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

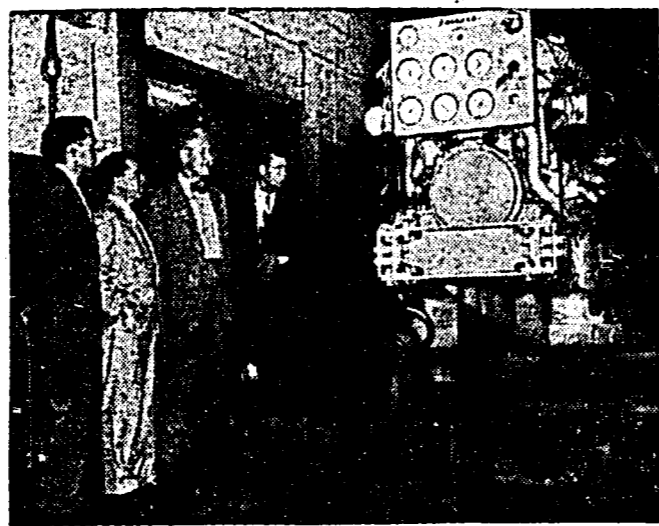

KANAZAWA, JAPAN, NOV. 3. — The late Dr. Jokichi Takamine, who isolated Adrenalin in 1900, was lauded on his 100th birthday here today for his "scientific discoveries, international trade contacts and great humanitarian interests."

Homer C. Fritsch, mayor of Grosse Pointe Park, Mich., and executive vice president of Parke, Davis & Co., travelled nearly 7,000 miles to participate in the colorful ceremonies and present a special scholl honoring the former Parke, Davis consultant, who died in 1922.

"Through Dr. Jokichi Takamine's scientific discoveries, through his international trade contacts, and finally through his great humanitarian interests, he has left his mark on the world," Fritsch said.

Greatest of all Takamine discoveries was his isolation in 1900 of Adrenalin, the first pure crystalline hormone to be made available to the medical profession.

Fritsch explained that Adrenalin produces a pronounced constriction of small blood vessels in the body. Consequently, it is employed to control bleeding from mucous membranes and surgical operative fields, especial in operations of the nose and throat, resulting in bloodless surgery.

It is a powerful stimulant of the heart, and is occasionally injected directly into the heart muscle as an emergency measure to restore the activity of the heart which suddenly has failed to beat.

In addition, Fritsch said Adrenalin also is employed in the management of acute allergic attacks "where its use may be life-saving."

"It has become an indispensable product in the armamentarium of the physician and the surgeon," Fritsch commented. "It has increased in value through the years, and today is one of the outstanding medical products of the age."

Dr. Takamine once presented, in the name of his native country, a gift of Japanese cherry trees to Washington, D. C., and New York City. He also conducted personal research studies involving molds which led to the discovery of TakaDiatase, a widely used starch digesting ferment.

"The importance of TakaDiatase is readily appreciated when it is realized that Parke-Davis

has marketed over 3,000,000 pounds, or the equivalent of 1,000,000,000 doses, since its addition to our catalogue in 1895," Fritsch said. "Today it is enjoying its greatest demand."

The four-day ceremony opened yesterday and continues through Nov. 5. Included among the congratulatory addresses today were talks by the Japanese minister of education, the United States Ambassador to Japan and the president of Kanazawa College.

Tomorrow, a commemoration mass for Dr. Takamine will be held at Kokutaiji Temple. A daughter-in-law of the famed scientist, Mrs. Eben T. Takamine of New York, presented a large portrait of Dr. Takamine to the centennial committee and later, on behalf of the family, thanked the group for the ceremonies.

A literal translation of the Japanese scroll presented by Fritsch reads:

"Parke, Davis & Co. U.S.A., is honored to convey to the chairman of the committee and to the Japanese people its profound felicitations on the occasion of the Centennial Anniversary of Dr. Jokichi Takamine in his birthplace, Kanazawa, Japan, November 2 to 3, 1953, and to join with them in tribute to the memory of a distinguished scientist and colleague."

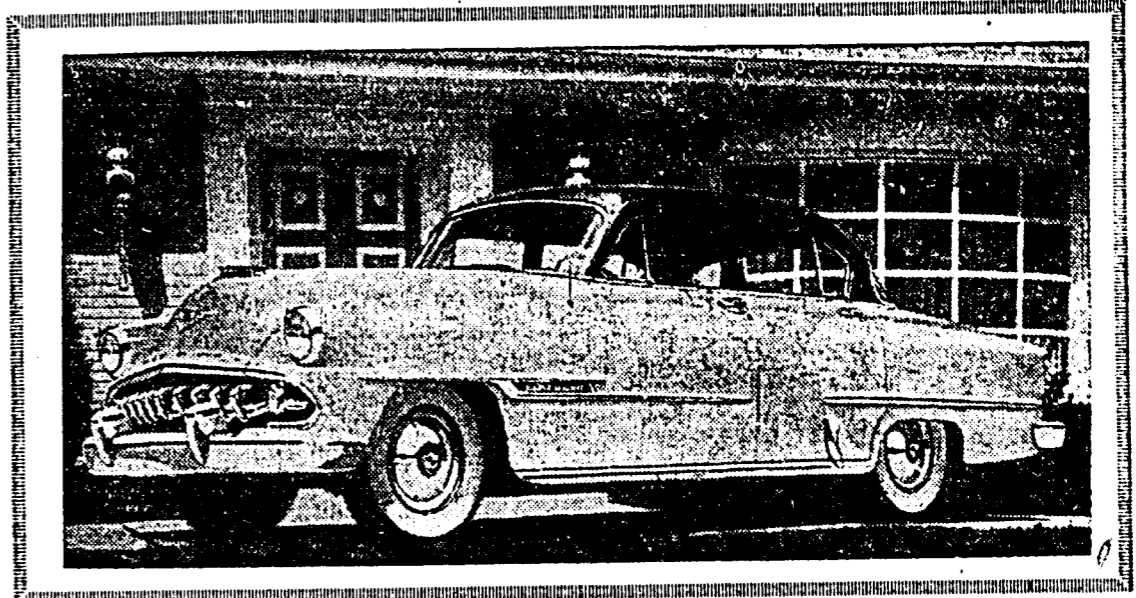

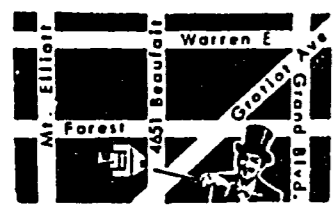
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### Students Discuss Safety Problems

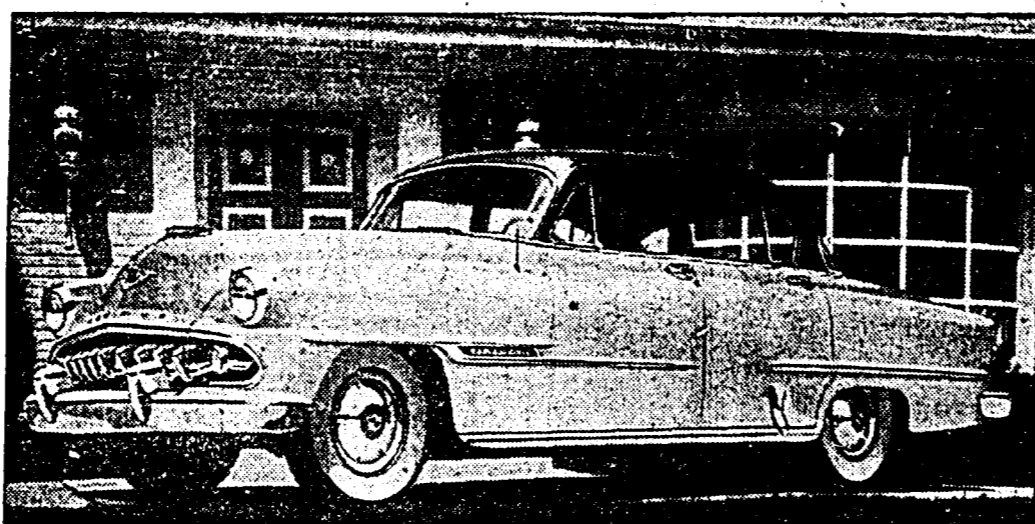

## Architect's Drawing of Proposed New Pier for Grosse Pointe City's Lakefront Park

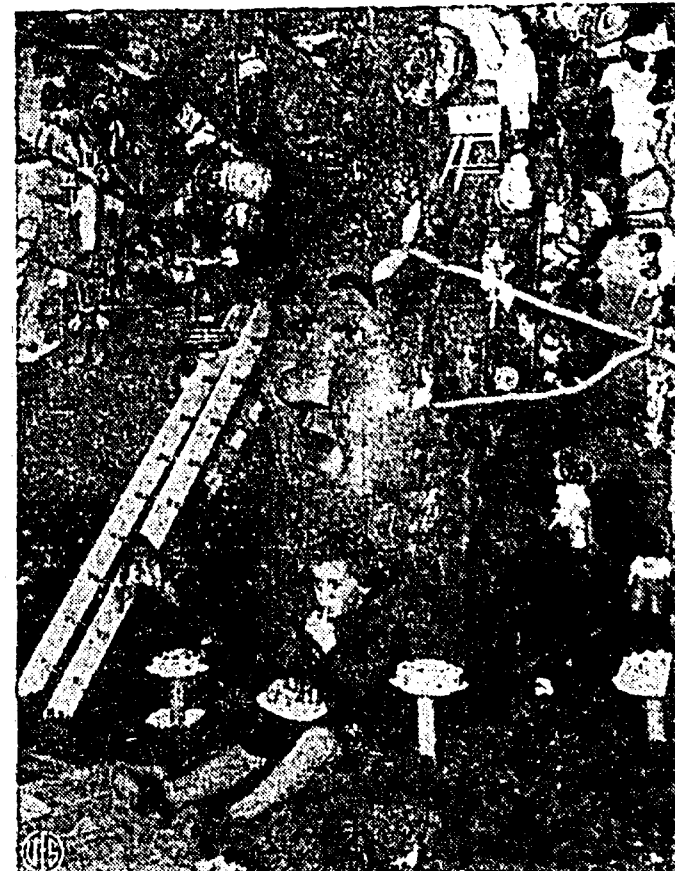

**Both Leaders Win**  
Monroe slaughtered winless Highland Park 34 to 0 and Royal Oak beat non-league Pontiac 21 to 7.

**Grosse Point Hit with Lightning-Fury**  
Scoring its lone touchdown within five minutes after the opening kickoff, Lou "Tweedle Dum" Hribar took a handoff from quarterback Jim Lineberger and faced 30 yards after smothering over his own right tackle, and reversed his field in the Tractors' secondary to carry two Fordson tacklers over the goal line on his back.

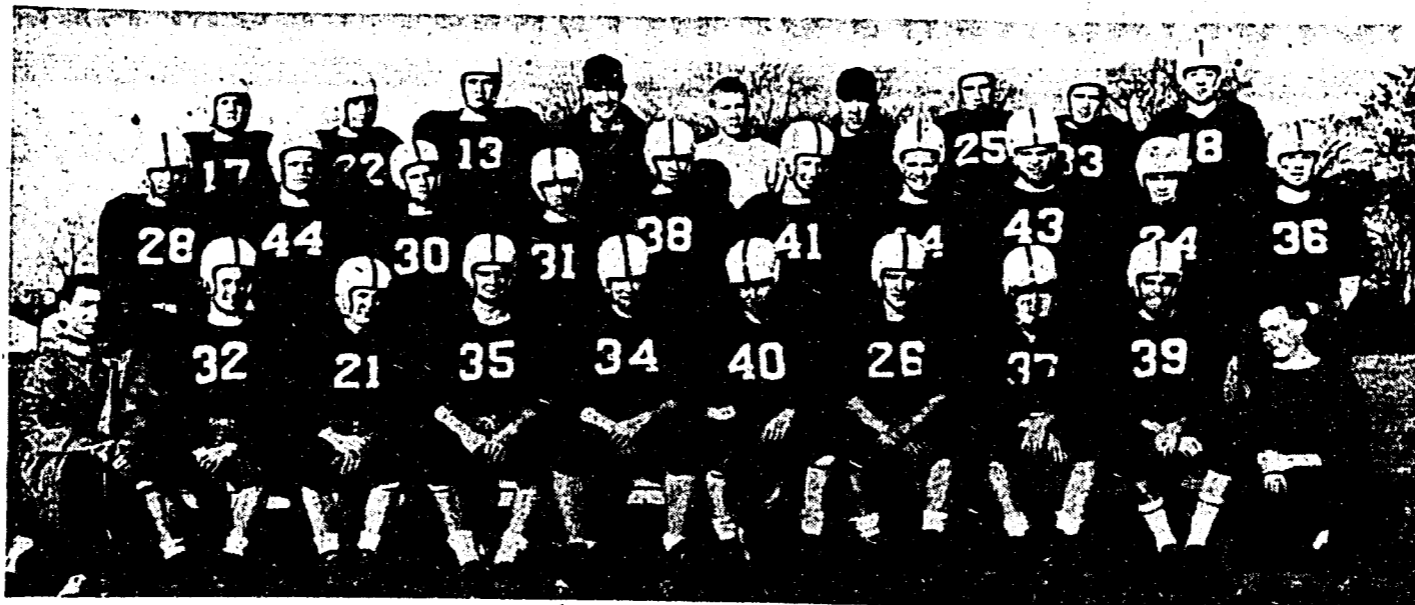
**Climaxed Long Drive**

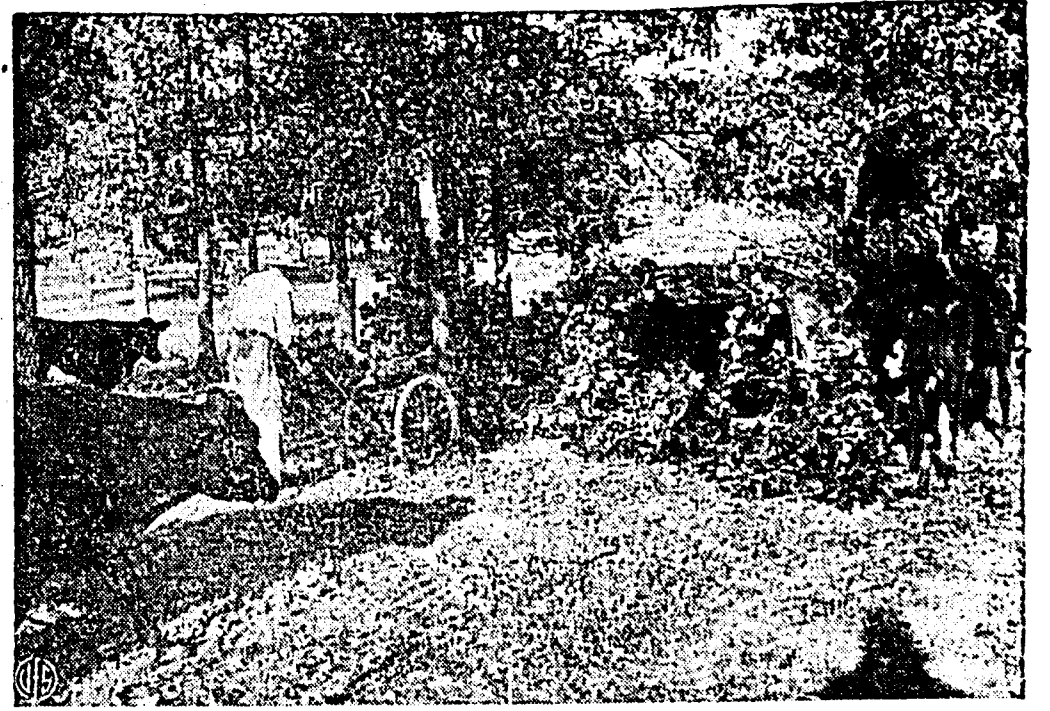

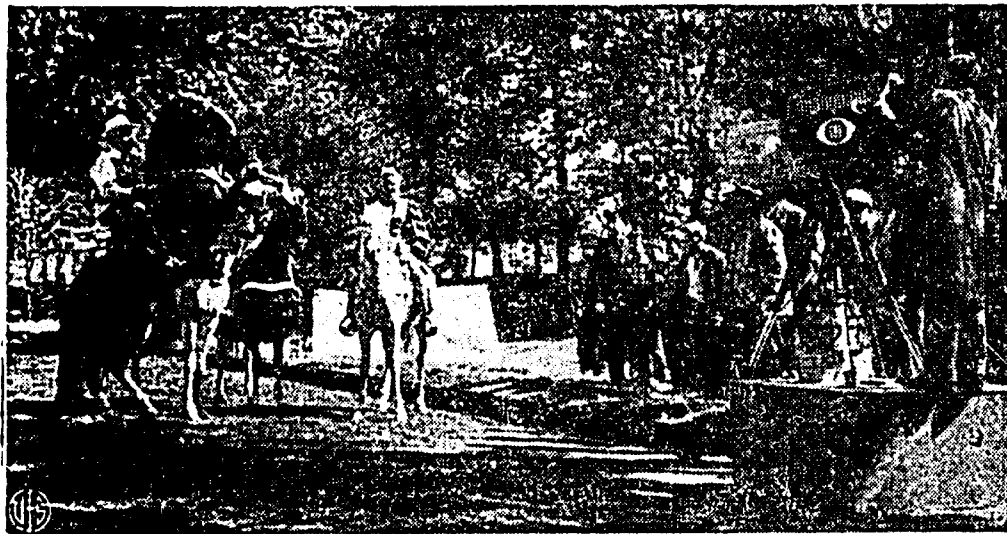
**"STICK 'EM UP!"**—These are not four victims of a stick-up man. They are members of a peasant family living near Rajkot, India, all of whom have extra fingers.

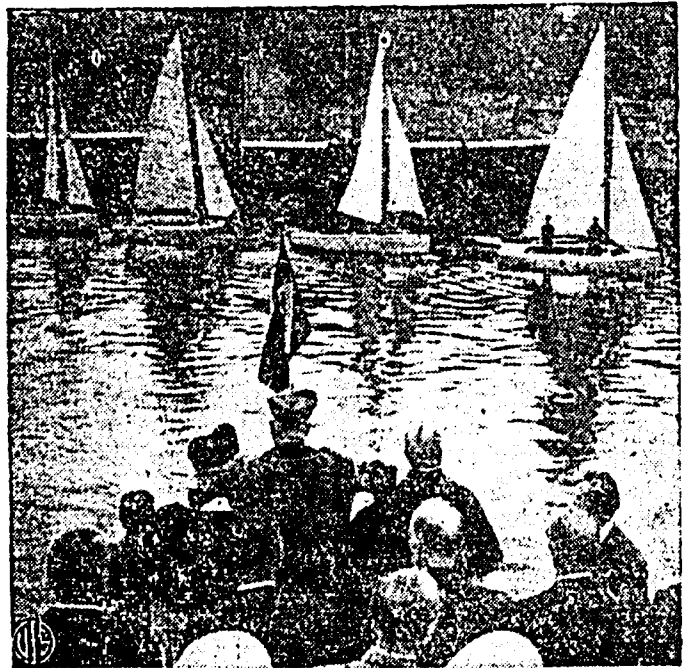

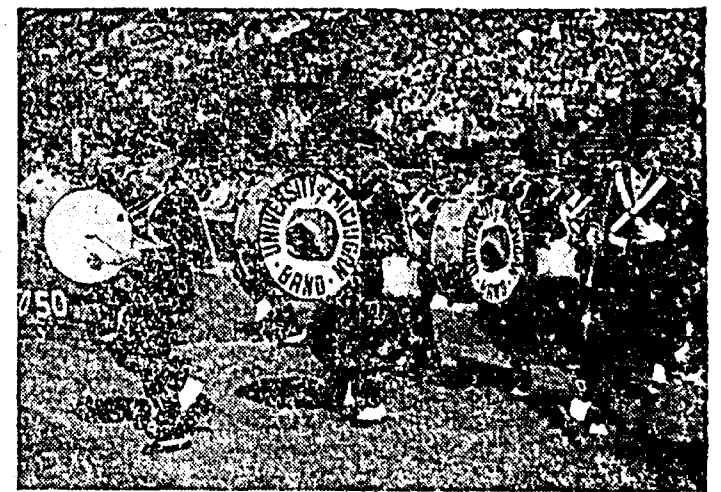

votes; Theodore G. Osius, treasurer for the last 15 years, got 1,522; Neil Blondell, tax assessor for 25 years, 1,511; and Charles H. Locke, constable for 12 years, was given 1,544.  
The amendments to the City's charter met with the approval of the majority of the voters who trekked to the polls.  
**Change Justices' Pay**  
A special proposition, which would give the council authority to draft an ordinance whereby the justices of the peace would be placed on salary, thus doing away with the fee collecting system, was approved by 1,358 yes votes, as against 308 noes. This also gives the council authority to establish the amount of compensation.  
**Pensions Increased**  
An amendment to the Employees' Retirement System was passed by 1,575 ballots in favor, with only 111 against.  
The amendment, among other

things, increases basic pensions by \$20 a year and membership service pensions one-eighth; and provides automatic protection to widows of members with 10 or more years of service who die after eligible retirement age.  
A special council meeting will be held tonight, November 5, to certify the election. The elected officials will be sworn in and assume their offices on the night of the regular council meeting, Monday, November 16.  
**Organize to Amend State Lottery Act**  
Representatives of more than 30 Wayne County benevolent organizations responded to the appeal of John H. Courtney, vice president of the Michigan Association of Charitable Organizations to amend the state lottery act.  
The amendment would allow charitable, civic, fraternal and veteran groups to operate bingo and raffles for philanthropic purposes.  
The name of the organization will be the Wayne County Association of Benevolent Organizations.

That Chapter 3, Section 3.5 of the Charter of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, Wayne County, Michigan, be amended so as to read as follows:  
'Chapter 3, Section 3.5. The elective officers of the city shall be a mayor, six councilmen and the Municipal Judge (Justice of the Peace). At the regular city election in 1954, there shall be elected from the city at large a mayor for a term of two years, and three councilmen for a term of two years; and in the year of 1955 there shall be elected from the city at large three councilmen for a term of three years, and in 1956 and biennially thereafter there shall be elected at each regular city election a mayor for a term of two years and three councilmen for a term of office of four years; all such terms to commence on the Monday next following the date of such election.  
At the regular city election in 1954 and every fourth year thereafter there shall also be elected the Municipal Judge (Justice of the Peace) for a term of four years commencing on the fourth of July next following such election.'  
Chapter 3, Section 3.5 of the Charter of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods at the present time reads as follows:  
'Section 3.5. The elective officers of the city shall be a Mayor, six Councilmen and the Municipal Judge (Justice of the Peace). At each regular city election there shall be elected from the city at large a Mayor for a term of office of one year and three Councilmen for a term of office of two years, all such terms to commence on the Monday next following the date of such election.  
At the regular city election in 1954 and every fourth regular city election thereafter there shall also be elected the Municipal Judge (Justice of the Peace) for a term of four years commencing on the fourth day of July next following such election.'  
**PROPOSITION NO. 2**  
'That Chapter 3, Section 3.4 of the Charter of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, Wayne County, Michigan, be amended to read as follows:  
Chapter 3, Section 3.4. A regular city election shall be held on the first Monday in April of 1954, 1955 and 1956 and biennially thereafter.'  
Chapter 3, Section 3.4 of the Charter of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods at the present time reads as follows:  
'Section 3.4. A regular city election shall be held on the first Monday in April of 1952 and of each year thereafter.'  
**PROPOSITION NO. 3**  
'That Chapter 4, Section 4.2 of the Charter of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, Wayne County, Michigan, be amended so as to read as follows:  
Chapter 4, Section 4.2. Each councilman and the mayor shall receive as compensation, fifteen dollars for each regular or special meeting of the council which he attends. The mayor shall, in addition, receive the sum of two hundred dollars per year.  
Such salaries shall be paid monthly and except as otherwise provided in this charter shall constitute the only compensation which may be paid the mayor or councilmen for the discharge of any official duty for or on behalf of the city during their term of office. However, the mayor and councilmen may, upon order of the council, be paid such necessary bona fide expenses incurred in service in behalf of the city as are authorized and itemized.'  
Chapter 4, Section 4.2 of the Charter of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, at the present time reads as follows:  
'Section 4.2. Each Councilman and the Mayor shall receive as compensation, fifteen dollars for each regular and special meeting of the Council which he attends; but the compensation so paid shall not exceed four hundred dollars in any fiscal year. The Mayor shall, in addition, receive the sum of two hundred dollars per year.  
Such salaries shall be paid monthly and except as otherwise provided in this charter shall constitute the only compensation which may be paid the Mayor or Councilmen for the discharge of any official duty for or on behalf of the city during their term of office. However, the Mayor and Councilmen may, upon order of the Council, be paid such necessary bona fide expenses incurred in service in behalf of the city as are authorized and itemized.'
