### Sanger Retires; Banking Dean 87

Henry H. Sanger, dean of Detroit bankers, announced his retirement as a director of Manufacturers National Bank at the annual meeting of the bank's stockholders today. At the same time, the stockholders elected three new directors to the bank's board.

George M. Holley Jr., president of the Holley Carburetor Company.

Russell S. Strickland, executive vice-president of the Bower Roller Bearing Company.

Wendell W. Anderson Jr., vice-president and general manager of the Bundy Tubing Company. All other directors were re-elected, increasing the bank's board membership from 15 to 17. Mr. Sanger, who is 87, has been in banking for 70 years—all of them in Detroit. After he was graduated from Cornell, he joined the First National Bank and later was an officer at the Commercial National Bank.

He helped organize the National Bank of Commerce in 1907 and eventually headed that institution. In 1932 he became vice-chairman of the Guardian National Bank of Commerce.

Mr. Sanger was one of the organizers of the Manufacturers

National Bank in 1933 and had served since that time as a director. He was in turn, senior vice-president, president—succeeding the late John Ballantyne—chairman of the board and chairman of the executive committee of Manufacturers National.

The new directors of the bank are among the best known young business executives in the Detroit area.

George M. Holley Jr., became president of the Holley Carburetor Company in 1953, after successfully guiding the firm for ten years as executive vice president and general manager. He is a graduate of Cornell University.

Russell S. Strickland became executive vice-president of the Bower Roller Bearing Company in 1952, after having served as a director and vice-president in charge of sales from 1946. A graduate of the University of Michigan, he served as an officer in the U. S. Navy from 1943 to 1948. Mr. Strickland is also director and secretary of the Boys' Club of Detroit.

### Move Started to Ban Wild Fowl Hunting on Lakefront

A move is underway, spearheaded by Grosse Pointe City Clerk Norbert Neff, whereby all the Pointe communities will petition the Michigan Wild Life Conservation Department to ban wild fowl hunting all along the six-mile shoreline of the Pointes.

Mr. Neff stated that the hunting of ducks has been going on for years, along the shoreline, and that it has become a nuisance to the residents who have their homes near the water.

The Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association, which now occupies the former Russell A. Alger home, began the spreading of the idea by sending letters to the heads of the local communities.

"About 30 years ago, the state banned spring duck hunting along the shoreline," said Mr. Neff. "Now, hunting only in the Fall. Permitting hunting is getting out of hand."

"In the autumn, hunters go out into the lake in their boats, and shoot inland, wantonly killing the Mallard ducks which have practically become the pets of Pointe residents. The shots not only kill the birds, but pellets pepper the homes of the people in the hunting area."

He said the move is underway to make the Pointes a sanctuary for the birds, which through feeding and kind treatment by residents have just about become tame. Several civic organizations have expressed an interest in the project, he added.

He pointed out that the so-called hunters not only show very poor sportsmanship by killing ducks, which sometimes are only half to two-thirds grown, but they have become an extreme nuisance, and this nuisance can very easily become a danger to the residents.
