Then, at a special meeting held on Friday, February 26, McKnight, when queried by the residents, stated that the Authority, and that the incinerator will be built only as a last resort.

Regarding the Woods' proposal, a new group, calling themselves the Progressive Citizens Group, are circulating petitions in favor of the city-owned rubbish burner, as opposed to the citizens who are circulating their anti-incinerator petitions.

City officials stated that if both the pro and anti-incinerator forces obtain the required number of signatures of registered voters, the issue will probably be put to popular vote.

sight, with the oily film covering walls, ceiling and all the contents, broken glass everywhere, and the blizzard blowing snow into the gaping, jagged openings in the two wings of the building.

Fortunately, no one was passing when the first explosion blew out the big window in the west wing. The force of the blast sprayed the sidewalk with large and small pieces of broken glass and anyone in its path would certainly have been injured.

The explosions were evidently caused by arcing electrodes, which furnish the ignition to fire the boiler. Vaporized oil had apparently become concentrated in the hot furnace before the oversupply of fuel was ignited by the delayed, faulty ignition.

The first blast is believed to have blown out the flames, then the same process was repeated... more concentration of vaporized oil and another delayed ignition. The decorators are still busy putting the finishing touches to a thorough job of renovating. The staff is still congratulating each other on two counts... no one was hurt... and it happened after the week's issue had cleared the office and was on the way to the presses.

community has some of the tallest elm trees in the area, ranging from 90 to 100 feet, said it cost the City about \$6,000 to have its elms sprayed and cared for. He said there are 2,965 elms owned by the City.

Village Superintendent Thomas Jefferies of the Shores, revealed that it cost the Village \$851.20 to care for its trees last year. He added that the figure could be much larger, but for the Wayne County Agriculture Department, which several times sprayed and cut down elms along Lake Shore road, sometimes without the Village officials' knowledge. The community owns 447 trees.

Farms Spent \$3,240 The Farms expended \$3,240 to care for its 1,836 elm trees, according to Farms City Engineer Murray M. Smith. He said that in 1953, the 29 diseased trees which were cut down, were mostly private-owned.

Woods City Administrator Ray MacArthur stated that by spraying its own trees last year, the city saved a considerable sum of money. He said the Woods spent about \$1,070 to spray its elms within the city limits and in its lake front park.

He revealed that the last time a private company took care of the city's trees, it cost in the vicinity of \$10,000. The Woods owns 2,262 elms within the limits and about 200 in the park.

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
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Court Chaplain Lenten Speaker

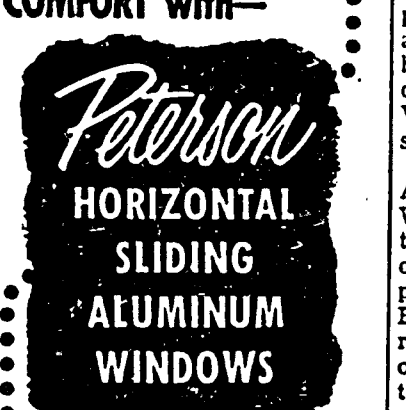

The first comprehensive reference book of Grosse Pointe has just been published by the League of Women Voters and will be shown tomorrow at the annual meeting of the League.

A special feature of the handbook is a detailed street map of Grosse Pointe showing municipal buildings, churches, schools, and voting locations.

Air Force Nurse Talks at GPHS

"A girl should not become a nurse with the single intention of joining a branch of the armed services. She must have a desire to help others."
Captain Hellen, chief nurse at Selfridge Air Force Base stressed these words in her talk to the Future Nurses' Club at Grosse Pointe High School.
Captain Hellen spoke on nursing as a career in the Air Force and other branches of the armed services.
"The Army, Navy, and Air Force Nursing Corps are similar," she commented. "The only difference is, in splitting the groups, each branch can specialize in one type of nursing, such as floating hospital or air ambulance nursing."
Air Force nursing is based mostly in the communication areas, she said, but nurses do fly into combat areas to remove patients.
"There is only one difference between the registered civilian and service nurse," she added. "In time of war you are near the service men action."
Captain Hellen told about the founding of the Air Force Nursing Corps. It grew out of the Army Nurse Corps in 1949. She, herself, has been in the service for 12 years, six years in the army and the last six years in the Air Force, serving in Europe, Japan, and Korea.
"Cadet nursing," Captain Hellen stated, "is no longer in existence. Now you have to be a registered nurse from an accredited school before you can enter the Air Force Nursing Corps."
In the Air Force, as in other service branches, she explained, young women sign a contract for a minimum of two years and enter as a second lieutenant. If for any reason the nurse is unable to cope with service life, she may get permission for release.
"I think every woman has a certain amount of patriotic duty to her country," she stressed. "There is no draft for the Women's Service Corps, but in case of emergency drafting nurses is legalized."
In time of war, she told the girls, operating room nurses and flight nurses are the two most wanted groups. The main mission of the air evacuation is to bring injured service men to specialists in well-equipped hospitals.
"One reason a girl joins a particular branch of the service is because she likes the uniform," Captain Hellen commented. "It's the new age of flying that makes the Air Force attractive to youth."
Captain Hellen also showed a movie about medical work in all armed forces entitled "Of Men and Medicine."
Afterward she distributed pamphlets and reference literature to the girls. She also passed around photos of shots from the recently released Air Force picture, "Flight Nurse."

 2. Awakening America to the need for doing something NOW.
 3. Showing Americans everywhere how they as individuals can help rebuild natural resources.
 4. Through the coming months, Cubs, Scouts and Explorer groups will be busily engaged in one or more of the following projects or activities:
 1. Building and setting out bird houses, feeding stations, in back yards or parks.
 2. Planting food or cover crops or shrubs for wild life.
 3. Planting grass seed in Yard, School or church yard.
 4. Planting trees or seedlings in the yard or park.
 5. Work on conservation and nature electives.
 6. Visit a fish hatchery, game farm or refuge.

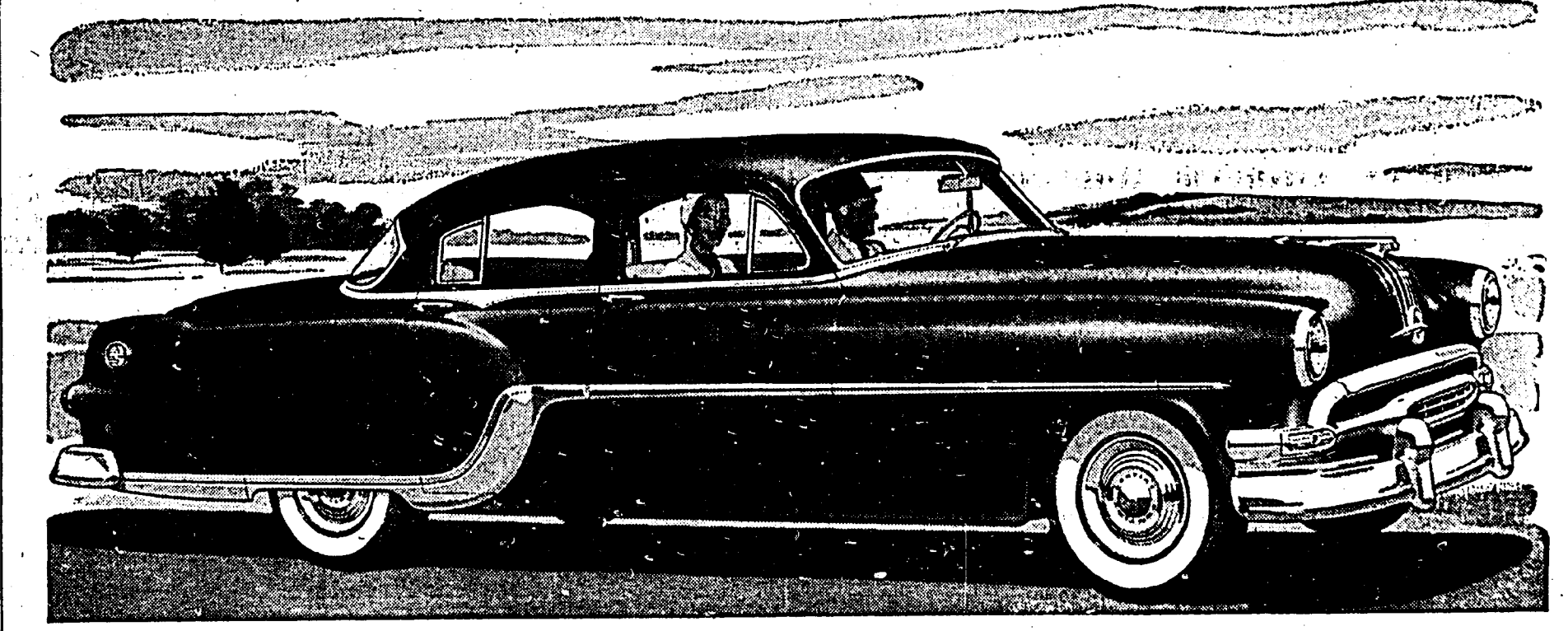
