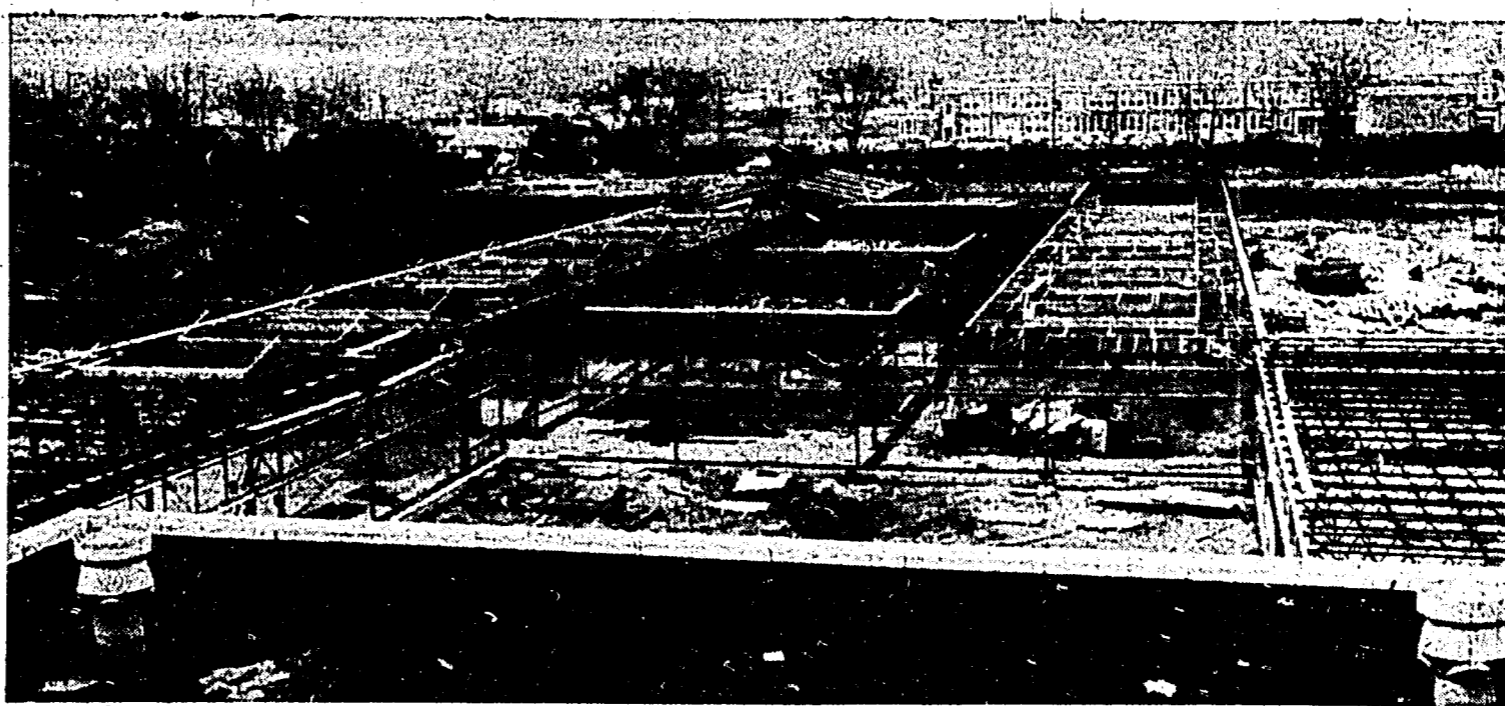

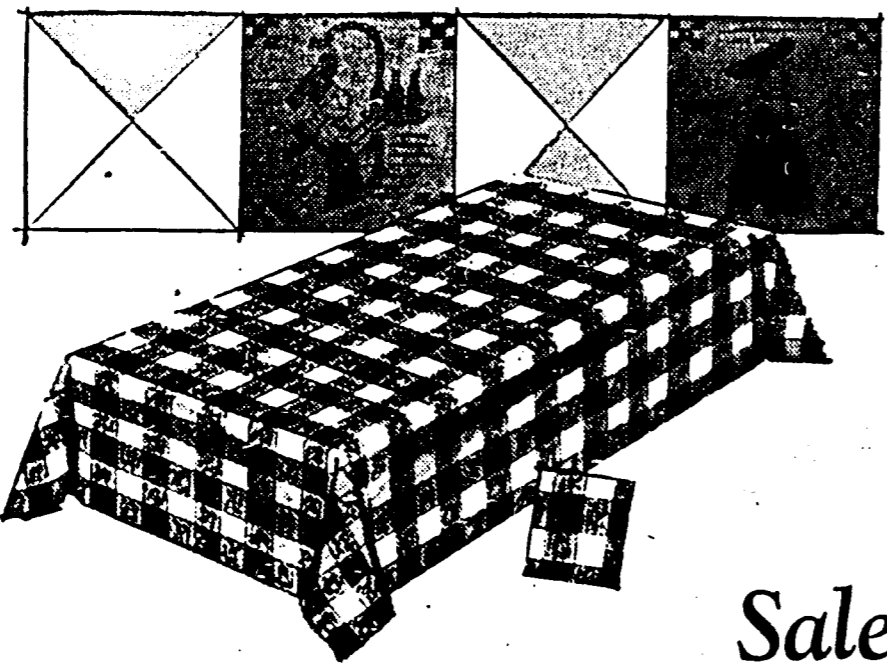

# Fund Drive Launched By Republican Women

The Kick-Off meeting which starts the annual campaign for funds of the Wayne and Oakland Counties Republican Women's Finance Committee was held at 11 a.m. yesterday, (April 12), at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Center. The drive is taking place in the spring this year in order to provide money for the elections this fall, according to campaign co-chairmen, Mrs. William K. Muir of Grosse Pointe and Mrs. Brooks Marshall of Birmingham.

Three-hundred women will be working during the next month on this campaign which will culminate in a gala contributions luncheon at the Sheraton-Cadillac Hotel on Wednesday, May 26, at which the guest speaker will be Hollywood's famous columnist, Hedda Hopper. Those women whose contributions to the Republican Party entitle them to tickets to the luncheon will hear all about Hollywood and its people straight from one who really knows.

At least 200 of the workers were present at the Kick-Off to receive their lists of names and the assignment kits which small working committees have been preparing and stuffing for some weeks past. Wayne County Campaign Chairman, Mrs. Muir, exhorted the women to start work immediately and to have all the necessary money in hand by the luncheon date on May 26.
