taining \$90 and personal papers in the cab, and did not miss it until the bus had started up. She called the police as soon as possible, and the cab company was notified.

The cab driver, Clark, was called in. He informed police, when questioned, that he knew nothing of a purse. However, he said, a minute after he had let off Mrs. Heinrich, he had picked up another fare who possibly could have taken the purse.

When the shoe store manager mentioned the name of Clark, Sgt. Seelow and Det. Beaupre decided to play a hunch, and asked permission to search the store basement. Not only was permission granted, but the manager helped the officers in their search.

#### Find Missing Purse

In one part of the basement were piles of cardboard boxes, and it was decided this would be a good place to start. The three men began a methodical search. It proved successful, for underneath the pile of boxes was the missing purse, the money gone, and all of Mrs. Heinrich's personal papers torn into tiny bits.

Armed with this evidence, the two detectives started to look for Clark, finally locating and arresting him at a drug store at Chalmers and Harper in Detroit.

#### Signs Confession

Taken to the Farms station and confronted with the evidence, Clark admitted in a written statement, that he had taken the purse. He said that he had spent all the money, and had torn up all the papers.

Sgt. Seelow stated that a charge of larceny by conversion against Clark hinges on whether full restitution of the money and the cost of replacing certain papers and a broken pair of glasses are made to Mrs. Heinrich. This amounts to about \$117.

It was also disclosed that Clark, who has since been discharged from his cab job, is out on a \$500 bond, pending a trial on breaking and entering charges in Detroit.

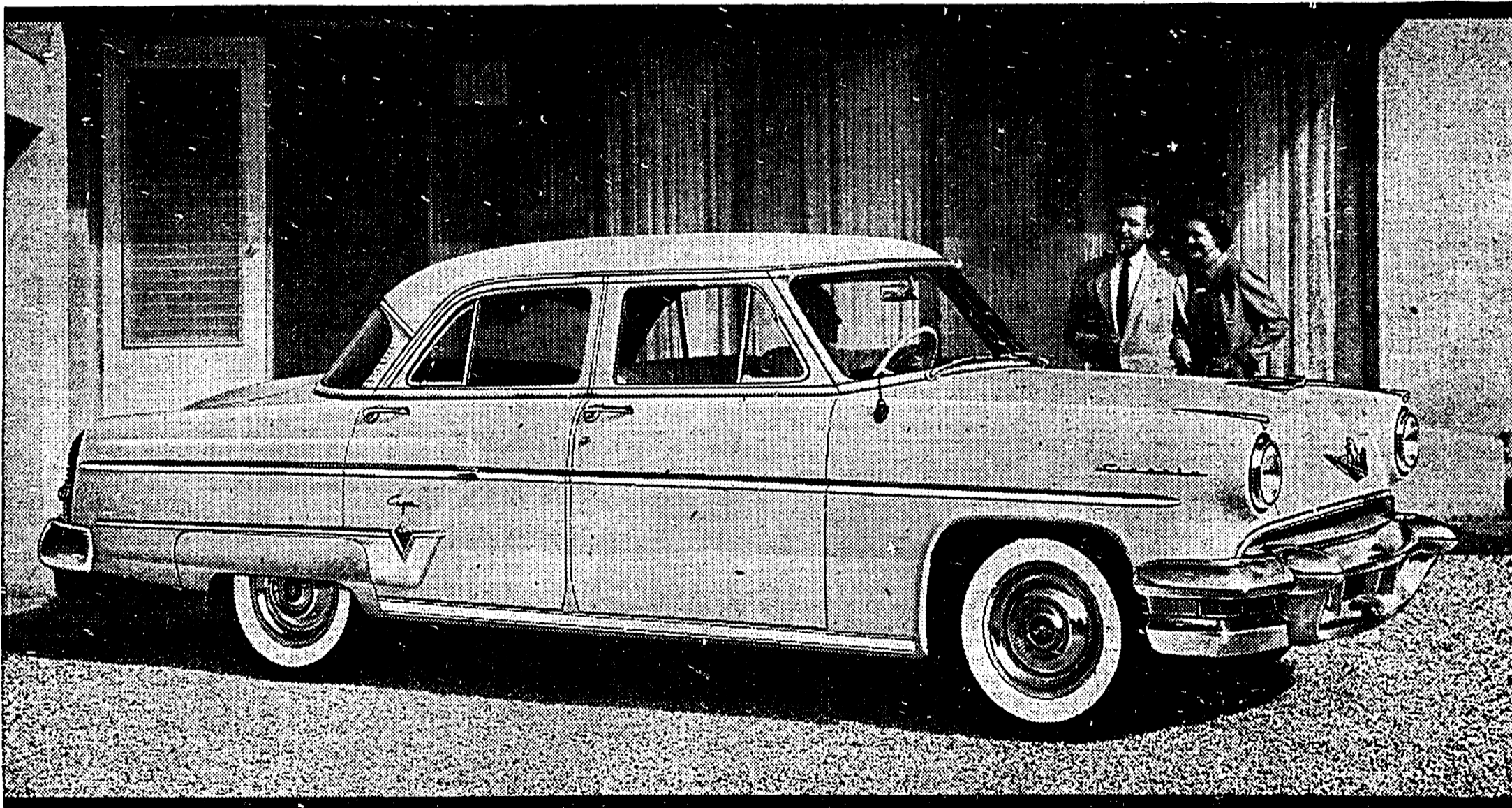

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### Freedoms Foundation Prize Won By High School Editor

"For outstanding achievement in bringing about a better understanding of the American way of life," reads the inscription on the George Washington Honor Medal presented to the Grosse Pointe High School newspaper, "The Tower," by the Freedom Foundation at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

Nancy Corey, 11A, is the writer of the editorial, "Freedom of Choice—Great Privilege," printed in the Tower last semester, which won the award for the paper.

Dr. Kenneth D. Wells, president of the Freedom Foundation, presented awards to 22 Michigan groups and individuals last Wednesday, May 12, in a radio broadcast.

Of these 22, "The Tower" was the only high school newspaper to receive an award.

In addition to the George Washington Honor Medal, "The Tower" received a \$100 check.

The staff agreed to donate the \$100 to the Foundation. In a conference with Dr. Wells, a plan was made for the allocation of the check.

He assured "The Tower" that the gift will be sent by the organization to a small German school on the Russian border, which has been repeatedly attacked by the Communists. The money, which will value about \$480 in Germany, will aid in buying books and material to help the pupils learn more about the true meaning of freedom.

The check will be endorsed: "To the Freedom Foundation, for use to 'Speak up for Freedom' in Europe, where the battle for minds rages."

Before the tape-recording of the program began, the award recipients gathered in the W.W.S. auditorium where they were addressed by Dr. Wells. He gave a graphic account of the famous siege of Washington and his army at historic Valley Forge and also told about the Freedom Foundation and its work.

Headquarters were established at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, in 1940.

There are five buildings on the grounds, with two barns housing the foundation offices. Here also is situated a library of material on the American system, more complete than any elsewhere in the country.

It is hoped that the Freedom Foundation will one day become a highly recognized research center.

The organization, now five years old, has given over 4,000 awards.

A jury of 30 persons evaluated the work. Composing the jury were chief justices of the state supreme courts, executives of veterans' organizations and other similar services, and the heads of recognized outstanding community service groups.

"The basis of the judging," said Dr. Wells, "is the credo defining our American way of life."

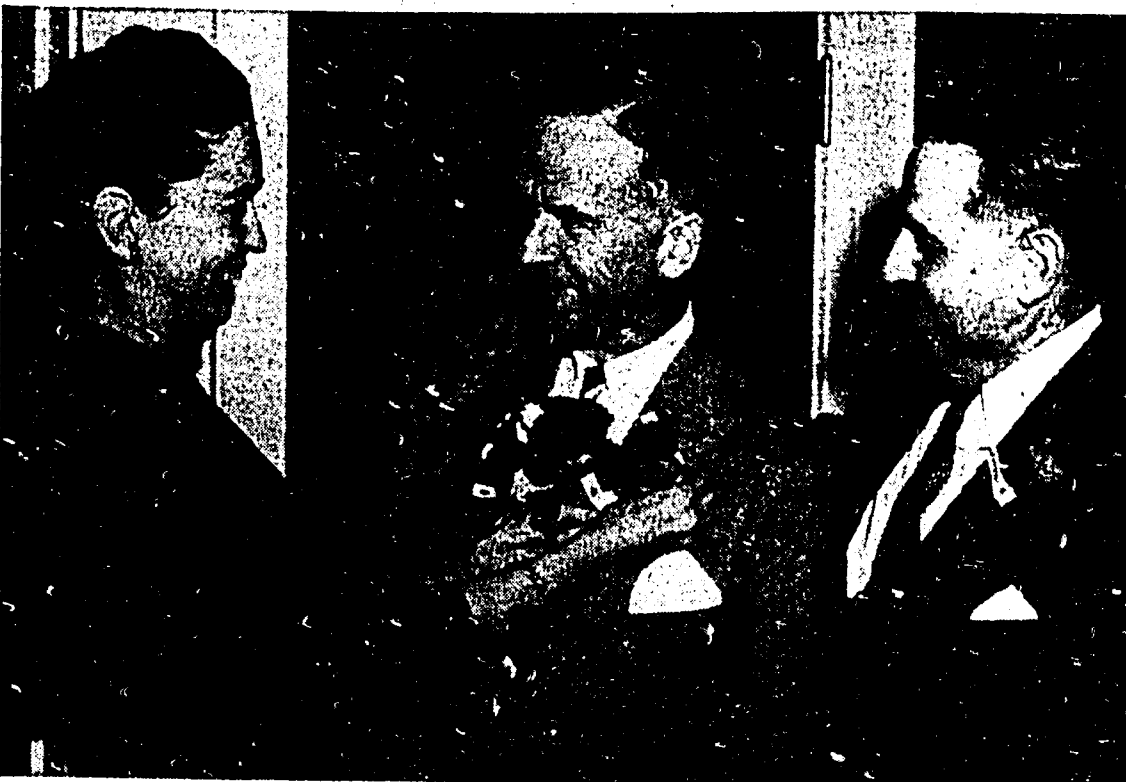
In 1953, eight and one-half tons of mail entries were received by the Foundation. The winners represent only one-seventh of one percent of all the material considered.

"It is a great honor," said Nancy in the broadcast, "for me to have the privilege of receiving this award from the Freedom Foundation on behalf of the Grosse Pointe High School. It has also been a privilege writing this editorial which has given me a chance to express my opinion on this subject, the freedom of choice."

Among others in this region receiving Freedom Foundation awards were: the T.V. program "International Town," Wayne University; Arthur Poyner—Detroit News cartoonist; Albion College; the Ford Motor Company; the Chrysler Corporation; the General Motors Corporation; the suburban city of Farmington; Cadillac Grade School; and the Inkster Public Schools.

Six Michigan community organizations were given awards, the largest number from one state in the history of the foundation. They were: Operation Tornado—Flint; Grand Rapids Chamber of Commerce; Greater Muskegon Chamber of Commerce; the Michigan Department of the American Legion; and the Detroit Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

### Council Adopts Farms Budget

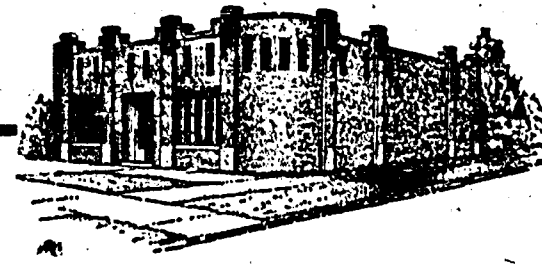

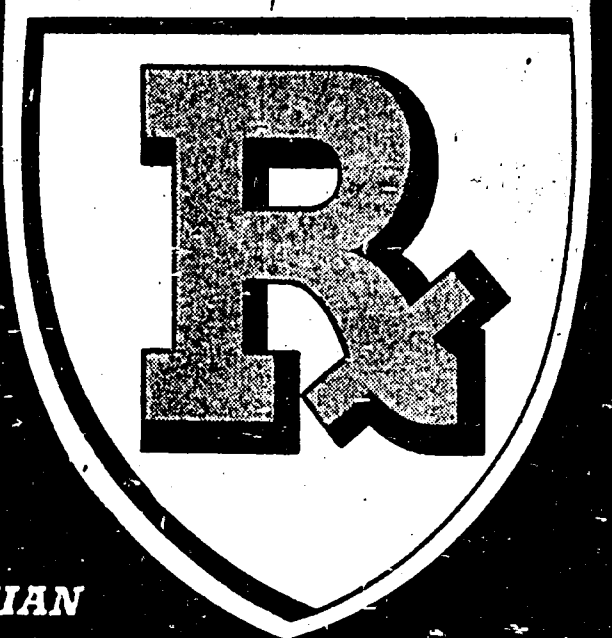

### 4 Motor Aides To Be Honored

Four residents of this area will be honored Tuesday, May 25, when Motor Aides join with the Central Volunteer Bureau of the United Community Services of Metropolitan Detroit for an annual meeting in International Institute, 111 East Kirby.

Grosse Pointe Lera to receive special recognition for five years' service as Motor Aides includes Mrs. Sherman J. Fitzsimmons, 88 Stephens road; Mrs. Edward T. Goodrich, 102 Handy road; Mrs. Harry Howenstein, 251 Vendome road, and Mrs. J. R. Kennedy, 400 Lincoln road.

They are among a group of 30 volunteers from throughout the City to be cited for outstanding service as Motor Aide drivers. Committee reports will highlight the Volunteer Bureau program scheduled for 11 a.m. Following a noon luncheon, Motor Aides will present a program at 1 p.m.

Speaker will be Dr. Ralph Johnson, past president of Wayne County Medical Society and member of Metropolitan Detroit Committee on Aging. His topic will be "Understanding Your Older Patients."

Motor Aides, a group of volunteer drivers organized in 1948, transport Detroit's ill, blind, crippled and aged to hospitals and clinics for treatments.

"Without the help of volunteers, these patients could not make the necessary trips to receive much-needed therapy prescribed by their doctors, declares Mrs. George Abbott, of 328 Touraine, Grosse Pointe Farms, Motor Aides chairman. "They are physically unable to use public transportation and cannot afford private transportation."

Some 175 men and women from all parts of the City now serve as Motor Aides. Among them are housewives, retired business men, a woman taxi driver, a factory worker, an office nurse, a judge. "All have one thing in common—the desire to help others directly," Mrs. Abbott said. "It is not uncommon for these volunteers to become interested in a patient and his problems and want to help in more ways than acting as chauffeur."

The central dispatching office, located in the United Community Services Building, 51 West Warren, and operated by volunteers, receives all requests for transportation and schedules trips for drivers.

The Motor Aides chairman pointed out that these volunteer drivers limit their service to persons certified by hospitals, clinic or agency social workers.

"Unfortunately, many now desperately in need of transportation must be turned down," she said. "There just are not enough drivers to fill all requests. We need many additional volunteers."

She emphasized that any responsible driver with a car available at regular times is eligible. Those who wish to join this corps, labeled "motorists of mercy," should telephone TEMple 1-1600 and ask for the Motor Aides office.

The volunteer dispatcher on duty will explain how trips are arranged and the time involved. Most trips are arranged on an appointment basis and require less than a half day.

Many drivers make one trip a week; other only one a month. The volunteer, herself, determines how often she will accept calls.

### 750 Pointe Children Given Fluorine Treatments

Nearly 750 children in the Grosse Pointe schools received fluorine treatments this year, new delegates to the Grosse Pointe Mothers' Health Education Council were told at a tea in their honor at the War Memorial Center, Tuesday afternoon, May 11.

To acquaint the new members with their duties, Mrs. Charles Porritt, former president of the Council and speaker of the afternoon, described the treatments carried on under the dental program of the Council.

"Many parents whose children attend schools where our program is not available have asked me how they can have their children's teeth treated," Mrs. Porritt related.

"They appreciate the great saving of time if the work could be done at school instead of at a dentist's office. They want the considerable saving of money

also, since our cost is only five dollars."

The speaker explained that any school in Grosse Pointe could use the fluorine service if the students' parents united to let the school authorities know their desire and if the school heads were willing.

Other than public schools, she listed those children treated this year as attending the Grosse Pointe Christian Day school, the Detroit University school, the Country Day school, and St. Clare school, the latter having the largest number to take this advantage, 112 pupils.

"We conduct our work under the close supervision of the Department of Health, the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, and the medical and dental authorities in Grosse Pointe," Mrs. Porritt continued. "One might say that we are a liaison group between the home and the schools."

While in Grosse Pointe there are few families who cannot afford the health improvements their children need, the former Health Council president pointed out that through its money making projects, the organization was able to contribute part or all of the cost of such professional attention that some of the children require.

She sketched the growing scope of the Council's work begun 10 years ago in physical and mental health. The dental program, Mrs. Porritt stated, started three years ago with the backing of the various Parent-Teacher Associations, the Lions club, the Kiwanis club, and the advice of dentists in Grosse Pointe who find that it frees them for essential remedial dentistry.

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
