Subdivision Regulations Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan

The following general rules and regulations governing plats, subdivisions and resubdivisions of land are adopted by the Grosse Pointe Park Planning Commission pursuant to Act. 205, Public Acts of 1931, as amended, and Act 172, Public Acts of 1929, as amended.

ARTICLE 1. TITLE

Section 101. SHORT TITLE

These rules shall be known as the "Subdivision Regulations of the City of Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan".

ARTICLE 2. AREA REGULATED

Section 201. TERRITORIAL LIMITS OF REGULATIONS These rules and regulations governing plats and subdivisions of land contained herein shall apply within the corporate limits of the City.

ARTICLE 3. DEFINITIONS

Section 301. DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of these regulations, certain words used herein are defined as follows:

1. BLOCK: An area of land within a subdivision that is en-

tirely bounded by streets, highways, or ways, except alleys, and the exterior boundary or boundaries of the Subdivision.

2. COMMISSION shall mean the City Plan Commission.

3. COUNCIL shall mean the legislative body of the City.

4. STREET: The term "Street" means a way for vehicular traffic, whether designated as a street, highway, thoroughfare, parkway, throughway, road, avenue, boulevard, lane, place or however otherwise designated.

- a. Alleys are minor ways providing a second means of access to a property.
- b. Arterial streets are those which are used primarily for fast or heavy traffic.
- c. Collector streets are those which carry traffic from minor streets to a major system of arterial streets and highways, including the principal entrance streets of a residential development and streets for circulation within such a development.
- d. Cul-de-sac is a minor street with only one outlet and having an appropriate terminal for the safe and convenient reversal of traffic movement.
- e. Marginal access streets are minor streets which are paralheld to and adjacent to arterial streets and highways; and which provide access to abutting properties and protection from through traffic.
- f. Minor streets are those which are used primarily for access to the abutting properties.

5. SUBDIVISION: The term "Subdivision" means the divi-sion of a parcel of land into two (2) or more lots or parcels for the purpose of transfer of ownership or building development, or, if a new street is involved, any division of a parcel of land. The term includes resubdivision and, when appropriate to the con-text, shall relate to the process of subdividing or to the land •ubdivided.

- a. Major subdivisions are those involving new streets or involving more than four (4) lots.
 b. Minor subdivisions are those on existing streets involving
- less than four (4) lots.

ARTICLE 4. SUBDIVISION PROCEDURE

Section 401. PRE-APPLICATION PROCEDURE

1. Prior to submission of a Preliminary Plat, subdividers are requested to submit tentative studies and general data to the Plan Commission at least ten (10) days before a regularly scheduled meeting.

(The purpose of the "Pre-Application Procedure" is to afford the subdivider an opportunity to avail himself of the advice and assistance of the Plan Commission and staff before preparation of the preliminary plat and before formal application for its ap-proval, in order to save time and money and to make the most of his land use opportunity.

(He should also consult with parties potentially interested with him or with the ultimate users of the development such as lending and mortgage insurance institutions, with a view to reaching, at this beginning stage, from conclusions regarding what part of the market demand should be served, the suitability of the location of the proposed subdivision, the most advantageous subdivision plan.

(Here is where opportunities are assured or lost. The Sub-divider is advised to engage a land planning specialist qualified to help him resolve the major factors into a workable and profitable

subdivision plan.)

AJOR SUBDIVISIONS MAJOR SUBDIVISIONS 1. The Final Plat shall conform substantially to the Pre-liminary Plat as approved, and, if desired by the Subdivider, it may constitute only that portion of the approved Preliminary Plat

which he proposes to record and develop at the time, provided, however, that such portion conforms to all requirements of these regulations. 2. The Final Plat shall be submitted to the Commission for approval within four months after approval of the Preliminary Plat; otherwise such approval shall become null and void unless an extension of time is applied for and granted by the Commis-

sion. 3. Application for approval of the Final Plat shall be sub-mitted in writing, with the plat copies, to the Commission, at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting at which it is to be con-

sidered.

4. The original and four (4) copies of the Final Plat must be submitted. One of the four (4) copies shall be on tracing cloth, written in waterproof ink and will be retained by the Commission. 5. The Final Plat shall be approved only after it meets those provisions listed below under Article 6 which are required by the Commission and the Council.

6. The Final Plat shall be prepared and presented in accord-ance with the provisions of Act 172, Public Acts of Michigan of 1929, as amended (Plat Act) and in addition shall show: building

lines and easements properly dimensioned, when, in the opinion of the Commission this requirement is desirable. When the Final Plat of the Major Subdivision meets all

requirements, the Commission shall present their report and copies of the plat along with the certificate of titles to the Council for approval.

ARTICLE 5. DESIGN STANDARDS

Section 501. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS 1. The arrangements, character, extent, width, grade, and location of all streets shall conform to the General Community Plan, (Master Plan Studies) and shall be considered in their rela-tion to existing and planned streets, to topographic conditions, to public convenience and safety, and in their appropriate relation to the proposed uses of the land to be served by such streets.

Where such is not shown in the General Community Plan. (Master Plan Studies), the arrangements of streets in a subdivision shall either:

a. Provide for the continuation or appropriate projection of existing principal streets in surrounding areas; or , Conform to a plan for the neighborhood approved by the

b. Commission to meet a particular situation where topo-graphical or other conditions make continuance or conformance to existing streets impracticable.

Minor streets shall be so laid out that their use by through traffic will be discouraged.

Where a subdivision abuts or contains an existing or proposed arterial street, the Commission may require marginal access streets, reverse frontage with screen planting contained in a non-access reservation along the rear property line, deep lots with near service alleys, or such other treatment as may be necessary

for adequate protection of residential properties and to afford separation of through and local traffic. 5. Half streets shall be prohibited, except where essential to the reasonable development of the subdivision in conformity with the other requirements of these regulations; and where the Plan Commission finds it will be practicable to require the dedication of the other half when the adjoining property is subdivided, Wherever a half street is adjacent to a tract to be subdivided, the other half of the street shall be platted within such tract. 6. Where the plat submitted covers only a part of the sub-

6. Where the plat submitted covers only a part of the sub-divider's plat, a sketch of the prospective future system of the unsubmitted part shall be furnished and the street system of the part submitted shall be considered in the light of adjustments in connection with the street system of the part not submitted. 7. In the event where the parcel is subdivided into larger tracts than for building lots such parcels shall be divided so as

tracts than for building lots, such parcels shall be divided so as to allow for the opening of major streets and the ultimate exten-sion of adjacent minor streets.

Subdivision showing unplatted strips or private streets controlling access to public ways will not receive approval. Section 502. STREETS 1. Insofar as is practical, acute angles between streets at

their intersections are to be avoided.

Street jogs with centerline offsets of less than one hundred and twenty-five (125) feet shall be avoided.

3. A tangent at least one hundred (100) feet long shall be introduced between reverse curves on arterial and collector streets.

When connecting street lines deflect from each other at any one point by more than ten (10) degrees, they shall be connected by a curve with a radius adequate to insure a sight dis-tance of not less than 200 feet for minor and collector streets, and if such greater radii as the Commission shall determine for special

5. Streets shall be laid out so as to intersect as nearly as possible at right angles and no street shall intersect any other street at less than sixty (60) degrees.



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
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The Commission shall notify the subdivider that the studies and data as submitted, or as modified do or do not meet the objectives of these regulations.

1. Three (3) copies of the Preliminary Plat and supple-mentary material specified shall be submitted to the Plan Commission with written application for conditional approval at least fourteen (14) days before the meeting at which it is to be con-sidered. The applicant shall at his own expense at least 10 days before said meeting send a written notice of such meeting by Registered Mail to all Taxpayers of record within two hundred (200) feet of the boundaries of the proposed subdivision and applicant shall return such receipts as evidence of compliance therewith.

- 2. The following shall be shown on the Preliminary Plat: a. The Plat shall be at a scale of 200 fect to one (1) inch or larger.
- b. Boundary lines: bearings and distances
- c. Easements: location, width and purpose.
 d. Existing streets on and adjacent to the tract: name, right-of-way width, location: type, width and elevation of surfacing; any legally established center-line
- elevations; walks, curbs, gutters, culverts, etc. e. Existing utilities on and adjacent to the tract; locations, size and invert elevations of existing sewers at points of proposed connections; water mains, hydrants, drain pipes, electric lines, telephone poles and street lights; if water mains and sewers are now on or adjacent to the gract, indicate the direction and distance to, and size of nearest ones, showing invert elevation of sewers.
- . Location of existing property lines, buildings, water-courses, marshes, nearby public spaces and other physcal features.
- g. Ground elevations on the tract; for land that slopes less than approximately 2 percent show spot elevations at all breaks in grade and at the extremities of and intersections of all public ways; for land that slopes more than 2 percent show contours with an interval of not more than 5 feet if ground slope is regular, 2 feet
- not more than 5 feet if ground slope is regular, 2 feet if the land is irregular or more detailed data if neces-sary for constructing drawings. Names, location, widths and approximate grades of proposed streets, building lines, alleys, easements, parks, open spaces, lot lines and utilities. Title under which proposed subdivision is to be re-corded, description of land to be platted, names and addresses of owner and technical author of the plan. All parcels of land proposed to be dedicated to public use and conditions of such dedication. Date, cardinal points, scale.

 m. Site data, including number of lots, typical lot size, acres in parks, area in walks, drives, etc.

3. A draft of protective covenants whereby the subdivider proposes to regulate land use in the subdivision and otherwise protect the proposed development shall be submitted with the copies of the Preliminary Plat.

4. Following review of the Preliminary Plat and other ma-terial submitted for conformity thereof to these regulations and after negotiations with the subdivider of changes deemed advisable and the kind and extent of improvements to be made by him, the Plan Commission shall within 60 days pass upon the Pre-liminary Plat as originally submitted or modified. If approved, the Commission shall express its approval as Conditional Approval and state the condition of such approval, if any, or if disapproved, shall express its disapproval and its reasons therefor.

5. The action of the Commission shall be noted on two (2) copies of the Preliminary Plat, referenced and attached to any conditions determined. One copy shall be returned to the sub-divider and the other retained by the Plan Commission. Accent-ance means approval of the design as a basis for the preparation of the Final Plat.




