tion for the special assessment which would bring in about \$28,000 from Kercheval business firms and property owners.
The city will pay from its coffers, about \$5,800, bringing the total close to \$34,000.

The council then approved an amendment to the assessment rolls in which the city agreed to discount five per cent from the property owners on the south side of Kercheval, and assess it to the city-at-large.
Not As Accessible
The five per cent was discounted from the south side of Kercheval owners, because their customers and employees do not have as ready accessibility to the parking lot.

The special assessment goes into effect immediately, and the property owners will be notified that they have up to 60 days to pay their shares without interest being charged.
It was stressed at the meeting, that free parking in the lot will continue indefinitely.

Retires After 53 Years of Faithful Service



George S. Sherman, of Huntington road, reminisces about 53 years of working for Parke, Davis & Company as he takes a last look at some of the catalogues he has put together for the pharmaceutical firm. He is the oldest of 9,000 Parke-Davis employes in point of active service.

Mr. Sherman retired on his 68th birthday on June 30.
The man who has handled the makeup of all Parke-Davis catalogues for 40 years, Sherman came to the firm May 14, 1901, as a messenger.

Has No Regrets
"I had no idea then of staying even 53 days, let alone 53 years," he said today. "But I'm glad I did. In fact, if I had my life to live over, I'd do the same thing."
A native of the Netherlands who was brought to this country by his parents when he was five years old, Sherman added, "It has been my experience that the harder a person works at anything, the more he gets out of it. I intend to work hard at retirement."

He didn't elaborate, but mentioned trips to Florida and Northern Michigan, as well as fishing and reading. Mrs. Sherman likes to work in the garden, and he said he probably would share a certain amount of that.

armed forces. In addition, he has handled special bulk business.
In the past 53 years, Sherman has seen great changes in the pharmaceutical industry. For example, 90 per cent of today's prescriptions couldn't have been written 15 years ago, because the medicines didn't even exist then.

Many Drugs Supplanted
When Sherman first started putting out catalogues, they contained long lists of extracts, fluids, powders, herbs and roots which were supplanted by new discoveries as the years passed and research increased.
Thus, Sherman has literally seen hundreds of products come and go.

He also has seen the company grow from sales of \$5,600,000 in 1901 to \$108,852,079 in 1953. When he started out as a messenger, Parke-Davis was a small struggling company. Today, it's one of the world's largest.

Under Six Presidents
Parke, Davis & Company has had seven presidents since its establishment in 1866, and Sherman served under six of them.

He was 14 years old when he got a job as messenger and, a year or so later, he was transferred to the Medical Service Department. Then, he was assigned to the Sales Department around 1908 and has remained there ever since. He was pricing manager from 1931 until 1951, when he became pricing consultant, his present post.

Lives in G. P. Woods
The Shermans live in Grosse Pointe Woods. They have three grown children, George S., Jr., a chemical engineer with the U. S. Rubber Company at Fort Wayne, Ind.; Mrs. Robert Marchowitz,

Business Group to Evaluate Program Advertising Pleas

The Grosse Pointe Business Men's Association announced early this week that it has plans under way for the re-establishment of a special committee to handle requests for program advertising. William Moir, a past president of the Association, has been named to head such a group.

Moir met with other business leaders last week-end and discussed measures for curtailing so-called advertising promotions. "The type of promotions we are opposed to," Moir stated, "are those where printing and ad selling costs consume the greater portion of the gross take."

He added that means for actually determining the worthiness of fund-raising promotions will be set up as soon as his Pointe-wide committee is named and given the go-ahead to act.

Every undertaking where advertising is to be the means for raising funds, big or little, will be required to have the Association's official approval or will not receive consideration by merchants and shop owners, according to Moir.

A MESSAGE FROM ORVILLE F. SHERWOOD

July 16, 1954

DEAR FRIEND AND NEIGHBOR:



On August 3, 1954 the electorate of the Grosse Pointe communities and Harper Woods will vote to nominate a Republican candidate to represent them in the Michigan legislature. I seek the privilege of serving as your first representative from our newly constituted 13th district. Since the early primary election date may deny me the pleasure of meeting you personally, I am publishing this letter to introduce myself briefly and to submit my qualifications for your consideration.

I was born in Detroit 38 years ago and was graduated from Wayne University with A.B. and LL.B. degrees. Inducted into the Army before Pearl Harbor, I served as an enlisted and commissioned infantryman in Panama, Australia, New Guinea and the Philippines. I presently hold an active commission of Captain in the Judge Advocate General's Corps, U. S. Army Reserve. I have been a practicing attorney since 1940 except for military service and a civilian trip around the world in 1946-1947. In 1948 I instructed courses in business law and economics on the faculty of the University of Detroit. I am married, the father of two boys, and reside at 743 Lakepointe.

The increasing role of our national government in the broad sweep of world history and the immediate problems of municipal affairs have combined to relegate the importance of the state representative in many minds; however, the preservation of our constitutional form of government depends primarily upon our state legislatures in which the basic sovereignty of our people is reposed. I am assured that my fellow Grosse Pointers likewise appreciate the importance of the office I seek and will elect only that candidate who most completely satisfies their demands for efficient, economical government; the preservation of life, liberty and property; and the protection of majority rights. If you choose me to represent you in Lansing, I will press for remedial legislation to stop the increasing curtailment of essential governmental services and the annual fiscal deficits which have required the imposition of \$70,000,000 in new emergency taxes in the last three years. I will support the recommendations for fiscal reform and administrative reorganization presently proposed by the Bureau of Governmental Research, the Michigan Committee for Better Schools, the Conlin Plan, and the Little Hoover Commission.

Your courtesy in reading this letter is appreciated. It remains my desire that I may have the pleasure of meeting you personally and perhaps the privilege of serving you.

Enthusiastic Sprayers Endanger Themselves and Small Animals

Death by poison is increasing at such an alarming rate in Michigan that several state organizations are cooperating to do something about it. Since human victims of this silent slaughter are rare, the public are the guilty killers. Careless use of chemical sprays is the weapon.

Most of the victims are small animals, generally wild, but often pet cats and dogs, and particularly birds of all kinds. This season alone many thousands of birds have met a convulsive death in the suburban area of Detroit, according to Dr. Marion T. Hall, scientist at Cranbrook Institute of Science, Bloomfield Hills, who says that autopsies on numerous dead creatures reveal dangerous concentrations of DDT.

Fully aware of the need to spray insect, fungus and virus enemies of plants, Dr. Hall suggests that much of the damage to harmless wildlife is done by uncontrolled spraying of pest insects such as mosquitos, black flies and deer flies. Seldom lethal immediately, DDT gradually accumulates in an organism through the digestive tract, or through the skin in humans, creating a general sickness which, with repeated exposure, may eventually result in death.

Concentrations of DDT exceeding two pounds per acre in oil solution are dangerous to mammals, including man, and birds. When used on or near water, concentrations exceeding one-fifth pound per acre are harmful to fish.

"One of the first things some former city dwellers do on moving to their new suburban homes is spray everything that moves," Dr. Hall said. "They want to enjoy nature in a penthouse atmosphere, and soon create a biological desert. They seldom realize that in killing off pests they are likely to slaughter many harmless creatures, including birds which are probably the most effective general insect control."

Particularly dangerous chemicals, aside from DDT, are arsenate of lead, phenyl mercury compounds, nicotine sulfate and aldrin. Dr. Hall recommends that spraying be applied in the proper concentration at the right time of year for a specific problem. Before using his "Kill It Yourself" kit or calling in commercial sprayers, the householder is urged to seek expert advice from his city forester, city parks department technical staff or county agricultural agent.

More than 1,300 posters advising motorists to "Signal Before You Turn" will be erected in Detroit and the metropolitan area starting next Monday (July 19), as part of a program to minimize what Detroiters consider the most discourteous driving act—falling to signal.

A poll of hundreds of Detroit drivers taken last year disclosed that failing to signal turns was the greatest breach of courtesy. Drivers also pointed out that it not only led to frayed tempers, but also to accidents in many cases.

An educational program to impress upon drivers need for giving signals will be conducted by the Detroit Police Department and the Traffic Safety Association. The posters are being prepared by the Association.

Warning Given Beach Visitors

Planning on visiting the beach this weekend? If you do, the Health Department advises to take it easy when swimming, boating or even when the children are wading. Summer vacationers often forget that water can be dangerous. Yet, records on file in the Michigan Department of Health show: There were 309 drowning deaths in Michigan in 1953. Of these, 84 were water craft accidents. The remaining 225 were other types of drownings. And the summer months of June, July and August accounted for 189, or 60 per cent., of the 309 drowning deaths. But if you remember a few simple rules, it can do much to cut down swimming accidents. Don't go into the water: If it is unfamiliar water, and especially if you like to dive. The water may be shallower than you think, and it may hide dangerous rocks. If you can't swim well. Over-estimating strength and skill is frequent and can be fatal. If you are alone. Even good swimmers have cramps. If it is after dark. Not being able to see—or be seen—may mean disaster. The 1953 drownings were widely scattered as to place. Eight occurred in the home, two on the farm, 13 in mines and quarries, seven in parks and other types of playgrounds, six were not specified and 189 deaths couldn't be classified as to place. Looking at the statistics from the standpoint of age and sex, young men and boys should be especially careful because: The majority drowned were males. The five to nine-year-olds recorded the most deaths followed by the ten to fourteen age group. There were 28 drownings recorded in the five years and

under group. Altogether, there were 41 accidents suffered in the five to nine age group and of those who drowned, 31 were males and 10 females. In the 10 to 14 age group, there were 40 drownings recorded of which 32 were males and eight females. Also in the high accident groups were the 15 to 19-year-olds with 35 drownings recorded for 1953, all males; and the 20 to 24 age group with 24 deaths recorded, 20 males and four females. Of the 28 drownings recorded in the five years and under age group, 20 were males and eight females. After 24 the drowning death rate begins to decline until it reaches the low of one death (male) in the 75 to 79 age group, the last group for which any drowning deaths were recorded.
