





### Library Friends Hear Talk On Collection of Art Books

The William J. Young collection of art books was the subject of an informal talk by Melitta E. Roemer at the Central Library last Sunday afternoon. The occasion was the first of the season's programs sponsored by the Friends of the Grosse Pointe Public Library.

The Young Collection, purchased from funds given by Mrs. William J. Young in memory of her husband, is probably the most outstanding group of books on any one subject which the library has acquired.

Miss Roemer, chief of the Central Library, reviewed the collection, outlining the scope and contents of the almost 200 excellent volumes. Included are books on all phases of art, from the efforts of early cultures to the work of most modern artists. Not only are painting and sculpture thoroughly covered, but decorative design, manuscripts, and allied fields of creative work are represented in the collection.

Miss Roemer chose several representative volumes for particular attention, to give her listeners an idea of the rich fund of entertainment and information available in these books.

After Miss Roemer's talk, tea and refreshments were served. Mrs. Bert H. Wicking, chairman of the Friends social committee, was assisted by Mrs. Lloyd G. Hooker, Mrs. E. Doty Worcester, Mrs. Ross Wilkins, Jr., Mrs. Herbert J. Woodall and Miss Mary Woodruff.

Brought here under the auspices of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Center, these films were picked by the Cinema League from entries from all over the world. Each year the league views hundreds of movies entered by both clubs and individuals. The showing will give local movie enthusiasts a chance to view amateur movie making at its best.

The War Memorial is sponsoring this outstanding movie evening in order to give impetus to the forming of a Grosse Pointe amateur movie club. Anyone interested in either taking or seeing movies is welcome. There will be no charge for the program, which will last about an hour and a half.

Among the movies to be shown, all with sound added, will be one titled "The Enchanted Isles," a travel survey of Whitsunday Islands of Australia. Another called "Caineville" deals with a ghost town in Utah. Work with amateur animated cartoons is illustrated in a prize winner called "The Deserted Mill," while a movie filmed by the Los Angeles 8mm Club shows what can be done in a cooperative movie project.

The last two pictures will be "Seashore Safari" described as a great bird study, and the Hiram Percy Maxim Award winner for 1953, "The Old House," filmed by Keith F. Hall, of Brisbane, Australia.

## Health Council Shown Movies

That every three minutes somebody dies of cancer and that 20,000 women die every year of breast cancer that is curable by early treatment, were facts that members of the Grosse Pointe Mother's Health Council carried home, with them for serious thought from their meeting at the central Grosse Pointe Library on Tuesday afternoon, October 12.

The two sound films they had seen came from the American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute, titled "Breast Self-Examination" and "The Doctor Speaks His Mind."

To depend on routine physical checkups by your doctor was the message of the second film shown, "The Doctor Speaks His Mind." For no doctor has a crystal ball to help him track down his patients when they need him. He must wait for them.

The program emphasized that one out of every eight persons gets cancer, and it's the wise ones who seek early treatment by X-ray, surgery, or radium. So far, the Council members were warned, there is no magic cure for cancer. Knowing the facts about cancer is their greatest weapon. And when there is a magic cure it will be the success of many individuals working together, not any one person.

George F. Jones, film counselor of the Grosse Pointe Library, procured the subjects for the program when the scheduled speaker, Miss Doris E. Forsythe, psychologist for the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, was suddenly unable to appear.

Available on loan without charge to any organization in Grosse Pointe are over 10,000 16mm. sound films many of which may also be used by individuals. Mr. Jones advised the Council members.

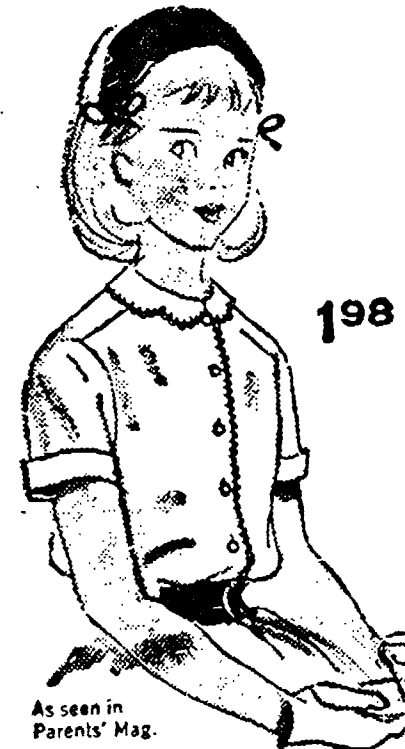

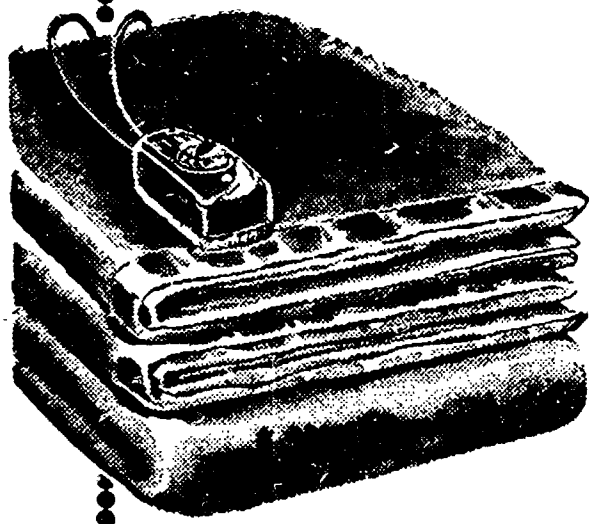

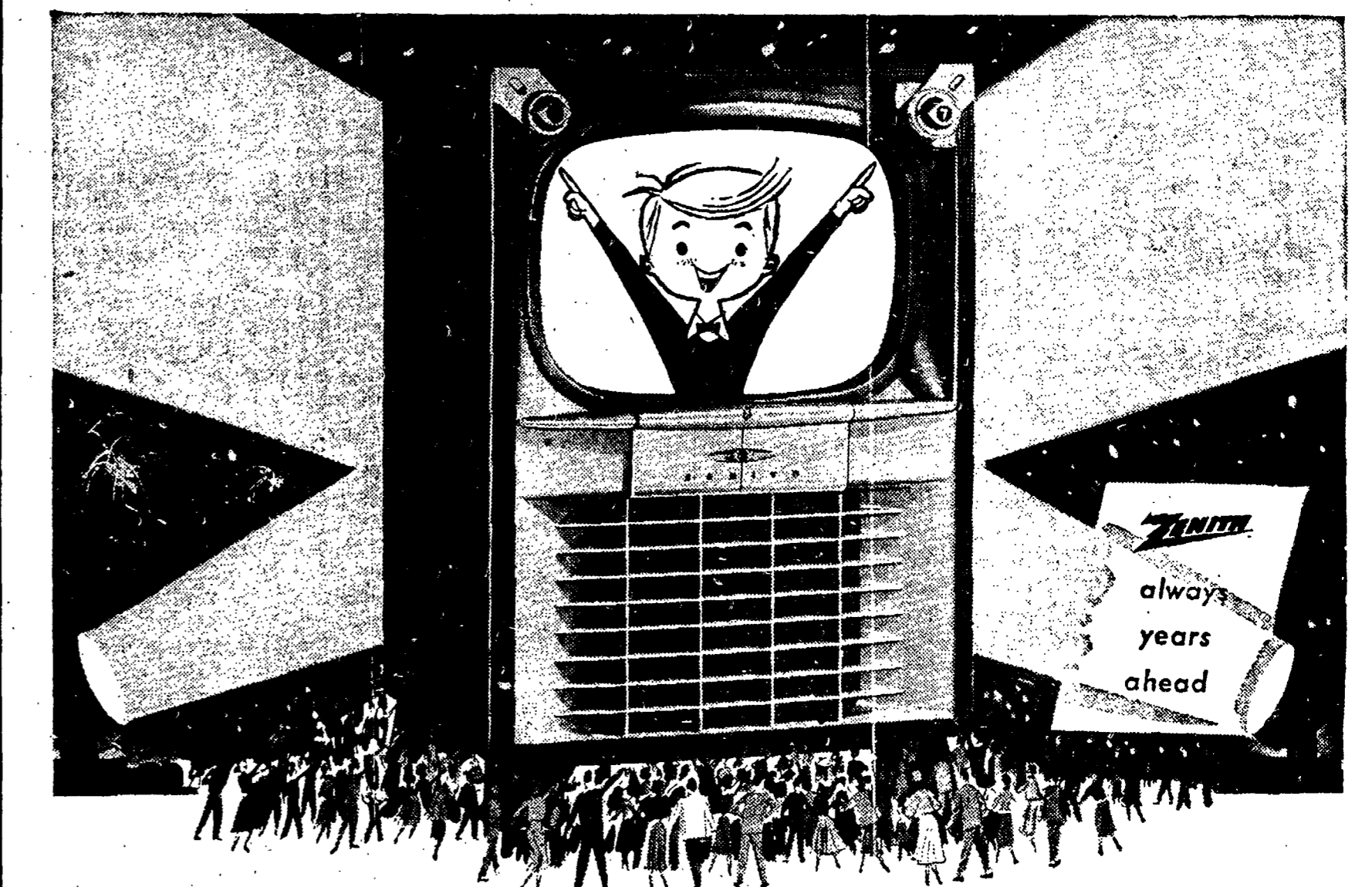

### Nurse's Aide Class Starting

The American Red Cross offers new Nurse's Aide Training class, starting November 1, to run for six weeks, five days per week, three hours each day, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The first three weeks are class work, taught by a registered nurse at Red Cross headquarters, 153 E. Elizabeth. The last three weeks are taught at the hospital where the Aides are allowed to practice as they learn.

In this case the hospital will be Detroit Memorial Hospital. There is no charge for this training which equips the Aide to serve as a volunteer in actually caring for the ill. The age re-

quirements for Nurse's Aides are 18-50 years. In addition, a high school education is required.

After the training course the Aide may choose the hospital she wishes to serve and arrange a schedule to suit her needs. Aides are asked to pledge 150 hours service per year as a minimum. Most Aides find one day per week a satisfactory way to render this community service.

Dramatization of this all-time, Mark Twain favorite story on the real stage by real college players should appeal to boys and girls in both grade and junior high school.

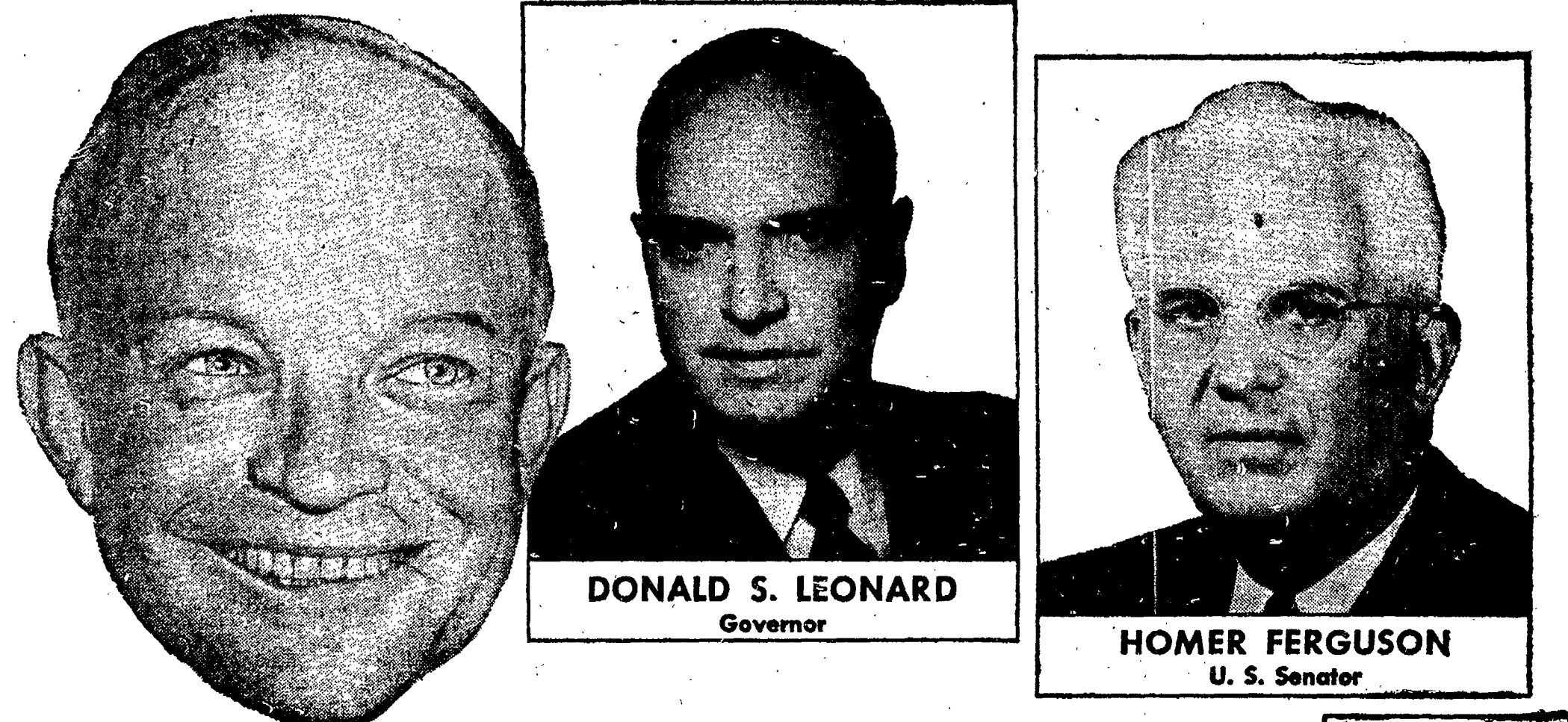

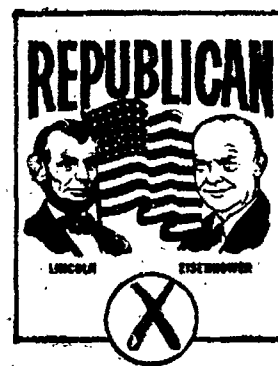

**Police Women Subject of Talk**

According to Mrs. Margaret Snow, Chief of the Women's Division of the Detroit Police

Department, the close proximity of the Grosse Pointe communities to Detroit assures that the protection and services offered to Detroit women and children are indirectly applicable to the women and children of the Pointe.

In her talk on "Detroit's Police Service to Women and Children," which was presented to the general meeting of the Women's Association of the Grosse Pointe Congregational Church, Mrs. Snow gave a detailed explanation of all the duties and functions of the Detroit policewomen.

While the standards of requirements are high (a college degree or at least three years of college with much experience in handling people being the minimum), physically you need only be five feet, one inch and weigh 101 pounds to meet the requirements of the policewomen's department.

Of the 90 women who make up the division, 23 women, in plain dress and unmarked cars, patrol the streets of Detroit from 4 p.m. until 8 a.m. every night. Besides giving immediate service on every new complaint, they make a constant check on all places which are open to children and adolescent girls, enforcing curfew laws and being generally alert for any suspicious situation.

One third of the staff is concerned with non-criminal cases, such as missing women, adolescent girls and all children, including boys under 10 years of age. Besides finding them, the policewomen try to determine the reason for the runaway, and then, when necessary, they make provisions for the permanent care of the person.

Finally, all cases of child neglect are handled by the Women's Division. Contrary to the general layman's belief, the Women's Division handles no cases of crimes committed by adult women. Mrs. Snow also said that in general, crimes committed by adolescent girls were of a shoplifting nature, and not those of vandalism or a hoodlum nature.

MRS. LAWRENCE LEADBITTER OF VERNIER ROAD

At the beginning of World War II, Mrs. Lawrence Leadbitter was a school girl fresh in her teens living in the Rhineland of Germany where she was born.

All her life her mother had told her "some day we will go to the great America where I truly belong" and as a teen-ager she had listened wide-eyed to the difficulties her father had when he refused to join the Nazi party.

"But everyone in Germany had to belong to the Nazi party or join the army," she recalled the other day in her home on Vernier road.

When bombs fell on their tiny town of M. G. Ladbach, Vera and her mother fled to Vienna, where long before art professors (including the famed Kiederich) had urged Mrs. Hofmann to take her talented daughter to study.

Of course there was no conversation between the German workers and the war prisoners. Anyone caught breaking this rule was sent immediately to a concentration camp.

It was in Bad Schallerbach that Vera met the handsome young American soldier, Larry Leadbitter, to another small town.

Because their lives were in danger, the army sent the Hofmanns to another small town. For three months Vera earned money doing art work for posters for a traveling circus which entertained the American troops.

He established Mrs. Hofmann's citizenship in New York and the late Senator Vandenberg and Gen. Mark Clark helped oil the machinery that finally put the pair on a plane bound for a new life in America.

Then work started on locating Vera's father who for seven months was a prisoner of the Russians. He escaped and for six weeks tramped on foot across the Rhineland to find his home, and family gone.

When he arrived he found two wonderful grandchildren besides his wife and daughter and a new son-in-law. They are young Val (he's six) and Vickie, just two.
