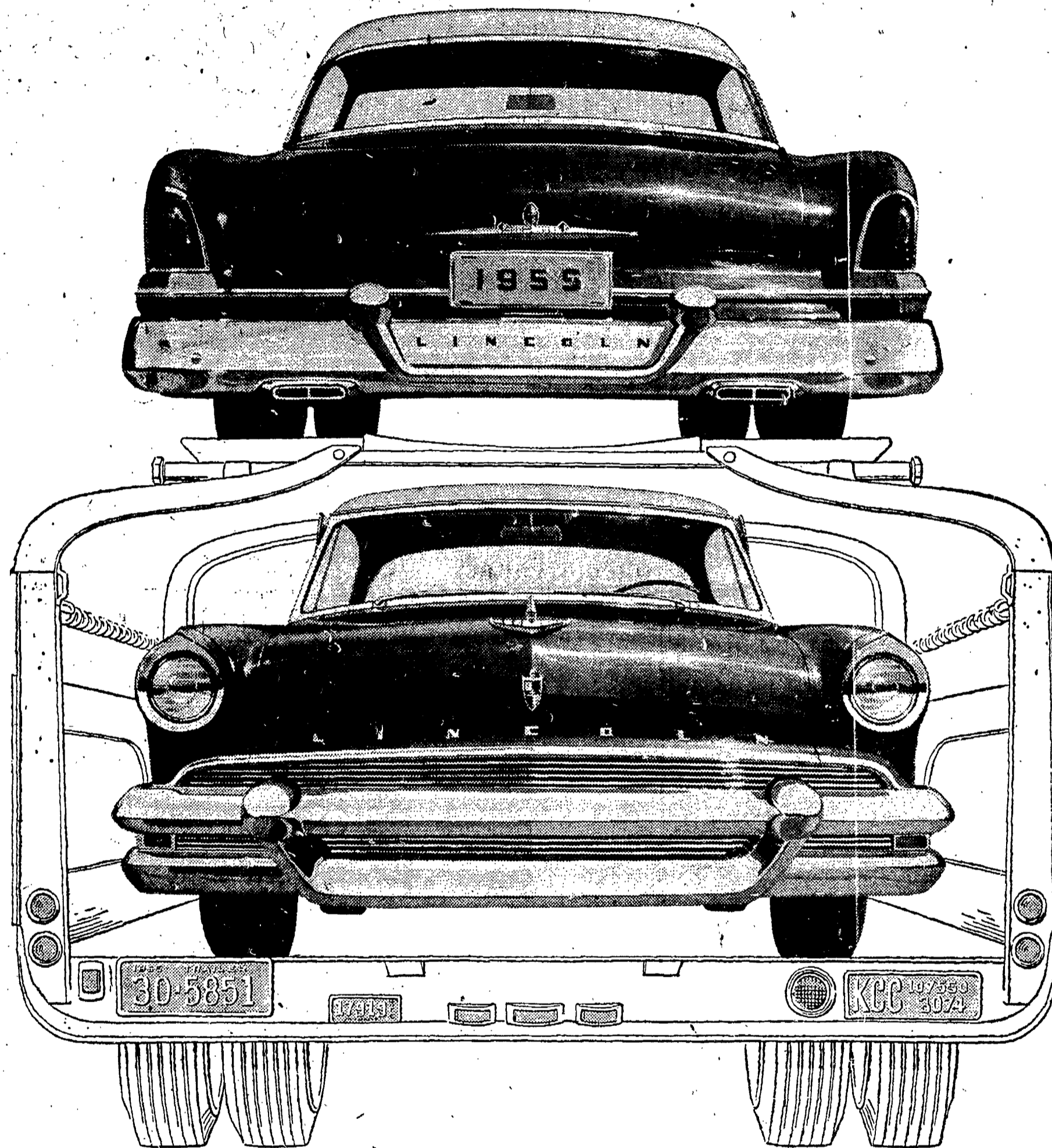
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Dominican High Father Meeting on December 1

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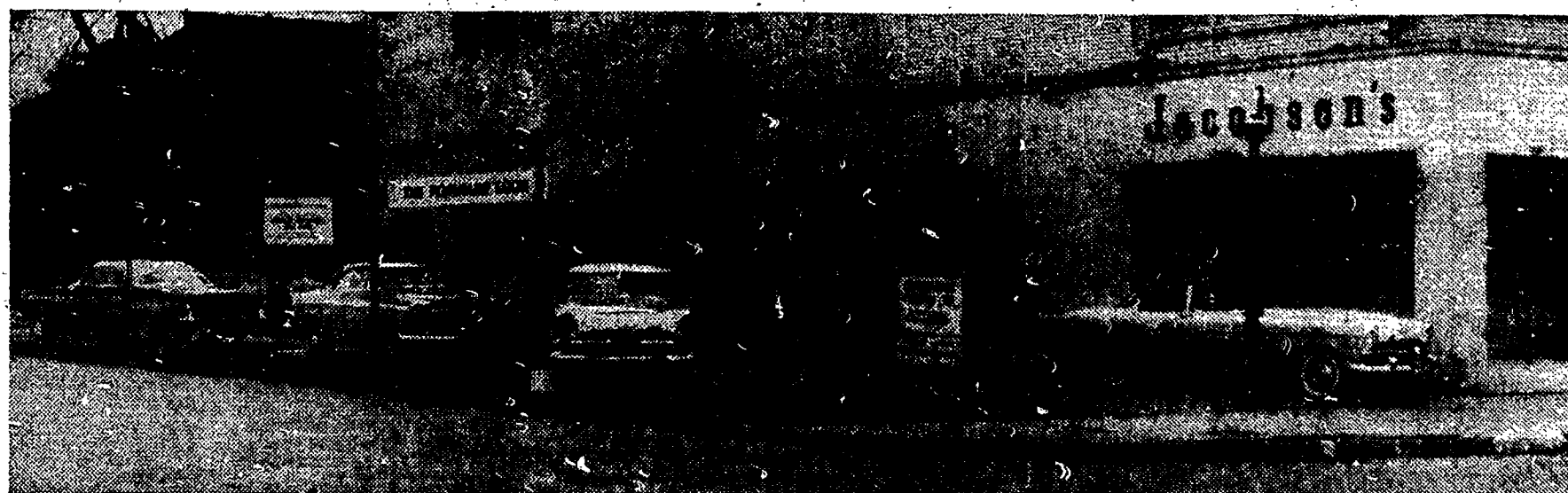
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### Cooperation Between Big Industry and Local Business

Mr. Yamasaki is known internationally as the architect of the new Consulate General Buildings in Kobe, Japan, and the new St. Louis Air Terminal now under construction.

### Stolen Wallets Returned To Nurses; Cash Missing

The nurses of Bon Secours Hospital who reported to City police last week that someone had stolen their wallets, were happy to have the wallets returned recently, even with the money missing.

City Police Chief Thomas Trombly disclosed that Thomas J. Gill, 27, 2500 Anderson, Detroit, the "telephone repairman" bandit, had been responsible for the loss of the nurses' wallets.

Gill was arrested by Detroit police on Saturday, November 13, on information, accumulated piece by piece, by Woods Det. Everett Plumb, who had been asked by a Woods citizen to check the character of Gill.

Gill, who was unemployed,

would walk into an office building, brazenly saying, "Telephone repairman," and when no one was looking would pilfer wallets from the purses of women employees.

On searching Gill's car, police found at least 21 wallets with identifications in a suitcase in the trunk of the car; among them the wallets of the nurses.

Chief Trombly said that it is still not known whether Gill had entered the hospital through use of his ruse, but the fact that he was the one who stole the wallets was substantiated when the items were found in the suitcase.

Gill confessed that he had committed 102 robberies by posing as a telephone repairman.

The nurses who lost their wallets and had them returned and the amounts they lost, are: Rose Manasa of 1237 Coplin, \$4.75; Angela Goodson of 2167 Van Antwerp, \$5.75; Elizabeth Gray of 626 Notre Dame, \$19; and a hospital employe, Mrs. Dorothy Klein of 72 Mapleton, \$15.

The nurses were especially glad to have the wallets returned because they contained important papers.

### Robert Vogeler To Give Lecture

Robert Vogeler will discuss "Experiences With Communism and the Fight Against It," when he speaks before The Grosse Pointe Celebrity Series on Thursday, December 2, at 11 a. m. in the Esquire Theatre.

A native New Yorker, Mr. Vogeler was educated at Peekskill Academy and appointed to the United States Naval Academy, from which, after two years, he was forced to resign because of ill health.

He, later, received his degree in engineering from Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and was employed by the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation.

It was as an officer of this company, representing the Eastern and Central European Subsidiaries, that he was arrested by the Hungarian Communist Government, in 1949. He was falsely charged with espionage and conspiracy to overthrow their government, and after being tried by a communist court, was sentenced to 15 years in solitary confinement. After serving three years of his sentence, he was released and immediately returned to the United States.

Author of the book "I Was Stalin's Prisoner" Mr. Vogeler not only has first hand knowledge of what transpires behind the Iron Curtain, but also of Communists and their influence on world affairs.

Mr. Vogeler will be honored at a luncheon at Al Green's following his lecture.

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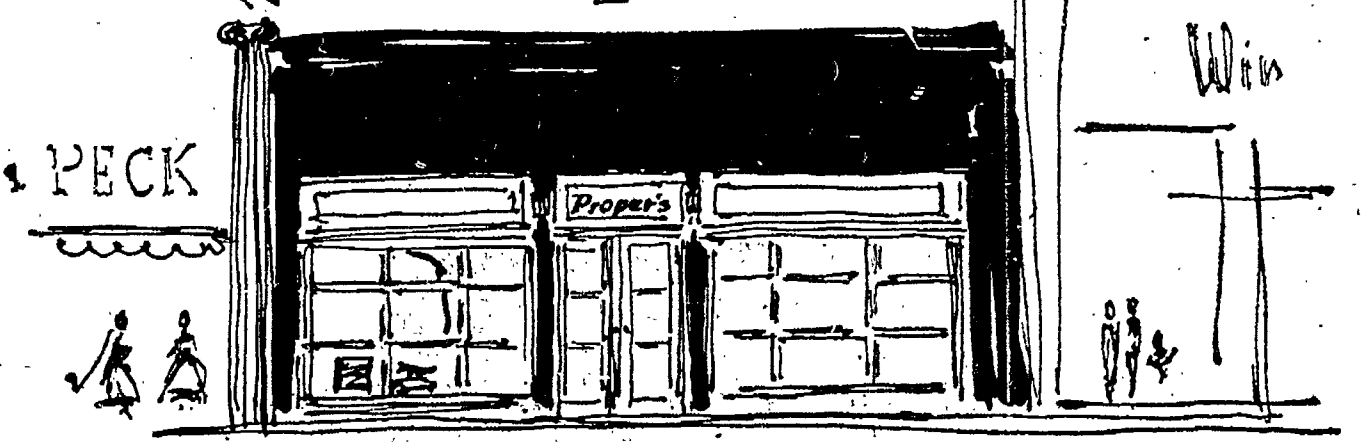
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## Musical Books Noted Pianist

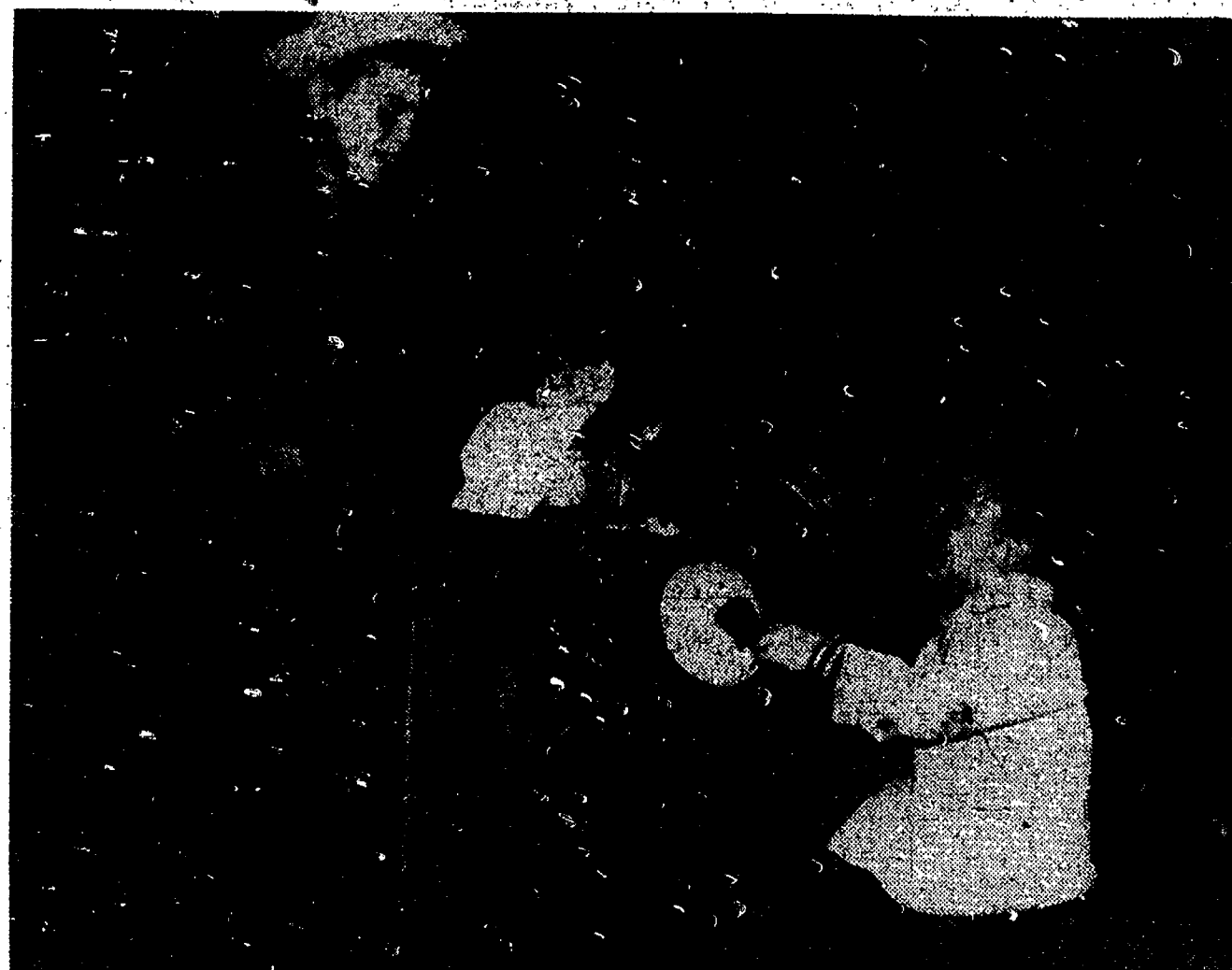

**Sunday, November 21**

RESULTS of a three-day talk between French Premier Mendès-France and Secretary of State Dulles was announced by the State Department. It was agreed that "early ratification of the Paris agreements" to rearm Germany be carried out. Also that a last minute Russian bid to halt the move be informally rejected.

It was further agreed that they will also coordinate procedures to meet the Communist threat in Indo-China. Soviet Premier V. M. Molotov said that the United States, Britain and France were doing everything in their power to prevent a conference on European security.

**WORKING TOGETHER**, the French and Tunisian Governments issued a joint ultimatum to North African terrorists in which they were requested to surrender and be pardoned or be exterminated. Spurred by new bombings and shootings, representatives of the two governments met in an atmosphere of urgency.

In Algeria, the French military authorities warned Berber tribesmen to clear out of the badlands of the Aures Mountains before French forces take revenge on outlaws.

THE DEFENSE DEPARTMENT revealed that the U.S. 8th Army has formally transferred its headquarters from Korea to Japan. The Eighth is America's major field command in the Far East.

It conducted the ground war for the United Nations Command, having under its control at one time, eight American divisions, a British Commonwealth division, 20 ROK divisions and smaller units from UN allies. Gen Taylor has been placed in command of all U.S. ground forces in Northeast Asia.

**Tuesday, November 23**

ANDREI Y. VISHINSKY, Russia's UN delegate, died of a heart attack, while preparing for one of the most important debates of his career. He was the Soviet Union's leading orator. An attaché found him slumped over his desk, a manuscript of the speech he was preparing for a talk before the United Nations General Assembly concerning the United States' atom-for-peace plan, under him. The debate was postponed, as were all other UN sessions, except a meeting of tribute to the colleague known as the No Man of the United Nations. Vishinsky's body will be flown to Moscow for burial.

THE SUPREME COURT ruled that state legislatures have almost unlimited power to order redevelopment of slum areas. The ruling also applied to Federal legislatures. The decision was handed down by United States Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, who spoke for the court. The court upheld the constitutionality of an act of Congress in authorizing a big redevelopment program in a rundown southwest Washington water-front area.

**Monday, November 22**

PRESIDENT TITO of Yugoslavia denied that his country may return to the fold of the Russian-led Cominform. He insists that his country will stay neutral and denounced as malicious accusations that Yugoslavia plans to rejoin the Soviet.

Tito stated that he has no intention of breaking off relations with the United States, Britain and France, which proved at the most trying moments that they were the friends of Yugoslavia. He said that his country only established normal relations with Russia and expressed hope that this will improve even more in time.

**TOP MILITARY CHIEFS** of the NATO nations gathered in Washington for their 10th session, to discuss the mutual defense system, including the effect of new atomic weapons on West Europe's forces.

Members at the conference were composed of the chairmen of the joint chiefs of staff or their representatives from each of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries. The meeting is the

Winty weather, Christmas shoppers and particularly longer nights are primarily responsible for the large number of pedestrian fatalities during December. Neither pedestrians nor drivers can see as well at night, although the actions of both in most cases indicate they do not realize this.

Many drivers drive just as fast at night as they do during the day. Actually they should cut their speed during hours of darkness. Pedestrians believe apparently that drivers can see them just as well at night, when in reality they should be doubly alert.

In December, as high as 90 percent of the pedestrians meeting death are killed at night.

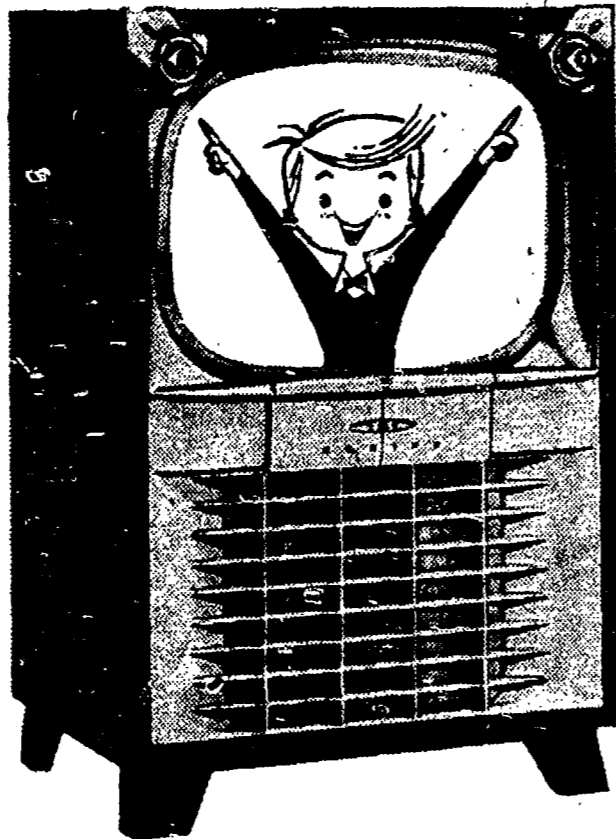

Cub Scouts Plan Huge Good Turn

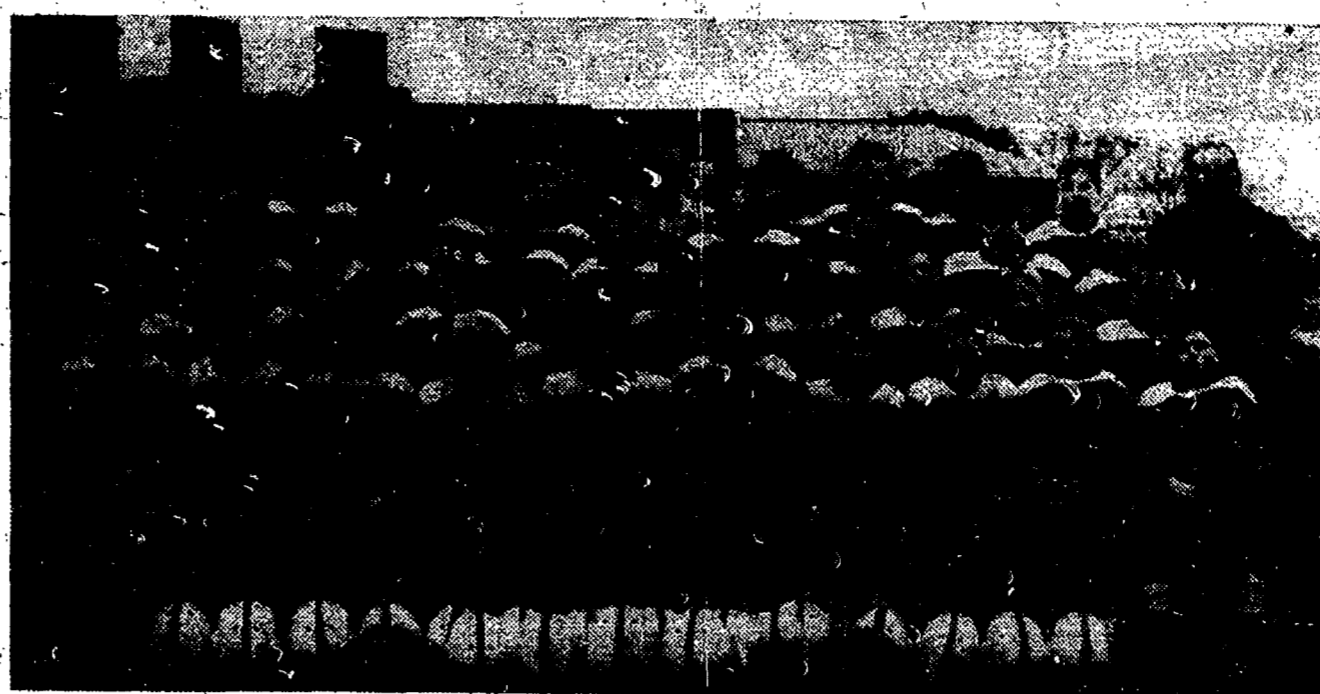

Hot Tips Given Winter Drivers

Winter motorists may find helpful some timely suggestions by Ford Motor Company's Engineering Staff.

For instance, Ford engineers say a bag of sand in the car trunk for sprinkling under the rear wheels for traction may mean the difference between a freezing night in a roadside ditch and one's own cozy fireside.

A couple of cardboard boxes will come in handy for motorists who park their cars in the open. The cardboard boxes, if tucked under the windshield wipers, will insure clear glass against freezing rain or snow when motorists are ready to drive.

An old windshield wiper blade kept in the glove compartment also is useful on the rare occasion when cold weather moisture is heavy and causes fogging on the inside of the car. The blade will keep the glass clear longer than if the driver uses the palm of his hand.

One precautionary word is offered about batteries on sub-freezing days. Ford engineers warn against adding water unless the driver plans to go farther than just a few blocks afterwards. Until the water mixes thoroughly with the battery acid, it may freeze and damage the battery.

A good trick to use to thaw a frozen door lock is to hold a lighted match or the flame of a cigarette lighter to the car key and then insert the heated key into the lock.

Ford engineers say that if a motorist is caught in a sudden cold snap without sufficient antifreeze, he can save his radiator—and all the troubles that go with frozen coolant—by slipping a large cardboard or a flattened paper shopping bag in front of the radiator until he reaches his auto dealer for service.

If the sharp drop in the thermometer is due overnight, Ford engineers say, the car owner can guard against a frozen radiator by hanging a lighted electric bulb under the hood of the car in his garage and draping a blanket over the radiator.
