Thursday, December 9

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER, with his temper well in check, announced that he will not reply to Senator McCarthy's attack against him. The Senator had accused the President of displaying a "shrinking show of weakness" against the Communists.

Without mentioning McCarthy's name, the Chief Executive said that he stands for positive things and does not indulge in personal vituperations or quarrels of any kind. He told news men that he would make no comment about the justice or injustice of the Senate's voting to condemn McCarthy's conduct.

Friday, December 10

THE UNITED STATES and its Korean allies bid to have the 11 American airmen jailed by Red China on charges of spying, released, was denounced as "shameful" and "jerry-built" by Russia's Jacob A. Malik. He repeatedly stated that the airmen were spies and that the United Nations had no right to interfere in Peiping justice.

The 16 UN allies had put the matter before the United Nations General Assembly, condemning the imprisonment. Malik stated that the United States was pressing release of the airmen to divert attention from many aggressive acts committed against Red China.

Saturday, December 11

RUSSIA WARNED France and the other Western Allies that she will fight, if it becomes necessary, to demonstrate its might and the righteousness of its cause. The warning was issued by Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, who spoke at an unusual rally honoring the French-Soviet alliance, signed in 1944.

Sunday, December 12

A PROTEST against the shooting down of an American plane on November 7, made by the United States, was rejected by Russia. A Moscow radio broadcast said the Soviet Foreign Ministry had given the U. S. Embassy in Moscow the rejection note.

According to the Moscow broadcast, the Soviet Union renewed its charge that the United States plane, a converted B-29, had violated Russian "air space" before it was shot down by two MiGs. The plane, while on a photo-reconnaissance mission, was shot down near Hokkaido, Japan. One of the 11 crewmen was killed.

Monday, December 13

A CUT in certain items shipped to Russia is being sought by the United States. Officials stated they were of the opinion that goods, such as generators and diesel engines, should be withheld because of a possible industrial buildup by the Soviet Union.

A discussion of the problem has been going on within the Eisenhower Administration. Meanwhile, United States officials have been talking it over with Allied representatives. No decisions have been reached as yet.

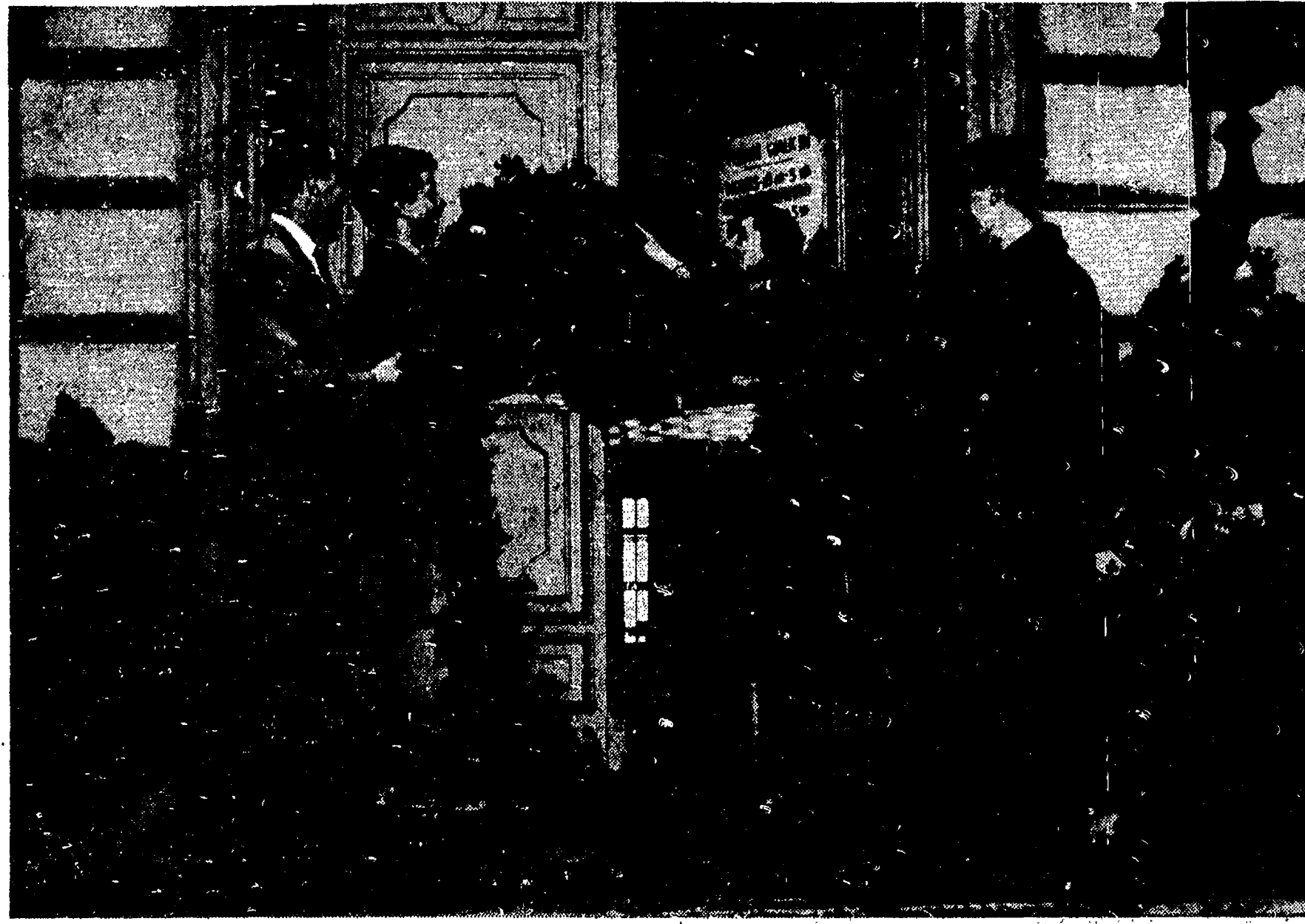
Tuesday, December 14

SILAS GARRET, Attorney General of Alabama, was arrested by a Texas deputy sheriff on charges that he murdered his prospective successor in Phenix City, Ala. He was indicted by a blue ribbon grand jury in Phenix City, which the National Guard is cleaning up. Garret was charged with murdering Albert Patterson, who was nominated in the Democratic primaries to succeed him. In addition to the murder charge against him, Garret is accused of larceny, and vote fraud in the June primary in Alabama. Phenix City almost became a synonym for commercialized vice, before state authorities started to clean up the town.

Wednesday, December 15

DIPLOMATS speculated that Red China may ask for the release of 35 Chinese students in exchange for the freedom of the 13 imprisoned Americans, 11 airmen and two civilians. Some 4,500 Chinese students were in the United States when Red China entered the Korean War, and of these, all but 353 asked to be returned to their homeland.

Police Seek Hit-Run Car; Woman Hurt

Teenagers Believed Guilty; Man Who Witnessed Accident Also Sought

All the Pointe police departments, especially the Farms, are looking for a hit and run driver who seriously injured a woman as she was about to enter her car on Thursday, December 9.

A Farms police accident report revealed that Mrs. Rosamond G. Wallace, 39, of 5115 Crayton, Detroit, was knocked unconscious after being struck by a car reported to have contained three or four teenagers.

The hit and run car did not stop after hitting the woman. The scene of the accident was on Kercheval near McKinley. Farms firemen rushed Mrs. Wallace to Bon Secours Hospital, suffering from a skull fracture, a fractured arm and bruises covering her head, knees and toes. She is still in serious condition.

The report stated that it was dark and raining and the street lights were on. Mrs. Wallace had just brought her daughter, Sharon, 7, from a music school and had helped her into the car from the sidewalk side. She then went around the car and was about to enter on the driver's side when she was hit.

Mrs. Wallace told police later.

Help Needed if Soldiers' Christmas Plans for Kids Are to Meet with Success

Men Stationed at AAA Camps Hope for Cooperation of Residents to Provide Merry Holiday for Under-Privileged Children

Residents of the Pointe are being asked to give a thought, and something more substantial, this Christmas-time to the soldiers who are stationed here, and who constitute our first line of defense in case of hostilities. The time is short and immediate action is required.

There are two batteries of Anti-Aircraft Artillery located within the confines of the Pointe area, one at the foot of Three Mile drive and the other in Chalfonte road, just east of Lothrop. Two more batteries are stationed in the same district, one in Morang drive, and the other in Hoover road.

Has General Appeal
Last year it was learned that these soldiers were busy with plans to entertain a group of under-privileged children at their campsites on Christmas Day. The idea had such a general appeal that local residents rallied to help them with their project. They also responded generously to the suggestion that it would be a nice move for the Pointes to do something about making Christmas a little brighter for the men themselves.

The result was that more than \$800 in cash and several hundred presents were donated locally to provide gifts and yuletide decorations to make the camp parties significantly successful.

Project Delayed
The hope is that this can be accomplished again this year. Unfortunately there was a delay in getting the project under way. The Pointes who are particularly interested are:

Blames Sluggers For His Injuries

A man who claimed that he was slugged and robbed was picked up by Farms police on Thursday, December 9, as he was walking on Mack at McKinley.

According to a police report, Thomas E. Cummings, 49, of 2543 Beniteau, Detroit, was seen by police officers as he was staggering along Mack with blood streaming from a cut face.

Taken to the station, Cummings, who had been drinking, told authorities that he had been hit on the head in an alley at East Jefferson and Beniteau, at about 5 p.m. Thursday, and from that point to when he was picked up by police; he did not remember a thing.

He stated that his wallet and car were missing. The car was later found at Moran and Ridge. He said that a person or persons unknown must have driven the car to the location at which it was found and let him out.
Detroit police were notified of the alleged slugging and robbing, and the case turned over to them.

Pointe Mail Now Boasts 'New Look'

New Cancellation Marking Will Advertise Community All Over World

Grosse Pointe has received an early Christmas present from Uncle Sam's Post Office Department. For the first time in history all mail collected locally is getting a Grosse Pointe 36, Mich. stamp cancellation marking.

Heretofore all mail collected here has been cleared through the Roosevelt Park station and the stamps have been cancelled with the Detroit marking used for the entire Metropolitan area. The local branch has been a collection center only, distribution being made through Roosevelt Park.

Speeds Delivery
Beginning last Monday morning, mail collected here and addressed to this area is being cancelled in the branch on Mack at East Warren and distributed directly, as quickly as possible, without having to go down town.

This means that Grosse Pointe mail collected here as late as 5 o'clock in the afternoon is being delivered the following morning. This has been made possible by the installation of a cancelling machine which the postal employees call "The Mighty Mite." It is capable of cancelling a minimum of 12,000 pieces of mail per hour, and the speed can be stepped up considerably when necessary.

Keeps 35 Persons Busy
Crews of about 35 are required to keep the machine operating at capacity. About 125 women, most of them Pointe residents, have been hired to handle the mail going through the branch here.

It has been pointed out that the change in system is experimental and designed to decentralize the work done at the Roosevelt station. Whether or not it continues after the Christmas rush is over remains to be seen.

Harper Woods Too
All of the mail being collected in Harper Woods as well as in the five Pointes, is also being processed through the local branch and is receiving the Grosse Pointe cancellation stamping.

The postal authorities warn all residents that it is imperative that their mail be addressed with the proper zoning. The temporary help engaged here is not equipped to sort mail that does not carry the zone markings, and this will have to be sent to the Roosevelt Park station for sorting, which will considerably delay delivery.

Plans to Increase Water Supply Get Approval of State

Way Appears Open for Early Solution of Problem Entailing Adequate Water for Both Farms and City of Grosse Pointe

Approval of the plan to increase the water supply for a large section of the Pointe area has been officially approved by the State Department of Health. The plan entails the building of two open filter beds at the Farms pumping station in Lake Shore road.

Sanction of the plan was contained in a letter mailed from Lansing on December 9 to City Engineer Murray M. Smith of the Farms. A construction permit will be issued by the state when final engineering plans for the project are submitted.

Greatly Reduces Cost
The idea of the open filter beds instead of costly covered structures was devised by Mr. Smith and the Farms engineers, Hubbell Roth and Clark. It is estimated the cost of the project will be about \$250,000 as compared to the \$450,000 estimated for new filters enclosed within buildings.

The City of Grosse Pointe, which gets all of its water from the Farms system, offered long ago to help the Farms finance the enlargement of its present system, rather than be cut off as a customer and have to get its water from Detroit.

Four Meetings Held
Both cities appointed special committees to work out details for the cooperation. Three meetings have already been held by these committees and a fourth was scheduled for Tuesday night. With the official approval of the project now received from the state, the committees will be free to go ahead with details of the financing.

Officials estimate that at best, it will take at least five months to sight the goal in this project. Under state law an ordinance must be adopted providing for revenue bonds to pay for such an undertaking. One of the first things to be done is the preparation of such an ordinance.

State Must Approve Bonds
Two months must then elapse before the bonds could be sold. Lansing must approve the bonds, which would be of the revenue type, to be retired through revenue derived from the sale of water. Matthew Carey, financial

The city clerk disclosed that an agreement has been arrived at between the city and the Board of Education, whereby the Farms has been given permission to use a portion of the Gabriel Richard school grounds to handle the anticipated overflow of holiday shoppers' cars.

Mr. Furton, who was instrumental in negotiating the deal, stated the ground to be used is being leveled and readied for use. "While on the subject of parking," Mr. Furton commented, "the city has conducted a survey of parking in the lot and has found that there is an over-abuse of

All Residents Asked to Help Pointe Needy

Lions Club Members Again Being Helped By Police, Firemen of Community

A goal of \$10,000, to satisfy charitable needs and other requirements for the coming year, has been set by the Grosse Pointe Lions Club, through its 26th annual Goodfellows' Day newspaper sale set for Monday, December 20. Chiefs and personnel of the five Pointes' police and fire departments, along with members of the club, will combine their efforts to assure the success of the project.

Committee Named
The president of the Grosse Pointe Lions International, as is the custom, selects a committee for the sale of the papers in the various Pointe communities.

This year's president, Edward J. Singely, has appointed former Wayne County Prosecutor James McNally and Carl Schweikart, local attorney, as co-chairmen of this committee. Both have held the posts in the past.

Proceeds from the sale are used for the charitable needs of the Pointe throughout the entire year, rather than being confined only to the Christmas and Holiday season. Expenditures of the club are made only upon recommendation of George Elworthy, Pointe Welfare Director.

To Distribute Baskets
As in other years, the club is determined that there will be no Pointe child without a Christmas. Baskets will be supplied to needy families, filled with food and other good things to eat, with toys for the children.

Chief among the recipients of the club's contributions are: the Leader Dog League for the Blind; public and private charities. Part of the funds raised will go towards alleviation of distress among the blind and infirm; donations of Braille watches and typewriters to those stricken with blindness; operations to correct faulty vision or save the sight of those, who without the help of an organization such as the Lions, would spend the rest of their lives in total darkness.

Promotes Activities
The club is also interested in promoting youth activities and recreational programs throughout the Pointe, thus encouraging healthier attitudes among its future residents and citizens.

This is the only fund raising campaign the Lions conduct during the year.

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Vandals Damage Brand New Car

Fred Runnells of 323 Moross road, reported to Farms police on Friday night, December 10, that someone had viciously scraped the paint on his brand new car, from the tail light to the headlight.

Runnells, the News' sports editor, told police that he was covering a basketball game at the Grosse Pointe High School and had parked his car in the high school's newly developed parking lot, where the incident took place.

The vandal had used a sharp instrument, which not only scraped the paint, but left a deep indentation in the metal of the car.

The incident has been added to a long list of vandalism reported by numerous citizens, in which car windows have been broken, radio antennae and mirrors have been either broken or bent, air let out of tires and paint on cars badly marred.

Police are making every effort to apprehend the vandals, but so far have not been successful.

Rerouting of Buses Causes Another Park Group to Kick

A compromise between residents residing on St. Paul, between Wayburn and Maryland and the Lake Shore Coach Lines, whereby bus company officials agreed to reroute a bus line, with approval of the Park council, appeared to have backfired on Monday, December 13.

At a regular council meeting held on November 1, the residents on St. Paul petitioned the council to have one of two bus routes changed. They requested that instead of permitting the buses to come down Wayburn, turn west on St. Paul and then north on Maryland to East Jefferson, they be rerouted to turn off Kercheval and straight onto Maryland.

They contended that the buses were causing excessive fumes and that the vibrations from passing buses were cracking the walls in their homes.

An agreement was reached, wherein the Kercheval bus route would use Maryland and the Charlevoix line would continue the use of its regular route.

At Monday night's meeting, a petition bearing the signature of every resident on Maryland, from Kercheval to St. Paul, was handed to the council, asking that the buses either be put back on the old route or have it rerouted somewhere else.

Their complaint was virtually the same as that of the residents of the one block on St. Paul, plus causing television interference and danger to cars backing out of driveways. They also maintained Maryland is a fire route.

The Maryland residents who attended Monday's meeting, maintained that the rerouting was done without their knowledge. One resident even stated that the petition of the other group bore several false signatures and this could be proven because he had checked the list.

The group present was informed that the plans for rerouting were drawn up by the Planning Commission and approved by members of the council.

The upshot of the whole thing was, the grievance of the Maryland residents was referred to the Planning Commission for study and report, which will be handed to the council at a future meeting.

The man, wearing a brown coat and hat and of medium build, had gotten out of his car to help the stricken woman, it was said. Description of the man, vague as it was, was corroborated by waitresses of the restaurant.

Mrs. Wallace's husband is a patient in Grace Hospital. Sharon is being cared for by Mr. and Mrs. David Wallace of Kenwood road. He is the uncle of the accident victim's husband.

expert who has been working with the two cities in this matter, says there is no doubt that such approval could easily be obtained from the state.

Mr. Smith said that the engineering figure actual construction could be completed in about three months. This means that if everything goes smoothly, it may be possible to have the enlarged system in operation before the dry summer months arrive.

Will Boost Supply

The new filter beds will increase the capacity of the present system by 2,000,000 gallons per day, ample to take care of all the needs of the City and Farms.

A new booster intake station is now under construction at the Farms lakefront park, which will increase the amount of raw water delivered to the filters and pumps. The pumping capacity has been declared adequate for all foreseeable needs.

Earlier this year the Farms had informed the City of Grosse Pointe that it would continue to furnish it water until the Detroit expansion program was completed in 1958 or 1957. After that, the City would have been cut off by the Farms and would have had to get its water from Detroit.

The City had arranged to become a customer of Detroit when Detroit's program was completed, but took the position that it much preferred to remain a customer of the Farms and would be willing to spend a considerable sum to help enlarge the Farms system.

Fire Changes Future

Last week's disastrous fire at the new Detroit water station which is not yet completed, might delay considerably the completion of the expansion program. This would conceivably have further complicated the picture locally.

The state's approval of the new plan for additional filter beds in the Farms, should mean an early solution to this major problem.

Woods Residents Petition Council to Eliminate Ditch

A group of Woods citizens appeared at a Woods council meeting on Monday, December 13, to appeal to council to do something about filling in a strip of land, three-eighths of a mile long and 42 feet wide located at the rear of their properties.

Council Receives Thank-You Letter

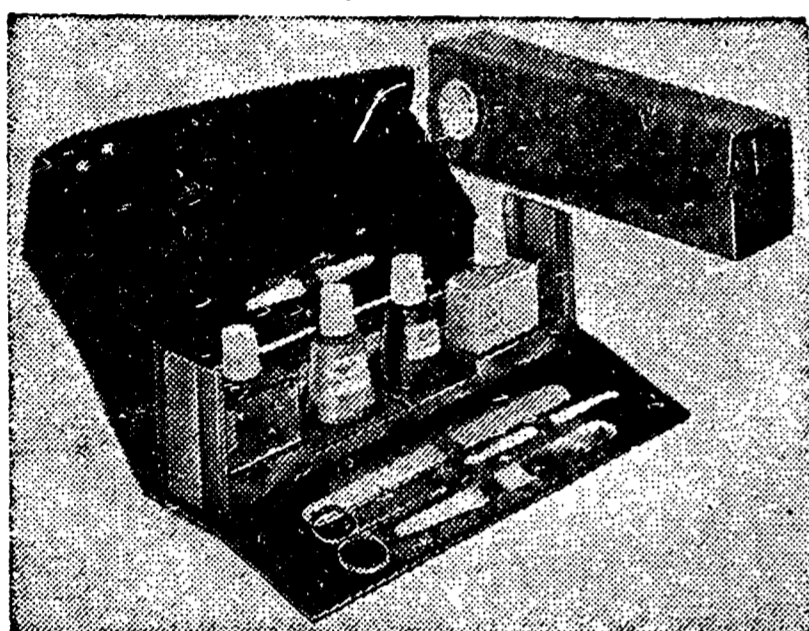

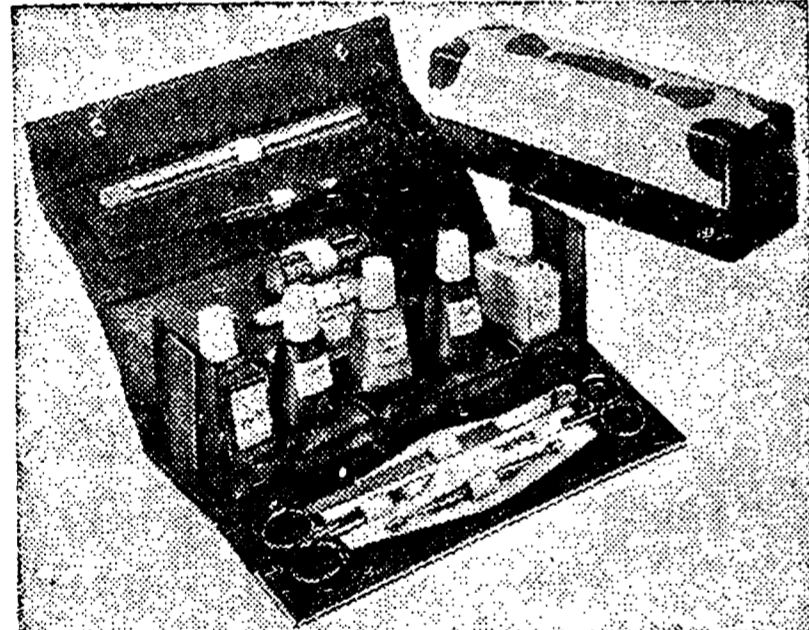

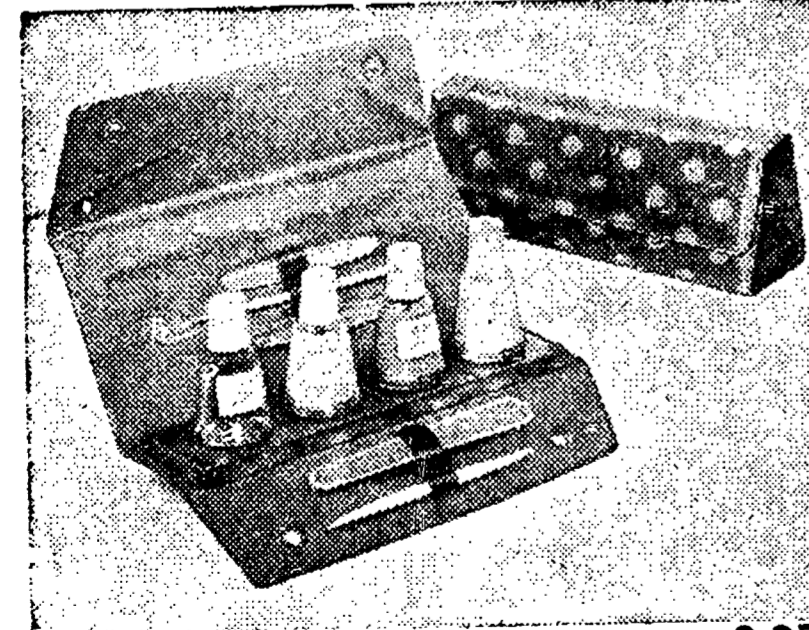

Loynd. Dr. Long shared responsibility for the chemical synthesis of Chloromyacin, the only antibiotic for which a commercial synthetic process has been achieved. He has had charge of the chemical research program in epilepsy which led last January to the announcement of Dilantin, a new anticonvulsant for the treatment of petit mal and epilepsy. The new compound followed 11 years of study and experimentation in the research laboratories of Parke-Davis, which introduced Dilantin in 1938 for the control of grand mal epilepsy. Born Jan. 7, 1914, at Dallas, Tex., Dr. Long was graduated from Woodrow Wilson High School there in 1932. He received his B. S. degree in chemistry from North Texas State College in 1937 and a master's degree there in 1939. In 1941, he was awarded a Ph.D. degree in organic chemistry at the University of Texas. He joined Parke-Davis in May, 1941, as a research chemist. Dr. Long is a member of the American Chemical Society and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. He and Mrs. Long have three children, Kathleen, 10; Evelyn, 8; and Loren M. III, 5. They live at 1300 Hampton road, Grosse Pointe.

Total of 43 Cases of Polio Reported Here This Season

The number of polio cases reported to date for 1954, exceeded that of all cases reported last year, according to statistics released by Grosse Pointe Health Commissioner Dr. Thomas Davies.

Dr. Davies revealed that the number of cases for this year still remains at 43, and that the chance of any further cases are slight.

He stated that during the year of 1953, only 28 cases of the crippling disease were reported.

One death, as a result of the disease, was reported in 1953, and one revealed this year.

In 1953, a 10-year-old boy was rushed to the hospital after being exposed to polio from a stricken brother. An injection of gamma globulin had an effect on him and he died of the disease.

The fatality for 1954 was Mrs. Marion Nimke, 34, of Harper Woods, mother of four children, who died on October 10.

A breakdown of the number of polio cases reported in the Health District during 1954 are as follows: Harper Woods, 16; Farms, 13; Park and Woods, five each;

City, three; and Shores, one.

For 1953, the reports were: Harper Woods, nine; Woods, nine; Farms, six; and Park, four.

Four of the 1954 victims were expectant mothers.

Dr. Davies revealed that the usual time for the polio season is from May or June to the beginning of frost time in Autumn.

He said that polio had an early start this year. The first case reported was in April.

The first case made known in 1953 was in July.

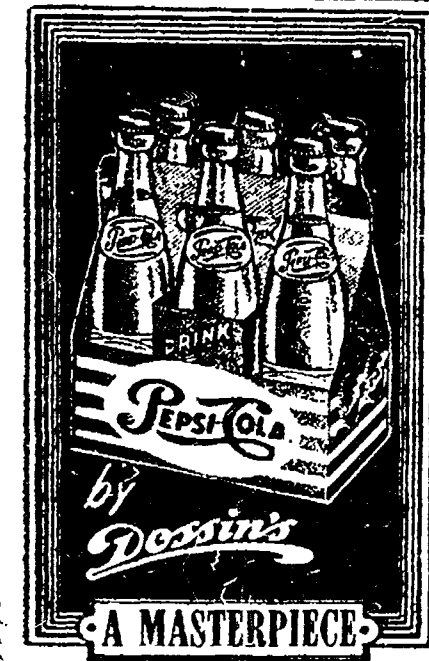

Funeral services were held yesterday, December 15, in St. Joan of Arc Church. Burial was in Mt. Olivet cemetery.



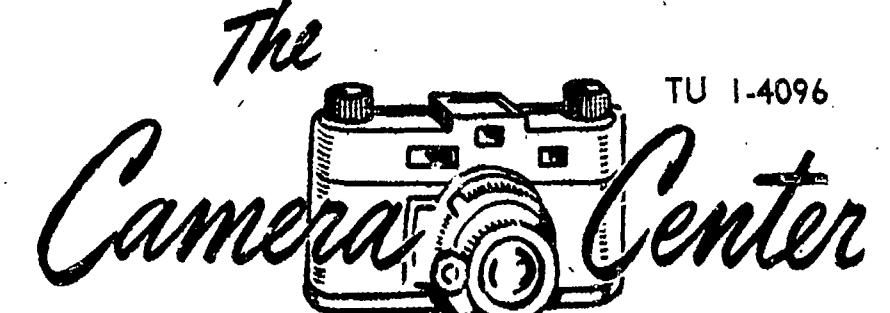

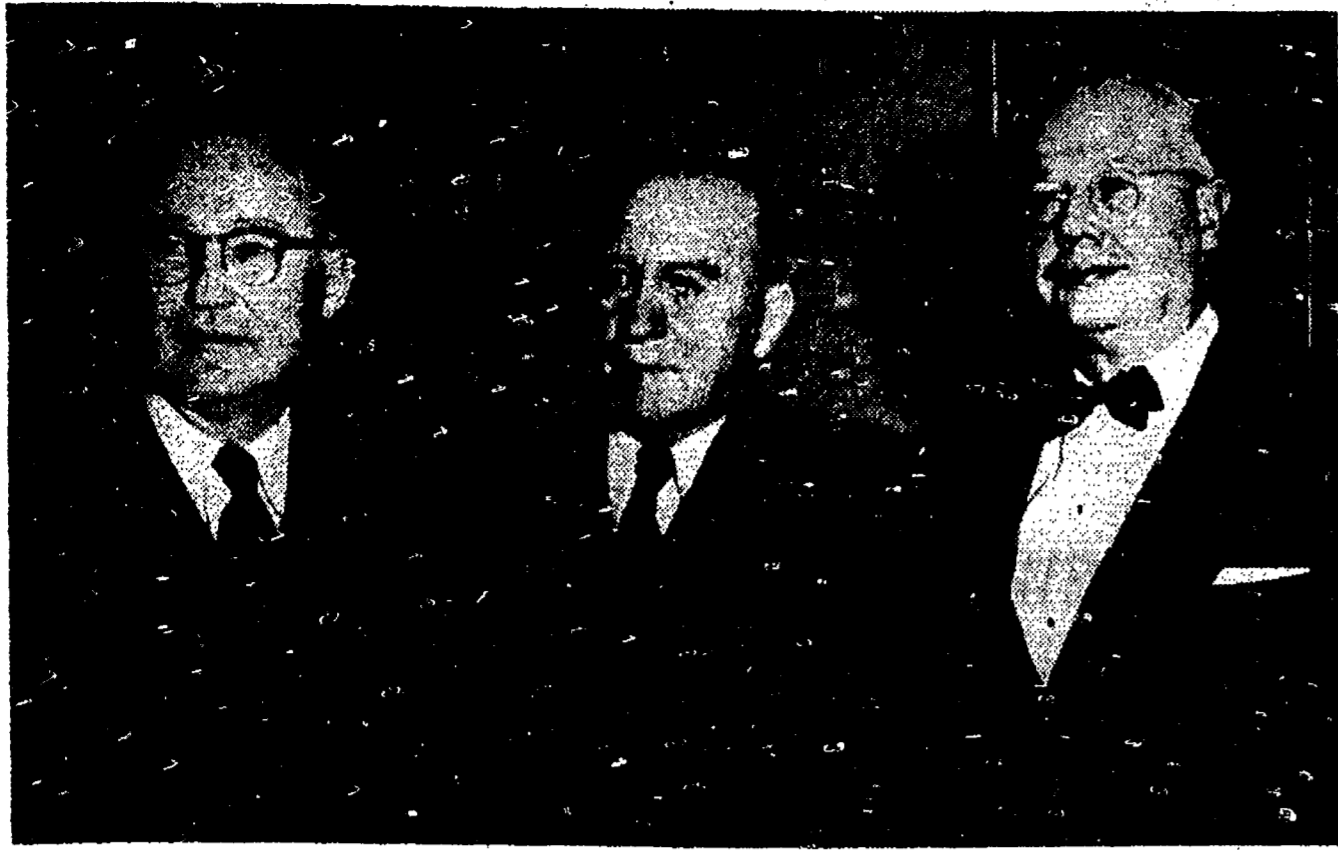

Drinking Drivers Court Accidents

Drinking alcoholic liquor while driving will make you a top prospect for ending up in the emergency room of a hospital, according to Dr. C. W. Muehlberger, Director of the Crime Detection Laboratory of the Michigan Department of Health.

Studies show that persons even in the very early stages of intoxication increase their chances of becoming a casualty. With the low blood alcohol concentration of .06 per cent the drinker has three times as good a chance of ending up in a hospital as the sober driver. But the fellow who really works at it and gets his blood alcohol level up to .15 per cent skyrockets his chances to 55 times that of the person who has not been drinking.

"It's easy to see," said Dr. Muehlberger, "that a person who has had alcoholic liquor to drink is simply not capable of the fast thinking and quick action required on our highways today." Dr. Muehlberger emphasized that alcohol is really an anesthetic and in addition to slowing a person's reaction time, narrows his visual field. In this condition a driver is unable to see as far to either side as he normally would. And with his slowed reaction time he is unable to adjust to unexpected situations fast enough.

"With the high horsepower of today's automobiles it just doesn't pay to mix gasoline and alcohol," Muehlberger said. "If you've had any intoxicating drink, make sure that you confine your driving to being a passenger."

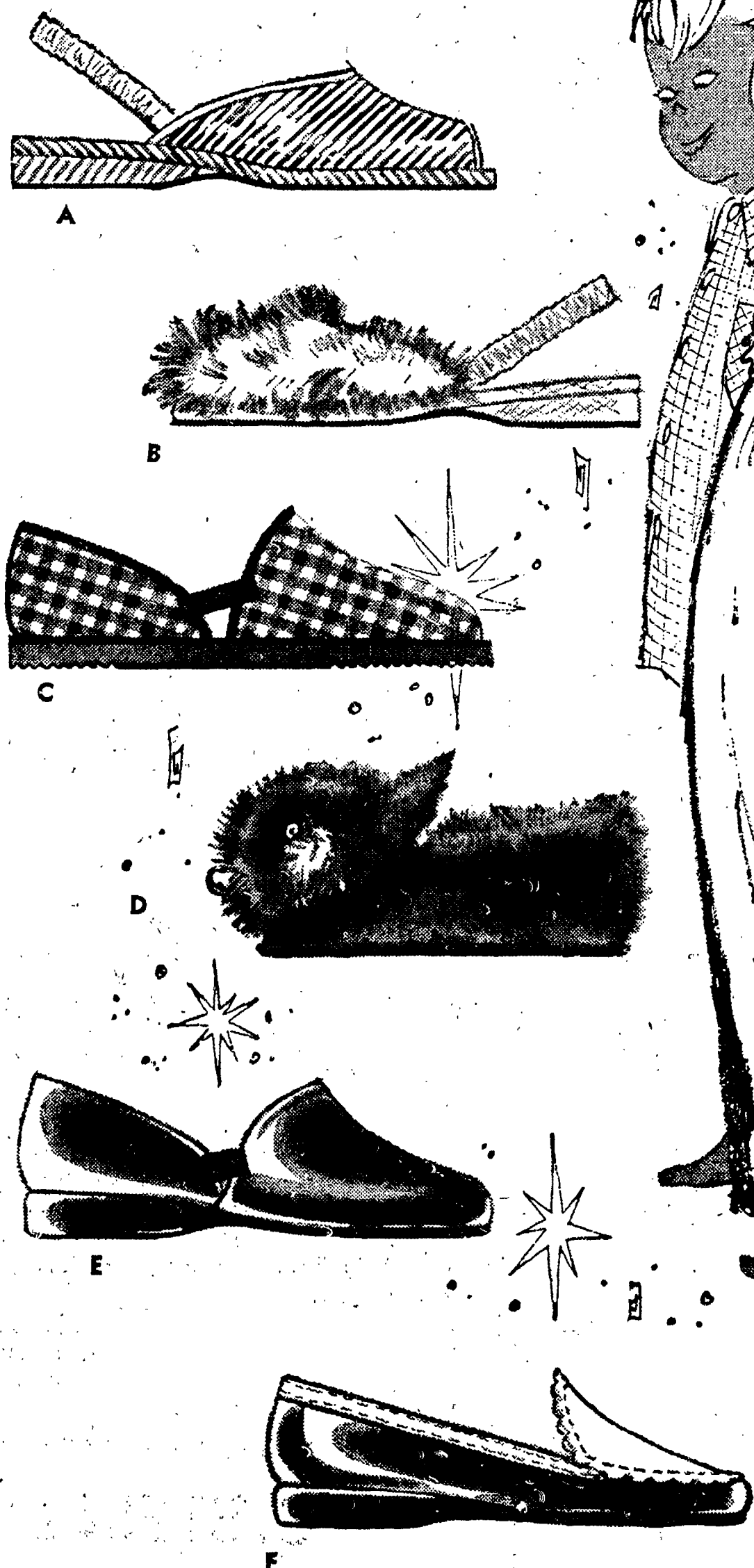
Exchange Club Honors Scout

A reward was offered, but Mrs. Johnston refused it, stating that she was just happy to get it back to its rightful owner.

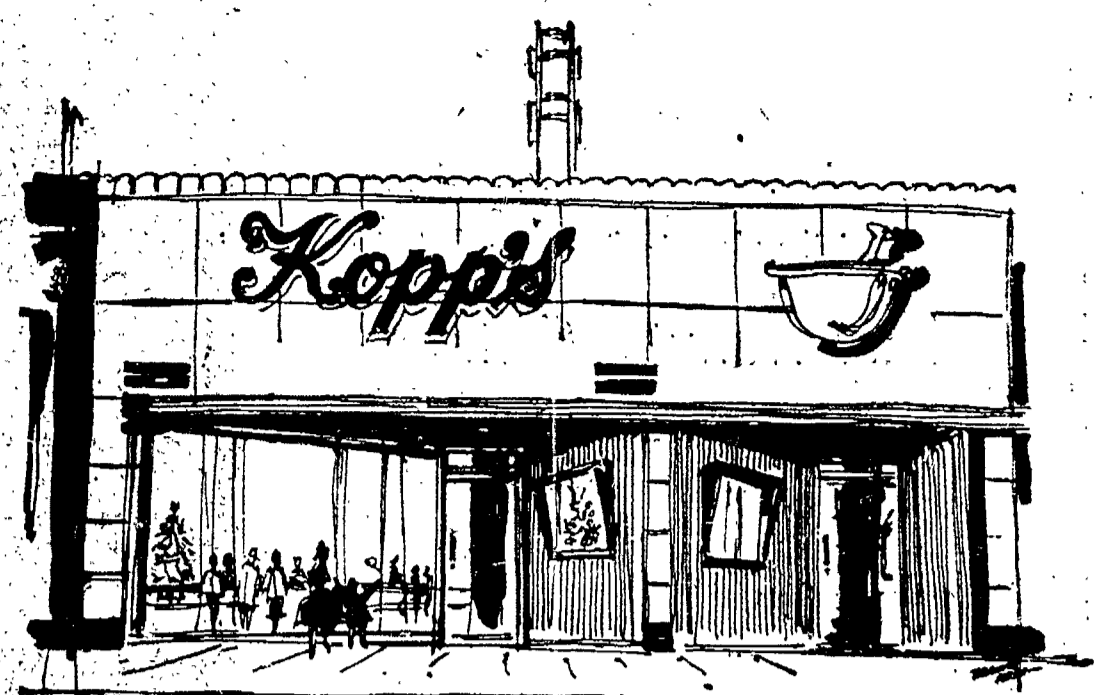

This issue, part of which is callable, will be retired within 20 years, Mr. Furton disclosed.

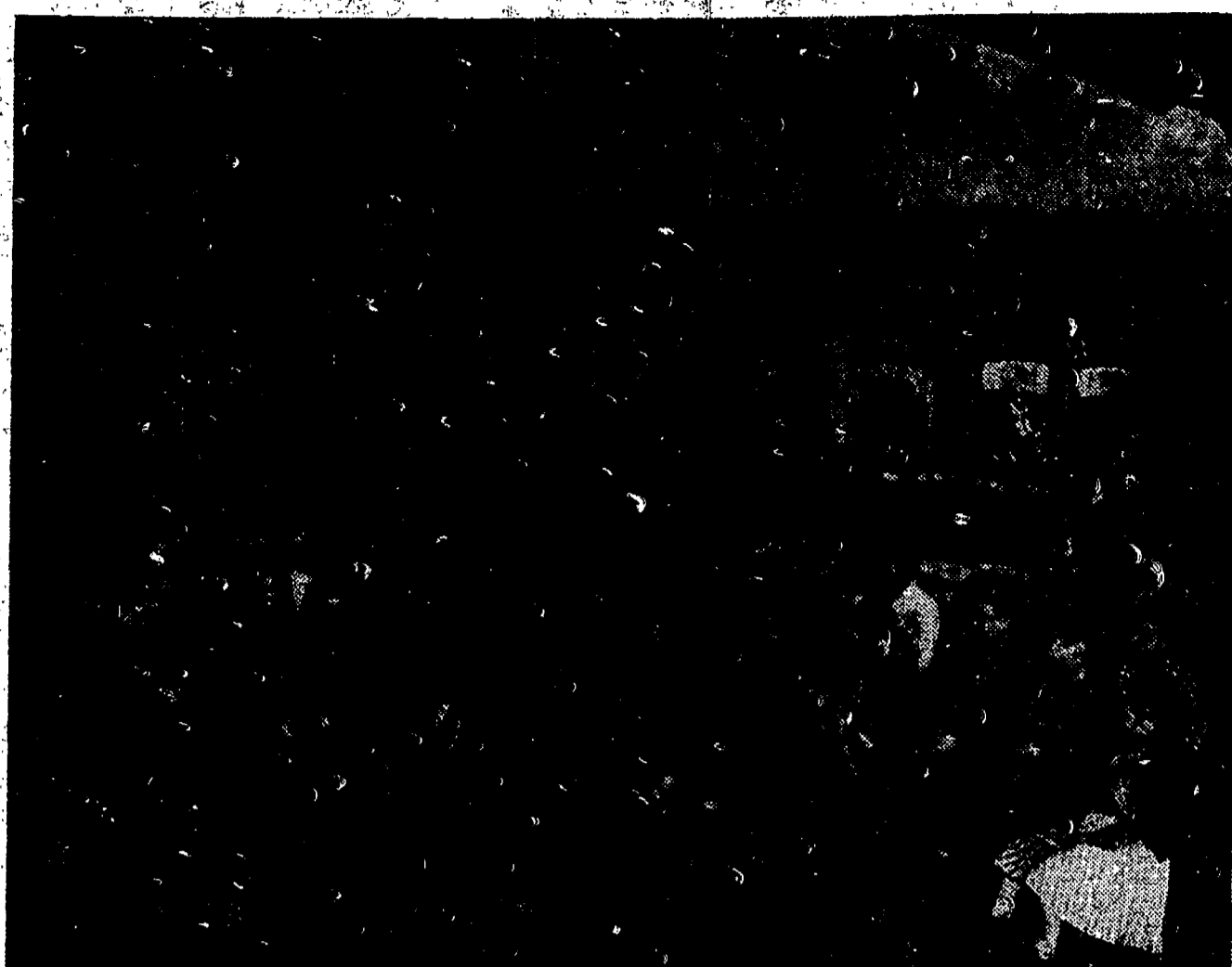

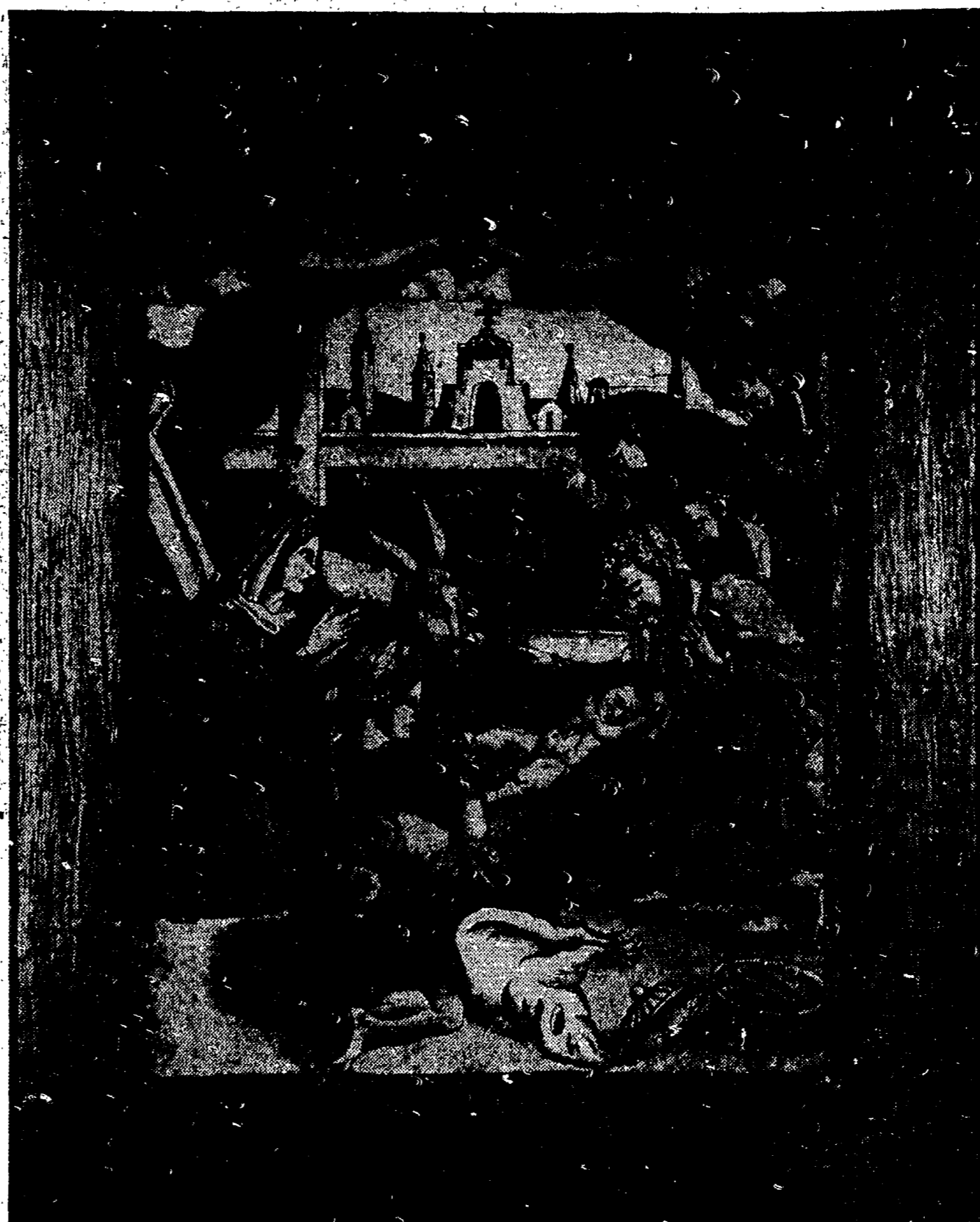

The challenge of the atomic age to the security of America will be studied by representatives of the country's leading women's patriotic organizations at the annual Women's Forum on National Security, to be held in Washington, D. C., January 27 to 29, according to Mrs. Mary Fauser, National Security Chairman of Grosse Pointe 303 Unit of the Auxiliary.

The Michigan Department of the Auxiliary will be represented at the forum by officers and delegates. The Auxiliary's National President, Mrs. P. A. Lainson of Iowa, will preside as Chairman. A panel of nationally known authorities on various phases of the security problem will discuss dangers of the atomic age and measures which can be taken for the nation's safety.

"Women have a very large responsibility for the security of America," Mrs. Fauser said. Christmas Tree Business Involves 30 Million Sales

Whether decorated trees originated with Martin Luther in the sixteenth century, or St. Boniface in the eighth century, or the prehistoric Druids, is still disputed.

Undisputed, however, is the fact that these pungent green symbols of Yule cheer are as popular in atomic age households as they ever were in German halls of other centuries.

Sale of 30 million Christmas trees in the U. S. annually involves farmers, conservation officials, timber firms, shippers, and even bootleggers, according to a report from Cranbrook Institute of Science, Bloomfield Hills.

Tree bootleggers are those few scavengers who, without permits, hack their contraband indiscriminately from private and public lands. Their wares are usually shoddy enough to warn off prospective buyers, but the Institute urges that the public accept only trees tagged with official identification.

Legal trees, usually seedlings thinned from timber stands owned by lumber companies, begin their trip to market in September or October as crews consisting of cutters, graders and bundlers select camp sites for their three-month harvesting operation.

Axe-wielding cutters lead the parties. They cut the chosen trees, trim off dead and injured limbs and square the butts. Then the bundlers drag the cut trees to the grading saw horses for grading. The grading device is made of several vertical boards arranged parallel at different distances and nailed securely to one of the saw horses. The trees are placed across the sawhorses, and the butts fitted into the proper slots.

When six trees of equal size are lined up in this manner, they are tied together into bundles that are hauled by truck or sleigh to cold storage areas. If the source is near the market, and the weather permits, the trees are often left in the woods until selling time. Since a frozen tree will break up when felled, cutting must be done before hard freezing weather.

Serve-yourself tree plantations, set aside in rocky or sandy areas by many farmers, have become popular with families who like to drive into the country and legally cut their own Christmas trees on the day of decoration.

Over half of all Christmas trees marketed in the U. S. are balsam fir cut in northern forests from Maine to Minnesota, and cold-stored months ahead, or shipped directly during the holiday season.

Aside from its distinctive spicy the balsam fir holds its leaves longer and stands cold storage

better than most other Yule greenery. Table size trees are often cut in August and bundled with branches tight against the main shoot. When the branches are released several months later, they spring back into shape in a few minutes with no signs of damage.

Despite these advantages, the balsam fir still shares popularity with such favorites as spruce, Scotch pine, Red pine, White pine, Douglas fir, cedar and hemlock, all of which, if bought fresh, hold their leaves well for the week or ten days of the holiday season.

Drunken Drivers To Go to Jail

Detroit's traditional traffic safety holiday greeting, "Drunk Drivers Go To Jail," is being "sent" to motorists.

Motorists are receiving it by means of 2,000 large posters erected on street-side standards throughout the Metropolitan area and through an additional 12,000 posters which are being placed in every bar and other establishments that handle liquor in Detroit and in many surrounding communities.

Traffic Court records convincingly substantiate that the poster means just what it says. Last year 74 per cent—827 persons—of those convicted of drunk driving were given straight jail sentences without any alternative for periods ranging from five days to six months. Virtually 100 per cent of all drivers convicted of this offense during the holiday season got straight jail sentences.

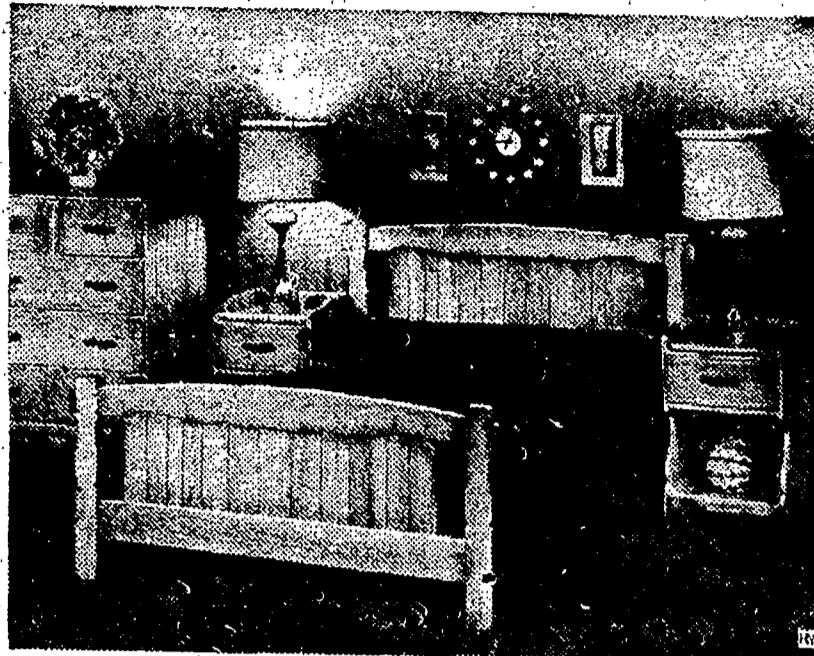
One added fact stands out—that is, that 94 per cent of the persons brought into Traffic Court on a drunk driving charge were convicted.

The "Drunk Drivers Go To Jail" program is jointly sponsored by the Traffic Court, the Detroit Police Department, the Department of Streets and Traffic and the Traffic Safety Association. It has been an annual program since 1941.

Traffic Judges George T. Murphy and John D. Watts have again stated their policy during the holiday season will be a straight jail sentence without the alternative of any fine. A jail sentence is none too severe a penalty for drunken drivers, both judges said.

Since the program was started, fatal and injury accidents have been cut more than 90 per cent by the combined enforcement-education effort. In 1941, records show that 47 persons were killed and 1,774 persons injured due to drunk driving. Last year three persons met death and 135 were injured.

Xmas Presents Fire Hazards

With the advent of another Christmas, the Grosse Pointe Fire Chiefs are cautioning Pointe residents and store occupants against the hazards which may be encountered through the improper use of Christmas decorations and lighting.

The fire chiefs cited many incidents throughout the nation which resulted in fires caused by faulty wiring and decorations which have caused home fires, costing the loss of lives and property.

Despite repeated warnings, there may be tragedies this year, but the chiefs are in hopes the Pointe residents will heed safety rules and prevent anything serious occurring in the Pointe.

They pointed out that the key to most of the trouble is the tree itself—filled with resin and pitch and extremely combustible. It ignites easily and burns so quickly and furiously that it is virtually impossible to put it out fast enough.

Protect your family by following these precautions recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters:—1. Choose a small tree rather than a large one; 2. Store it out of doors until a day or two before Christmas; 3. When you bring it in, stand it in water and set it in a cool part of the house, away from radiators, fireplaces and heaters. DON'T let it block an exit.

When you decorate your tree, remember these things:—1. Be sure that every lighting set and electric cord you use is in good condition—no loose sockets, no worn or frayed wires. Naturally, you NEVER use candles!

2. When you buy new sets or cords, look for the UL label. The

"Christmas Seals make possible pioneering programs in the fight against TB as well as maintaining the present programs of aid to TB patients, and prevention of TB through health education and

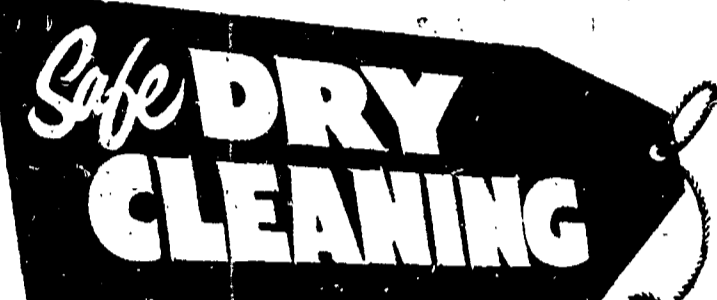
chest X-ray."

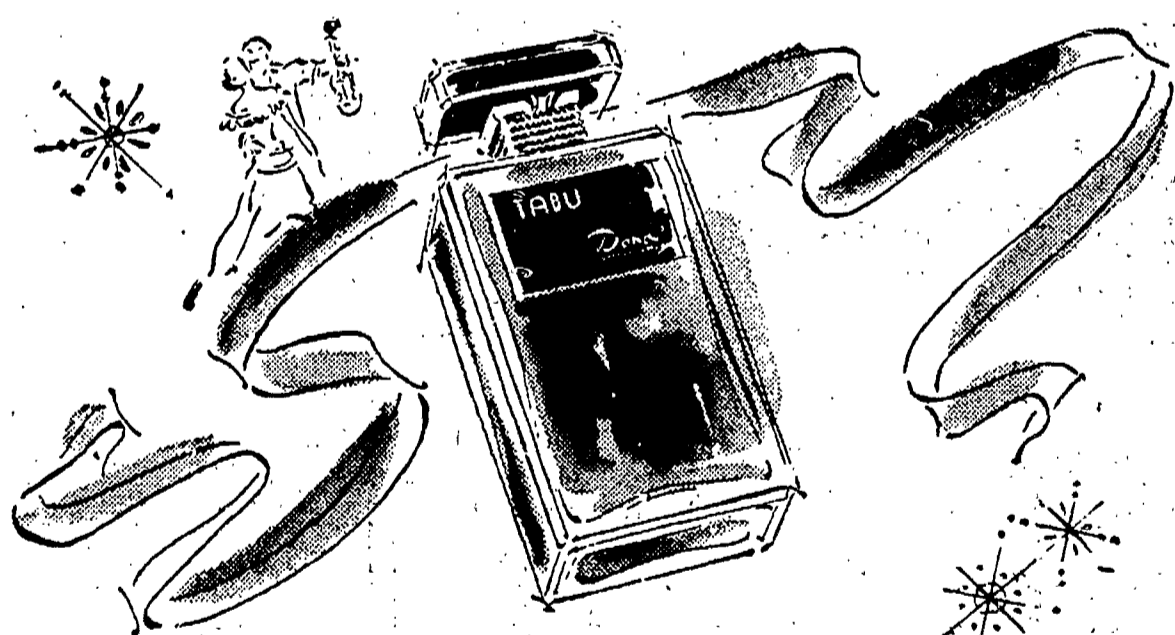

A very late call for help is heard from some lads who just might become the most important people we have ever met. They are the soldiers stationed in the Army Anti-Aircraft Artillery camps located in our midst.

They want to give another Christmas party . . . not for themselves, but for a group of 60-75 underprivileged children whom they will take out of an institution to spend with them, at their camps, as their honored guests. They did it last year, and with some help from us, it was a tremendous success. They'd like our assistance again.

The tardiness of the appeal is explained by the fact that these ranges were keeping a very important date up on the firing range on Lake Michigan. They have just returned and it should be more than a little comforting to us to learn that they brought back with them the best record ever made by a unit in the entire Army Anti-Aircraft Artillery Command.

We always knew they were square-shooters; it is nice to know they also have the ability to knock down some enemy planes if the Commies ever take it into their silly heads to try and attack us.

This party idea was born last year when it was learned that the boys in the camp had invited a group of orphans to share their Christmas with them. The soldiers didn't ask for any help. They were digging into their own pockets to make up a pool to buy little, practical gifts to give the youngsters whose presents are few and far between.

It was suggested by a few Pointers that it would be a nice gesture if the local residents horned into the picture, helped the boys provide the gifts for the kids and also threw in a little something extra to show them that we appreciate the job they are doing in being our watchdogs. Like everyone else all over the world, they would like to be home for Christmas, but duty keeps them here. Very few of them are getting holiday leave.

Last year the response to the appeal, not instigated by the AAA men, but by interested Pointers, brought in some \$800 in cash and several hundred actual gifts. This enabled the lads in uniform to play hosts and guests at some never-to-be-forgotten parties at the campsites. The orphans received five presents each, an unprecedented occurrence in their restricted young lives. The excess went to buy thank-you expressions from the local residents to the soldiers themselves. Nothing lavish, but something to tell the boys we were glad and grateful to have them among us.

We are being given the opportunity to make the same sort of gesture this yuletide. The time is very short and action is imperative. The same sort of quick, decisive action we would want if an emergency should arise wherein the soldiers ever had to rush to our defense.

The same capable individuals and agencies who helped handle last year's drive have volunteered to carry on again. Lt. Col. D. Walter Allard, chairman of the Veterans' Committee at the War Memorial Center, is heading the movement. His personal experience in World War II taught him how lonely a soldier on duty can be at Christmas time. He saw more orphans in bombed-out towns than anyone should have to see in a lifetime.

The Pointe VFW Post 995 and its auxiliary are again pitching in to help make this project a success. Last year they brought all the presents at wholesale. They helped with the wrapping and the distribution of gifts and the decorating of the mess halls at the camps. They found their efforts well rewarded and they are hoping that results will be even more gratifying this year.

Time is of the essence. Christmas is close at hand, and presents must be bought and wrapped and delivered and the holly must be hung. It is a chance for all of us to glean an extra portion of joy from the act of sharing.

We couldn't agree more with what this man had to say.

He was referring to the gummed up, glued up, sprayed up trees that have been on display for the past few years . . . and they seem to be getting more so. In fact, we have seen some pictures of "modern" Christmas trees that took us some minutes to figure out what they were.

When we were a small tot and on through our growing-up, a Christmas tree was just what it sounds like . . . a down-to-earth natural green pine tree that smelled heavenly from the time it was bought until the day it unhappily had to be thrown out.

A great production was made in the family as to just the right size and shape for our particular "bay window" corner in the "parlor" and buying the tree was an event to be looked forward to with great excitement. After the tree was installed the ornaments were brought down from the attic, unwrapped with gentle care and the ceremony of decorating the trees began. Father did the work, while the rest of us sat around and told him what was wrong? But that was part of the deal and a big part of the fun.

Putting the star (or angel) on the top! Look at least an hour . . . then came the business of the candles! No electric bulbs for us in those days. Little colored candles were clamped onto the tree here and there and were backed by red, green and silver shields that were supposed to make the candles safe for lighting.

Safe indeed! As we look back on it now, it was a scary performance, but it didn't seem to stop people all over the country from using them and lighting them. That in itself was a ritual the same in every home. No one was allowed to light them except the "man of the house" (because he was the most careful member!) and they were never lit unless the family was gathered around the tree to watch. It was a wondrous sight. We would sit very quietly and just look at this beautiful miracle . . . then after a short time the candles had to be snuffed out before any damage was done. It is hard to believe today that one could ever have taken such chances . . . putting match-lit candles on a pine tree in one's own home near the lace-curtained windows! OUCH!

Soon came the electric light bulbs for trees and an entire new world was opened to us . . . but at least Christmas trees still looked like Christmas trees. Now one can buy them ready-made in pink, lavender, white, silver, blue or any color under the sun. They come already decorated in sequins, feathers and beads and the "snow" is sprayed on with a lacquer that looks about as Christmasy as a tropical evening gown.

Even the Christmas tree ornaments have undergone a drastic change. It would be difficult to describe the old timers but the memory of them will linger with us always . . . especially the little pot-bellied Santa Claus that clamped on a conspicuous branch of the tree, and the lush pink bird with the white brush tail that shared honors with Santa. We wonder what has ever happened to them!

If a tree ornament got busted in the hanging it was a catastrophe that sat heavily on the family and especially heavy on the bustier of it! They were usually handled like precious jewels and when the sad time came to dismantle the Christmas tree, these baubles were carefully packed away in cartons to rest in the attic until the following year. It would be fun to go back to that for a change . . . all but the lighted candles!

Well, there's one thing that hasn't changed very much and that's Santa Claus. We DO fervently hope that some bright ad man doesn't get the idea of dressing Santa and all his helpers in shocking pink or aquamarine dust and sprinkling his lovely white whiskers with sequin blue!

If anything, the Santa of today is a vast improvement on the one of yesteryear. In our day a child would have to be pretty credulous to attach any romantic importance to those cottony looking beards that were usually and obviously held on the face by an unconcealed piece of string. Nor was it unusual to see Santa's own black hair sticking out from under a poorly made wig.

Our first real encounter with him at a children's party, (where he handed a toy to each guest), brought from us the remark, made to grandma, that "Santa Claus smells funny." Devils Surprise Royal Oak Court Team to Win, 62-59

An untried, underdog Blue Devil basketball team raced to a 62 to 59 victory over Royal Oak last Friday, December 10, before a capacity bipartisan crowd that jammed the Pointers' tiny gymnasium.

Relying on a spectator-pleasing, fast break offense and an alert defense around the boards, the Devils charged into a 20 to 11 advantage at the end of the opening period behind the sharp shooting of veteran Johnny Russell, who connected for nine of his 21 point game total.

Tom Barry Stars
Veteran center Tom Barry took over in the second period to pour in six points and lead the Devils to a 32 to 27 margin at the halftime intermission.

The Devils rolled up a 7 to 0 lead in the first two minutes of play behind the sharp passing of Barry, who also combined with lanky Denny McGinty to control both backboards. The Acorns didn't get their first basket until two minutes and 10 seconds had elapsed.

Royal Oak's defense tightened to start the second period and they held the Pointers scoreless for three minutes and 15 seconds of the period. In the meantime, the Acorns pulled to within three points of a tie, 20 to 17. At this point Barry went into offensive action and poured six points through the nets to give the Pointers their halftime margin.

Captain Ejected
Royal Oak's offense suffered a serious blow when its captain and star, Roger Sides, was ejected from the game at three minutes, 35 seconds of the second quarter. This turn of events turned Acorn coach Don Bray into a jumping jack on a pogo stick. He hit the ceiling and complained bitterly to Coach Howard MacAdam while wagging a well manicured finger under his nose. Then he turned his ire on referee Earl Meyer who patiently waited for the storm to subside, then shackled the Acorns with a technical foul against their coach for unsportsmanlike conduct.

Russell Takes Over
Johnny Russell paced the Pointers in their 13 point third quarter surge with six points which enabled the Devils to go into the final period holding a scant 45 to 41 lead.

Russell added another six points to his game total in the final quarter, which saw the

Acorns lose their lanky, 6 feet 5 inch, center Bob Kelly on personal fouls with less than two minutes remaining. With Kelly's height out of the game the Devils easily controlled the ball and the game to the final horn.

Grundeman High Scorer
Most everyone thought Russell had annexed high point honors for the night but they had lost sight of the fact Royal Oak guard Bob Grundeman had been clicking at the foul line and had compiled a 22 point game total for honors. Grundeman scored six field goals and 10 free throws in 12 attempts from the charity circle. Russell hooped eight field goals and five free throws.

The final scoring totals revealed that Grosse Pointe hit from the floor for 25 field goals while the Acorns were successful on 20 tries. At the foul line the Acorns had a better percentage, hitting 19 of 29 tries as compared to the Devils' 12 of 27 attempts. Personal fouls were even, but the edge went to Royal Oak because of two technical fouls, 19 to 17.

Coach MacAdam Pleased
Needless to say Coach Howard MacAdam was pleased with this unexpected victory and immediately telephoned his wife Betty at the hospital, where she had presented him with a bouncing baby girl just the night before.

The coach isn't being too optimistic about the rest of the season and for good reason. He loses his high scoring star, Johnny Russell, at mid-season, due to graduation.

A truer picture of what to expect from the 1954-55 Blue Devil basketball edition will be told when the Pointers entertain the Fordson Tractors next Friday, December 17.

Two Tough Opponents
Fordson, along with Border Cities League defending champion Highland Park appear to be the strongest teams in the league. If Coach MacAdam can keep his lads running like they did against Royal Oak, the Pointers will stand a chance to spring their second upset in as many weeks. But to ask schoolboys to run, run, run for 24 grueling minutes of play is almost too much to expect. The Devils' bench leaves something to be desired. To date the Devils can present only a front line attack with little or no reinforcement from the bench.

It will be interesting to watch the season unfold for the Blue Devils. Can they lead a charmed life like the Devils' football team that wasn't given too much of a chance at the beginning of the season, only to come through to win more titles in one year than ever before in the history of the school on Fisher road?

A Grosse Pointe disqualification in the final event handed the Royal Oak Acorns their first Border Cities League victory of the season and dropped the Blue Devils from the undefeated ranks.

Grosse Pointe had splashed to impressive non-league victories over Hazel Park and Ferndale prior to the Royal Oak meet last Friday, December 10, in the Acorns' pool. Coach Banach's paddlers had an excellent chance to remain undefeated as they battled the Acorns on even terms throughout the meet right down to the last event, which found the teams tied at 36-all.

Beat Ferndale Easily
Just four days earlier the Blue Devils handily squashed non-league Ferndale 57 to 27 in the local pool. In this meet the Devils won five of the seven individual events and slammed the two re-lays which led Ferndale's coach, John McGregor, to state to Coach Banach, "I didn't realize your team was so strong. You should beat Royal Oak on Friday."

He was comparing the results of that meet with the one Ferndale had with the Acorns earlier in the season. But for the disqualification Coach McGregor could have been stamped as a sharp observer of swimming talent.

The Blue Devils will tangle with Fordson, the 1953-54 Border Cities League champion, in what should prove to be another knock-down splash party on Friday, December 17, in the Tractors' home pool.

Devils Take Lead
Veteran Walt Eversman and Bob Guenther placed first and third in the 100 yard backstroke to give the Devils a two-point, 19 to 17 lead. Bayne and Schleicker placed second and third behind Royal Oak's Platt in the 100 yard freestyle to enable the Pointers to maintain a one-point 23 to 22 margin.

In the diving Royal Oak took a two-point, 28 to 26, lead when Kelly and LaRose place first and third with Dick Stafford taking second place.

Eversman was upset by Seaman in the 150 yard individual medley relay but Harry Huffaker took a third place to keep the Pointers within striking distance, four points behind, 29 to 33.

Bob Guenther, Jim Ketzler and Nicholson put the Pointers right back in the meet when they won the 150 medley relay to tie the score at 36-all and set the stage for the heart-breaking final relay.

After the meet Coach Banach remarked that in all his 26 years as a swimming coach this was the first time he had ever lost a meet on a disqualification. Banach feels that in the return meet, which will be held in the Pointers' pool, his team will turn the tables on the Acorns and pointed out that he still feels no team in the league will go through the season undefeated.

Seems All Out
At this point Coach Banach put all his eggs in one basket and sent Dick Schleicker, Dave Bayne, Carl Anderson and Dick DeGner out for the "Blue Chip" event, the 200 yard speed relay, on which hinged the outcome of the meet.

The first three boys of the relay team managed to gain about a yard margin over the fast moving Acorns and Pointe followers envious victory by an eyelash. But then it happened.

The anchorman, and we will be the last to name him, jumped the gun by a whisker and the officials caught the infraction and disqualified the Pointers, giving Royal Oak a 44 to 36 victory.

No Hard Feelings
This sudden turn of events brought visible tears to the eyes of the hard working Blue Devil natators but to a man they forgave their errant teammate for they knew it could happen to the best of them.
