Thursday, December 9 PRESIDENT EISENHOWER, with his temper well in check, announced that he will not reply to Senator McCarthy's attack against him. The Senator had accused the President of displaying a "shrinking show of weakness" against the Communists.

Without mentioning McCarthy's name, the Chief Executive said that he stands for positive things and does not indulge in personal vituperations or quarrels of any kind. He told news men that he would make no comment about the justice or injustice of the Senate's voting to condemn McCarthy's conduct.

Friday, December 10

THE UNITED STATES' and its Korean allies' bid to have the 11 American airmen jailed by Red China on charges of spying, released, was denounced as "shameful" and "jerry - built," by Russia's Jacob A. Malik. He repeatedly stated that the airmen were spies and that the United Nations had no right to interfere in Peiping justice.

The 16 UN allies had put the matter before the United Nations General Assembly, condemning the imprisonment. Malik stated that the United States was press-


Committee Named

Pointe Mail Now Boasts 'New Look'

New Cancellation Marking Will Advertise Community All Over World

Grosse Pointe has received an early Christmas present from Uncle Sam's Post Office Department. For the first time in history all mail collected locally is getting a Grosse Pointe 36, Mich., stamp cancellation marking.

Heretofore all mail collected here has been cleared through the Roosevelt Park station and the stamps have been cancelled with the Deroit marking usedcampsites on Christmas Day. Speeds Delivery

Beginning last Monday morning, mail collected here and addressed to this area is being cancelled in the branch on Mack at East Warren and distributed directly, as quickly as possible, without having to go down town. This means that Grosse Pointe mail collected here as late as 5 o'clock in the afternoon is being delivered the following morning.

This has been made possible by the installation of a cancelling machine which the postal employes call "The Mighty Mite." It is capable of cancelling a minimum of 12,000 pieces of mail


Vandals Damage

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



all the needs of the City and Farms. A new booster intake station is now under construction at the Farms lakefront park, which will increase the amount of raw water delivered to the filters and pumps. The pumping capacity has been declared adequate for all foreseeable needs.

Earlier this year the Farms had informed the City of Grosse Pointe that it would continue to furnish it water until the Detroit expansion program was completed in 1956 or 1957. After that, the City would have been cut off by the Farms and would have had to get its water from Detroit. The City had arranged to become a customer of Detroit when Detroit's program was completed, but took the position that it much preferred to remain a customer of the Farms and would be willing to spend a considerable sum to help enlarge the Farms system.

Fire Changes Picture Last week's disastrous fire at the big new Detroit water station which is not yet completed, might delay considerably the completion of the expansion program. This would conceivably have further complicated the picture locally. The state's approval of the new

plan for additional filter beds in the Farms, should mean an early solution to this major problem.

A Chance to Reciprocate

A very late call for help is heard from some lads who just might become the most important people we have ever met. They are the soldiers stationed in the Army Anti-Aircraft Artillery camps located in our midst.


They want to give another Christmas party . . . not for themselves, but for a group of 60-75 underprivileged children whom they will take out of an institution to spend with them, at their camps, as their honored guests. They did it last year, and with some help from us, it was a tremendous success. They'd like our assistance again.

The tardiness of the appeal is explained by the fact that these soldiers were keeping a very important date up on the firing range on Lake Michigan. They have just returned and it should be more than a little comforting to us to learn that they brought back with them the best record ever made by any unit in the entire Army Anti-Aircraft Artillery Command.

We always knew they were square-shooters; it is nice to know they also have the ability to knock down some enemy planes if the Commies ever take it into their silly heads to try and attack us.

This party idea was born last year when it was learned that the boys in the camp had invited a group of orphans to share their Christmas with them. The soldiers didn't ask for any help. They were digging into their own pockets to make up a pool to buy little, practical gifts to give the youngsters whose presents are few and far between.

It was suggested by a few Pointers that it would be a nice gesture if the local residents horned into the picture, helped the boys provide the gifts for the kids and also threw in a little something extra to show them that we appreciate the job they are doing in being our watchdogs. Like everyone else all over the world, they would like to be home for Christmas, but duty keeps them here. Very few of them are getting holiday leave. Last year the response to the appeal, not instigated by the AAA men, but by interested Pointers, brought in some \$800 in cash and several hundred actual gifts. This enabled the lads in uniform to play hosts and guests at some neverto-be-forgotten parties at the campsites. The orphans received five presents each, an unprecedented occurrence in their restricted young lives. The excess went to buy thankyou expressions from the local residents to the soldiers themselves. Nothing lavish, but something to tell the boys we were glad and grateful to have them among us. We are being given the opportunity to make the same sort of gesture this yuletide. The time is very short and action is imperative. The same sort of quick, decisive action we would want if an emergency should arise wherein the soldiers ever had to rush to our defense. The same capable individuals and agencies who helped handle last year's drive have volunteered to carry on again. Lt. Col. D. Walter Allard, chairman of the Veterans' Committee at the War Memorial Center, is heading the movement. His personal experience in World War II taught him how lonely a soldier on duty can be at Christmas time. He saw more orphans in bombed-out towns than anyone should have to see in a lifetime. The Pointe VFW Post 995 and its auxiliary are again pitching in to help make this project a success. Last year they bought all the presents at wholesale. They helped with the wrapping and the distribution of gifts and the decorating of the mess halls at the camps. They found their efforts well rewarded and they are hoping that results will be even more gratifying this year. All donations, either money or presents, may be taken to Mondry Cleaners at 369 Fisher road. Checks should be made out to Alger VFW Post Xmas Fund. Time is of the essence. Christmas is close at hand, and presents must be bought and wrapped and delivered and the holly must be hung. If the response is as thickly spread as the cause merits, the multitude of small gifts will be ample to fill the need. It is a chance for all of us to glean an extra portion of joy from the act of sharing.

Calling on a friend last week, we walked into the house just in time to hear the wind-up of a radio talk by someone whose identity is unknown to us ... but who was talking about the old-fashioned Christmas tree as compared to some of the fantastic things shown today. We couldn't agree more with what this man had to say.

He was referring to the gummed up, glued up, sprayed up trees that have been on display for the past few years . . and they seem to be getting more so. In fact, we have seen some pictures of "modern" Christmas trees that took us some minutes to figure out what they were.

When we were a small tot and on through our growingup, a Christmas tree was just what it sounds like . . . a down-to-earth natural green pine tree that smelled heavenly from the time it was bought until the day it unhappily had to be thrown out.

A great production was made in the family as to just the right size and shape for our particular "bay window" corner in the "parlor" and buying the tree was an event to be looked forward to with great excitement. After the tree was installed the ornaments were brought down from the attic, unwrapped with gentle care and the ceremony of decorating the trees began. Father did the work, while the rest of us sat around and told him what was wrong? But that was part of the deal and a big part of the fun.

Putting the star (or angel) on the top took at least an hour . . . then came the business of the candles! No electric bulbs for us in those days. Little colored candles were clamped onto the tree here and there and were backed by red, green and silver shields that were supposed to make the candles safe for lighting.

Safe indeed! As we look back on it now, it was a scary performance, but it didn't seem to stop people all over the country from using them and lighting them. That in itself was a ritual the same in every home. No one was allowed to light them except the "man of the house" (because he was the most careful member!) and they were never lit unless the family was gathered around the tree to watch. It was a wondrous sight. We would sit very quietly and just look at this beautiful miracle . . . then after a short time the candles had to be snuffed out before any damage was done. It is hard to believe today that one could ever have taken such chances . . . putting match-lit candles on a pine tree in one's wn-nome near the lace-curtained windows! OUCH Soon came the electric light bulbs for trees and an entire new world was opened to us . . . but at least Christmas trees still looked like Christmas trees. Now one can buy them ready-made in pink, lavender, white, silver, blue or any color under the sun. They come already decorated in sequins, feathers and beads and the "snow" is sprayed on with a lacquer that looks about as Christmasy as a tropical evening gown. Even the Christmas tree ornaments have undergone a drastic change. It would be difficult to describe the old timers but the memory of them will linger with us always ... especially the little pot-bellied Santa Claus that clamped on a conspicuous branch of the tree, and the lush pink bird with the white brush tail that shared honors with Santa. We wonder what has ever happened to them!
