(Continued from Page 1) their attorney, that home owners on Maryland will encounter a great deal of difficulty in selling their homes and will probably take a loss of approximately 10 to 15 percent on the sale price. They said that people, especially those with children, frequently refuse to buy a home where a street car line or bus line is in operation.

Threaten to Move: Some of the residents on Maryland stated that if the lines continue to operate on their street, they intend to move away; and others revealed that if the lines are not eliminated, they "here and now" make claim against the coach line and the Park for proper compensation for this loss of property values.

Along the route in question, the letter from the attorney revealed, there are 38 homes housing 61 families. Therefore, the loss in property values would probably be about \$100,000 or more, for which compensation is expected, and, if necessary, will be sought in a court of law.

Property Value Drops: Property value on a bus route drops about 10 to 20 percent, the letter stated, and many of the people had purchased their properties, and sold them, too, on the basis that there were no bus lines on Maryland.

Park City Manager Everitt B. Lane disclosed that the matter is in the hands of the Planning Commission, inasmuch as it comes under its jurisdiction.

He said that he had tried to contact the Maryland Citizens Committee's attorney to arrange a meeting with the group, but so far has been unsuccessful.

If the 55-year-old law is upheld, counties and other local communities are apt to find that they have been collecting taxes on property which belongs to the State, and that the State may have the right to seek damages against trespassers.

According to the law, the State has no authority to grant permits for fill-ins on State-owned submerged lands, and such type lands can only be sold under special legislative action.

Mrs. Meyer, 64, of 777 Fisher road, died on Tuesday, January 25, in Bon Secours Hospital, after a short illness.

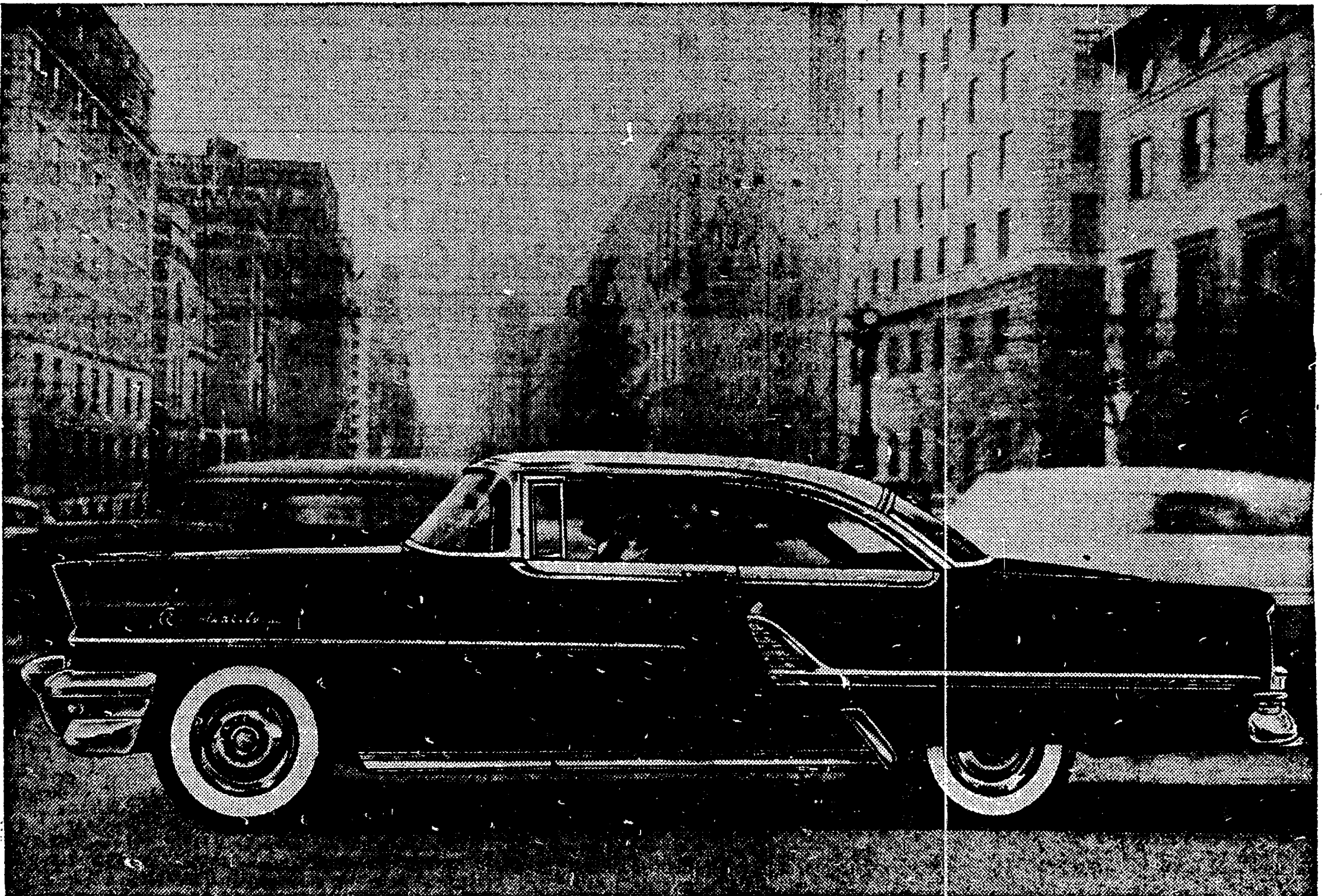
She was a member of the St. Philomena Altar Society, and a member of social clubs and organizations.

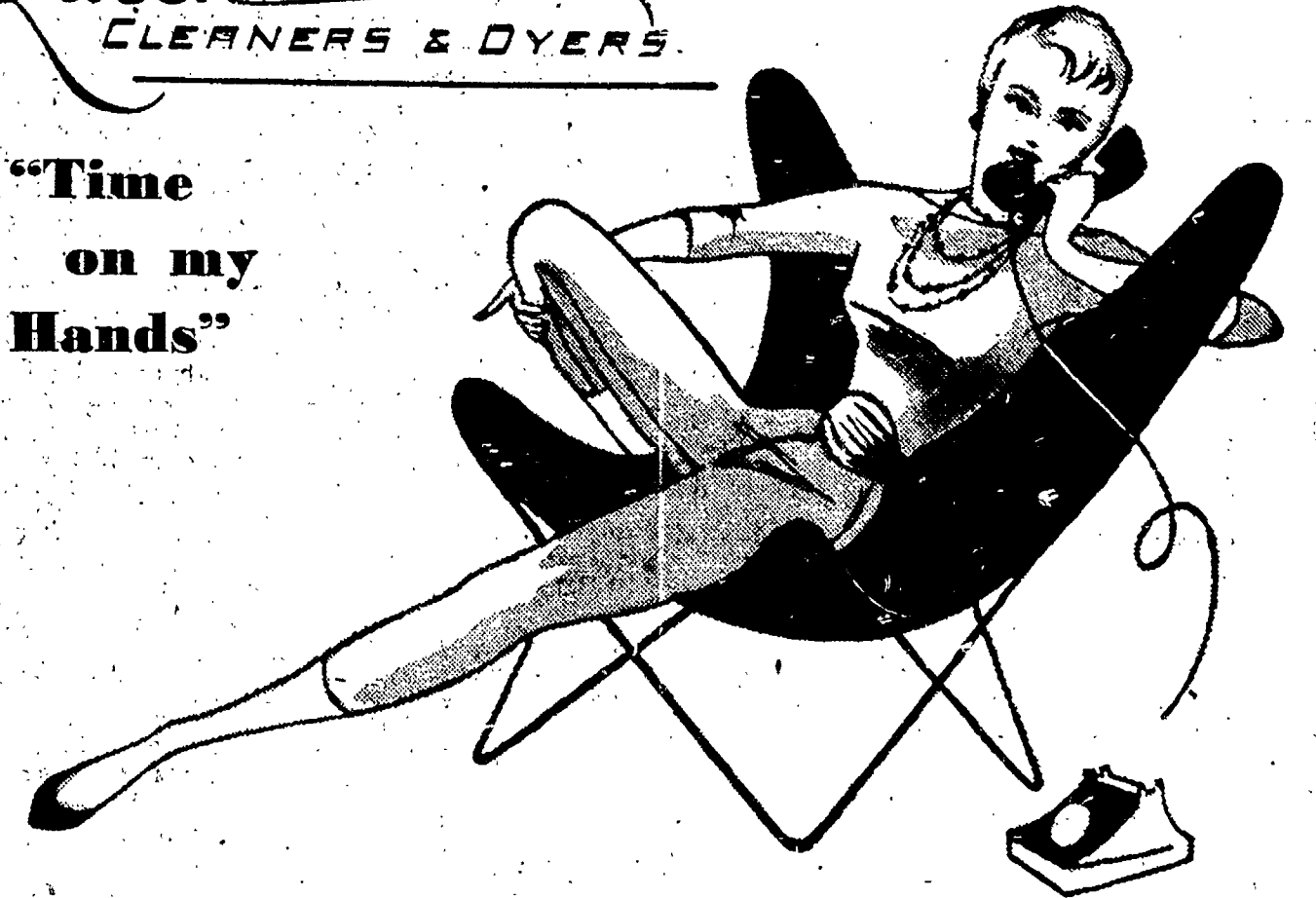
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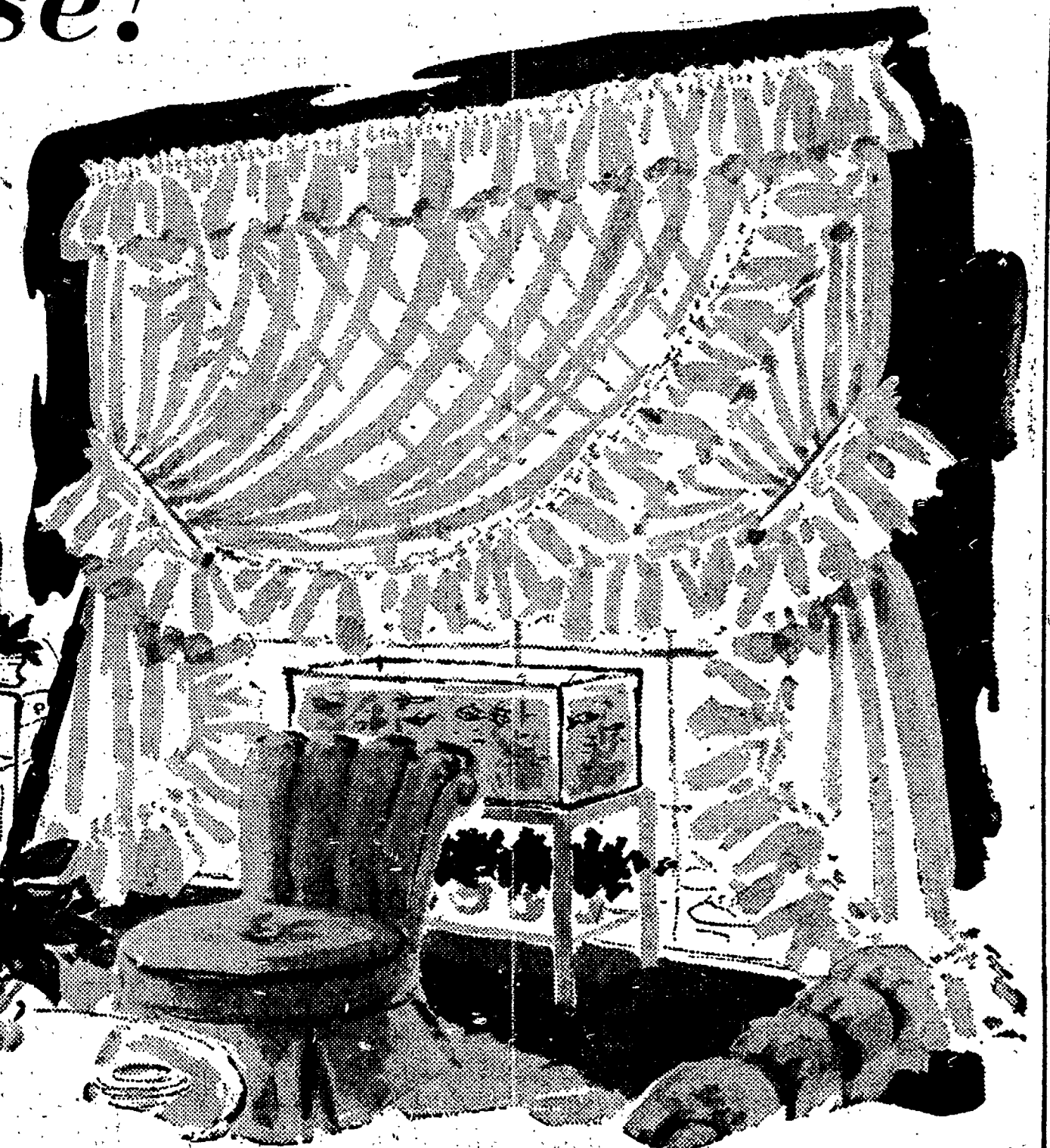
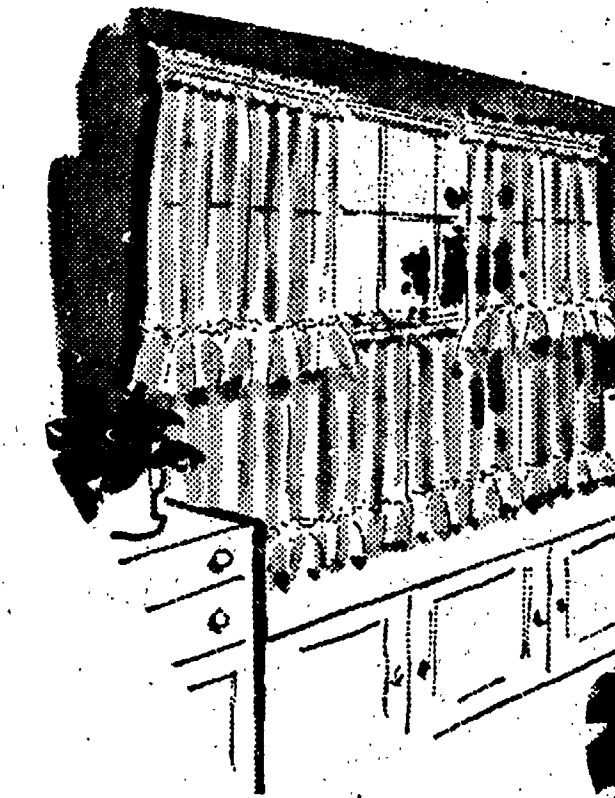

To begin at 8 o'clock in the upstairs meeting room of the Central Library at Fisher and Kercheval, the hour long program will provide an opportunity for Pointers to see four short films chosen to appeal to all members of the family.

This film is part of the Library's permanent collection, its acquisition having been made possible through the interest and generosity of the Grosse Pointe Motion Picture and Television Council. As part of the permanent collection, it is available at all times for home, club, and classroom use in the community.

Two travel films will highlight this program. WHITE THUNDER shows the wonders and beauties of Niagara Falls, one of the great sights of America and of particular interest to Detroiters, being located within driving distance of home.

An old-time winter pastime of the northeastern States and Canada is the subject of MAPLE SUGAR TIME. Showing, as it does, the processes and pleasures of the gathering of the maple sugar crop, the film revives memories for the country-bred and provides a new experience for those not so fortunate.

The film shows the majestic 167 foot plunge of the waters of the four Great Lakes — Erie, Huron, Michigan, and Superior — which have combined to form the Niagara River. Unusual camera shots of the famed sights of the Falls are offered — the Cave of the Winds, Horseshoe Falls, the Great Whirlpool, and the tour boat, Maid of the Mist.

To complete the program, there will be a short subject of especial interest to the younger members of the audience.

The other travel film on the program is far removed from the first in locale and feeling. While the Niagara film emphasizes surging vitality, ROME, CITY ETERNAL, conveys in glowing color the beauties and antiquities of one of the great cities of the western world.

All residents of the community are cordially invited to attend the showing. Children of junior high and elementary school age are welcome if they are accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult.

SELFRIDGE AIR FORCE BASE, Mich. — Col. Lloyd E. Arnold, 58, of 425 Moran road, Grosse Pointe Farms, is new special adviser on Reserve affairs to Maj. Gen. Richard A. Grunsford, Tenth Air Force commander, at headquarters here.

He came to the headquarters, administrative center for Tenth's 159 Regular and Reserve units in a 13-state Midwest area, after four years in the Pentagon. There he was a member of the Air Force's Air Staff Committee on Reserve policy.

His 37 years in uniform as a Reserve officer—11 of them on active duty—include three as commander of overseas air bases in World War II.

Reckless Drivers Pay Up In Court

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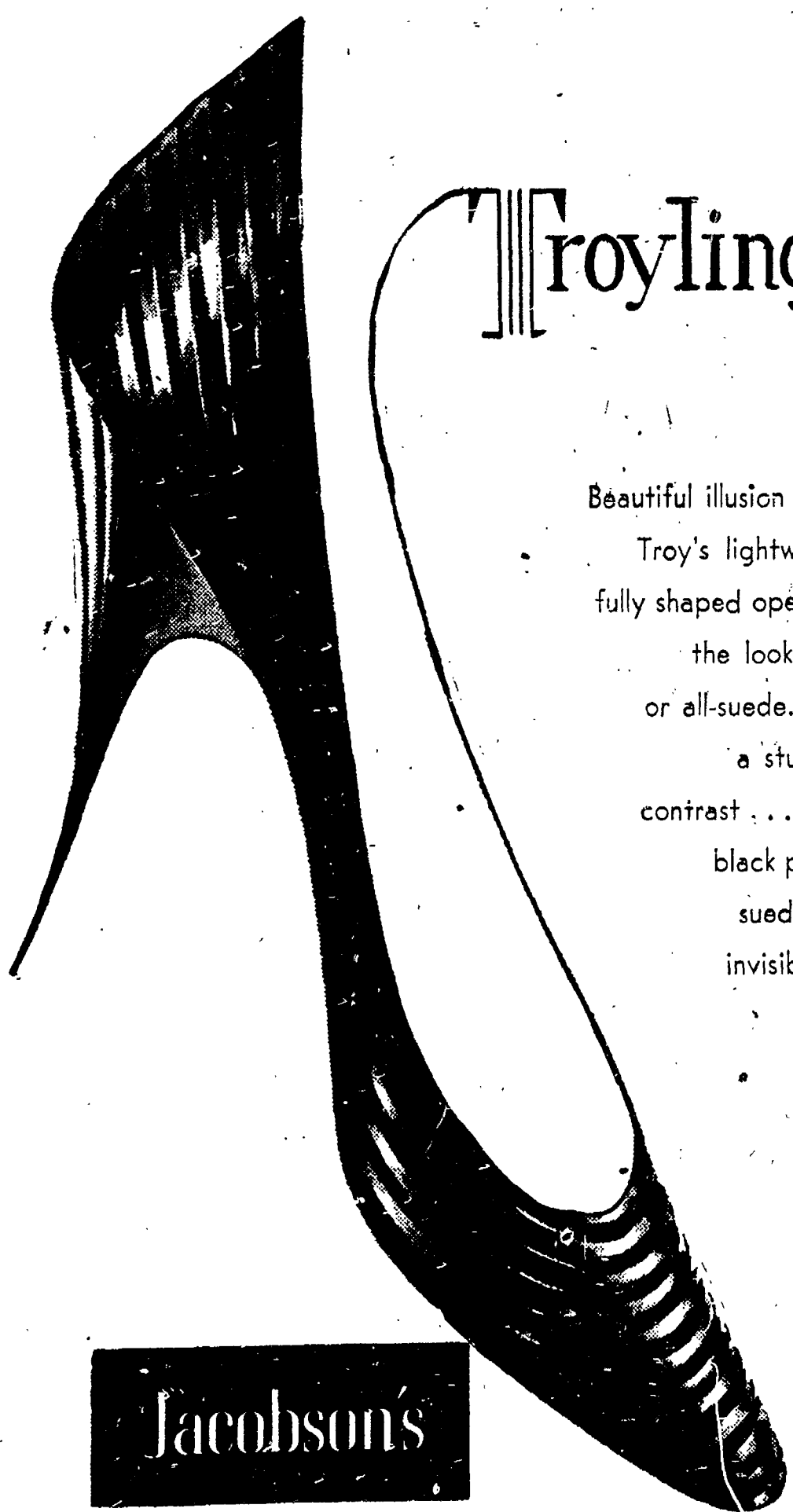

## Rabaut Supports Benefits for GI

Congressman Louis C. Rabaut (D. Mich.) went on record with the House Committee on Veterans Affairs in support of legislation to rescind that part of the President's Proclamation which discontinues further educational and training benefits as of the end of this month. His statement reads as follows:

"Mr. Chairman: I wish to go on record with your Committee as being wholeheartedly in support of your bill, H. R. 587, the intent of which is to permit those individuals who are in the service on or before January 31, 1955 to continue to earn educational benefits until their discharge, or until the maximum of 36 months entitlement has been accrued.

"Earlier this month I received from your Committee copies of the President's Proclamation issued on January 1, 1955 and was amazed at the termination of certain veteran benefits it contained—benefits which I have always considered as being matters of simple justice of treatment for men and women who have served their country by sacrificing important formative years of their lives.

"One of these curtailments which particularly concerned me was the termination of Education and Training benefits under Public Law 550 of the 82nd Congress, proclaiming that no additional eligibility for Education and Training may be accumulated by our veterans now in service after January 31, 1955 and further, that those persons first entering service after that date acquire no eligibility for these benefits at all.

"It is my personal feeling there is no excuse for curtailment of benefits to veterans, especially the much-needed, beneficial and publicly-approved college scholarships, which are an important protection to the veteran to ease his re-adjustment to civilian life after he has performed his duty of sacrificing a period of his normal peacetime living for the good of his country.

Rabaut concluded his remarks by saying, "Mr. Chairman, I am glad to have this opportunity to submit my statement to you in support of this type of legislation and request that it be included in the record of the Committee."

How much freedom can a democracy afford? Can we defeat unacceptable ideologies without resorting to methods we despise? Does a worthy end in international affairs justify harsh means? It has thus set up a program not designed primarily to convey information but instead geared to emphasize critical reading, reflection, and stimulating exchange of opinion.
