



WOODS TO GO TO POLLS MONDAY

HEADLINES of the WEEK As Compiled by the Grosse Pointe News

Thursday, December 1
EDGAR FAURE, premier of France, refused to resign after he lost a vote of confidence from the National Assembly. Instead, he said he might dissolve the Assembly and go over its head to the people on the issue of early elections.
President Rene Coty was reported as opposed to the dissolution. Not since 1877 has a Government leader dared to dissolve Parliament.

Friday, December 2
MICHIGAN'S TURNPIKE Law was ruled constitutional on all 19 counts by the State Supreme Court. Following the ruling, the Michigan Turnpike Authority announced that it will place bonds on sale to raise money to build the turnpike from Flat Rock to Saginaw.
Communities along the route of the proposed toll road, including Dearborn, had opposed the law on the constitutional grounds. State Highway Commissioner Ziegler, who had placed every obstacle in the way of the turnpike, now revealed that he will go along with the ruling of the court and formulate plans and call a meeting of the cities affected and see what can be worked out.

Saturday, December 3
A MEETING HELD between the publishers of the three major Detroit newspapers, and the representatives of the striking members of the stereotypers union, lasted for three hours and 45 minutes, but no progress was made. Meetings have been held since the strike went into effect on Thursday morning.
News-hungry Detroiters have bought out all the out-of-town papers from the downtown newsstands.

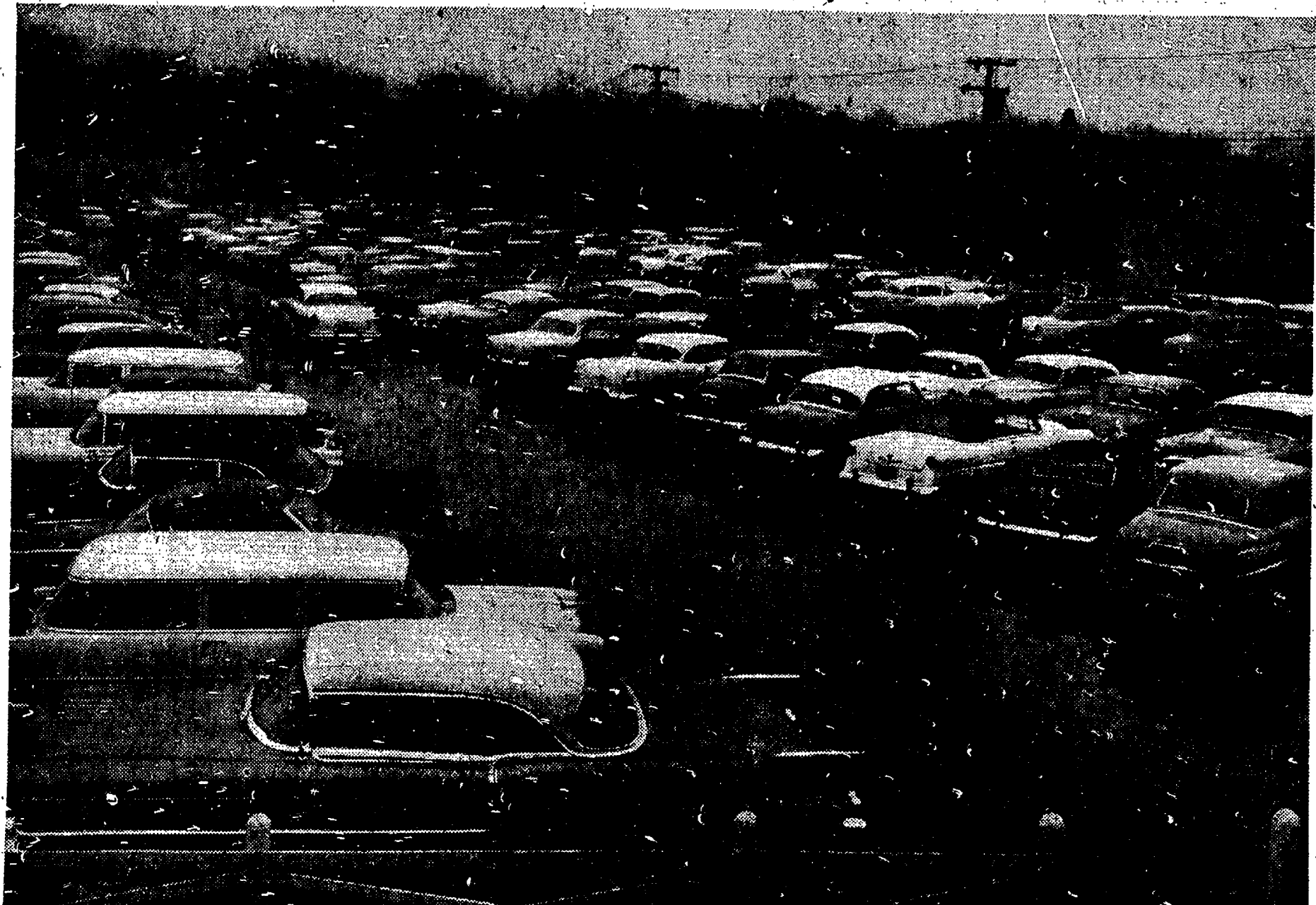
Sunday, December 4
THE RED REGIME of East Germany has taken the first step in banning barge permits, threatening thereby, to choke off the West German barges which bring approximately 1,500,000 tons of supplies to West Berlin through the Soviet occupation zone.
Allied officials believe that the Reds will also attempt to interfere with the highway, railroad and perhaps even with air traffic. The Communists are taking these steps because they claim that East Germany is now a "sovereign nation."

Monday, December 5
A HEAVY GUARD has been placed around the home of Gov. Williams in Lansing after the Governor's wife, Nancy, and Lansing police received three threats that the Governor's residence would be bombed. The caller, speaking in a husky voice, told Mrs. Williams that he was a member of the Communist Party and that he had placed a bomb in the house on Thanksgiving day and that it was set to go off at 2 p. m. today.

Tuesday, December 6
INDIA IS drawing up an angry protest because Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and Portuguese Foreign Minister Paulo Cunha called the Portuguese possession, Goa, a Portuguese province. Goa, located near the west coast of India, is regarded by the Indians as a colony held by force of arms. Furious Indian officials stated that the U. S.'s siding with Portugal could be construed as a United States decision to oppose India's claim to the territory and support Portuguese claim to it. American Embassy officials in India said Dulles' statement was the biggest diplomatic blunder the U. S. could make.

Wednesday, December 7
RUSSIA'S Communist Party Boss Nikita Khrushchev vigorously attacked the former colonial rule of Britain in Burma. The attack came while he was touring the country. During a state dinner in Taunggyi, Shan state capital, which followed the tour, the Red Boss claimed that the British were not in Burma to advance its civilization, but to rob it. He congratulated the Burmese for "throwing off the yolk of colonial oppression" and offered to supply the country with engineers, or supply an education for Burmese engineers in Russia.

Need for More Parking Space Clearly Demonstrated



This is the municipal parking area behind the Kercheval avenue business district, which Farms officials decided just a few weeks ago was plenty large enough for all foreseeable needs. With every available space occupied, cars can be seen cruising in both lanes and in the alley, hoping they will be able to park and get about their business without too much delay. More land could be acquired from the Richard School playground adjacent to the lot, if the Farms officials and the Board of Education could get together.

Reservoir Need Seen For Pointes

Suburbs supplied with water from Detroit will be asked to plan eventually on constructing reservoirs so that there will be an ample supply of water for these communities during peak consumption periods.
Disclosure of Detroit's proposed reservoir was made to the Woods Council on Monday, December 5, by the Woods city engineers, the firm of Pate and Hirt.
The city engineer also made a report on a proposed supplying of water to the Shores from the Woods water system. The Woods gets its water from Detroit.

Approval Sought
The Shores had asked for an okay from the Woods to permit it (Shores) to construct a water main down Vernier road to either connect with the Woods system on Vernier, or to the Detroit system on Mack avenue.
When the report was read to the Council, it was decided to hold off permission for the construction until it is found if the Shores would be interested in building a joint reservoir, when the request comes through from Detroit, and other details are ironed out between the two communities.

Two 17-year-old Detroit boys were arrested by Detroit police on Sunday, December 4, a few hours after the youths had broken into two Farms business places.
Farms Det. Sgt. Harold Seelow disclosed that the youths, Ezenzer Anthony of 653 E. Willis, and Kenneth Bradford of 681 Superior, were arrested by Detroit authorities while they were attempting to break into a Detroit business place. Police were tipped off when they were spotted trying to get into the establishment.
When arrested, Sgt. Seelow said, the boys admitted breaking into a barber shop at 1854 Mack and a restaurant at 1854 Mack, 45 minutes apart on Saturday evening, December 3.

Rubber Check Artist Still Operating

Check Passer Using Checks Stolen From Detroit Store
A phony check passer, wanted by Woods, Farms and Detroit police, has been operating in the Woods again.
Information received from Woods Det. Everitt Plumb revealed that William H. Barr, address not known, passed a check for \$70 at the Ship's Wheel on Mack avenue, on Tuesday, November 22, and on Wednesday, November 30, the check "bounced."
The check, drawn on the Detroit Bank, was stamped "payment stopped" because it was one of several stolen from a business place in Detroit.

Follow Several Leads
Det. Sgt. Walter O'Dell and Det. Plumb have been following several leads on the latest check passing, but so far have not been very successful.
Det. Plumb disclosed that Barr is on parole for passing bad checks in Detroit. He had been sentenced to a maximum of three years in Jackson Prison, and had served 11 months of his sentence when he was let out.
The officer stated that Barr had reported to his parole officer only once since his release in June, and that the parole office has no record of where he is staying at present.

Stiff Penalties Given Drivers

Two Detroit motorists apprehended for driving on the wrong side of the street, and not having driver's licenses, received stiff penalties imposed by Park Judge C. Joseph Belanger on Monday, December 5.
According to a police report of the case, Robert D. Jobe, 18, of 3408 Lemay; and Esker J. Keaton, 31, of 2607 Dubois, were spotted driving left of the center lane on Vernier, trying to pass each other on Sunday, December 4, when they were noticed by Patrolmen George Blair and Robert Edmunds, who took up pursuit.
Keaton was stopped first and while Patrolman Edmund stayed with him, Patrolman Blair took off after Jobe. Both were stopped between Lakepointe and Beaconsfield.

Farms to Review Parking Problems With Businessmen

Council Will Meet as Committee of Whole Sometime After January 16; Two Proposals Expected to Be Discussed
Grosse Pointe Farms Council agreed Monday, December 5, to consult On-the-Hill businessmen on community parking problems. The Council agreed that it would meet as a committee of the whole sometime "after January 16" to consider:
1—Proposals to construct a double-decker parking garage over the present parking site north of Kercheval.
2—Proposals to expand the Kercheval parking area to the east by condemning eight homes on the south side of Muir road.
Would Cost \$180,000
The double-decker suggestion, still in the "it" stage, might cost upwards of \$180,000. It would provide additional parking space for 180 cars—about \$1,000 a car.
The extended lot, it was estimated, would provide for 80 cars at an estimated \$115,000.
Financing of the parking plans was a key question to be discussed with businessmen.
The Council agreed that it would like to "have a chance to review the entire problem with businessmen."
Harry A. Furton, City manager, was instructed to contact the businessmen as a "representative group"—in time for the "after January 16" meeting.

Ask Residents to Register For School Bond Election

All residents of the Grosse Pointe School District are urged to register, if they have not already done so, for the special school bond election to be held on Tuesday, January 24.
Voters are already registered if they have voted previously in any of the Grosse Pointe municipalities or in that portion of Harper Woods which is in the Grosse Pointe School District in local, state and/or national elections and have not moved since the last time they voted.
How to Register
Any resident who has not previously voted in any of these areas may register for the January 24 election provided that he meets the following requirements:
He must be twenty-one years of age or older; he must have resided in Michigan for at least six months and in the Grosse Pointe School District for at least 30 days prior to January 24, 1956.

Pool Filter Bond Issue Election Set

Sixty Percent of Those Voting Must Approve Proposed Plan to Open Pool
Will the Grosse Pointe Woods Lake Front Park pool be open next year? This question is facing Woods voters next Monday. The Citizens Committee of Grosse Pointe Woods strongly urges all voters to vote on December 12.
On that date the voters will be asked to approve a 30-year bond issue of \$115,000 to cover a filtering system and necessary improvements at the Woods Lake Front Park pool. The State and County Health Departments have notified the Woods that the pool must remain closed until the filtering system is installed.
Pool Focal Point
The pool is the focal point of the park activity and community recreation during the summer months. It provides a safe, healthful and supervised recreation area for Woods residents of all ages, principally the children.
In some instances it affords the only means of leisurely recreation for adults. Very often entire families spend many hours in or around the pool and it is here that many youngsters first learn to swim. The pool and park is easily accessible and is open only to Woods residents by permit.

All Urged to Vote
The Woods Citizens Committee advises its residents not to assume an attitude of complacency by anticipating that his neighbor will vote. No opposition to the bond issue, either expressed or implied, has been encountered, however, other communities have experienced defeat of projects of equal importance when those in favor of a project failed to exercise their right to vote.
In order for the pool to open next year sixty (60) percent of those voting must approve the bond issue.

It is hoped that enough toys will be collected to distribute to several orphanages and needy families, but if not, one orphanage will be picked to receive them.

(Continued from Page 1) water system tapping by the Shores. The Village of Grosse Pointe Shores through its Manager and Consulting Engineer has requested that the City of Grosse Pointe Woods approve a proposal for supplying water from the Grosse Pointe Woods water system to the Grosse Pointe Shores system at a maximum rate of 3 million gallons per day.

During the year 1951 a 24-inch water main was placed in Vernier road extending from Harper Avenue to Mack Avenue. The City of Grosse Pointe Woods paid 92 per cent of the cost of this main and 8 per cent of the cost was paid by Grosse Pointe Shores.

The 24-inch main in Vernier road is supplied with water from a 30-inch main in Harper Avenue. At Mack Avenue it discharges into a 12-inch main extending south on the western side of Mack Avenue also to a 12-inch main extending north and south in Mack Avenue and a 12-inch main extending east in Vernier Road.

The main in Vernier road extends into the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores. Should Grosse Pointe Shores construct a new main in Vernier road of sufficient size to supply the water required the capacity of the existing 12-inch main would be usable for the City of Grosse Pointe Woods.

The 30-inch main in Harper Avenue extends northward to Eight Mile Road where it is connected to a 42-inch main which extends west (and beyond) the new Detroit North East water supply station located near the junction of Eight Mile road and Groesbeck highway.

At Higher Elevation The new North East station pumps water to some areas that are at a higher elevation than Grosse Pointe Woods, which requires high pressure.

To avoid excessive pressures in the lower areas a pressure reducing valve has been installed in the Eight Mile road 42-inch main at its intersection with Kelly road. This valve reduces pressure to about 55 pounds on the eastern side of the valve.

Water use records show that maximum hourly water use rates in Grosse Pointe Woods may be expected to be as high as 550 gallons per person per day and in Grosse Pointe Shores as high as 700 gallons per person per day.

For purposes of present calculations a population of 18,000 is used for Grosse Pointe Woods and 3,000 for Grosse Pointe Shores. Using these populations with water use as noted above, the maximum rate of use for the two communities is 12 million gallons per day.

FORD FOUNDATION AIDS HISTORY CENTER PROJECT WASHINGTON—The American Historical Association announced that next year it would establish a service center for history teachers with funds supplied by the Ford Foundation.

The center will make available for local school consultation 50 to 60 recognized professional historians.

It also will prepare or supervise the preparation of pamphlets to aid secondary teachers.

The association emphasized that "it has no intention of entering the fields of methods of teaching, already amply cared for by experts in education."

The center will be on a three-year experimental basis. The Ford Foundation is providing \$148,000.

To Review Parking Problem

(Continued from Page 1) City Manager Furton was instructed to consult with Grosse Pointe City officials on the traffic innovations.

Main point of contention was the posting of four-way stop signs and blinkers at Goethe and University, Charlevoix and Fisher, Charlevoix and Rivard, Charlevoix at Neff, Waterloo at Fisher, Waterloo at Rivard, St. Paul at Lakeland, and Maumee at Lakeview road.

The area would extend from Kercheval Avenue to the west line of the present parking lot, and would provide approximately 80 spaces after allowing for appropriate barriers and planting strips along Kercheval Avenue and Muir road.

Total estimated cost, including condemnation, legal and improvements is approximately \$115,000. The council agenda stated:

In another parking "decision," the Council heard protests from Arthur Keyes, of 473 Manor Avenue, and other area residents on condemnation of three lots adjacent to Mack Avenue for parking.

The Council decided to defer further action on the condemnation until it had consulted a committee of three Manor Avenue area residents.

Meanwhile, it was agreed to approve a resolution condemning four vacant lots on Mack Avenue in the area as an alternate parking problem solution.

Keyes' group had suggested the lots might better serve the parking needs created by a "beer garden and doctors' offices," in the sector.

In other actions, the Council: 1—Approved spending \$100 toward meeting expenses of the annual Halloween observance.

2—Appointed a three-man Council committee on a proposed division of a part of the late E. B. Whitcomb's property.

3—Agreed to clean house of 4,000 building plans which were taxing the City's storage facilities.

Occupants of the buildings for which the plans were drawn will be advised that the plans are available on calling at the City offices. Uncalled-for plans, beyond a five-year date, will be destroyed.

4—Approved installation of a new heating system in the skating rink shack at Kerby Field.

5—Protested the unilateral action of the City of Grosse Pointe in establishing new traffic control methods within the City of Grosse Pointe.

Friends Program Chairman this year, as moderator.

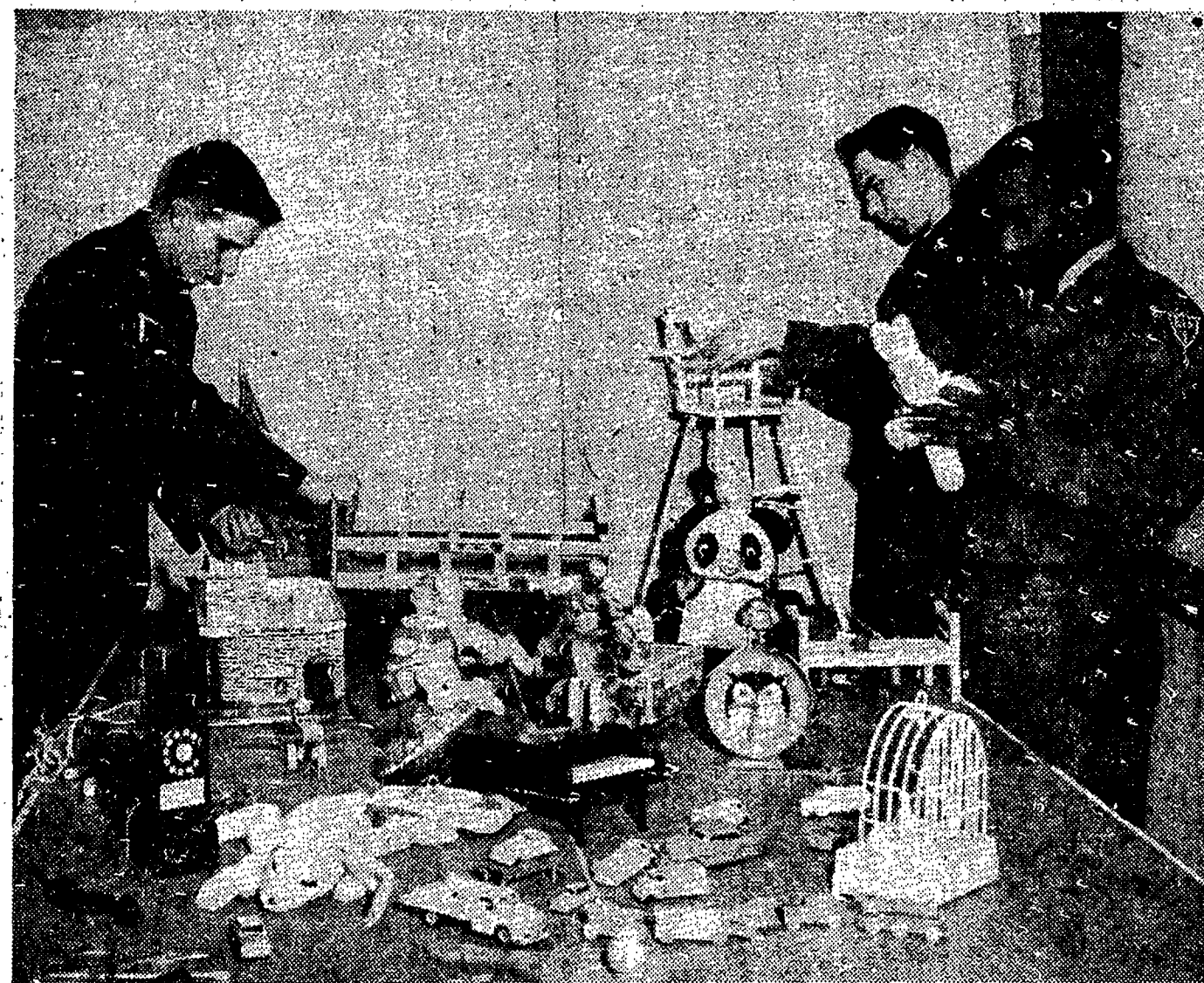

Machine Tests Driving Faults

Traffic-safety authorities agree that psychophysical tests should be made available periodically to every man and woman who drives a car, for their own safety and the pedestrian's protection.

The car and the road are just as safe—or unsafe—as the driver makes them. The driver cannot correct faults which he does not know he has.

The Don McCullough Chevrolet Company's Driver Training School at 16700 Harper avenue has recently purchased a portable driving-testing machine, the first in Detroit, which can detect some physical limitations.

Clifford Larson, of McCullough Chevrolet, revealed that the machine, in operation since Safe Driving Day, found drivers who took the tests needed to have the lenses of their glasses changed and learned of other defects to guard against.

The portable machine called a Saf-T-Rater, is used for seven tests. The first three includes testing (seated in a chair at a 20 feet distance), visual acuity, the field of vision and depth perception.

The public is invited to take a test free of charge in the McCullough show room any weekday from 9 to 5 p.m.

Mr. Larson also announced that many safety booklets from the Secretary of State's office may be obtained at the show room.

The city will continue to col-lect and grind tree limbs and branches every Monday through-out the year. Grass clippings will be picked up by the con-tractor each Monday, beginning April 16, 1956. Meanwhile, resi-dents may put grass, leaves,

shrubbery or plant clippings in containers with regular rubbish, which the contractor will remove on the new dates.

Hatcher Blasts Grid 'Madness'

ANN ARBOR — Moderation must replace "accelerated madness" in collegiate football or corrective action must be taken, University of Michigan President Harlan Hatcher believes.

The score of a game and its effect on conference championships or traditional rivalries is no longer the important thing, he says.

Sports reports now seem to place prime importance on the effect of a game on a "bid" to a bowl game.

Hatcher also is critical of the practice of pre-season ratings in which the number of games a team is expected to win or lose as well as the participants in the various bowl games are all determined before the first game of the season is played.

Carried to an extreme, the present "accelerated madness" could turn football into a year-around sport, he points out. If the "bids" to bowl games are all-important then it may not be too long before the demand arises for the winners of the major bowl games to meet in playoff games to determine a national champion.

This could produce football games in February or March with spring practice beginning soon after and then, after a summer's interval, the whole thing would start over again in the fall.

The pressures built up by pre-season ratings and the sports writers' emphasis on "bowl bids" are the more regrettable, President Hatcher believes, because the game of football itself has so many admirable qualities and because football has become such an important part of the collegiate season during the fall.

To save these admirable qualities, he hopes that the "accelerated madness" will disappear before either the collegiate athletic officials or the college presidents have to resort to some corrective action.

Crashes To Kill 2,000 in State

More than 2,000 persons will lose their lives in Michigan traffic in 1955.

This forecast was borne out when the State Police monthly traffic accident report revealed that 204 persons were killed during October, raising the death toll to 1,614 for the first 10 months of 1955.

The October toll exceeded 200 for the second month this year and was up 37, or 22 per cent, over October 1954.

Should the total for 1955 pass the 2,000 mark, it will be the third time in recorded Michigan traffic history. The high was in 1937 with 2,175, and the second

high in 1941 with 2,133. October's injury toll was 5,657, or an increase of 7 per cent over the same month last year. Reported accidents numbered 17,812, a 9 per cent increase.

Injuries for the first 10 months of this year total 49,060 and reported accidents 154,571. These figures represent increases of 9 and 5 per cent, respectively, over the same period of 1954.

Deaths in rural areas were up 15 per cent while urban deaths were down 7 per cent.

Mileage traveled the first nine months of this year, the latest figure available, was 22.1 billion, an increase of nearly 9 per cent over 20.3 billion in the same

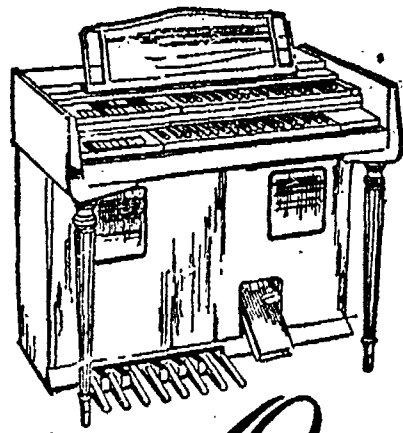
Park firemen arrived and administered oxygen, but the man did not respond. He was pronounced dead at 5:55 p.m., by a doctor who was called to the place.

Christmas Gift Repeats Itself

Flower buds are appearing and there is every hope of plenty of bloom for another Christmas season.

Medical Research Delayed At U-M by Lack of Funds

At least 60 research projects at The University of Michigan Medical School have been stymied for lack of funds. These projects include investigation of leukemia, heart disease, alcoholism, high blood pressure, cancer, and many others, Dean A. C. Furstenberg reports.

However, the U-M medical Dean noted that these projects have not been developed beyond the drawing board stage, largely because medical research depends upon the unpredictable donations of wealthy sponsors.

"Medical research is too essential to be dependent solely on support from public spirited citizens or private foundations," declared Dean Furstenberg. He estimated that at least \$600,000 was needed annually to sustain a complete research program at the U-M Medical Center, and he declared that this sum was above and beyond present contributions to the program.

Commenting on the report, Dean Furstenberg said he believed that the public, although keenly interested in medical and health problems, does not fully appreciate what is involved financially in medical investigations. He said, for example, that a single, typical medical

project costs approximately \$7,000 to \$10,000 a year. "Actually," said Dean Furstenberg, "we medical people have been more at fault in not using opportunities to explain what medical research really involves."

The resources and personnel for at least sixty medical projects are currently available at the Medical Center, but they have not been able to proceed for lack of funds for other essentials required for these projects. For example, the Dean declared that for approximately \$3000, oxygen studies could be made in the Pediatrics Department on children who suffer from congenital heart disease.

"Research is more than a matter of physical determination and moral conviction," said Dean Furstenberg. "It involves technical assistants, apparatus, equipment, experimental animals, and overhead."

Some of the projects which have been planned at the U-M Medical Center but which have been deferred due to lack of funds are:

1) A thorough investigation of the action of ACTH and cortisone, miracle compounds which appear to work but no one yet actually knows why;

2) A project of special interest to Michigan residents who live in the "golfer district," who often suffer eye disturbances, sometimes blindness.

3) The apparent increase in "cancer of the blood," which could be more thoroughly investigated at the U-M Simpson Memorial Institute.

4) Infant diarrhea, which continues to baffle pediatricians;

5) And, the connection of hormone deficiency with virus infections.

Dean Furstenberg concluded, "It should not be necessary to have to go out and sell good health to the public. Yet it is sad to note that so much effort goes into fund raising for medical research that the investigator has little time and energy left for the more important work."

Our State of Michigan, currently being mantled with King Winter's fluffy white stuff, is truly an amazing piece of geography when one stops to consider the following facts.
 Michigan has more than 11,000 inland lakes which cover 1,194 square miles of territory. The Great Lakes which surround the only inland peninsula in the nation have an area of 39,960 square miles. The State is divided into two peninsulas by the Straits of Mackinac and is separated, in the upper peninsula, from Canada by the Soo Locks at Sault St. Marie, which are the busiest in the world.

If it is no wonder our forefathers chose the State motto "If thou seekest a beautiful Peninsula, Behold it here."

Known as the Wolverine state with a population of 6,372,000, it ranks seventh in the 48 states and covers an area of 58,125 square miles.

In many ways Michigan leads the nation, namely in the manufacture of automobiles, automobile parts and engines. It also has the greatest inland fisheries in the world. The annual catch taken from the Great Lakes averages 20,000,000 pounds yearly, not counting the catches from inland lakes taken by amateur anglers. It is first in chemical

products, bromine, calcium chloride, sand, lime, brick, drugs, pharmaceuticals, adding machines, office equipment and refrigerators.

Michigan ranks second in producing iron ore and fourth in copper and is a leading producer of salt, limestone, coal, clay, lime, manganese ore, natural gas, gypsum, petroleum and mineral water.

In farming, Michigan ranks first in beans and cherries; second in plums and mint; third in grapes and sugar beets; fourth in peaches, potatoes and maple syrup; and fifth in apples.

Isle Royale, in Lake Superior, is the second largest island in the United States and is one of the few wilderness areas.

The state flower is apple blossom.

The City of Grosse Pointe Farms building report for the period of January 1 through November 30, 1955, released by acting city engineer Sidney DeBoer, reveals a drop in permit valuation of some \$2,000,000 over the same period in 1954, when 206 permits were issued. Total permit valuation for the 1955 period included 187 permits carrying a value of \$2,239,950. One permit was for business property on Kercheval avenue valued at \$35,000; 54 permits for residences for \$1,788,000; 110 miscellaneous permits at \$334,950; and 2 in-the-non-assessable classification were valued at \$92,000. The two permits were issued to St. Paul Church for an addition; and to Grosse Pointe Memorial Church for repairs.

During the month of November, 13 permits were issued carrying a valuation of \$255,000; six of these were in the residence classification, six in miscellaneous, and one for business purpose, mentioned in the overall report.

The six residence permits were for homes built at the following addresses: 20 Lakecrest, valued at \$33,000; 39 McKinley, \$28,000; 71 Stephens road, \$50,000; 91

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Rotarians Hear Lieut. Governor

Members of the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club heard Michigan's Lt. Gov. Philip A. Hart speak at a luncheon-meeting held in the War Memorial Center on Monday, December 5.

Lt. Gov. Hart disclosed that as the second highest elected official of the State, he is the presiding officer of the State Senate.

He pointed out that the lieutenant governor has two duties which are established by the State Constitution: 1. He is the president of the senate, which sits about five months out of the year; and 2. He theoretically heads the State Board of Directors. The lieutenant governor has no voice or vote in the Senate, he said.

He touched on the fact that much of a lieutenant governor's time is taken up with "two-bit" affairs, but the most important fact is that the lieutenant governor assumes the duties of the governor, when the State's chief executive is out of the State or crosses the State line.

He said that his office can be a full time job. Compensation for the job is not great, nor does the lieutenant governor have an expense or traveling account. He said the entire appropriation for his office is \$4,900.

He said that the business of running "a free society" must be everyone's business, and that this must be produced by informal discussion and debate. He said that there are two products of society, one stamped S.A. and the other, U.S.S.R.

He cautioned grownups not to influence the youths that politics is "too dirty, too second rate for them," because the boys and girls of today are needed to run the government of tomorrow.

He added that there should be a degree of independent judgement and realization of the role politics play in government.

Going-Over-the-Hill Rate Is Rapidly Going Downhill

WASHINGTON — Fewer Servicemen are going over the hill.

The big drop in AWOLs and desertions is attributed by the armed services to educational programs, help on the GI's personal and family problems, and stiffer penalties authorized by President Eisenhower.

The Army reported it has cut its monthly AWOL rate from 15.2 in 1,000 enlisted men in 1952 to 5.2 in 1,000 this year.

In 1952, the Navy had 29,490 "absence" offenses of more than three days, including desertions. Last year the number was cut to 18,542, and in the first eight months of this year only 6,841 sailors have gone over the hill for three days or more.

The Air Force, which had a monthly AWOL rate of 7.6 in 1,000 men in 1950 and 5.13 in 1,000 in 1952, has cut the number to 1.88 in 1,000 this year.

The rate of Air Force desertions has dropped from 346 in 1,000 last year to 225 in 1,000 this year.

The Marine Corps said it had 5,849 "administrative desertions" in 1952 and cut that to 4,882 last year. For the first seven months this year, the number was 1,895.

AWOLs and desertions reach their peak during the Korean War. The Army in 1953 adopted

a policy of sending AWOLs to combat duty in Korea. After the Korean War, the rate continued high, and President Eisenhower on Sept. 28, 1954, authorized stiffer maximum penalties.

The Navy reported that despite its cut in AWOLs and desertions, unauthorized absence "continues to be a major disciplinary problem."

The Air Force found in a 1954 study that "the typical AWOL or deserter is a young man recently come into the Air Force who has a lower mental ability and a less than average education. He is not particularly happy in his work, and after reaching a certain point he simply takes off."

Trombly Makes Corps Grid Team

Jack Trombly, son of City Police Chief Tom Trombly, and former football and basketball star at St. Paul High School, was selected as quarterback of the second team of the V Corps Service team in Germany.

Jack played with the 14th Armored Cavalry team which was stationed at Fulda, Germany, and competed against 19 other service teams stationed within a 200-mile radius.

Each team carried four quarterbacks, making Trombly's selection all the more honor as his play was compared with 80 other players in the same position.

Currently, Jack is refereeing service basketball games overseas.

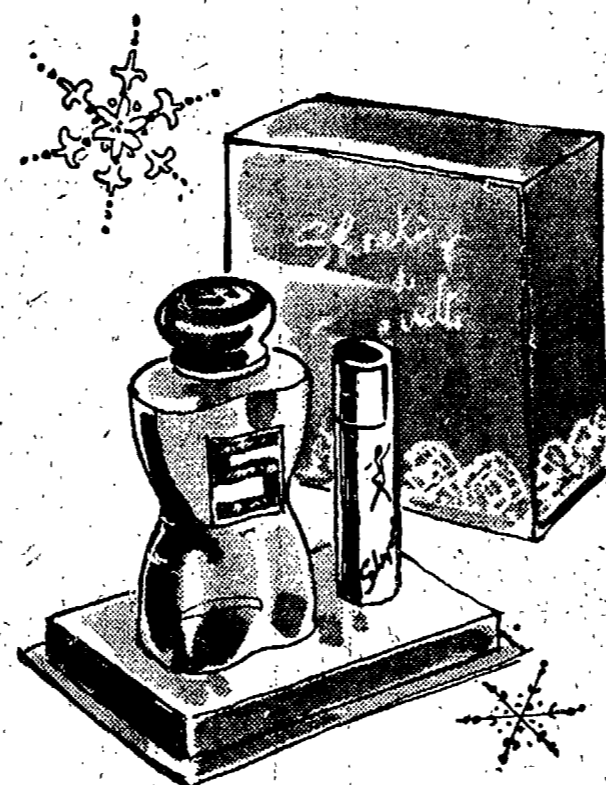

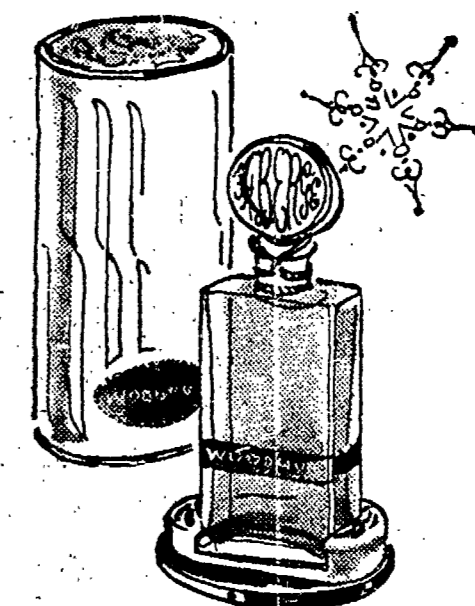

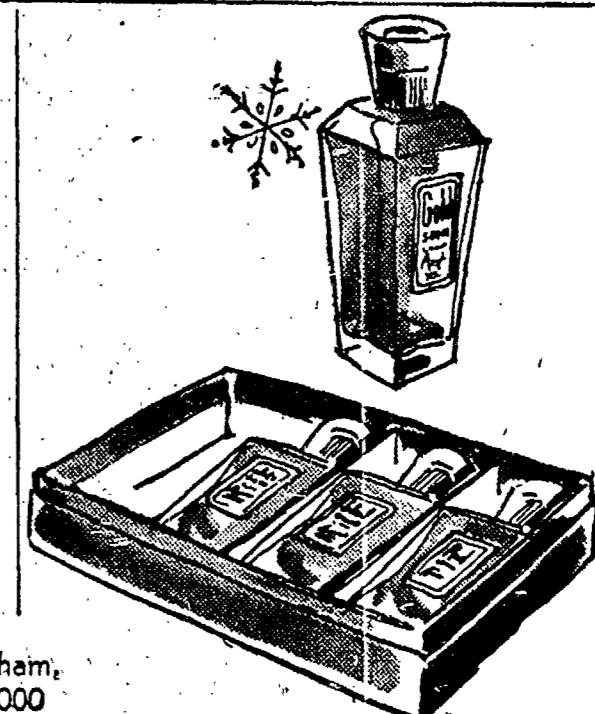

Budget-minded shoppers will again welcome plentiful pork! Loin roast is a real penny-saver. The rib end is selling at about 10 cents less per pound than the loin end. Many stores are selling the whole 12 to 14 pound loin at about 40 cents per pound. This is a good time for savory spareribs at economy prices. Other pork items in the economy bracket include picnic shoulders, bacon, and sausage.

Egg Nog Pie
1 tablespoon gelatin
¼ cup water
4 eggs, separated
6 tablespoons water
¼ cup sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon rum extract
1 tablespoon brandy extract
½ teaspoon nutmeg
4 tablespoons powdered sugar
1 baked 9-inch pie shell
½ cup whipping cream
nutmeg

1—Soak gelatin in ¼ cup water.
2—Beat egg yolks and 6 tablespoons of water slightly. Add sugar and salt to egg yolks.
3—Stir and cook in the top of a double boiler, over boiling water, until the custard coats the back of the spoon (about 7 minutes).

4—Add the softened gelatin. Stir to combine gelatin and egg mixture thoroughly. Add extracts and nutmeg. Set mixture aside to cool.
5—When egg mixture is almost thick, beat egg whites until slightly stiff. Fold powdered sugar into egg whites and continue beating until egg whites are stiff.
6—Fold beaten egg whites into egg yolk mixture. Fill baked pie shell with filling.
7—Chill in the refrigerator.
8—Beat whipping cream and spread a thin layer over pie just before serving. Sprinkle with nutmeg.

With about 10 per cent more cattle on feed than last year at this time, shoppers will find a large amount of choice grade beef with special prices on round, sirloin, and porterhouse steak.

More fresh vegetables are arriving from sunnier parts of the country. Green beans and corn-on-the-cob, more abundant now, are reasonably priced. Salad vegetables that add much in appetite appeal are becoming more plentiful at more favorable prices for consumers. Shallots, radishes, tomatoes, and cucumbers add color, flavor and texture to any meal at little cost.

Fruit counters are colorful with the big supply of citrus fruits. The quality and flavor of grapefruit is improving as it becomes more mature. The peak in tangerine flavor is expected within the next week. Both the Florida Hamlin and Pineapple are popular varieties of oranges at this time. These heavy juice oranges are a good fruit value for about 50 cents per dozen. Michigan apples are most reasonably priced with Jonathans, McIntosh, and Northern Spies for all-purpose use. The Red Delicious is a good choice for salads, desserts, or snacks.

Due to shorter supplies of some sizes, egg prices are slightly higher. Large sizes are most plentiful. On the basis of weight, medium sizes are still a slightly better value at 42 to 43½ cents per pound compared to large sizes at 42 to 48 cents per pound.

Many cheese items are especially priced for the coming holidays. The United States has developed its cheese industry, so that many varieties are now superior and less expensive than the imported varieties. The National Cheese Institute reports that each person in 1954 used 7.6

Antiques Expert to Give Lecture at Ford Museum

Minor Wine Thomas, Jr., director of Craft Shops at Colonial Williamsburg, will be the third speaker in the current Michigan Antiques Lecture Series to be held at the Henry Ford Museum December 7 at 8:30 p.m.

"The Colonial Kitchen" will be the topic of Thomas's lecture. In his talk, Thomas will discuss southern colonial eating habits in general and how they differ from those of the present day. He will illustrate the lecture with an extensive slide collection, showing antique utensils used in preparing colonial food.

Slides dealing with operations during a normal Williamsburg baking day will show how the Bake Shop produces bread, gingerbread and fruit cakes.

A college graduate with a degree in chemistry, Thomas joined the Williamsburg staff in 1938 when he developed methods for cleaning and preserving material excavated from 18th century foundations during archaeological work. Thomas left Williamsburg during World War II to take a position in a chemical plant. He returned following the war and was made supervisor of the archaeological laboratory and museum.

As director of Craft Shops, Thomas heads the trades that were followed in colonial times, including blacksmithing, spinning, weaving, bootmaking, wig-making and printing. He is also known as Williamsburg's unofficial curator of colonial military equipment, and is skilled at loading and firing 18th century muskets and cannons.

Thomas is well-known as a lecturer on archaeology and other subjects and has spoken at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York; the Farmer's Museum in Cooperstown; and the Williamsburg Antiques Forum. He is also a director of the Early American Industries Association and a co-editor of its quarterly magazine.

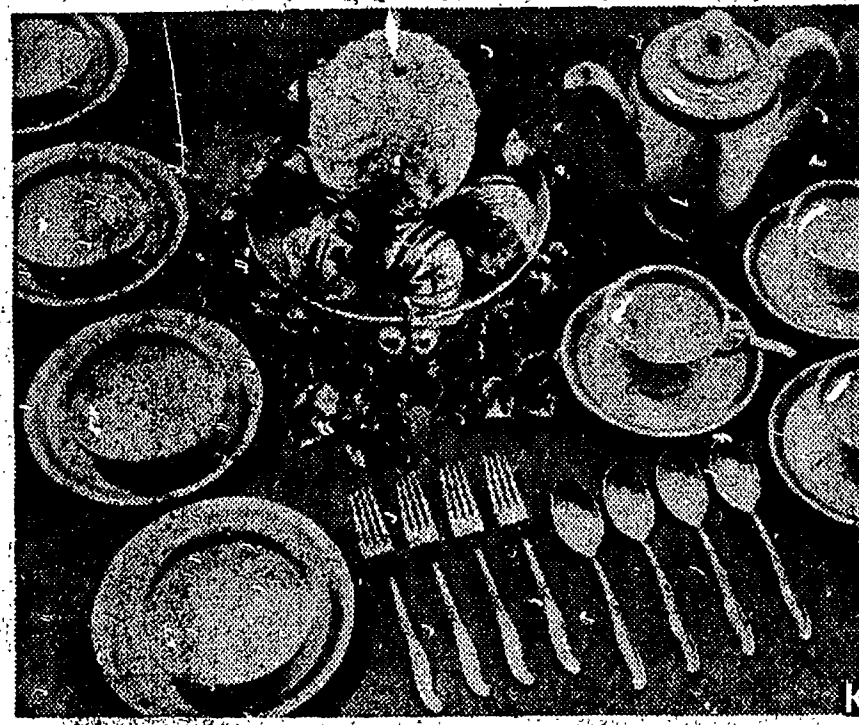

Dads Top Their Sons In Quiz on Grammar

Are college freshmen better or poorer in English than their parents who were in school 25 years ago?

To find out, the English department of Oregon State College gave, this fall, a 1927 English placement examination to its 1,800 freshmen.

Test scores tipped in favor of the "old timers" in matters of spelling and formal grammar.

But in English usage and punctuation the students of 1955 and 1927 are about equal.

Students taking the 163-question test in 1927 made an average of 53 errors. This fall the average was 65 mistakes.

The biggest difference was in the 50-word spelling section. The students of 1927 did considerably better than this year's freshmen.

Series of Lectures and Workshops in Memorial Center Based on Theme of "Women in a Changing World"

Even in the swirl of their gay and sometimes frenzied holiday shopping, Grosse Pointe women are taking time out to buy tickets for the January-February "Women in a Changing World" series of lectures and workshops.

Last week the War Memorial Association mailed 3,500 pamphlets to its contributing members, telling about the programs which will be held at the Memorial Center on Fridays from Jan. 20 through Feb. 24.

Mrs. Morgan Sherman, in charge of the series for the American Association of University Women, co-sponsors with the War Memorial Association, said:

"Women in this complex world have to meet the challenge of finding for themselves some way to evaluate their lives. They need to make their lives more purposeful.

"When the mid-winter doldrums set in is the best time to accomplish this, and our series aims to do it."

Weed Battlers Plan Aid For Backyard Gardeners

WASHINGTON—Man appears to be getting the upper hand in his battle against weeds.

Dr. Warren C. Shaw, Agriculture Department agronomist, said there has been a "chemical revolution" in weed control. It began 10 years ago and has made "almost fantastic" gains since.

The revolution promises benefits not only to farmers, livestock raisers, forest managers and backyard gardeners but for millions of hay fever sufferers as well—to say nothing of the thousands who annually run afoul of poison ivy.

Dr. Shaw's comments followed announcements that the Weed Society of America will hold its first annual meeting in New York January 4-5.

Its 1,000 members include makers and users of weed killers, health officials and a variety of state and Federal research workers.

Dr. Shaw estimated that weeds on agricultural lands cost the country about \$3,800,000,000 a year. Weeds on non-agricultural lands—railroad and highway rights-of-way, parks and factory grounds—bring the total loss to \$5,000,000,000.

This is about two and one-half times the annual cost of running the atomic energy project.

But these figures will be lowered as the result of a chemical attack on weeds launched late in World War II with development of herbicides like 2,4-D. Last year farmers at a cost of

\$48,000,000 sprayed 33,500,000 acres with weed killer—one out of every 10 acres of agricultural land in the country.

According to Jack Dressen, of the Weed Society, it is now "cheaper to spray a field than it would be to hire a man just to walk across it."

A social will be held before the dance so that Date Bureau registrants can meet. Applications will be accepted through Friday, December 9.

Rex Smith and his orchestra will furnish dance music. Mistletoe corsages will be presented to the men. Tickets priced at \$2.50 per couple may be purchased in the Student Center lobby or from AWS members, according to Dionne Klassen, general chairman of the dance.

Post Office Starts Drive To Obtain Career Employees

Postmaster Edward L. Baker was informed by Postmaster General Arthur L. Summerfield that the first nationwide effort to attract desirable new career employees into the postal service was launched on December 5.

Red, white and blue posters outlining higher salaries now offered and other benefits of postal employment, will be displayed for 30 days in the lobbies of approximately 10,000 of the largest post offices and in 3,000 communities on 16,000 Air Force recruiting bill-boards.

Under the heading "Plan a Career in Uncle Sam's Post Office—Good Pay—Advancement—Many Benefits," the posters list these facts about postal employment:

1. Starting Pay of \$70 per Week—\$1.82 per Hour.
2. Automatic Annual Raises to \$85 per Week—\$2.19 per Hour.
3. Longevity Increases to \$90 per Week—\$2.34 per Hour.
4. 2 1/2 to 5 Weeks' Paid Vacation Each Year.
5. Liberal Paid Sick Leave.
6. 8 Paid Holidays Each Year.
7. Generous Retirement Plan.

The posters also emphasize that low cost life insurance, allowances for uniforms, and 10 percent higher pay for night work are available.

Mr. Summerfield pointed out that the postal service is now more attractive than ever for the young person seeking a career. The second step of the salary increases enacted into law earlier this year became effective De-

ember 3, 1955, for approximately half a million field service positions in the Post Office Department, "providing the highest wage rates in history for postal employees."

He added that, although present vacancies do not exist in all post offices, he hopes that the advantages of a postal career will attract alert young Americans to file for Civil Service examinations for postal positions as they are announced. Information about examinations may be obtained from local post offices.

At the same time, Mr. Summerfield informed Mr. Baker, the present drive for new personnel is part of a long-range program aimed at improving the career service of the Post Office Department and the mail service to the American people.

This is not intended to be a short-term, temporary recruiting effort, he explained. Neither does it conflict with reductions in staff that might be necessary from time to time among temporary and part-time employees to meet specialized local conditions that might arise.

The Post Office spent \$362,700,000 more than it took in during the 1955 fiscal year, which ended last June 30. Its income amounted to \$2,349,500,000, but its outgo totaled \$2,712,200,000. The deficit for this fiscal year is expected to reach \$500,000,000 but postal officials say it would have been at least \$164,000,000 less were it not for the postal pay rise Congress voted this year.

G.P.U.S. News Notes

On Monday evening of this week at Grosse Pointe University School parents were invited to listen to an exposition of "Trends and Problems in College Admissions Today" as set forth by Mrs. Annie L. Broughton, Director of Admissions, Bryn Mawr College, and Emery R. Walker, Jr., Dean of Admissions, Brown University.

The meeting was devoted to exploring the whole situation confronting private liberal arts colleges, where, as Mr. Chandler, G.P.U.S. headmaster, has pointed out, "the number of applicants has in many cases more than tripled in the last ten years and yet there has been no significant increase in the number admitted each year. The new problem for colleges is how to select a freshman class from qualified applicants sufficient in number to fill two or more classes."

The following interesting quotation is from a longer article in "The Parents Bulletin" written by Jane Savery and Marcia Sweeney, directors of the Girls' Athletic Program: "With the changing aims and objectives of education in general, there has been a corresponding change in the Physical Education Program. The old theory of using Physical Education as a means of developing outstanding athletes and catering to the 'gifted few' is antiquated as the horse and buggy. Today we realize that girls' Physical Education is a means of educating through physical activity with a greater emphasis on developing the child as an indi-

vidual and as a member of a group. Her social, mental, and moral development are all concerns of our present Physical Education program. Unlike boys, very few girls are emotionally capable of handling an intense competitive program.

"Is it really worth the intense physical reactions that so often accompany the emotional tension of an important game? We feel it is not. There has been no lessening of school spirit; in fact, it has increased, and by emphasizing Red and Blue (intra-mur-

al) competition, we have the needed motivation.

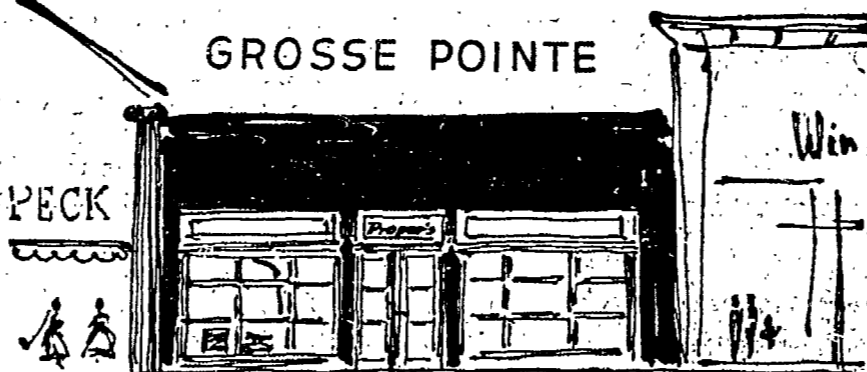

Do-It-Yourself Fans Face Workshop Danger

Do-it-yourself fans, who can turn out toys, furniture and other gifts in their home workshops with relatively little strain on the family budget, are at a decided advantage around Christmas time. Safety-wise, however, they may be at an equally decided disadvantage, because those workshops can be danger spots for fire.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters urges every home handyman to protect his home and family by taking these safety precautions:

1. Clean up all sawdust after each day's work. Sawdust is extremely combustible.
2. Be sure power tools do not overload electrical circuits. Most household circuits should be protected with 15 ampere fuses; substituting larger ones may allow wires to heat to the point where insulation will ignite. If fuses blow, call an electrician. You may need a heavier circuit installed for your power equipment.
3. Throw out all oily rags; they can ignite spontaneously. If you must save a few, store them in a covered metal container.

Insurance Covers All Girl Scouts

Mrs. Harold J. Fleming, district public relations chairman of the Grosse Pointe district of the Girl Scouts, announces that effective October 1, all Girl Scouts, Scout leaders, and committee members were automatically covered by a blanket policy for group accident insurance.

At the request of Girl Scout parents and leaders, the Metropolitan Detroit Council experimented with a group accident insurance plan for three years. At the June meeting of the Board of Directors, 13 of the Girl Scout 14 districts requested complete group accident insurance coverage for all girls and adults.

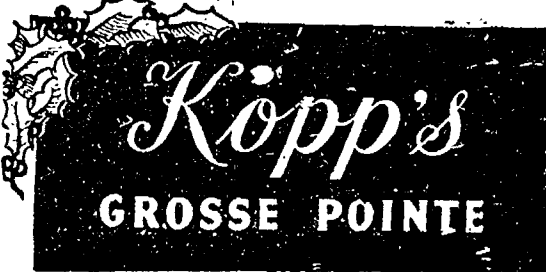

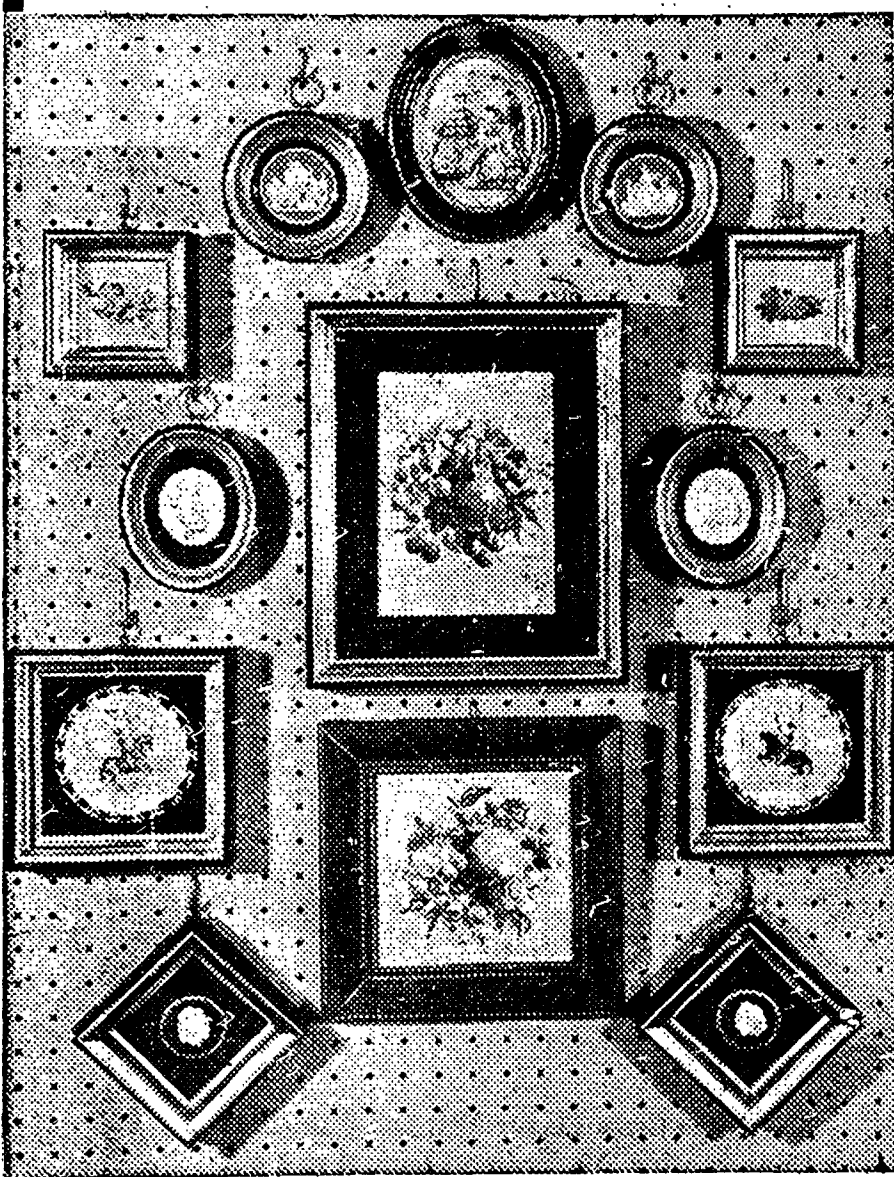

McNamara Is Optimistic On Federal Aid to Schools

WASHINGTON — Congressional leaders are divided as to whether the White House Conference on Education will have any effect on legislation when Congress meets in January.

Senator Pat McNamara, Democrat of Michigan, a member of the Senate Sub-Committee on Education, said:

"The chances for Federal aid to school construction have been greatly enhanced by this conference and the discussion, which have brought into sharp focus the need for more school housing. If we provide Federal aid to school construction it will relieve the local governments of this burden and enable them to meet other needs."

Senator H. Alexander Smith, Republican of New Jersey, ranking Republican on the Labor and Public Welfare Committee said:

"I am most hopeful that, with these conference reports and the various state reports as guides, we can work out with the Administration and with the members of both parties legislation which will assist the states in the job of building schools. I expect to work closely with the Administration in the preparation of such a bill. At the concluding meeting of the White House Conference, Secretary Folsom gave his support to 'A broadened and improved program of Federal school aid.' I shall give my whole-hearted support to such a program."

Senator James E. Murray, Democrat of Montana, chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Education, said:

"As I predicted, the White House education conference was a waste of time. This has been underscored by the gag rule preventing free debate and a democratic vote on the recommendations of those participating."

We have known for several years what school needs are and have known that their needs have grown more acute year by year. There is no excuse for further delay in passing a comprehensive Federal aid to education bill which should not only provide for construction of schools, but should include provisions to guarantee adequate pay to our teachers."

The concert, a program of contemporary music, is being presented for some 400 members of the American School Band Directors who are holding their national convention in Detroit, December 15, 16 and 17.

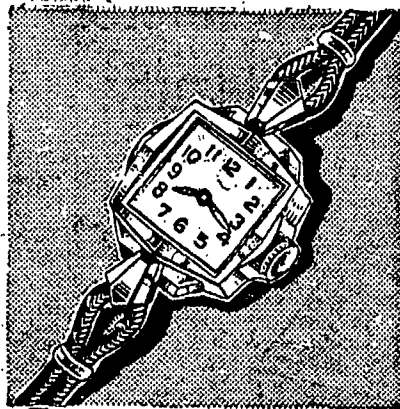
"Sea Portrait" will be conducted by the composer, Homer LaGassey, assistant director of music, Detroit Public Schools, and Wayne University graduate.

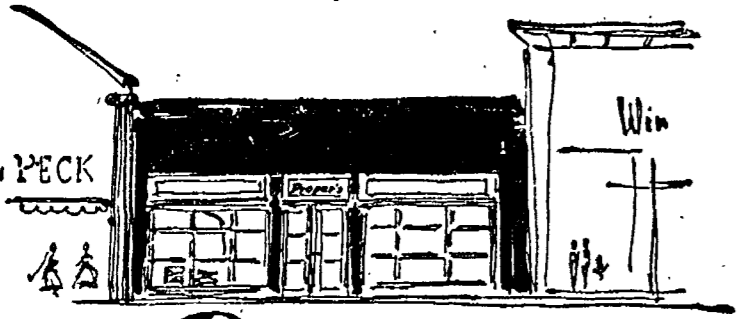

Choice of Toys Is Important

Joy and happiness for children should be your first consideration when you buy toys for Christmas giving, but safety and suitability for age are important too, Dr. Joseph G. McIner, commissioner of health, advises. Wise selection of toys as gifts by aunts and other relatives will help to give the child's parents an enjoyable Christmas, in addition to delighting the child. Select toys which are durable to give to young children. They should be easily cleaned and not have removable parts small enough to be swallowed.

Every toy should stimulate its owner to some activity, either physical or mental. Some which meet this requirement include dolls, blocks with rounded corners, and wagons which may be pulled by a string or rounded handle. These toys are universal favorites with children because they can be used by youngsters of different ages and under most circumstances.

Play is necessary for wholesome, normal personality growth and physical development, and toys are the tools of play. Consider the age and living conditions of the child before you buy the toy. A sled or skates given to a boy who has no safe place to use them tempts him to take unnecessary risks or to use them in unsafe places, or causes him to feel frustrated because he can't use them.

The tiny baby's first toy should be a bright object to hang where he can follow it with his eyes, but not grab it. By three or four months, the baby can grasp and hold the rattle. From one to two years, the baby is learning fast and he needs toys to push and pull, to pile up and knock down, to load and unload.

A young child will be happier if his holiday celebration is spread over several days. He is merely confused and bewildered when too many toys are given to him at once, and his pleasure is diminished by his confusion. Avoid giving him toys which have sharp points or which splinter or break. Avoid stuffed animals which have glass or button eyes which may be swallowed. When he is under two and in the "hand to mouth" age, don't give him toys with paint which may be chewed.

Babies and young children are sensitive to the feelings of those closest to them. If there is a baby or little child in your family, provide for him the feeling of security and warmth of a happy family holiday and see that it is not too different from his experience on other days. Don't overwhelm him with too many visitors, too many toys, too much excitement if you expect him to have a happy Christmas. Make sure that he gets enough rest by preventing overexcitement.

WASHINGTON—The 1955 Christmas Pageant of Peace will be inaugurated on Sunday, December 18, at 5 p.m., when President Eisenhower presses a switch illuminating the giant National Community Christmas tree.

Simultaneously, Christmas trees across the nation before churches and courthouses, on naval vessels, in the barracks of our troops overseas, and in our embassies and legations around the world will be lit.

The pageant will again be located in the President's Park, more familiarly known as the Ellipse, just south of the White House.

The ceremonies will be attended by members of the Supreme Court, Congress, representatives of the diplomatic corps and leaders of the religious, educational and civic life of the nation's capital.

Formally opened last year by the President, the pageant is a voluntary expression of American citizens of every race, creed and color to dramatize the eternal Christmas message of "Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men."

A life-sized reproduction of the Nativity Scene will be one of the highlights which attracted 500,000 spectators last year.

Santa Claus and his eight live reindeer will again be on hand housed in a peppermint inclosure in the children's corner, a feature of which will be an exhibition of children's arts and crafts gathered from around the world.

The huge community Christmas tree, which last year was donated by Michigan State University, this year comes from South Dakota. It is a Black Hills spruce rising 65 feet. It will be arrayed with an ornamentation of 8,000 lights.





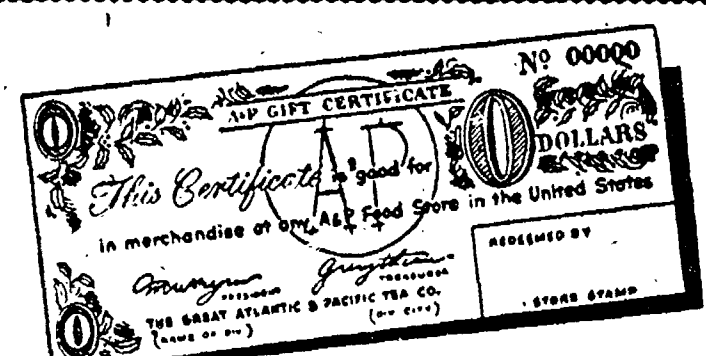

The youths, both 17-year-old boys, were arrested by Detroit police while committing a burglary in Detroit within a few hours after their crimes in the Farms.

Vote to Decide School Crisis

Grosse Pointe School District voters will ballot on Tuesday, January 24, on spending approximately \$3,500,000 for a new junior high school and expanded school facilities.

The proposed junior high would be built on a 15-acre site on Chalfonte road in the southwest sector of Grosse Pointe Farms. The tract was bought by the Board of Education in 1929 for slightly less than \$26,000.

In addition to the junior high, the Board of Education proposes:

- 1—Swimming pools for the existing junior high schools.
- 2—Renovation of the high school heating system, including replacement of boilers.

If voters approve the spending, construction on the junior high would start as soon as weather permits. The new school could be ready for use in October of 1957.

In 1953, the Board had predicted that the growth of Pointes population would require a new junior high in 1957.

At present, junior high schools in the District are operating at capacity and there are still some 360 students who have been assigned to the high school.

By the fall of 1957, Board of Education officials predict, the high school will be at full capacity with senior high students alone.

In 1954, the American Red Cross issued 903,100 certificates to persons completing Red Cross swimming instruction training.

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Scared Burglars Flee Residence

Burglars who broke into a Park home Monday evening, December 5, were frightened away by a woman occupant of the house, who awoke when she heard a noise, and called out.

Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers revealed that Gladys Forward of 745 Grand Marais, was asleep in an upper floor bedroom with her door locked, when she was awakened by a noise made by the intruder.

She called, and heard running footsteps as the apparently frightened burglars ran out the door. She looked out the window and saw two youths running across the front lawn.

Investigating police found that entrance was gained by forcing the rear screen door and breaking the glass of the back door.

The burglars first entered the library of the house and then began to prow through the rooms upstairs, trying the locked door of the woman's bedroom. Burned matches littered their paths as they coursed through the house.

A fur piece in a closet of one bedroom was disturbed but was not taken.

Chief Louwers stated that nothing was reported missing.

A total of 180 voices will be heard on this program. The choirs are under the direction of Miss Ruth Burkholder.

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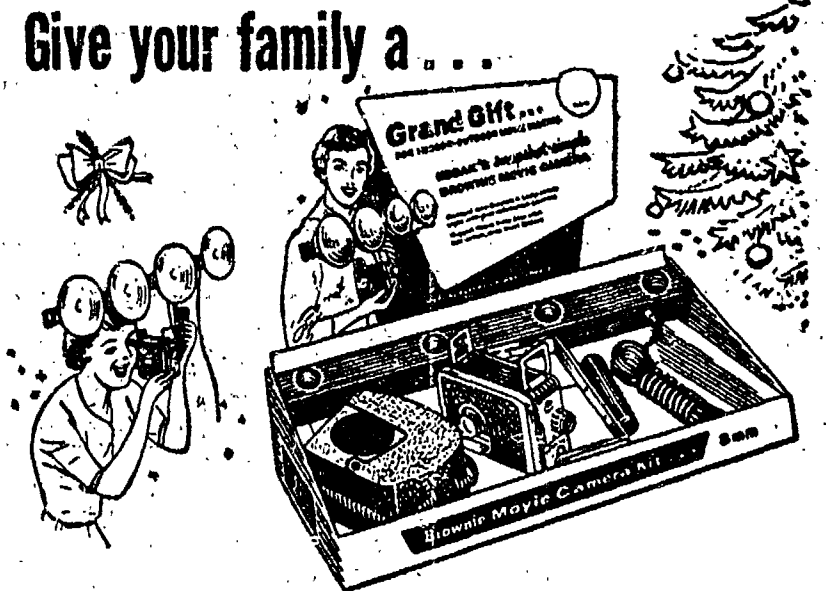
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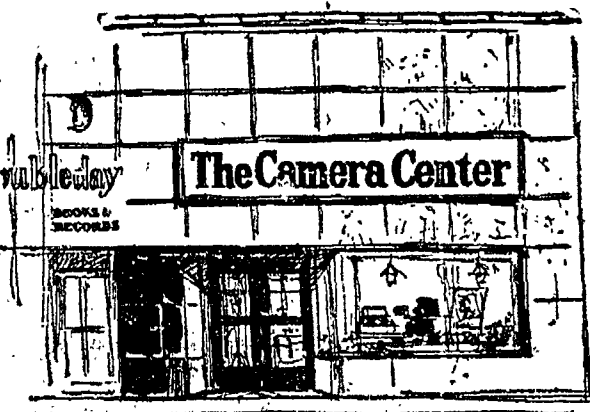

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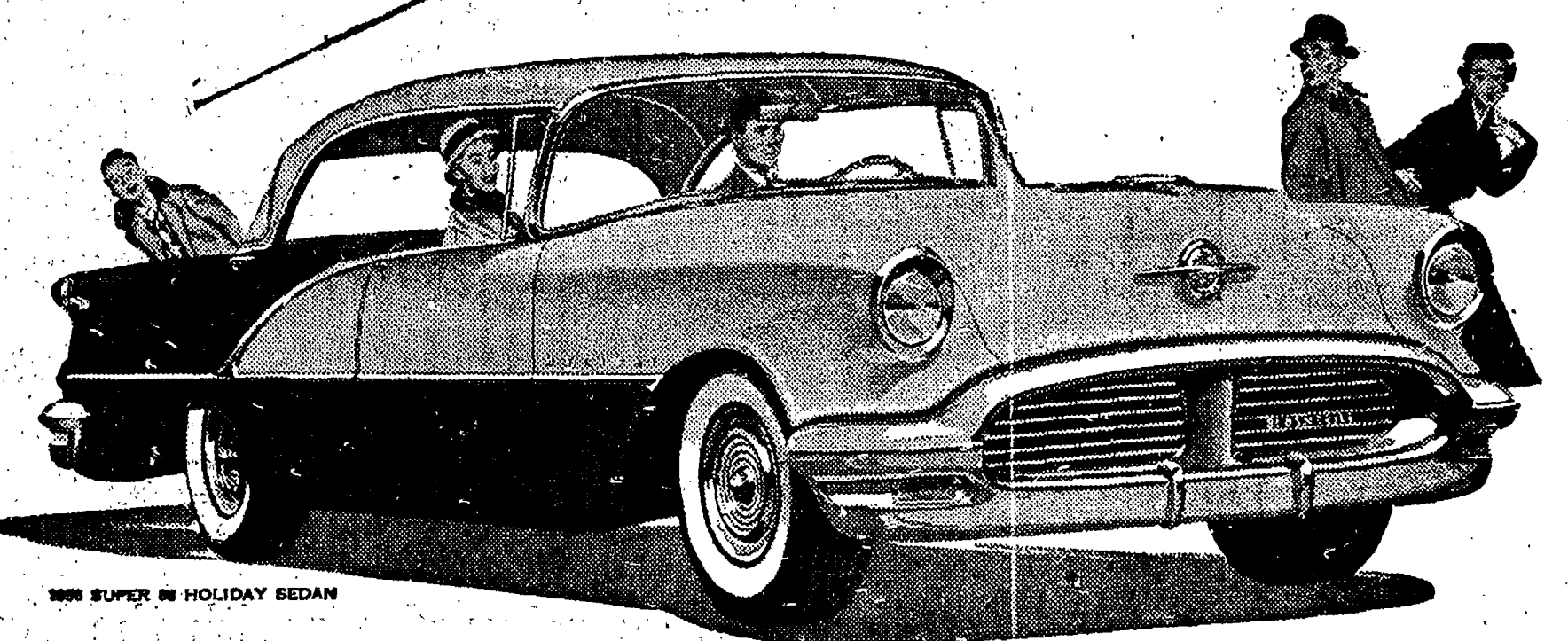
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Elementary School News

To Poupard School for additional trips, assemblies, library books, film strips, phonograph records and additional games—\$960.00.

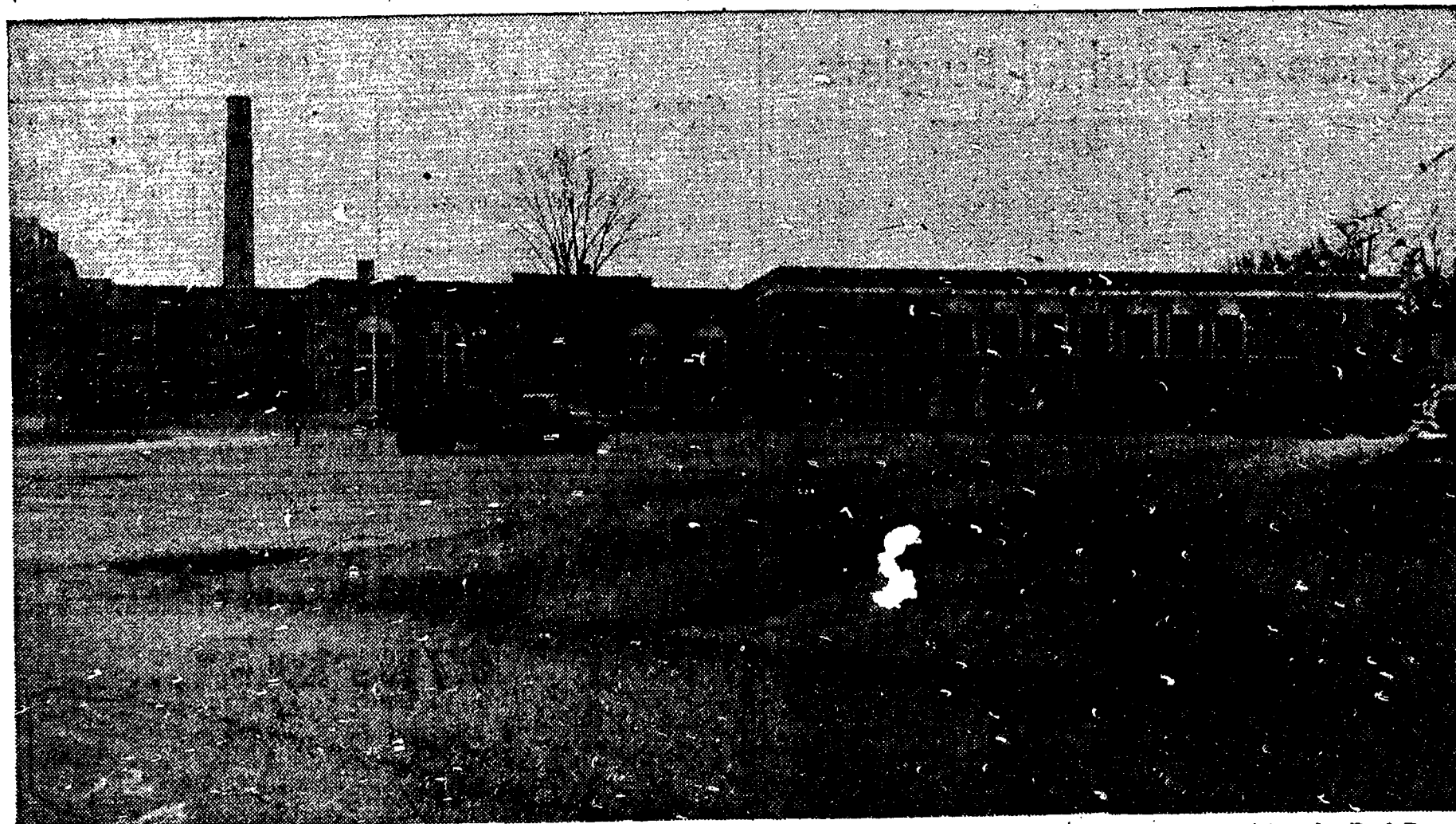
The Harper Woods Police Department received \$35.00 for its safety program.

Form Gun Club At Farms Pier

Already the club has received a challenge from Bayview Yacht Club, which has been shooting trap for several years after navigation closes.

The Farms police department has expressed interest in the new club and from the police it is hoped competent range officers will be available to assure safety regulations are conformed with by the shooters.

During the initial test of the selected site the shooters fired from the first level deck, and then from the sun deck at the end of the pier. The sun deck appeared to be the best, inasmuch as it kept the spectators separated from the shooters and eliminated practically all of the danger. It was also good because it kept the skaters in the harbor at a safe distance from the nimrods.

Officers will be elected at the organizational meeting after which those present will have the opportunity to shoot. Already plans are underway for the club to obtain shells which the shooters may purchase for use at the site of the shooting.

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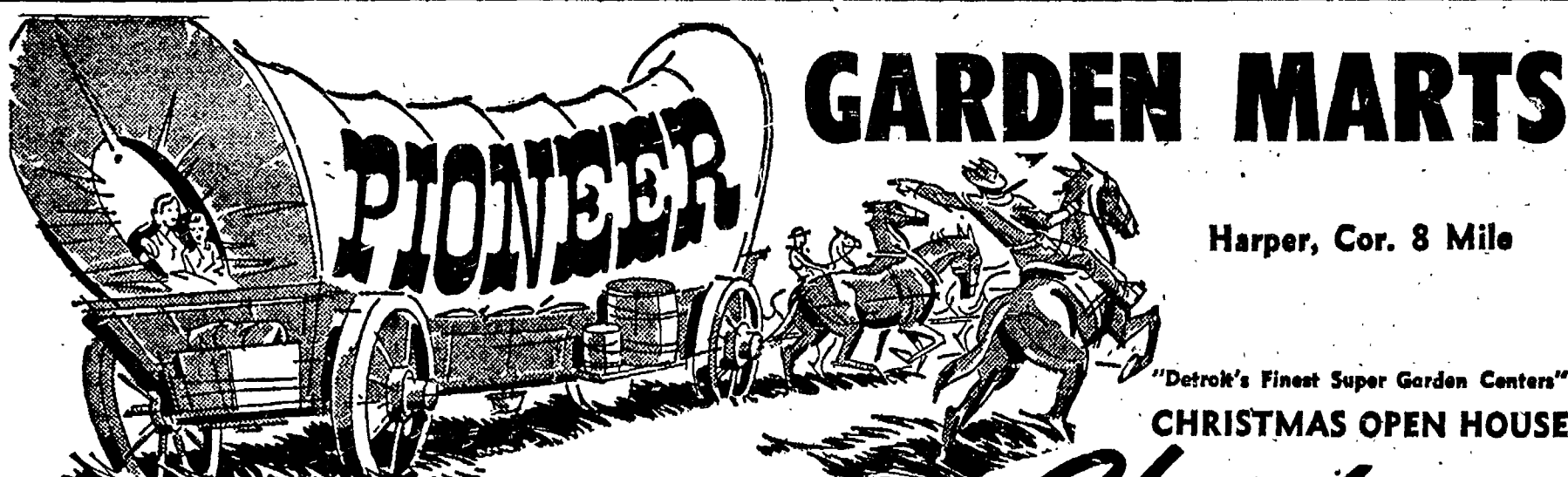
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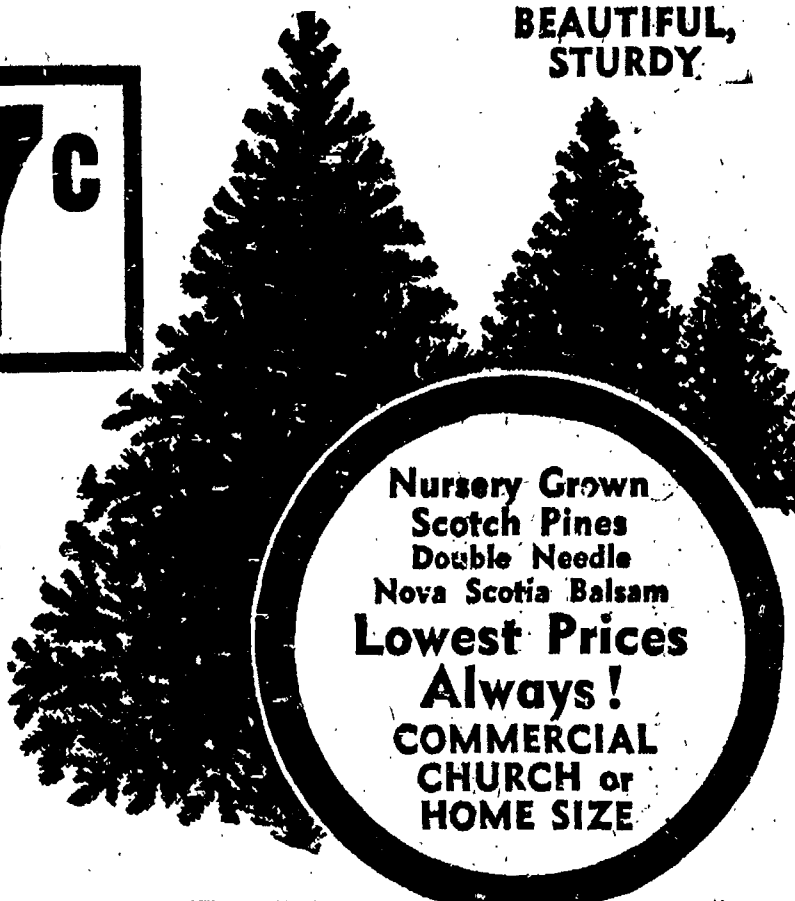
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City of Grosse Pointe Woods SPECIAL BOND ELECTION

December 12, 1955

On this date property owners will have an opportunity to vote on a 30-year Bond Issue of \$115,000.00, the amount necessary to provide a filtering system for the Lake Front Park Pool.

The State and Wayne County Health Department have advised the City that the Lake Front Park Pool must remain closed until certain alterations and improvements are made to protect the health and safety of those residents using the Pool.

These alterations and improvements are: additional chlorinators and larger circulating pumps; a filtering system; necessary building to house these facilities; incidental changes to piping, electrical and plumbing to implement these items; provisions for a shower-inspection area in the present bath house plus adequate clothes storage space; additional strip of sidewalk, curb and fence around the outside of the pool.

Only these emergency alterations and improvements are to be accomplished at this time. Any other desirable changes will be recommended by Wilcox & Laird, City Park Consultants, after they have completed their study of the entire park areas.

Plans and specifications being prepared by Pate & Hirn, City Engineers, must be approved by the Michigan Department of Health before construction may begin. The plans must be approved and funds provided prior to January 1st, 1956 to insure completion of the project on or before May 15th, 1956.

METHOD OF FINANCING: After considering all methods of providing funds, the Council felt it would be in the best interest of the community to ask its resident property owners to approve a 30-year General Obligation Bond issue of \$115,000.00. This will permit the cost of improvements to be paid by the people who will be living in Grosse Pointe Woods and using the pool during this period.

A Special Assessment could not be used to finance this program since the City Charter prohibits the use of a Special Assessment District larger than twenty-five percent of the area of the City.

The contemplated Bond Issue of \$115,000.00 will raise the City's total Bonded Debt to \$932,000.00, or less than 22% of the City's capacity to bond, which is \$4,258,000.00.

The cost of the minimum necessary improvements over the 30-year period is estimated to be fourteen cents (14c) per one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) of assessed valuation, or approximately \$1.40 per year for a home assessed at \$10,000.00.

The question of title to submerged or reclaimed land has no bearing on the need for the bond issue election. The Health Department will not permit the use of the Pool until after the above changes have been completed.

Under the terms of the deed, the use of the Park is restricted to Woods residents and their guests. Regardless of any litigation, pending or otherwise, the filtering system can be installed on park property to which the City now has clear title.

A 60-40 vote majority is necessary to approve this Bond Issue. As cited above, only residents, property owners are eligible to vote in this election.
