Thursday, December 15 REPORTS ARE CIRCULA-TING in West Germany that Dr. Otto John, 46, former chief of the Security Office, (comparable to the FBI) claims he was kidnapped and did not flee to the Communists about 17 months ago. The West German Cabinet had been given a top-secret briefing on his return. Sources stated that his return was not unexpected and that he had been keeping in touch with the Bonn Government and had notified it of his plans to return.

John fled to East Germany in 1954 and his defection rocked the Audenauer administration. The most popular theory in circulation is that John became fed up with the Reds and fled back to

AFTER SIX WEEKS of bitter wrangling between the House and Senate and two special sessions called by Gov. Williams, the State Legislature adopted an emergency hospitalization program to help retarded children. The program calls for an additional 1,450 beds within two to four months, including 150 at the Children's Hospital in Farming-

It also calls for appropriation of \$100,000 for preliminary planning of a 2.500-bed hospital in Southeastern Michigan, as a further aid to these children. Total cost for the entire program, which includes other steps in the aid, is said to be about \$1,214,222.

CHANCES for an immediate tax cut appears to be very slim, according to the GOP and Democratic leaders of the House in Washington. Republican Minority Leader Joseph Martin said it will Takes Life be at least April before the Administration will know whether to allow a tax cut during the fiscal year of 1956-57.

Democratic House Speaker Sam Rayburn emphasized that he was opposed to a cut at the present time. However, he favored granting tax relief to low income families, provided other taxes can be boosted to offset the losses resulting from this relief.

Morris, already an ex-convict, first became a Grosse Pointe police problem in 1944.

First Charity Count Morris first got a charitable "count" from prison authorities while serving a 5-15 year sentence beginning in 1945. He was paroled in 1949. Until the day he was captured in December, 1951, by Farms police he continued to get credit for serving time on the

5-15 sentence. Sanborn conceded that Morris might have been robbing Pointe homes during this entire period but said until caught in the act Morris was presumed to be obey-

ing his parole. Morris was caught in December, 1951, and at that time he was remanded to prison to serve the balance of his 5-15 year term and his new 2-5 sentence. But, thanks to his good time on

The film is in color and shows most of the activities carried on during a typical school day until they leave.



Florida can look forward to a seven percent gain in visitors from Michigan this season, according to Harry N. Rogan, Automobile Club of Michigan travel services director.

Rogan estimates that nearly 100,000 Michigan cars, each carrying an average of three passengers, will head for the Sunshine State. Drivers will find a small increase in round-trip costs over last year due to slight rises in accommodation prices and car operating costs.


Average round - trip driving costs, including meals and accommodations, for a trip to Miami, amounts to just over \$200 for a couple from Detroit. Two children can go along for another \$65. The trip to Miami, including

some sightseeing time, can be made comfortably in four days on either of two popular routes, Rogan states. The eastern or "direct route" runs 1,425 miles from Detroit to Miami and includes some mountain driving. Mountainous sections of Kentucky and Tennessee are occasionally icy in

The western route is about 125 miles longer but is flatter and takes only 35 minutes longer to drive than the eastern roads.

Fewer detours than usual will be found this year, the Auto Club official says. A detour on secondary roads off Ind.-3, south of Fort Wayne, will actually save two miles while the detour off US-431 in Alabama adds five miles. The only detour on the eastern route is off Florida-100 south of Lake City and also adds five miles.

Rogan foresees increased numbers of Michiganians flying to Florida due to recent improvements in air service which added flights and shortened flying time.


