# 2 Million Books In 'M' Libraries

There are 2,055,139 volumes in 31 different libraries around the University of Michigan campus.

The center of the vast system is the General Library, where there are more than on million books.

The libraries employ approximately 160 workers in jobs such as cataloguers, binders, receptionists and stack workers, in addition to students who do these jobs part time.

Other services are also offered. Microfilm, microcards and prints, and a photo-duplication service are available in the General Library. There are a large number of maps and charts for reference.

An addition is being planned to the system with a new undergraduate library to be completed early in 1956. The new library will have open stacks and a larger capacity for studying.

**U-M Hopes 1956 Can Be Key Year for Planning Future**

With enrollment already at the 20,800-mark on campus, the University of Michigan is looking to 1956 as a key year in preparation for the inevitable upward spiral in college enrollments.

Throughout the year of 1955, President Harlan Hatcher continued to drive home the following points:

1. Size of the University is not the important item. The real issue is whether the quality of the instructional program can be maintained. He has emphasized that the University expects to maintain its high standards in keeping with the type of performance that the people of the state have come to expect at Ann Arbor.
2. The University is not engaging in recruiting of students or in any race with other colleges and universities as to the numbers of students enrolled. Hence it will continue to admit only those who are qualified to both the undergraduate and graduate and professional programs. President Hatcher has said, "The enrollment this year could have been 40,000 if we had let down the bars."
3. With reasonable support and some sort of controlled growth which will permit the University to absorb additional students in an orderly fashion, it should be possible for the U-M to continue to grow either on the Ann Arbor campus or at other points in the state.

The year of 1956 will see the start of a venture in expanding the U-M to another city. The Flint College of the U-M will be launched in the fall of 1956 offering the junior and senior years while Flint Junior College provides the first two years.

Since conservative estimates show that college enrollments in the State of Michigan will double by 1970, the U-M is devoting the much time to planning and to preparing itself to meet its share of the increased enrollments.

Although the University of Michigan has traditionally prided itself on the accuracy of its enrollment predictions, the forecasts a year ago of 19,750 students on campus for the fall of 1955 proved to be too conservative since the actual count exceeded the prediction by more than one thousand students.

Thus it is a certainty that in the fall of 1956, the U-M will set a new enrollment mark, breaking the 21,363 peak set in the fall of 1948 during the so-called "veterans bulge."

To help keep the faculty and its other vital services in line with the much higher enrollment, the Regents are seeking an appropriation of \$27,730,720 from the Legislature, which will be basic in the financing of a \$35,033,420 General Fund Budget to cover the instructional and research program in 1956-57. The remaining \$7,302,700 will come from student fees and other income.

As required by the Legislature, the Regents also have submitted a five-year program for capital outlay to cover the new buildings, additions and remodeling required during the fiscal years starting July 1, 1956 through June 30, 1961.

The figure comes to \$111,000,000 with \$17,571,200 of the sum required during the 1956-57 year.

**Power's Injured In Motor Crash**

Hildred Powers, president of the Powers Lumber Co. on Harper avenue, and his wife, Francine, suffered severe lacerations and bruises Wednesday, December 14, when they car collided with a highway department truck near Fowler, Kan.

Mr. and Mrs. Powers are recovering in the Community Hospital at Fowler. They were en route to their winter home at Tucson, Ariz.

**Army to Get Opportunity To Defend Park Camp Site**

The Army will be given an opportunity to speak on reasons to retain the AAA Battery unit at its present site at Three Mile drive and Essex.

On Monday, December 19, the Park council approved a public hearing with officials of the Army and citizens, regarding the anti-aircraft base.

Although no definite date has been set, it is expected that the meeting will be held about the middle, or latter part of January.

Lt. William Nolde, commander of the base, who was present at Monday's meeting, expressed a wish that he be notified when the meeting date has been set, which was agreed to by the council.

On Monday, November 28, a group of citizens living in the immediate vicinity of the Army camp, attended a public hearing, to protest an extension of a lease on the site, for another 10 years.

The present lease will expire on September 1, 1956.

The citizens complained that the camp site location depreciated the value of their properties; that there was too much noise from truck motors, etc.; and that some of the soldiers use unprintable language at times.

The Army unit, Battery D, 99th AAA Battalion, backed by another group of citizens who are also expected to be at the meeting, will have a chance to speak on why the camp site should be retained and the lease renewed.

The group of citizens backing the retention of the camp site are expected to gather their forces to protest the removal of the Army unit.

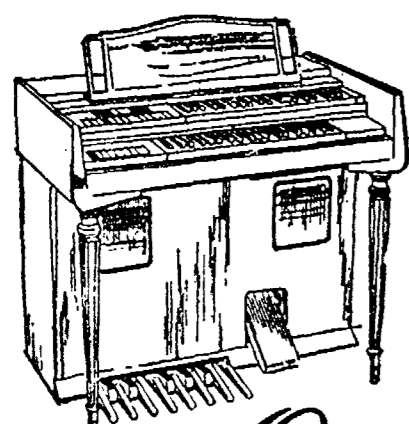

### Hold Workshop For Teachers

An art workshop for Grosse Pointe elementary school teachers was conducted this fall by Art Counselor Gladys Gies. It's an in-service training program, an offering designed to make Grosse Pointe teachers even better teachers.

The professional growth experienced by the participants is reflected in the classroom. Ideas worked out during workshop time wind up as educational projects engaged in by the children. It's a work-learning situation for the 21 teachers who take part in the workshop.

The workshop course—seven two-hour sessions—is planned around new uses for old materials. Fabrics, corrugated paper, wallpaper, printed material, colored string, gaily colored paper from slick magazines, and so on, are utilized in unique designs and art projects.

Scenes such as landscapes, and objects such as stars, trees and candles are made from these materials. Unusual and striking designs result.

Mosaic art is a good example. This ancient art expression is enjoying popular interest currently.

Mosaics are being made for the contemporary home. In school, teachers and children are finding this form a lively, exciting one to use.

The Art Counselor introduces the latest art trends to the elementary school teachers. She develops with them the possibilities of art expression found in the expensive materials at hand.

Mrs. Gies is a graduate of Northwestern. She took work at the Art Institute of Chicago. She earned her masters at Wayne University in Art Education.

Mrs. Gies has been in the Grosse Pointe Public Schools for 12 years. During the first four years she taught at the Maire Elementary. Liking art she began to trade assignments with her colleagues, taking their art class for some other subject. Eight years ago she became Art Counselor in the Department of Instruction.

### Jet Transports Near Soviet Use

SINGAPORE—Soviet plans for using long-range jet transport planes are well advanced, Keith Holyoake, New Zealand's Deputy Prime Minister, said here.

On his way home after visiting the Soviet Union, India and Pakistan, Mr. Holyoake said he had talked for three hours with Nikita S. Khrushchev, the Communist Party leader, at the holiday resort of Yalta.

Mr. Holyoake said Mr. Khrushchev told him about the types of planes that the Soviets intended using. He said they had a long range and a heavy passenger-carrying capacity.

Mr. Holyoake said: "I was delighted with the more friendly approach of the Soviets. I can only hope that it will lead to better relations between Western countries and the Soviet Union."

He said he had discussed problems affecting New Zealand's trade with the Soviet Union with ministers and officials. He said there were "prospects of increasing New Zealand's exports of butter and meat."

It will require less than five minutes of your time and there is no need to undress. By having your chest x-rayed this Christmas season, you can remember more easily to have another at the same time next year.

Campus Martius every weekday. The unit will be located on It will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Dr. Molner says the increased knowledge about tuberculosis and the wisdom of people in taking advantage of the opportunity to have a chest x-ray, and the early diagnosis and treatment when necessary has paid big dividends in the saving of lives here.

In 1900 there were 131 deaths for every 100,000 persons in Detroit compared with 10 last year. Last year there were 209 deaths in Detroit from tuberculosis compared with 565 in 1950.

A chest x-ray is the most important method of discovering tuberculosis in the early stages.

### Driver Training Showing Slump

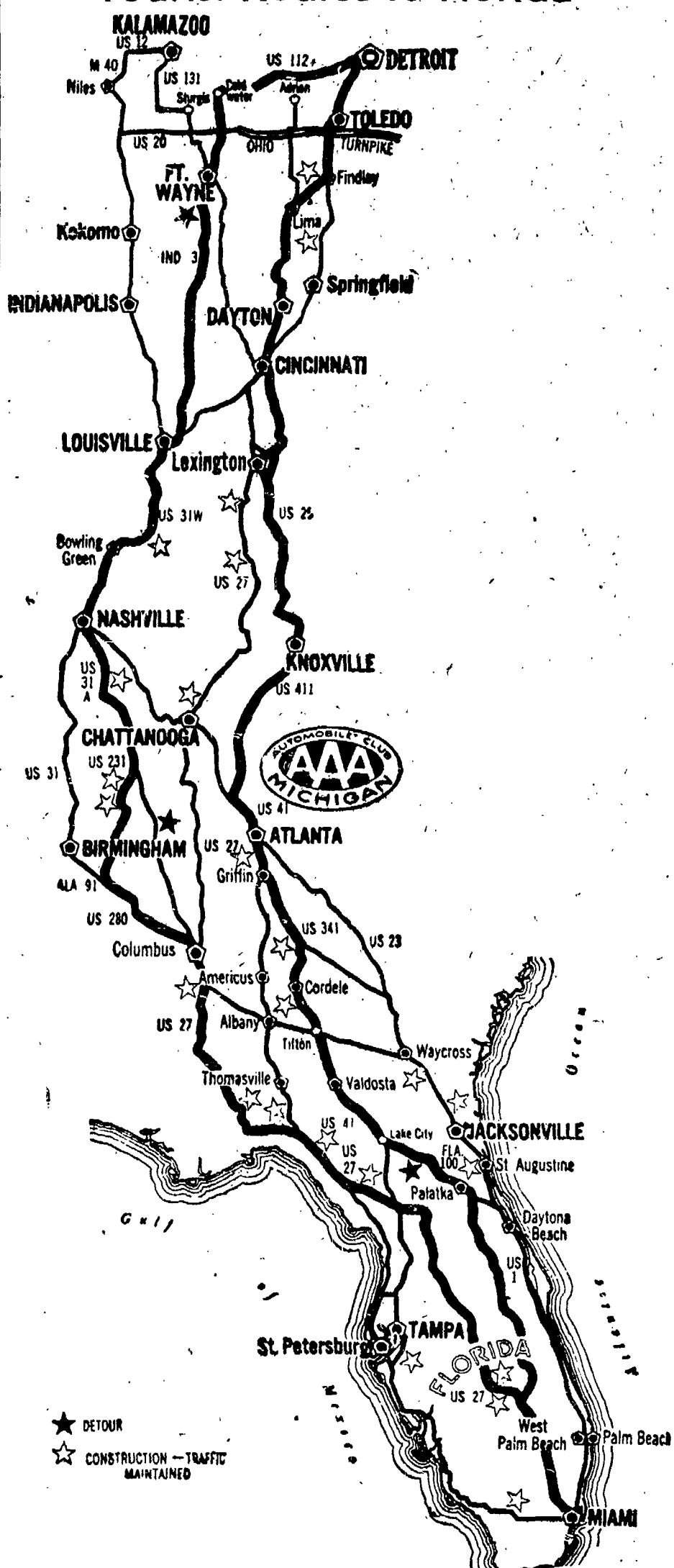
The extent to which Detroit's adults take advantage of the schools' driver education program is revealed in the enrollment figures. In 1953-54, eight schools enrolled a total of 2,346 adult driver trainees. In 1954-55, nine schools enrolled 2,083.

This year four evening schools, Northeastern, Northern, Miller, and Redford, have on-street education training; and five schools, Mackenzie, Southwestern, Denby,

Pershing, and Cody have off-street programs. Mumford high launched a driving range last month.

Evening driver-education programs start in most schools about 3 p.m. Classes are held on Friday afternoons and during the day on Saturday. There is a waiting list of adults desiring this training in most evening schools despite the intensive use of all available facilities.

### Schooling Is Key To Top Salaries

The high correlation between good schooling and good living is summarized in a report to the people by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. This report was based on an extensive nation-wide survey showing that communities with the best schools also have the highest standard of living.

Following are some figures from the report showing that a direct relationship exists between a person's level of education and his learning power. The figures listed are from the census bureau and concern men 25 years of age and over, in this country, with a college or high school education. The figures are as follows:

- 78% of the \$5,000 to \$6,000 incomes
- 77% of the \$6,000 to \$7,000 incomes
- 79% of the \$7,000 to \$10,000 incomes
- 82% of the \$10,000 or more incomes

Those with an eighth grade education or less have:

- 77% of the incomes below \$500
- 73% of the \$500 to \$1,000 incomes
- 65% of the \$1,000 to \$1,500 incomes

61% of the \$1,500 to \$2,000 incomes

The report indicates also that education is essential to successful self government and protection of American political freedom. Interview scores in a Roper survey revealed that:

- 52% of the college educated
- 26% of the high school educated
- 16% of the grade school educated were politically active; and
- 18% of the college educated
- 34% of the high school educated
- 51% of the grade school educated were completely inactive politically.

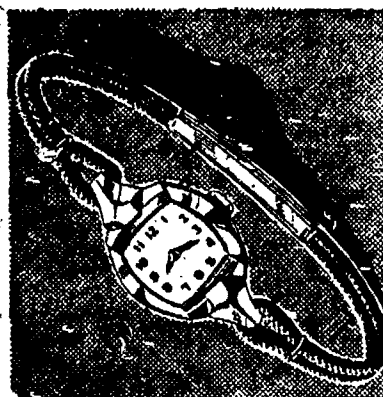
For the first time in American history there are more adults who have had either high school or college education than less. Three-quarters of persons 25 years of

age or over have had nine years or more of schooling. In contrast, three-quarters of those over 65 years have had eight years or less of education.

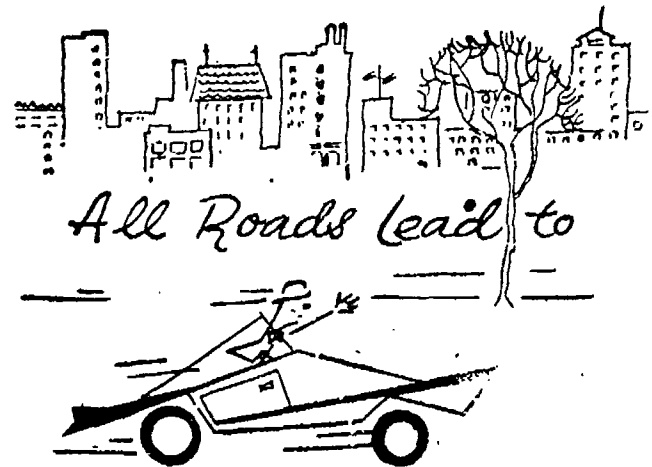

Rogan estimates that nearly 100,000 Michigan cars, each carrying an average of three passengers, will head for the Sunshine State. Drivers will find a small increase in round-trip costs over last year due to slight rises in accommodation prices and car operating costs.

Average round-trip driving costs, including meals and accommodations, for a trip to Miami, amounts to just over \$200 for a couple from Detroit. Two children can go along for another \$65.

The trip to Miami, including some sightseeing time, can be made comfortably in four days on either of two popular routes, Rogan states. The eastern or "direct route" runs 1,425 miles from Detroit to Miami and includes some mountain driving. Mountainous sections of Kentucky and Tennessee are occasionally icy in midwinter.

The western route is about 125 miles longer but is flatter and takes only 35 minutes longer to drive than the eastern roads.

Fewer detours than usual will be found this year, the Auto Club official says. A detour on secondary roads off Ind.-3, south of Fort Wayne, will actually save two miles while the detour off US-431 in Alabama adds five miles. The only detour on the eastern route is off Florida-100 south of Lake City and also adds five miles.

Rogan foresees increased numbers of Michiganders flying to Florida due to recent improvements in air service which added flights and shortened flying time.

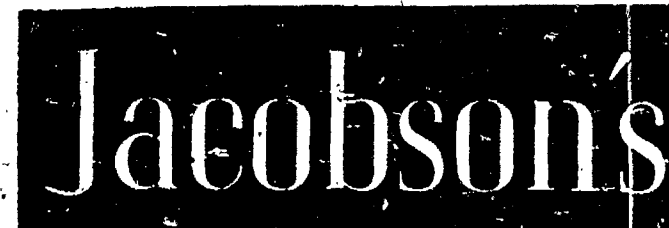

### Drunken Drivers To Go to Jail

Judge George T. Murphy, presiding judge in Traffic Court in December, today promised straight jail sentences without any alternative to all drivers convicted of driving while drunk during the holiday season.

In addition to the straight jail sentence two other automatic penalties resulting from a drunk driving conviction were cited. These were:

1. Automatic suspension of driver's license for at least 90 days.
2. Before the drunk driver can get his license back he must show financial responsibility in the amount of \$5000 for property damage and \$10,000 for public liability.

Traffic Judge John D. Watts, who will preside during January, pointed out that all drivers arrested during the holiday season for drunk driving and subsequently convicted no matter when their cases are heard, will be given the same penalty—a straight jail sentence.

Holiday drinking is expected to be as great or greater than in any year in the past. The Michigan

Liquor Control Commission purchased \$25,000,000 worth of holiday beverages, approximately \$5,000,000 more than in 1954.

The last two weeks are the most dangerous of the whole year for traffic fatalities. The National Safety Council reports that December 24, the day before Christmas, records more traffic fatalities in the country than any other day. In Detroit one year 25 persons were killed between Christmas and New Year's.

Judge Murphy said that driving under the influence of liquor aggravates the accident problem at this time of the year.

"I would also like to make one thing perfectly clear about drunk driving," Judge Murphy continued. "A person is considered to be under the influence of intoxicating liquor when his ability to drive is impaired. This ability is impaired, not just when he is 'falling-down drunk,' but also when his reactions are slowed; when he cannot respond to an emergency situation; when he can't get his foot off the accelerator and onto the brake as quickly as he ordinarily would."

### Art Institute Gets Fine Gift

Twenty-two paintings depicting the life and martyrdom of the famous abolitionist, John Brown, are an important gift of contemporary art received by the Detroit Institute of Arts from noted Eastern collectors, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Lowenthal of New York. The pictures are on view in the Recent Accessions Gallery.

The series of paintings, in gouache, are the work of Jacob Lawrence, one of America's outstanding Negro artists who, is now on a good will mission to the Orient, sent by the State Department to show in person the status of a Negro artist in American life.

Institute of Arts Director Edgar P. Richardson, said that the John Brown series, painted in 1941, is probably the most important creation of Lawrence's career to date. He noted that the Art Institute also owns another painting by Lawrence, "The Juke Box."

The series presents the John Brown story poetically and emotionally rather than in literal narrative form although each is titled with original text by the painter.

The paintings are less brilliant in color and more abstract in design than most other work by Lawrence. Their reverent mood makes them especially appropri-

ate for showing at the Christmas season.

The canvases are uncrowded, significant human details being used to build a series of close-ups of great power and mounting intensity.

Among the titles for the paintings are: "No. 1 'John Brown, a man who had a fanatical belief that he was chose by God to overthrow slavery in America'; No. 5 'John Brown, while tending his flock in Ohio, first communicated with his sons and daughters his plans of attacking slavery by force'; No. 11 'John Brown took to guerilla warfare'; No. 15 'John Brown made many trips to Canada organizing for his assault on Harper Ferry'; No. 18 'July 3, 1859. John Brown stocked an old barn with guns and ammunition. He was ready to strike his first blow at slavery'; No. 20 'John Brown held Harpers Ferry for twelve hours. His defeat was a few hours off'; No. 22 'John Brown was found guilty of treason and murder in the first degree, and was hanged in Charles Town, Virginia, on December 2, 1859.

Lawrence's John Brown series has been widely exhibited. Its last showing was in the Whitney Museum of American Art in New York in 1952 in the "Exhibition of Edith and Milton Lowenthal Collection."

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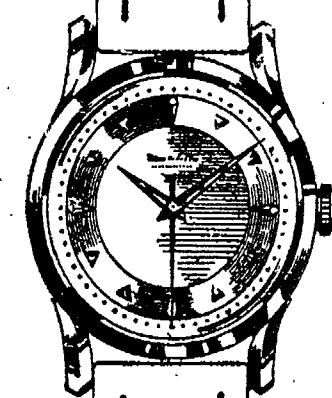
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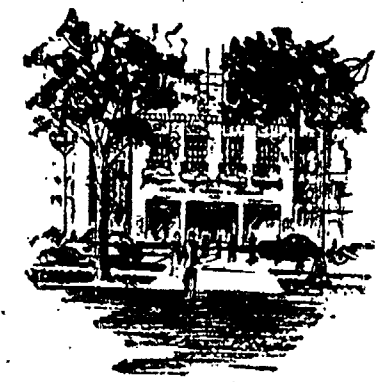

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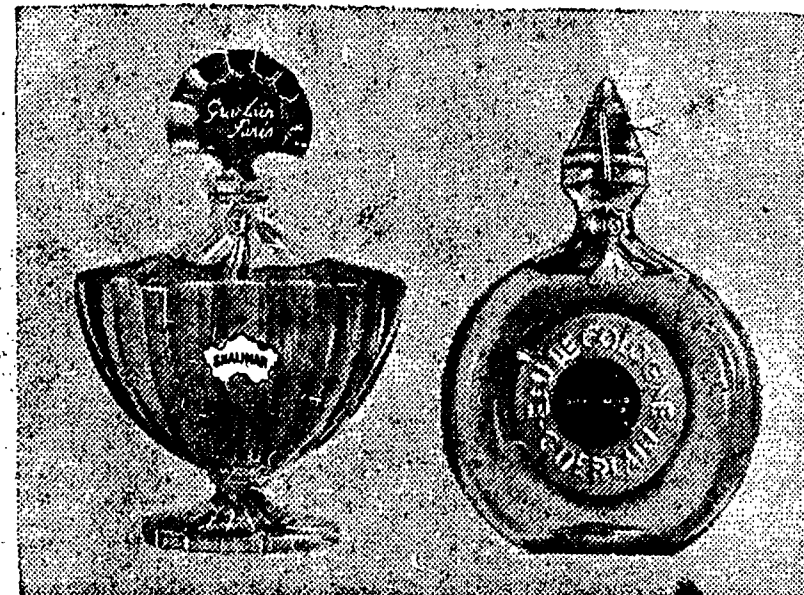

Spys are in abundance now; their season runs from September to December. It is a bright, striped red apple with a clear pale yellow skin which is nearly concealed with bright pinkish red, mottled and splashed with carmine.

The Stayman Winesap, which has a season from November to February, is excellent for baking. It is a dull, mixed red, rather indistinctly striped with dull carmine. Often, the Stayman Winesap is covered with light gray and russet dots.

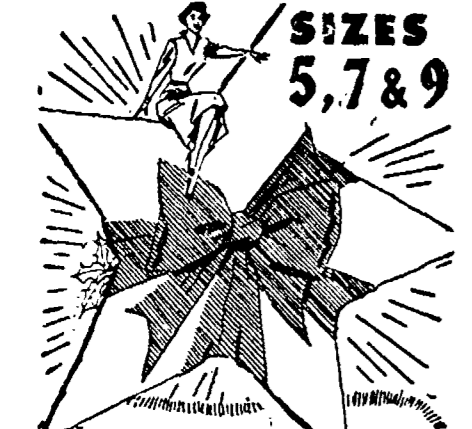

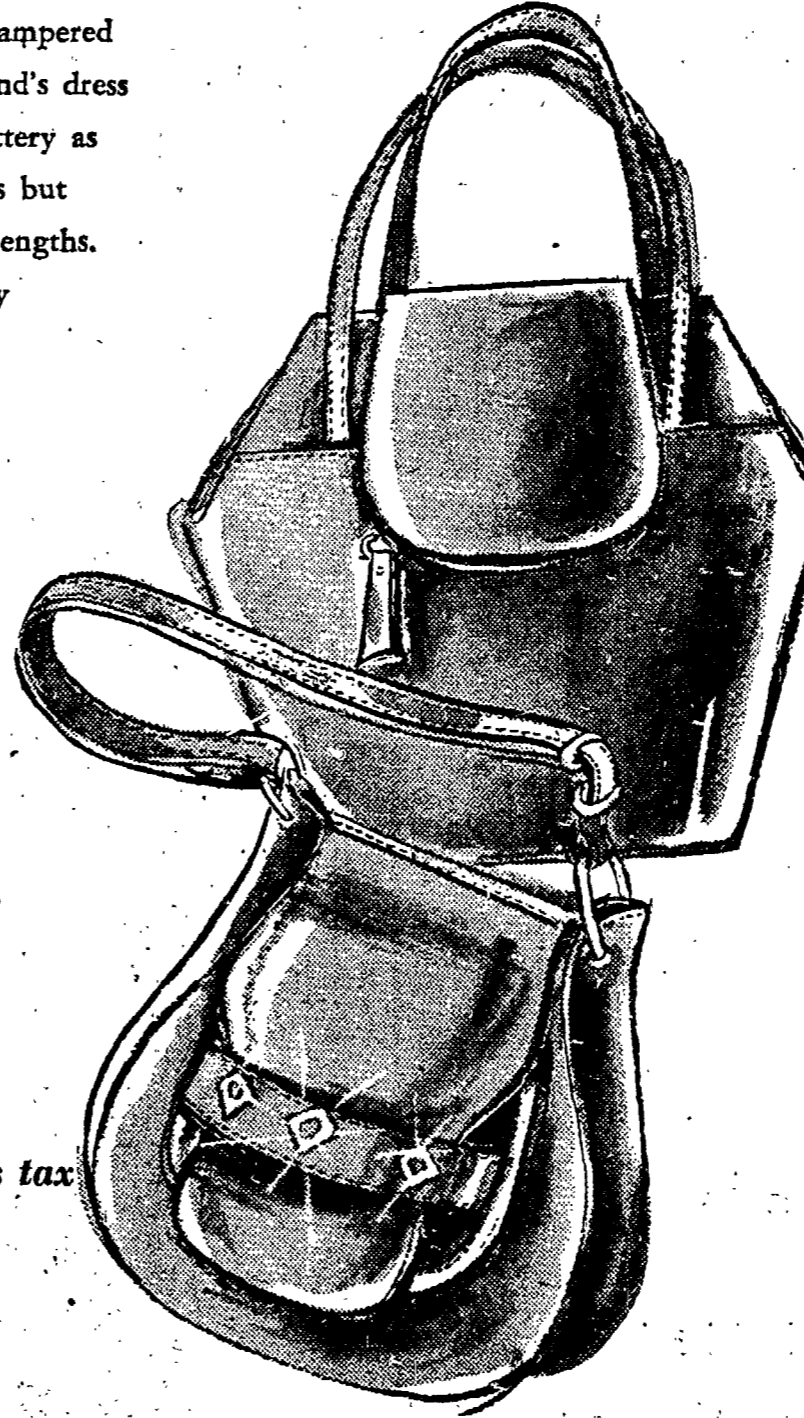

Fishermen are served by a bait and tackle shop where tackle may be purchased or rented by beginners wishing to try the sports. All facilities except food, bait and tackle are free.

Bob Girardin, beach recreation director, said two hockey leagues of six teams were organized and

ready to play. The senior league, players over 18, will play on Sunday mornings and the juniors, under 18, on Saturday mornings.

Kensington Metropolitan Park near New Hudson will offer ice fishing and skating on a cleared area on Kent Lake and skiing and tobogganing on slopes newly cleared and seeded.

Lower Huron Metropolitan Park near Belleville has two natural ice rinks in a sheltered hollow. There is a warm skaters' hut and new benches and landscaping are an addition this year.

## Harmony Rules Woods Council Meeting

administrator to \$100,000 apiece. Previously the city treasurer had been bonded at \$50,000, the administrator at \$40,000 and the comptroller clerk at \$15,000.

Mayor Kenneth Koppin pointed out that the lower bonds were a holdover from the days when the Woods was just a fraction of its present size.

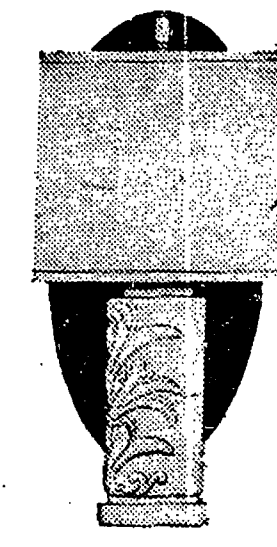

## Ordinary Christmas Tree Can Be Dangerous Object

The ordinary Christmas tree is one of the most flammable objects known. It is full of pitch and resin and may take less than two minutes to burn. Fireman might be too late, says Eleanor Mullikin, Wayne County Home Agent.

Choose a small tree—it's just as beautiful and safer. Buy it early if you like, but don't set it up until a few days before Christmas. Keep it outside or in a cold place. Cut the tree trunk diagonally, one inch above the original cut.

Mount the tree in a container of water and keep water above the cut surface until the tree is taken down. This will make the tree less burnable and keep needles from falling. Erect the tree in a cool spot, shutting off nearby heat if necessary.

Paper and cotton decorations, wires and electric trains around trees can cause fires, as can candles or electric lights with frayed wires and loose sockets. A switch at some distance is safer than plugging and unplugging lights beneath or behind the tree. If needles turn brown, move the lights, and when needles start to fall, take the tree down or hold lighting to a half hour at a time.

A wide variety of decorative lighting fixtures and light bulbs of many different colors, sizes and shapes are manufactured. Before you shop, check on last year's lights to see if any burned-out bulbs need replacing or any repairs are needed.

Most satisfactory, generally, are the strings in which each bulb lights independently, so if one burns out, it does not cut off the remaining ones. For convenience, look for strings with add-on connectors for attaching additional sets of lights and for clips or other arrangements that fasten bulbs easily and firmly to the tree where you want them.

Be sure cords have no worn insulation that exposes wires and no loose connections at sockets, or plugs. In placing decorations, make sure light bulbs will not come in contact with anything combustible.

Place the Christmas tree close to a wall outlet to avoid use of extension wires, but if such wires

must be used, the heavy duty kind are safest. At least be sure wires are placed where they will not be trip hazards, will not run under rugs, along window ledges where they touch curtains, or over metal nails, hooks or hot radiators.

If Santa should leave Junior's electric train under the Christmas tree, take care not to connect it there. Any metal decoration that fall on the track may short circuit and cause sparks and possibly fire.

Finally, for safety, disconnect lights in the tree when you leave the room or the house.

## Ranger Exams Begin In State

The Michigan State Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for Park Rangers. Park Rangers work during the summer season, usually beginning in May and continuing through October.

The work offers an opportunity for a summer of outdoor activity. Park Rangers issue camp permits, enforce park rules, clean the grounds, make minor road repairs and structural repairs to buildings in more than 50 state parks located in every section of the state.

Applicants for the positions which pay \$61.60 per week must be between 18 and 60 and have completed at least the eighth school grade.

Applications and examination announcements for these positions may be obtained from the nearest Michigan Employment Security Commission branch office, Michigan Department of Conservation field office, or by writing to the Michigan State Civil Service Commission, Lansing 13, Michigan.

Food Scoops For This Week

Although prices on hen turkeys offer the best value according to weight, tom turkeys may be found at very reasonable costs. They are a few pennies more than at Thanksgiving. Because there is a record supply for this time of the year, frying chickens are still selling at low prices.

It is still the time for pork, for it still represents the best buy in many years among all kinds of meat! Because this is the low point in the lowest-priced season, it is the ideal time to stock the freezer with loin roasts, Boston-butts, pork chops, or spareribs. Bacon and ham is also an excellent value.

Beef supplies remain large and prices are about steady on the more plentiful choice grade. This is also an excellent month to fill any vacant spaces in your freezer with such attractive buys as chuck roasts, ground beef and even round and sirloin steaks.

Although lamb supplies are declining slightly, prices have remained steady to slightly lower due to the low prices on pork and beef. Excellent quality legs of lamb and shoulder roasts from the heavier weights are very reasonable.

Improved weather conditions in the northern Canadian area has begun to bring ample sup-

plies of fresh fish and the more abundant frozen packages are still a most popular choice. Due to more limited shipments of medium sizes of shrimp they are not as good a value as they were in 1934. The jumbo size provides more for your money.

Supplies of tomatoes from the warmer climates are steadily increasing and prices are becoming more attractive. Both the California pascal celery and the Florida cucumbers are more abundant and provide salad suggestions at attractive prices. The increased volume of spinach in the markets has resulted in a very low price on the 10 ounce packages already washed and cleaned. Deep snow in some of the growing areas has caused a shorter harvest of Xmas trees

and some prices are a little higher than they were last year. All sprayed or painted trees are much higher in price than the natural green ones.

Abundant shipments of bananas are arriving from the tropical countries at unusually low costs. Special features of both red and yellow western delicious apples are being run in many markets, but all Michigan apples are still the best value. Large quantities of oranges are arriving from Florida at reasonable costs, but most California citrus is up a few cents in price due to less picking during the wet weather in that area. The tangelo, the juicy-sweet fruit which is a cross between the tangerine and the Temple orange, would be a special economical treat. One of the newest

arrivals to add color to the fruit counter is the popular D'Anjou pear—they remain green when they are ripe and keep very well. They are being featured at very low prices.

Hot Turkey Salad  
1 qt. chopped cooked turkey  
1 qt. chopped celery  
1 cup chopped almonds  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
1/4 cup minced onion  
1/4 cup chopped pimento  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
1 cup salad dressing  
3 cups crushed potato chips  
1/2 cup grated Swiss cheese  
Combine all ingredients except potato chips and Swiss cheese. Blend well. Pour into 2 greased 1 1/2 quart casseroles. Top with potato chips and then Swiss

cheese. Bake at 350°F., about 30 minutes. NOTE: 1 quart tuna fish (4-6 ounce cans) may be used in place of turkey or chicken.

Nesselrode (6 Servings)  
1 T. unflavored gelatin  
1/2 c. coffee cream  
1 cup scalded milk  
3 eggs  
1 T. brandy or rum flavoring  
1/4 c. chopped blanched almonds  
1/4 cup sugar 1 T. vanilla  
1/2 cup crumbled almond macaroons  
1/4 cup diced candied cherries  
2 tbs. diced candied citron  
2 tablespoons raisins  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 tbs. sugar  
1/2 cup whipping cream  
1 tbs. Maraschino cherry sirup  
Maraschino cherries

Soak gelatin in cream. Separate eggs, then stir 1/4 cup sugar into yolks. Add milk and cook until mixture thinly coats a wooden spoon and is slightly thickened. Add soaked gelatin and stir until dissolved, then add vanilla and brandy or rum flavoring. Chill over ice water until it begins to thicken. Add almonds, macaroons and fruit. Add salt to egg whites and beat until they form rounded peaks when beater is lifted. Beat in 1 tablespoon sugar. Fold custard mixture into egg whites. Decorate bottom of 1 quart mold with almonds, cherries and citron. Carefully pour pudding mixture over it. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve with whipped cream flavored with Maraschino cherry sirup; garnish with Maraschino cherries.

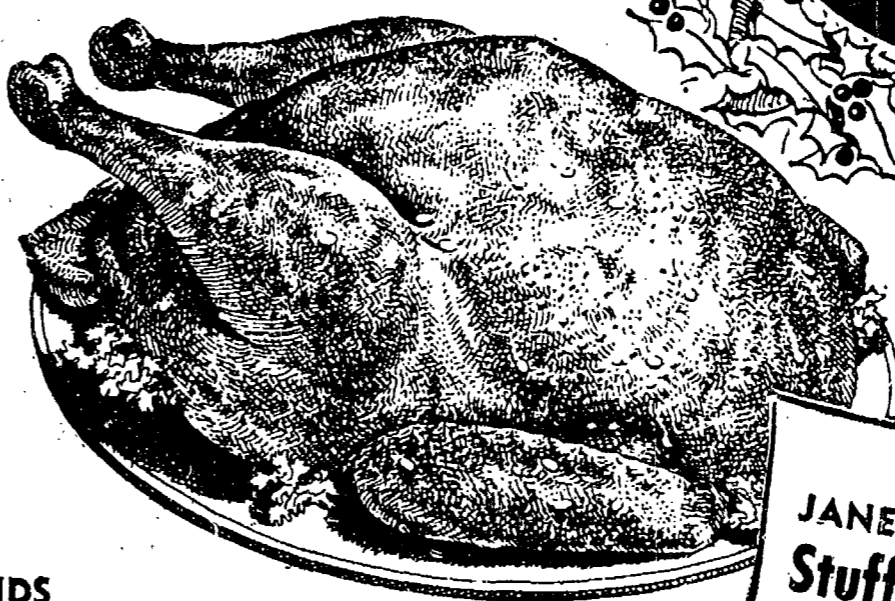

### Refunds in Park Ordered By State Tax Commission

The refund of tax monies to two Park residents, ordered by the State Tax Commission, is under study by Park City Attorney Pierre Hettler.

The residents, the council was informed on Monday, December 19, had appealed to the Commission, protesting that their city-county taxes were too high.

The commission ruled in favor of the residents, Dr. Julius Tapert of 1125 Devonshire; and Helen C. Katros of 1000 Devonshire.

The assessed valuation set by the Park and Wayne County on the Tapert property was set as: land value, \$2,850; and house,

\$19,120; and on the Katros residence, \$23,530. The land valuation on the latter apparently was upheld by the Commission, as no mention of a figure was made at the council meeting.

In the Tapert case, the Commission ruled that the land assessment should be only \$1,810, but did not tamper with the house assessment. It then ruled that Dr. Tapert was entitled to a refund of \$30.14.

Mrs. Katros is to have a refund of \$116.55, it was ordered by the Commission, after it ruled that the assessed valuation of her home be reduced from the \$25,530 to \$16,530.

City Attorney Hettler disclosed that there is a technicality, whereby the refunds need not be paid, and that is the fact that the two residents had paid up their taxes before their cases were heard. However, he pointed out, there is the matter of an appeal that was made to the State Tax Commission before the taxes were paid.

This, he said, might be sufficient to cause the payment of the refunds.

He was instructed by the council to look into the matter and present a report at a future meeting.

The ruling of the Commission

remains in effect for three years; after that, the original figure can be reinstated on the tax rolls, it was revealed.

Egyptian Government in building a \$1,300,000,000 High Dam at Aswan. The United States will contribute 56 million dollars of this sum and Britain will furnish the balance in blocked sterling.

The Egyptian Government was promised further financial aid by the two Western Powers in the further stages of construction, but they made no specific long-range commitments. Construction of the great power and irrigation The offer of assistance was spurred by an offer made by the Soviet Union for a 50-year loan to finance the dam.

**AT LEAST 500 PERSONS** were arrested by the Provisional Government of Gen. Pedro Eugenio Aramburi in Argentina, in connection with a conspiracy to "discredit the Government by acts of sabotage." The persons were arrested in several raids made by security police.

It was learned that Gen. Heracleo Ferrazo, former commander of the Second Army Division; and Lt. Col. Norberto Ugolini, former chief of the Second Infantry Division, both ardent Peronists, had been taken into custody. It was believed that these men were arrested prior to the raids, but might have been connected with the conspiracy to discredit the Government. Most of the persons arrested were reported to be Peronists.

**PAKISTAN TROOPS** are standing by to uphold the rights of citizens of Kashmir to hold a plebiscite, to determine whether they want to become a part of Pakistan or India. The largest part of Kashmir was under Indian control when a United Nations truce halted the fighting between India and Pakistan in 1949.

A proposal for a plebiscite conducted by the UN has been hanging fire ever since. Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India is committed to a plebiscite among the predominantly Moslems Kashmiris.

The purse, empty except for identification papers, was found four blocks from the scene of the crime. It had contained little money, police said. Homicide detectives are questioning all boys with police records who live in the area of the 8800 block in Arcadia.

**MICHIGAN'S AID** to retarded children program will get a boost when Washington turns over 51 buildings at Fort Custer to the State for use of mentally retarded children. A lease signed by the Secretary of the Army Wilber M. Brucker will be turned over to Michigan officials this week, it was revealed.

The State will take charge and convert the one-story, barracks-type hospital buildings from plans approved by Army authorities. When the conversion is completed, there will be room to house at least 800 children. The lease is for three and a half years, and will cost the State about \$15,000 a year. The date for occupancy has not been set.

IN HIS STUBBORN FIGHT against deportation, Thomas Dutton, 70, of 2083 Twenty-eight street, Detroit, charged that his

bus driver, admitted to falling asleep at the wheel, while his bus was loaded with passengers. His vehicle plowed into a five-ton steel tractor, injuring the tractor's driver, Anthony Kobe, 56, of 17162 Bentler, Detroit, fatally.

Officials said that in April, 1952, the United States forces had 3,843 procured facilities, including 2,483 private houses. All but two of these now have been returned. Since the same date, 56 of 63 hotels have been released, seven out of 13 hospitals, five of 18 schools, and all 15 department stores formerly used for United States servicemen.

- 2 lbs. cranberries

4 c. hot water

Cook slowly until soft; cover while cooking. Then uncover, and boil hard for five minutes.

Put cranberry sauce into refrigerator. This recipe makes a delicious well-jellied sauce.
