

Man Seriously Injured When Hit by Car on Mack

A St. Clair Shores resident was admitted to St. John Hospital on Sunday, March 18, following an accident in which he was seriously injured.

Raymond Jones, 34, of 21314 Alexander drive, suffered multiple fractures of the right leg, head and internal injuries when he was struck by a car driven by Leo Robitaille, 20, of 22657 Manor, St. Clair Shores. The accident occurred at Mack and Fairholme.

A Woods police report said that Jones was standing alongside a car, in which his wife, Angeline, was sitting behind the wheel, when Robitaille's car scraped the side of the other, hitting the victim.

The report said that Jones was carried approximately 28 feet before he fell to the pavement. Tire skid marks from the

vehicle which struck him, measured about 18 feet. Witnesses said that Robitaille was traveling between 20 and 25 miles an hour prior to the impact.

Robitaille was ticketed for not having his car under control and ordered to appear in court on July 28.

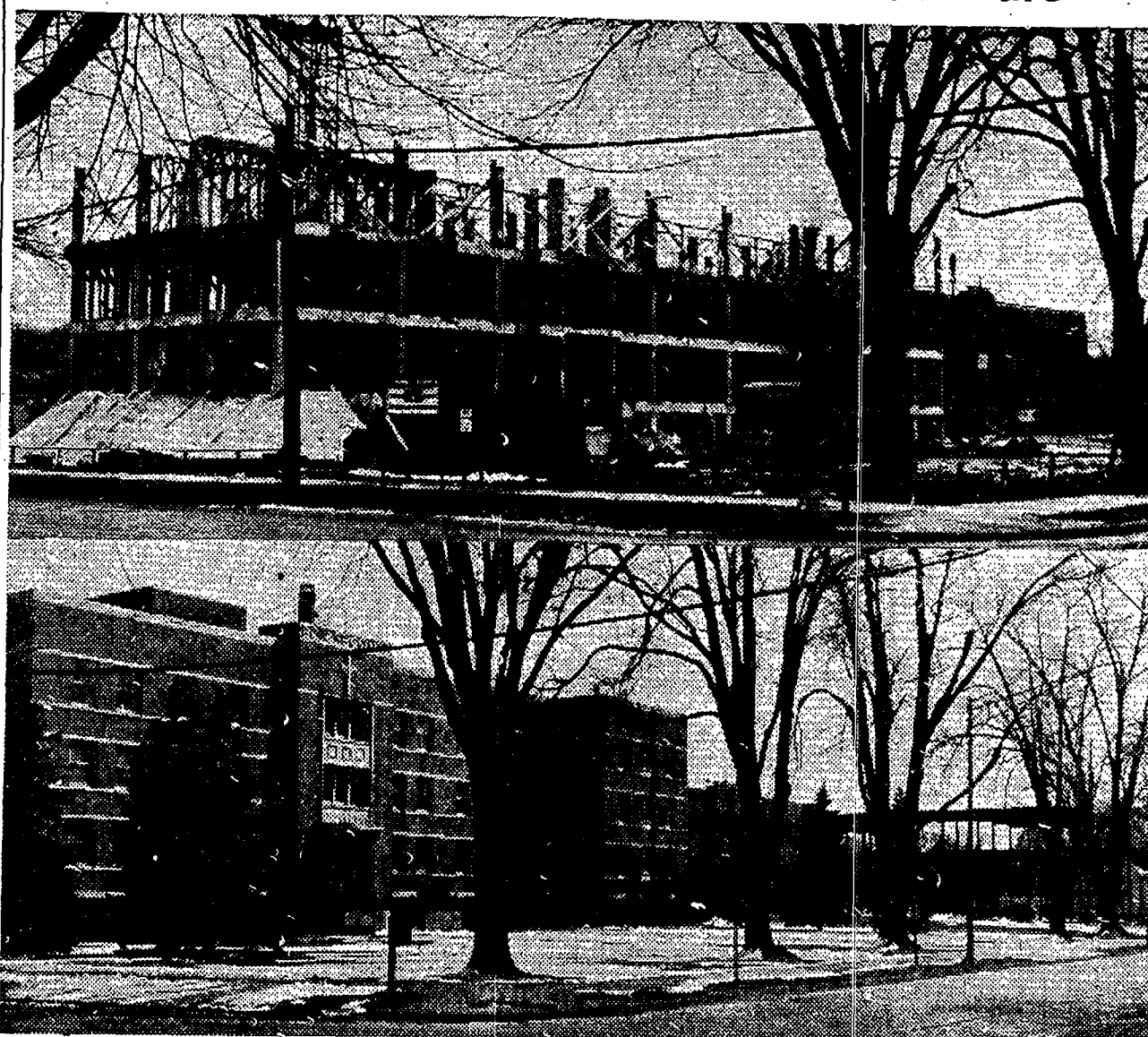
The officers took up the trail at 10:50 p.m. and caught up with the alleged peeper at 12:35 a.m.

Social Security Reports Soon Due

Social security reports are due in April from housewives in the Grosse Pointes, Harper Woods, and the east side of Detroit who employ domestic workers, according to Francis L. Pendergast, manager of the Detroit-East district office, Social Security Administration.

Housewives are required to make these reports during April on household workers paid as much as \$50 in cash wages in January, February, and March. This is the fifth quarterly report due since the new law covered household employees without regard to the number of days worked. Reports are sent to the District Director of Internal Revenue at Detroit.

Work of cooks, maids, housekeepers, gardeners and other workers in a private household counts toward eligibility for retirement or death payments under old-age and survivors insurance if they are paid at least \$50 cash wages by one employer in a calendar quarter. If the household employes work long enough to be insured, benefits are payable in old age or to certain survivors in case of death.

Free booklets explaining the employer's obligation and benefits to the employe are available at the social security office located at 13238 Harper, Detroit 13, Michigan.

Lakes Compact Bill Introduced

Congressman Louis C. Rabaut (D., Mich.), introduced a bill, H. R. 9817, providing for the consent and approval of Congress to a Great Lakes Basin Compact.

H. R. 9817 would give eight states the authority to enter into an interstate compact with each other and the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec for the purpose of promoting "the orderly, integrated, and comprehensive development, use and conservation of the water resources of the Great Lakes Basin."

The compact would secure and maintain a proper balance among industrial, commercial, agricultural, water supply, residential, recreational, and other legitimate uses of the water resources of the Basin.

In addition to authorizing an interstate compact, this bill would create a Great Lakes Commission so that the purposes of the Compact may be accomplished more effectively.

The following morning the police were summoned again. This time their job was to clear a clothes chute which had become jammed.

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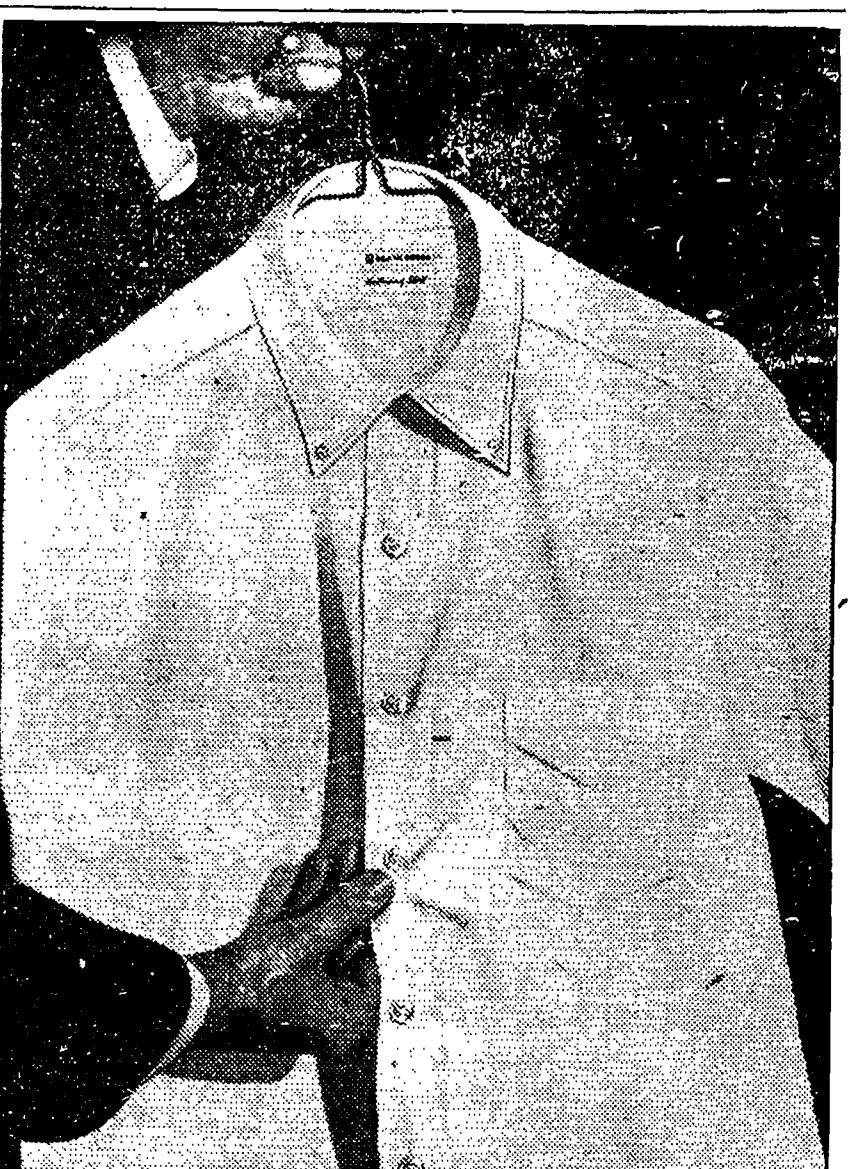
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Plan Town Hall For Candidates

Mr. Rabaut said the selection and price of shows under subscription television would be subject to widespread abuse and the American people would be the loser.

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Businessmen to Hold Next Lunch Meeting at Center

The regular March noonday-luncheon meeting of the Grosse Pointe Business Men's Association will be held at the War Memorial Center, next Tuesday, March 27, commencing promptly at 12:30 o'clock.

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Blood Collection Data Released

John M. Sullivan, executive director of the Detroit Red Cross Chapter, today reported that \$2,250 pints of blood were collected by the Detroit Regional Blood Program last year. More than 1,000 "accounts" are held in the names of individuals or organizations such as club, lodge, church, community, management and labor groups.

"Red Cross acts as banker in the blood program, with voluntary donors depositing to the account of their choice. When a group-account member needs blood, authorization for its release is made by a designated representative of the group. Red Cross arranges transportation of the proper type blood to the hospital. Periodically organizations choose to release specified amounts for civil defense needs, for use in research or for processing into various derivatives for medical purposes," he said.

Finances to maintain the Red Cross blood program are included in the Red Cross budget, the bulk of which was secured this year by the Chapter's participation in the fall United Foundation Torch Drive. "Hospitals usually find it necessary to make a charge to the patient for the technical services involved in its administration, but there is no charge for Red Cross blood," said Mrs. William J. Turner, volunteer chairman of the Regional Blood Program.

Last year Red Cross expended \$137,660.19 in Wayne County at a cost of \$5.33 per pint collected. Occasionally an instance calling for the use of blood is dramatic enough to receive mention in the press . . . such as the explosion at a Wyandotte chemical plant when police cars rushed it to hospitals caring for injured men. Each time a patient's life is saved because blood was available when it was needed, the patient, his family, his community, and his country all are benefited.

"When one translates the cost of the blood program to the community in terms of persons restored to health and usefulness, the price being paid is indeed small.

"The case of Roy Doughty, Allen Park police officer, provides eloquent testimony as to what participation in the Red Cross blood program can mean to an individual and to his community. Injured while on duty directing traffic, Doughty spent over 100 days in the hospital. Nine pints of blood provided by the Allen Park community account, available through Red Cross at the time they were needed, played a large part in returning the officer to his family, and to the job in which he has served Allen Park for several years," Mrs. Turner concluded.

Red Cross blood centers recently have been called on to furnish large quantities of blood in emergencies. The December fire victims in Baltimore, Maryland, required 100 pints of whole blood and 100 units of serum albumin from a Red Cross blood center, while victims of two train wrecks, one in the west and one on the east coast, required a total of 250 pints of whole blood, donated through Red Cross.

Fifteen Class A railroads serve almost every locality in Michigan carrying raw materials to plants and taking finished products to consumers.

Club Selected As Host Agency

Mrs. T. K. Jefferis, president of the board of directors of the Grosse Pointe Woods Community Club has announced that the Community Club has been honored to be selected as a host agency for Mrs. Sarah Leao of Fortaleza, Brazil, a Wayne student under the Technical Assistance program of the Foreign Operations Administration of the State Department of the United States government.

Mrs. Leao is a well-known social worker in Brazil, having held administrative and supervisory posts in a number of agencies. She has organized an information bureau, conducted social surveys, and lectured throughout her country.

A graduate of Universidade de Ceara, Mrs. Leao also studied at the Escola de Serviço Social de Instituto Social de Fortaleza or the School of Social Work, where she received her master's degree. She is a member of the faculty of that school in addition to her fulltime post as Chief of Section of the Department Regional de Ceara, Industrial Social Service.

In this latter position, she supervises the industrial social work program of the state of Ceara, located in various factories and industries. A private social agency, it is supported by funds from the management groups of the various industries as well as somewhat by the Brazilian government.

The work done through these factory settings includes family and medical casework, group work recreation, and informal education activities with the workers. Many of the latter programs are with teen-agers who leave school before the completion of their formal education.

Mrs. Leao will carry academic work at Wayne University at the School of Social Work. She will be at the Community Club two days a week as part of a field work assignment. She will study how such an agency is organized, how its program is planned, and how it fits into the community as a whole.

Methods of working with adults to organize activities for themselves and their communities will receive Mrs. Leao's particular attention.

The work of the Community Club in development of the preschool program, in which the leadership of the program is shared by the parents as volunteers, as well as the development of the Committee on Community Services in the Harper Woods area, will also be part of her study.

She will also visit various Grosse Pointe organizations such as the schools, as well as other social agencies in the Metropolitan area.

Miss Virginia Crowthers will serve as adviser to Mrs. Leao during her work at the club. Several members of the board of directors are planning to entertain Mrs. Leao in their homes during her stay at the club.

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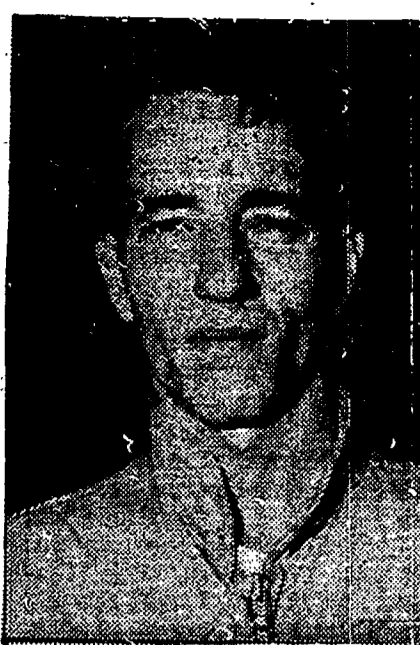
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Two Cars Tangle At Intersection

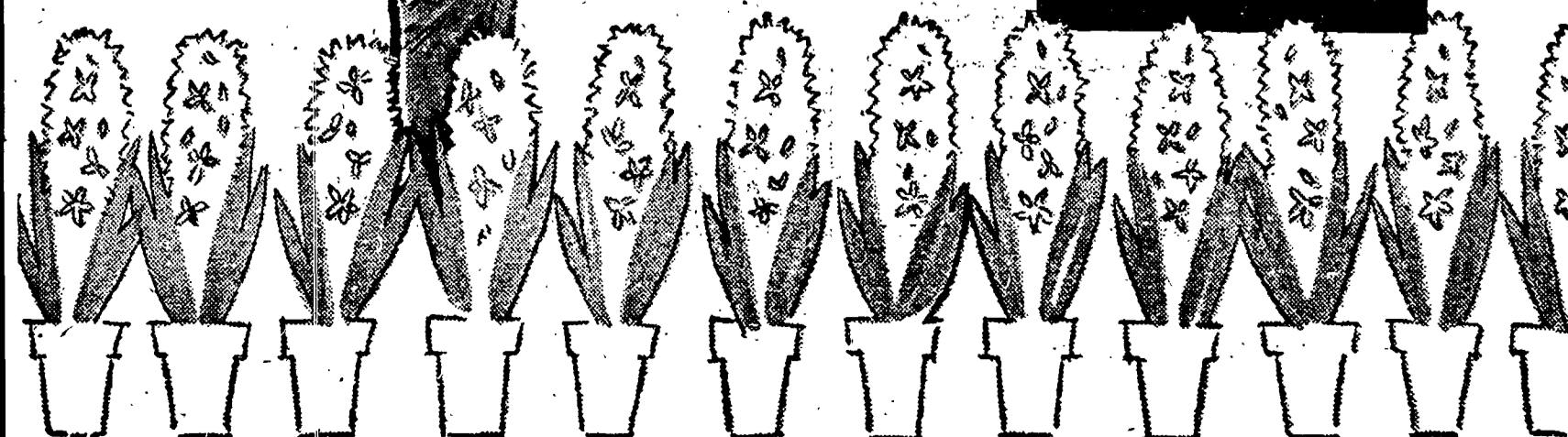

Special Homemakers' Class Planned for Heart Patients

Free classes in work-simplification techniques, to teach homemakers in Grosse Pointe to do their daily housework simpler and easier with less strain on their hearts, will be offered at the Department of Community Services, 43 Grosse Pointe boulevard, starting Tuesday, April 10.

The series is financed and sponsored by the Michigan Heart Association working in co-operation with the Department of Community Service, according to E. A. Irvin, M.D., president of the Michigan Heart Association.

The announcement is of special importance to all women who are incapacitated or disabled by heart disease; high

blood pressure, arteriosclerosis, rheumatic heart, varicose veins, coronary heart, etc.

"Most homemakers can enjoy the luxury of extra time and energy that results from finding better and easier ways of doing things," Dr. Irvin stated, "but for the homemaker with heart disease, the saving of time and energy is an absolute necessity."

The work-simplification classes, which are a free community service of the Michigan Heart Association, are designed to fill the doctor's prescription of "take it easy" by showing the homemaker how to save as much as 75 per cent of her walking, 75 per cent of her moving and 60 per cent of her reaching. This tremendous saving of time and energy means lessening the strain placed on the heart by reducing the physical effort expended by the homemaker.

Mrs. Hannah R. Pretzer of the Wayne University Home Economics Department conducts the classes. She emphasizes that the classes are designed to benefit any economic level and that it is not necessary to remodel a home in order to conserve the homemakers time and energy.

"A homemaker can learn to 'take it easy' while doing her various household tasks," Mrs. Pretzer said, "by merely following the work-simplification techniques, principles, and ideas taught in the classes."

The course is available to every woman in Grosse Pointe, although those with a heart or blood vessel ailment will be given first listing. Homemakers may register for the free classes by writing or calling the Department of Community Services, 43 Grosse Pointe boulevard, TUxedo 5-3808.

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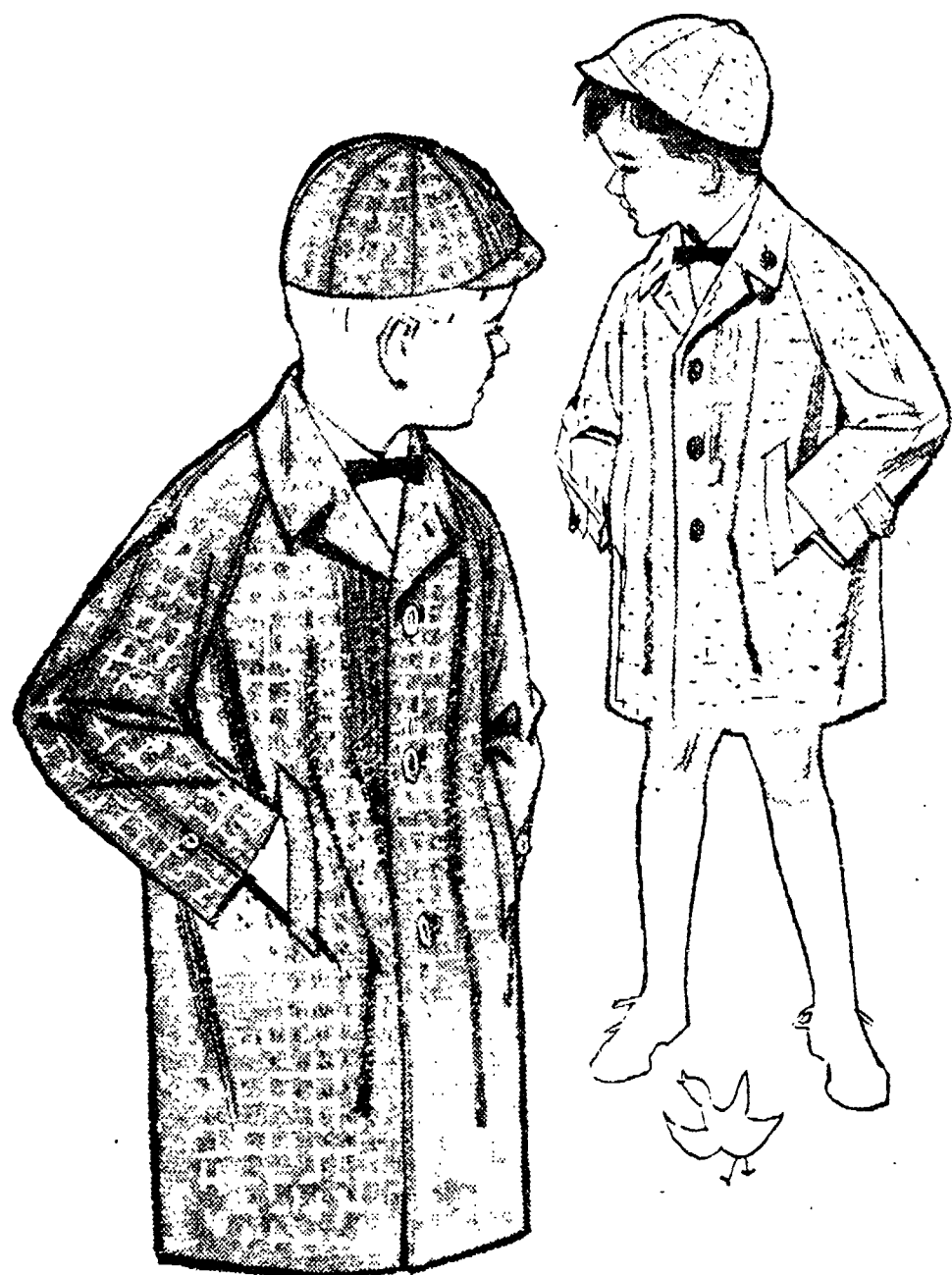

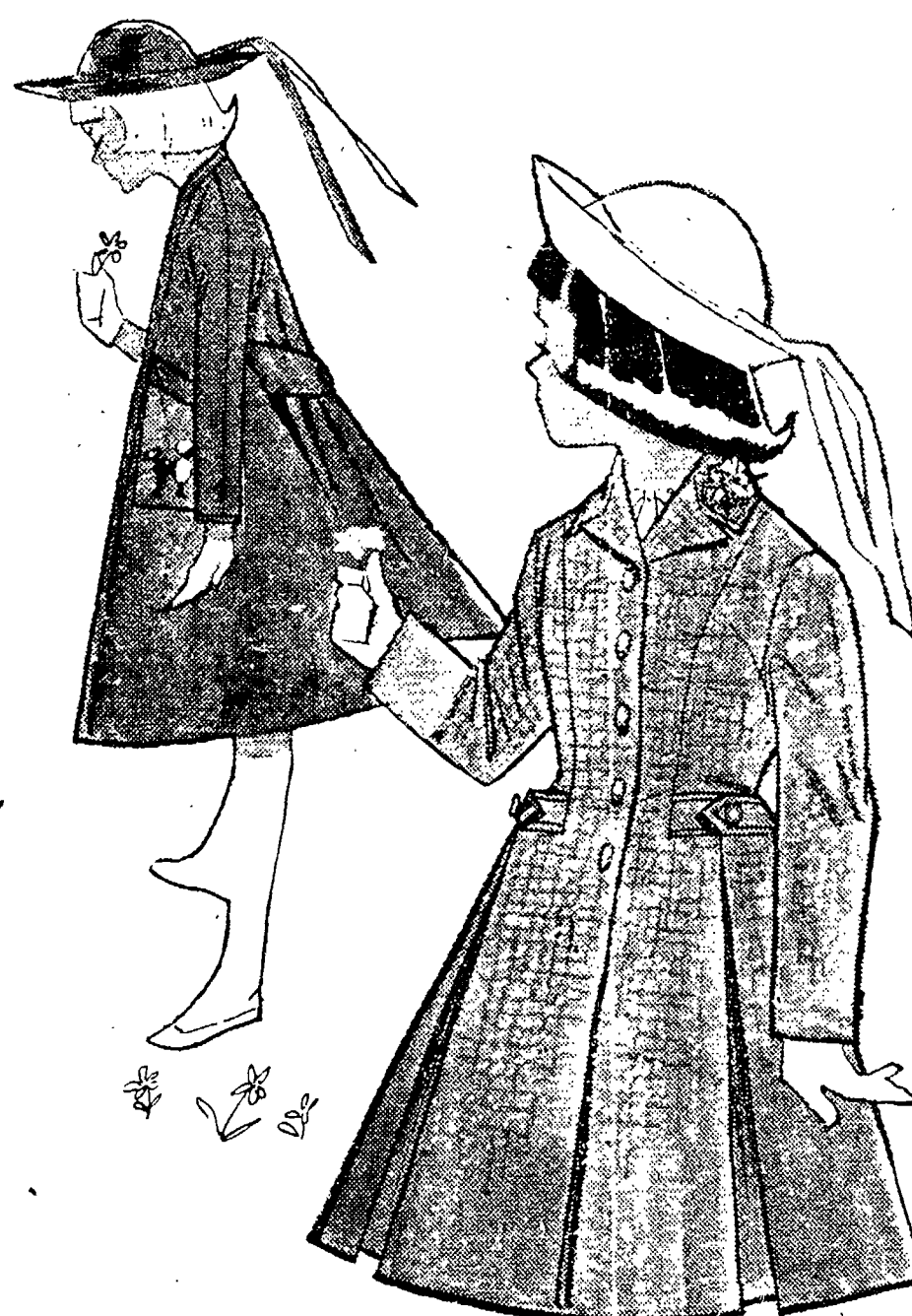

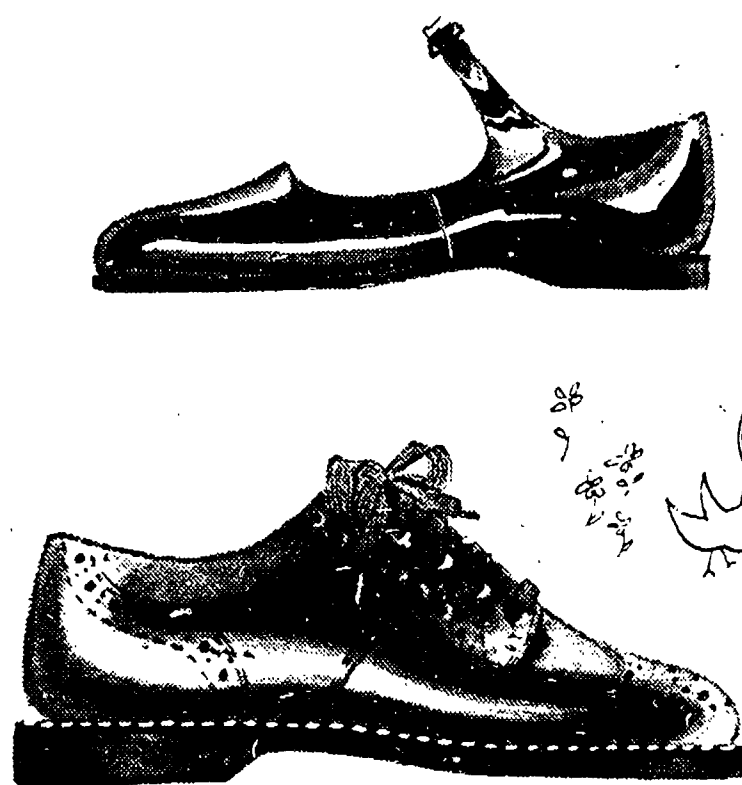

Food Scoops For This Week

The wholesale prices of beef and pork are only slightly above levels of OPA days. This should keep pork and beef in the front line of top food buys, and make them popular candidates for the home freezer right now.

"Buy Big" if you want to save money on beef. For example, if you ordinarily like a three-rib roast of beef, this week buy a roast big enough to include four or five ribs, and have the butcher cut off a few steaks. The steaks cut off a "U.S. Choice" rib roast will broil just as well as steaks out of the loin and you've saved around twenty cents a pound compared to costs on loin steaks.

Rolled boneless rump roasts are being featured in many Detroit stores. Chuck roast cuts are thrifty choices and tops in flavor. The blade cut is the least expensive, but because of the higher proportion of meat to bone and fat, the arm cut gives more serving per pound, making both cuts of equal cost when figured on a cost-per-serving basis.

Economical ground beef, carefully wrapped for freezer storage, is a wise choice for the family that uses it three or four times a week.

Pork loin prices remain good buys in the Detroit stores, the rib end is priced about 10 cents lower than the loin end. Economical hams that have been partially cooked for quick heating or the properly prepared cook-at-home type hams need no sauce to accent the flavor, but cherry, orange, pineapple, or blended fruit sauces are good flavor companions.

Modern methods of production make lamb a year round meat, but meat men inform us that the genuine "Spring lamb," symbolic of Easter, will not arrive in local markets before April 1st. A full leg of lamb may be too large for some families, so many markets cut off the sirloin section to make a small roast or several sirloin steaks.

All lamb cuts are good quality and prices should remain the same until June. The mark of an expert is to serve hot lamb on hot plates.

Fish is a wise choice for meatless days; it contains the same kind and amount of protein found in meat. March 1st meant the opening of the lakes for commercial fishing, so this week you'll notice fresh smelt, bass, whitefish, and pickerel coming to market. Prices on fresh and frozen fish vary widely, so if time permits, shop before you buy.

It takes a gallon of milk to make a pound of natural cheddar cheese. Cheddar cheese prices range from 40 to 80 cents with the higher priced cheese usually aged for a longer period. When cooking cheddar cheese, use low temperatures for prolonged or high heat causes stringiness.

Cheese Pork-Burgers
1 lb. pork sausage links
2 T. butter or shortening
2 T. sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup American cheese—freshly grated and lightly measured.
3 large English muffins
1 cup warm milk
How to prepare cheese sauce: Melt butter, add flour and mix until smooth, add warm milk slowly, cook over low flame until thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Add grated cheese and salt and continue to cook for several minutes or until cheese is fully melted and sauce is smooth. If sauce is too thick, add more milk.

Fry pork sausage links until done. Split English muffins in halves and toast. Spread toasted muffins with butter. Place 2 pork sausages on top of each muffin. Pour two or three T. cheese sauce over pork sausages. Sprinkle paprika over sauce and serve at once. Serves about 6.

The National Safety Council has announced that General Motors had earned its "Award of Honor" for outstanding safety performance in 1955. Last year's achievement set an all-time safety record for the company. Presentation of the Council's highest award marks the eleventh time during the past 14 years that General Motors has received this recognition for its safety practices, it was announced.

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Civil Defense Officials Adopt New Point of View

The Grosse Pointe Area Council of Civil Defense has gone on record as heartily concurring with a new point of view which had already been endorsed by national and state Civil Defense officials.

The new attitude is explained in Informational Letter 113 sent out recently by the Michigan Office of Civil Defense. The subject is referred to as "The New Look in Civil Defense." The letter's contents follow.

"For some years, the generally accepted approach to civil defense has been predicated more or less upon an emotional appeal to the people—an appeal that placed heavy emphasis on the threat or potential threat to this country.

Some time ago, President Eisenhower observed 'One thing that worries me is that we discuss civil defense with the public on the basis of fear. People seem to feel that the only way we can get an aroused American public is by frightening them as to what the dangers are.' And he said, 'I frankly don't agree that that is the basic approach we want to use on this.'

"We, in the Michigan Office of Civil Defense, concur most heartily in this point of view. "The President went on to say that there are three elements to a just and lasting peace—the third of which is 'There must be a knowledge on the part of the enemy that this nation cannot be demoralized, that it cannot be panicked, that it cannot be thrown into a state of chaos by the kind of bombing that is possible under the modern warfare conditions and the use of nuclear weapons.' This third element can be realized by a strong civil defense

system—a system which can help make an attack by an aggressor so unprofitable as to deter him from attempting it."

"It is our feeling here in the Michigan Office of Civil Defense that if we approach the problems intelligently, calmly, and realistically, we can get the kind of cooperation that is essential if our program is to succeed.

"A recent FCDA publication said:—
1. When a problem or a threat, looms so overwhelmingly that it seems to have no answer, the human mind tends to reject it and take refuge in escapism. The ability to reason or to take corrective action becomes paralyzed.

2. This, we believe, has been the basic reason for the refusal of many people to face up to the problem of civil defense, particularly at the local level. It is, perhaps, the explanation for the so-called apathy of large sections of the public much of the time, not only in this country but abroad.

3. It is simply that acceptance of civil defense, with all the personal sacrifice and inconvenience that goes with it, has meant acceptance of the reality of a threat so tremendous, so horrible, that there has seemed no defense against it.

4. If we were merely to give the people the facts on the threat they face, without any information on what they can do about it, we would run the risk of indulging in sensationalism and scare copy. This, in our view, would be indefensible. Worse, it would tend to create the very apathy we are trying to avoid by posing problems of life and death without a solution.

5. That is why FCDA policy on the release of information, on new hazards of modern warfare has invariably been to keep the facts in perspective—balancing a frank description of the threat with at least an outline of the measures which can be taken against it."

Lieut. Henry DeClerck Attends Fire School

Lieutenant Henry DeClerck of the Park Fire Department was among the visiting firemen at the University of Michigan March 13-15.

The delegates attended the annual fire inspectors conference sponsored by the University Extension Service and the Michigan Office of Vocational Education. Teaching arson detection and improved civil defense methods were among the topics discussed.

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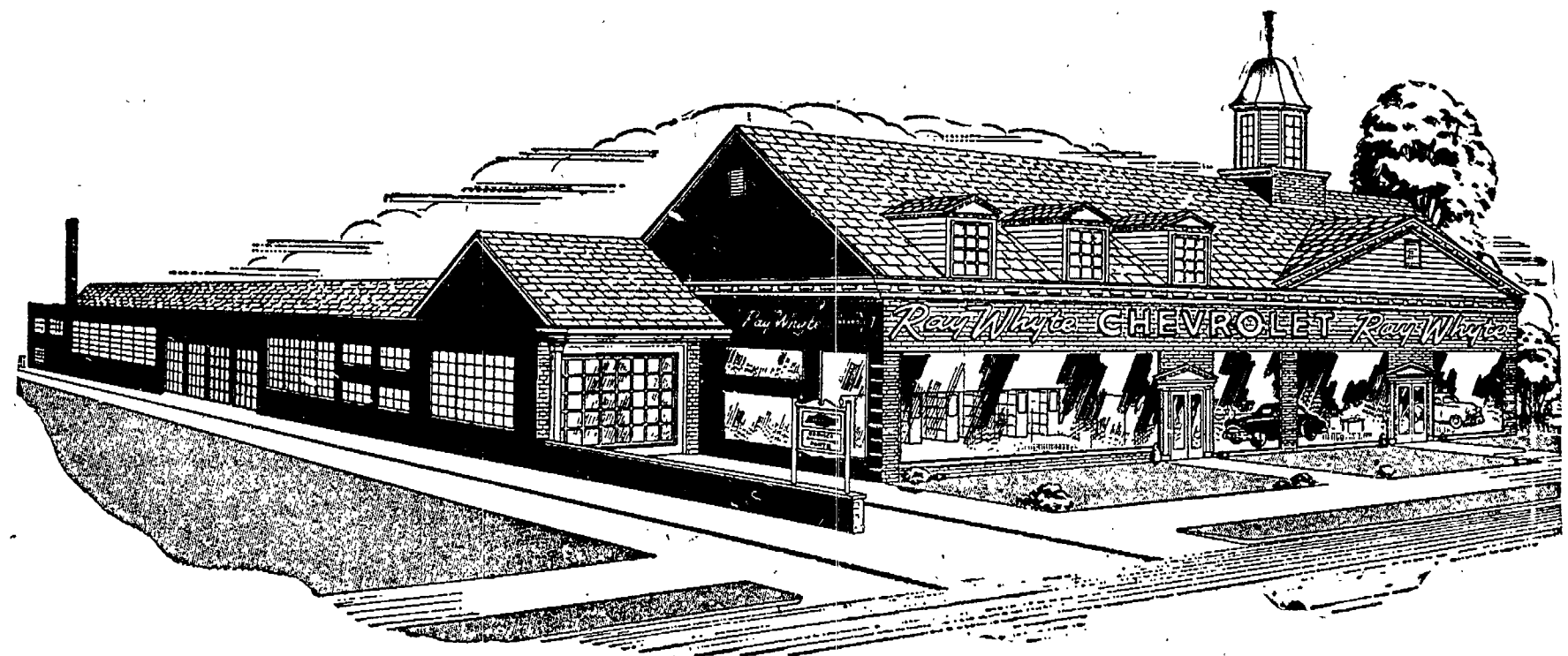

School Children Organize Fight

Michigan school children have been enlisted in a war against an old enemy—cold weather. Dr. Clair Taylor, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, said that public school students launched their attack March 19, the beginning of "Bundle Week" in Michigan.

They will collect good, clean clothing for needy youngsters in isolated rural mountains of the Southern United States and on the Navajo Indian Reservation.

Dr. Taylor has written to local superintendents through the state asking them to cooperate in the 1955-56 Bundle Week, the 14th Annual Clothing Crusade of Save the Children Federation. The Federation is an international child service agency that helps underprivileged boys and girls overseas as well as in America.

Much of the clothing collected in this year's drives will be used here in this country. The remainder is either sent to the poor in Europe or Korea or stockpiled for use during emergencies. Save the Children Federation has rushed large amounts of clothing to victims of floods, earthquakes, fires, and storms in the past. Over the past three years, SFC has shipped more than 2,000,000 pounds to Korea alone.

Dr. Taylor recalled previous years in which Save the Children Federation has held clothing drives in Michigan. "Michigan has taken part in several earlier Bundle Weeks," he said. "In the last two years Michigan school children collected some 400,000 pounds of used clothing for youngsters less fortunate than themselves."

"Save the Children Federation reduces what would otherwise be a herculean task to an easy routine for schools," he continued. "The Federation supplies everything needed, from circulars for students and information for teachers to free shipping and complete publicity kits. Experience has proved this to be an excellent project for promoting an awareness of the needs of others—as well as providing much needed suits and dresses and coats for shivering children."

The Federation was founded in 1932 and has national headquarters at 345 East 46th Street,

New York City. Among its national sponsors are Miss Faith Baldwin, Raymond E. Baldwin, Mrs. Sherwood Eddy, Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Herbert Hoover, Henry R. Luce, Sen. H. Alexander Smith, the Rt. Rev. Henry St. G. Tucker, and Thomas J. Watson.

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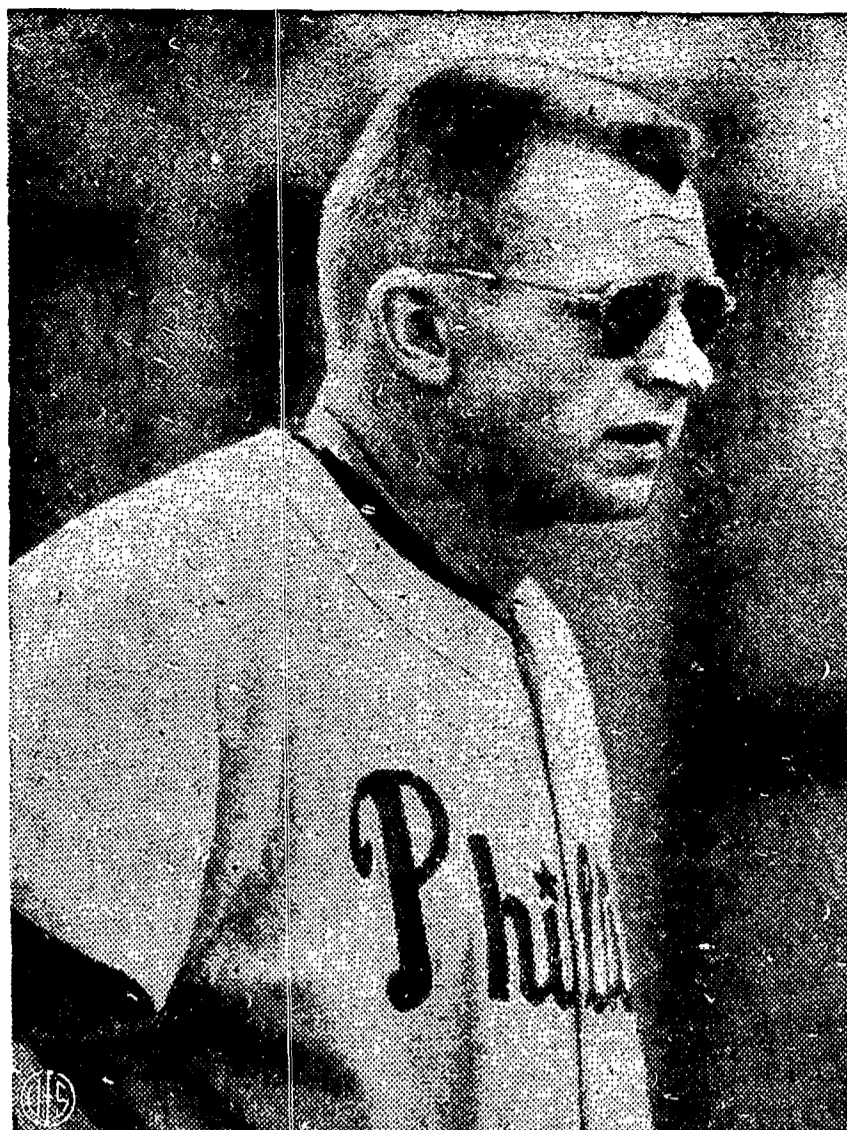
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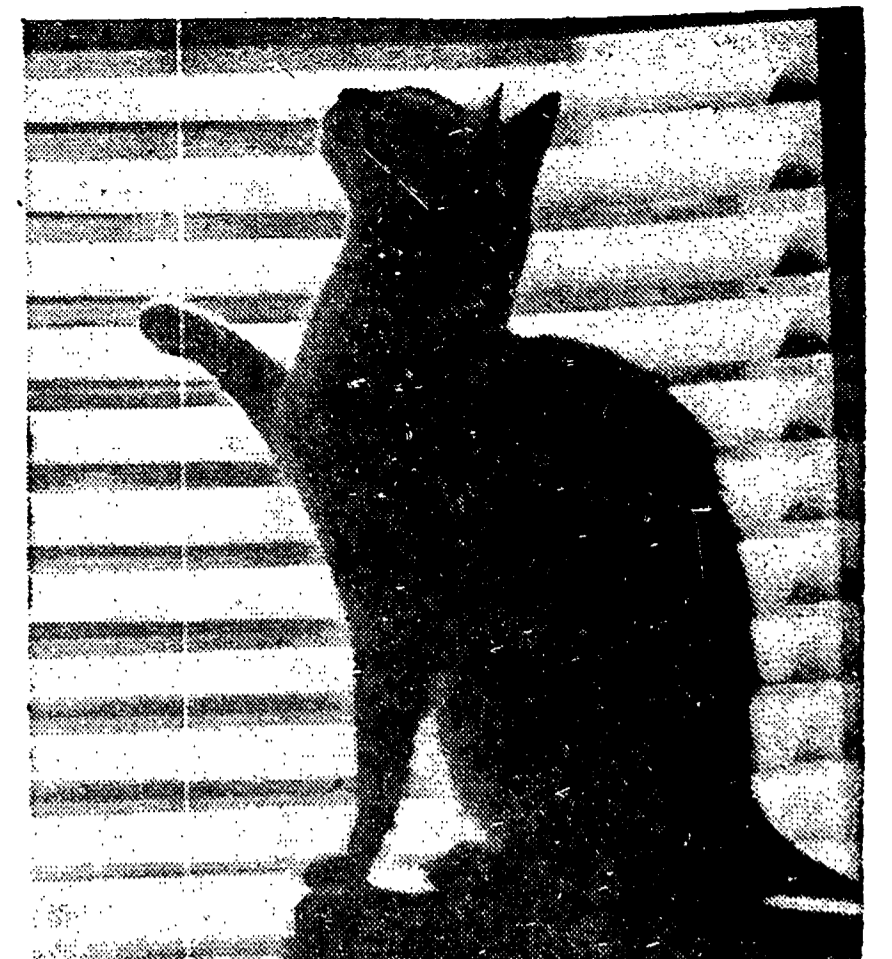

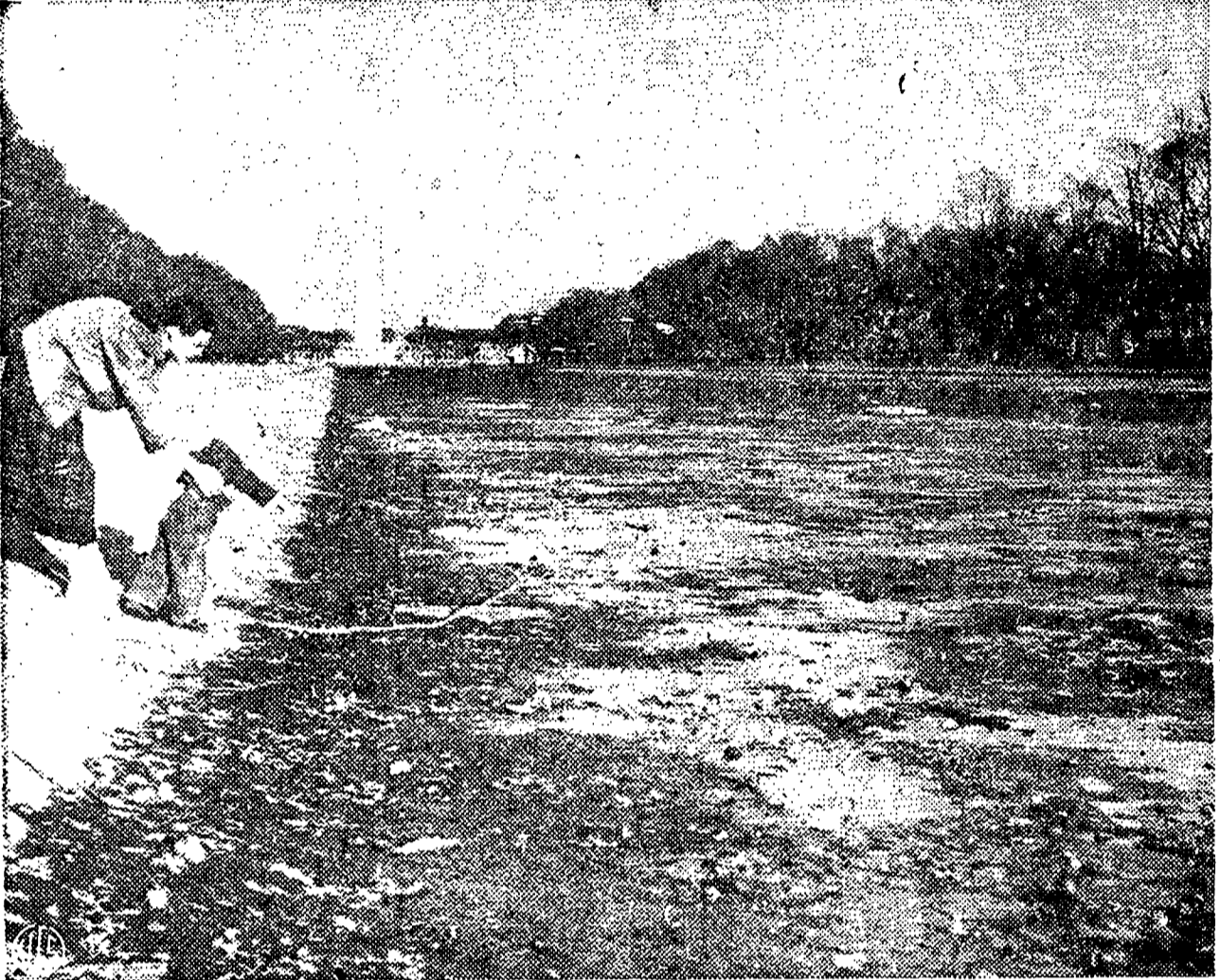

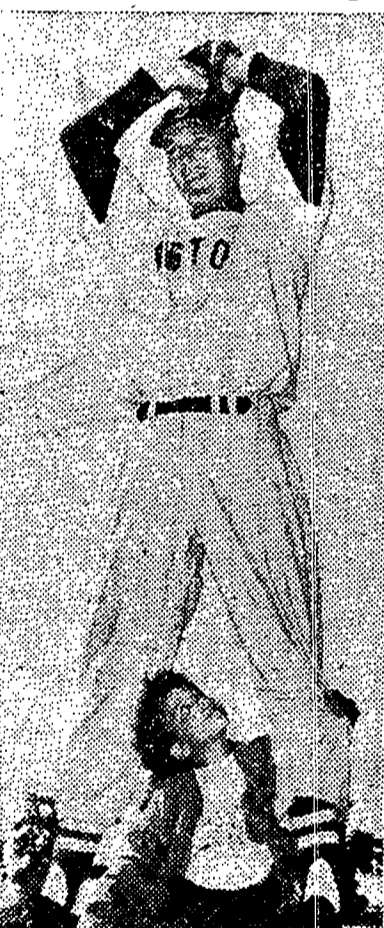

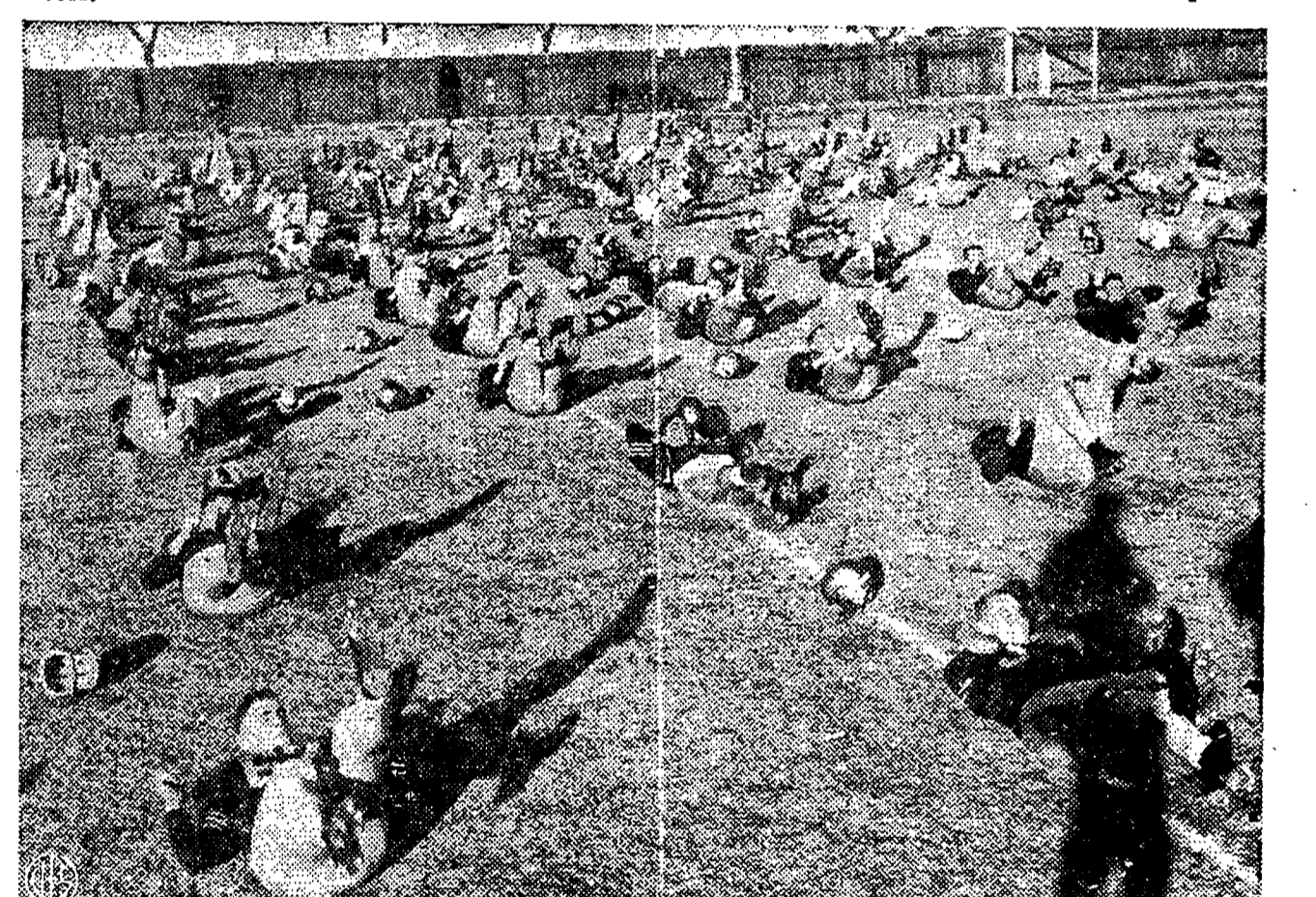

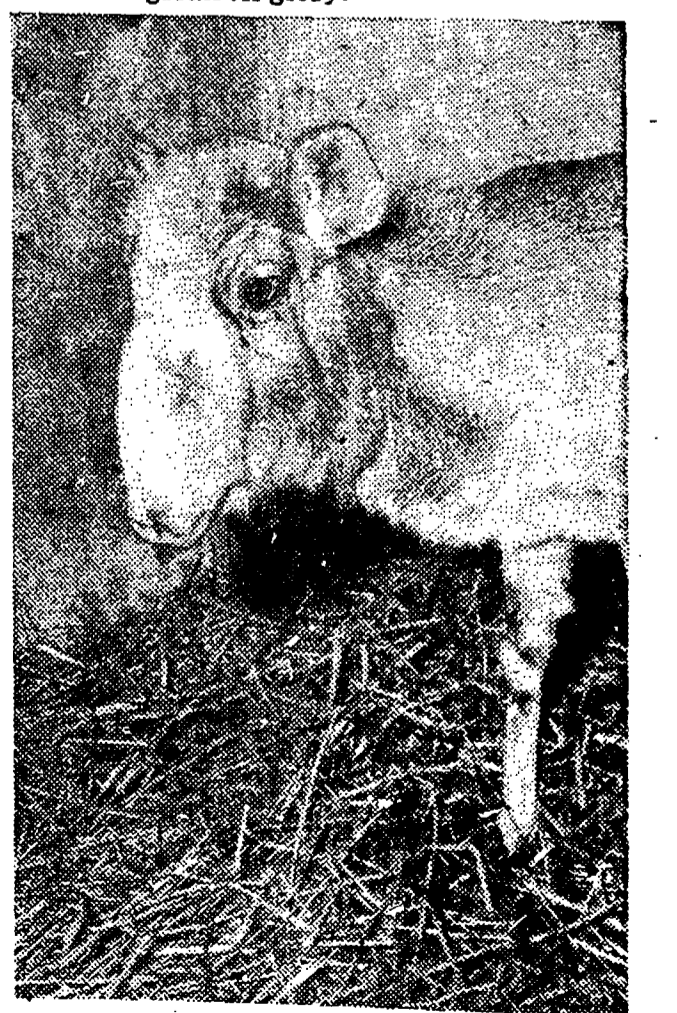
