Thanks Are in Order

The Pointe owes a great big vote of thanks to the Detroit Federation of Musicians, John B. Ford, Jr., and the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association. They teamed up to give the community a delightful concert by the full Detroit Symphony Orchestra on the Center lawn last Sunday afternoon.

It is estimated that more than 3,000 residents turned out for the event. At least 2,000 gathered on the Center lawn. Seats had been set up for 1,500, but hundreds of others made themselves comfortable on the grass and wide steps and crowded the pergola. Many heard the concert from boats which pulled into the sea wall, and others took up vantage points on the properties on both sides of the Center.

There was no charge to the public. This was made possible by the fact that the Detroit Federation of Musicians donated \$1,500; Mr. Ford personally gave \$1,000, and the War Memorial Association appropriated \$500. The combination made possible this gift to the community which will long be remembered by those who were present.

The contribution of Mr. Ford is just one more of the many reasons he has earned the title of "Mr. Symphony." His efforts and personal sacrifices to rejuvenate the Detroit Symphony Orchestra after it appeared to be a lost cause, have been well publicized. Largely through him has the orchestra now been elevated to an envied position among the great musical organizations of the world.
