BRITISH AND FRENCH forces are reported poised and ready for action on the Isle of Cyprus, as talks on the Suez Canal appear to be failing. A source close to the Egyptian Government said the fivepower mission presenting a plan to internationalize the canal has failed to reach any agreement with Egyptian President Nasser.

The informant said that only intervention by the United States can prevent the British and French from using force. The source also said that the five-power mission headed by Australian Prime Minister Robert Menzies, lacks sufficient power to go beyond terms of the proposal American Secretary of State Dulles presented to the 22-nation Suez conference



The Park's fire loss during the fiscal year 1955-56 was 57 cents per capita, according to an annual fire report submitted by Fire Chief George deCaussin.

The report, read to the Park council by City Manager Everitt B. Lane or Monday, September 10, revealed the city's fire loss amounted to \$5,190 to homes, and \$2,849.12 to the contents in these homes, which the chief described as "very nominal."

It was also revealed that fire and contents loss in mercantile buildings was exceptionally low. being \$94.50 and \$19.50, respec-

The following preamble and resolution was offered by Councilman Pongrace and supported by Councilman Kenower.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Grosse Pointe County of Wayne, Michigan, deems it necessary to acquire and construct improvements to the Major and Local Streets in the

City consisting of resurfacing the following streets: East ½ of Cadieux Road from Jefferson to Mack; Notre Dame from Mack to Kercheval, Notre Dame from St. Paul to Caroline; Kercheval Place from Cadieux to Notre Dame; Neff Road from Kercheval to Mack; Lakeland Avenue from St. Paul to N. of Charlevoix; Rivard Boulevard from Waterloo to Mack; Roosevelt Place from Jefferson to Maumee; Washington Road from Charles to Waterloo: Lincoln Road from Jefferson to N. of Maumee: Kercheval Avenue from Cadieux to Fisher; Lakeland Avenue from Lake St. Clair to Jefferson;

AND WHEREAS, the City Council estimates the cost of funds of the City of Grosse Pointe; and it is hereby certified and said improvements, including financial and legal expenses in recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done, connection with the issuance of the bonds to be One Hundred Forty Thousand (\$140,000.00) Dollars;

AND WHEREAS, the City is authorized to expend Motor Vehicle Highway Funds allocated to it under the provisions of and that the total indebtedness of said City, including the series Section 13 of Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, as amended, of bonds of which this is one, does not exceed any constitutional, for the foregoing purposes;

AND WHEREAS, the City Council deems it to be in the best interest of the City to finance part of the cost of said improvements by borrowing the sum of \$130,000.00 and issuing bonds of the City therefor, pursuant to the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, the balance of the cost thereof to be defrayed from funds on hand and legally available for such pur-

AND WHEREAS, the revenues received by the City of Grosse Pointe from the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund pursuant to Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, as amended, in the five (5) years preceding the contemplated borrowing are more than sufficient to comply with all the requirements specified in Section 4 of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952.

#### NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The plans and estimates of cost of the improvements as set forth in the preamble hereto are hereby approved and adopted. 2. The period of usefulness of said improvements set forth in the preamble hereto is estimated to be not less than twenty

3. The City Council of the City of Grosse Pointe hereby determines to borrow the sum of \$130,000.00 and issue bonds of the City therefor pursuant to the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, for the purpose of providing funds to pay

4. Said bonds shall be designated 1956 MOTOR VEHICLE HIGHWAY FUND BONDS and shall consist of one hundred thirty (130) bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 130, both inclusive, dated as of November 1, 1956, and payable serially as

\$6,000.00 November 1st of each of the years 1957 and 1958; \$7,000.00 November 1st of each of the years 1959 and 1960; \$8,000.00 November 1st of each year from 1961 to 1963, both

\$9,000.00 November 1st of each year from 1964 to 1966, both

\$10,000.00 November 1st of each of the years 1967 and 1968;

\$11,000.00 November 1st of each year from 1969 to 1971, both Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate or rates not ex-

ceeding four (4%) per cent per annum, payable on May 1, 1957, and semi-annually thereafter on November 1st and May 1st of each year. Both principal and interest shall be payable at a bank or trust company to be designated by the purchaser of the bonds. Bonds numbered 1 to 97, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1957 to 1968, both inclusive, shall not be subject to redemp-

Bonds numbered 98 to 130, both inclusive, maturing in the years 1969 to 1971, both inclusive, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity, at the option of the City, in inverse numerical order, on any interest payment date on or after November 1, 1966, at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption

\$30.00 on each bond called for redemption prior to Novem-

\$20.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after November 1, 1968, but prior to November 1, 1969; \$10.00 on each bond called for redemption on or after

November 1, 1969, but prior to maturity of the bond. Notice of redemption shall be given to holders of bonds to be redeemed by publication of such notice at least once not less than thirty days before the date fixed for redemption in a newspaper circulated in the State of Michigan which carries, as part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. No further interest shall accrue on bonds called for redemption after the date fixed for redemption provided the City has money available for such redemption with the paying agent.

5. For the purpose of providing moneys to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds herein authorized, and in accordance with the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, there is hereby made an irrevocable appropriation of the amount necessary to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds herein authorized from the moneys to be derived from State-collected taxes returned to the City of Grosse Pointe for highway purposes, pursuant to law, and the Treasurer of the City of Grosse Pointe is hereby directed, during each year that any of the principal of and interest on the indebtedness herein authorized remains outstanding and unpaid, to set aside in a separate depositary account, to be designated 1956 MOTOR VEHICLE HIGHWAY FUND BOND DEBT RETIREMENT FUND, sufficient moneys from revenues received during each such year from the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund pursuant to law to pay the principal of and interest on the installment of such indebtedness next

6. Pursuant to the authorization of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, and as additional security for the prompt payment of the principal and interest on the bonds herein authorized, there is hereby irrevocably pledged the full faith and credit of the City of Grosse Pointe.

½ c. water 6 eggs, beaten separately

¼ t. salt 1 c. Henkel's cake flour 1 t. cream of tartar

1 t. orange extract Boil sugar and water until it threads when dropped from spoon. Four hot syrup in fine stream over beaten egg whites to which salt has been added.

Beat mixture until cool. Add egg yolks, one at a time. Blend in flour and cream of tartar, then orange flavoring. Bake one hour slowly at 300° in angel food cake pan.

Suggestions: use regular wire egg beater to get air into the batter, rather than an electric mixer. Ice with butter cream
