He said their efforts have | \$1,400. failed to hinder Egypt's operation of the canal without the aid of foreign technicians.


Monday, September 17 THE UNITED STATES offered to loan its allies a half billion dollars to finance detouring of ships around the Suez Canal, if Egypt bars their ships, with non-Egyptian pilots aboard, passage through the waterway. It seems likely that the Egyptian government will not permit members of the "users association," formed by the U.S. and its friends, the use of the canal. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will inform the leaders of the 18nation conference in London of this country's offer.

School Board Lets Bids for Junior High and New Pool

Construction to Start Immediately; First Bids All Rejected Because Costs Were Far Above Architect's Estimates

At the Grosse Pointe Board of Education meeting Wednesday night, September 12, contracts were let for the new Junior High School and a swimming pool at the Parcells Junior High School.

The announcement was made by Robert F. Weber, president of the board. Contract for the pool at the Pierce Junior High School was let on September Enrollment 5 and work has already begun Sets Record

To Start Immediately

Construction on the new junior high and the Parcells pool will get underway immediately. Contract for renovating the high school heating system has not yet been let as the original bid was considered too high and was turned down.

Including architects fees and other complementary expenses, to total sum of these three contracts is \$3,387,541.90. On January 24, 1956, the voters of Grosse Pointe authorized the board to spend \$3,475,000 for a new junior high school to be built on its site on Chalfonte for swimming pools at Pierce and Parcells and for renovating the high school heating plant. The balance of \$87,458.10 can be used for the high school

First Bids Too High "We are glad to be able to make this announcement," Mr. Weber stated "but we had a

number of problems to solve before we could do it. 'We first got bids on the new junior high school on July 2. They were too high and we had to turn them down and work out some savings so we could operate within our budget. Not being able to accept this contract was a great disappoint-(Continued on Page 2)

Because this concentration is considered hazardous by the P.H.S. it is now being reduced to 1 ppm.


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With school bells ringing out again this week bringing an end to the summer vacation, a familiar warning—"Watch Out | time or money. for Kids"—was sounded by traffic safety authorities to motorists using Detroit streets.

Lieut. Reyniear Staats, in charge of the Detroit Police Department Traffic Safety Bureau, urged drivers to be parwhen driving near schools or on residential streets the children gredient. may use on their way to and from school. He also asked parschool and the police.

"This is the safest route for the owner. children to take," he said. "The routes skirt heavily-travelled streets wherever possible. When tersections are always controlled, either by an adult school-crossing guard or a safety patrol boy, or in some cases by a police officer."

Lieutenant Staats advised parents to take their children starting kindergarten or in the first few grades over this route the first couple of days of school, pointing out to them exactly the way they should travel.

"This gives the youngster a more secure sense of what is expected of him," he said. "It is instruction and interest of this discards and keep its produckind on the part of parents that will prevent accidents to their children." Too often with the start of

school, traffic accidents involving children increase sharply, he said. With the proper alertness and caution by drivers and instruction by parents this kind of tragedy can be averted. Figures released by Lieuten-

ant Staats' bureau showed that an intensive educational program paid off last year. Accidents involving school children were 12 per cent lower during the 1955-56 school year than during the 1954-55 year. There were 112 fewer child accidents last year than the preceding
