Thursday, November 8

TAGEND RETURNS of Tuesday's election showed that President Eisenhower gained a mighty personal victory, but his party did not gain control of Congress. The electorate went on a historic vote-splitting spree which gave the Democrats thin margins of control of both the Senate and the House, making it a certainty that they would maintain their present 49-47 Senate majority, and 228 seats in the House.

The House majority is 218. This marks for the first time in more than a century, since 1848, that a presidential winner did not swing at least one branch of Congress with him. In Michigan, Gov. G. Mennen Williams, a Democrat, beat his opponent, Detroit's Mayor Albert E. Cobo, for the governorship, by over 287,000 votes.

HUNGARIAN PATRIOTS, fighting last-ditch battles, were reported using their last bullets on themselves as the Russian military forces overran their positions. Sources disclosed that many defenders of Budapest, capital of Hungary, took their own lives rather than surrender to Russian troops break ing through the last pocket of rebel resistance. "We have neither guns nor ing message in Pecs. "Blood alone is not enough." At Gyoer, however, which is northwest of the Hungarian capital, bitter fighting is still going on. The Russians were reported to have thrown 300 tanks against the 14,000 men defending that city.

Friday, November 9

SILENCE REIGNED over the Middle East battle fronts and the United Nations is hurriedly readying its international police force to neutralize and hold the Suez Canal. The cease-fire went into effect yesterday afternoon. On the diplomatic fronts, Israel, Britain and France, all now occupying parts of Egypt, pledged to leave when the police force arrives to take over.

Manpower from such nations as the United States, Russia, Britain and France, are barred from the international force. If all goes well, the police force will keep the canal under international control until a solution the three occupying forces to agree to a withdrawal.

WASHINGTON diplomats are worried that Poland might be the next victim of Russian might. # By Unknown Assailant

Suffers Internal Injuries and Needs 30 Stitches to Close Face Wounds After Attack

A Detroit man was so severely beaten about the face and body on Tuesday, November 6, that he required medical attention.

Leon Byse, 4861 Berkshire, could give Park police no reason for an unprovoked attack by an unknown man who beat and kicked him about the face and body, causing him to suffer multiple cuts about the face and internal injuries.

## Taken to Hospital

Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers said that Byse was taken to Bon Secours Hospital by police ambulance, where about 30 stitches were needed to close a number of gashes about his face, and said that 5.645. Byse suffered internal injuries as a result of the brutal beating. The chief said that Byse had gone into the Park Lounge Bar, 15016 Mack avenue, for about two minutes, to talk to the proprietor, and then left. Miss Severs came to Grosse Pointe in 1928 to direct the Wayne County Library's Grosse Pointe Branch, and under her direction the Grosse Pointe Public Library was organized in

At the time of her resignation in March, 1949, the Library's services had grown from 1,000 registered borrowers in 1928 to over 10,000, using the Main Library in the Pierce School, the City Branch in Notre Dame avenue the Farms Branch in Kerby road and the Woods Branch in Mack avenue.

Miss Severs was a member of the Grosse Pointe Honor Roll Association, and was responsible for compiling a record of the names of men and women in service during World War II. She also served on the boards of the Grosse Pointe Historical Society, the Grosse Pointe Lectures, Inc., The Friends of the Grosse Pointe Public Library, the Esther Longyear Murphy Memorial Library of the Detroit Garden Center, The Grosse Pointe Motion Picture Council, A.A.U.W., and the Michigan Library Association.

Miss Severs, a native of Iowa and graduated from the University of Washington and the New York School of Library Science, spent much of her life in the far west. She returned to Oregon upon retiring from the Grosse Pointe Public Library and spent much of her time on her fruit ranch near La Grande





Christmas Seals are now available for overseas mail and packages, Irving L. Goldman, chairman of the 50th annual Christmas Seal sale, announced

"To make it possible for friends and relatives to send a good health wish to the other side of the ocean in the form of a little green and white Christmas Seal, the stamps may be obtained now," Mr. Goldman. said. The U.S. Post Office is urging that overseas mail be sent prior to November 15.

The 1956 Christmas Seal has an overseas history. The original Christmas Seal was designed postal clerk in Denmark where the stamps were used to raise money for children with tuberculosis. A few years later the idea came to life in the United States when the first Christmas Seal sale was held in Delaware to raise money for tuberculosis victims.

Heide Brandt, Colorado Springs, Colo., designer of this year's seal, also has a Danish background, her parents being Danish. Mrs. Brandt, the mother of three sons, was returning from Europe aboard the Stocknolm when it and the Adrea Doria collided at sea. She had been studying art in Germany under a Fulbright scholarship.

"The 1956 Seals are designed to illustrate the spirit of the 50th annual Christmas Seal. Children march across each sheet of seals carrying the double-barred cross, the symbol of the fight against tuberculosis into the future. Two seals, one showing a little girl and the other an appealing little boy, both dressed in green, make up the pattern," Mr. Goldman

pointed out. "The Christmas Seal children do not look backward. There is no time to pause for cele-bration of the triumphs over TB in the past 50 years while there is still a big job ahead to bring under control this disease which creeps into our homes and robs so many of health and happiness," the

chairman said. Those wishing to obtain Christmas Seals prior to the opening of the Christmas Seal campaign on November 15 may call the Tuberculosis and Health Society, Monday through Fri-

day, at WO. 1-1697. The Christmas Seal sale in Detroit and Wayne county this year will support the tuberculosis control programs

"Call today and get your supply to send overseas. Your friends and relatives in foreign lands see a great many more tuberculosis cases than we do in the United States. They see even more than we, the terrible toll that uncontrolled TB can take in human happiness and lives. They will be glad to know that you are doing your part in its control," Mr. Goldman pointed out.

But never in our recollection has there been such a mass of controversial so-called evidence presented to the public. We admit that we have been confused and we feel not a qualm about such a state. We hear one day that this or that medical or dental association has endorsed fluoridation, and the next that this wasn't so. If the professional men can't make up their minds, what is the layman supposed to do?

It is small wonder that more than 1,000 voters who cast ballots in the election on November 6 failed to state their stand either for or against fluoridation. They were probably just plain confused.

The one thing that does seem more or less clear in the picture is that there are a great many adults who are genuinely afraid of the additive. To the best of our knowledge the advocates of fluorine can tell this group about no benefits which they could derive from its addition. Most of lengthy literature sent through the mails no matter WHAT the opponents of fluoridation argue that it is possible for it concerns. individual treatment to be given the growing youngsters for whom the great benefits are specifically intended. They object to mass medication being forced on them.

Mental disturbances can produce just as drastic results as physical ills and it is obvious that there are a great many residents who are considerably upset over the thought of either drinking fluorine in their water or having to go to the expense of buying the bottled product.

The Farms councilmen have a lot to take into consideration and the very close vote gives them little to go on. It was stipulated before the election that this ballot would be purely advisory and the council members reserved the right to make their own decision after they had sampled the opinion of the electors. With but 50 votes separating the opponents and the proponents of fluoridation, little advice has been provided the solons that they did not have before.

Another aspect that clouds the issue is the fact that it was not seen fit to ask the residents of Grosse Pointe City fo rtheir opinion. They use the same water, which is all pumped and treated by the Farms, and it would only seem fair to let them have some say on this subject. Why satisfactorily explained.

The safest bet one could make would be that whatever the Farms, council decides next Monday night, there will be howls of protest, about equally mixed with paeans of praise. The battle will probably not be finished for a long time to come.

# Face Your Fear. Advises Expert

Shocked rats are helping a psychologist at Michigan State University to demontsrate that fear is best overcome by facing the situation.

In a controlled experiment rats were found to lose their fear of being shocked electrically much faster in surroundings similar to those in which the original shock occurred. It took them more than twice as long to lose the fear in new surroundings.

"What's true of rats in this case apparently applies to humans as well," says Dr. M. Ray Denny, associate professor of psychology.

"A person frightened of public speaking or fearful of selling from door to door has to face those situations to extinguish his fears. Londoners who moved to the country to escape bombings in World War II remained scared stiff while those who stayed behind and were not harmed overcame their fear."



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




