Returning are Arley Pate, 26, of Carbondale, Ill.; and Aaron Wilson, 24, of Urania, La. Twenty minutes after they arrived in Hong Kong yesterday, they were winging their way to Seattle. Both said they had no interest in Communism or politics and just wanted to go back home to their families' farms. Whether or not they will be tried by an Army court martial was not disclosed.

ANTHONY EDEN, prime minister of Great Britain, won a vote of confidence from the House of Commons on his handling of the Suez Canal situation. However, in spite of the vote, he suffered a damaging loss of prestige. At least 15 Conservative "rebels" abstained be served to both adults and from the vote which ended two days of debate on the Govern-

ment's Suez policy. The abstention marked the most serious party defection since Neville Chamberlain fell from power following the start of World War II. The rebel strategy was to keep the party in power, but show a lack of confidence in Eden's leadership. The two-day debate was carried on without Eden, who is recuperating in Jamaica from "severe over-strain."

BRITISH AND FRENCH troop withdrawals from Egypt have stepped up, causing near panic among Port Said's European communities. The Italian and Greek consuls in that port city have asked their governments for evacuation ships to remove their nationals before the bulk of British-French troops leave within the next few days.

Task force headquarters said that 1,853 British troops have already left for England aboard a troopship, followed by another which carried 2,000 men. Another ship is being loaded for departure within the next day or two. The number of French troops already left, or ready to leave, has not been disclosed.

It was so convenient to put a car on the boat in the late afternoon, sail down the river and out into Lake Erie in the twilight, have a good dinner on board, get a fine night's sleep and awaken in Buffalo with 275 miles of the trip already accomplished.

There were always loads of friends on board and whole family groups, vacation-bound or returning home, were a dime a dozen. The baggage room generally held half a dozen pooches. The kids and their nurses would make frequent trips to this important rendezvous to check on their pets, and the reunion at debarkation time in the morning was a howling, barking, whimperingly joyous event.

In the early days there were batteries of slot machines, and there was always dancing in the dining room after dinner. There were moonlit nights and cool breezes and plenty of deck chairs, and always there was the thrill of watching the big motors churn the gigantic paddle wheels.

As we remember, in those days of the early 30s, it cost but \$6.00 to take a car from Detroit to Buffalo, and the passenger fare was about the same. Staterooms were ridiculously cheap, and so were the meals. With the passing of the years these prices were all increased sharply until they reached a point where few families could afford to travel enmasse. It seemed to be a case where the steamship lines were pushed into the position of pricing themselves out of business.

Improved highways made motoring faster and easier and the boat traffic just fell off until there wasn't enough left to operate the ships at a profit. This wasn't a situation where the grand old boats had outlived their usefulness. Nor was it like the skeleton of the unfinished clipper ship that spoke in Will Carleton's poem of many years past:
