
The Real Joy of Christmas




CARE launched its 1956 holiday season Food Crusade to distribute five million \$1 packages of U.S. farm surplus, to help feed 20 million people in 19 countries. Then the Hungarian crisis arose. CARE quickly organized a \$2,-000,000 emergency drive for the victims in Hungary and the refugees fleeing to Austria.

Every \$1 sent to the Food Crusade sends a 22-pound package, in your name, to help feed four persons for one month. The recipients include refugees from South Korea, Vietnam, Hong Kong, West Berlin and Germany; needy families from Italy to Panama.

For Hungarian relief, CARE delivers \$10 standard food and various priced clothing and other supplies purchased as needed.

The hour has passed when relief can be provided by Christmas for many of these sorely stricken, but hunger and cold and privation know no seasons nor holidays. Let the real spirit of Christmas enter into our hearts and cause us to send whatever help we can afford to those who need help so badly.
