misuse of union funds entrusted to his care." He was ousted on charges based on an investigation by the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee. For the pudgy 62-year-old Beck, the dismissal is a heavy blow. His Teamsters Union is reported taking steps to oust him as president. The Teamsters boss is accused of using \$332,000 of union funds to advance his personal fortunes and of invoking the Fifth Amendment 200 times when questioned by the Senate committee.

The team managers have announced their lineups are all set and Ear Becker, league president, is anticipating an interesting and exciting season.



Following are quotations from a letter by Nancy Hubbard, born in Erie County, Pennsylvania, in 1806 and who died over 50 years later in Port Huron. She came with her family in an open boat from Painesville, O., to live on a farm in Grosse Pointe in 1811.

We came around the shore of Lake Erie and were two weeks making the trip, stopping until morning where night overtook us. We at last reached Detroit and were landed at the foot of Randolph street.

My father moved to Grosse Pointe in time to put in fall crops. He rented a farm joining Joseph Ellair on the south, and Grant's on the north. In the winter my father took ill, and a sickness of one week terminated his life on earth. He was taken from our sight, and his remains now rest in Grant's orchard on the banks of Lake St. Clair.

Soon after that was a voice came that thrilled our hearts, saying "War is declared between Britain and America," and that dear brother volunteered for six months. He provided his own horse and was placed as a watch between Detroit and Grosse Pointe to spy the marauders of our shore and give the alarm if necessary.

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
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
