ESKIMO ARTS AND CRAFTS (33 min., color). "A man is the hunter his wife makes him," say the Eskimos of the Eastern Arctic, where in some regions the women still cure, cut, chew, and sew the skins used for clothing, footwear, the kayak, and the drums that accompany their songs and dances. Skilled craftsmen work on bone and ivory

carvings and fashion a very subtle fish spear; community rituals and recreations hint at a highly complex system of beliefs and customs.

HUNTING WITH A CAMERA (17 min.). The thrills of the chase can be recaptured time and again when hunting is done with a motion picture camera. For this film, animals, fish and water birds were "shot" to provide a living picture gallery of wildlife. A group of children, visiting a natural history museum, sits spellbound watching a passing parade of water birds, buffalo, coyotes, Rock Mountain sheep, elk, moose, caribou, beavers, bears—all photographed in their natural environment.

JASPER NATIONAL PARK (11 min., color). Two-and-a-half million acres of magnificent holiday-land await the visitor to Jasper National Park in the Canadian Rockies. Fishing, mountain-climbing and trail-riding keep the sportsman happy, while the naturalist finds delight in the animal life and the rare alpine flowers. For the vacationer who just wants to relax, the majestic mountain scenery is a constant joy.

NAVY GOES NORTH (26 min., color). The film, produced by the Royal Canadian Navy, tells of the maiden voyage of H.M.C.S. Labrador, the first Arctic patrol vessel to negotiate the Northwest Passage and circumnavigate North America.

Gerald A. Lesjack of 23321 Willard, Detroit, paid a fine and costs of \$17.50, after being found guilty of speeding on Vernier.

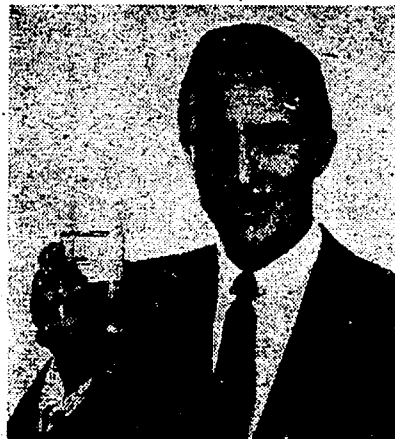

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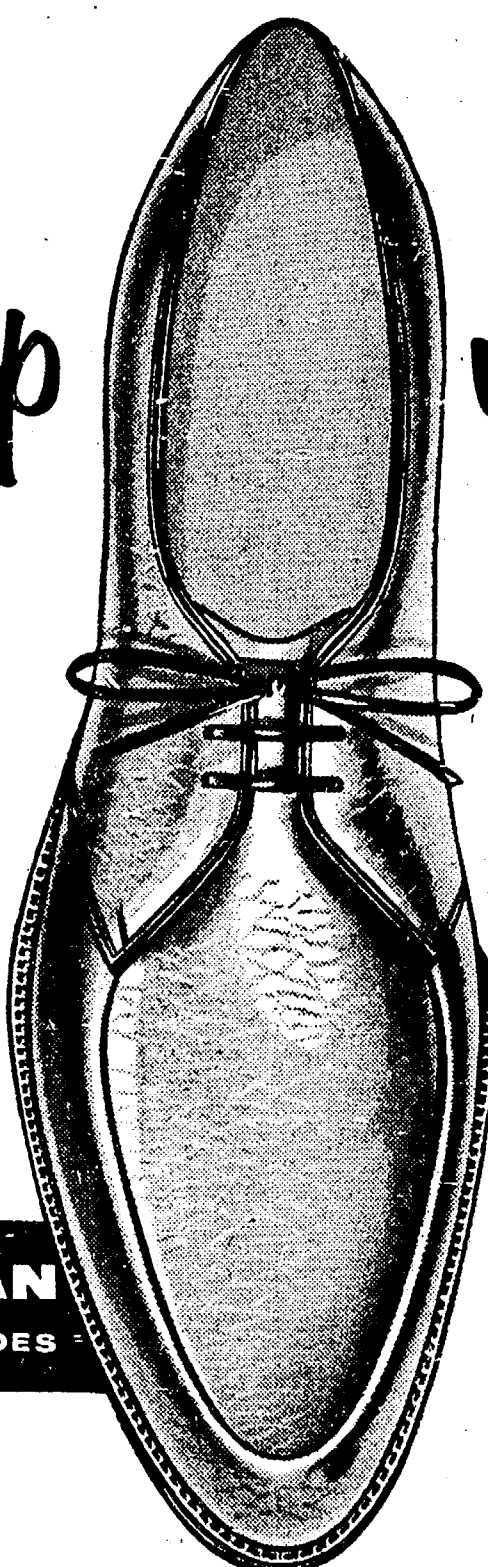
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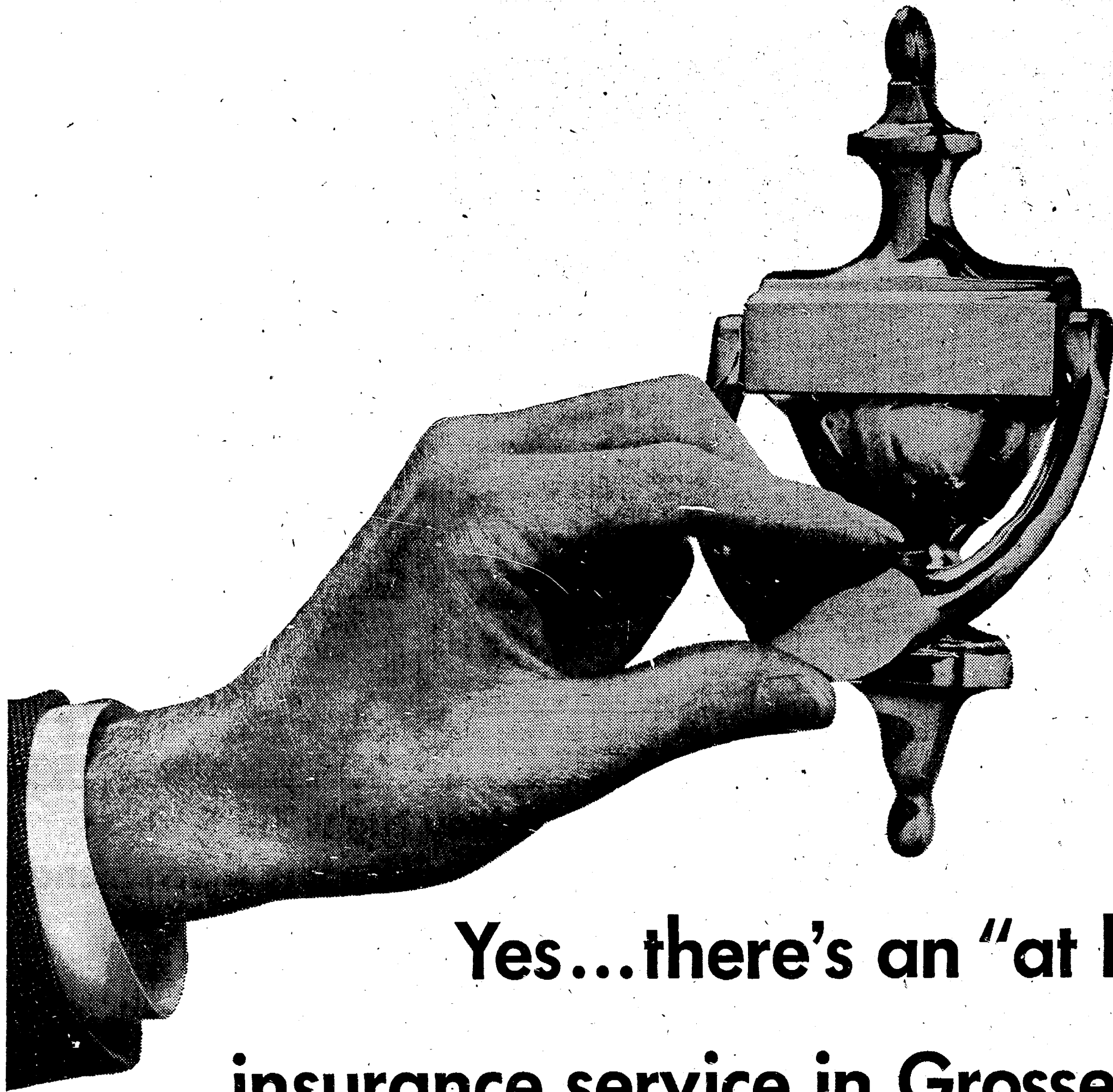

Visiting Japanese Student Offers Some Comparisons

"American kids are much more openhearted and friendly than we Japanese."

This is the view of 17-year-old Kichiro Nagai, one of this year's exchange students, from Hokkaido and Tokyo, Japan. Kichiro as he likes to be called, is spending the high school year with John Davidson, 11B, and his family.

Kichiro's five years of mandatory English have given him a good understanding of the language. At home his school subjects also include Japanese, geology, analysis I, (Algebra), geometry, Chinese sentence, analysis II, Japanese history, and athletics.

Japanese athletics include judo (wrestling), swimming, softball, soccer, touch football, and track events.

While a junior in high school in Hokkaido, Kichiro transferred to a Tokyo school where better facilities were available. There, his father is one of the 400-odd members of the Japanese Parliament.

Japan's government is made up of its main Parliament and various committees that are selected from it. These committees are similar to our Department of Agriculture or Labor.

Kichiro's father, a member of the Socialist Party, is on the merchant's committee.

In Japan, most of the high school students spend their time preparing for college entrance examinations. One out of 14 students is privileged to enter a university. Most work until 1 a.m. nightly in preparation for the exams.

College graduation is of the utmost importance to the Japanese student because the maximum monthly salary for a high school graduate is 15,000 yen or 42 dollars. A maximum of 100 dollars may be earned monthly by a student with a college education.

"The relationship between boys and girls in Japan is not as close as in America," Kichiro said. "A boy and girl are walking together and the boy's classmates see them, he will make fun of them. But, this does not always happen."

In olden days the Japanese had a proverb that boys became dominant over girls at the age of 7 years. Although it has been gradually forgotten, many students are influenced by it.

A majority of the roomers in Japan include over 50 persons. In Kichiro's school, ranked thirtieth in Japan, there are no more than 3 classes with less than fifty students.

"The relationship between students and teachers in Japan also is not as intimate as at Grosse Pointe High. Students do not talk with the teachers much. Classes are given in lecture form. If a student has a question he stands up beside his chair and addresses the teacher," said Kichiro.

Often university candidates are asked questions which are not taught in high school. Eleven students could pass the exams of the most difficult university, Tokyo University, this year. Of those only two were eligible to go directly to college. The remaining nine are required to study for one or two more years.

Kichiro is a student of Kudan High School and hopes to enter Tokyo University after a year or two more of preparation.

Three persons were injured in an accident at Charlevoix and Devonshire on Tuesday, September 17, according to a Park police report.

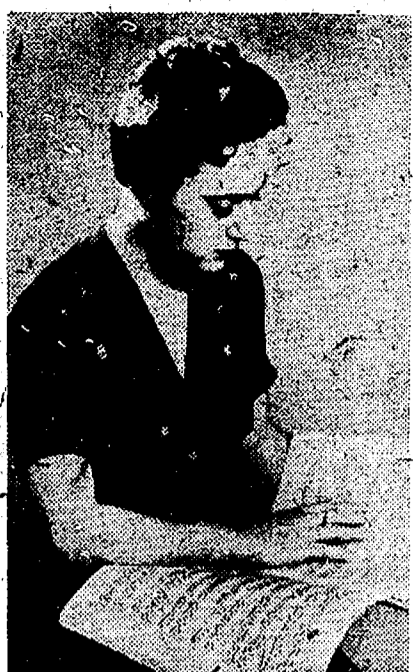

Ban Parking Following Plea

The City Council on Monday, September 16, accepted a petition signed by 20 residents of University place, then, in accordance with the petition, banned parking on one side of the street.

The petitioners asked the council to ban parking only on one side of the street because they said the street was not wide enough to allow parking on both sides.

They said the street was one of the narrowest in the Pointe, 27 feet, and it is difficult for police and fire, or other emergency vehicles to drive through.

They said they are taking into consideration, too, that a large number of children reside on the street.

The council agreed with the petitioners and banned parking on the east side of University.

Petitions Heard By City Council

About 50 residents of the City of Grosse Pointe attended a public hearing held by the council Monday night to consider two petitions which had been submitted relating to proposed real estate developments.

The first petition asked the council's permission to convert to a four-family dwelling a two-family one at 295 Rivard boulevard.

The second petition proposed the building of a 16-family terrace near the southwest corner of Mack avenue and Neff road, where a gasoline service station is soon to be erected.

Both petitions met with a storm of protests from residents who wanted no relaxing of the present zoning laws.

The council took the petitions under advisement and it appeared doubtful that either would be approved.

Teenager Guilty of Being Drunk

A 17-year-old Mt. Clemens youth was arraigned before Woods Judge Don Goodrow, on Saturday, September 21, and was found guilty of being intoxicated.

He was ordered to pay a fine of \$25, and was placed on probation for one year. The fine is to be paid within three months.

A 16-year-old Harper Woods boy who was with him on September 11, at the time of his arrest, but fled before Woods police could apprehend him, was filed against in the Wayne County Juvenile Court.

Jean Zimmerman of 26621 Beemer, Mt. Clemens, the woman the boys said purchased the liquor for them, was arraigned in Mt. Clemens (Harrison, Township) and was found guilty of furnishing alcoholic beverages to minors. She paid a fine of \$25, and was sentenced to 90 days in the Macomb County Jail. The judge suspended 89 days of the sentence,

but placed the woman on one year probation.

The Mt. Clemens boy was arrested by Woods Patrolmen Donald Sabel and William Duster when they found him very drunk and kneeling in the driveway at 2127 Hollywood. The other boy ran away on sighting

the approaching police, but later came to the Woods station voluntarily.

The 16-year-old told the police that the woman had purchased the beverages for them in Mt. Clemens, and this matter was turned over to Macomb authorities.

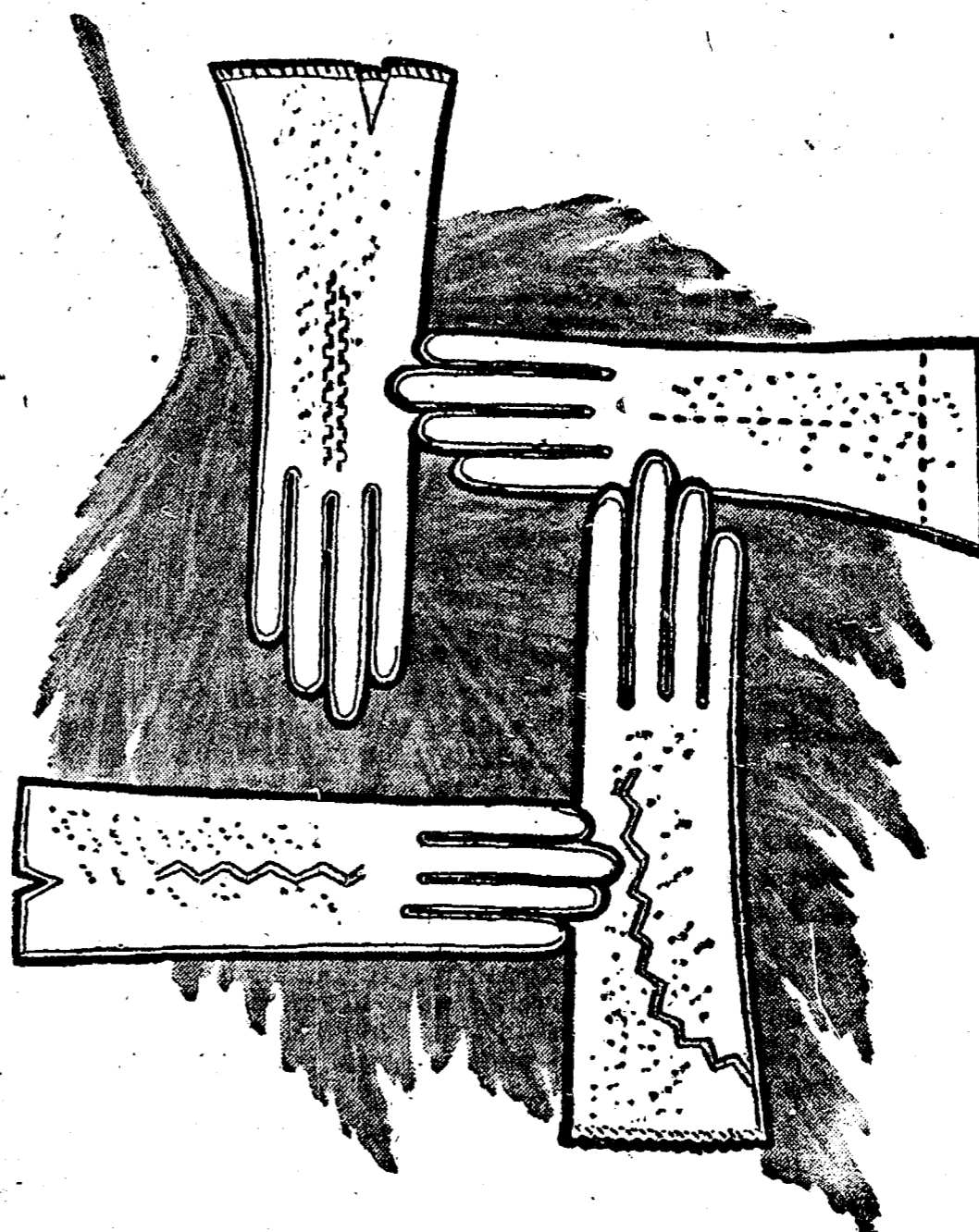

No More Cream for the Cat

We await with great interest the final disposition of the case of one Ernest Morris, well known throughout the Pointe as "The Cat Burglar."

His first criminal activity in the Pointe dates way back to 1944. He was captured in October of that year by Shores Police Officer Fred Duemling, now chief of that department.

After his capture in 1951 he was sentenced to 2 to 5 years for his offenses in the Farms, but as a parole violator it appeared automatic that he would have to serve the new sentence in addition to being incarcerated for the full unexpired term of his 5 to 15 year sentence for robberies in Detroit.

The local police and Pointe residents breathed easier when they felt that Mr. Morris was safely put away for at least 13 years. But in November, 1954, less than three years later, through some strange action on the part of the state parole board, "The Cat Burglar" was free once more.

Morris was last captured on August 27 of this year when he knocked himself out trying to escape from a home he was attempting to rob in Birmingham. He hit his head on a beam in a wild dash down a flight of stairs.

After recovering from his head injuries in a hospital, he was bound over to the Oakland County Sheriff's office under a \$5,000 bond. He was arraigned on September 10 before Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Clark J. Adams, at which time he took an about-face and claimed innocence, demanding a jury trial on the charge of breaking and entering in the night time.

Morris has been returned to the custody of the sheriff and his bond continued pending the setting of a trial date. It is to be hoped that this time the judge will pass a sentence befitting the many depredations of "The Cat Burglar," and that the parole board will not again hand him the cream off the great abundance of the milk of human kindness with which the members seem to be endowed.

Grosse Exaggerations A. PRYOR

In lieu of a poem this week OR a column, we are reprinting the following from The Gulf Stream News which stems from Riviera Beach, Florida. The editor of that paper, Lawrence J. Nunn, was kind enough to give us permission to use it.

Returning from my vacation I've been checking over happenings for the past month and see where the television networks went stark staring nuts during my absence and have established a "policy" which calls for revising Stephen Foster songs, contending that as written by the world beloved composer, they are offensive to the Negro race.

The world has been singing these time honored folk songs as they were written for a good many years and they are as dear to the hearts of the Negroes as they are to any race.

Because they are true folk songs use of the Negro terms and dialect are imperative, and it is my firm belief that any intelligent Negro would be just as bitterly opposed to any change in the lyrics as are millions of other groups.

If the networks really want to perform a public service and eliminate all that is offensive to their listeners, regardless of race, color or creed they might stop worrying about Stephen Foster songs and try listening to some of their own putrid commercials.

I don't know about you but I'm getting awfully tired of blaring television commercials that insinuate that I stink to high heaven and if I don't sprain my ankle rushing down to the drug store for some particular kind of soap, deodorant or cleanser I'll have the board of health breathing down my neck.

I am tired of being reminded that headaches are frightful things, illustrated with guys being clobbered with sledge hammers while sparks fly in every direction, or having my regularity questioned morning, noon and night while I am called upon to watch an elixir glide into a stomach, make its way into a blood stream and then gallop joyously through several miles of colon.

Maybe I've got "tired blood" but it seems that the Red Cross and Civil Defense still want all they can get of it for emergency use. If my breath stinks, it has a right to after being told in no uncertain terms 10 times a day that it does. Any breath would give up and go putrid after a few months of this type of brain washing.

Any day now I expect my hair and teeth to fall out for I absolutely refuse to be brow beaten into changing to a new kind of tooth paste or switching to some new fangled hair tonic.

When it comes to bull, baloney, bluster and blaw, modern day radio and television can have my "Oscar." Another thing I resent is the commercial directed to children that instructs them to "Tell Mommie to be sure and brush their teeth with Zoop" or "Wipe their noses with Betsy Witsy tissue."

NUTS to the networks, the advertising agencies and sponsors who are so dumb they would go along with such top drawer asininity as trying to censor Stephen Foster's masterpiece.

And they want us to buy "colored" television sets. Now there is an INSULT if I ever heard one.
