Piano wire and bamboo . . . they were the main ingredients of the flying machine that landed on the old Country Club golf course on June 19, 1911. The Aero Club brought the Orville Wright bi-plane to Grosse Pointe for three days that far away summer and every teen ager around wanted a ride.


Mrs. D. Dwight Douglas, who was then Josephine Alger, had the necessary intestinal fortitude to make the flight with aviator Frank Coffyn. The plane couldn't have been a very reassuring sight. It had twin pusher propellers, tricycle landing gear and the pilot and the passenger were right out in the open, facing the elements.

With Miss Alger as a passenger the pilot took off and ascended to over 350 feet, swooping out over the lake and traveling a distance of four miles. Mrs. Douglas has the record of this thrilling flight carefully recorded in a scrapbook with a note from Orville Wright, who she subsequently met with her parents in Pau, France.

Another youngster to make the flight was twelve-yearold Horace Wadsworth, son of Fred Wadsworth and actress Mary Mannering. The first two ladies in the state to make the flight were Mrs. Russell Alger and the late Mrs. Fred T. Murphy. They and their husbands with John A. Dyar, Sidney Waldon and Burns Henry were all passengers that first day.

The bi-plane was kept in a tent on the golf course (about where the Grosse Pointe High football field is today). Norbert Neff and four other local lads served as ground crew while the plane was here. They'd wheel it out for a flight and hang onto it while the pilot revved up the motor. At the signal they'd let go and the plane would bounce along to the take off. The pilot didn't bother with parachutes or instruments. He decided if it was flying weather by watching the breeze in the trees.

All the brave Pointers who ascended in the flying machine during those exciting three days enjoyed the ride and seemed to take it quite calmly. Listed as passengers also were Mrs. E. S. Barbour, Philip McMillan, Virginia Brush, Roy Chapin, W. E. Metzger, Eugene Lewis, E. S. George and Fred Lewis.





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
