A new chain link fence is also being erected from the Pergola to the lake along the boundary of the Memorial Church property.

Garden Center Busy
Mrs. T. Crawford Frost, Jr., chairman of the Garden Center Committee, reported on a year full of activity, including the annual Flower Show, Trial Gardens and the year round service supplies through the Garden Center headquarters.

Food and catering income at the Center has increased from \$24,000 in 1954 to more than \$37,000 last year. Serving capacity has been increased to 300. A total of 45,548 persons were served food last year against 42,118 in 1955-56, according to the report of Mrs. F. F. Steinkuh, House Committee chairman.

Hilary H. Micou, Jr., chairman of the Building Committee, reported a new elevator has been installed this year and a considerable amount of plastering and painting done, broken windows replaced and the garage doors restored.

Investments Worth \$364,241
The Investment Committee headed by Alger Sheldon reported a total investment fund of \$364,241, at present market values, which is expected to yield income of \$17,480 in 1957.

Total assets of the association are listed at \$544,321, with the investment fund valued at \$271,655, which represents the actual cost of purchased securities, or at market prices at date of receipt of the securities. The land is valued at \$100,000, the amount assessed for local property taxes, and the Center building at \$83,600.

(The Alger home was built in 1910 at a reported cost of \$600,000 and was known as one of the finest examples of Italian Renaissance architecture in the country. When it was presented to the Pointe as a war memorial center architects estimated that it could not be reproduced for less than two to three million dollars.)

Furnishings at appraised value in the year of donation are listed at \$54,851 and improvements to the buildings at cost at \$36,520. Furniture and fixtures are listed at \$32,423. Net Assets \$598,321 With liabilities of \$46,000, which include \$38,441 in contri-

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FBI Sponsoring Special Police Training School

Charles W. Brown, Special Agent in Charge of the Detroit Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, announced today that officers from 65 law enforcement agencies in the metropolitan Detroit area have been invited to attend three training schools starting Wednesday, October 2, at Lincoln Park Police Department; Thursday, October 3, at the Royal Oak Elks Temple; and Friday, October 4, at the Grosse Pointe Park Council Chambers.

The schools are sponsored by the Southeastern Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police in cooperation with the Federal Bureau of Investigation; these schools permit officers to receive on the job training without cost to the communities. This training is the outgrowth of a movement started 20 years ago by Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, in an effort to raise the standards of the police officer to a professional level.

Instructors at the school will be specially trained agents of the FBI and other experienced law enforcement officers. A new feature of the course offered this year will be instruction by a licensed physician in "The Handling of Emergency Maternity Cases."

"Booker T. Washington," (18 min.) presents episodes which illustrate Booker T. Washington's constant struggle to free his people from ignorance, poverty, and fear. Recalls his hardships in obtaining an education, his problem in building Tuskegee Institute, and his tragedies in private life. Includes part of his influential Atlanta speech.

"Hawaii, U. S. A.," (21 min., color), presents a tourist's view of the islands with its variety of races, climates, and crops. Shows the modern buildings, homes, and hotels; the industry and agriculture of the area. The abundance and variety of the flowers are shown, as well as the volcanic crater and the formation of the islands.

"Frustrating Fours and Fascinating Fives," (22 min.), studies the behavior of four- and five-year-old children at home and at nursery school. Young Roddy presents typical examples of the actions of a child at these ages, as the film follows his development and that of his classmates. At four, the vacillation between infantile helplessness and vigorous self-assertion is seen, and at five the development of independence and the beginnings of cooperation. To parents the film gives advice and encouragement and asserts that, unpredictable as their behavior may be, it's fun to help in the development of the fours and fives.

"Jerusalem: The Holy City" (10 Min., color). Concentrating on the historic settings and contemporary shrines of the respective religions, this film develops the theme of Jerusalem as a city sacred to the Jewish, Christian, and Mohammedan faiths. Settings and structures rich in historic association pass in review to the accompaniment of especially prepared musical score and interpretative narration.

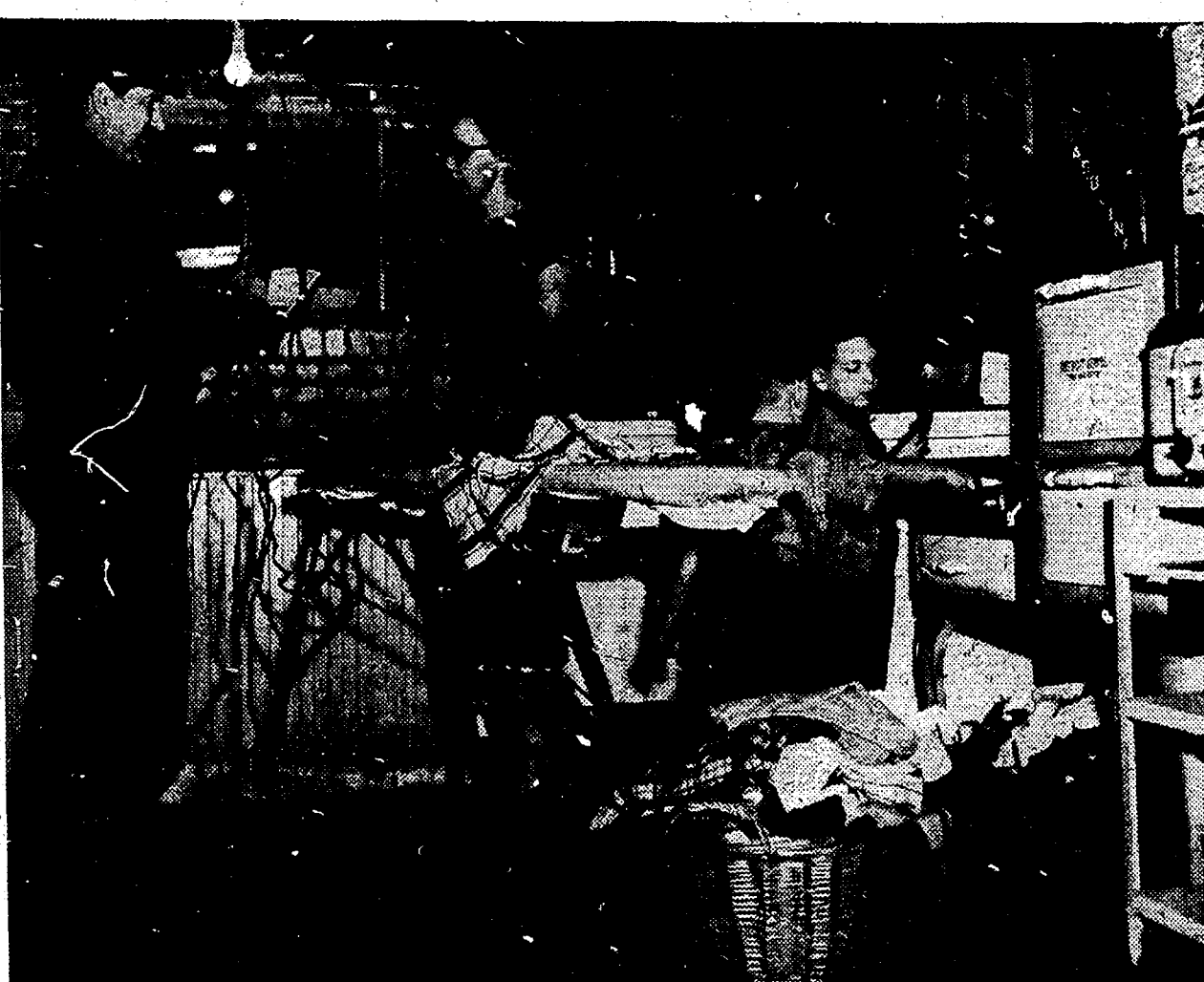
Judging of the films was done by the audience on a percentage basis according to standards set up by the Photographic Society of America.

He lives with his parents at the Drexel address.

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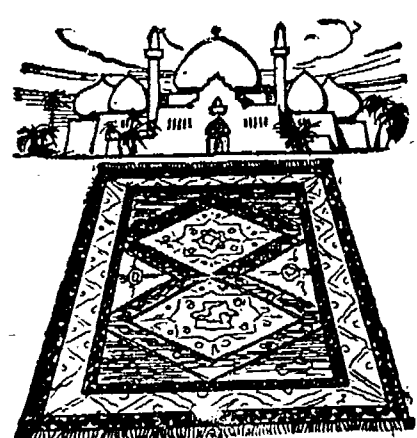

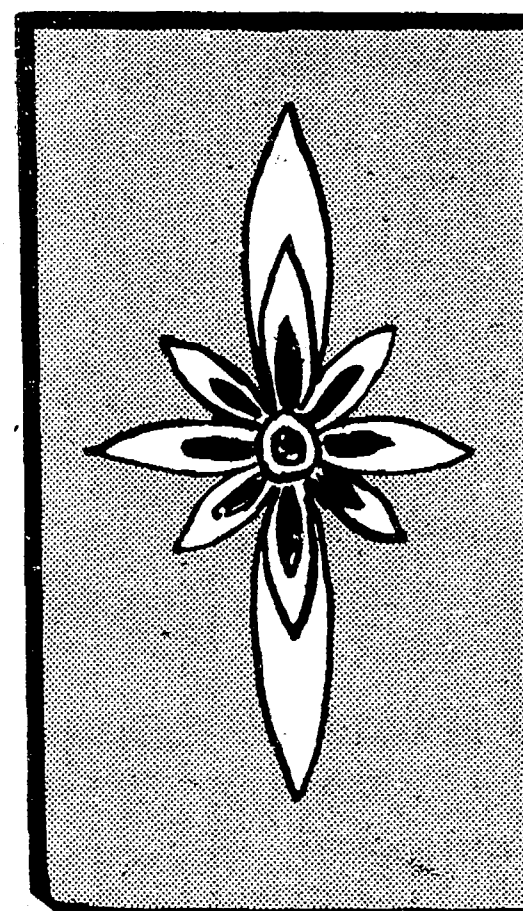

The first completely new Red Cross First Aid textbook in 12 years has just been published and now is being distributed to the organization's 3,700 chapters across the country.

Federal Civil Defense Administrator Leo A. Hoegh urges every family member to prepare for emergencies by taking Red Cross first aid training.

The new First Aid textbook incorporates all the latest first aid techniques, including the much publicized artificial respiration method for infants called "mouth-to-mouth" breathing.

Dr. A. H. Whittaker, Detroit chapter chairman of Safety Services, says copies of the book are available at the chapter offices, 153 East Elizabeth, and can be obtained for the cost of publication and distribution—75 cents for paperback copies and one dollar for clothbound.

The new book will be used as the text for the standard first aid course, which has been shortened from 18 to 10 hours. The advanced course now is increased from 12 to 16 hours.

Mr. Cantwell said that more than 18,600,000 certificates have been issued to persons successfully completing Red Cross first aid training since its inception in 1909.

The 240-page volume is liberally illustrated with photographs, drawing and colored plates. The colored plates cover the circulatory and skeletal systems, the musculature, internal organs, poisonous snakes and poisonous plants.

First aid techniques adopted since the last first aid textbook was published in 1945 include: A tourniquet should not be released once it has been put into place.

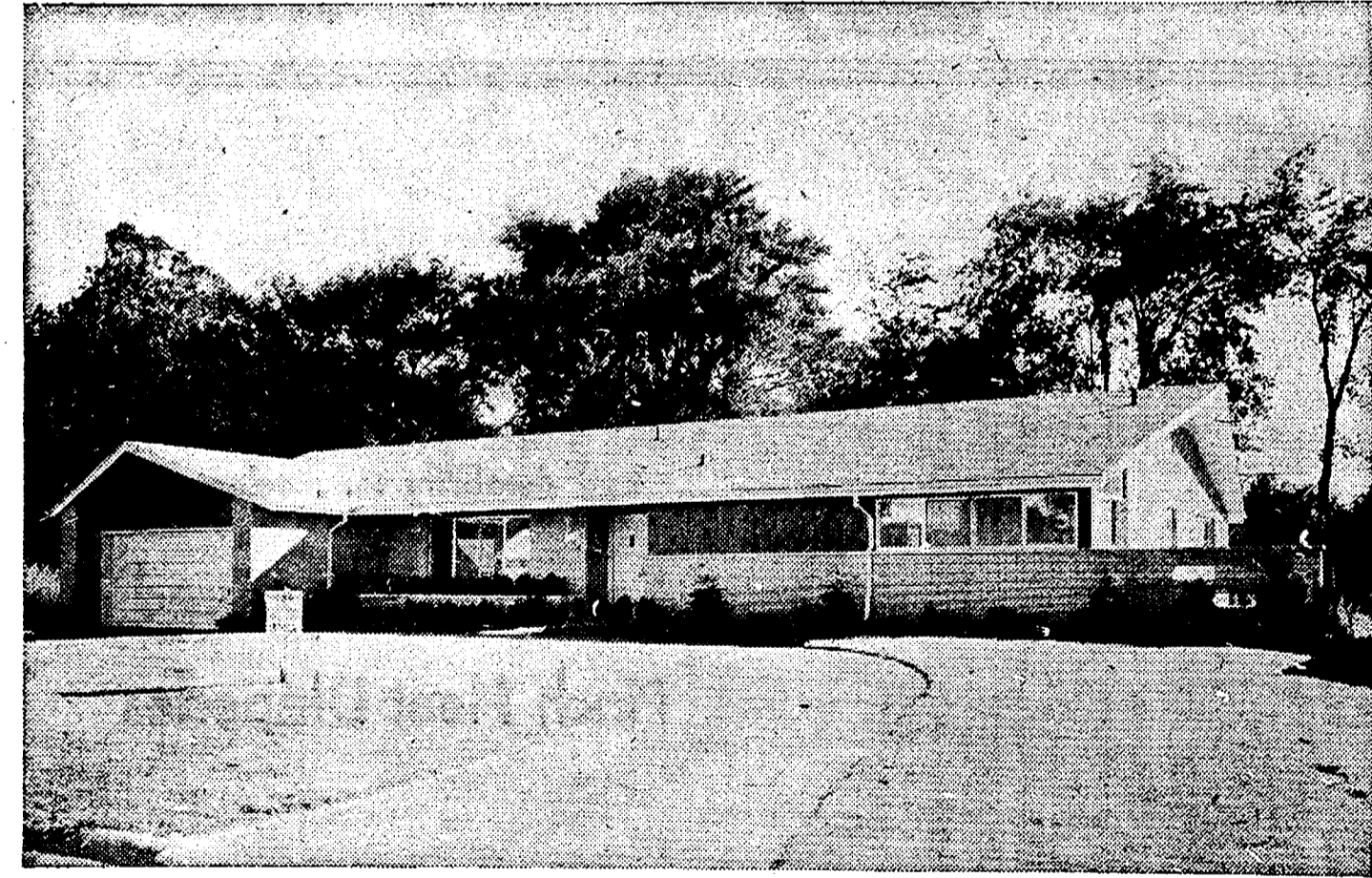

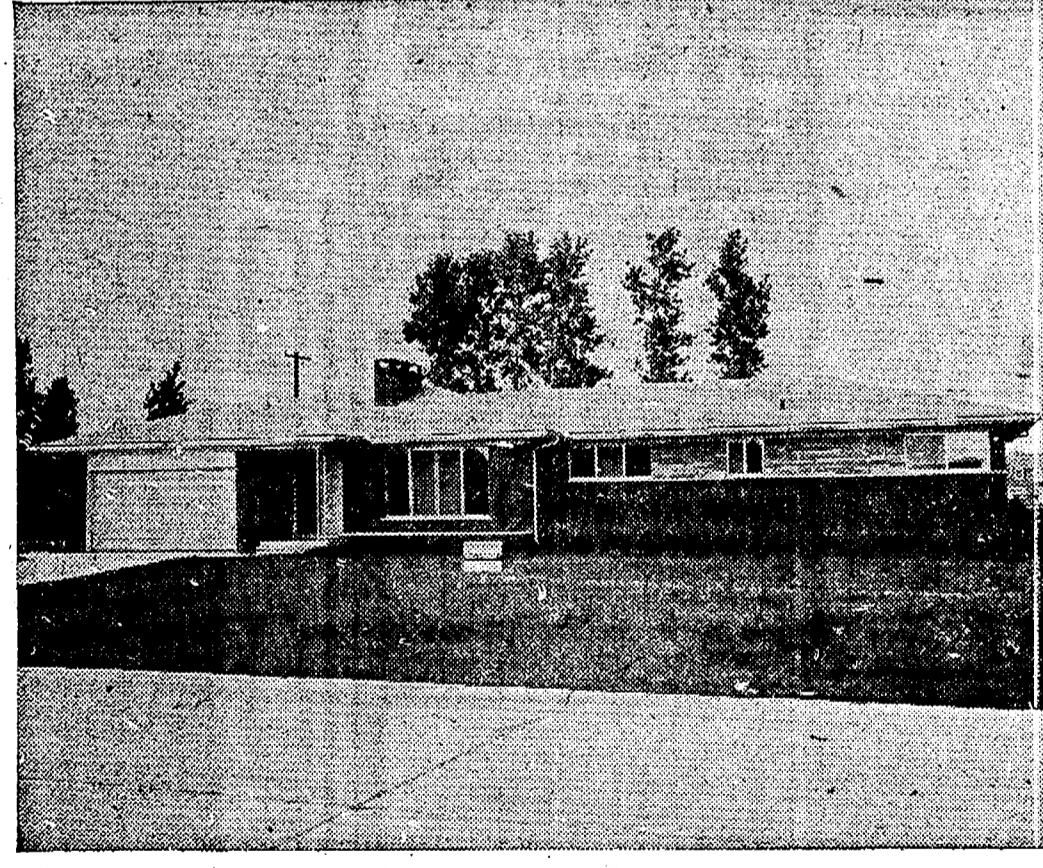

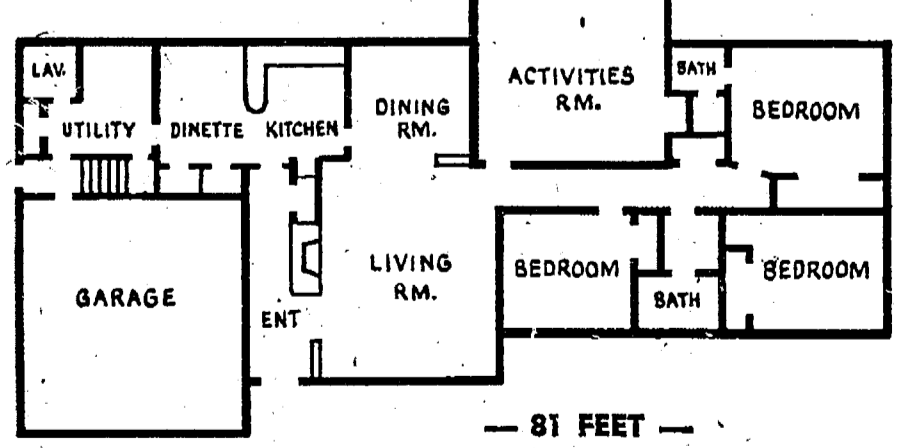

They point out that the existing condition of the "Black Marsh Open Drain" is a "breeding place for mosquitoes, rats and other vermin and pests" and constitutes a serious menace to the health of the residents of the Woods and surrounding cities.

The petitions have been circulating through the Woods for the past several weeks, and must be returned promptly if the matter is to be taken up by the court.

Michigan Grads To Hear Stirton

Dr. William E. Stirton, vice president of the University of Michigan, will be honored at a reception and dinner to be held Wednesday evening, October 16, at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, it was announced by A. D. Rueggeger, president of the University of Michigan Club of Grosse Pointe.

The reception has been scheduled for 6:30 p.m., and dinner at 7 p.m., followed by a talk by Doctor Stirton. Tickets are available from the president and the Board of Governors. Since the number of tickets is limited, Club members will have priority in their purchase until Monday, October 7.

Doctor Stirton will speak on what he sees as a development or pattern for higher education nationally in this country, projecting those things to the Michigan campus and program with his prognosis of the kind of institution Michigan will have 50 years from now.

Doctor Stirton is well known in the Detroit area, having been born in Inlay City in 1903 but moved to Detroit in 1914. He attended Dwyer Grade School and graduated from Cass Tech. He worked his way through the University of Michigan, acquiring a Bachelor's Degree in Electrical Engineering and a Master's Degree in Physics and Mathematics. He has received the honorary degrees of Doctor of Science in Business Administration and Doctor of Science in Engineering. He is a member of the honorary professional fraternities of Mu Sigma Pi, Phi Delta Kappa, and Tau Beta Pi.

He was employed as an engineer with the Michigan Bell Telephone Company and other industries in Detroit. He began his educational career at Cass Technical High School, teaching electrical work and physics. During the war years, Dr. Stirton was in charge of the War Training Program in the Detroit Public Schools, which trained 337,000 men and women for war production jobs in the Detroit area.

In 1946 he was Civic Manager of the Detroit Automotive Golden Jubilee and a member of the Board of Directors of the 250th Birthday Festival from its inception. In September, 1944, Dr. Stirton was made Principal of Cass Technical High School. He has taught at Wayne University and at Purdue University. In September, 1951, he was appointed Assistant to the President of Wayne University and Director of the Division of Community Relations. Later he was appointed vice president of Wayne University for University Services and Development, and on July 1, 1956, became vice president of the University of Michigan.

In 1956 he served as Chief of Party of a team which journeyed through Thailand and Indonesia to make a survey and recommendation on the technical and engineering educational needs in those countries of Southeast Asia, later returning to Bangkok to negotiate a contract to effect some of his survey recommendations.

Dr. Stirton is past president of the Michigan Schoolmaster Club; past president of the Detroit Schoolmen's Club; past president of the Guidance Association of Detroit and Vicinity; and past president and currently a director of the Engineering Society of Detroit; a member of the Association of Secondary School Principals; and a member of the Economic Club of Detroit.

He was executive secretary of the Detroit Educational Television. He has served as a member of the National Citizens Committee for Educational Television. He has served as a member of the board of directors of the Family Service Society of Metropolitan Detroit, Michigan Society for Mental Health, and a member of the Board of Directors of the Public Relations Society of America, Michigan Chapter. He has been a member of the Wayne County Board of Supervisor. He is a member of the Governor's Commission on the St. Lawrence Waterway, Great Lakes Tidewater Commission, and the Executive Committee of the Detroit-Tomorrow Committee.
