Thursday, October 10 PRESIDENT EISENHOWER. revising United States Earth satellite plans, announced yesterday this country will attempt to launch the first of four small "test" satellites in

December. He also said the first United States satellite carrying scientific instruments will be fired in March. He said the American man-made moon would provide "much mere" information than the Russian satellite now circling the earth. . .

The President also assured newsmen that there was "not one iota" of danger to this country from the Russian satellite. He added that it showed the Soviets have rockets with "a very powerful thrust," but refused to concede Russian superiority in the missile field.

SPUTNIK, the Russian "moon" satellite, sped on around the world Wednesday, speaking to earthbound scientists with a strong new radio voice. Scientists, using one of the world's most powerful radar sets at Stanford Research Institute at Menlo Park, California, said they detected 'radar echoes from two separate objects." The second was believed to be the nose cone of the booster rocket which is known to be trailing the satel-

A MOVE TO JAIL James R. Hoffa, Dave Beck and a half dozen other top Teamster Union leaders for contempt of court will be made by a 13man New York rank-and-file committee fighting Hoffa's recent election as the union's president.

Lawyers for the 13 rebels who obtained an anti-election injunction only to see it upset by Chief Justice Earl Warren, will seek to prove that the union bigwigs ran a rigged vote at their convention in Miami Beach last week where Hoffa won by an overwhelming 1,208 to 443 vote.

JAMES R. HOFFA could not have been elected president of the Teamsters Union if the union had obeyed its own constitution, charged Senator Mc-Clellan Thursday. He further claimed that "shocking and scandalous" situations developed in Hoffa's election.

McClellan said the Senate Rackets Investigation Committee, of which he is chairman, will continue its study of Hoffa and his union, adding "This is also a matter for the courts".

The 1957 edition of Accident Facts lists 52 major disasters which have occurred since 1865—all involving U.S. residents. The worst of these was the Galveston (Tex.) tidal wave of 1900 which claimed 6.000 lives. Others were the Peshtigo (Wis.) and surround; ing area forest fire of 1871 which took 1,152 lives, the Johnstown (Pa.) flood of 1889 which took 2,209 lives, and the explosion of the Sultana in the Mississippi River in 1865 which took 1,405 lives. Altogether the death toll from the 52 disasters amounted to 28,094. Yet in 1956 there were 40,000 traffic deaths in the United States and in all but three of the last 29 years the traffic toll has topped the combined toll of all these dis-

### **Barnaby Conrad** To Lecture Here

The Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association in co-sponsorship with the Grosse Pointe Community Theater has a treat in store for Pointers Friday evening, November 1, at

Barnaby Conrad, author of Matador, la Fiesta Brava." and "Gates of Fear," will bring "Drama in the Bull Ring" to the Center. His personal account will be accompanied by movies in color.

Mr. Conrad, who is in his early thirties, was born in San Francisco where he now lives, attended the California School of Fine Arts and the Universities of Mexico and North Carolina before being graduated from Yale.

Mr. Conrad entered the foreign service and was assigned to Spain during the war. There he studied bullfighting under Sidney Franklin and Juan Belmonte. After 30 amateur performances he appeared on the same program with Belmonte himself. Only a severe leg injury in a subsquent fight caused him to abandon becoming a professional matador.

Barnaby Conrad was in

Peru in 1946. He had left the Foreign Service and was earning his living as a pianist in Lima's largest hotel. Meanwhile, he was still taking part in bullfights and becoming a successful portrait painter on

the side. In Williamstown, Mass., in 1948, Mr. Conrad turned up as secretary and chess companion to Sinclair Lewis at which time he completed his first

novel, "The Innocent Villa." Since then Mr. Conrad has been a contributor to Colliers, Esquire and the Readers Digest. His novel "Matador" was a best seller in 1952.

We refer, of course, to the soaping and chalking of windows, car windshields, sidewalks, buildings, etc. This is an inane occupation that is unbecoming to anyone beyond the finger-painting period. It indicates an age bracket slightly lower than the kindergarten student's.

Soaping of car windshields can be particularly dangerous. Ofter the driver has neither the tools nor the time to remove the vision-obstructing defamation that sticks with the tenacity of a leech. One of the basic rules of safety is to always have a full view of the road ahead and on both sides. A windshield covered with soap is a cordial invitation to accidents.

Parents, school teachers and the students themselves can do a lot toward ending this puerile practice. If they all pass the word around to everyone within earshot that they think it's pretty stupid, the message is bound to sink into at least a few of these little uncreased brains.







The City of Grosse Pointe Farms ordains:

Sec. 1. "Section 8. Enforcement" of the Parking Meter Ordinance being Ordinance No. 85 of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms is hereby amended by the addition of a substitute Section 8 to read as follows:

SECTION 8. ENFORCEMENT: It shall be the duty of the police officers of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan, witnessing a violation hereunder, acting in accordance with instructions issued by the Chief of Police to report:

(d) Any other facts, a knowledge of which is necessary to a thorough understanding of the circumstances attending such violation.

Each such police officer shall also attach to such vehicle, a notice to the owner or operator thereof, that such vehicle has been parked in violation of a provision of this ordinance and instructing such owner or operator that such violation may be settled by placing the sum of \$.50 in the envelope on which such violation notice is endorsed and depositing same within twenty-four hours after such violation notice is issued in the parking meter receptacle for such envelopes or with the officer in charge of the desk at the Police Station. Such notice shall next instruct such owner or operator that he may after said twenty-four hour period, settle such violation by paying \$2.00 to the Traffic Violation Bureau as a penalty for and in full satisfaction of such violation on or before the date fixed for his appearance in Justice Court. Such notice shall further instruct such owner or operator that in case he wishes to protest the violation charged, he is required to appear in Justice Court in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms at an hour and date set forth in the notice. The failure of such owner or operator to make either the \$.50 payment within twenty-four hours as above provided, or the \$2.00 payment within the time above stated, shall render such owner or operator subject to the penalties hereinafter provided for violations

of the provisions of this ordinance. Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after its enactment or upon its publication, whichever is later.

These propositions are being submitted in accordance with the following resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors of said County on the 16th day of September, 1957, by the requisite three-fifths (3/5) vote:

cipal corporation comprising the Port District: AND WHEREAS, extensive meetings and discussions relative to said comprehensive port development plan have been held with the Port Commission and the Port Committee and Ways and Means Committee of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Wayne, as a result of which it is the determination of the Board of Supervisors that said plan should be approved, but that only that portion of the lands and properties embraced in said plan within the following description should presently be acquired, constructed and financed by the issuance of bonds, to wit:

side of transit sheds; 5. Appropriate quay type wharf and a wharf facing of approximately 1,105' having a depth of water of 27½' and wharf apron area of approximately 66,300 sq. ft.;

6. And such other work of light construction and technical nature as may be required; the balance of the land, properties, and port facilities specified in said plan to be left for future determination as

to acquisition, construction and financing thereof; AND WHEREAS, the estimate of cost of the acquisition of the lands and properties within the above designated area, and the acquisition of the port facilities specified for said area has been estimated by Harley, Ellington and Day, Inc., architects and engineers, of Detroit, Michigan to be Nine Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$9,500,000.00)

AND WHEREAS, the Port Commission of the Port of Detroit has concurred in the program herein set forth, which is a revision of its original immediate acquisition program as outlined in its resolution adopted September 3, 1957, and duly certified to the Board of Supervisors;
AND WHEREAS, the Port Commission has submitted to

the Common Council of the City of Detroit, the legislative

the Common Council of the City of Detroit, the legislative body thereof, said comprehensive port development plan, all the area and territory embodied in said plan being located within the corporate limits of the City of Detroit, and said Common Council, by resolution, has approved said plan, all in accordance with the provisions of Section 30 of Act 234, Public Acts of 1925, as amended;

AND WHEREAS, because of uncertainties under the law as to whether the Port District is an agency of the county and thus is limited in its taxing ability for the payment of bonds by the limitations expressed in Section 21, Article X of the Michigan Constitution, or is an independent municipal corporation having a charter tax rate limitation, and thus is not subject to the limitations of said constitutional amendment under the decisions of the Michigan Supreme Court, this Board feels that it is necessary in order to provide for all eventualities to submit to the qualiorder to provide for all eventualities to submit to the qualified electors on a separate ballot, or as a separate proposi-



When dimity dresses swept green lawns edging Lake St. Clair, courting couples chatted on the swings of the stately verandas and their parents gathered behind shuttered blinds for sewing sessions or rubbers of whist. These were the halcyon summer days of 1870 in Grosse Pointe.

Stately and gracious was the vacation life of the Pointe's twoscore families ringing the blue lake. The gentlemen enjoyed a weekly evening of whist from May to October when the industrial struggle in far away Detroit was not so pressing.

This gathering was a stag affair and the whist club consisted of two tables. Such names as General C. B. Comstock, James McMillan, Edmund A. Brush, A. H. Day, George Van Ness Lothrop, John S. Newberry, J. H. Farnsworth and Emory Wendell made up the club's

Whist in the 70's was a forerunner of bridge and required a great deal of concentration from the eight players, upright in their high starched collars, breezes wafted on hot nights by palmetto fans.


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
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
