For action in Cuban waters the Yosemite was awarded "double prize money", the last awarded by the US Navy. Two members of that war-time ship's company were each to become secretary of the Navy, Lt. Truman H. Newberry and Gunner's Mate Edwin Denby.

Friendships formed aboard the Yosemite during the battles of the Spanish American War remained firm. Chief machinist Andrew R. Green, Jr., later became a prominent industrialist, a political reformer, a Red Cross director in World War I overseas and finally campaign manager for Truman Newberry in his 1918 election as senator on the Republican ticket.

The Yosemite crew which left Detroit on April 29, 1898 for Norfolk to await the ship were home again by 1900 when the cruiser met her tragic fate off Guam. She had been sent there after her war duties to be a station ship and was run aground in a terrible typhoon, her bows crushed in and rudder and propeller broken.

Charles B. King was the last of her war-time crew to board the cruiser which had been in New York before the fatal trip to Guam. He went down to the engine rooms for a last look around before the Yosemite sailed, never dreaming that the ship which held so many memories for its famous crew would be scuttled in Pacific waters.

The Spanish-American War, many of the soldiers and sailors of that day have faded away but at the Brodhead Naval Armory a tablet testifies to the glory of the USS Yosemite and the roster of famous men who served on her.

Mrs. Bellis also reported 41 rejects, whose blood for varied reasons was deemed unsuitable for Red Cross purposes. It was estimated that at least 10 percent of those who had originally made appointments to give blood had to cancel because of illness—in most cases, the flu.

DEFINITIONS

Section 65. (24). "Voluntary retirement age" means age 60 years for a general city member, and age 55 years for a policeman or fireman member. During time of war engaged in by the United States, the Council may extend the age at which any class of members may voluntarily retire.

SERVICE RETIREMENT ALLOWANCE-COVERED MEMBER

Section 82.1. Upon his retirement, as provided in this Chapter, a covered member shall receive a retirement allowance consisting of the benefits hereinafter provided in this section, called a regular retirement allowance, and he shall have the right to elect an option provided for in section 84. (a). An annuity which shall be the actuarial equivalent of his accumulated contributions standing to his credit in the annuity savings fund at the time of his retirement; and (b). A pension which when added to his annuity will provide a retirement allowance equal to the product of the number of years, and fraction of a year, of his credited service multiplied by the sum of 1 per cent of. the first \$4,200 of his final average compensation and 1.5 per cent of the portion, if any, of his final average compensation in excess of \$4,200. (c). If a covered member, who is in City service at the social security date, retires before he has acquired social security fully insured status on account of his City employment, the pension portion of his retirement allowance provided for in this section bortion of his retrement and wanted of (A) \$120 per annum; and (B) 1/120 of his final aver-age compensation multiplied by the number of years, and fraction of a year, of his credited membership service; and (C) 2/135 of his final average compensation multiplied by the number of years, and fraction of a year, of his credited prior service: Provided, that in no case shall (C) exceed \$1,800 per annum. (d). According to such rules and regulations as the Board shall from time to time adopt, any covered mem-ber who retires prior to his attainment of age 65 years may elect to have his regular retirement allowance equated on an actuarial basis to provide an increased retire-ment allowance payable to his attainment of age 65 years and a reduced retirement allowance payable thereafter. His increased retirement allowance payable to his attainment of age 65 years shall approximate the sum of his reduced retirement allowance payable after his attain-ment of age 65 years and his estimated social security primary insurance amount. (e). If a retirant dies before he has received in re-tirement allowance payments an aggregate amount equal to his accumuated contributions standing to his credit in the annuity savings fund at the time of his retirement, the difference between his said accumulated contributions and the said aggregate amount of retirement allow-ance payments received by him shall be paid to such person or persons as he shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the Board. If there be no such designated person or persons surviving the said retirant, such difference, if any, shall be paid to his legal representative. If he retires before his attainment of age 65 years, a pension which when added to his annuity will provide a retirement allowance, payable to his attainment of age 65 years, equal to the number of years, and fraction of a year, of his credited service multiplied by the sum of 1.1 per cent of the first \$4200 of his final average compensation plus 1.6 per cent of the portion, if any, of his final average compensation in excess of \$4200: Provided, that his said retirement allowance shall be subject to sections 82.2 and 82.3. (c). Upon his attainment of age 65 years, if he retired prior thereto, or upon his retirement at or after his attain-ment of age 65 years, a pension which when added to his annuity will provide a retirement allowance equal to the number of years, and fraction of a year, of his credited service multiplied by the sum of 1.0 per cent of the first \$4200 of his final average compensation plus 1.5 per cent of the portion, if any, of his final average compensation in excess of \$4200: Provided that his said retirement allowance shall be subject to sections 82.2 and 82.3. If a covered member, who is in City service at the social security date, or in the case of a policeman or fireman member who is in City service at the date the City first covers policemen and firemen under the Federal Social security old-age and survivors insurance program, retires before he has acquired social security fully in-sured status on account of his City employment, the pension portion of his retirement allowance provided for in paragraphs (b) and (c) of this section shall not be less than the sum of (A) 120 per annum, and (B) 1/120of his final average compensation multiplied by the number of years, and fraction of a year, of his member-ship service credit, plus (C) 2/135 of his final average compensation multiplied by the number of years, and fraction of a year, of his prior service credit: Provided, that in no case shall (C) exceed \$1,800 per annum. In the event the said covered member is a policeman or fireman member and he retires before his attainment of age 55 years, or if he is a general City member and he retires before his attainment of age 60 years, his said pension above provided in this paragraph shall be re-duced 1/2 of 1 percent multiplied by the number of months, and fraction of a month, contained in the period from the date his retirement allowance becomes due to the date he would attain age 55 years or 60 years, as the case may be. (e). According. to such rules and regulations as the Board shall from time to time adopt, any covered member who retires prior to his attainment of age 65 years may elect to have his regular retirement allowance equated on an actuarial basis to provide an increased retirement allowance payable to his attainment of age 65 years and a reduced retirement allowance payable thereafter. Section 82.1 Upon his retirement, as provided in this chapter, a non-covered member shall receive a retirement allowance consisting of the benefits hereinafter provided in this section, called a regular retirement allowance, and he shall have the right to elect an option provided

If a member has an option 2 election in force at the time of his retirement, his said election of option 2 and nomination of beneficiary shall thereafter continue in force, unless prior to the effective date of his retirement he elects to receive his retirement allowance as a regular retirement allowance or according to another option provided for in section 84. No benefits shall be paid under this paragraph on account of the death of a member if any benefits are paid under section 91 on account of his death.

(b). A member, with 10 or more years of credited service, who continues in City service on or after his attainment of age 55 years, and does not have an option 2 election in force as provided in paragraph (a) of this section, and (1) dies while in City service, and (2) leaves a widow, or in the case of a female member leaves a widower whom the Board finds to be totally and permanently disabled and to have been dependent upon the said female member for at least 50 per cent of his support, the said widow or widower, as the case may be, shall immediately receive the same retirement allowance as the said beneficiary would have been entitled to receive if the said member had (1) retired the day preceding the date of his death, notwithstanding that he may not have attained his voluntary retirement age, (2) elected option 2 provided for in section 84, and (3) nominated his said widow or widower, as the case may be, as beneficiary. Upon the death or remarriage of the said beneficiary his retirement allowance shall terminate. If a member has an option 2 election in force at the time of his retirement, his said election of option 2 and nomination of beneficiary shall thereafter continue in force, unless prior to the effective date of his retire-ment he elects to receive his retirement allowance as a regular retirement allowance or according to an option provided for in section 84. No benefits shall be paid under this paragraph on account of the death of a member if any benefits are paid, or are to be paid, under section 91 on account of his death.

(b). A member who continues in City employment after the date he either (1) has acquired 15 or more years of credited service, or (2) has attained age 55 years and has 10 or more years of credited service, and does not have an option 2 election in force as provided in paragraph (a) above, and (1) dies while in City service after March 31, 1956, and (2) leaves a widow, or in the case of a female member leaves a widower whom the Board finds to be totally and permanently disabled and to have been dependent upon the said female member for at least 50 percent of his support, the said widow or widower, as the case may be, shall immediately receive the same retirement allowance, computed in the same manner in all respects, to which the said beneficiary would have been entitled if the said member had (1) retired the day preceding the date of his death, notwithstanding that he might not have attained his voluntary retirement age. (2) elected option 2 provided for in section 84, and (3) nominated his said widow or widower, as the case may be, as beneficiary: Provided, that section 82.2 shall not be applied to said retirement allowance. Upon the death or re-marriage of the said beneficiary his retirement allowance shall terminate. Upon said termination, if the aggregate amount of retirement allowance payments received by the said beneficiary is less than the accumu-lated contributions credited to the said member's annuity savings fund account at the time of the said member's death, the difference between the said accumulated contributions and the said aggregate amount of retirement allowance payments received by the said beneficiary shall be paid in a single sum to such person or persons as the Board shall determine to be entitled to same. 
