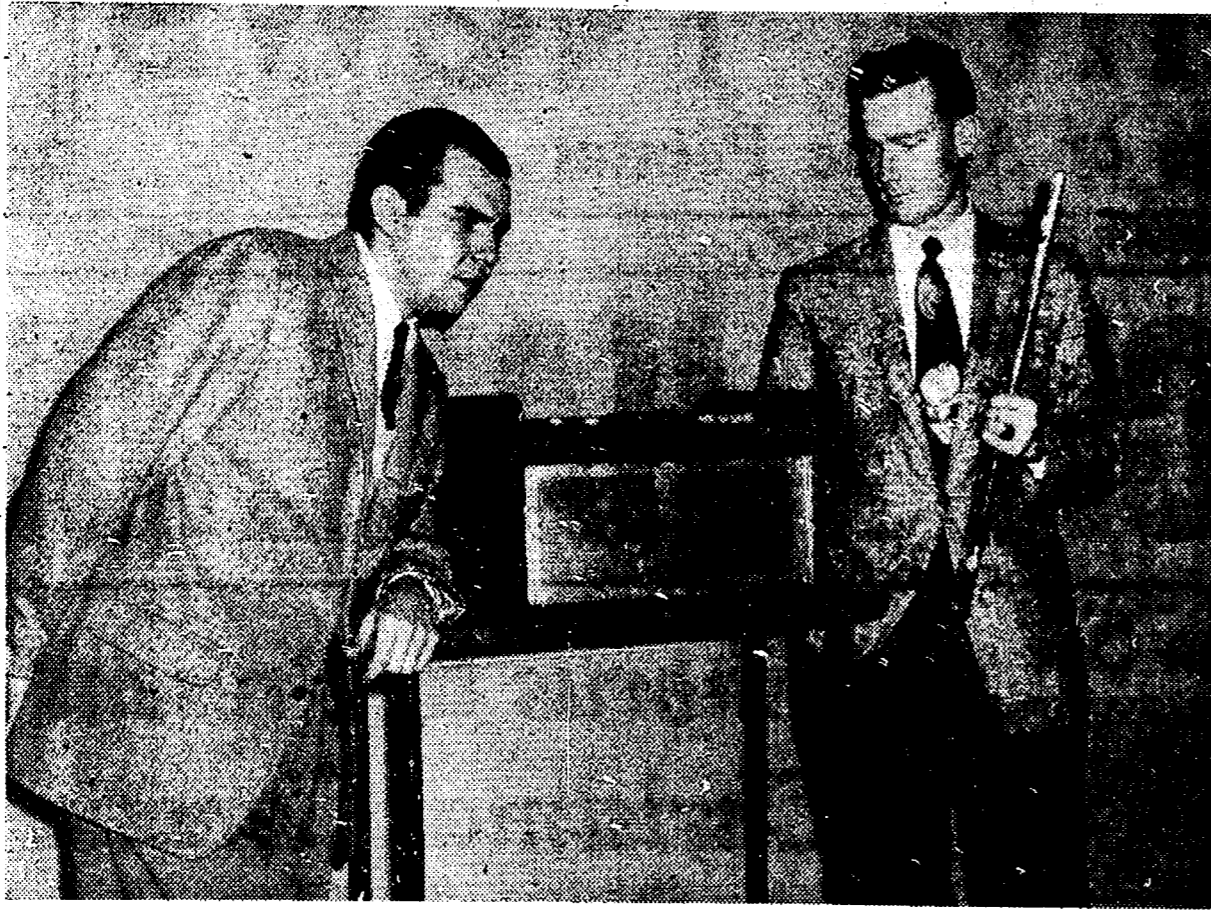

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Peddler of Pornography To Face Judge Saturday

The Wayne County Prosecutor's Office approved a warrant recommended by Woods police on Monday, December 2, charging Theodore R. Wichman, 57, of 1423 Berkshire, with possession of obscene movie films and literature.

Wichman will be arraigned before Woods Judge Don Goodrow on Saturday, December 7.

The accused man was arrested on Friday, November 22, by Sgt. Roland Symons and Patrolman Mast, as he emerged from his store, the Empire Gift and Camera Shop, Mack and Hampton. The officers observed Wichman's car parked three feet from the curb and stopped to investigate.

A check of the vehicle disclosed a suit case on the rear seat. Wichman said the car was his, and he was taken to the station, where the suitcase was opened and pornographic material found. The shop owner was held for investigation.

This was Wichman's second arrest. He was found guilty on October 8 last year on a similar charge, by Judge Goodrow, and fined \$100, and ordered to pay \$100 court costs. In addition he was placed on probation for two years.

Det. Sgt. Walter O'Dell and Det. Leroy Tobian said the present charge against the man constitutes a high misdemeanor, and if he is convicted, he could receive as much as a year in prison.

The alleged activities of Wichman has stirred up the people in the Woods, especially those in the immediate neighborhood of the store.

The Woods council on Monday, December 2, granted a plea of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Reinowski of 1200 Roslyn road, to be heard in the matter.

Mrs. Reinowski, speaking in behalf of her husband and neighbors, asked the council to enact some kind of an ordinance that would put teeth into city control of local business, so that if Wichman is convicted, he would be prohibited from carrying on any business in the city.

City Attorney Julius Berns said that this is not possible because this would be restraint of business, and that Wichman was found to be, or the evidence showed, only in possession of the obscene material. He was not arrested while selling it, the city attorney said.

When Mrs. Reinowski asked for an ordinance prohibiting the sale of pornographic material in the city, she was informed that a State law controls this. If the city has an ordinance against such sales, it was said, the limit an offender can get is 90 days in jail, whereas, the State law sets the punishment up to one year.

The council discussed measures, such as having State authorities padlock Wichman's store, provided he is convicted, or having city police and building fire and other inspectors constantly checking the store, which might force the man to move.

The council finally decided to leave Wichman's fate in the hands of the judiciary branch of government.

Furnishes Tip On Hit-Runner

An alert pedestrian last Monday supplied the necessary information to City Police for catching a hit-and-run driver.

An un-named witness phoned the City station to report he had seen a green Ford strike a parked car on Mack avenue, between Neff road and Grosse Pointe court.

Shortly afterwards Stanley Joseph McDonald, 28439 Fountain avenue, in Roseville, reported that it was his car that had been damaged.

A description of the avenger-auto, with its damaged right front end, went over the local police radios. Within the hour Grosse Pointe Farms police found a car answering the description parked at the corner of McMillan and Ridge roads. It had apparently been abandoned. The car was towed to the City police station.

Clifford Kistner, of 21621 Frazzio road, in St. Clair Shores, called the station shortly afterwards to report that he had been involved in an accident. He was told by City police to report the accident in person.

Upon appearing at the station he was presented with a bill for the towing charges and a severe lecture—but no ticket, as the complainant was unwilling to press charges.

Farms Council Approves Bills

At Monday's council meeting, the Farms Council agreed to pay special bills totaling over \$10,000.

The largest bill to be paid by the council will be the one to the Jess M. Gregory Contracting Company for the sum of \$6,346.44, in full payment for the construction of the base in the addition to the Kercheval Business District parking lot, which was approved some time ago by the city engineer.

Another check for \$3,000 will be paid to Silloway and Company in connection with the improvements made on the Shore Lane Subdivision which have already been completed.

The council also agreed to pay the sum of \$1,030.00, to the Detroit Gas Burner company, representing payment in full for the installation of the gas unit heaters in the Public Works garage.

Action by the Council concerning the withdrawal of Touche, Niven, Bailey and Smart, as auditors for the City, and the appointment of new auditors was postponed until the next meeting. In any case the present auditors will remain on the job till the end of December.

A request to the city to vacate a strip of land in the rear of the property of William D. Allison, of 39 Radnor Circle, and Robert Hannah, of 41 Radnor Circle, was supported by all members of the council.

Name Donovan to Art Board

Frank W. Donovan, of East Jefferson avenue, prominent in civic affairs, has accepted the position of trustee on the national board of American Art. Mr. Donovan, who is also president of the Detroit Grand Opera Association, will serve as Detroit chairman of the fund-raising campaign for the Archives, a national project, supported by private subscriptions, and housed in the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Vincent Price, of Beverly Hills, Calif., well-known actor and art authority, also on the Archives' national board, will speak on the research value of the archives on Sunday, December 8, in the Franklin Hills home of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Shwayder. Others on the national board are: Al Capp, noted cartoonist; Senator J. W. Fulbright, known for his scholarships and other contributions to various cultural projects; and Henry F. duPont, Joseph H. Hirschhorn, Howard W. Lipman and Mrs. Charles F. Willis, Jr., all from the New Jersey area and all among America's leading art collectors.

Heading the national project locally are: Charles F. Moore, chairman; Mrs. Edsel B. Ford, vice chairman; Lawrence W. Fleischman, treasurer; Dr. E. P. Richardson, Art Institute director; and Paul L. Grigaut, Art Institute chief curator, secretary.

The Archives, established in 1934, has already made Detroit the world center for research on American Art.

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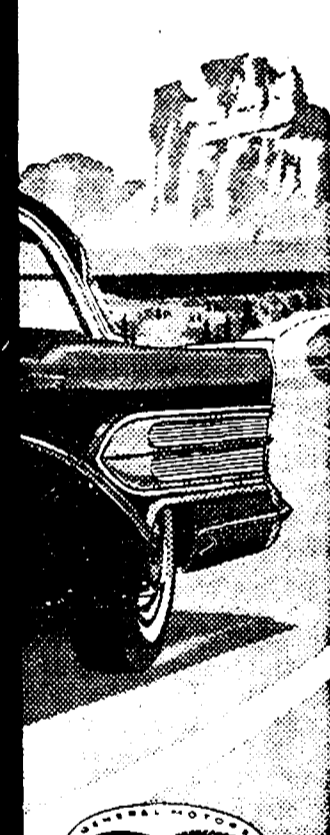

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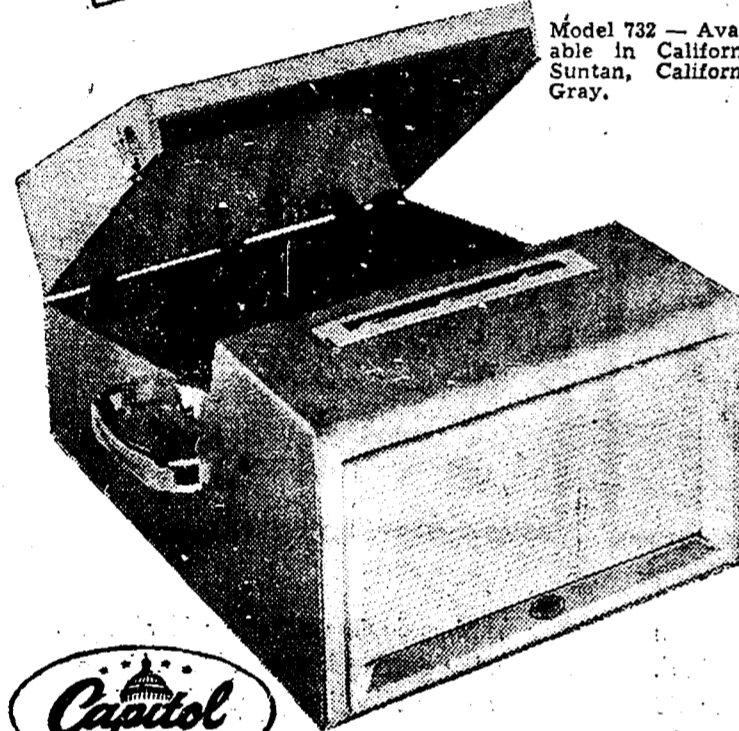
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\$100 Bill

(Continued from Page 1) Berns, two weeks ago, who opined that the city did not have the legal right to determine who is entitled to the \$100, and turned the money over to the city treasurer.

Would Wait for Years
The city attorney said, at the time, that the ownership would have to be determined in court, but if claimants do not institute legal action, the money will have to remain in the treasury until the expiration of a six-year statute of limitation, after which Linda could have it.

The council approved a resolution authorizing City Treasurer Helen Fox to return the \$100 bill to Director Bailey, who in turn was authorized to give the money to Linda's parents, on presentation of a signed receipt and an indemnity release.

Berns told the council that by its action, it could be involved in a legal tangle with the claimants, if the claimants seek court action. He told the mayor and the three councilmen they would have to pay the money out of their own pockets, including court costs, if they were sued and lost.

Assume Responsibility
The mayor and the councilmen took a "devil may care" attitude, stating that the money has been held for more than a year, and no court action has been taken, therefore, the money belongs to Linda.

The city attorney said that the money would have to be turned over to the child's parents, and that they themselves must sign the receipt and indemnity release because Linda is a minor.

The serial number of the \$100 bill was made part of the resolution because, it was said, it is the same one found by the girl.

There were three claimants seeking the money, one making a claim as late as November 17. They are:

Kurt P. Hirschelmann of 1703 Manchester (since deceased) who put in a claim on October 6, 1956; Mrs. Anna Clawson of 2111 Parkview, Detroit, a school teacher, who entered a claim several days after Hirschelmann; and the later claimant, Shirley Kulka of 3507 Frederick, Detroit.

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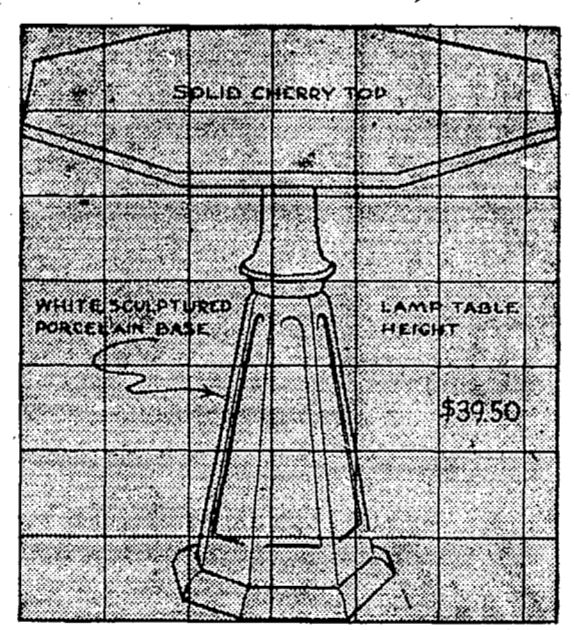

Christ Church Presenting Dramatic Yule Cantata

"The Christmas Story," a dramatic cantata by the 17th century German composer Heinrich Schutz, will be given its first public performance by the Festival Chorus, Christ Episcopal Church, Grosse Pointe, on Sunday, December 8, at 4 p.m.

The performance of this baroque masterpiece, under the direction of Richard Roeckelein, will be as authentic as practical in the 20th century. Using a chorus of about 50 mixed voices it will feature soprano Mary Lewis as the angel, Richard Webb, bass, as King Herod, and John Moldovan, tenor, in the important role of evangelist-narrator, through whose recitation the beautiful story of the first Christmas unfolds.

Assisting the singers will be a small orchestra including the usual strings, trombones, trumpets, bassoon, two recorders and harpsichord. The tone of the ancient recorder, seldom heard in the 20th century, resembles a soft flute.

The two instruments will be played by Ester Frost and Helga Herz. During the narrative sections Mr. Roeckelein, following a 17th century custom, will accompany the Evangelist at the harpsichord.

The work itself is easily loved with its wealth of melody, dramatic interest and vivid coloring.

The public is cordially invited. There will be no charge for admission, nor will there be any seats reserved.

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Rotarians Hear Address About Employee Relations

Fred Mosdale, vice-president and director of the National Bank of Detroit, was the guest speaker at the Grosse Pointe Rotary Club luncheon-meeting held at the War Memorial Center on Monday, December 2.

Mosdale, a former Pointer and an active member of the National Office Management Association, chose as his topic, "Things Everyone Knows About Employee Relations."

He was introduced by Rotarian James Alexis, chairman of the Pointe club's Employee-Relationship Committee, and also a member of the Association.

Mosdale said that modern managements have had a greater awareness that the most valuable assets of their organizations are not their plants, materials and equipment, but the human assets, since without human effort, the most efficiently organized business is simply a hollow shell; the most highly automated factory would be nothing but cobwebs.

It is not a simple thing for management to insure harmonious relations with its employees, for the main reason that people are different from one another, and often it is not known in what respect they are different, to what degree, or why they differ in needs and wants.

Mosdale said that the main conclusion arrived at by Professor Roethlisberger, and his group of relations researchers at Harvard University, is: "That people at work are no different from people in other aspects of life."

He said that these people are not entirely creatures of logic. They have feelings, and like to feel that their work is recognized as important.

He said that people seek five basic satisfactions in life, built-in needs that influence what they do, and which effect them continuously. They are:

1. The need to stay alive and be alive;
2. The need to feel safe;
3. The need to be social;
4. The need to feel respected; and
5. The need to do work that we like.

Mosdale elaborated on each of the needs, boiling them down to simply this, that people need to live fully, feel safe, to belong, to feel important, and to fulfill themselves. Out of this management theoretically shapes its employee relations policies, so that employees can gain satisfaction out of them.

He said the essential task of management is to arrange organizational conditions and methods of operation, insofar as it is possible, so that people CAN achieve their own goals best, by directing their own efforts to organizational objects. Such changes are not easy, nor will they be achieved overnight, he added.

As the Chinese proverb puts it, Mosdale said, "It is better to light one small candle than to curse the darkness."

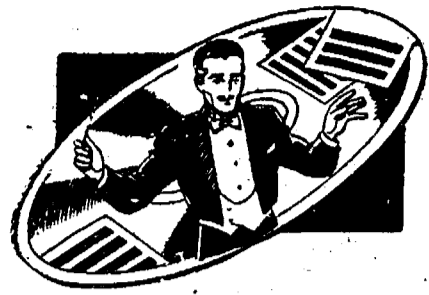

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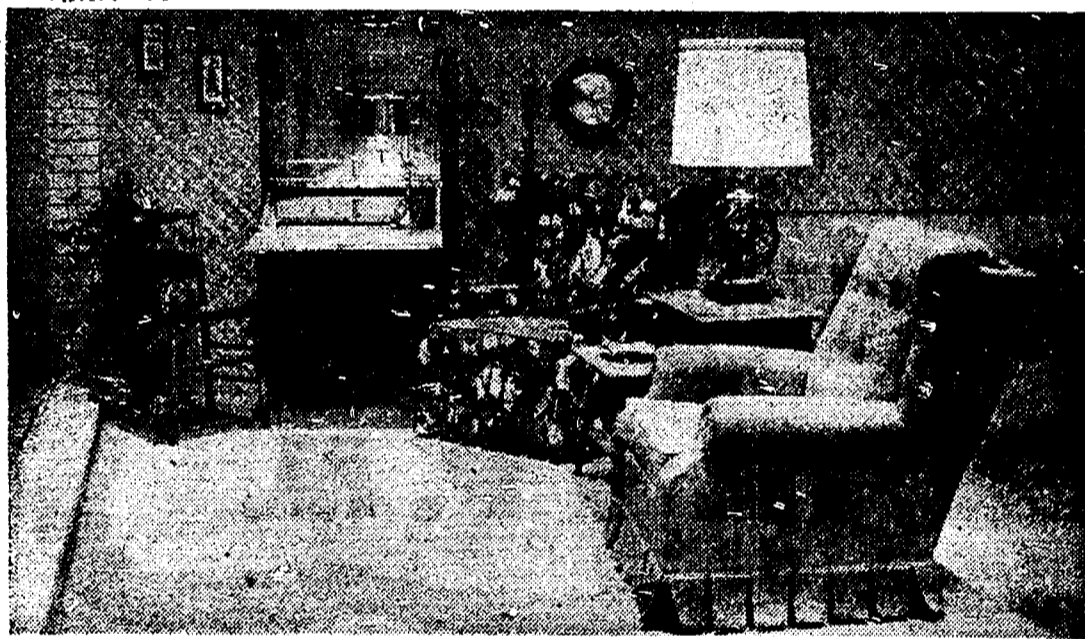

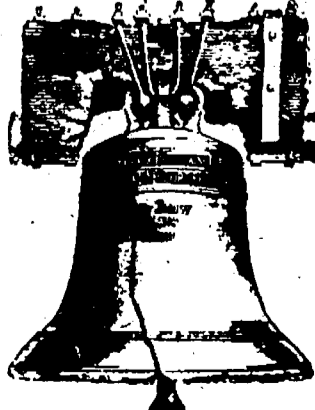

News of Husband's Death Causes Wife to End Life

G. Leslie Field, 64, noted Detroit attorney, was found dead Friday morning at University Hospital in Ann Arbor, a victim of suicide.

Six hours later, his wife, Pauline, took her life in exactly the same way at the couple's Grosse Pointe Park home located at 1036 Berkshire.

According to doctors who had attended him, Mr. Field had been suffering from "severe depression," but added that he had no chronic illness whatsoever.

He had hanged himself from a shower handle in his private room at the hospital.

Mrs. Field, who was one year younger than Mr. Field, was found hanging from the rafters in the garage behind their home which the couple had bought just six months earlier.

Park police said she had left a suicide note indicating despondency over the death of her husband, although she had been told by a family friend

that her husband had died of a "heart attack."

Both bodies were clad in bathrobes. The bathrobe cords had been used as ropes in the two hangings.

Mrs. Field's body was found by Ernest W. Nigg of 850 Balfour, after a family friend, Mrs. Bernice Carmichael, of 1014 Bishop became alarmed after finding the Field home empty in the afternoon and telephoned Nigg, who found the body after searching the house and grounds.

Surviving Mr. and Mrs. Field are two children, a son, Peter, of 1630 Banbury, Birmingham, and a daughter, Mrs. Virginia Nigg, who is living with her husband in California, where he is stationed with the Army.

Accident Report Lists 29 Cases

According to Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers, there were 29 auto accidents in the Park during the month of November, of which seven were non-fatal.

Of the 29 accidents, 22 involved property damage, 24 hit more than one car, four ran off the road, and one hit a fixed object.

November's accidents bring this year's figure up to a total of 250, in which two persons were killed, and 106 seriously injured.

Battle of Bulge Wastes Millions

"Millions of dollars a year are being spent by the American public for promises, pamphlets, products, and pills which offer very vague, unscientific guarantees for curing illnesses, being healthy and losing weight," says Miss Adela Beeuwkes, nutritionist at The University of Michigan School of Public Health.

Miss Beeuwkes is associate professor of public health nutrition at the U-M and former speaker of the House of Delegates of the American Dietetic Association.

More and more information on nutrition is being made available from scientific sources, she states, and "More and more attempts are being made to capitalize on this new information by unscrupulous manufacturers of worthless—and often harmful—cure alls, tonics, and reducing pills.

When people take to a bogus medication they see advertised somewhere as a solution and cure for their health problems, she warns, "They not

only are going in the opposite direction from competent medical care, but are also going in the opposite direction from possible cure and health.

"It's tragic to see or learn of a person who trusts what some quack in a far-off state says is the answer to his own health problems, when a scientifically trained and experienced physician is readily available in his own home town.

"You simply cannot receive medical care by proxy. I recommend that a person who believes he's in poor health see a doctor. If a person is wondering about the truth in statements that a 'cure all' will cure all, call the local health department and talk to the public health nutritionist about it.

"If none are available locally, there are many places where trained dieticians and nutritionists would be pleased to discuss it, absolutely free—the State Health Department, for example. There are three

hospitals in the state which are training dieticians in graduate hospital dietetics: U-M, Harper, and Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit.

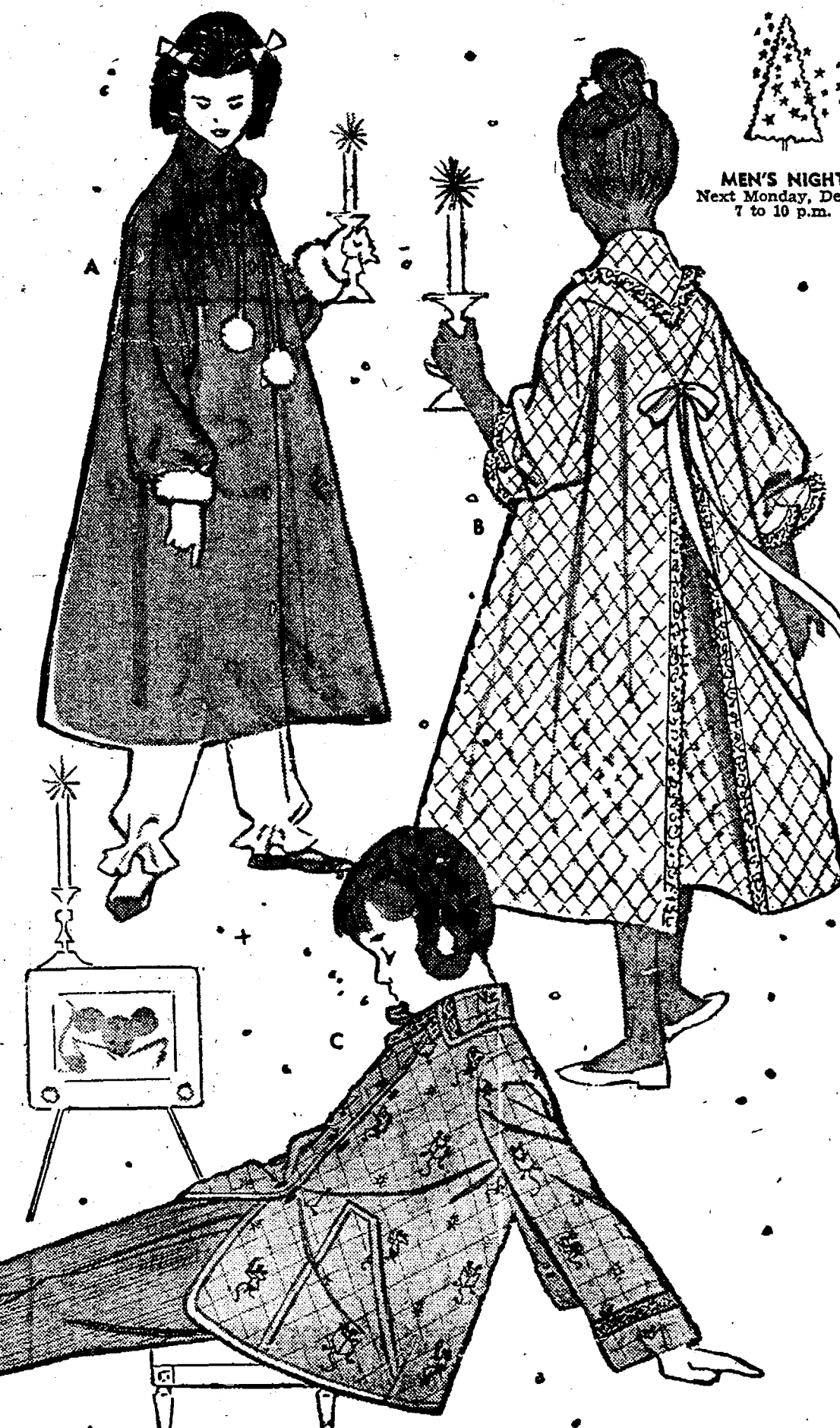

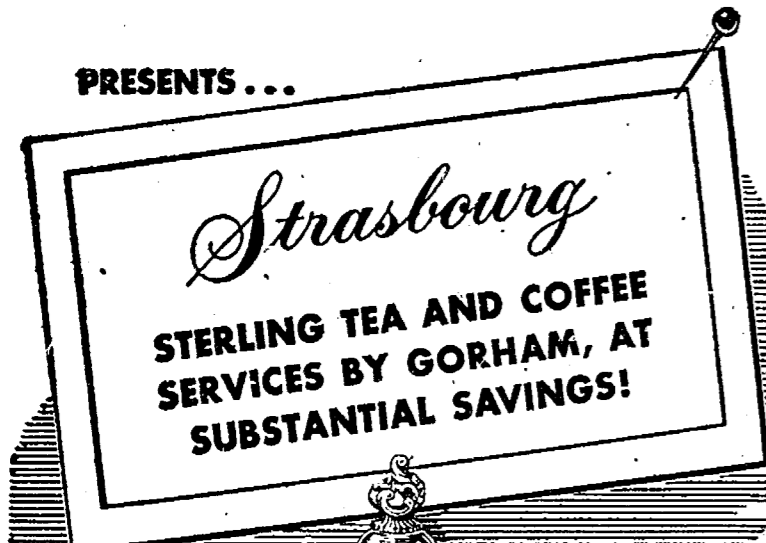

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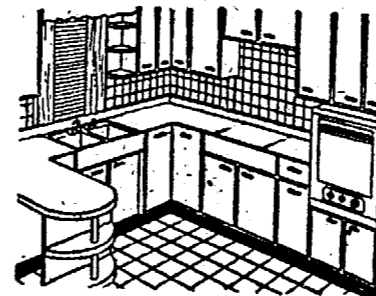

Ford Museum Has Toy Show

The Henry Ford Museum's Seventh Annual Holiday Exhibition, "Under the Christmas Tree," opened Wednesday, December 4, in the museum's main exhibition hall.

Designed to feature toys, the exhibit shows the 18th and 19th century children's idea of Christmas and the toys they received.

The central motif is an old-fashioned balsam tree set in an old time parlor of the 1890's with gifts and toys spread underneath. Strings of cranberries and popcorn decorate the tree, interspersed with hand-blown glass ornaments and decorated cookies.

Featured in the display of gifts and toys under the tree and in nearby cases are the museum's outstanding collections of dolls, toys, games, books and music boxes.

Since dolls played a big role in the lives of yesterday's children, a large number are shown. Included are a group of French Jumeau mechanical dolls, equipped with music boxes; the Edison talking doll of 1887-88, which has a record inside playing "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star"; a three-faced doll, papier-mache and wax-headed dolls and early wood-jointed types.

Oldest toy in the display is a chest made for Patience Hall of Cheshire, Conn., in the style of the family home in 1778. Shaped in the manner of an 18th century five-bay Georgian house, it is lined with newspapers dated 1788.

Toys for young lads of that time include sleds, skates, marbles, blocks and parlor games, toy banks, early jigsaw puzzles, wooden and cast iron pull toys.

Early children's books, which didn't make their appearance until the second half of the 18th century, also are displayed.

In addition, the Detroit Doll Collector's Club has made available for the exhibit some 30 dolls dressed in the national costumes of France, Germany, England and other countries imported during the 18th and 19th century for sale in America.

Fruit Cake Better Aged

Christmas is only a few weeks away and if you plan to make fruit cake you'll want to do it soon. Even the best of fruit cakes are better if they are allowed to mellow, says Anita Dean, extension specialist in foods at Michigan State University.

You can make either light or dark fruit cake, whichever is the family favorite. Or, if you'd like to have more than one type, get together with a neighbor. Each of you can bake a different recipe and then trade.

Candied fruit is available whole or already cut in pieces. Ready-cut fruit saves time. With the whole candied fruits you can cut the sizes and shapes you want.

You may want to do the cutting up of fruits and nuts one day and save the baking until the next. This keeps the job from getting long and tiresome.

When your fruit cake comes out of the oven, put it on a cooling rack. Leave the pan lining paper on the cake. After your cake is thoroughly cold wrap it with waxed paper or aluminum foil and store in an air tight container to age.

Veterans Warned About Insurance

World War Two veterans holding term GI life insurance might do well to ponder the experience of nearly 20,000 veterans of World War One who didn't convert their term policies to permanent GI insurance.

That's the advice of Lloyd H. Jameson, manager of the Veterans Administrative office in Detroit.

Term GI insurance, he explained, must be renewed every five years at an increasingly higher premium rate.

Having carried their term GI-policies through as many as seven renewals, these 20,000 World War One veterans now face an almost insoluble problem, Mr. Jameson said.

Averaging 82 years of age, with their earnings generally declining, they are finding the renewal cost of their term policies so high that many of them are being forced to drop their GI insurance. Even those who can afford to renew currently may not be able to do so in another five years, Mr. Jameson pointed out.

He said that World War Two veterans can avoid the dilemma of their older comrades by converting to permanent GI insurance. The initial cost of permanent insurance is higher than term, but the premium rates do not increase.

In addition, Mr. Jameson explained, permanent GI insurance has a cash surrender, extended insurance, paid up insurance, and loan value. Term insurance has none of these.

Information about conversion of GI insurance policies is available at the VA office in Detroit.

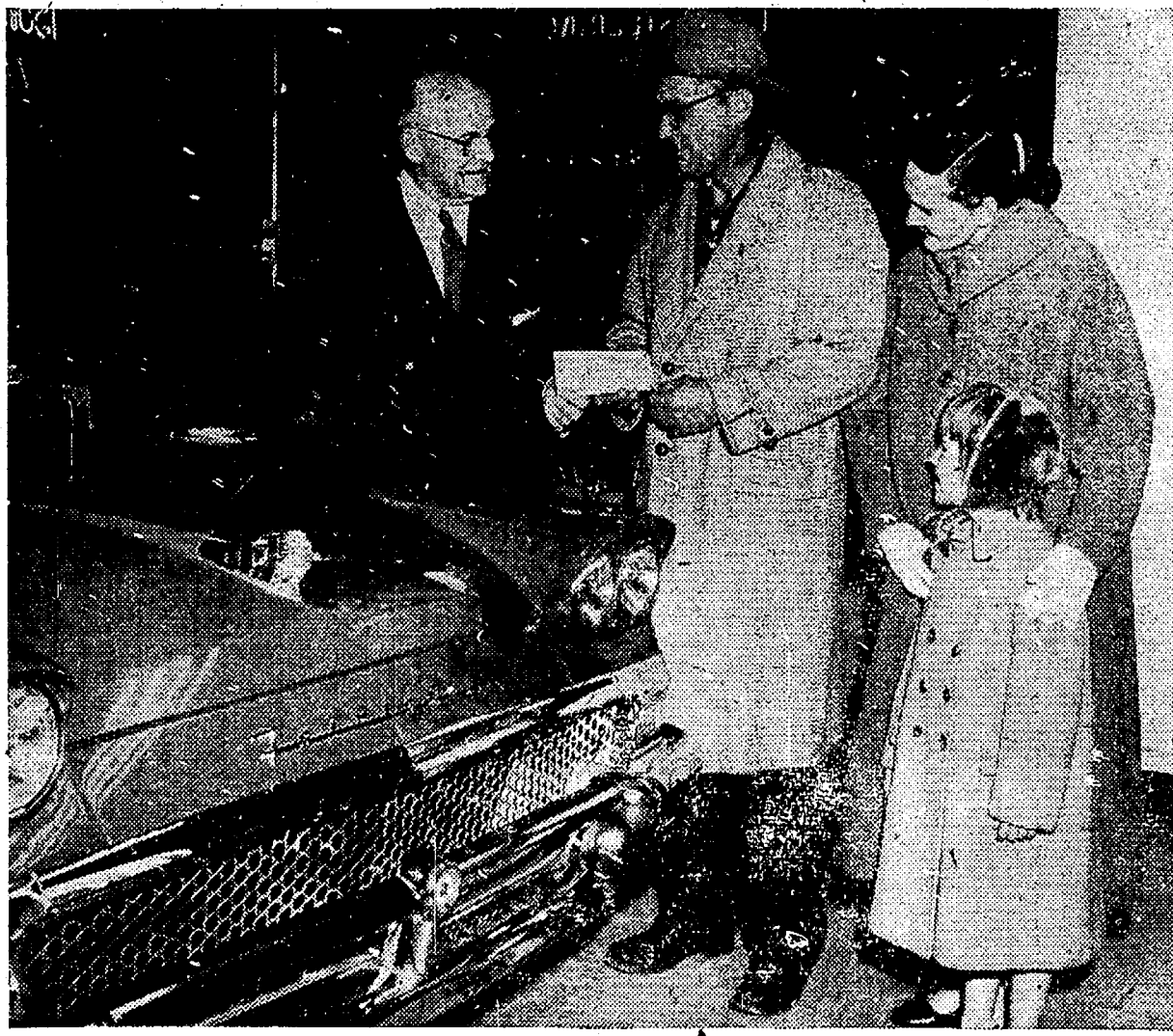

Worst Traffic Month Is Here

Detroit this week began the most critical traffic accident month of the year.

On the basis of records for the past five years, 29 persons will be struck down in Detroit traffic accidents and will not live to see the New Year.

At least two out of three of them will be pedestrians. Most of them will meet death at night when it is more difficult for both pedestrians and drivers to see danger.

Director of Traffic Louis J. Berg stressed these facts in urging the full co-operation of drivers and persons afoot to prevent this threatened Christmas holiday death toll.

"December always takes more lives in traffic than any other month in the year," he said. "We can prevent this needless taking of lives by the combined efforts of Detroit citizens and our police officers who are on the streets to protect lives and property by preventing accidents.

"Our officers have been given special assignments to patrol high accident areas and have been directed to enforce our traffic laws impartially and vigorously," he said. "But voluntary observance of traffic regulations by drivers and pedestrians will make for a happier and a safer Christmas for all."

The Traffic Safety Association pointed out that social drinking increases sharply at this time because of the festivities of the season, presenting a greater traffic hazard than at any other time of the year.

In a special study of 501 fatal Christmas holiday accidents, which killed 609 persons, the National Safety Council found that drinking drivers were involved in 55 percent of the accidents. At other times of the year they are involved in about 30 percent, the Council said.

Applicants Face Wayne Deadline

Applications for admission to Wayne State University in February must be complete and filed by Saturday, December 21, the University's Office of Admissions warned.

With applications running more than 10 percent above a year ago, Hugh E. Sarles, director of admissions, said that his office will hold fast to the deadline set last fall for completed forms.

"Beyond December 21 we can make no guarantees," Sarles said. "We will continue to accept applications, but we cannot give any assurance those applying late will receive a decision in time for February enrollment."

All high schools and prospective applicants were notified of the deadline soon after the date was set. They were warned that all records must be on file at the University by that date.

These records include: an application, an autobiography, transcripts from each college or university attended, a high school transcript, and the entrance examination if required.

Following new registration rules that went into effect this semester, prospective students also were reminded that they must register at their allotted times in accordance with a printed alphabetical and class rank schedule.

A late registration fee and the Dean's signature will be required of anyone completing registration on or after the first day of classes, February 3.

Registration will begin at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 28, and will run through 12 noon, Saturday, Feb. 1.

Also under the new rules, no refunds will be allowed after the second week of classes.

A Festive Holiday Candle



A pilsener-type beer glass provides the mold for this gay little Christmas candle that you'll find is fun and easy to make. You'll probably want to have several around the house during the festive season, as well as some to give away as gifts.

Besides the glass, you'll need 3 bars of wax, a little star-shaped candle holder or ash tray found in any five and ten-cent store, a candle wick, several pipe cleaners and an assortment of colored dragees that are used for decorating cakes, cookies, etc.

Grease the inside of the glass thoroughly with a vegetable shortening and chill. The chilling makes the wax candle easy to remove from the mold.

Melt the 3 bars of Gulfwax in a double boiler (NEVER over direct heat). Let it cool slightly, then pour into the pilsener glass. Before the wax is completely hard, remove from mold and press dragees in with the hand. Scatter colors at random or you may follow a special color scheme.

While the candle is cooling, take the glass star-shaped candle holder or ash tray and pour a little of the melted wax into it. Place the pipe cleaners crossed in the center to form a star. The melted wax

will adhere them to the container. When the candle is cool, place it on top of the pipe cleaners. No glue will be needed since the wax on the pipe cleaners will make the candle stay in place.

Attach metallic stars in your favorite colors to the pipe cleaners in an irregular fashion. A plastic lace doily may be placed underneath the container.

Last of all, heat an ice pick or a steel knitting needle and form a hole in the center of the candle. Place a wick all the way down and pour melted wax in to fill the hole. You may use a wick from an inexpensive candle.

Should you want to make the cone candle in color, just dissolve ordinary wax crayons in the melted wax—dissolve them whole, break them into segments or shave them into the melted Gulfwax. You can control the range of color from pastel to deep shades, by the number of crayons you use.

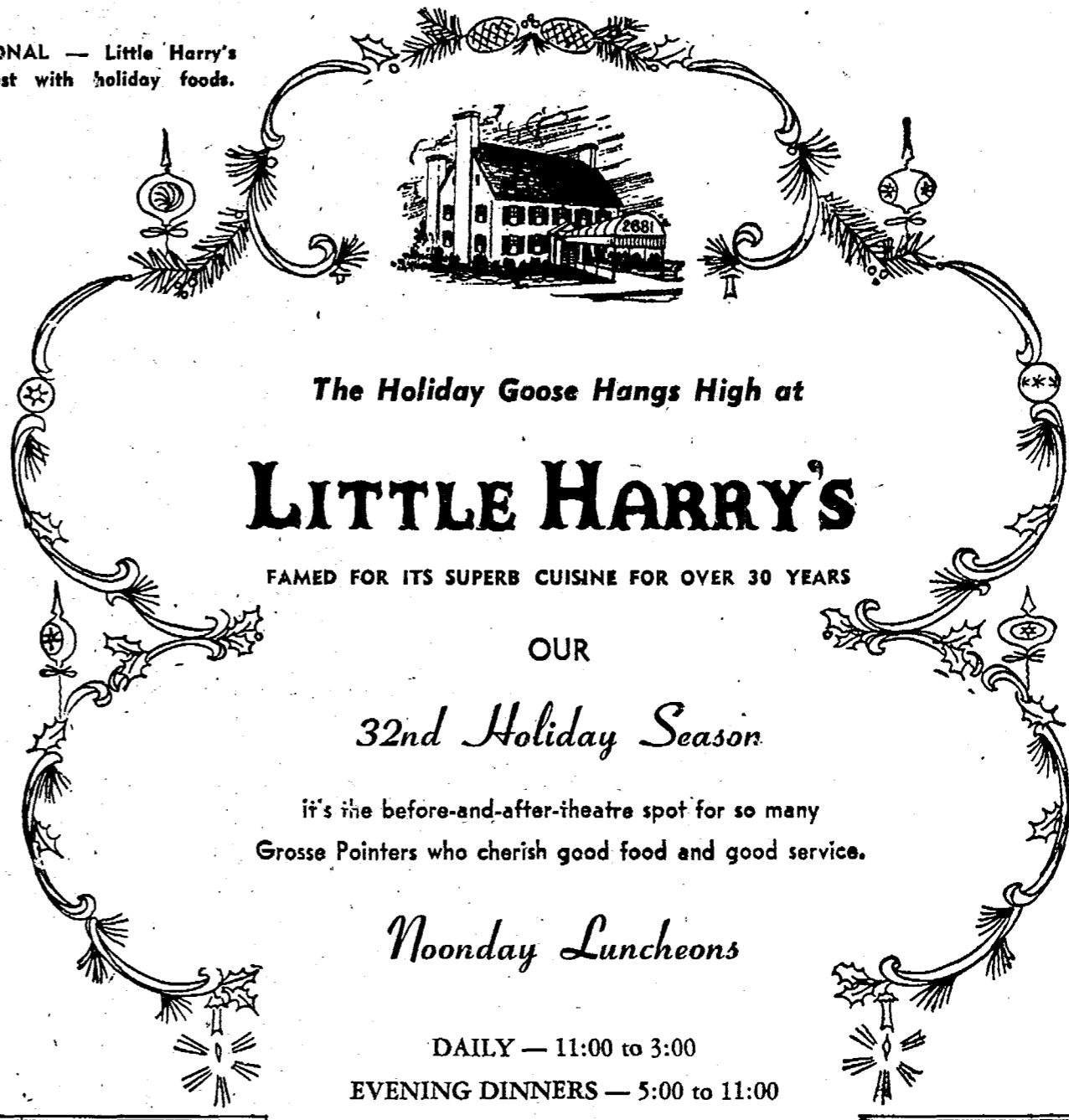

The eggnog is heated in a saucepan over low heat with unflavored gelatine and sugar. Heavy cream, whipped and added to the eggnog and gelatine, gives additional smoothness and richness. Then in go flavorings and the fruit cocktail with its taste medley of peaches, pears, pineapple and cherries. The filling is ready to be turned into a baked pastry crust . . . home assembled or from a mix.

- 1 envelope unflavored gelatine
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups commercially prepared eggnog
- 1 cup whipping cream, whipped
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon almond extract
- 1 can (29 ounces) fruit cocktail, thoroughly drained
- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell

Mix gelatine, sugar and salt. Gradually stir in eggnog. Warm over direct low heat until gelatine is dissolved. Chill until mixture mounds when dropped from spoon. Fold in whipped cream, flavorings, 1 1/2 cups drained fruit cocktail. Chill again until mixture mounds. Heap into baked pie shell. Decorate with remaining fruit cocktail. Chill 2 to 4 hours. YIELD: 1 9-inch pie.

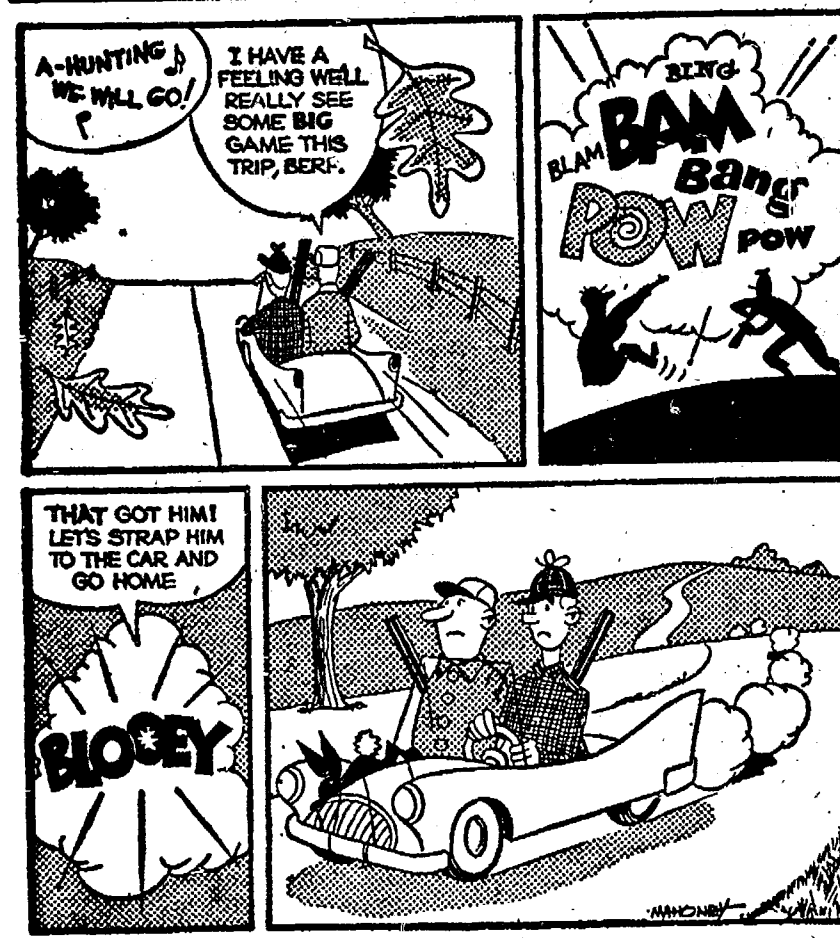

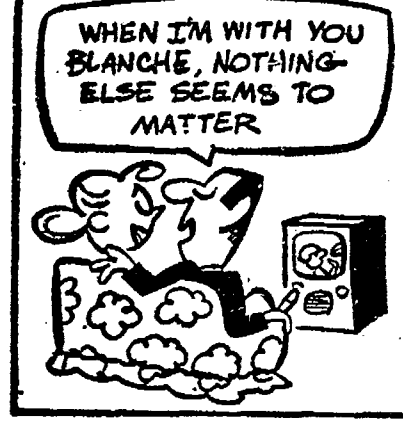

- A—No. The Capitol Building is 287 feet high. The Press Club is 140 feet high. The Munsey Trust Building, at 160 feet, is higher than the Press Club. Although its 12 stories are one less than the Press Club.
- Q—Who led the troops which burned Washington in 1814?
- A—Admiral Sir Geo. Cockburn led his troops into Washington on August 24, 1814, after routing Americans at Bladensburg, Md., one day less than a month earlier. Cockburn's troops burned the Capitol, Library of Congress and the White House. Dolly Madison saved the original Declaration of Independence and Stuart's portrait of Washington.
- Q—Who designed the White House?
- A—James Hoban, an Irish-born architect designed the White House, in a competition that paid \$500. The design was supposedly based on the Duke of Leinster's house in Dublin, with some details selected from other contemporary homes abroad. Although President George Washington chose the site for the White House, he was not present when the cornerstone was laid in 1792 and he never lived in the White House.

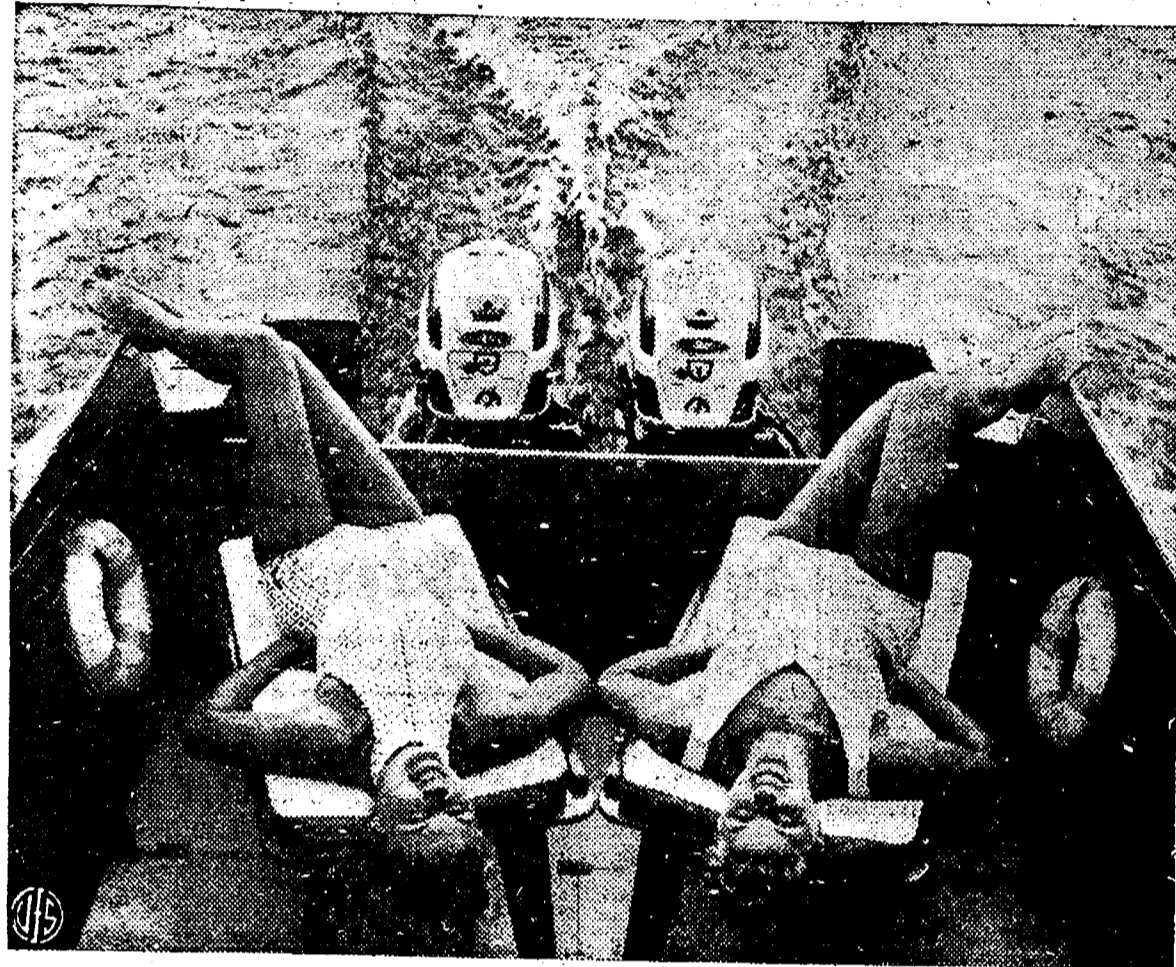

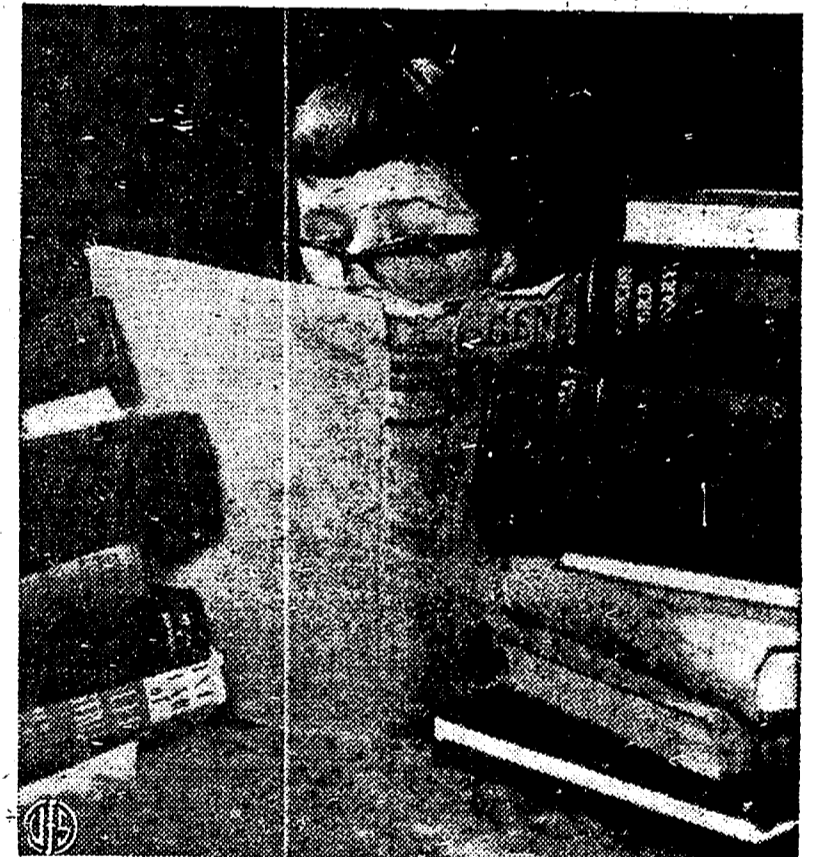

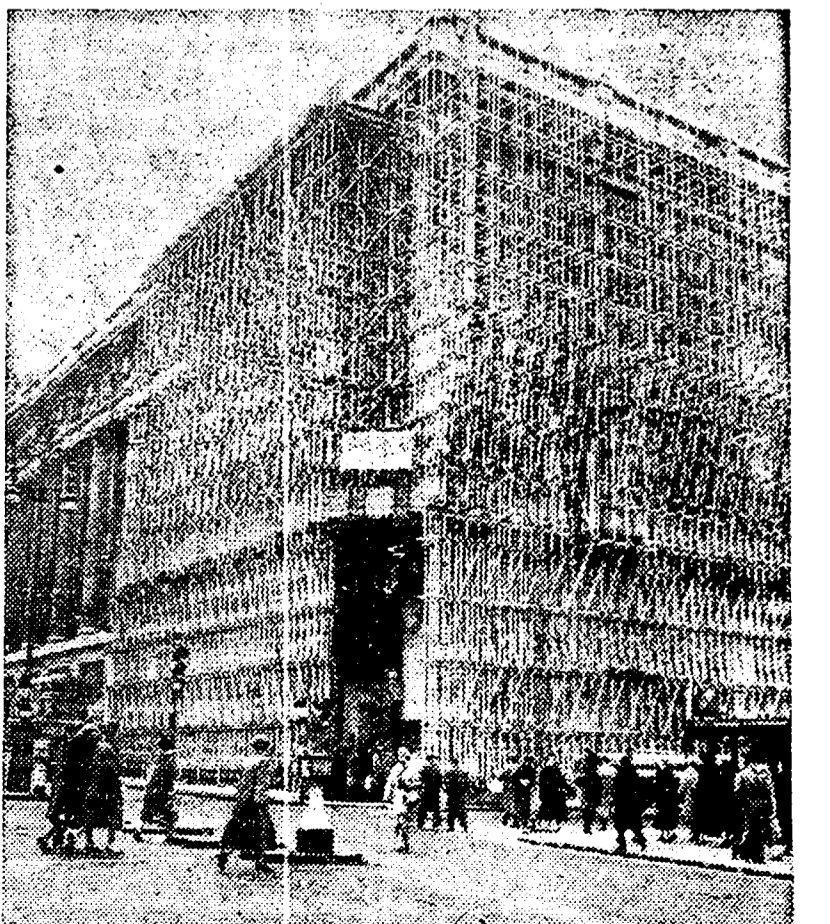
