THE LAST 225 of 1,000 original paratroopers, sent to enforce court-ordered integration at Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas, have returned to their base in Fort

Campbell, Kentucky, by plane. The contingent of the 101st Airborne Division moved into Little Rock September 24 after violent protests by segregationists set off rioting.

MORE THAN 100 POLICE, citizens and Boy Scouts resumed searching at daybreak for a Taylor Township boy, 10, missing since 3:30 p.m. yes-

Taylor Township police, after an 11-hour fruitless search, indicated they thought the boy had run away because he feared punishment over failing grades. The boy's mother, June, 34, said Harold, their only child, had never run away before.

President Eisenhower's "caged lion" eagerness to get back to work too soon shaped up today as one of the biggest problems left in his steady rebound from the mild stroke he suffered Monday. The reaction was reported by Vice President Nixon, who said late yesterday that Eisenhower's "recovery is sure." He spiked rumors Eisenhower might re-

Describing the President as "One of the major problems in this case is to see that he gets the rest his doctors believe he needs prior to resuming his full duties."

The President's excellent recovery progress was reflected on the New York Stock Exchange, where stocks more than recouped the four-billiondollar plus loss on Tuesday when Eisenhower's true illness was disclosed.

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER, in an astounding display of recovery from his brain artery in its twelfth annual "Men's and freezers, and those for blockage on Monday, left the Night". White House Thursday and went to church. Furthermore, the White House said he and Mrs. Eisenhower hope to go to Gettysburg, Penna. Friday.

Mr. Eisenhower's doctors will decide later, it was said, whether he will fly to Paris in a couple of weeks for the North Atlantic Pact meeting.

NATO NATIONS decided Thursday to go ahead with next month's summit meeting even if President Eisenhower cannot attend.

A communique from NATO's permanent Council said it "learned with regret" about the President's illness and seemed to take for granted that Vice President Nixon would sit in for Mr. Eisenhower saying "It learned with satisfaction that Vice President Nixon would lead the American delegation.



The fact that city officials are making a third try for a bond issue, for the new edifice. attests that they are cognizant of the fact that the present city hall is inadequate and antiquated, for the fastest The matter of the ownership of the money was placed on growing Pointe.

It was pointed out at the committee meeting, that if the bond issue is not passed, then other means will have to be devised to acquire a new building, perhaps through "piece-meal" construction, that is, a little at a time. This method would be more costly to the taxpayers than if the bond issue is passed.

Might Take 25 Years Mayor Kenneth Koppin said that building the new city hall a little at a time, would cover perhaps a period of about 25 years because this could only be done when money is availfound, abided by a ruling

He said this method would entail a higher cost to the taxpayers because labor and material costs are bound to go up, whereas, if the bond issue is passed, the material and labor would be at the prevailing figure.

He said, too, that if the issue is defeated, the city will have to rent space to house the various departments, and this also would be extremely costly to the taxpayers.

Sees No Tax Increase The mayor pointed out that the bond issue will be spread over a 30-year period, and that payment will come from city operational funds, and that he is confident there will be no

(Continued from Page 1) Berns, two weeks ago, who opinioned that the city did not have the legal right to determine who is entitled to the \$100, and turned the money over to the city treasurer.

Would Wait for Years The city attorney said, at the time, that the ownership

would have to be determined in court, but if claimants do not institute legal action, the money will have to remain in the treasury until the expiration of a six-year statute of limitation, after which Linda could have it.

The council approved a resolution authorizing City Treasurer Helen Fox to return the \$100 bill to Director Bailey, who in turn was authorized to give the money to Linda's parents, on presentation of a signed receipt and an indemnity release.

Berns told the council that by its action, it could be involved in a legal tangle with the claimants, if the claimants seek court action. He told the mayor and the three councilmen they would have to pay the money out of their own pockets, including court costs, if they were sued and lost.

Assume Responsibility

The mayor and the councilmen took a "devil may care" attitude, stating that the money has been held for more than a year, and no court action has been taken, therefore, the money belongs to Linda.

The city attorney said that the money would have to be turned over to the child's parents, and that they themselves must sign the receipt and indemnity release because Linda in a minor.

The serial number of the \$100 bill was made part of the resolution because, it was said, it is the same one found by the girl.

There were three claimants seeking the money, one making a claim as late as November 17. They are:

Kurt P. Hirschelman of 1703 Manchester (since · deceased) who put in a claim on October 6, 1956; Mrs. Anna Clawson of 2111 Parkview, Detroit, a school teacher, who entered a claim several days after Hirschelman; and the later claimant, Shirley Kulka of 3507 Frederick, Detroit.

Veterans Warned About Insurance

World War Two veterans holding term GI life insurance might do well to ponder the experience of nearly 20,000 veterans of World War One who didn't convert their term policies to permanent GI in-

That's the advice of Lloyd H. ameson, manager of the Veterans Administrative office in

Term GI insurance, he explained, must be renewed every five years at an inreasingly higher premium

Having carried their term GI-policies through as many as seven renewals, these 20,000 World War One veterans now face an almost insoluble problem, Mr. Jameson said.

Averaging 62 years of age, with their earnings generally declining, they are finding the renewal cost of 'their term policies so high that many of them are being forced to drop their GI insurance. Even those who can afford to renew currently may not be able to do so in another five years, Mr. Jameson pointed out.

He said that World War Two veterans can avoid the dilemma of their older comrades by converting to permanent GI insurance. The initial cost of permanent insurance is higher than term, but the premium rates do not increase. In addition, Mr. Jameson







The Alger name is one closely associated with service to the nation, state and community and Pointers may. proudly claim a closer relationship with the family which donated the War Memorial to their home town.

But in that intimate summer resort colony of the long ago 1870's General Russell A. Alger was not a member. He was known throughout the city as the commander of a Michigan regiment that fought brillantly at Gettysburg and as the founder of a thriving lumber fortune but his son did not bring the Alger name to the Pointe until 1910.

That was the year the Algers bought the land from the T. H. Hinchman estate on which to build the fabulous Italian Renaissance home which now houses so much of our civic life.

The Hinchmans were early summer pioneers, building their frame house in the midst of the Civil War, 1862. Mrs. Hinchman, wife of the prominent Detroit merchant, recalled traveling out to look at the property owned by a Mrs. Fisher. On the four acres of land fronting Lake St. Clair there were 80 apple trees in full bloom and a gentle breeze blowing in from the shore.
