hearing were too late for this issue of the NEWS.
Following his suspension, Lietke retained Prete as his attorney, and on July 22, the lawyer dispatched a letter to Village President Jack Williams, Commissioner Huettner, Chief Duemling and Superintendent Jefferis, protesting the suspension.

Prete demanded a full hearing before President Williams, "as provided in the Ordinance, Rules and Regulations of the Police Department, as adopted, revised and amended by the Village."
Illegality Charged
The lawyer charged the suspension was illegal for the following reasons: 1. That no hearing was given to John F. Lietke in accordance with Village ordinances, rules and regulations; 2. That no notice of hearing for suspension was given, orally or in writing; 3. That no cause or reason for suspension or removal was given; 4. That Officer John F. Lietke was not permitted an opportunity to be represented by counsel; 5. That he was subjected to abuses and invasion of privacy; 6. That his suspension was arbitrary, capricious, without cause and an abuse of power.

Prete then made the following demands: 1. Full and public hearing as provided by law; 2. Copy of alleged letter of alleged complaint from one Jean Francis Mesritz; 3. Copy of records, files and reports of the suspension of Officer John F. Lietke; and 4. Copy of any report or communication from Dr. Allan Canty of his interview with Officer John F. Lietke.

Received No Reply
The attorney said that as of Monday, August 8; he had received no communications from village officials regarding his demands. He said the officer re-

ceived a notice postmarked Friday, August 5, at 7:30 p.m., scheduling the hearing on his suspension for Tuesday evening.

Prete said that the lack of meeting his demands for evidence cannot be overlooked as the rights of his client are in jeopardy and he could not properly prepare the officer's defense without the records requested.

In his letters to village officials, the attorney protested the untimely and "quickie" setting of the hearing and for the failure to meet his demands for the documents, as well as failure to notify him as Lietke's counsel.

He would attend the hearing, Prete said, and make an oral request for an adjournment.

ing to have the Submerged Land Act declared unconstitutional.

Heffler said that if the Park should pay the State for the submerged land at Three Mile drive, and the statute should be declared unconstitutional, it is very unlikely that the State will refund the money.

He said that so far, Michigan has collected more than \$700,000 from municipalities and private citizens, for submerged lands, none of which will possibly be returned to purchasers.

The city attorney cited several cases in which the Submerged Land Acts was upheld by high state courts, giving the State clear title to filled land.

He said that final decision in the case brought before the Supreme Court by the citizen should be given by October or November. In the meantime, it was recommended that the Park file an application for the wanted property.

The Park is not only seeking to buy the submerged land attached to its Three Mile property, but also that of submerged land on private property belonging to Mrs. James McMillan, west of the proposed park area; and that belonging to the J. L. Griegers, to the east.

The private owners are opposing the city's attempts to get the filled land in front of their properties, desiring it for themselves. The city and owners are trying to negotiate a compromise.

If it should obtain all of the filled lands, the Park, with the fast land it owns at the foot of Three Mile drive, will have approximately 18 acres which it hopes to develop into additional recreational park area for its citizens.

At Monday night's meeting

the council approved expenditure of \$3,875, for grading, fertilizing and seeding of approximately 200,000 square feet of its Three Mile property known

as Section A. This piece of property extends from Essex in the direction of the lake, to a point approximately at the private property lines on Grand Marais.

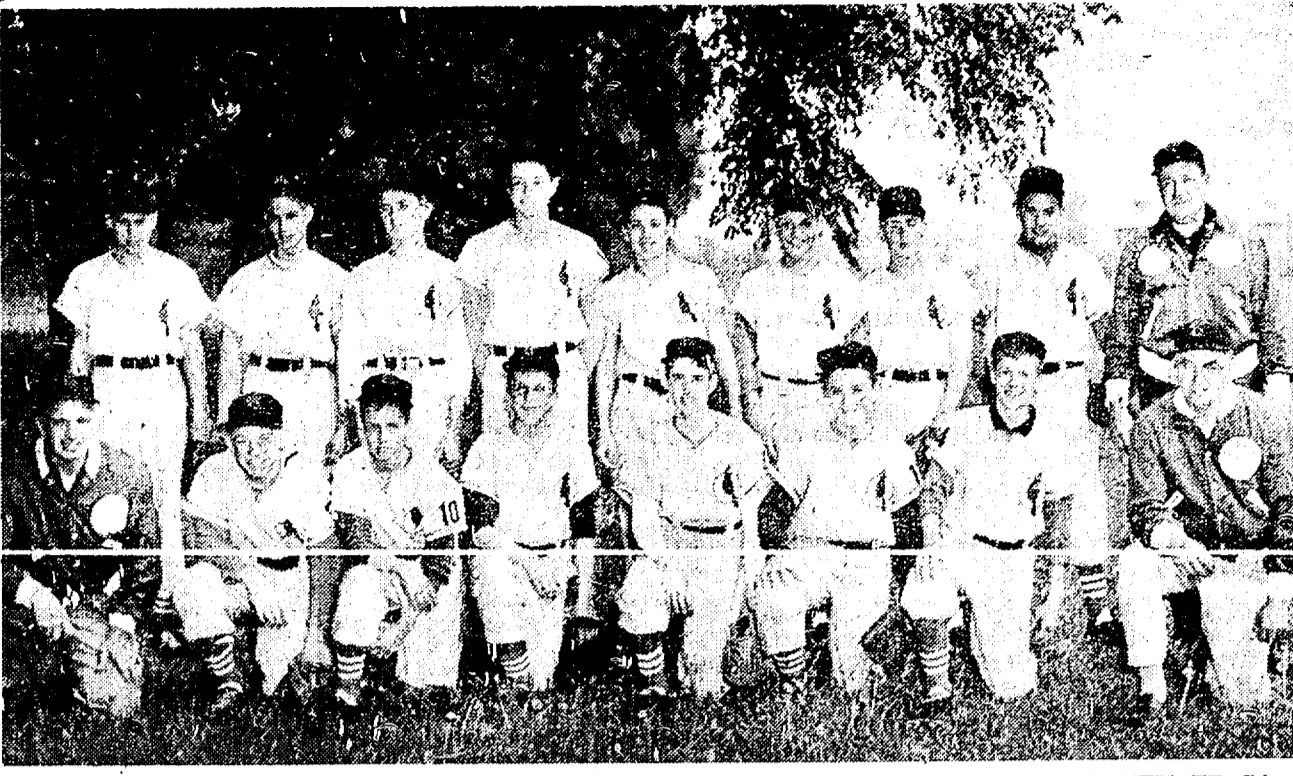

A far-reaching interest in athletics has led Jack Tompkins to travel around the world representing the Detroit Olympic Committee and nearer home, to coach one of the Pointe's Little League baseball teams.

Better known, perhaps, for his aviation connections, Mr. Tompkins is Detroit manager of American Airlines and has been with that company since 1935. A Michigan native, he is widely known throughout the state and considered by many as the foremost figure in commercial aviation hereabouts.

Began Sports Career
Mr. Tompkins' sports attachments go back to his University of Michigan days, when he captained both baseball and hockey teams and was three times named to the All-American Collegiate Hockey team.

Following graduation, he played professional baseball for several years with a Detroit Tigers farm club, and professional hockey in the International and National Leagues while under contract to the Detroit Red Wings.

Olympic Games Committee
In 1946, Tompkins was appointed to the committee to represent Detroit in negotiations to bring the Olympic Games to the city. Since that time as a committee member, he has made a number of trips to Europe conducting negotiations concerning the Olympics.

He was in Germany last year for meetings held to determine the 1964 Olympic site (Tokyo). The Games were last held in the United States in 1932, when Los Angeles was host city. Since the United States Olympic Association has designated Detroit for the honor when next the Olympics come to this country, Tompkins and his fellow committee members have now set their sights on a 1968 goal.

This month will find Tompkins going (by air, naturally) to Rome to attend the current Olympic games and to campaign for U.S. chances in 1968.
