FORTY - FOUR - YEAR - OLD Robert S. McNamara, of Ann Arbor, has been named President of the Ford Motor Company. He was elevated from the post of vice president and group executive. A native of California, McNamara will be primarily responsible for operations, with Henry Ford II retaining full responsibility for general company management.

DETROIT POLICE nabbed six men and plan to make three more arrests in the cracking of a million-dollar-a-year narcotics ring that had been in operation for six months in the Detroit area. The gang was selling 30 per cent pure heroin to "pushers" who in turn broke it down to the usual three per cent strength for sale to ad-

SENATOR JOHN F. KEN-NEDY will be the next President of the United States, but his margin of victory was the narrowest in nearly half a century. In Michigan, Democrats swept top offices, though en-countering a revitalized out-state Republican party. He grabbed his rifle, he said, and ran to the kitchen where he fired at the opening Moments later, police found Lawrence J. Vendam lying in the back yard about 120 feet from the Miller house. He was wearing a handkerchief mask. Police said the boy had a record as a juvenile offender.

VICE PRESIDENT Richard M. Nixon has denied yesterday's announcement by a Republican aide that he and GOP Chairman Thruston B. Morton would follow a course which could lead to vote recounts in 11 states. Rumors of election errors cr fraud in the close contest had led Morton to ask Republican leaders to check the vote in their areas with a view to possible entering of recount demands. However, Nixon said that as far as he is concerned, the decision made by voters on Tuesday still stands and he will not contest John F. Kennedy's election to the Presidency.

Sunday, November 13 AS SEVERAL PROMINENT Michigan Republicans prepare to pack their bags and leave Washington in January, at least one well-known state Democrat hopes to buy a one-way ticket to the Nation's capital this winter. Governor G. Mennen (Soapy) Williams announced recently that he was "available" for a government position and some observers think

that he may get it. Question is how instrumental was Governor Williams in securing Michigan's electoral votes for the Democrats and what does President-elect John F. Kennedy intend to do about it. Rumor says that Williams will be the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare in the new administration. Senator Kennedy says he has made no commitments.

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

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

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
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Nabbed Speeder **Denies Charges**

Jim started his skiing career on the golf course of his home town, Winchester, Mass., at the age of five. Even then he took great delight in schussing from the top of the slope. A few years later with the innovation of "harnesses," he learned to turn, but by then his schussing tendencies were firmly imbedded. To this day he will schuss almost any slope, and the stitching line. with a camera in hand, he produces some very interesting results, as you will see.

He has some rather unique filming techniques, such as skiing down the slopes with the camera between his legs, shooting ahead of him. He will also shoot back between his legs or off to one side. One of his favorite techniques is skiing backwards ahead of an' approaching skier.

Jim says, "This is teadier, and allows better framing of the subject. "It's no wonder that he has acquired the reputation of being the "maddest" photographer on skis. His equipment has had to withstand the ordeals. In the past five years he broken seventeen pair of ski plus a few cameras.

In the final assembly of a ski movie, Jim finds that the editing table is where the movie is really made. He says that anyone can take ski movies, but it's the editing of the film that separates excellence from mediocrity. He estimates that he spends at least three hundred hours to edit one film.



Meanwhile, the embattled Orleans Parish School Board, fearing contempt-of-court action, struggled to keep the schools open as usual.

Segregationist Governor Jimmie H. Davis has called the legislature into a 30 day special session in hopes of finding a legal loophole. William Rogers, U. S. Attorney General, said in Washington that he would use the full power of the Federal government to check any resistance or obstruction of integration as ordered by the courts.

A VISIT WITHOUT PRECE-DENT took place today between President-Elect John F. Kennedy and his defeated rival for the Presidency, Vice-President Richard M. Nixon. Kennedy asked to meet Nixon at the Vice President's vacation retreat on Key Biscayne, an island 10 miles from Miami.

Speculation is rising that the Soviet government may later intend to make the ruble an international currency with sufficient strength to challenge the dollar for primacy among world currencies.

A CAPSULE ejected by an Air Force Discoverer XVII orbiting satellite was caught over the Pacific near Hawaii yes terday by an Air Force C-119. Pelican II. It was the second successful air catch in history.

In overall performance, the Air Force said, this was the most successful operation in the Discoverer series. Officials said the capsule carried instruments to record sun spot activity in space. The signal for capsule ejection was delayed 24 hours to enable the satellite to gather môre information.

Wednesday, November 16 HENRY FORD II surprised officials of the giant Ford Motor limited of England with a bid to take over the balance of stock held by British shareholders. The American Ford Motor Company which already owns 54.6 percent of the British operation, offered \$20.50 for each stock unit making the total offer worth \$363,339,482. United States firm said that if the offer is accepted, it does not intend to change the companies' operations, its employment policy, or the development program. Since its inception in 1911, the British firm has grown into a huge complex of factories with a labor force

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

Con-Con Controversy

Voters in the Pointe and East Side Detroit in the 14th Congressional District were bombarded during the weekend just prior to the November 8 election with literature urging a "No" vote on the Constitutional Convention proposal. Members of the League of Women Voters and others who have worked hard sponsoring the proposal, have expressed considerable resentment over the last minute attempt to torpedo their campaign, and the methods used.

The one-page sheet, printed on both sides, contended that to vote for Con-Con would be to "fall into a CIO trap." Mrs. G. Sam Zilly, executive secretary of the Republican 14th District organization and an executive board member of the ultraconservative Republican Voters Associated, was one of the major sponsors of the sheet, although it was only signed "Prepared by Michigan Citizens Against a Constitutional Convention." She has said she and one other person financed the printing, which was done on the district organization presses. Those backing the Con-Con proposal are particularly bitter about the organization presses being rented for such an attack, and the way distribution was handled. The sheet was enclosed in literature urging election of the Republican candidates in the district.

It is doubtful how much harm to the Con-Con cause was done at the polls by the circulation of the Vote No sheet, as probably the majority of voters were so stuffed with campaign literature and speeches at this late hour that they didn't take time to read it. The proponents of the proposal, who didn't have time before the election to answer the charges contained in the sheet, have requested an opportunity to state their views. The following two letters express the opinions of those who backed the proposal.

To the Editor: Your statements on October 27 concerning anonymous letters was beautifully put. Have you seen the recent circular distributed a few days before the election, headed Vote No on Con-Con, and signed Michigan Citizens Against Con-Con? In addition to being anonymous, the authors also practiced plagiarism, I would say. Citizens for Michigan is an incorporated group of sincere and dedicated individuals ready and willing to stand up

I found a copy of this publication, urging a "no" vote on Con-Con, at my front door the morning of Sunday, November 6, two days before the election. The sheet was folded and placed inside the "Pointe Voter", a two-sided sheet urging me to help "elect" two local Republican candidates.

This anti-Con-Con sheet said three countles would elect 40 per cent of the delegates to a constitutional convention. This statement is false. The item further states "This would mean control by organized labor." This is not a fact, but an opinion based on the supposition that only organized labor representatives would be elected delegates from all of Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb counties. The only person who has indicated so far that he would be willing to serve as a delegate, (not as an advisor) is George Romney, and note he lives in one of these three counties.

In 1958, a different Con-Con proposal, based on 3 delegates from each Senate district only, was defeated. The present Con-Con plan (Proposal Three on the ballot) is a compromise based on one delegate for each member of our state legislature.

CODE NO. 4-01 AMENDMENT TO ELECTRICAL **CODE ORDINANCE** ORDINANCE NO. 144

AN ORDINANCE to amend Sections 1 and 2 of the Electrical Code Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being: An Ordinance to Regulate the Installation, Alterations, Repair, Servicing, Maintenance and Use of Electrical Equipment in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms; to Provide for the Issuance of Permits and Collection of Fees Therefor, for Inspection of Electrical Equipment, and for Licensing of Electrical Contractors and Journey-

men; and to Repeal Ordinance Number 56.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ORDAINS: Section 1. of the Electrical Code Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 133 adopted September 8, 1958, is hereby amended to read as follows:

"SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF ELECTRICAL CODE. A certain document, a copy of which is on file in the office of the City Clerk, available for inspection by and distribution to the public at all times, and which is marked and designated as the 'National Electrical Code, 1959', and which is an electrical code promulgated by an organization or association organized and conducted for the purpose of eveloping such code, is hereby adopted, and is to be used in regulating the installation, alteration, repair, servicing, maintenance and use of electrical equipment in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms; and each and all of the provisions, conditions and terms of such National Electrical Code, 1959, on file in the office of the City Clerk, are hereby referred to, adopted and made a part hereof as if fully set out in

this ordinance, with the additions, insertions, deletions and changes prescribed in Section 2 of this ordinance." Section 2. of the Electrical Code Ordinance of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, being Ordinance No. 153 adopted September 8, 1958, is hereby amended to read as follows:

SECTION 2, UNIFORM ELECTRICAL RULES, A certain document, a copy of which is on file in the office of the City Clerk, available for inspection by and distribution to the public at all times and which is marked and designated as the 'Uniform Electrical Rules,' and which has been promulgated by the Reciprocal Electrical Council, of been promulgated by the Reciprocal Electrical Council, of Detroit, Michigan, an organization or association organized and conducted for the purpose of developing such rules, is hereby referred to, adopted and made a part hereof as if fully set out in this ordinance, and shall control and supersede the provisions of the National Electrical Code, 1959, on all matters covered by said Uniform Electrical Rules. In the cardination of the Uniform Electrical Rules, the tent the application of the Uniform Electrical Rules, the term 'Electrical Inspection Authority' used therein, stall mean the City Manager of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms; and an Electrical Board shall be appointed by the City Manager in accordance with the provisions of said Uniform Electrical

Section 3. If any provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Joseph Campau was the wealthiest man in Michigan when he died in 1863. His estate was estimated at one million dollars, most of it in valuable property.

He owned some 2,000 acres in Grosse Pointe and there were many heirs entitled to a share. His daughter, Emily W. Lewis, was among them and her share became a matter of legal dispute.

At 40 years old she had eloped with George W. Lewis, 22, to Rochester, N.Y. Their marriage of a few months was not a happy one. At one time she left her husband and began divorce proceedings but he persuaded her that a reconciliation would be best. During the few months of the marriage Mr. Campau died without leaving a will. Not long after Emily died and George became her heir. The couple had no children.

There followed months of litigation for George was opposed by a whole battery of Campaus. A famous Pointer, Cleaveland Hunt, was appointed administrator for the dispute but he resigned in 1869. George was in deep financial trouble and sold his interest to William C. Duncan who then took up the battle. He finally sold his interest, which was three twentieths of the estate, for \$12,400, to Catherine D. C. Palms another daughter of Joseph Campau, and various other heirs.

Joseph Campau was a remarkable man of his age. He had been well educated in Montreal, spoke and wrote both English and French. He made his early fortune trading with the Indians and then took this money to buy property. He married Adelaide Dequindre and more property came with her.

He was a founder of the Detroit Free Press, appraisor, overseer of the poor, major in the militia, inspector of water barrels, city treasurer and assessor.

A member of the parish of St. Anne's he became interested in the new site of that church after it was burnt and tried to persuade Father Gabriel Richard and the parish to move the church to some lands he owned. There was much bitterness and friction which ended in another site, on Larned, being chosen, and Joseph Campau's excommunication from the Catholic Church. He was not alone, but when the new church was dedicated, the other communicants including a Moran, a Chapotan, a Gouin, a Chene, all repented, but not Campau.

The land which he held in Grosse Pointe eventually was sold by his decendants to the LeGrande Land Co. who developed the Whittier road subdivision.
