

Thursday, December 1 STILL GLOWING over the success of the National Automobile Show in Cobo Hall, directors of the Automobile Manufacturers Association decided unanimously to hold the next Auto Show in Detroit in 1962. The auto exposition in October netted a new world attendance record of 1,403,873 and oettered by four times the previous record at the last auto show in 1956.

FOURTEEN PEOPLE remained trapped today on a I berian freighter caught aground Tuesday in Lake Michigan off South Manitou Island. Captain Eduardo Trivirazara, his pregnant wife, and 12 crewmen stayed below the decks, waiting for the 10 to 15 foot waves to subside. Coast Guard ships stood by, but Captain Trivirazara said that no attempts to free the ship should be made until he determined the damage to the hull. As the St. Lawrence Seaway locks close Thursday, the ship will have to spend the winter in a Great Lakes port. Grew mem bers will return home.

HENRY FORD II, one of President Dwight D. Eisen-hower's closest industrial friends, was asked by Treasury Secretary, Robert B. Anderson, to consider America's golddollar shortage when conducting negotiations for the purchase of full ov-.ership of Ford of England. The unprecedented personal plea amounted almost to an official government request. The transfer could be accomplished and save American dollars at the same time it was hoped, by using pounds sterling purchased from British creditors in this country instead of dollars. This possibility was rejected by Britain.

Goodfellows Need \$52.63 Total Help of Citizens To Raise \$10,000

Pointe Lions Club Ask Residents to Contribute Gen-

Below Other Four Pointes

Park Is Only 33 Cents Per Thousand Higher and Detroit is Lower Than Any Pointe

The Farms council on Monday, December 5, proudly boasted that for the third consecutive year, it has the lowest tax rate per \$1,000 assessed valuation, of all the Pointes and Harper Woods. In comparison, Detroit was lower than the Farms by a little more than two dollars.

On the Pointe-Harper Woods city tax rate level, the Woods and Harper Woods taxpayers are assessed \$14.55 per \$1,000; at the county level, a matter of three cents puts the Farms at the bottom; and the Shores pays the least School District tax.

Detroit Taxes Lower

In Detroit, the city tax rate is \$25.26 per \$1,000 assessed valuation; there is no drain tax; county tax is \$6.87 per \$1,060; school tax, \$18.35 per Tuesday morning, Novem- \$1,000, making the total tax \$50.48 per \$1,000.

A Chance To Be Selfish


Charity seems to be staying too close to home in this holiday season in the Pointe. It is probably just that late-hour pressure of having to buy gifts for all those by whom we expect to be remembered, but we appear to have muffed a great opportunity to taste a morsel of that wonderful satisfaction which we are told comes when we practice the teaching "It is better to give than to receive."

Last week this paper carried a story about a family of 10, with eight children ranging from 4 to 19, who had been made homeless when their rented home was gutted by fire the day before Thanksgiving. Their possessions were reported an almost total loss. The parents started out immediately to look for a new home and during the search the mother fell and broke her ankle. She was hospitalized for three days, then put in a walking cast.

This had all the aspects of a case that called for quick action on the part of those who are interested in helping when help is drastically needed. And there were those who responded, but the response was distressingly slight. A kindly woman in Detroit who did not even know them, read the story and offered shelter in her home to as many of the family as could be accommodated there. The Crisis Club of Grosse Pointe said it was standing by to do whatever was most needed; so did the Goodfellows. And the sisters of Bon Secours Hospital, headed by Mother Liborius, announced the establishment of a fund to accept money and clothes and furniture and household goods to help the stricken residents. Some donations were received.

The sisters of Bon Secours had an added reason for feeling sorry for this family which has been described as being "so modest, so humble and anxious to help themselves." One of the children, handicapped at birth, has spent a good part of the time in the hospital, and the mother has worked evening hours and until 2 in the morning to help defray the expenses. The father suffered a serious coronary several years ago, but is working now under this added burden.

Since the fire the family has been divided, some of the children being housed with relatives, others with friends. Now it has found a 3-bedroom house in Muir road and has rented it, hopeful of being reunited for the holidays. Plans have been made to move in this weekend, but we can imagine the complications in-volved. NATIONS receiving United States foreign aid may not in the future spend the money in 19 economically strong countries. In a new move to halt the gold exodus from this country the State Department told countries receiving such aid that they must use the funds to trade with underdeveloped nations or with the United States While the new order is not expected to save a great many dollars in itself, it is hoped that it will prompt some of the 19 nations involved to assume the burden of financing more of their exports to underdeveloped areas.

PRESIDENT-ELECT John F.

Kennedy received a defense report advočating sweeping shakeups which would save the United States eight billion dollars a year. Among the more controversial suggestions was a proposal to abolish the Army, Navy, and Air Force secretaries. The special study com mittee report said that the entity of the three services should be maintained, but more than 17 posts in addition to the secretaries could be abolished. Kennedy received the report from chairman Stuart Symington, former Air Force Secretary in the Truman administration. He called it an "interesting and constructive study.





For 40 years Dr. Jean Baptiste Chapoton signed every death certificate in the colony of Detroit. These were the years following his arrival at Fort Pontchartrain after 1719. For 200 years the Chapoton name has been known in Detroit and its suburbs.

In 1879 the family owned a large tract of land bordering the Milk River above eight mile road and stretching to the lake. On Mack avenue today a row of apartments, Chapoton Manor, reminds residents of this French family's contribution to the development of the east side.

The Chapotons came from the south of France. The doctor, also a major in the French army, had 20 children. The doctor finally retired and farmed on a private claim on the east side of Hastings street.

His children married Godfreys, Chenes, Pelletiers, Cicottes and Trombleys, all the best French families of the day. Jean Baptiste Chapoton III lost much of the family estate and his son, Eustache Chapoton, wished to redeem the loss and opened a Tavern at the foot of Woodward.

He was quite successful but gave up the tavern because of a sermon he heard at old St. Anne's Church. The priest denounced the selling of liquor to Indians and said there was little hope of salvation for a man who tempted others.

The former inn keeper apprenticed himself to a builder and in a few years branched out for himself. He knew little mathematics and little writing but he would count the bricks by 100's by putting out match sticks. By hard work he became a master builder and aquired the princely sum of \$100,000. He built St. Peter's and St. Paul's Jesuit Church on Jefferson avenue, fought in the War of 1812 and died in 1871.

His son, Alexander, carried on the building trade. He courted Felice Monteuil, of Walkerville, Ont., a strenuous romance because every time he wished to visit her he had to paddle a canoe across the river. He served in the state legislature and was an advisor on the erection of the state capitol. He was the contractor for time. many of the public buildings of his time.

A neighbor of the Verniers on lakeshore the Chapotons were also farmers as well as builders. They held their land long before the Pointe was a resort colony.

Another Alexander Chapoton became a banker and insurance man. The vast family had business and social connections throughout the city. There are still many of the name living on the east side of Detroit.




