The family has met this crisis with apparent calm and a determination to work things out for themselves as far as possible. However, many difficulties stand in their way. Mrs.

Chouinard has spent several days in Bon Secours Hospital since the fire suffering from shock and a badly sprained ankle. A young son has been in and out of the hospital as the result of a physical defect with which he was born.

Mr. Chouinard has a weak heart and has been unable to do heavy work since he suffered a severe coronary three years ago. He is employed as a salesman for Duplicating Sales Company.

Some clothing, bedding, and other items have been collected by Mother Liborius and the Sisters at Bon Secours who established a Chouinard family fund. They are still soliciting money and goods for the stricken family.

While Mrs. Chouinard was in the hospital, several members of the family were given meals in the cafeteria there. In the past Mrs. Chouinard has worked at Bon Secours nights from 7 p.m. until 2 a.m. to provide financial help for her large family.

Other organizations, including the Grosse Pointe Lions, Goodfellows and the Crisis Club, have promised to aid the family. Mrs. Chouinard said she is confident that the family will be able to surmount the difficulties they will encounter.

The Chouinard children range in age from four to 19. They are Richard, 19, Gerard, 17, Kathleen, 16, James, 15, Robert, 10, David 7, Thomas, 5, and Donald, 4.

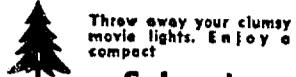

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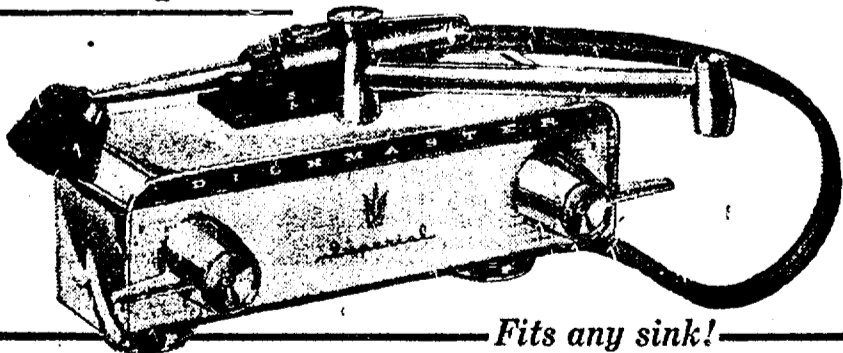

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Lesser Crime Uncovers Bigger One By Parolee

William Hearin, 20, of 2460 Dutton, Rochester, a Jackson Prison parolee, was arrested by Shores police on Monday, December 5, for non-payment of two dollars worth of gasoline, and was held for investigation of car theft.

Shores Police Chief Fred Duemling said that a police radio broadcast was received from St. Clair Shores Police Department, asking area authorities to be on the lookout for Hearin and gave a description of his car.

Hearin, the broadcast information said, was wanted for failing to pay for gasoline purchased from a gas station owned by Joseph Wedyke, 41, of 1592 Ery's drive, at Nine Mile road and Jefferson.

Shores Police Sgt. Charles Wenrich, in his scout car, was jotting down the information as it came over his radio, when he spotted Hearin making a right turn onto Vernier road and heading toward Mack avenue. The officer stopped the suspect at Vernier and Hollywood.

At the Shores station, it was found that Hearin stole the car he was driving from a car dealer in Rochester, Mich. The car still had the dealer's license plates. Hearin admitted the theft.

Hearin, Chief Duemling said, was recently released on parole from Jackson Prison, after serving one and a half years of a 1 1/2 to 15-year sentence for breaking and entering.

Shores police turned Hearin over to Woods authorities for questioning of breakings and enterings committed in the Woods, but Woods Det. Sgt. Walter O'Dell and Det. Leroy Tobian said Hearin was not involved in any crimes in their city.

Hearin was then put in the

Woods Station cell, to await the arrival of Rochester police, who will prosecute him for the car theft. The youth is also wanted by the State Parole Department for violation of parole.

The Woods officers said that Hearin told them he stole the car and some money from the Rochester dealer, and was headed for West Virginia.

Boys, Matches Destroy Garage

Mrs. Joseph Askin of 1200 Torrey road, heard her six-year-old son pleading with a friend and looked out of the window to find out the cause and discovered the family garage on fire.

Mr. Askin told Woods firemen on Sunday, December 4, that his wife heard their son tell the friend "Don't tell Mommy," and she went to the back of the house to see what the mystery was about. She discovered the fire and called in the

alarm. Authorities believed that the two little boys were lighting matches while playing in the garage, and this caused the fire.

Destroyed with the garage were two girls' bicycles, a boy's bicycle, a small step ladder, a 100-foot garden hose, and a 20-foot extension ladder.

The flames from the garage also charred a white picket fence on the property of the Askins' neighbor, Kenneth Reid, 1210 Torrey.

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Community Chorus Concert Proves Delightful Experience

 A large segment of Grosse Pointe produced a standing-room-only crowd at Parcels Junior High Auditorium Sun-

day for the eighth annual Christmas Concert by the Community Chorus.
 Two things were obvious that day—the Pointe is proud of its Community Chorus, and the group is worthy of this pride in every way.

As a newcomer to the Pointe, this was the first time this reviewer had heard the much-heralded group perform. It will not be the last. The program was delightful and the Chorus, conducted by Donald Simmons, gave a polished performance that could be envied by any professional group.

Technically, the Community Chorus came close to achieving perfection. Members were well drilled and followed their conductor (no mean achievement in an amateur community group.) Like craftsmen, performers had polished each note, each phrase, into a harmonious and finely finished product. In addition, they showed unusual stage poise and a relaxed self confidence which added immeasurably to the performance.

There was more of merit than a competent presentation, however. Spirit, dynamics, reverence, and joy were appropriately displayed at the right times. A conductor who can breathe fire and life into a unit of 108 voices; many untrained, deserves special credit for this.

Along these lines, we particularly enjoyed the opening selections, two Chorales from the Christmas Oratio by J. S. Bach. Two short numbers, "Salvation is Created," by P. Tschesnokoff and "The Shep-

herds' Story," by Clarence Herdick were also very well done.

The Madrigal Singers a group of 13 within the Community Chorus, gave a polished performance of "Psallite" by Praetorius, "How Unto Bethlehem," and "Patapan," traditional carols. Most of all, however, we enjoyed their last number, "Bring the Torch, Jeanette Isabella," which wasn't even on the program. It was a delightful afterthought.

The concert turned out to be fun for everyone with a short interim of group carol singing. In addition, it gave the audience a chance to appreciate Conductor Simmons' stage personality, which is gracious and charming. The audience seemed to enter into the spirit admirably and lustily "assisted" the chorus in a rollicking presentation of "The Twelve Days of Christmas."

Soloists Barbara Bailey and Lori Lang deserve special mention for their work in "Some Children See Him" and Recitatives and chorus from Handel's "Messiah" respectively. Mary Freda, accompanist, and Donald Sylvester, organist, used their considerable musical talents to provide a suitable background for the Chorus.

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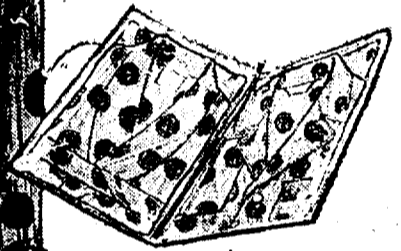
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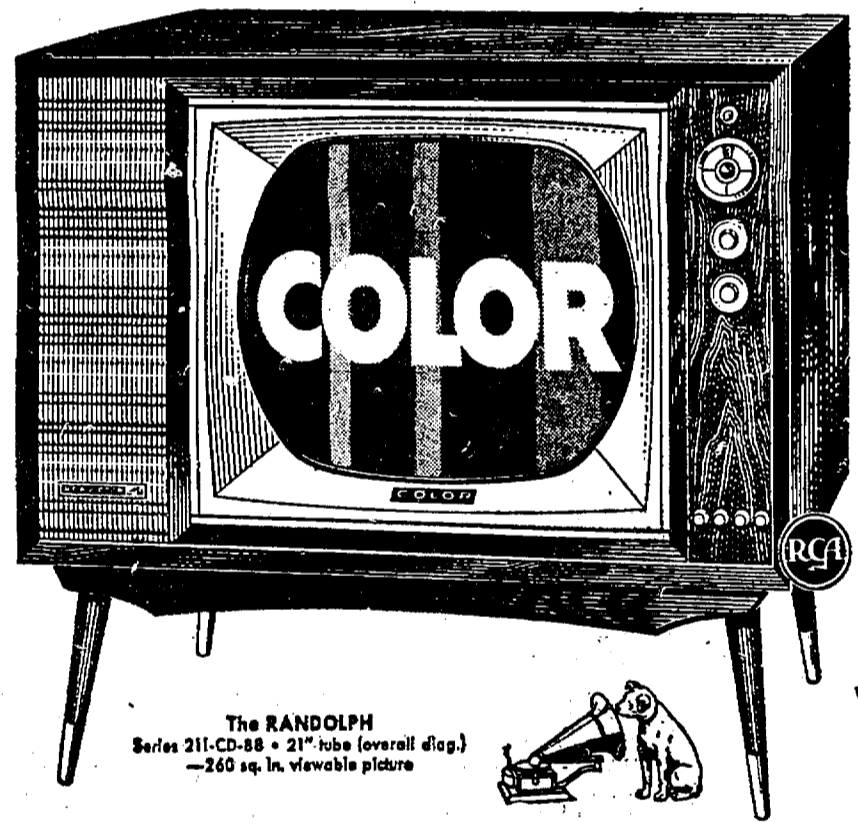
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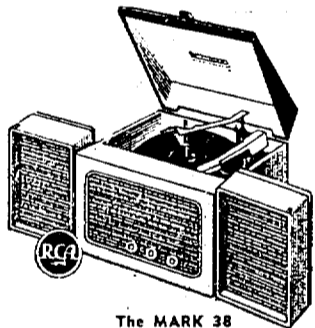
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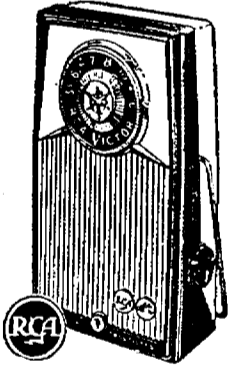
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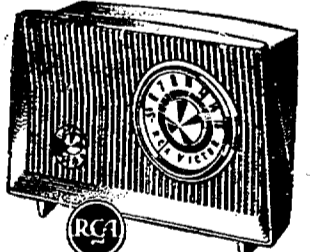
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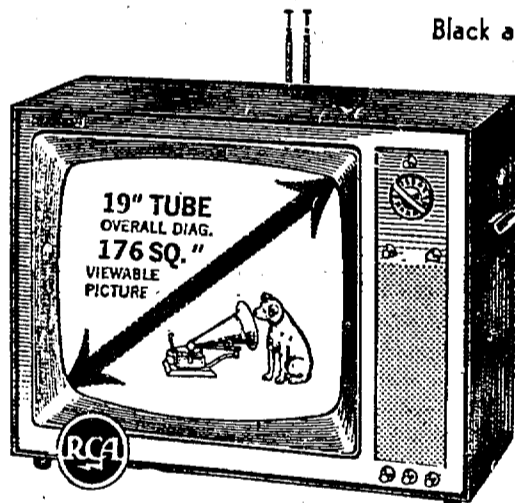

Ready to Dedicate Woods Church Addition

The new \$150,000 addition to the nave of the Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church, Mack avenue and Torrey road, will be dedicated on Sunday morning, December 18 at the 9:30 and 11 o'clock services. This addition completes the church proper. The first

part of the church unit was built and dedicated on May 23, 1948. This was the first permanent church structure to be built in Grosse Pointe Woods. Several religious groups had held services in various temporary buildings.

The Woods Presbyterian Church had its origin in the Mason School in Vernier road as a Sunday School on Palm Sunday, March 21, 1937. The people completed the organization of a congregation on October 2, 1939. The late Dr. and Mrs. Harry H. Torrey presented the church with a free and clear deed for its present property in May, 1940.

Since the dedication of the first unit in 1948, the following additions have been made: minister's study and church offices in 1949; first part of the educational building in 1951; second part of the educational unit in 1953; the church house in 1956 and now the addition to the church in 1960.

The Sunday School started with an attendance of 138 pupils. Now the school has an enrollment of 906 and 105 teachers and officers.

The church started with 123 charter members. There are now 1824 members in the congregation.

Including the addition being dedicated on Sunday, the church land and building valuation will be \$797,914.

Phony Check Artists Busy

Phony check artists are on the loose in the Detroit area, and Pointe merchants and other businessmen are warned to be on the lookout for them.

The Pointe police chiefs said jointly that the busy Christmas hours are ideal for the check passers, in that they depend on the haste of the merchants and employes increasing the chances of passing bad checks. When in a hurry, one is not apt to glance too closely at the checks, or the identifications presented, it was said.

Persons cashing checks should be extra cautious and demand more than one means of identification from persons who want their checks cashed.

Farms Det. Sgt. George Van Tiem stated that a check ring is operating in the Detroit area, flooding Detroit with phony checks.

Two such checks were cashed by businessmen in the Farms "he officer said, each for 103.62, and both with the same check number, 3983.

The checks are printed in the name of T. H. Browning Steamship Company, Inc., and made out to a Paul G. Bender and signed by an E. H. Searls.

The checks are endorsed by Paul G. Bender of 10006 Monica. The name and address are fictitious, and the identification used, a driver's license, is also phony, Van Tiem said.

Traffic Deaths Show Increase

Traffic fatalities in Detroit for the first 11 months of 1960 were 14 percent higher than during the corresponding 1959 period, according to records of the Detroit Police Department Accident Prevention Bureau. With 176 persons killed through November this year, the Traffic Safety Association warned that for the first time since 1955 more than 200 persons may die in a calendar year, unless the sharp upward trend is reversed.

"Thirty persons met death last December, or virtually one for every day of the month," said the Association. "The death toll in December is always at its highest and last December's was about normal for the month."

December is especially dangerous for pedestrians, the Association said. More hours of darkness and winter weather aggravate the pedestrian problem. Drivers fail to adjust their driving to these conditions.

"Many motorists, who drive to or from work in daylight during the other months of the year, travel forward or home-ward in darkness during December," the Association pointed out. "But they drive just the same way as they did during the summer months."

"These drivers must cut down their speed, must be more alert at this time than under ideal conditions. They must expect pedestrians to be less alert and to dart suddenly into the paths of their cars. And they must be ready to stop for these emergencies," the Association said.


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FORD PRODUCTION REPORT

Cass Descendant Taken By Death

The great granddaughter of General Lewis Cass, Baroness Matilda von Kettler, daughter of the late Henry B. Ledyard, died November 30 in Falls Village, Conn.

The baroness, born in 1871, grew up in Grosse Pointe on her father's summer estate, Cloverleigh. Henry B. Ledyard was the son of a former mayor of Detroit who married Cass' daughter, Matilda.

Baroness von Kettler's father served as secretary to the delegation when General Cass was Ambassador to France. General Cass was governor of the state when it was still a territory. Secretary of War and a presidential aspirant. No statesman ranks higher in the history of Michigan than Lewis Cass.

While visiting her girlhood friend, Amy McMillan, in Washington where James McMillan was serving as a senator, Matilda Ledyard met Baron Clemens von Kettler, a young secretary in the German Embassy. She was presented to society in the nation's capital in the 1890's.

The couple were married

in a brilliant ceremony in SS Peter and Paul Cathedral in 1897. Baron von Kettler later was minister to Mexico and then Ambassador to China. He died during the Boxer Rebellion in 1900, his self sacrifice saving the lives of all the other foreign representatives in Peking.

Her father, Henry B. Ledyard was an alumnus of West Point, served under General William T. Sherman in the West, and left the army to become a railroad man. He became president of the Michigan Central Railroad.

During the great flu epidemic of World War I the Baroness with other prominent Pointers established the present Cottage Hospital. She was a member of old Christ Church.

The residents of the Pointes, and children accompanied, are urged to attend this and other programs of the Family Film Night Series, designed for the enjoyment of children and adults.



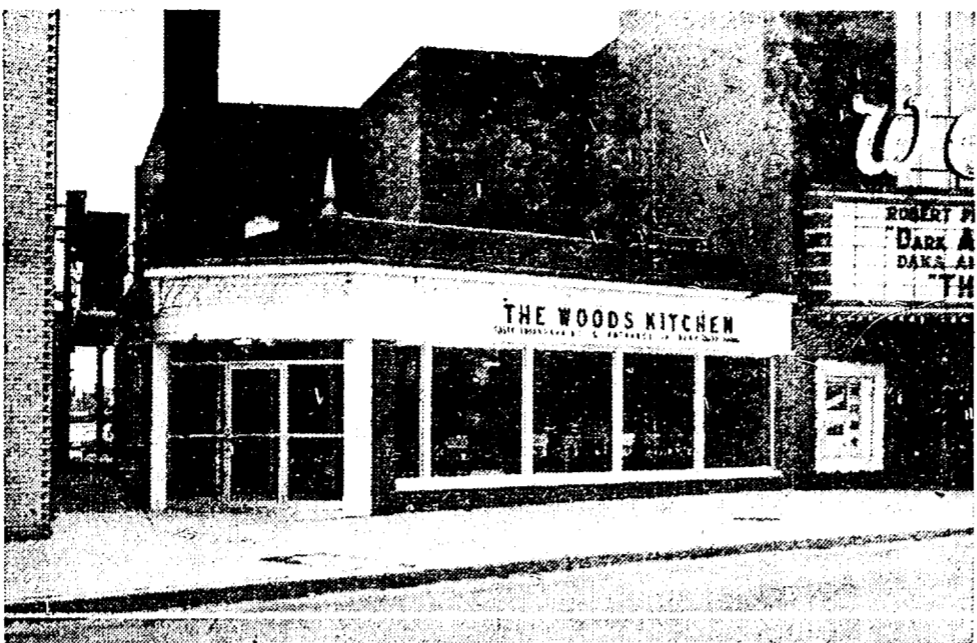

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Woods Fights Grant Deadline

Woods Councilmen were told December 5 that all necessary arrangements for the utilization of a Federal grant for sewer projects will be completed by December 31, but with little time to spare.

A Federal grant of \$218,000 is available to help defray the costs of additional sanitary sewage capacity but detailed plans and specifications for the project must be submitted to the Wayne County Board of Public Works by December 31, 1960, or the grant is forfeited.

The grant and proposed sewage improvements affect the South Macomb Sanitary District, Harper Woods, and Grosse Pointe Woods jointly.

City Administrator W. H. Lange said this Federal grant was sought after the Michigan Department of Health decided that the 72-inch sanitary intercepting sewer which conducts Woods sewage into the City of Detroit plants was inadequate. The Board banned further efforts in subdividing the Woods until the situation was rectified.

Total cost for the project will be \$810,000 and Woods residents will pay approximately 10 percent of this. Financing will be handled through a direct rate increase of the sewage treatment charge submitted to each residence and business establishment with the quarterly water bill.

No estimates have been made on what these improvements will cost an individual homeowner.

George R. Bingham, director of the Woods Board of Public Works said all necessary resolutions, agreements, and related documents pertaining to financing have been completed.

Now, before December 31, engineers must prepare detailed plans and specifications for the remainder of the project. If necessary, the Woods Council will have a special meeting to approve these so that receipt of the grant will be assured.

A ten-year extension of all E bonds is now guaranteed by the Treasury. E bonds that have matured since May 1951 have already been automatically extended once and will get another renewal beginning with their twenty-first year.

Students Mourn Teacher's Death

Students and staff members of The Grosse Pointe Public Schools today mourned the passing of an outstanding educator. Stirling Shoemaker, science teacher and head of the High School Science Department, succumbed to an illness at Henry Ford Hospital where he had been a patient for about three weeks.

Mr. Shoemaker joined the teaching staff of Grosse Pointe High School upon his graduation from Alma College in 1925. He earned a Master's degree from the University of Michigan in 1931 and was appointed head of the High School Science Department in 1943.

He taught his first classes in the building currently serving as the Administrative Headquarters at 389 St. Clair and saw a total of 24 students graduate from Grosse Pointe High in June of that year.

"Mr. Shoemaker's high educational standards and his genuine regard for young people served as an inspiration to the

thousands of students and hundreds of fellow teachers who were privileged to know him", commented Superintendent James W. Bushong. "His presence will be sorely missed by his many friends and associates in Grosse Pointe".

Robert Weber, president of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, expressed the deep regret all members of the board shared due to the unfortunate loss of this fine educator. "He was a dedicated professional teacher who devoted his entire adult life to serving the educational interests of Grosse Pointe boys and girls", said Weber. "Mr. Shoemaker made many valuable contributions to the community and its schools during his long years of faithful service."

"We can never replace the counsel which Mr. Shoemaker provided us by drawing on his years of experience in Grosse Pointe", declared Principal Jerry Gerich. "A wise, veteran teacher who gave unstintingly of himself as our educational program developed from its position of serving 1685 students in 1925 to our present situation in which we enroll well over 10,000 boys and girls."

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British Planning Peaceful Detroit Invasion On Jan. 9

Big Ben's boom, heard in downtown Detroit, will signal the start of "Visit Britain Week" on January 9 — a celebration presenting some of Britain's famous flavor, its pubs, sporty cars, its barmaids, its cheeses and tweeds.

Object of the week is to foster a feeling of friendship between Detroit and Britain, and to encourage a greater flow of travel to that country, states Patrick Spooner, chairman of the organizing committee.

Across half the world will come personalities and displays to strengthen the festivities. A burly British bobby in dark blue uniform and crested helmet, who normally pounds his beat in Coventry, England's principal car manufacturing city, will be flown here directly by BOAC.

Opening day ceremony, with bands and color guards, will be staged in Cadillac Square outside Old City Hall. British flags will be unfurled on Washington Boulevard, renamed Piccadilly for the occasion, and the flag of Coventry, England, will flutter from Old City Hall as a salute to Detroit from her sister city.

Gracing many of the events will be the beautiful Duchess of Bedford, and the Duke. Flown here especially for the occasion, the Duke and Duchess will look over the city in an imported London taxi. They are owners of famed Woburn Abbey, the ancestral home which was thrown open to the public to become one of Britain's foremost tourist attractions.

The Sheraton-Cadillac will be one of the chief centers for this friendly invasion. The White Cellar Tavern, a recreation of the original White Horse Cellar in Edinburgh, will be installed. Its lustrous wood, pewter and brass candelabra will make a picture of comfort and cheerful civilization which visitors will carry away with them.

Adjoining it will be a pub over which a genuine British barmaid will preside. She will be selected from girls who once reigned over pubs in England, who have settled in Detroit, but have not lost the touch. British beer and Mr. Pickwick's punch will be served. Darts and shove ha'penny will be played, and a contest to see who can drink a "yard of ale" will be staged.

The inn will be open to the public Monday, January 9, 5 p.m. to 10 p.m.; Tuesday, 12 noon to 2 p.m.; and 7:30 to 10 p.m.; Wednesday, 12 noon to 2 p.m., and 7:30 to 10 p.m., and Thursday and Friday, 12 noon to 10 p.m.

Dazzling copies of the British crown jewels, including the Royal Sceptre, Imperial State Crown, Great Sword of State and St. Edward's Crown, will be displayed at a British Exhibition in the English Room at the Sheraton-Cadillac. Replicas of the ruby and gold desert service presented to Queen Elizabeth II by the Household Brigade will be shown by the Worcester Royal Porcelain Co. 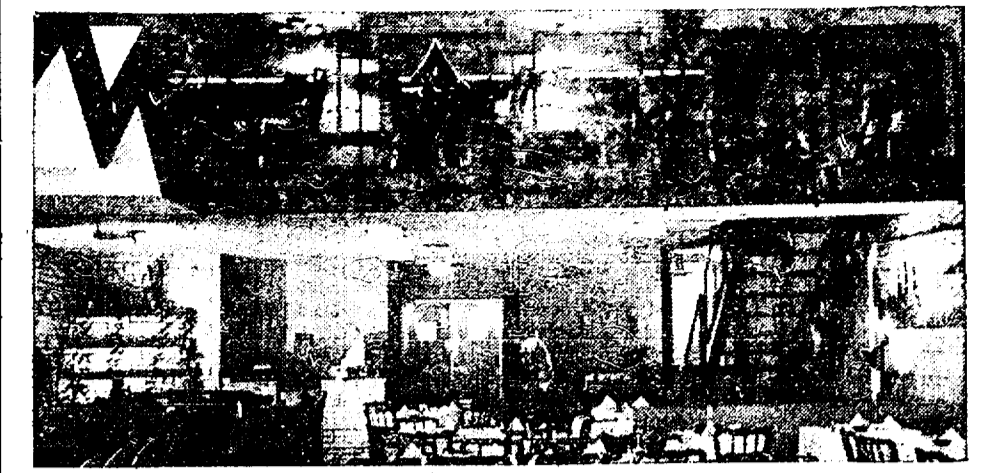

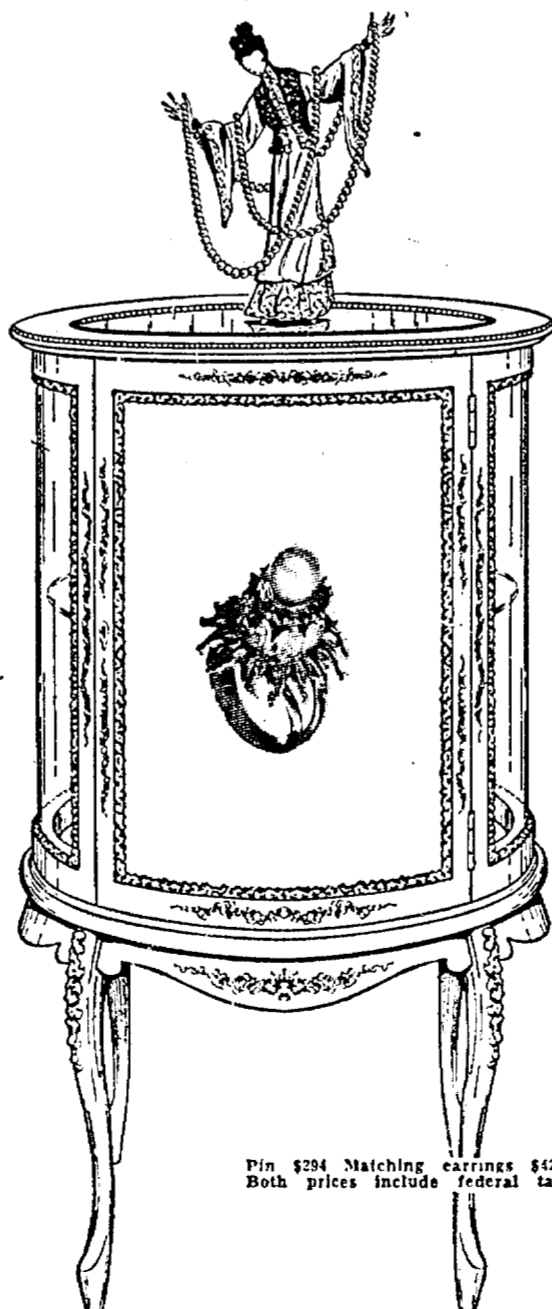

The war was not forgotten entirely in this last gay season before Pearl Harbor. The Red Cross Motor Corps was gaining Pointe recruits. The issue of December 5 announced the various draft board locations. Lady Stella Reading, chairman of England's WVS, requested 20,000 air raid shelter kits and Mrs. J. Dwyer Kinnucan, chairman of the production unit of the Red Cross, hastened to comply. Mrs. W. Dean Robinson

was training volunteers in surgical dressings.

Many Homes Built

There was a great deal of interest in residential expansion, for 716 home building plans had been issued in the past year, but there was equal concern about the rise in taxes. There was also talk about consolidating the five Pointes, which is still a matter of much dispute.

Christmas shopping and entertaining was done for prices which astounded today's holiday revelers. Coffee was 25c a can, lamb chops, 35c a pound, prime roast of beef was also 35c a pound, and butter was 36c a pound.

Prices Were Different

You could buy an English racing bicycle for \$16.50, a brand new Ford deluxe Tudor for \$439, a nine room house on Balfour for \$9,000, and a general maid demanded \$12 a week.

Prices have changed and shopping is a shocker compared to 1940 but in those far away days there were few of the stores available to Pointe residents on the hill or in the village, which are so well equipped today.

Many of the lakeshore estates which were aglow with 1940 entertainments are forever dark, many of the hostesses gone, but Christmas celebrations continue and who's to say which is the greater holiday, today's or yesterday's.

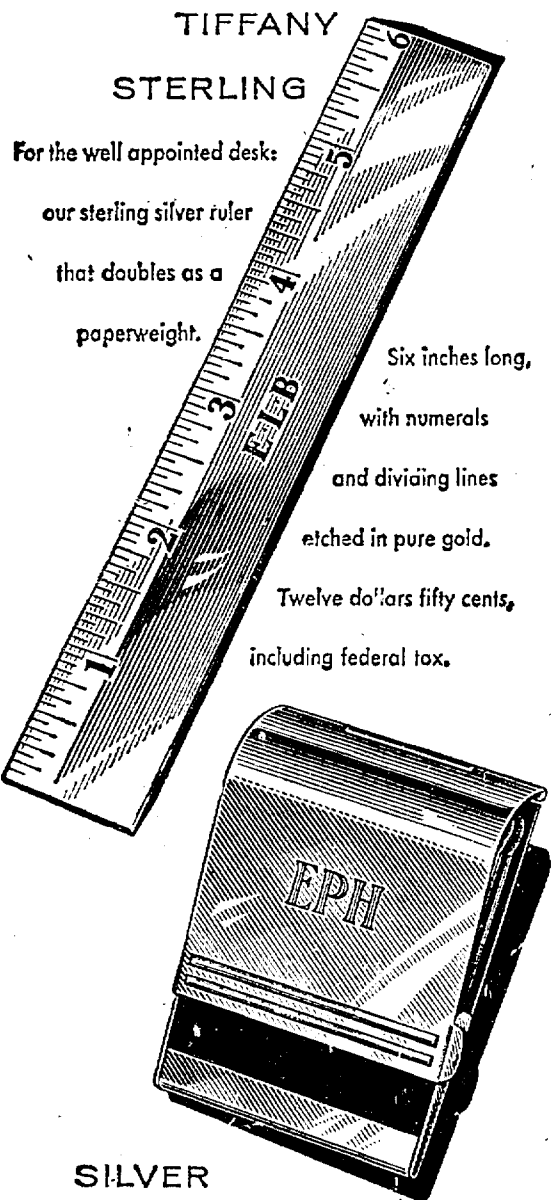

Veterans Given Joy of Living

"In addition to providing gifts for the hospitalized veterans to send to their families, the American Legion Auxiliary makes sure that the veterans themselves are remembered on Christmas day. Last year gifts from the Auxiliary went to 140,020 of these sick or disabled veterans."

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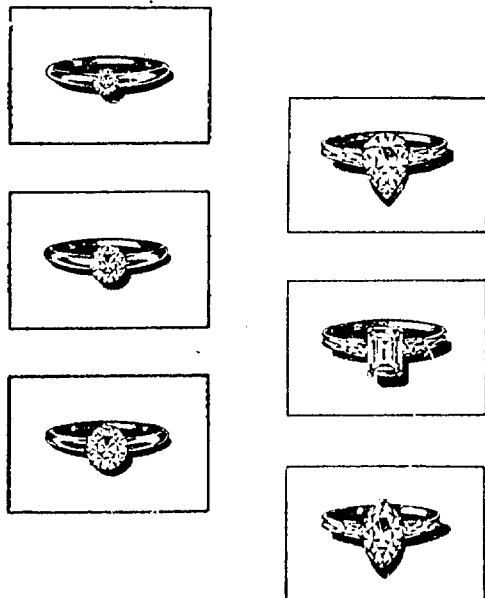

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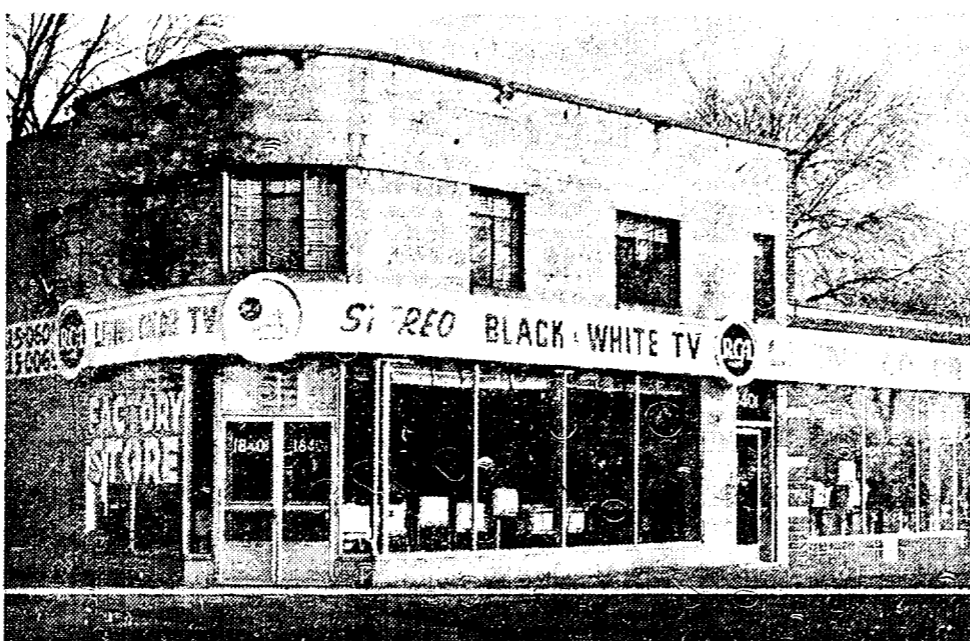

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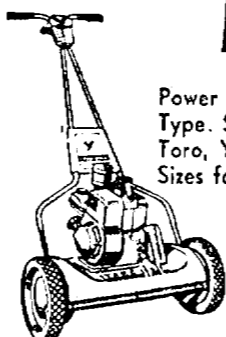

for the Ontario Department of Labor. He said that the settlement was reached following a 7½ hour session with officials of management and the union Thursday night. No details were released pending an anticipated affirmative vote of union

members. The busmen walked out on Thanksgiving when they failed to achieve a 15-cent-an-hour rate increase and the firm asked them to take a pay cut instead.

IN CHICAGO, Republican Chairman Thurston Morton an-

nounced that he was taking a personal part in the drive to upset Senator Kennedy's 8,900 vote margin in Illinois and give the state's 27 electoral votes to Vice President Richard Nixon. Although he admitted that chances of overturning the election or throwing it into the House of Representatives were remote, he said that he hoped the drive would help to insure honest elections, unmarked by fraud, in the years to come.

Saturday, December 3

NEW HEIR apparent to the presidency of Chrysler corporation is Lynn Alfred Townsend who has been named administrative vice-president of the corporation. The 41-year-old executive, formerly group vice-president in charge of international operations, has been with the auto concern only three years. Townsend will replace Edgar C. Row, a 40-year Chrysler veteran who will resign at the end of January when he reaches the compulsory retirement age of 65.

YESTERDAY'S meeting between the Most Rev. Geoffrey Francis Fisher, primate of the Church of England, and Pope John XXIII in Vatican City, was described by a Church of England information office communique as a "notable event in the history of church relations." A high Vatican official called the meeting "friendly and realistic" and said he hoped this might be the start of other meetings at a lower level. It was the first time the heads of the two churches had met since the 16th Century Reformation when the Protestants broke away from Rome.

JEERING THRONES paraded around captured fugitive Premier Patrice Lumumba on display in the Congo capital Friday. The goateed fugitive, his hands tied behind his back, submitted to the screamed insults of soldiers and endured their bodily assaults by having his stomach punched, his hair pulled, and his shins kicked. Lumumba had slipped past the guards of strongman Col. Joseph Mobutu Sunday and escaped from Leopoldville. He was recaptured Thursday night. Mobutu, a former supporter of the ousted premier, said Lumumba would have to stand trial for inciting rebellion.

PRESIDENT DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER officially branded Cuba's government as Communist controlled for the first time Friday. He then authorized spending up to one million dollars to aid Cuban refugees in Florida and elsewhere under the Dirksen-Douglas amendment in the Mutual Security Act. According to the amendment, aid can be applied only to peoples who are enslaved by the communists.

Sunday, December 4

MODERN-DAY Protestantism was given what some church leaders regard as a "most significant suggestion" today in San Francisco when the chief executive officer of the United Presbyterian Church proposed that four of the country's largest Protestant bodies unite to form one huge new church. In

his proposal to leaders of the National Council of Churches, Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake suggested that the churches involved might be the Methodist Church, Protestant Episcopal Church, United Presbyterian Church, and the United Church of Christ.

THIRTY-FIVE YEAR OLD Governor-elect John B. Swainson received a standing ovation from some 300 Democrats Sunday at a victory meeting of the Democratic State Central Committee in the Civic Center, Lansing. As the Michigan Democrat took over the leadership of the state party he pledged that his administration will be dedicated to good government in the Williams tradition. Williams, whose sixth term ends January 1, was attending a meeting of the African liaison committee of the American Council of Education in Princeton in preparation for his new duties with President-elect Kennedy's administration.

Monday, December 5

FEDERAL CIVIL DEFENSE officials hope that Michigan will be a test area for the planning of a state-wide system of home-installed buzzers to warn against nuclear attack. They will ask Congress for \$500,000 to supply signal generators. The public will be urged to buy the buzzers, costing around \$7.50 themselves. The buzzer system is designed to furnish each home, office, and factory with direct, unmistakable warning of impending attack or local disaster.

ACTING ON A CAMPAIGN

promise, President-elect John F. Kennedy, named an 11-member task force to swiftly draw up plans to aid the Federal government in relieving and solving the problems of economically depressed areas. Senator Paul H. Douglas will head the committee working toward objectives in the type of area redevelopment measures twice vetoed by President Eisenhower. The group study will concern itself largely with West Virginia but Senator Kennedy hopes solutions will also be applicable to other depressed areas.

AFTER NEW ASSURANCES

by the government of El Salvador that foreign obligations will be honored, the State Department announced U.S. recognition of the new government which came to power in October. A six-man junta is now ruling the country after former President Jose Maria Lemus was ousted in a bloodless coup.

Tuesday, December 6

NIKITA S. KHRUSHCHEV apparently won his ideological struggle with Red China, temporarily at least. In a communist war and peace manifesto published at the conclusion of the communist summit conference, "peaceful coexistence," as advocated by the Soviet premier was the party line instead of the "war is inevitable" theory supported by Chinese communists.

No mention was made in the report of any disagreements by the two major communist states. The United States was branded as the main force of aggression and the eventual victory of communism was predicted.

NATIONS receiving United States foreign aid may not in the future spend the money in 19 economically strong countries. In a new move to halt the gold exodus from this country the State Department told countries receiving such aid that they must use the funds to trade with underdeveloped nations or with the United States. While the new order is not expected to save a great many dollars in itself, it is hoped that it will prompt some of the 19 nations involved to assume the burden of financing more of their exports to underdeveloped areas.

PRESIDENT-ELECT John F. Kennedy received a defense report advocating sweeping shakeups which would save the United States eight billion dollars a year. Among the more controversial suggestions was a proposal to abolish the Army, Navy, and Air Force secretaries. The special study committee report said that the entire of the three services should be maintained, but more than 17 posts in addition to the secretaries could be abolished. Kennedy received the report from chairman Stuart Symington, former Air Force Secretary in the Truman administration. He called it an "interesting and constructive study."

TWO HUNDRED delegates from area American Legion posts decided to submit a second bid to the national executive committee in an effort to regain the Legion's 1962 national convention for Detroit. The national committee recently withdrew a tentative approval of Detroit as a convention site ruling that the city lacks sufficient hotel space.


Unofficial second guesses indicate that perhaps another reason for the ruling was that the national committee doubted Michigan's ultra liberal climate was a fitting background for the convention of the conservative organization.

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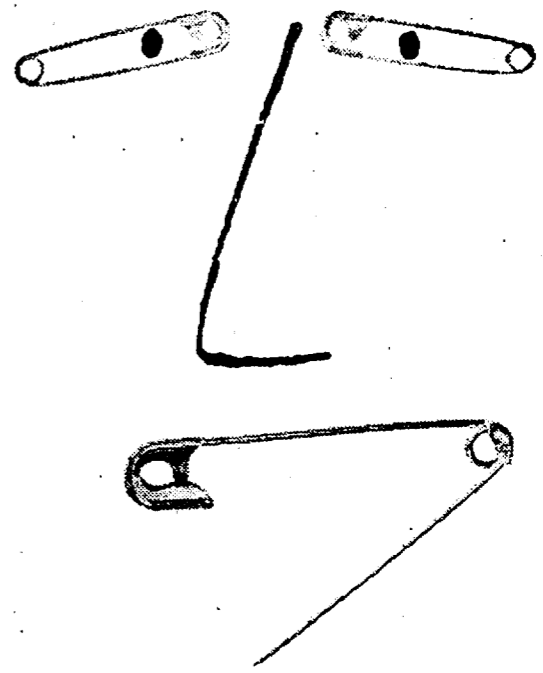
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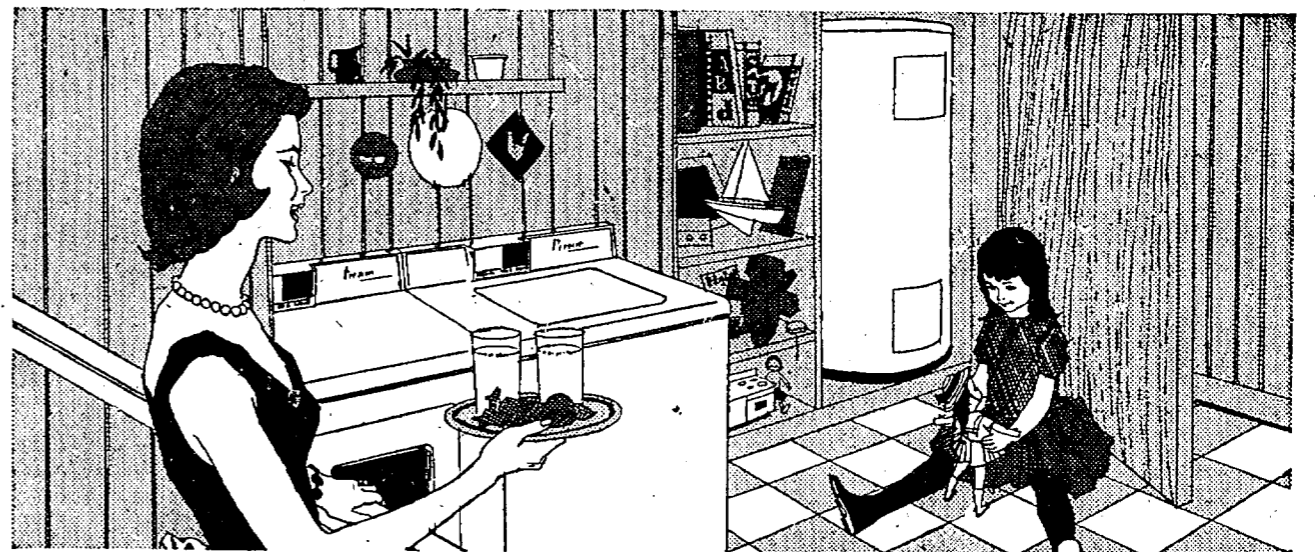

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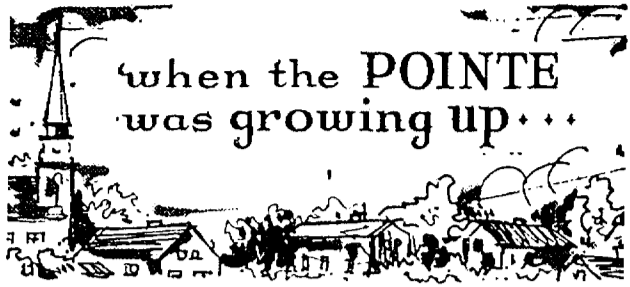

When the POINTE was growing up...

For 40 years Dr. Jean Baptiste Chapoton signed every death certificate in the colony of Detroit. These were the years following his arrival at Fort Pontchartrain after 1719. For 200 years the Chapoton name has been known in Detroit and its suburbs.

In 1879 the family owned a large tract of land bordering the Milk River above eight mile road and stretching to the lake. On Mack avenue today a row of apartments, Chapoton Manor, reminds residents of this French family's contribution to the development of the east side.

The Chapotons came from the south of France. The doctor, also a major in the French army, had 20 children. The doctor finally retired and farmed on a private claim on the east side of Hastings street.

His children married Godfreys, Chenes, Pelletiers, Cicottes and Trombleys, all the best French families of the day. Jean Baptiste Chapoton III lost much of the family estate and his son, Eustache Chapoton, wished to redeem the loss and opened a Tavern at the foot of Woodward.

He was quite successful but gave up the tavern because of a sermon he heard at old St. Anne's Church. The priest denounced the selling of liquor to Indians and said there was little hope of salvation for a man who tempted others.

The former inn keeper apprenticed himself to a builder and in a few years branched out for himself. He knew little mathematics and little writing but he would count the bricks by 100's by putting out match sticks. By hard work he became a master builder and acquired the princely sum of \$100,000. He built St. Peter's and St. Paul's Jesuit Church on Jefferson avenue, fought in the War of 1812 and died in 1871.

His son, Alexander, carried on the building trade. He courted Felice Monteul, of Walkerville, Ont., a strenuous romance because every time he wished to visit her he had to paddle a canoe across the river. He served in the state legislature and was an advisor on the erection of the state capitol. He was the contractor for many of the public buildings of his time.

A neighbor of the Verniers on lakeshore the Chapotons were also farmers as well as builders. They held their land long before the Pointe was a resort colony.

Another Alexander Chapoton became a banker and insurance man. The vast family had business and social connections throughout the city. There are still many of the name living on the east side of Detroit.

An old fashioned Christmas cook is Mrs. Herbert Epstein, who begins her fruitcakes, cookies and rolls in early November to prepare for holiday parties.

With a husband who is a gourmet and two small sons who love to eat, she has a trio of willing tasters because she can't eat any of the goodies herself.

Mrs. Epstein is on a strict diet prescribed by her doctor and sugar is not allowed. This doesn't stop the petite blond from whipping up intricate recipes loaded with calories. She began cooking as a girl on her family's farm in Unionville, Mich., when farmhands by the dozens had to be fed at harvest time.

Here's Her Coffee Cake

But her cooking today, in a well equipped sunny kitchen which overlooks Lake St. Clair, is a far different sort than she did on the farm. She dishes up shish kebab, chicken pancakes, tenderloin marinated in wine and heavenly pastries such as

this Kugelhoff: 1 cake or package of yeast 1/2 cup lukewarm water 2 1/2 cups sifted flour 2 eggs 2 cups scalded milk, cooled to lukewarm 6 Tb butter 1/2 tsp. salt 4 Tb. powdered sugar 1/2 cup currants 1/2 cup ground blanched almonds 3 Tb. grated lemon rind 1 tsp. cinnamon 1/4 cup sifted confectioner's sugar

bowl with towel. Set in warm place until the yeast mixture rises through the flour. Mix with hands until blended then mix in eggs one at a time and milk. Beat until very smooth. Combine butter, salt, and 2 Tb. powdered sugar. Add to first mixture of very soft dough. Pour half in pan. Sprinkle with currants, almonds, lemon rind and rest of powdered sugar. Cover with remaining dough. Cover and set aside to rise double. Pre-heat oven to 400 degrees. Bake for 40 minutes or until brown.

Mrs. Epstein admits this isn't a particularly easy recipe or one you dash off in an hour, but to an accomplished baker it is rewarding.

Cooks In The Evening

For this Tuesday's meeting of the Suburbia Garden Club she baked batches of cookies. Most of this cooking is done in the evening because Herbie, 2 1/2, and Robbie, 8 months, keep her busy during the day. She has every known cooking gad-

get and keeps getting new ones like the kugelhoff pan.

"I like everything to do with the home," says Mrs. E., and this includes baby tending, cooking and keeping every table top shining bright.

But gardening is another hobby. She has just raised 120 violet plants for Suburbia members to buy for Christmas gifts. Her house is crowded with greens (philodendron dripping from every window.)

Freezer Kept Full Down in the Epstein deep freezer are plates of cookies, rolls, fruitcakes ready for Christmas giving. The accomplished cook says even last minute guests, who are frequent, don't bother her. She can drive in the garage minutes ahead of her husband and still serve a beef stroganoff to tempt the palate. "You learn to use a freezer on a farm, city people don't know how to take the best advantage of one," says Mrs. Epstein.

Nowadays when almost every meal comes from a package or a can it is refreshing to meet a cook whose heart is in the kitchen and whose hands are so accomplished with pastry. There is no more thoughtful gift than home baked cakes or cookies and the Epsteins' friends know when they untie the ribbon and paper that this is one gift prepared not only with skill and taste but with loving care.

Mrs. Epstein shares a Christmas cookie recipe which is really unusual.

Rolled Almond Wafers

3/4 cup finely ground unblanched almonds 1/2 cup unsalted butter 1/2 cup sugar 1 Tb. flour 1 Dash of salt 2 Tb. heavy cream Mix all ingredients in small heavy saucepan. Heat, stirring until butter melts. Drop by teaspoons about 3 inches apart onto buttered and floured cookie sheets. Bake six cookies at a time in moderate oven, 350 degrees, or until edges begin to brown but centers are still bubbling. Cool 1 or 2 minutes. Then loosen with a thin knife and wrap each cookie around the handle of a wooden spoon. Lay, joined sides down on racks to cool. Makes about three dozen rolled wafers.

CREPES FRAISES

Contributed by Mrs. William C. Emory 2 eggs 1 1/4 cup milk 1/2 tsp. salt 1 cup sifted all purpose flour 1/4 cup sugar

Filling: 12 oz. cream cheese (4 packages) 1/4 cup sugar 3 Tb. lemon juice 2 Tb. grated lemon rind

Topping: 2 packages frozen sliced strawberries 2 Tb. lemon juice 1/2 tsp. almond extract

Beat eggs until light. Blend in milk and salt. Sift flour and sugar into mixture. Beat until just smooth. Use about two tablespoons of batter for each cake. Griddle should be lightly greased (or salt rubbed) before each baking. Note: (Keep cakes stacked and covered until ready to fill). Yield: sixteen 5 inch cakes.

Have ingredients for filling at room temperature and beat together until fluffy. Spoon about 2 tablespoons across middle of each cake. Roll and place folded down on cookie sheet. Cakes may be frozen in this rolled condition.

Heat ingredients for topping. Heat rolled cakes in 400 degree oven for 10 minutes or until piping hot. Spoon heated topping over cakes and serve at once. Sprinkle with silvered blanched almonds if desired.
