(Continued from Page 1) myer began confessing to burglaries in 19 cities throughout the country, which grossed him more than \$250,000 worth of jewelry and many thousands of dollars in cash.

Fasenmyer told St. Louis police that he committed many burglaries. "Too numerous to mention" since he escaped from Brooksville Prison in Florida last March.

His undoing came about when his wife, Ruby, 23, took a stolen ring to Chicago to sell, taking her brother along for reference. After selling the ring for \$500, she loaned \$400 to her brother and returned to her home in St. Louis.

Chicago police, in investigating the sale of the ring, wired St. Louis authorities to check out the item.

St. Louis detectives went to the Fasemyer home, after following a chain of evidence, and found a number of pieces of jewelry, which they confiscated for a check out. Other evidence of burglary was found.

When confronted, Fasemyer said, "Okay, you've got me. I'm the burglar," and surrendered. His wife, who claimed she was ignorant of her husband's activities, was also arrested and held for investigation.

Among the loot found in the Fasemyer home was a \$750 gold and diamond wrist watch taken from the home of the Peter Koenigs, 586 Shelden, last July 9. Fasemyer confessed to breaking into this house.

Also taken from the Koenig home were several other items of jewelry and a small gold-painted metal box containing \$50 in coins.

Shores Police Chief Fred Duemling was notified of the confession made by Fasemyer and about the recovery of the watch. The other items are believed to have been disposed of, it was said.

Fasenmyer said it was his policy to remove gems from rings and other items, and sell the gold and precious stones through different channels.

He said that he had often "thrown away" jewelry pieces when they did not meet his "standards."

Paisley and Van Tiem said that Fasemyer is daily recalling the "too numerous" burglaries he has committed, and police departments of the cities in which he was active, are being notified as fast as Fasemyer clears his crimes.

Detroit detectives, Lt. Leonard Daschke and Ralph Manderano said Kleiner and Laethem netted \$1,000 in the six holdups and 15 burglaries, or an average of \$42.62 a job. They said the pair's biggest haul was \$185 from a beer store, and the smallest, \$24, from a milk depot.

Daschke said Kleiner, who worked off-and-on as a surveillance man for Selvig Secret Service, 16333 Harper, Detroit, had no police record. He said Laethem was unemployed and was convicted of burglary two years ago, receiving a probationary sentence.

Paisley and Van Tiem said that Detroit authorities will handle the prosecution of the cousins.

Announcing that they will not run again, are Richard Maxon, dean of the council, serving since 1944; and J. Lawrence Buell, Jr., who led the ticket in 1957, for a four-year term.

Mayor Connolly will not seek reelection as mayor, but as a councilman. According to the Farms charter, the mayor is elected annually by the council from its own ranks. Connolly has held the job of mayor since 1949, the first time he was elected a councilman. He lives at 54 Moran road.

#### Seeks Third Term

Butler, of 191 Touraine road, is presently mayor pro tem of the council, and has served on that body for six years. He is running for the third time.

Buell, of 69 Vendome, said he will not seek another term of office because the position needs someone who will devote more time to the job.

Maxon, of 220 Country Club drive, said he was giving up public life because he has reached the age of retirement.

Armstrong is petitioning for his fourth term. He lives at 66 Handy place.

Park City Clerk Charles Heise and Farms City Clerk Dawson Nacy, stated that nomination petitions for public of-

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### Students Still Wondering What Happened in Church

Everyone knows that nearly anything can happen when a large group of high schoolers get together.

But no one knows yet what really happened at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church last weekend when 211 teenagers from the Pointe, Birmingham, and Ann Arbor gathered for a

three-day conference on Christ and the Church.  
Instead of the usual pranks and parties, there were thought-provoking talks by the Reverend Lyman Stookey, Tuxis advisor and youth minister at Memorial Church, Robert B. Welch, English teacher at G.P.H.S., Frank Maple, counselor at Ann Arbor High School, George

Coomb, from the First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham, and Jack Angerman, also from Birmingham.

And the students, Tuxis Club members and 83 guests from Ann Arbor and Birmingham listened attentively to each of the 40-minute talks. In addition, they heard their own members, George Lewis, of

Grosse Pointe High School, Cathy Browder, of Ann Arbor, and Mike Gibson, of Birmingham, give their views.

Then they broke up into small discussion groups led by students Linda Ruester, Bob Smare, Carol Haller and Nancy Cowan.

When the weekend was over, something had happened to these students which may affect their lives for years to come.

Call it an awakening, or just plain inner confusion, but students were thinking, some of them for the first time, about problems far greater than day-to-day teen crises.

One thing is certain. Students who have complained about being "spoon fed" by their church and school were taken at their word. They were given no pat answers. In fact, if any answers are to come out of their efforts, it will depend upon the students themselves.

Students considered such problems as the relation between church and high school and what it means to the student. They asked themselves what relevance, if any, does their religion have to the schools. And what, they wondered, is the relationship between the Truth they study in church and the many truths they must memorize in school?

Some of the group's advisors were shocked when students said their school spoke in terms more meaningful to them than their church. Other students doubted that there is any relationship between the two, but that they go in separate ways. "What we need," said one youth, "is a modern church."

Most of the students agreed last weekend that they were fortunate to be a part of a unique conference for students. It was large enough to be "important" and full enough to be meaningful. And it was "different" enough to capture their attention and imaginations.

Mr. Stookey first dreamed of such a gathering last year. The project got underway when other Tuxis advisors, Mrs. Stookey, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hanpeter, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bokram, and Mr. and Mrs. Cedric Richner agreed and decided the Tuxis Club should sponsor the venture.

Plans were made for 83 students from Presbyterian churches in Ann Arbor and Birmingham to join the conference. These students stayed in Grosse Pointe for the weekend as guests of the Tuxis members.

The conference is over now, but the process of taking a look at the Church and the high school is not. Discussion groups are still trying to interpret the speeches they heard. And it may be many years before the students involved really understand what happened at Memorial Church last weekend.

### Garden Council Offering Outdoor Decorating Advice

The "Christmas Beauty" program which the Grosse Pointe Garden Club Council inaugurated four years ago, in an effort to have the community express the true yuletide spirit in its outdoor lighting, rather than by gaudy display, seems to have become a popular project for many Pointers.

Each year the decorations are more breathtakingly beautiful, some simple, some more ambitious, but joining all the area in the message of peace, joy, hope and Goodwill to Men, from the smallest home to the large estates and including business streets and public buildings.

In order to preserve this beauty, the Garden Club Council is having more colored slides made this Christmas, to augment the slide lecture which was made last year, and which several groups have shown in their programs. As this is a service to the Community there has been no charge for the use of the slides. This year smaller homes and daylight pictures will be emphasized.

Mrs. Taylor Seeber, 213 Merriweather road, TU 5-6806, who is chairman of this committee, will welcome all suggestions of any outstanding or unusual displays for a picture. Many homeowners who would like to decorate with lighting effects, shy away from the

idea, thinking it too difficult or too expensive. This is untrue. A simple window or door, a lighted tree or a shadow effect, can be more expressive of the Yuletide season than a whole battery of lights and color. Below are a few suggestions for the novice:

1. Decide on a motif such as Religious, Traditional, Child Appealing or Contemporary.
2. Keep it simple—start with one focal point, such as the doorway or a picture window and add effects each year.
3. Consider the architecture and lines of house, so there is balance and scale and harmony of the whole.
4. Remember the spectators' viewpoint. Look at your house from across the street—does the lighting inside harmonize with the exterior lighting? Is the effect too cluttered or are there large gaps?
5. Usually the result is more pleasing if few colors are used. Many colors combined give a "busy" effect.
6. Flood lights are particularly dramatic to accent a doorway, or highlight a tree—to attract the eye to a scene in an upper window.
7. Dramatize your theme. Always emphasize it with color contrast, style and size relationship to other elements.

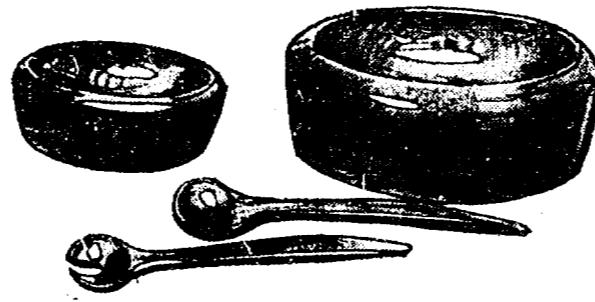

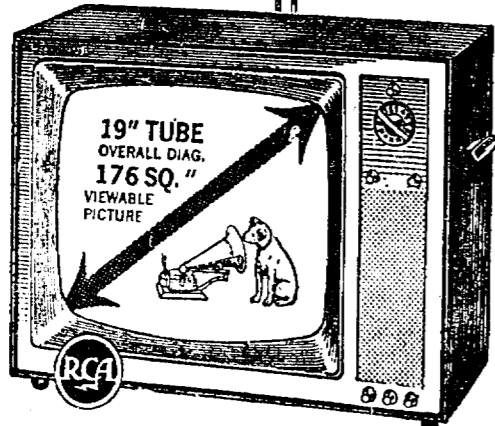

They hope the people who find the balloons will mail the post-cards back to the class informing them of where the balloons were carried by the air currents.

### School Board Adopts New Teaching Contracts Policy

The Grosse Pointe Board of Education adopted a new policy with respect to teaching contracts at its regular monthly meeting last Monday evening and, henceforth, will be able to enter into longer-term agreements with the professional staff.

School spokesmen pointed out that the customary contract for a teacher's service was one of a year's duration, renewable each spring. The new plan, effective for the 1961-62 school year in Grosse Pointe, will provide opportunities for contracts of up to five years in length to be issued.

The plan as proposed by

Superintendent James W. Bushong provides for a one year agreement between the school system and a newly employed teacher. At the end of the first year, if the experience has been a mutually satisfactory one, a two-year contract will be signed. As this second contract approaches its expiration, and after a careful re-appraisal has established that a sound situation exists, the teacher may be issued a five-year contract.

This five-year contract and succeeding ones, will be re-negotiable at the end of its third year for a new five-year period if both parties to the agreement

so determine. Thus, a teacher whose services are satisfactory in all respects can look forward to always having a contract of not more than five nor less than two years in length.

School officials stated that it would always remain the Board's prerogative to issue less than a five-year contract if such seemed advisable in individual cases.

In the case of a veteran teacher who has enjoyed a series of multiple year contracts but whose performance appears to be at or approaching a sub-standard level it would be the intention of the Board not to

renew the long term contract in its third year but, rather, to utilize the remaining two years to guide and counsel the individual in an attempt to overcome whatever deficiencies were present. If successful, long term contracts could be resumed. If not, then the contract would be allowed to expire just as is now the case with the annual agreement.

Board members and administrators expressed a confidence that these new employment

policies will enhance the stability of the professional staff. They also indicated that such provisions should be helpful in interesting career teachers in Grosse Pointe teaching opportunities.

MICHIGAN SETS ANOTHER HIGHWAY RECORD



MICHIGAN WILL HAVE the longest continuous stretch of toll-free Interstate highway in the U.S. after Dec. 19 when the final link of Interstate 94 will be open to traffic. The freeway extends from Detroit to St. Joseph, a distance of 203 miles, and also is the nation's first border-to-border Interstate freeway. State Highway Commissioner John C.

Mackie and other top national, state and local officials will participate in a ribbon-cutting ceremony to mark completion of the last section to be opened, an 18-mile stretch between Jackson and Ann Arbor. The new section also includes Michigan's 500th mile of freeway—five times as much as the state had only three years ago.

The dream of a superhighway across Michigan will become a reality next Monday (Dec. 19).

On that day, State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie will cut a ribbon to open the final link of a freeway that extends 203 miles from downtown Detroit to Stevensville on Lake Michigan.

A 15-foot wide band of gold paint will be used to mark the site of the 500th mile between Ann Arbor and Jackson.

National, state and local officials have been invited to participate in the dedication ceremonies which will be held to formally open the final 18 miles of freeway west of Ann Arbor.

Mackie said Interstate 94 freeway, now that it is completed, will have a "tremendous impact on Michigan's future economic growth."

"Michigan is on the horizon of the greatest industrial and economic expansion in its history and this freeway will do much to help business, create jobs and attract new industry," Mackie said.

The campaign to build a superhighway between Detroit and Chicago began nearly 30 years ago. The idea was first promoted by the AAA clubs in Michigan and Illinois.

Actual construction of the freeway began during World War II when the Willow Run Expressway was built to serve the thousands of employees of Henry Ford's giant bomber plant near Ypsilanti. Construction of the first section of the Edsel Ford Freeway in Detroit, now part of Interstate 94, started in 1947. Other short stretches were built at Jackson and Kalamazoo in the early 1950's.

By 1957, less than 50 miles of Interstate 94 freeway in three separate sections was open to traffic. Since then, three times as much of the freeway—150 miles—has been opened to traffic as was put in use during the first 15 years of its construction.

The 203-mile freeway, built at an estimated cost of \$250 million, passes through seven counties—Wayne, Washtenaw, Jackson, Calhoun, Kalamazoo, Van Buren and Berrien.

It replaces US-12, a winding, mostly two-lane highway and has been obsolete since before World War II.

Mackie said the new freeway will reduce the driving time from downtown Detroit to St. Joseph by two hours, from about five hours on old US-12 to about three hours on the freeway.

"In effect, the new freeway pulls Detroit and St. Joseph 78

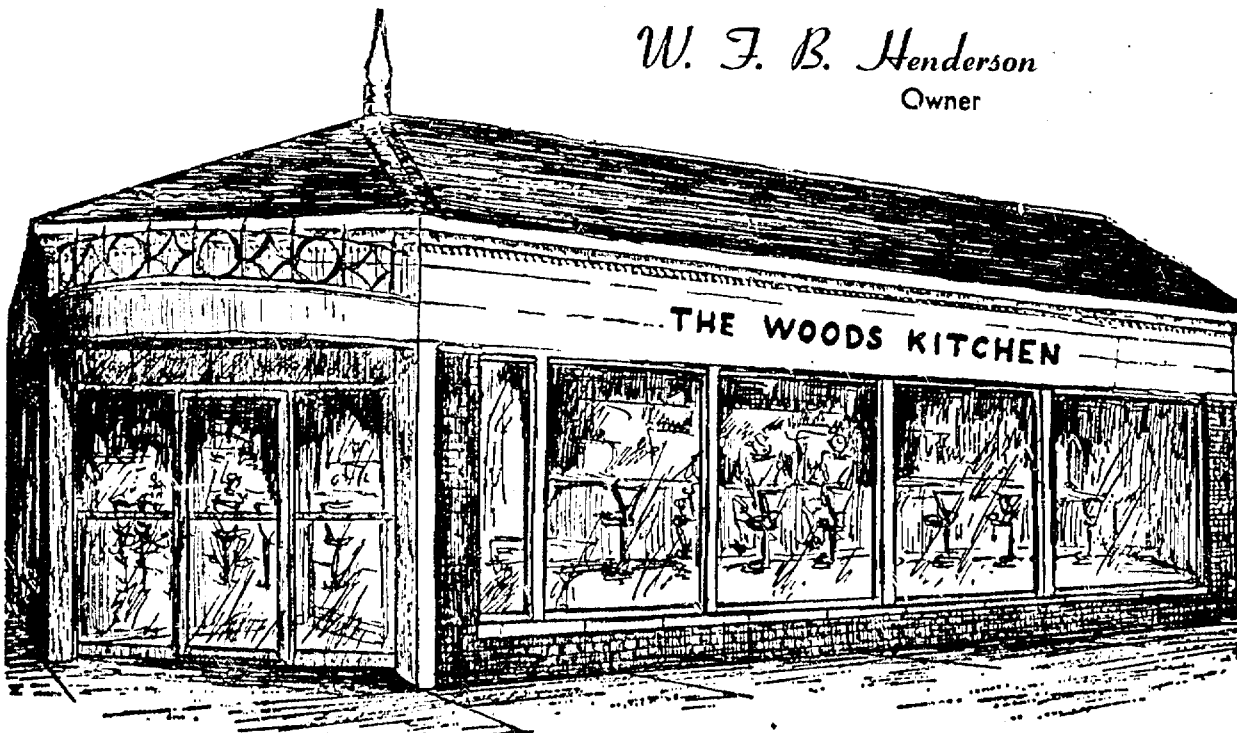

### Pointe Schools Doing Good Job

How good a job of instruction are our schools doing? How do we "measure up" to a set of standards with respect to administration and teaching procedures?

Some possible answers to these questions were given at a PTA program presented at Brownell on November 28. Principal Charles E. Saltzer narrated a slide program comparing Brownell's program of instruction with the recommendations contained in Dr. James Conant's "Education in the Junior High School Years."

The slides showed class and extra-curricular activities at school together with charts

showing reading and mathematics test results and Brownell course requirements. Following the program, questions from the audience were directed at a panel consisting of Brownell deans and department representatives.

Among the facts brought out in the program was that a Brownell teacher has an average student load of 116 to 135 students, while the Conant report states that 125 to 150 students is a "reasonable limit."

The Conant report recommends that a junior high counselor have from 250 to 300 students assigned to him; the ratio

at Brownell of students per counselor is 268.

Seventh and eighth graders at Brownell spend 30 hours a week in school, while the report advocates a 33-hour week of seven class periods a day. The program also disclosed that on reading tests Brownell students attained reading scores of at least one year higher than the level expected of their grade.

### Four Held in Connection With TV Store Robbery

Four men, two of them Jackson Prison parolees, are being held in the Wayne County Jail for investigation of breaking and entering of a Woods television store on Monday, December 5.

Held for questioning and investigation are William Leggett, 20, of 1133 Dickerson, and Peter Thomas, 29, of 951 Dickerson, both of Detroit; and Ernest Hogan, 21, of 1714 Washington, and Philbert Duran, 22, of 1627 Washington, both of Algonac.

Woods, Det. Sgt. Walter O'Dell and Det. Leroy Tobian said that the four were arrested by Detroit police a few hours after they broke into the K.L.A. Electronics Shop, 19775 Mack avenue, when they were

observed near the home of a friend in Detroit.

The foursome broke into the television store and stole radio and television sets valued at more than \$800 and \$42 cash, which was taken from a cash register. The store is owned by Donald C. VanDame of 1693 Bays Drive, who discovered the breaking and entering when he opened for business December 5.

The Woods detectives said that Thomas and Hogan have confessed their part in the burglary, and that Leggett and Duran, have yet to be questioned. The latter two had been sentenced to prison for burglary and were recently released on parole.

The four men took their loot to the home of the girl, whose name is withheld and later were seen in the vicinity of the house by a Detroit police scout car crew, who stopped to investigate. The four were arrested and held for investigation and turned over to Woods authorities after it was found that they had broken into VanDame's store.

O'Dell and Tobian said that Thomas and Hogan stated that they broke into the store at about 6 a. m. on the December date, and were in the building for about five minutes.

Thomas said, in a statement, that he and the others had been drinking, and were in Hogan's car, with Leggett driving. They drove around Detroit after buying some beer, then parked at the foot of Alter road, where they had three bottles each. After this, they cruised through the Pointe area looking over stores to see what they liked, Thomas said.

Thomas said that they came to the television store and Leggett drove to the rear of the building. Leggett got out of the car and smashed the store window with a gravel fist, then helped Duran crawl through the window into the store, then followed.

Leggett, according to Thomas, then opened the rear door for Hogan. Thomas said he was afraid to go in, and remained in the car. Then his companions brought out the goods and put them in the car, after which they drove to the girl's house, to deposit their ill-gotten gains, and then to another friend's house to play cards.

After playing several hands

of cards, Thomas said, the friend went with them to the girl's house, where he inspected the loot and purchased a transistor radio for \$55. They drove the friend back home and, after dropping him off, drove to the alley at the rear, when they were stopped by police.

Duran's statement was somewhat the same as Thomas', except more detailed.

He told of driving around with Hogan on Detroit's east side, when they came upon Leggett driving his car at Jefferson and East Grand boulevard, with his girl friend, in whose house the goods were stored.

They all drove to Jefferson and Dickerson, and then they met Thomas, who was asked if he wanted to go for a ride. He went to a drive-in restaurant at Warren and Connor, then to a bar, where they had a few bottles of beer, and then to the foot of Alter road, where they drank more beer. Then, Duran said, they went to the television store.

Duran said that Leggett broke the window of the store, and after he and Leggett entered the store, Leggett forced the hoods off the rear door to let Hogan in.

Duran claimed that while he, Leggett and Hogan were inside, Thomas was behind the wheel of the car, so that in the event they were interrupted, they could make a fast getaway.

The balance of Duran's statement was similar to that made by Thomas, except that Duran claimed that while the other four were playing cards, he was in the car asleep.

He was still asleep when they went to the girl's house so that the friend, "Buster," could look at the radio. After the purchase, they came out of the girl's house, Duran said, and he awoke and was informed that Buster bought the radio for \$55. Buster was driven home, after that, Duran said.

Duran said they did not have a chance to split the money because they were stopped by the Detroit police and questioned, then taken to McLellan Station, where they told of breaking in VanDame's store.

O'Dell and Tobian said they were notified of the arrest of the four men, and took custody of Thomas and Hogan, and questioned them at the Woods station. Their two companions

were kept in the County Jail for violation of parole.

The officers said they will seek warrants charging the four men with breaking and entering.

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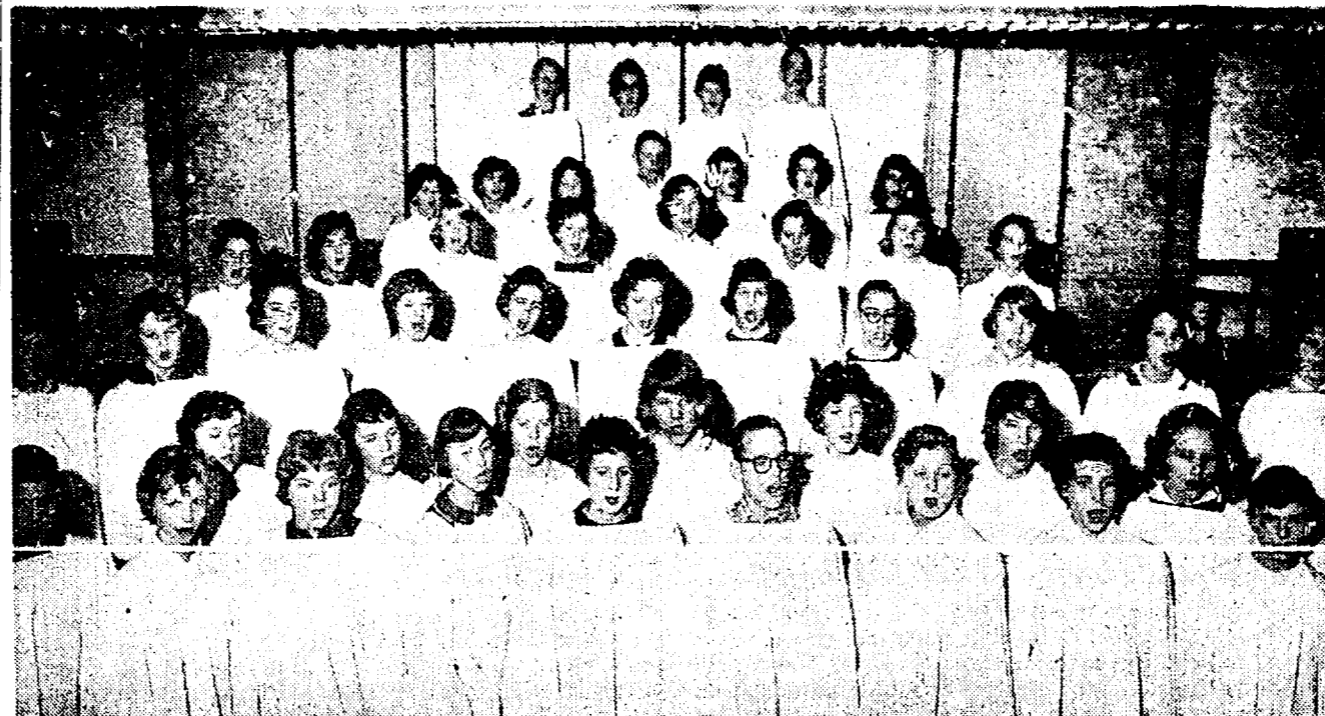
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Pierce School To Have Christmas Vespers

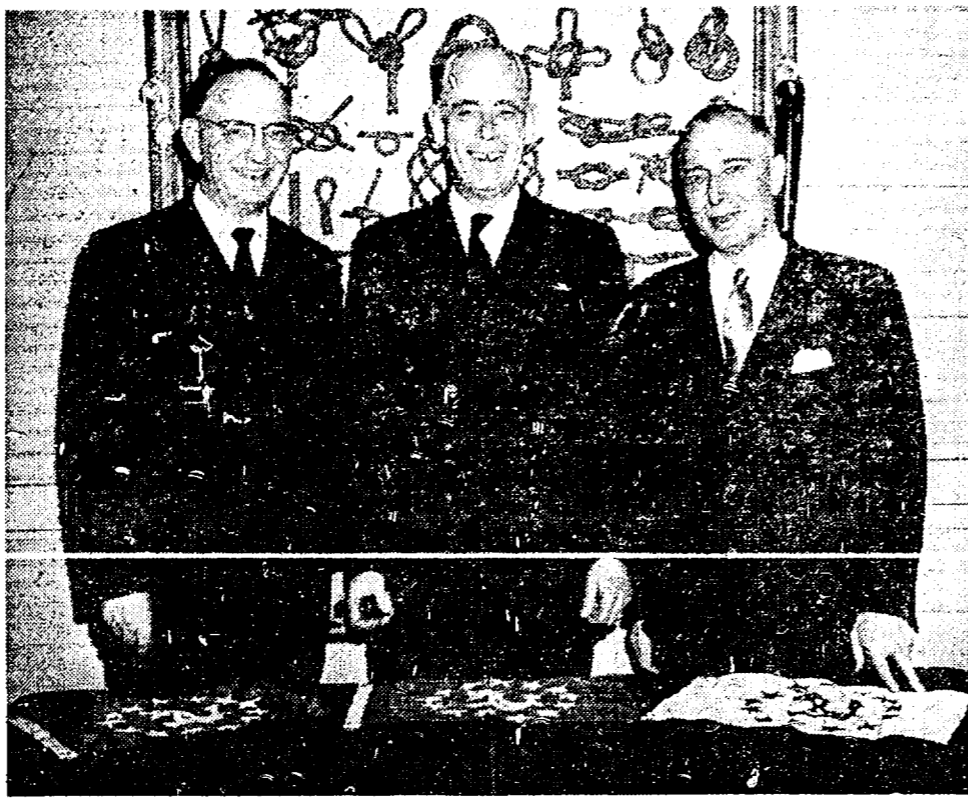

### Play It Safe At Yule Time

December is the month when the accident rate is high so that accident prevention as well as good will should have high priority on your December schedule, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, City-County Health Commissioner, states.

Wise safety practices, as well as good will toward men, are particularly important at Christmas time, he said. You increase the likelihood that you will have an accident if you permit yourself to get "dead tired." This is true of children as well as adults. Rest from your shopping and other Christmas preparations before you become so tired that you are more likely to be accident prone.

Burns from fires, as well as traffic and other accidents, are high in the days before Christmas until the week after New Years.

When the buy a tree, bounce the trunk on the ground. If the needles fall off in showers, the tree has been in storage too long and is a fire hazard. Pull at the needles at the end of the branch to see if they have good resistance. Choose a tree that is not too big for your room and keep it outdoors until you are ready to put it up. Remember, the larger the tree the greater is the hazard, so do not buy a tree any larger than you need. Until you are ready to decorate your tree, stand it outside in a bucket of water or in the snow. Saw off the trunk of the tree at least one inch before you set it up. When you bring the tree in the house, set it in a container of water or wet sand and keep the container filled. The water should be above the bottom of the stump. Make sure the tree is well supported so that it does not tip over and use a stand that is strong enough to hold it up.

Don't put a tree near sources of heat such as fire places or radiators and keep the branches out of doorways. If you decide

to have a fire in your fireplace, keep the tree a safe distance away from it.

Don't let Christmas wrappings or old decorations accumulate in your home. Burn them or place them in a covered metal trash can.

Examine the lights for your tree and if you have any frayed cords or loose sockets, discard them. When buying a new string of lights, make sure that it has the approval of U.L.—Underwriters Laboratory. If the tree lights flicker, turn them off until they are carefully examined. Never leave the lights burning when the family is away from home or when the family is asleep.

Don't plug too many cords in one outlet, and be sure you use no more than a 15-ampere fuse on the electrical circuit. Call a competent electrician if you plan any extensive wiring for Christmas lighting. Don't do it yourself.

Unbreakable ornaments are safest, but if others are to be used, they should be placed high on the tree and out of reach of little children. When you place decorations high up, use a step ladder or sturdy step stool.

Your own actions speak much louder than words in teaching good safety practices to the children in your family or any others who are watching you.

The youth, turned over to Det. Lt. Arnold F. Gogh for further questioning, admitted taking the mike. Hansen told the officer that he jerked the instrument from the police car. He also admitted taking something from another car, a private one, somewhere in the Park, the lieutenant said.

Hansen refused to implicate his companion, who is known, Hough said, and this youth will be picked up for questioning.

The City of Grosse Pointe has commenced advertising today for applicants to fill a vacant police position resulting from the sudden death of one of its officers, Sgt. John E. Rabaut.

Savage emphasized the sensitive nature of police work and the importance of selecting qualified people for this type of job. "The advent of the automobile and the increasing complexities of city living, require a more professional type of person for today's policemen than ever before. The city government and the community have a great interest in seeing that these people are of the highest moral and mental fitness for they may be serving the community for a great time to come. Because of this, we are going to screen and select these people with the greatest of care and caution."

Announced qualifications for the job, which carries a salary range of \$5300 to \$5900, include age 21 to 27 inclusive; minimum height of 5'10" with weight to match; high school graduation; and residence within a five mile radius of the City of Grosse Pointe. Applicants are required to apply at the Police Department in person, between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on week days before Saturday, December 31st.

### Books Beat TV For Education

ANN ARBOR—Books are the most efficient teaching aids and television the least efficient, a specialist in instructional materials declared at The University of Michigan.

Perfection of a teaching aid as an educational tool hinges on the degree to which individuals can use it on their own terms, explained Louis Forsdale, of Horace Mann-Lincoln Institute of School Experimentation at Columbia University's Teachers College.

Forsdale described his method of evaluating teaching materials:

"Place all teaching aids on a line, with those most accessible to individuals at one end and those farthest removed at the other. Nearest the student would be books. At the opposite pole would be television. Films would be in the middle. Degree to which aids could be moved down the line toward individual control defines their effectiveness as teaching tools."

Forsdale said this principle assumes that individuals operate at various paces due to differences, that motivation changes with time and situation, and that repetition is desirable or necessary in the education process.

With television, individuals exercise no control over what they see and when, he said, adding that they can't repeat the experience as with books. "It would be as absurdity for individuals to ask television stations to televise this or that program for his benefit."

Forsdale said extensive educational use of video tape would be economically taxing, since taping machines cost upwards of \$50,000 and require extensive training to operate.

Film is in the middle of the scale, he commented—one innovation and another that is desired could move it closer to individual control.

Introduction of eight mm. sound film and development and production of a cartridge loading film projector could lead to greater individual use of motion pictures as instructional materials, Forsdale said.

Use of cartridge loading projectors would make a variety of subjects available to school libraries and classrooms. Use would require skills any six year old possesses, he explained.

Eight mm. sound film could lead to the same changes that the entrance of 16 mm. prompted in the 1930's. Film cost, projector portability and size would be affected, allowing wider usage, he said.

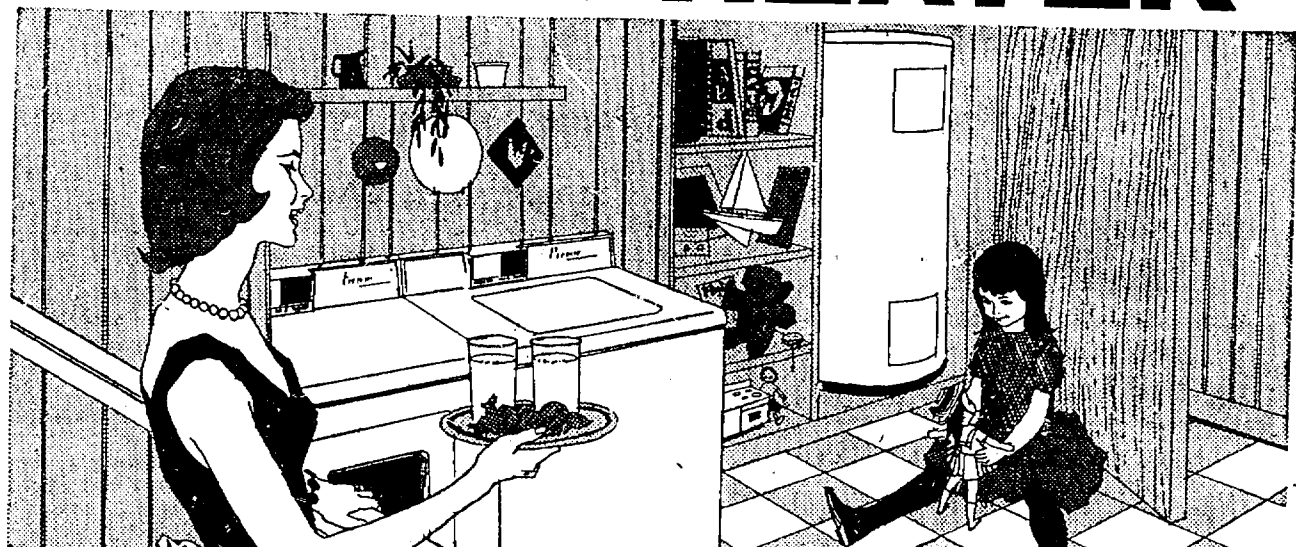

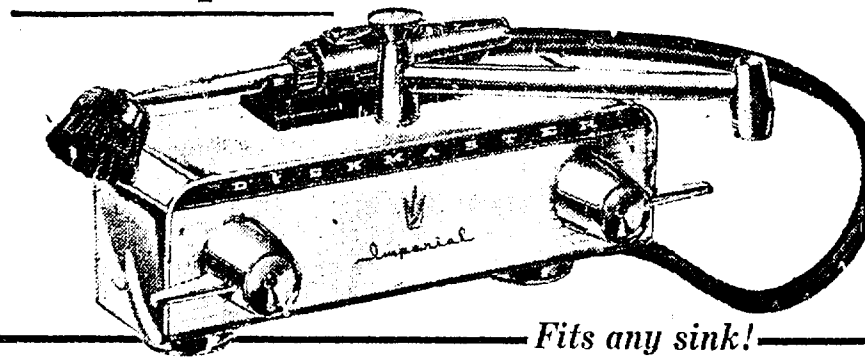

at 1971 James Couzens. The attractive career girl, a resident of Royal Oak, was stabbed six times Wednesday morning

while she was alone in the office. The intruder had ransacked her desk and rifled her wallet.

Before she died in Mt. Carmel Mercy Hospital, Miss Donahue described her assailant as a shabbily dressed Negro who had been in the office before looking for odd jobs. Police said the 15 officers assigned to the murder had started a systematic check of every possible suspect.

A RECENT letter by George Romney, president of American Motors Corporation may mean good news and money in the bank for buyers of the corporation's automobiles. The let-

ter concerned a meeting in New York on Thursday at which time Romney said the company would outline a program of "national importance," which the company thinks has historic potential. Company officials refused to confirm or deny reports that this would be a profit sharing program.

In 1957 Romney suggested the possibility of rebating \$100 to buyers of American Motors Ramblers if production reached \$180,000 to \$200,000, but 1957 sales totaled only \$98,500. This year, the company's sales are expected to be above \$460,000.

Saturday, December 10  
OLD-SOLDIER Charles de Gaulle marched bareheaded through mobs of rioting right-wing Algerians yesterday and at least some of the demonstrators grew quiet. In the western Algerian town of Ain Temouchent, de Gaulle told thousands of extremist French settlers who had violently attacked his security guards that "the cries, the clamor signify nothing." They cheered him as he walked away.

In other parts of Algiers and in Oran, angry youths set up barricades in the street and hurled rocks, potatoes, and bottles at the security guards in protest against de Gaulle's idea of an independent Algeria. However, a military district commander in Oran assured de Gaulle that "the army will never make common cause with the insurgents."

MRS. JOHN F. KENNEDY, curious to see her new home, visited Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower yesterday just an hour after she and her newborn son were released from Georgetown Hospital. When she left the White House, Mrs. Kennedy thanked her hosts for the tour and told reporters that Mrs. Eisenhower was "very gracious." Later the Kennedy family flew to Palm Beach for a reunion with three-year-old daughter Caroline and a rest.

WALTER REUTHER vowed today that cost-of-living clauses and annual pay increases will remain a part of the new contracts to be negotiated next year. He warned auto leaders that it would be dangerous and unrealistic for auto companies to tamper with such "basic" parts of the labor contract. The UAW president said it was "nonsense" to think that the auto industry would follow the lead of steel, railroad, and electrical industries in modifying the cost-of-living allowance or eliminating it entirely.

A DERANGED farmer in Ar-mada, Michigan, killed his wife, her former attorney, and finally himself in a rampage that shocked police and stunned the quiet community.

Police said an unreasoning rage had been building up in 67-year-old Joseph Austin since his wife filed for divorce two years ago. The couple were reunited through the efforts of their attorneys, but Austin continued to blame his troubles on his wife's attorney, Wendell H. Lichtenfeld. Today, in a wild rage, Austin murdered his wife and traveled into town where he shot Lichtenfeld. After returning home, he destroyed everything in reach with an axe, poked holes through pic-

tures of family members with a pencil, and finally killed himself.

Sunday, December 11  
ANTONY ARMSTRONG-Jones has accepted a part-time job and doesn't seem to mind that he may be the most under-paid man in London. He won't earn a cent from the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art, but he will aid in policy-making and will be able to use his photographic abilities as well. Academy head John Fernald said no general announcement had been made because he was still recovering from the shock of Armstrong-Jones' acceptance. The former society and court photographer had refused several other theatrical offers.

SPECULATION that Robert S. McNamara may resign his month-old job as Ford Motor Company president was based today on McNamara's appearance in Washington for confidential talks with aides to President-elect John F. Kennedy. The 44-year-old "political independent" has been reported in line for a presidential appointment as Secretary of the Treasury or Defense Secretary.

A 27-YEAR-OLD Fraser man drowned today when he was trapped under the ice in Green Lake, in West Bloomfield Township. Police said James Clark had gone skimming with Edward Long, 22. The men had tried to cross the lake under-water using the "buddy system." When they realized the lake was frozen, Long said they turned back and he somehow lost track of his companion. The father of two children, Clark had been skimming for more than ten years.

Monday, December 12  
Several time-honored Army superstitions were upset with the publication in the Army Digest of food likes and dislikes of 30,000 soldiers. Army chefs have shown a historical preference for beans, but the soldiers disagreed. Their favorite foods

were milk, hot rolls, hot biscuits, strawberry shortcake, grilled steak, ice cream, ice cream sundae and fried chicken. Disliked most were candied parsnips. "We have a very young army," explained David Peryam, chief of the Quartermaster Corps food acceptance branch.

FROM PALM BEACH, President-elect John F. Kennedy announced the appointment of Dean Rusk as secretary of state. Rusk has been serving as head of the Rockefeller Foundation. Senator Kennedy also announced that Rep. Chester Bowles (D. Conn.) will be undersecretary of state in the new administration.

Some disturbing questions apparently were answered for Adlai Stevenson with these appointments. Stevenson accepted his appointment as U. S. ambassador to the United Nations, after a delay of several days.

A STORY in London's Sunday Express stating that Chrysler corporation was trying to buy a large share of a British auto firm, Standard Triumph International, was immediately denied by Chrysler spokesmen in this country and abroad. In Detroit, a Chrysler official said the report was false and no such negotiations have taken place.

Tuesday, December 13  
A FULL-BLOWN BLIZZARD, starting in Texas and blowing across the northeastern United States yesterday left 123 dead in its wake. It was declared the worst storm in at least 13 years and preceded by nine days the official coming of winter. The East coast was paralyzed under huge snow drifts.

Airports in New York City and Washington D.C. were closed and the streets were nearly empty. Offices in the nation's capital were put under emergency operation under which only skeleton staffs of workers reported for duty. The storm struck quickly, then ended, hours after it began.

A GIANT EXPOSITION will be held in Cobo Hall in 1962 if the Civic Center Commission will agree to adopt 10 ground rules to avoid labor difficulties at the convention building. The American Foundrymen's society suggested the rules which it said must be agreed upon by everyone concerned if the group is to hold its exposition in Detroit.

They stipulate in part that exhibitors be given a list in advance of what they will and will not be allowed to do in installing and dismantling their exhibits. They also would provide that exhibitors would not be required to pay higher labor fees than called for by the job and eliminates "featherbedding" by not allowing standby labor except as provided in the contract.

Wednesday, December 14  
WHEN GOVERNOR G. MEN-NEN WILLIAMS retires in January, he will move his family to a three-story, 7-bedroom, brick and clapboard home in Washington's old Georgetown area. Located about six blocks from the present home of President-elect John F. Kennedy, the new Williams home is three blocks from the home of Rep. Chester Bowles, who will be undersecretary of state. Governor Williams said he and his son, Gery, 19, a former Princeton student, will move approximately January 12. The rest of the family will follow when the girls finish school in June.

AS DETROIT SHIVERED through the coldest weather in nearly two years and the temperature dropped almost to zero, the happiest people in town were the ice skating fans. All of Detroit's 104 natural and nine artificial skating rinks

were open to the public and a heavy attendance was reported. Ice was four to five inches thick at most of the natural rinks and skating was described as "very good."



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

# Society News Gathered from All of the Pointes

## Parties Of Christmases Past Described In Family Volume

When Mrs. Cameron Davenport Waterman entertained during the holidays in 1900 guests were assured it would be more than punch and a cookie.

Her dinners in the magnificent Victorian house where the Fort Shelby Hotel stands today were renowned. She carefully kept the menu, guest list and table decorations in a leather-bound book for future reference. This book now belongs to her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Cameron B. Waterman, of Lincoln road.

On December 19, 1900, the Watermans entertained at dinner, the menu cards printed and inscribed with a literary quotation under every course.

There were canapes, oysters, consommé, landlocked salmon, frogs, Huron Island duck, Roman punch, Huron Mountain venison, Neuchâtel and café parfait. The menu cards were decked with holly and ivy and a line from Cymbeline "Most Welcome! Be sprightly, for you fall 'mongst friends."

Guests were the Henry M. Campbells, the W. P. Hamiltons, Dr. and Mrs. Longyear, Miss Florence Pond, Charles Rathbone and Mr. and Mrs. Charles M. Swift. They ate at a table centered with a log filled with pine boughs and flanked by vases of hemlock branches and red berries.

Mrs. Waterman also ran her charitable and church activities with a firm and organized hand. Two days after Christmas in 1900 she gave a dinner

for 100 women and children at the Fort Street Presbyterian Church.

In her fine Spencerian hand it is noted that 100 chicken pies cost \$5.00; 4 pounds of dairy butter were 88c, 18 square cakes were \$1.80 and 3 gals. of Neopolitan ice cream cost \$4.50.

In early January, 1901, she entertained at tea for 110 people which "was a great success in every way". Mrs. C. A. DuCharme poured tea and Mrs. Douglas poured coffee. Mrs. Henry D. Sheldon served apricot sherbert in the drawing room, and the guests consumed 2 gallons. They also ate 60 brown bread cottage cheese and olive sandwiches and 100 chicken and celery sandwiches. Pink roses with pink ribbons were the accent notes.

On December 23, 1904, the Watermans gave a dance for the Yale Glee and Banjo Clubs. Some of the members were Harold Baker, Frederick Ford, Hiram Walker, Wylie Carhart, Hugh Ledyard and Thayer McMillan.

Among the ladies asked were Virginia Brush, Frances Bagley, Carol Newberry, Marion Eddy, Eloise Jenks, Anne, Frances, Helen and Gertrude Russell, and Adele Campau.

They ate early, at 6:30, before the 8:30 concert, at a table decked with Christmas bells and holly with touches of Yale blue. Filet of whitefish and beef, Roman punch and plum pudding were on the menu.

And what did the ladies wear

to such gayeties? At a debut dance in 1902 at the Masonic Temple, Mrs. Henry B. Joy came in Nile green silk veiled in white lace with a large bow knot of diamonds; Mrs. Truman Newberry was in black velvet with sleeves and a bertha of white tulle with a sunburst of diamonds; Miss Sallie Hendrie was in white satin with tulle ruffles spangled in silver.

An unexpected guest at this holiday debut was Ethel Barrymore, the great actress, who wore severe black velvet draped with white chiffon and a chaplet of leaves in her hair.

The Watermans often had theater parties like the supper following Raymond Hitchcock's performance in "The Man Who Owns Broadway", December 10, 1910.

Then they dined on caviar, partridge and oyster and clam bouillon with the setting an Italian garden.

Favors were often a feature of their parties like those given at the cotillon held on December 23, 1899. The gentlemen were given Christmas stockings, holly plants in silver tubes, Mandolins and match scratchers. The ladies received Yale blue spangled puffs, quills painted Yale blue, Japanese iris and doll heads.

Progressive euchre was the occasion for a party to which John Hinchman, Fred T. Moran, Anne Russell, Irene Swift and others were asked. There were five prizes.

There were parties to honor

Washington's birthday, Lincoln's Birthday; the Dexter Ferrys were feted at a dinner with fine Belgian hare from the Denby farm (Edwin Denby was secretary of the Navy); a luncheon for Miss Seyburn which starred little rose trees as favors and a Christmas pie; several suppers following musicales at home and a breakfast on two succeeding days with flannan haddie, aspic jelly and violet charlotte russe on the menu.

For all these fascinating entertainments Mrs. Waterman carefully recorded the guests who accepted and those who refused. The record has a nostalgic flavor of the days when parties were more stately and gracious, menus in the manner of the haute cuisine expected, and the guests accustomed to formal service when there was no servant problem.

## Mrs. Stark to Lead Mothers' March

### Civic Leader and Poetess Again Accepts Leadership of Important Part of National Foundation's Annual Campaign

Anne Campbell Stark, well known civic leader and poetess, again will head up the Mothers' March for the 1961 New March of Dimes campaign against crippling diseases, it was announced by Charles Gehring, Wayne County campaign director.

Mrs. Stark, best known as Anne Campbell, is poetess for syndicated newspapers whose daily poem appears in 150 papers across the country, (including the Detroit News) dealing with the subject of everyday living.

Participating in the National Foundation's March of Dimes is no new assignment for Mrs. Stark, wife of Detroit's historian, George W. Stark, as she first served this civic cause in 1947 as a member of the Board of Directors. She then headed up the entire campaign as Chapter Chairman from 1949-1954.

Mrs. Stark served as the Mothers' March Chairman at the inception of this event in 1950 and has continued to serve as the only chairman ever since. It is under her leadership that 20,000 volunteer mothers,

and some fathers who fill in under the slogan of "Tonight I Am A Mother", have helped raise over \$3,000,000 in Wayne County to aid in the fight against the crippling disease—birth defects, arthritis and polio.

She has been active also in other areas of the March of Dimes campaign including co-chairman of the March of Dimes Fashion Extravaganza since 1955. This event has contributed over \$75,000 during this period of time.

In 1954 Mrs. Stark was selected as Michigan Mother of the Year.

Accepting the honor of leading the 1961 Mothers' March brought forth the following statement from Mrs. Stark: "Most people still don't realize what vicious crippling birth defects and arthritis can be, in addition to polio. About 250,000 children are born each year in the U.S. with birth defects. Arthritis and other rheumatic diseases afflict more than 11,000,000 Americans. More than 50,000 polio patients are still on the March of Dimes patient aid rolls.

"Volunteers who worked for the March of Dimes in past years have the comforting knowledge that their efforts helped sponsor the research work of a young doctor named Jonas E. Salk, and Dr. Albert B. Sabin. We hope that our present efforts will sponsor research doctors who will be to the war against birth defects and arthritis what Dr. Salk and Sabin are to the polio war."

Mrs. Stark stressed the continued need for volunteer mothers who wish to contribute their services for the Mothers' March on Tuesday, January 31, 1961. She urged that they call the New March of Dimes headquarters, WO 1-4153, and ask for the Mothers' March department.

use them will only tempt him to take unnecessary risks and use them in unsafe places or else they will make him frustrated because he cannot enjoy them.

The tiny baby's first toy should be a bright one to hang where he can follow it with his eyes. It is certain the first thing he will enjoy is something that moves. When he is three or four months old he can grasp and hold a rattle. A child one or two years old is learning safety and needs toys to pull and push, to pile up and knock down again, to load and unload. A young child will be happier if his holiday celebration is spread over several days. Do not confuse him by giving him too many toys at once. His enjoyment is diminished by confusion or bewilderment.

Make sure that the toys you give him do not have sharp points and that they are not splintered or broken. Avoid stuffed animals which have glass or button eyes which a child might pull off and breathe into his windpipe or shove into his ear.

Babies and young children are sensitive to the emotions of those closest to them. If there is a baby or young child in your family, surround him with the security and warmth of a happy family holiday and try to make it not too different from the experience he is accustomed to on other days. Don't overwhelm him with too many visitors, too many toys or too much excitement. If you expect him to have a happy Christmas, make sure he has enough rest by preventing overexcitement.

"Food could be America's most forceful weapon in the cold war," says a Michigan State University expert on world food problems.

Dr. George A. Borgstrom, a professor of food science, says in two years, with its food production capacity and surplus, America could bring the nutritional standards of the Egyptians up to what they hope to attain in 1975, when the Aswan Dam, which the Russians are

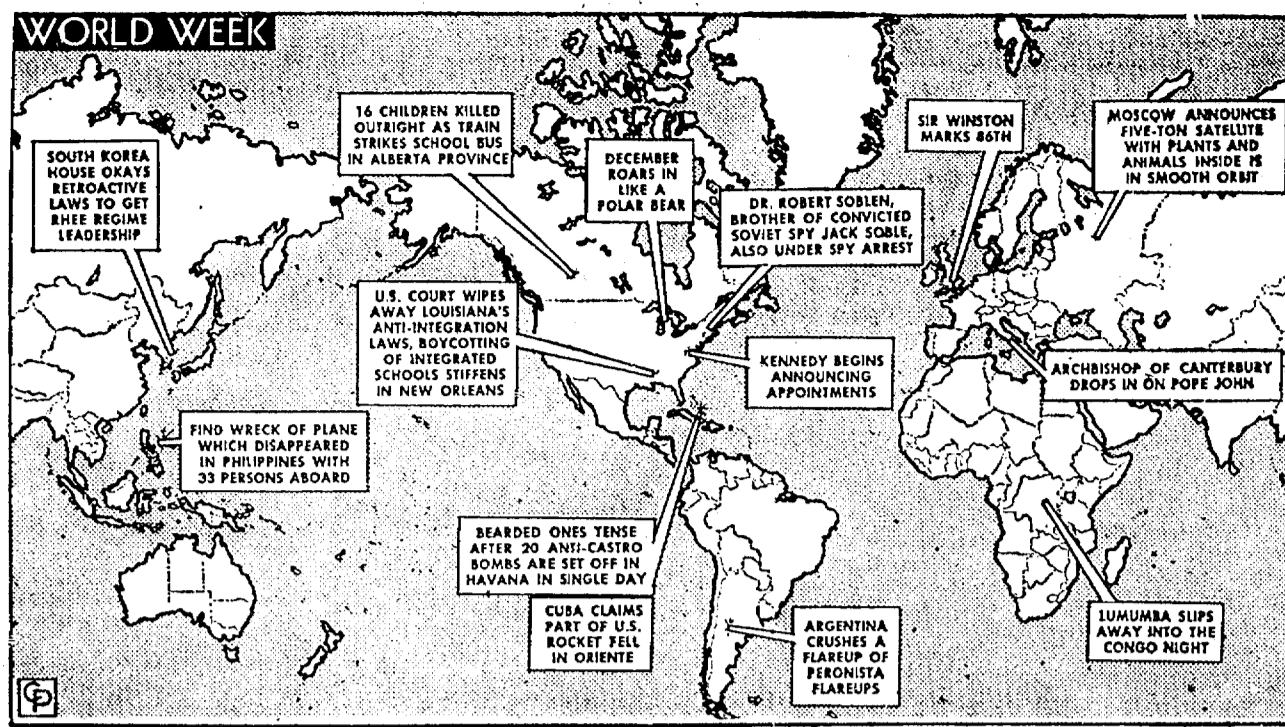

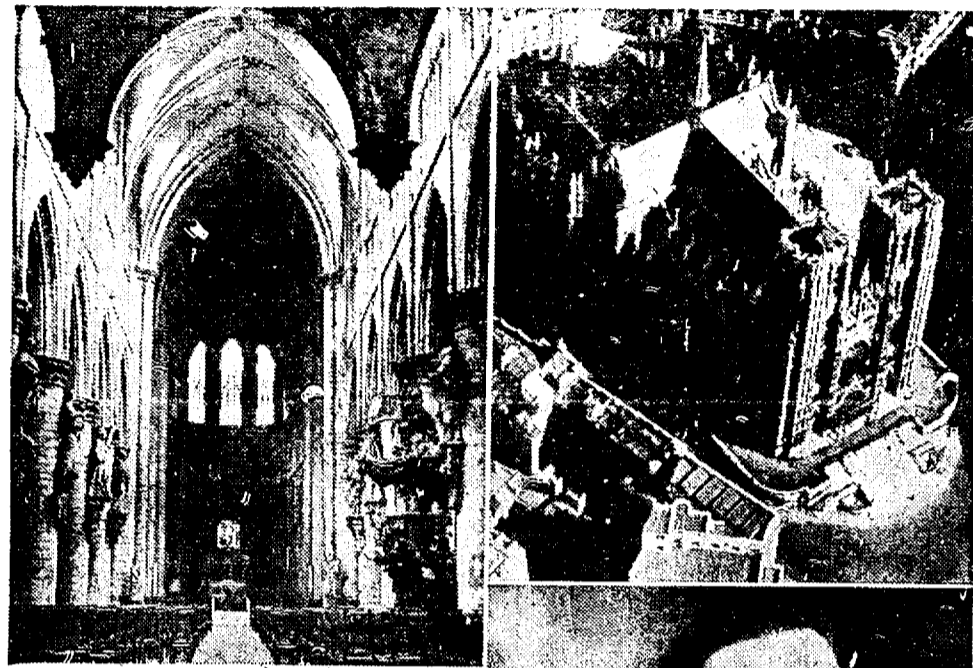

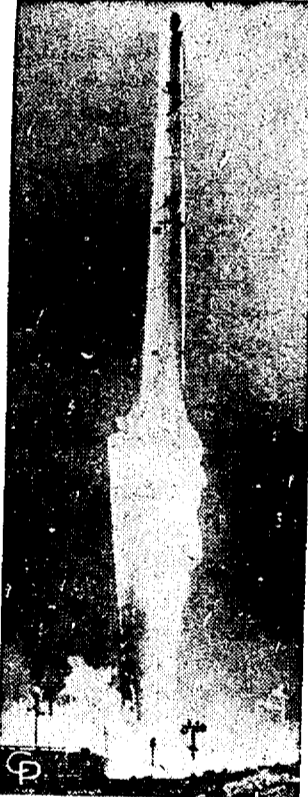

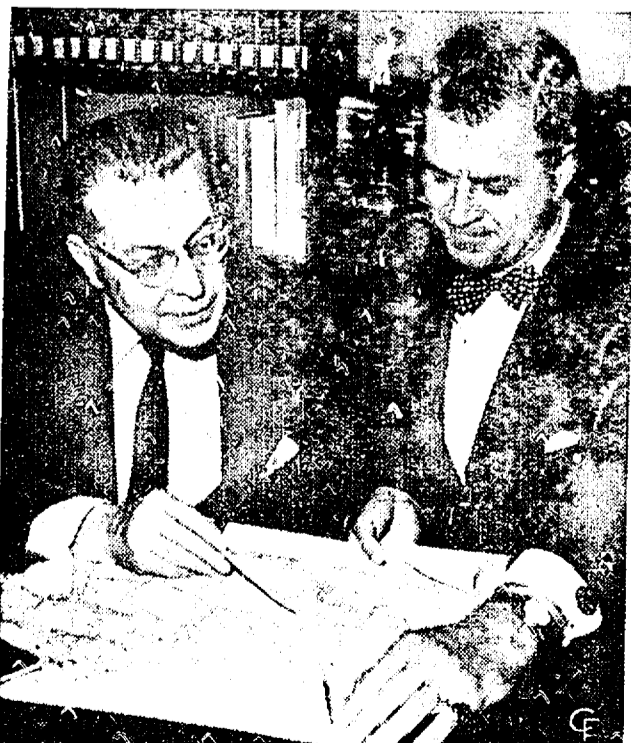

when the POINTE was growing up...

By Pat Talbot

Frigid weather was a blessing during the holidays of the 1880's. If a good cold snap came early in December Pointers would be able to hitch up their cutters and drive along the frozen roads to Detroit to do their Christmas shopping.

There were only a few grocery stores along Kercheval, Jefferson and Fisher in those days. For any important purchases year round residents had to go to the city across dirt lanes, which were often mired in mud.

Cadillac square was the hub of shopping. Crosswalks led from the square, paved in flagstones, to such stores as Mableys, the first department store in Detroit. C. R. Mabley, had begun business in 1870 and on opening day had sent a wagon through the streets distributing several hundred dollars worth of clothing. He was the first to use advertising in a big way, initiate special sales.

The old market on Cadillac Square sold venison, rabbit and wild turkey. On Saturday it would be crowded with Pointe farmers selling and buying produce.

On Campus Martius was a tobacconist, Scotten, Lovett and Co., which during the 80's became the Kirkwood Hotel. A clothing store nearby gave away a watch with every purchase of a suit of clothes. There was a museum, largely dedicated to entertainment with a hand grind organ going all afternoon to tempt the passersby. The organ played only one tune, "Down in a Coal Mine."

Although the big fancy grocery store, G. and R. McMillan, on the west side of Woodward made bi-weekly trips to Grosse Pointe, most of its best customers lived along Jefferson avenue in the winter and the mistress of the house had her coachman drive her shopping, ping.

J. L. Hudson was just beginning his men's clothing store on Woodward. He had begun his career as a clerk in Mabley's. And there was the Wright Kay and Co.'s jewelry store which had a large staff atop its building with a ball on the end of it. Each day precisely at noon, the ball would drop, and all the citizens would set their watches.

Atop the Farnsworth Building on Michigan and Woodward was a huge golden boot, advertising shoes for sale.

When the shopping was done patrons would flock to the Russell House, an old six story building and the most famous hotel in the city. Any member of the male sex, of legal age, could walk in and buy a draught of beer for 2c or two drinks of whiskey for a quarter.

Horse cars had reduced the traffic of carriages. The streets were wide and beautiful. Not far from the main shopping center were the avenues which housed the upcoming tycoons of the day, Alger, Newberry, Buhl Hendrie McMillan, DuCharme and Muir. Lumber, grain and ore were coming up, and down the lakes but masted schooners could still be seen from the docks. Detroit's population in the 80's was 116,000.

More Student Aid Offered

Six new and substantial college scholarships were announced today by Student Aid Foundation of Michigan, which is entrusted with their administration.

Included are one Martha Dwight Douglas Scholarship of \$3,500 per year for four years, totaling \$14,000, and five Katherine Tuck Scholarships of \$1,000 each per year for four years, totaling \$4,000 each, all of which have been provided by the Katherine Tuck Fund, of Detroit.

Renewals from year to year are subject to maintenance of satisfactory academic and personal standards, as in the case of approximately 180 other scholarships awarded annually by the Foundation.

The new scholarships, substantially larger than average, are intended to enable six highly qualified high school seniors, having valid educational plans which call for study at distant and high-cost institutions, to carry out their programs. Applications for the 1961-62 college year are to be made through the principals of high schools in Metropolitan Detroit area. The deadline for receipt of applications for these six scholarships is 1 February 1961.

For the current college year, Student Aid Foundation has awarded 139 of its "regular" scholarships, varying in amounts according to need; 30 one-year Detroit News Carrier Scholarships of \$500, totaling \$15,000; 5 Metropolitan Detroit Science Fair Scholarships of \$1,000 each divided equally between the first two years of college, totaling \$5,000; 2 four-year David Whitney, Jr. Scholarships of \$1,000 per year, totaling \$8,000, and 1 each of the William R. Stocking and William P. Lovett Memorial Scholarships, variable in size.

CRANBERRY ICE BOX CAKE
