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

(Continued from Page 1) myer began confessing to burglaries in 19 cities throughout the country, which grossed him more than \$250,000 worth of jewelry and many thousands of dollars in cash.

Fasenmyer told St. Louis police that he committed many burglaries, "too numerous to mention" since he escaped from Brooksville Prison in Florida last March.

His undoing came about when his wife, Ruby, 23, took a stolen ring to Chicago to sell, taking her brother along for reference. After selling the ring for \$500, she loaned \$400 to her brother and returned to her home in St. Louis.

Chicago police, in investigating the sale of the ring, wired St. Louis authorities to check out the item.

St. Louis detectives went to the Fasenmyer home, after following a chain of evidence, and found a number of pieces of jewelry, which they confiscated for a check out. Other evidence of burglary was found.

When confronted, Fasenmyer said, "Okay, you've got me. I'm the burglar," and surrendered. His wife, who claimed she was They said the pair's biggest ignorant of her husband's activities, was also arrested and and the smallest, \$24, from a held for investigation.

Among the lost found in the Fasenmyer home was a \$750 gold and diamond wrist watch taken from the home of the Peter Koenigs, 586 Shelden, last July 9. Fasenmyer confessed to breaking into this house.
Also taken from the Koenig

home were several other items of jewelry and a small goldpainted metal box containing

\$50 in coins.
Shores Police Chief Fred Duemling was notified of the confession made by Fasenmyer and about the recovery of the watch. The other items are believed to have been disposed of, it was said. Fasenmyer said it was his

policy to remove gems from rings and other items, and sell the gold and precious stones through different channels.

He said that he had often

"thrown away" jewelry pieces when they did not meet his "standards."

Paisley and Van Tiem said that Fasenmyer is daily recalling the "too numerous" burglaries he has committed, and police departments of the cities in which he was active, are being notified as fast as Fasenmyer clears his crimes.

The first annual followup of the American Cancer Society's six-year Cancer Prevention Study has been launched locally by the Society's Southeastern Michigan Division.

Approximately 20,000 Detroiters will be contacted by the volunteers who enrolled them in the Study last year to determine the deaths that have occurred in the Study group.

Death certificates will be obtained and those listing cancer as the cause will be followed up by the Society through the deceased's physician who will be asked to furnish details.

Through nationwide investigation, the Society is attempting to correlate cancer deaths to find common factors involved. Nationally, 1.2 million Americans have been enrolled in the Study.

Books Beat TV For Education

ANN ARBOR-Books are the most efficient teaching aids and television the least efficient, a specialist in instructional materials declared at The University of Michigan,

Perfection of a teaching aid as an educational tool hinges on the degree to which individuals can use it on their own terms. explained Louis Forsdale, of Horace Mann-Lincoln Institute of School Experimentation at Columbia University's Teachers College.

Forsdale described his method of evaluating teaching ma-

"Place all teaching aids on a line, with those most accessible to individuals at one end and those farthest removed at the other. Nearest the student would be books. At the opposite pole would be television. Films would be in the middle. Degree to which aids could be moved down the line toward individual control defines their effectiveness as teaching tools."

Forsdale said this principle assumes that individuals operate at various paces due to differences, that motivation changes with time and situation, and that repetition is desirable or neccessary in the education process.

With television, individuals exercise no control over what they see and when, he said, addding that they can't repeat the experience as with books. "It would be as absurdity for individuals to ask television stations to televise this or that program for his benefit."

Forsdale said extensive educational use of video tape would be economically taxing, since taping machines cost upwards of \$50,000 and require extensive training to operate.

Film is in the middle of the scale, he commented-one innovation and another that is desired could move it closer to ndividual control.

Introduction of eight mm. sound film and development and production of a cartage 21 to 27 inclusive; minimum ridge loading film projector height of 5'10" with weight to could lead to greater individual match; high school graduation; use of motion pictures as instructional materials, Forsdale said. BUTTONHOLES FOR BLOUSES

certainly match peculiarities with those of any other section when it comes to our demonstration of tastes. We are thinking of the current exhibit at the Detroit Institute of Arts of the priceless collection of Flemish *Mid-week trip to Mt. Grampian—Bus leaves the Center paintings and other creations, and the pitifully few who have take the trouble to go see them.

We have no intent of ridiculing the tastes of anyone, nor of attempting to push art down the throat of a single individual. This matter of art has long been one of our favorite subjects for argument. We can sit with all the aplomb of a nerveless mule when someone tries to tell us what is art and what is not art. We abide by an early decision that to carn the appelation of art in our catalogue, the painting, statue, object, whatsoever, must possess the power to stir within our innermost self, the reactions which make us want to dignify it with this jealously guarded tag. We respect the right of others to term something which we consider art, as nonsensical rubbish, and we demand the same privilege without being accorded treatment usually reserved for complete

We admit our taste is probably ultra-inferior, but we have seen myriad examples of calendar art, and we mean pictures not pin-ups, which we would rather give house room, than many of the monstrosities hanging in museums of repute. We want to wake up in the morning and gaze on something that will make us happy, not scare us to death.

How far can we stray from the Flemish Exhibit? What we started to express was our amazement over the way the public appears to have shunned a golden opportunity. This collection has been gathered and brought here at tremendous expense. It will be shown at no other place in the United States, and the same collection, which contains so many masterpieces that recognized experts have travelled far and wide to see, will quite probably never again be assembled under one roof. We have practically none of this 14th and 15th century art, created at the birth of the oil painting technique, in this country, and here is the cream of the crop, laid in our laps in a magnificent setting.

The National Automobile Show, which offered us howling mobs setting fantastic attendance records each day, gave us a chance to look at car models which were either already on the streets or would be shortly. It attracted more than a million and a quarter people in five days. The Lions or the Tigers, winning or losing, and whom we can see, one or the other, during almost any given week of the year, can fill Briggs stadium practically any weekend. The hockey fans pound at the doors of Olympia, as do the basketball cohorts; and even the wrestlers and second rate boxers attract more attention than is being given this once-in-a-lifetime show being staged at the Art Institute.

One more comparison. We suggested to a trustee of the Institute that it might be a good idea to put up phony signs, directing all those interested in the Christmas Fantasy being presented at the Ford Rotunda, to the beautiful art museum in Woodward avenue. The attendance records at the Rotunda have also been fabulous, and small wonder. Here is a fantastically delightful and wondrously beautiful creation which conveys all the spirit of Christmas to young and old. From the animated displays of toys and Mother Goose characters which delight the young, to the magnificent creche which leaves adults awe-stricken in the inner Rotunda, this is something which should not be missed. The point is that the Fantasy, which continues to the first of the year, attracted more people in the first week than the Flemish exhibit has in its entire visit. And the visit grows ever nearer an end.

Advice Offered On Giving Toys

Grownup givers should take care not to select gifts to please themselves, but rather to please the child and meet his needs. Your first consideration should be the child's happiness, but remember that safety and suitability for age are important if they are to bring happiness. Being wise in your selection of toys as gifts if you are an aunt, uncle or other relative will help give the child's parents an enjoyable Christmas.

In addition to delighting the youngsters, select toys that are durable and simple to give to young children. They should be easily cleaned and not have removable parts small enough to be swallowed. Each toy should stimulate its owner to some activity, either mental or physical. Some of the longtime favorites which meet this requirement include dolls, wagons which have rull strings or round handles and blocks which have rounded corners. 



Frigid weather was a blessing during the holidays of the 1880's. If a good cold snap came early in December Pointers would be able to hitch up their cutters and drive along the frozen roads to Detroit to do their Christmas shopping.

There were only a few grocery stores along Kercheval, Jefferson and Fisher in those days. For any important purchases year round residents had to go to the city across dirt lanes, which were often mired in mud.

Cadillac square was the hub of shopping. Crosswalks led from the square, paved in flagstones, to such stores as Mableys, the first department store in Detroit. C. R. Mabley, had begun business in 1270 and on opening day had sent a wagon through the streets distributing several hundred dollars worth of clothing. He was the first to use advertising in a big way, initiate special

The old market on Cadillac Square sold venison, rabbit and wild turkey. On Saturday it would be crowded with Pointe farmers selling and buying produce.

On Campus Martius was a tobaconnist, Scotten, Lovett and Co., which during the 80's became the Kirkwood Hotel. A clothing store nearby gave away a watch with every purchase of a suit of clothes. There was a museum, largely dedicated to entertainment with a hand grind organ going all afternoon to tempt the passersby. The organ played only one tune, "Down in a

Atop the Farnsworth Building on Michigan and Woodward was a huge golden boot, advertising shoes

When the shopping was done patrons would flock to the Russell House, an old six story building and the most famous hotel in the city. Any member of the male sex, of legal age, could walk in and buy a draught of beer for 2c or two drinks of whiskey for a quarter.

Horse cars had reduced the traffic of carriages. The streets were wide and beautiful. Not far from the main shopping center were the avenues which housed the up coming tycoons of the day, Alger, Newberry, Buhl Hendrie McMillan, DuCharme and Muir. Lumber, grain and ore were coming up and down the lakes but masted schooners could still be seen from the docks. Detroit's population in the 80's was 116,000.




