

January 7 - Theodore Souris ® gan Supreme Court by Governor Williams. Souris, 34, is the youngest man ever to be appointed to the State's highest court in its 132-year history. 

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
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
# Appeal Issued To Bird Lovers

# Real Christmas Gifts For Local Governments

In this season, when mankind strives to rededicate itself to the ideal of brotherly love, good will and peace among all men, we often exchange gifts as tokens of this spirit. Some gifts reflect these ideals, some do not but often merely try to purchase special privilege that tends to embarrass the receiver.

An experienced city administrator once said that he never accepts a gift that he cannot eat or drink in one sitting. Others, equally knowledgeable, have said that they accept no gifts at all that have monetary value and that they instruct their subordinates to follow the same

However, there are gifts that a people can bestow on their local governments that will be welcome and that will return to the giver the traditional sevenfold. These gifts are not tangible nor are they purchasable at a market price, but they are of a substance that strength-

ens a free people. The first gift is the recognition that strong, independent local governments form a cornerstone in a free society such as ours. The stultifying iron hand of a police state cannot tolerate the existence of independent local government. Where they exist, one knows that freedom

The second gift is a new, more realistic meaning, to the word "politician." A free people select their own leaders. They do this by vote, through the machinery of politics. Judged objectively, they select on able group of men to take charge of their affairs. Politics is on honorable profession. True, it often is demanding and without much material reward. But it is nonetheless required.

And it deserves appropriate respect. The third gift is a more understanding approach to the career civil servant. The word "bureaucrat" is an ugly one, indicating inefficiency, incompetence, and lack of loyalty to the basic governmental unit. There still are some who seek to protect their jobs even though this may be contrary to the best interests of the city. But their numbers are diminishing. And the number of alert, skilled young men and women, highly trained, who have dedicated themselves to the principle that a democratic government can be efficient, is steadily growing.

A fourth gift would be an alert citizenry, earnestly and unselfishly working for the good of their communities. Edmund Burke, the Irish philosopher, once said, ities. Edmund Burke, the Irish philosopher, once said, "All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is that good men do nothing." Some 24 centuries ago, Plato said, "The punishment of wise men who refuse to take part in of merchandise from Kresge's In court, Frank said that he the affairs of government is to live under the government of unwise men." 🛭

This fourth gift would be the most welcome of all. It would mean that badly needed reassessment programs could proceed without hysteria, so that a community could take much of the injustice out of present taxing programs. Many assessment practices in use today breed slums by making them financially profitale.

This gift would enable local governments to attack and overcome basic weaknesses in their structures such as inadequate water supplies, unsanitary sewerage and refuse systems, overloaded and uncoordinated traffic and transportation facilities, deteriorating residential and business areas. Dedicated people unselfishly backing their local governments have the power of accomplishment that few realize.

Gifts such as these, intangible and without price, would strengthen our nation's local governments and return to the givers a rich reward. And they would strengthen our rededication to the ideals of brotherly dise worth an additional \$138, love, good will, and peace among all men.

Christmas past in the Pointe was a time to cheer your neighbor, to hitch up the surrey and gallop over the hard frozen roads to deliver holiday greetings. The small band of residents grew closer together as the year ended and they celebrated the Yuletide in St. Paul's Church and the small frame and stone Protestant chapel on the lakeshore.

Most of the great summer families went to town to their mansions in Fort street and East Jefferson early in October for the social season which began then and lasted into the New Year. The great wooden castles along the lake were boarded up, surrounded by untracked wastes of gleaming snow. Inside the vacation homes furniture was covered with dust sheets and curtains drawn against the bright December sun. 


