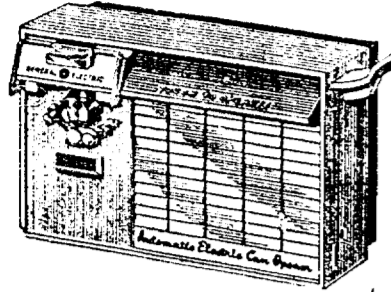

Police Holding Lost Cameras

Park police are in possession of two expensive cameras in a new leather case, found on Tuesday, December 13, behind bushes at Kercheval and Grayton.

Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers said that the case and cameras, with a light meter, apparently had been put there by someone who had stolen it. It is possible, he said, that if it had been stolen, the thief became frightened at the approach of a police car and hid the equipment behind the bushes to avoid detection.

The chief said that his department will check the serial numbers on the cameras and light meter, in an effort to find the owner.

No report has been received by police, he said, regarding any equipment of this kind being stolen. If anyone is missing these things, call Park police, Valley 2-7400, or visit the

The thief was frightened away in the Park homes, but his fourth visit netted him \$25, according to Chief Louwers.

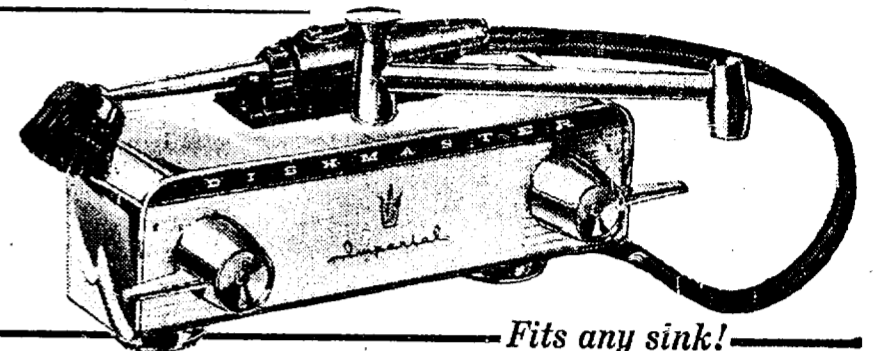

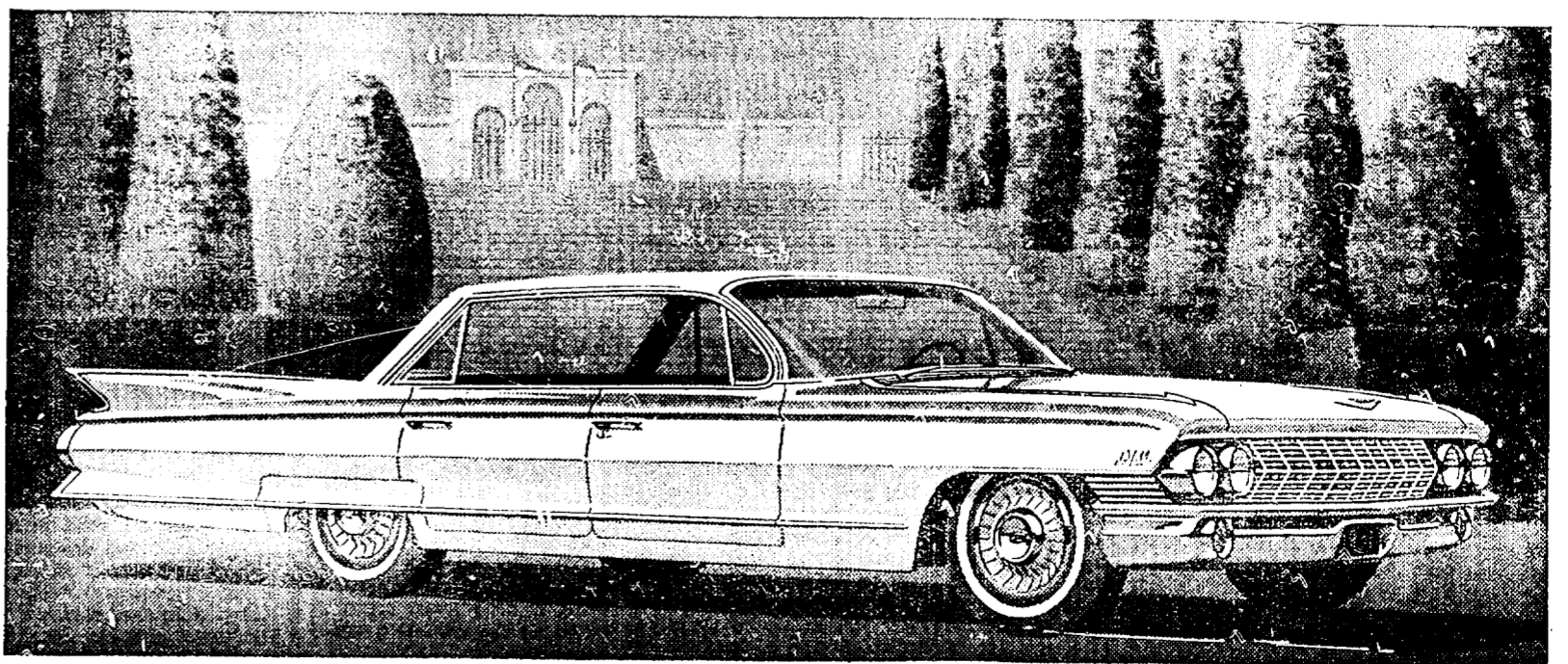

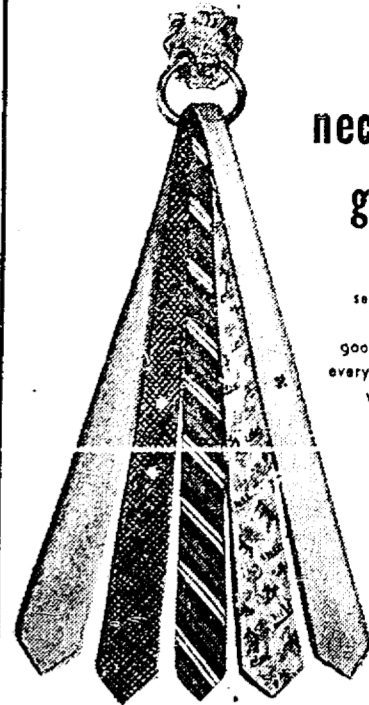
He drove off, followed by another man in a service truck who had been waiting at the curb.

Obscene Literature Parley Attracts Many To Lansing

A large delegation from the Detroit area attended a hearing on Thursday in Lansing, conducted by Representative Harry DeMaso of Battle Creek assisted by Representative Alexander Petri of Ecorse.

The hearing, which was the second in recent weeks, was conducted in the capitol building in an effort to determine what could be done to stem the ever-increasing flow of obscene material that is being displayed and sold in Michigan and also sent through the mails.

Mrs. Jacob F. Wenzel, founder and organizer of the Grosse Pointe Council of Better Literature for Youth, headed the local delegation and representatives were present from all over Michigan from schools, various police departments, youth organizations, and clergy as well as the distributors.

Some of the witnesses urged a state licensing law for magazine distributors which might prove effective and it was generally agreed by the legislative study committee, that stronger laws were needed to curb this vicious traffic, from which profits conservatively estimated at over \$500 million per year were derived.

His efforts over the past four decades have been to explain the operations of Parke-Davis and its policies to members of the medical profession and the public.
 As advertising director of the pharmaceutical firm, he launched the company on a unique institutional advertising campaign in national magazines in 1928, which is continuing. He took on the added responsibility of public relations in 1952, supervising preparation of both advertising copy and news material.
 Sickels will be honored at a dinner Tuesday, December 20, at the Detroit Yacht Club by fellow executives from Parke-Davis, and other friends.
 A native of Indianapolis, Sickels served as an instructor at Culver Military Academy following his graduation in 1914 from Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn. He was discharged from the army with the rank of captain after two years service during World War I, and joined a Boston advertising agency as a copywriter in 1919. He came to Parke-Davis in Detroit the following year.
 "The tools and techniques used in communicating with people have changed considerably over the years," Sickels commented. "My early assignments with the company were to prepare homey editorial pieces for pharmacists which contained a bit of product promotion, humor, recipes... something like the Farmer's Almanac, with a trace of salesmanship."
 That was in 1920 when he joined Parke-Davis as an assistant in the firm's editorial department.
 Sickels recalls that when the company began institutional advertising "in behalf of the physician and pharmacist" in 1928, it required an almost "continuous selling effort" to keep the program going.
 Evidence of his "selling" ability is the fact that the campaign has continued uninterrupted since its inception.
 Sickels has been responsible for preparation of more than 250 different advertisements which have appeared in approximately 75 national magazines during his service as advertising manager.
 In addition, he also supervised during his Parke-Davis service product advertising in medical journals, promotion, and the placement of company technical exhibits.
 In April, 1957, the national weekly magazine, Saturday Review, honored the company with an award for "distinguished advertising in the public interest." The theme for the campaign for which the award was given was, "prompt and proper medical care may well turn out to be one of the biggest bargains of your life."
 In June, 1957, the American Medical Association awarded Parke-Davis a citation for "the service it has performed to the public and the nation through its continuing series of institutional messages published in national magazines which accurately and dramatically tell the story of medicine and medical progress."
 Shortly after assuming his additional duties as public relations director, Sickels directed production of a 30-minute color motion picture. It highlights the history of Parke-Davis and the numerous operations involved in the manufacture of drug products. It has been viewed by more than 12 million people on television, in theaters, by students in classrooms and by professional groups.
 Although normal retirement age at Parke-Davis is 65, President Harry J. Loynd asked Sickels to remain on the job for three extra years.
 Sickels lives at 863 Grand Marais, Grosse Pointe, and says he has no definite plans for the future other than "to do some writing and try to improve my golf game."

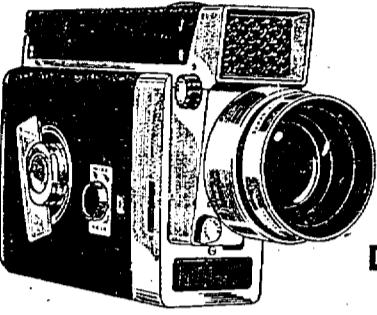

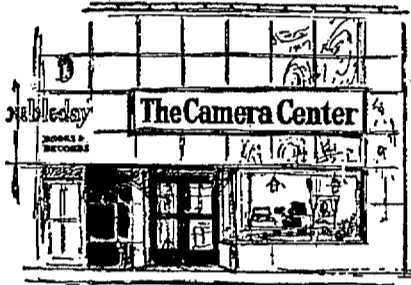

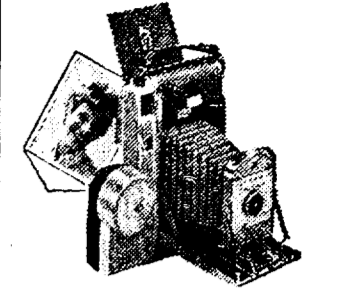

Real Christmas Gifts For Local Governments

In this season, when mankind strives to rededicate itself to the ideal of brotherly love, good will and peace among all men, we often exchange gifts as tokens of this spirit.

An experienced city administrator once said that he never accepts a gift that he cannot eat or drink in one sitting. Others, equally knowledgeable, have said that they accept no gifts at all that have monetary value and that they instruct their subordinates to follow the same example.

However, there are gifts that a people can bestow on their local governments that will be welcome and that will return to the giver the traditional sevenfold.

The first gift is the recognition that strong, independent local governments form a cornerstone in a free society such as ours. The stultifying iron hand of a police state cannot tolerate the existence of independent local government.

The second gift is a new, more realistic meaning, to the word "politician." A free people select their own leaders. They do this by vote, through the machinery of politics. Judged objectively, they select an able group of men to take charge of their affairs.

The third gift is a more understanding approach to the career civil servant. The word "bureaucrat" is an ugly one, indicating inefficiency, incompetence, and lack of loyalty to the basic governmental unit.

A fourth gift would be an alert citizenry, earnestly and unselfishly working for the good of their communities. Edmund Burke, the Irish philosopher, once said, "All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is that good men do nothing."

This fourth gift would be the most welcome of all. It would mean that badly needed reassessment programs could proceed without hysteria, so that a community could take much of the injustice out of present taxing programs.

This gift would enable local governments to attack and overcome basic weaknesses in their structures such as inadequate water supplies, unsanitary sewerage and refuse systems, overloaded and uncoordinated traffic and transportation facilities, deteriorating residential and business areas.

Gifts such as these, intangible and without price, would strengthen our nation's local governments and return to the givers a rich reward. And they would strengthen our rededication to the ideals of brotherly love, good will, and peace among all men.

Store Stockman Admits Thefts

Paul Robert Frank, 2202 Louis, Detroit, was found guilty in City Court December 15 of taking more than \$225 worth of merchandise from Kresge's on Kercheval, where Frank worked as a stockman.

City Judge Douglas L. Paterson fined Frank \$50 and placed him on six months probation for simple larceny and being a disorderly person. He was ordered to make restitution to Kresge's for \$35 worth of unrecovered goods.

Frank's illegal activities were discovered on December 5 when police officers saw him running across Mack avenue with a large box. When stopped, Frank admitted that the merchandise inside, worth \$51.99, had been stolen from Kresge's.

Police Captain Andrew Teevaert later searched Frank's home and found more merchandise worth an additional \$138, which also had been taken from

the store. Most of it was clothing, socks, stockings, shorts, shirts, etc., which Frank said was for his wife and children.

Championship Crew Which Raced at Henley Last Summer to be Feted at Big Party This Friday by Club Officers and Members

The Detroit Boat Club's Annual Oarsmen's Ball is always among the highlights of the Christmas Season. This year Boat Clubbers will kick off Christmas week festivities and honor their champion oarsmen with the traditional black tie affair on Friday, December 23.

The D.B.C. is one of Detroit's most venerable institutions. Organized back in 1839, it boasts, that it is the oldest continuously existing rowing club in the world and the oldest yacht club in the Great Lakes. It is most certainly one of this city's oldest and most distinguished social organizations.

As usual the scene of this gala dance and buffet dinner will be the beautiful main ballroom, where Boat Clubbers have gathered for such parties for nearly 60 years. The present Belle Isle Club House was built in 1902 and is the sixth in the club's history.

Originally the Oarsmen's Ball was held in the fall, but has been a Christmas time highlight for some twenty years. Mr. and Mrs. George Kuhn are chairmen for the ball working under the general supervision of the D.B.C. Naval Board, headed by Naval Board Captain Frank M. 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

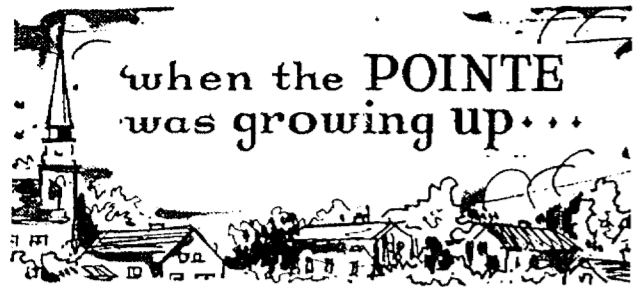

Christmas past in the Pointe was a time to cheer your neighbor, to hitch up the surrey and gallop over the hard frozen roads to deliver holiday greetings. The small band of residents grew closer together as the year ended and they celebrated the Yuletide in St. Paul's Church and the small frame and stone Protestant chapel on the lakeshore.

Most of the great summer families went to town to their mansions in Fort street and East Jefferson early in October for the social season which began then and lasted into the New Year. The great wooden castles along the lake were boarded up, surrounded by untracked wastes of gleaming snow. Inside the vacation homes furniture was covered with dust sheets and curtains drawn against the bright December sun. Occasionally a caretaker carrying his lantern and accompanied by his fierce watchdog checked the houses against marauders, but few penetrated that vast stillness until May, when with the first warm winds the families arrived on their summer pilgrimage.

But in the cabins and farm houses of the early French families Christmas was celebrated with great gusto. Early in December the head of the household took the interurban into town to the McMillan Bros. great grocery store and into his two gallon jug poured some special spirits to carry the revelers through the holiday. There was much Christmas calling, the families riding their buggies as far afield as Mack avenue, (then called the Clinton road) to visit friends.

All the roadhouses kept open house during the holiday welcoming guests around a filled Tom and Jerry bowl. Many Detroiters rode out from town to taste the hospitality at Aunt Kate Weaver's in Notre Dame, at Matt Kramer's in Edgemont park and at the Chauvin House. These gay hostesses served Christmas wild duck dinners; no frozen turkeys, then.

The landmark along the lake was the Edmund A. Brush home, where the family stayed during the holiday and received callers from town. By 1907 when gas lights were replaced by electricity and water mains were built, many of the summer families remained all year long for the skating, the ice boating and the horse races on the crisp shore.

In the two churches there were services especially for the children and midnight Mass was the highpoint of Christmas for the French settlers. After Mass great hearty breakfasts were served in the tradition of Cadillac's day and the real party spirit of the season began.

Those long ago Pointers had none of the amenities of our Christmas, no Christmas Street full of exciting shops, no merchants to deck their town, few comforts, but they kept the season with joyous hearts, in fellowship and reverence.

PILFERINGS YULE

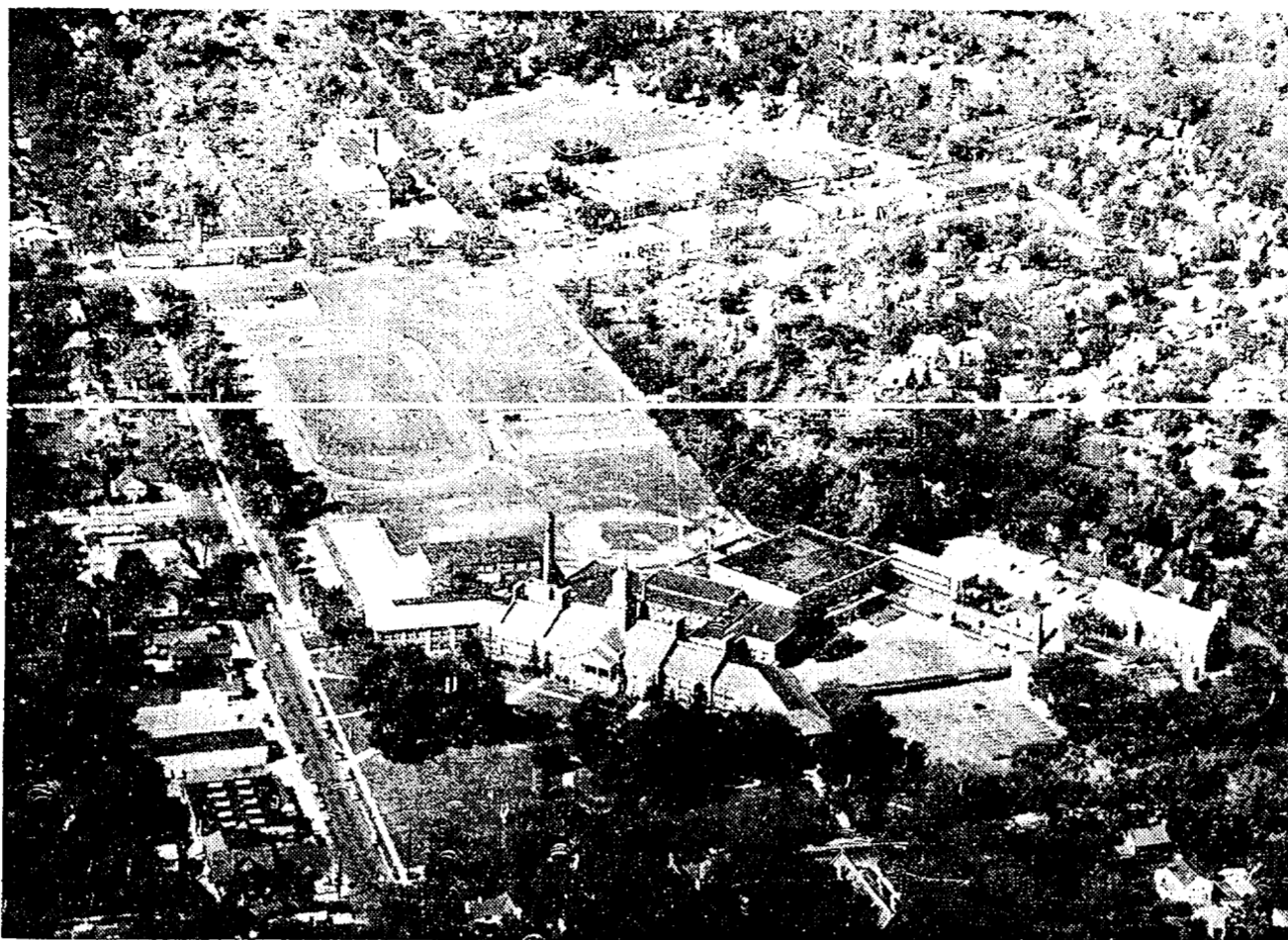
They piled on wood—the wind blew chill—

All Led By Pointers

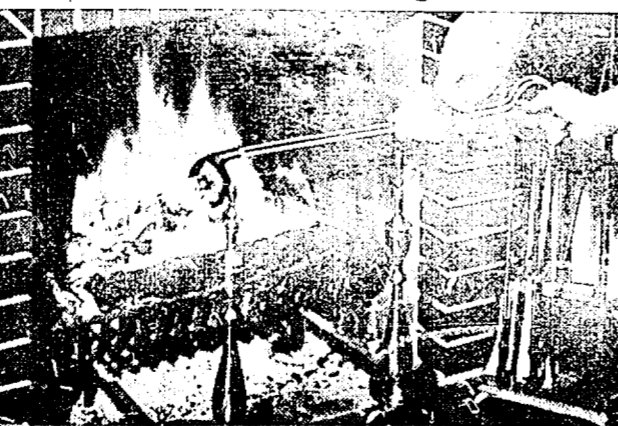
