What Goes On at Your Library

With Lent less than a week away, we call your attention to some tape recordings of a religious and inspirational nature, as well as some recent books suitable for Lenten reading.

A year or two ago, a series of weekly Lenten lectures was arranged by George McMullen, in which seven Grosse Pointe ministers were asked to speak on the history, organization and doctrines of their respective churches.

There are many recent books for the thoughtful reader to consider during the Lenten period, but space permits mention of only a few.

The Psalms are general favorites with Bible readers, and you will find many books in the library concerning these. "Reflections on the Psalms" by C. S. Lewis, published in 1958, is well worth reading.

"Son of Man, the Life of Christ" by Leslie A. Paul is not a conventional biography of Jesus of Nazareth, but a gripping one.

Mature young people who are beginning to think deeply for themselves about religious teachings which they have formerly accepted without question, will find Marchette Chute's "Jesus of Israel" an exciting

book which will readily capture their interest. Adults will enjoy it too, and will be strengthened in their conviction of Jesus as a historical and spiritual entity.

Questioning young people and older folk also will find food for thought in Marcus Bach's "Had You Been Born in Another Faith." This author of many books on religion writes of the ideals and symbols you would know, the traditions and customs you would practice, the commandments and rules of conduct by which you would live.

"Dear Mr. Brown" by Harry Emerson Fosdick is written in the form of Letters, and answers the questions of a hypothetical Mr. Brown, who inclines to the rejection of Christianity.

Catherine Marshall, author of "A Man Called Peter," has written a new and practical book "Beyond Ourselves."

"The Religious Factor" — a sociological study of religion's impact on politics, economics and family life, is written by Gerhard E. Lenski, a University of Michigan sociologist.

Fulton Sheen's recent publication "Go to Heaven," in which he examines the confused condition of modern man and discusses the several steps which lead to Heaven, will be of special interest to Catholic readers.

On the subject of Christ's Passion, Dom Hubert Van Zeller has written an outstanding book "Approach to Calvary". This is written from a Catholic viewpoint, but may be read with profit by others as well.

Alva Gay, Shakespearean scholar of Wayne State University, class members will study and discuss Macbeth, The Tempest, The Taming of the Shrew, and Rostand's Cyrano de Bergerac of all which will be presented at Stratford this Summer.

Spring cleaning can be a joy if you keep the Neighborhood Thrift Shop March clothing drive in mind. Every bag and bundle of clothing, and household items will be resold to support the Neighborhood Club Day camp which provides a joyful summer for over 200 boys and girls. Not only do your contributions provide the joy but it's all tax deductible.

Miss Pauline Masak, Camp Director, is assisted by a staff of 12 senior counselors and eight volunteer junior counselors. Each year, the camp staff chooses a travel theme and all activities center around an imaginary trip.

This year, campers will be learning all about Michigan from thumb to wrist to tip. The camping agenda also includes Nature Study, Drama, Music Appreciation, Folk Dancing and Art.

Six to eleven is the eligible age for campers but the smaller fry from 3 through 5 can enroll in the Summer Play group.

All through the year, the Neighborhood Club provides recreational and educational activities for adults as well as children.

In the sports field there are four basketball leagues, a senior girls group of volleyball and basketball, Little League, Babe Ruth and Senior Softball leagues in baseball plus tennis instruction and competition.

Classes are offered in enameling, photography and chess. For seniors there is an Old Timers Club and a knitting group.

The Neighborhood Club pro-

vides headquarters for meetings, elections, public hearings and court trials. In addition, the club acts as liaison for social welfare problems.

Support for the club comes from three sources, Community Fund, Thrift Shop and individual dues.

Newcomers and visitors to the Pointe often express surprise that the community reaches so far back into the nation's history. Before Pittsburgh and Chicago were little more than frontier outposts Detroit was a thriving city and the Pointe was an established village.

The real growth of the Pointe as a residential area began with the railroad. For it was railroad money which made the Pointe the Newport of the mid-west.

Newberry, McMillan, Russel, Muir, Hendrie, Lothrop, Ledyard . . . all these aristocratic families owed their fortunes to the network of train transportation which was opening the state in the days following the Civil War. Along with Vanderbilts, Harrimans and Goulds they were establishing dynasties.

George Hendrie, the founder of that family, was a Scotsman and early in his career joined forces with William K. Muir who came to Detroit from Hamilton, Ont., where he was instrumental in establishing the eastern division of the Grand Trunk. When James McMillan and Muir brought the line to Detroit they gave the trucking monopoly for the railroads to George Hendrie.

This meant that every apple, orange, load of lumber and nails which came into burgeoning Detroit had to be carted by a Hendrie truck. Hendrie eventually broadened his interests in railroading. He became involved with horse drawn street omnibuses, the Detroit Street Railway which was to cause so much political controversy when Hazen Pingree was mayor and governor. Hendrie loved horses and believed in them. When the street railways gave up horses for more efficient electric power he abandoned the cars.

Hendrie's first wife was Christina Muir, which allied his family through marriage as well as business to the Muir clan. After her death he married Sarah Sibley Trowbridge, daughter of Charles Trowbridge, former mayor of Detroit, and descendant of two famous Detroit founding families. The couple had eight children, who grew up in the Pointe summer home Hendrie built on land near St. Paul's Church which he bought from the Morans.

Every summer the Hendries drove to the Pointe in a handsome coach and four. They owned many other thoroughbred horses on the farm which Hendrie bought in Pontiac.

George Hendrie's hand was in various municipal pies. He was involved in the development of Belle Isle, when the former Hog Island became a city park. With William G. Moran he reclaimed the Grand Marais swamp at the edge of Grosse Pointe building the subdivision of Windmill Pointe.

His son, Strathearn, married a Moran, was a hero of the Spanish American War, sailed as a member of the "millionaires' crew" aboard the Yosemite with Truman Newberry, Edwin Denby, Henry B. Joy and D. B. Duffield.

The Hendries no longer live on the lakeshore but there are many Hendries in the Pointe today, the founder having established a family which is now in its fourth generation and in small danger of diminishing in the fifth generation.

Whenever she can tear herself away from the ski slopes or the golf course, Mrs. Edward F. Wunsch sits down at the typewriter. Since school days she has been writing stories. In April she will proudly autograph copies of her first book, "Flying Skis", a novel for juveniles which exhibits her skill as a skier and her talent as a writer.

Mother of three teen agers, she decided a book for the young set would be easier. "I'm not ready for an adult book, yet," she says confidently. "Flying Skis" represents her knowledge of the sport as well as her creative ability as a story teller. "Publishers are so particular," she insists, having rewritten the book twice and now is in the midst of correcting proofs.

The whole Wunsch family adore skiing. They were named "Skiers of the Week" in Aspen, Colo., some seasons ago for navigating two of the more perilous mountains without an accident. Daughter Betsy, an honor student at Grosse Pointe High, and her brother, Eddie, Jr., recently won awards in a local ski contest at Holly. Kay Wunsch, the eldest, a co-ed at her mother's alma mater the U. of M., is currently absorbed in her flute studies, but she too is a skier. Jack accompanied the U. of M. orchestra on a tour of Russia last year and her diaries of the trip will be the basis of Mrs. Wunsch's next book, already one quarter done.

Fights for Time

The novelist writes in her sprawling gray stucco home in McKinley place, where an upstairs room, in a chronic state of writer's confusion, serves as her study. A full time mother, housewife, athlete and volunteer worker, she has the usual difficulty in finding time to write, she sighs.

Mr. Wunsch began writing at Liggett, continued at the U. of

M., where she was women's editor of the Daily, and then did publicity work in New York. She has written special features for both of Detroit's daily newspapers, was gadget editor of the Free Press, wrote fashion copy for a Detroit store. She has sold several short stories and non-fiction articles since becoming a housewife and mother.

Top Notch Volunteer

In spite of proofs and telegrams from her publisher this month she is heavily involved in raising funds for the new Liggett School, for Collegiate Sorosis at the U. of M., does volunteer work for Christ Church and Tau Beta, belongs to the Junior League and the Lawyers Wives of Michigan.

"I like suburban life, even though I have to fight for time to write. The only time I really enjoy housework is when I know I should be writing." Like most writers she finds her work hard and lonely and settling down to uninterrupted hours at the typewriter is a real chore.



APRICOT SOUFFLE
 Contributed By Mrs. Frank Wilton
 1 1/4 cup dried apricots
 1/8 tsp. almond
 4 egg whites
 1/8 tsp. cream of tartar
 dash of salt
 1/4 cup sugar
 1 cup whipping cream
 1 Tb. confectioner's sugar
 1/8 tsp. almond
 3/4 cup apricots covered in 1 1/4 cups of water, for 30 minutes. Sieve or use blender to make puree and add almond extract. Butter 1 1/2 quart casserole and sprinkle a little granulated sugar over the bottom. Beat egg whites (at room temperature) until foamy, add cream of tartar and salt and beat to soft peak stage. Add 1/4 cup sugar one tablespoon at a time, beating after each addition until mixture forms stiff peaks. Gently fold in puree. Pour into casserole, set in pan containing hot water and bake 40 minutes at 325 degrees. Serve with sweetened, flavored whipped cream and hot brandy sauce. Serves 8.
HOT BRANDY SAUCE
 1/2 cup soft butter or margarine
 1 cup sifted confectioner's sugar
 1 egg beaten
 2 to 3 Tb. brandy
 Beat butter until creamy and add sugar gradually. Continue beating at medium speed of electric beater until light and fluffy. Beat in the egg. Add brandy and heat sauce in a double boiler. Serve at once.
