Eight candidates will battle it out at the polls for the three council seats which must be filled.

One of them is said to have neglected to register to vote for more than two years after he moved into the Woods in 1958, and then for the sole purpose of casting a ballot in the 1960 Presidential Election. The alleged record of the second candidate is even worse. He is said to have moved into the Woods nine years ago and never registered until it was necessary before he could file his nominating petition to seek election next Monday. It is claimed that he has never voted for a single person now holding office in the Woods, and didn't even bother to qualify to vote in the Presidential Election.
