Park streets, and some of them were driven away by a few of the 12-year-old boys, the chief said. Some cars were only broken into and items stolen, the chief added.

The boys, all close friends or acquaintances, confessed to stealing the cars for joyrides over a long period of time.

Boys Given Numbers
"During the investigation," Chief Louwers said, "it reached a point where we stopped calling the boys by their names, and used numbers we gave them. Different boys were involved in different thefts. So, rather than call 'John Doe,' 'Joe Smith' and 'Bob Jones' for questioning on a particular theft, we just called out numbers, such as, 'Two,' 'Five' and 'Six,' and so on.

"Lt. Hough and Officer LaPratt worked on the case for hours, almost without rest. They performed an excellent bit of police work, and are to be commended," the chief said.

The chief said that he will petition the Juvenile Court to hold the hearings in the Park Municipal Building because of the large number of boys involved.

The boys were released to Detroit police for further investigation, Chief Louwers said.

Juvenile Car Thieves Caught

Two juveniles picked up for stealing a car on Monday, April 16, have been turned over to Detroit authorities.

The boys, both 15, were apprehended shortly before noon when they drove the stolen '56 Chevrolet station wagon up over a curb at Lakeland and Jefferson. Neither had a receipt of registration or driver's license on his person.

Taken to the City police station, they refused to talk. Investigation revealed that the car, belonging to Vincent Paradiso, 20791 Beaufait, Harper Woods, had been stolen from in front of Jim Causley Pontiac, Mack at University.

Detroit police were notified of the vehicle's apprehension and the two arrests, and the station wagon was towed to the rear of the station, from which Paradiso recovered it at 5 p.m.

As the theft occurred in the City of Detroit, the boys have been placed under Detroit authorities' jurisdiction.

Commissioned by Wilson Vincent received his colonelcy in the Army Reserves from President Wilson at the conclusion of World War I. His hobbies included flying and golf. He continued to fly his own plane until shortly after World War II.

Col. Vincent's accomplishments were made despite the lack of formal education. He left school in the eighth grade in his boyhood home of Pana, Ill. He was president of both the Society of Automotive Engineers in 1920 and of Automobile Club of Michigan in 1948-49. He has been an Auto Club director from 1921 to the time of his death, an AAA National director and was a member of the AAA National Contest Board.

He is survived by his wife Rachel, a brother Charles H. Vincent of Mesa, Ariz. and sisters Mrs. Forrest Williams of McAllen, Tex. and Mrs. Henry Hoehn of Witt, Ill.

He disclosed that the initial bicycle inspection was sponsored

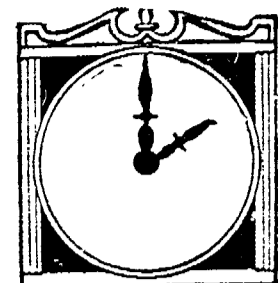

tinued the program as an annual event, and gradually the other Points and Harper Woods participated, making this a joint venture.

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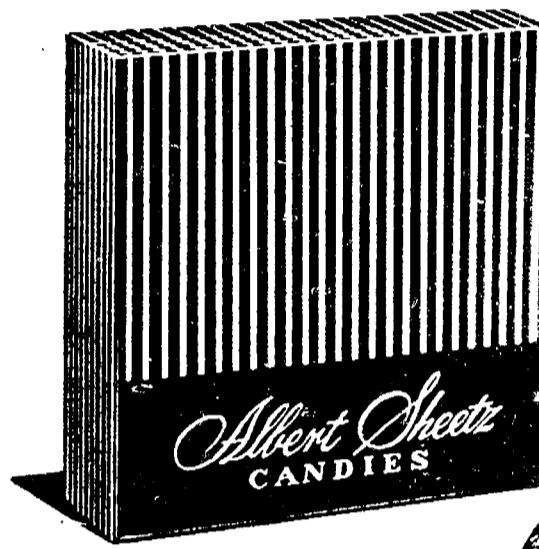

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Thief Breaks Into Three Woods Homes; Loots Two

Three neighboring homes in the Woods were forcibly entered and ransacked Saturday evening, April 14, with two of the homes looted by a burglar. Nothing appeared to be missing in the third home.

Entered were the homes of M. D. Conway, 2025 Van Antwerp; Mr. and Mrs. James Murphy, 2001 Van Antwerp; and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph G. Nelson of 2009 Van Antwerp. Looted were the Murphy and Nelson residences, according to information given to police.

In each case, the burglaries were committed while the residents were absent from their homes for only a few hours, it was disclosed by Det. Sgt. Walter O'Dell and Det. Leroy Tobian.

The first report of a breaking and entering was received from Conway, who reported that on returning home, he discovered that the rear door of the house had been pried open, with what appeared to be a screwdriver. The window of the storm door had been broken. It was later established that the thief had used a screwdriver taken from the garage on the property.

Conway said that he checked his house and found that the thief had opened a bedroom dresser drawer, but nothing seemed to have been taken.

He told police that he and his daughter had been absent from the house from 6 p.m. to 11 p.m.

The Murphy residence was entered through the rear porch door by the burglar, who broke the door glass and reached in to unlock the door.

Murphy told Patrolmen Gaylord Golding and George Kasper, that he and his wife left home at 8:30 p.m. Saturday and returned at about 2:30 a. m. Sunday.

The home owner told the officers that all the dresser and bureau drawers in the house had been ransacked. Missing, he said, were a 1923 silver dollar, several 1961 ten quarters and dimes, and assorted currency, with a total loss amounting to about \$85.

In their report, Golding and Kasper stated that they discovered the breaking and entering of the Murphy residence, after Patrolmen Everett Plumb and Thomas Kane were called to the Nelson home, to get information of the burglary there. Golding and Kasper were checking the area, after being dispatched by radio, along with the other officers.

The Nelsons lost a portable television set, value not known; a \$35 lady's wrist watch, belonging to Mrs. Nelson; and \$25 in currency.

Entrance into the residence was gained by breaking the window of the side door and reaching in and unlocking the door. The broken door window was discovered by the Nelsons when they returned home.

Nelson told the officers that he and his wife left the house at 9:20 p. m. Saturday, and returned at 12:45 a. m. Sunday.

He said that shortly before leaving home, he saw a man walking rapidly on the sidewalk near his house, then stop and look into the window of the house.

Nelson described the man as being between 35 and 40 years old, five feet nine inches tall, heavy build, with a pug nose and bushy hair, no hat and wearing a top coat.

O'Dell and Tobian said that because of the close proximity of the crimes, it is without doubt that all three breakings and enterings were committed by the same man.

Shift Personnel At City's Beach

The functions of gateman and watchman at Neff Memorial Park will be handled this year by a private protection agency, whose employees are drawn from the ranks of retired Detroit policemen.

In past years, the City has hired two persons to handle the gate and night watchman functions, and there has been a loss in coverage at meal times and in the morning due to a time lapse between the gateman's arrival and the watchman's departure. Life-guard personnel and park attendants have had to be pulled from their regular jobs to fill in when necessary and, according to City Manager Lawrence C. Savage, public relations have suffered because the gate was attended by a young person clothed only in a bathing suit.

The private agency protection is also more economical. Complete coverage will be provided at \$1.50 per hour, as compared to last year's gateman cost of \$1.85 per hour.

Flexibility is also a feature in the City's hiring of the private agency. Personnel and coverage will be controlled so that coverage is had only when necessary or desirable.

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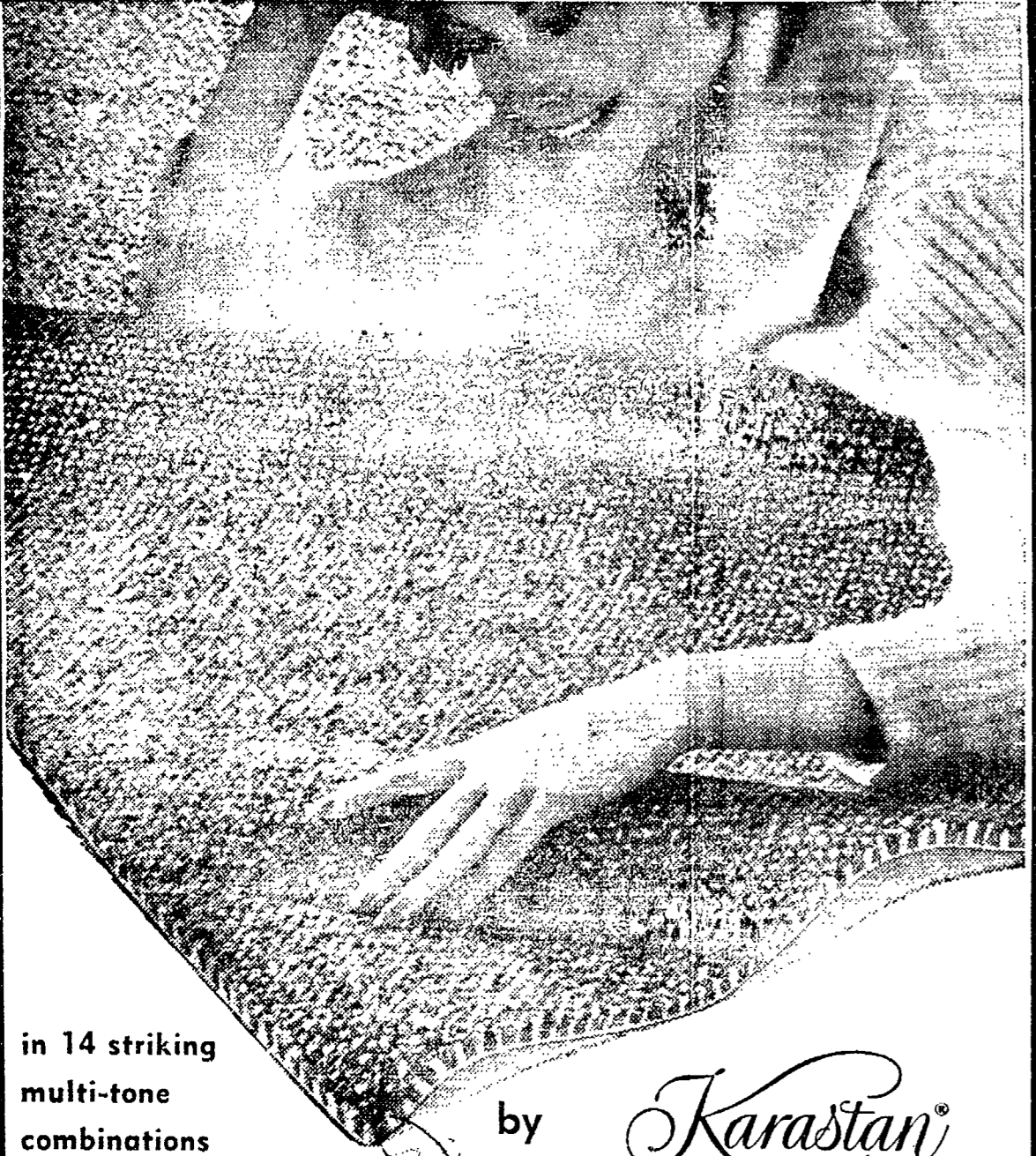
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Methodists Plan To Banish Debt

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Shores Warns Dog Owners

Shores Chief Fred Duemling issued a warning to Village dog owners that according to the Village Dog Ordinance, 1962 licenses for the pets are due on May 1.

Beginning Tuesday, the chief said, officers of his department will canvass the Village to determine which homes have dogs, and owners will be reminded of their obligations to purchase tags for their pets.

Owners will be given a period of time to comply with the law. However, after three warnings, if an owner has not yet bought a tag, he will be cited to appear in court and will be subject to a fine.

Persons permitting their pets to run loose, in violation of the ordinance, will also be subject to fines, the chief said. The first and second citations will mean a two-dollar fine, the third ticket, a fine of \$5, he pointed out. After that, violators will be taken to court.

To obtain a license for dogs, owners must present proof that the animal has been vaccinated. Licenses may be obtained at the police station, 795 Lake Shore road. The fee is \$3, regardless of the animal's sex.

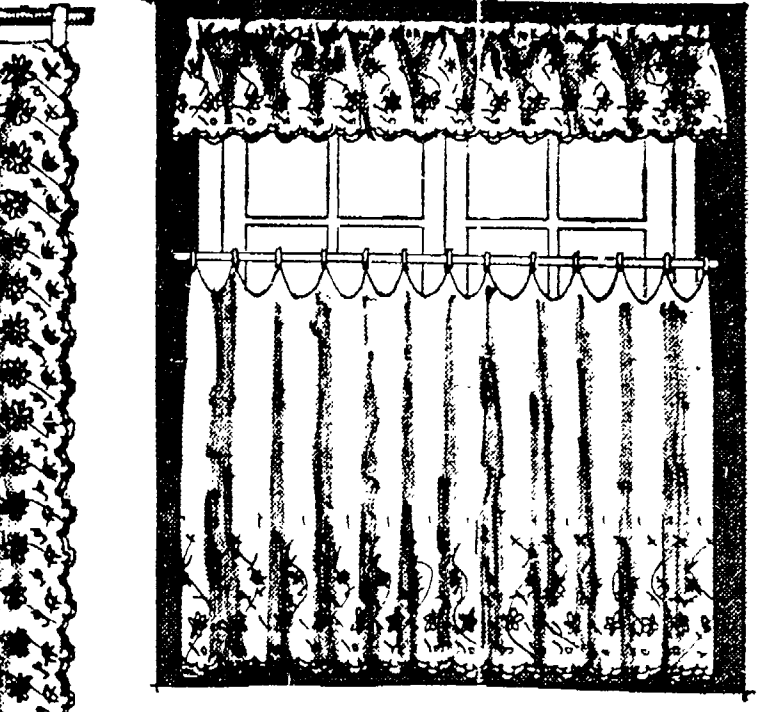
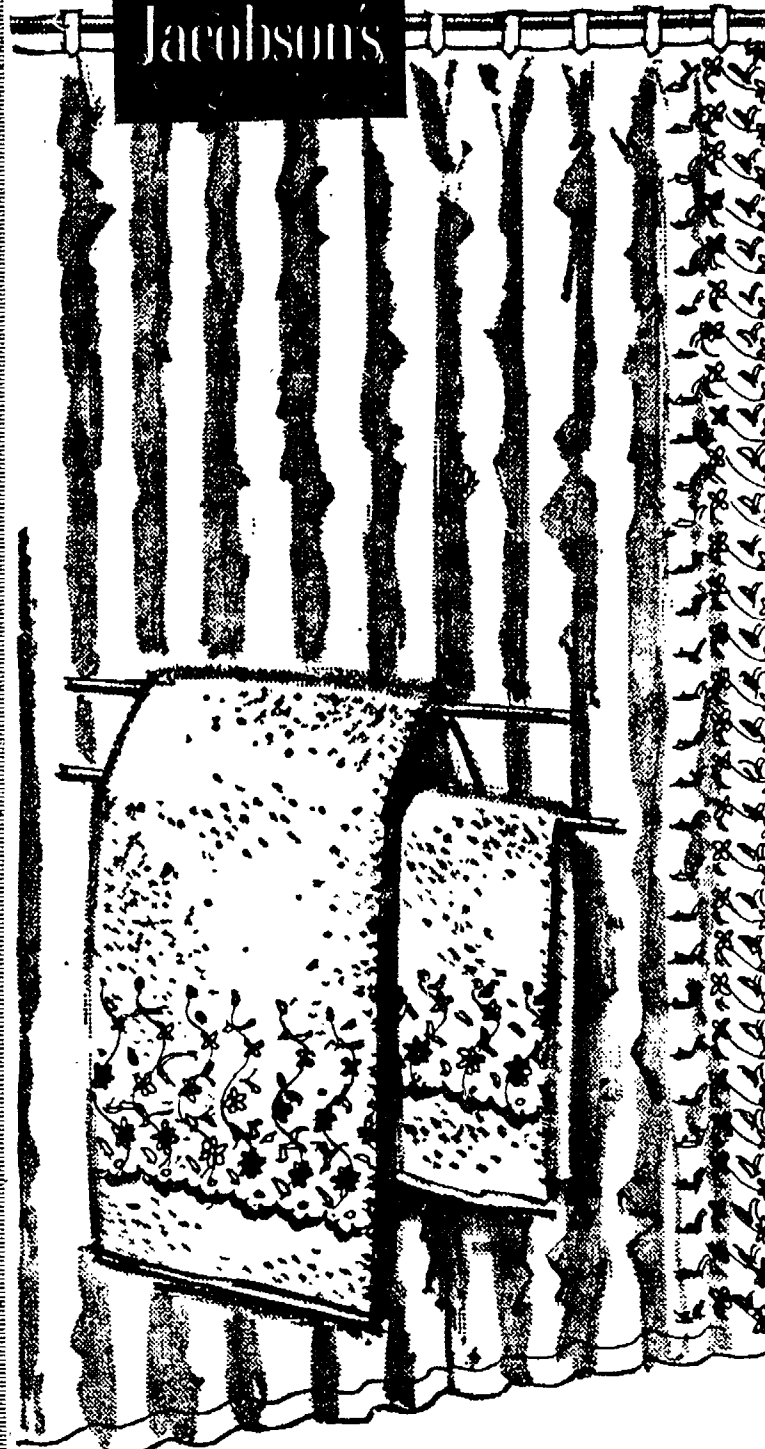

Forum Showing Powerful Film

Man has the power to build and the power to destroy, and a motion picture, "Power Among Men," which asks how man will choose in the future between those forces will be shown free to Grosse Pointers at the Central Library at 9:15 p.m. Friday, April 27.

This powerful film, produced for the United Nations by Thorold Dickinson and J. C. Sheers, is the final feature program of this season of the Friends Film Forum, sponsored jointly by the Grosse Pointe Public Library and the Friends of the Library.

Commentary for "Power Among Men" is by Lawrence Harvey, star of "Room at the Top," while music for the 90-minute film was composed and conducted by members of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra.

"Power Among Men" is the first feature-length film dealing with the ideas and purposes of the United Nations. It shows man's awesome powers — to build or destroy. It shows how men rebuilt a war-torn village in Italy, how technical assistance in modern farming methods helped rebuild Haiti, where waste and decay had proved as destructive as war to farmers of a small town.


The film also takes viewers to British Columbia where men and women from 31 countries carved a new town out of the wilderness. Tensions erupt between nationalities, but are eased as national customs and prejudices are melted away through establishment of common objectives.

Viewers then enter a nuclear energy plant in Norway, where a supreme tool for advancement is realized. But within this knowledge lies a greater power, for total destruction. The bomb. The film demonstrates that "only the dead can afford not to care."

"It is the most important film of the decade," said the Saturday Review. "It is a film not only to watch for, but to demand . . . that no one can afford to miss."

"The film is dedicated to the proposition that science is but the tool of man," said McCalls, "and man alone is responsible for his own survival—a superb film."

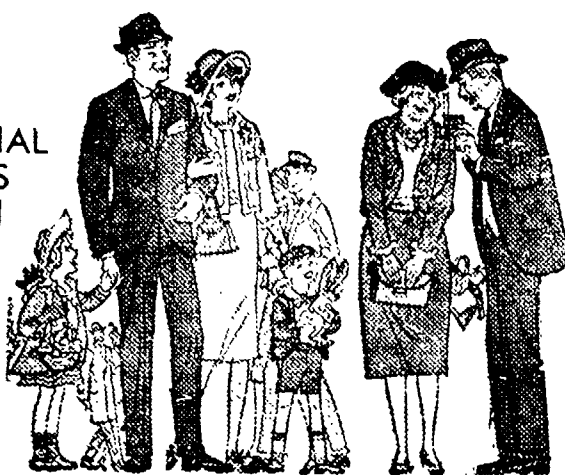

Announcement of the time and place, May 19, at the Sheraton-Cadillac Hotel, was made Tuesday by Women's Division President and Ball Chairman Mrs. Roy A. Fruehauf at a press luncheon at the Pfeiffer Brewing Company, 3740 Bellevue. Alfred Epstein was host.

Measured in dollars, the 1961 Carousel Ball was a sure-fire success. It provided \$65,000, geared to earn health and happiness for many of Michigan's disturbed youth.

Of these monies, \$47,000 have already been disbursed in direct grants to institutions for program enrichment materials; as placement scholarship grants and a memorial placement scholarship; for a day school demonstration project, sponsored by Merrill-Palmer Institute and the Children's Center of Metropolitan Detroit; for public information and education through grants to the state association, MAEDC. Alan L. Gornick is president of the Greater Detroit Chapter-MAEDC.

Such disbursement of funds adds up to the fact that 15 children who might not have been helped otherwise are now closer to recovery.

It means, too, that many others in state hospitals, residential homes for disturbed youth, Juvenile Courts in both Wayne and Oakland Counties, plus several centers were provided with materials necessary for hopeful and progressive treatment.

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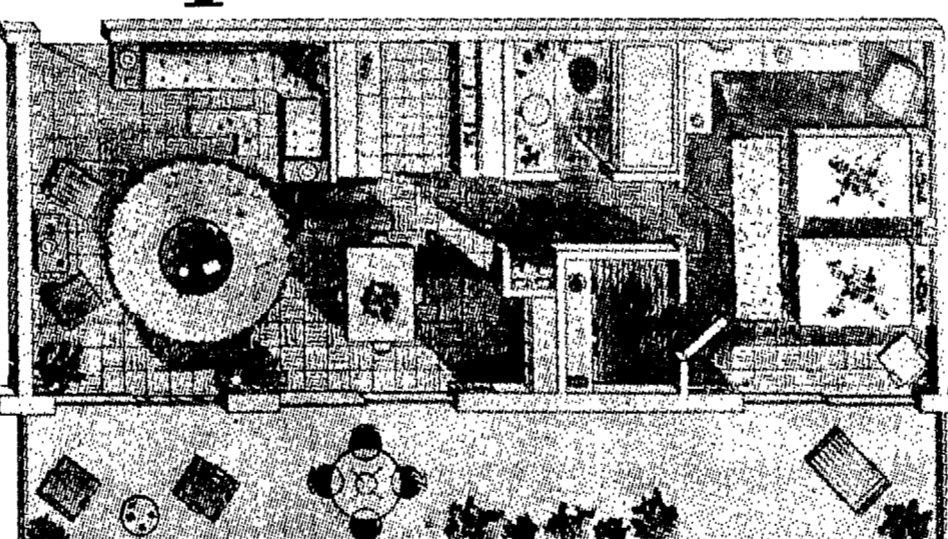
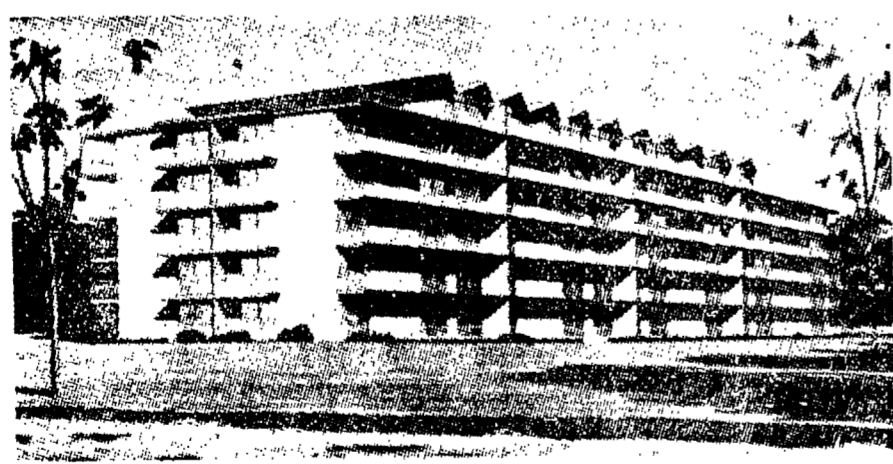
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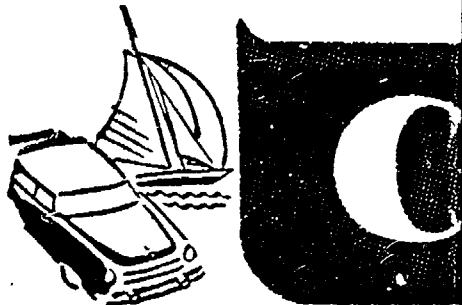

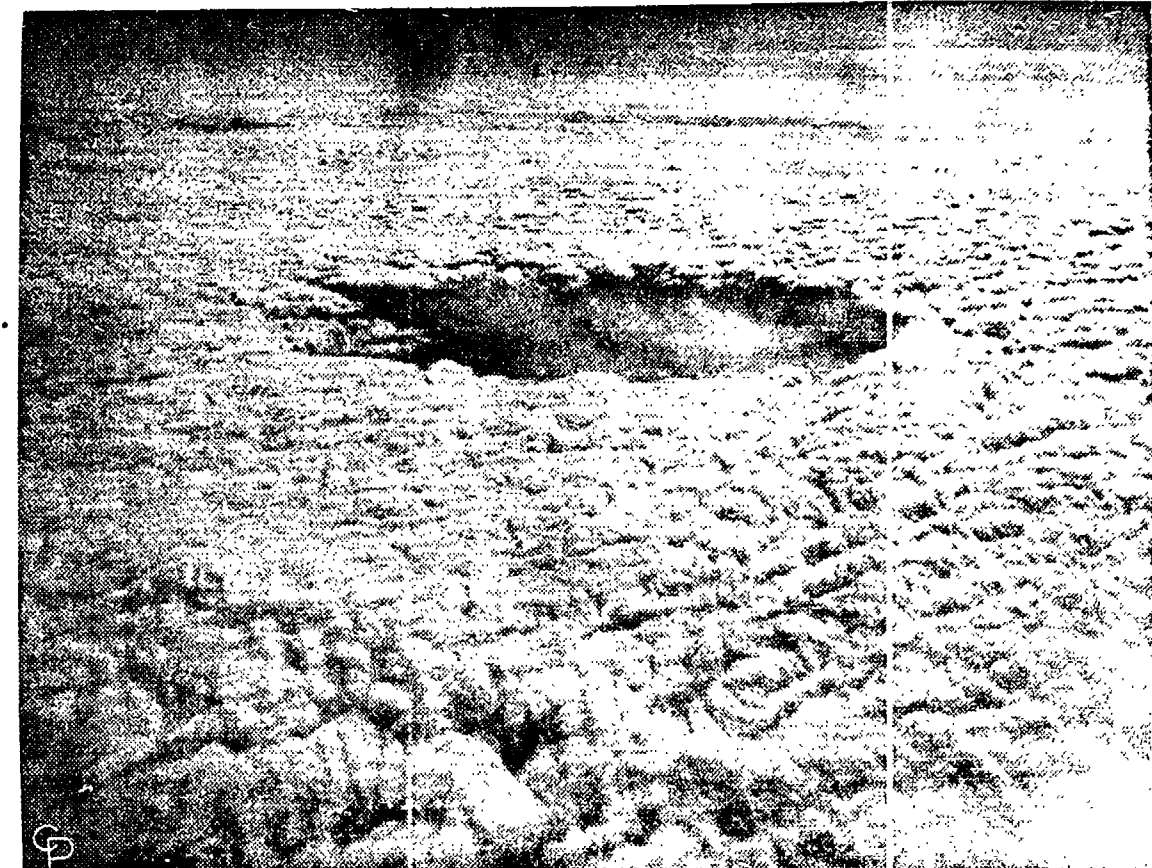
