



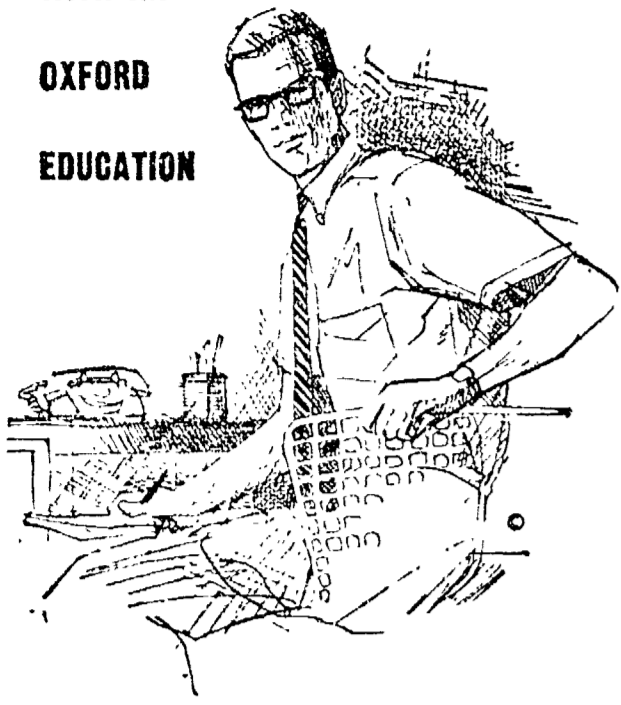

Start New Nursery. These will be ready by May 31.

He said that 500 tons of sand have been spread along the beach. The park will have 12 extra picnic tables and three portable picnic stoves. The latter were purchased to supplement the present permanent grills used by large groups of picnickers.

Two new boat hoists have been installed and have been in operation since Tuesday, May 15, the opening date of the boat launching season.

Old Pilings Replaced

Ten rotted wood pilings have been replaced with steel pilings, and three Silver Linden trees were planted around the lot area.

After June 1, the sidewalk behind the bathing beach will be replaced; the diving and swimming area is in excellent condition.

In the City's Norbert P. Neff Memorial Park, it looks as though the new swimming pool will be ready by the opening day, May 30, according to City Manager Lawrence Savage. He also disclosed that the City is outfitting several more boat wells.

Also to be completed by opening date will be the new bathroom and the renovation of the kiddies' wading pool.

Shores Village Superintendent Thomas Jefferis said that the Village Lakefront park beach has been laid with sand reclaimed out of the harbor. There is a special problem in that the sand is constantly washed away by waves, he said. This area cannot hold sand, he added.

To Have 80 Boat Wells

Six new boat wells for large boats are under construction and should be ready soon. This will make 80 wells in the park, Jefferis said.

A parking lot and tennis courts are located at the south side of the park, and are ready for use. The swimming area is okay and will be roped off. There is about a foot and a half less water in the lake this year than last, he pointed out.

He also disclosed that for the benefit of boat owners, weather instruments, to check wind speed, and a direction indicator and barometer will soon be installed.

At the Woods lakefront park, the areas around the bathroom, gate entrance and pumping station have been landscaped, information released by Don Hallman, recreational director, disclosed.

GIVE IT A HAND

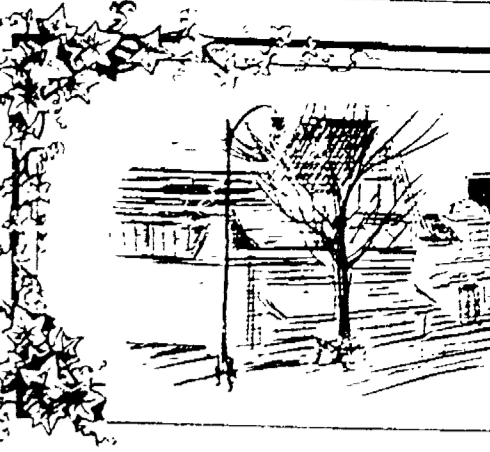

In the 1962-63 budget, the Water Revenue is included in Miscellaneous Revenue, according to City Comptroller Nunzio Ortisi.

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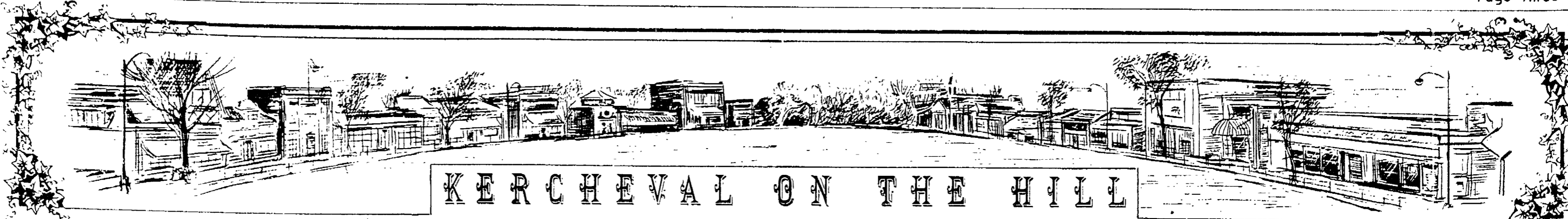

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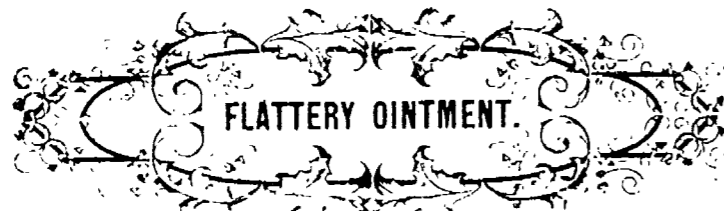


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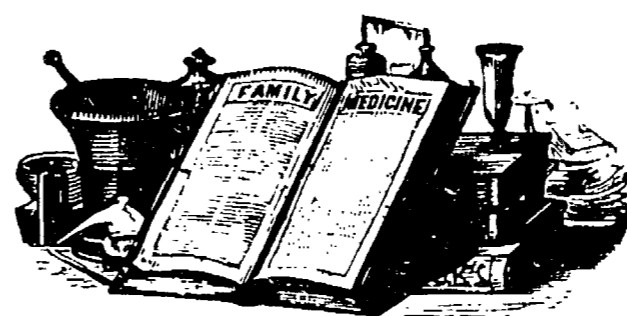


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### 14th District Republicans Rocked By Party Squabble

Republican headquarters in the 14th District have been shaken this past week by an inter-party storm which involves two of the candidates for lieutenant governor in the August 7 primary.

State Senator John H. Stahlin has called for a state investigation of the attempts of certain extremist charge.

State Rep. Robert E. Waldron, also a Pointer, has come to Durant's defense, telling Stahlin to "stop interfering with party affairs in Wayne County."

Waldron, who was defeated for the Congressional seat held by the late Louis A. Rabaut and won by Democrat Harold Ryan in a recent special election, repudiated connection with Durant and the John Birch Society, right wing extremist group, during the campaign.

Durant admits his membership in the Birch Society. Waldron, at the same time he chastised Stahlin, announced Saturday that he would challenge Durant to a fight for the delegate post in Grosse Pointe's 2nd Precinct, now held by the vice chairman of the 14th District Republican Organization.

In the background of this inter-party squabble is Rockwell T. Gust, one of Stahlin's two rivals for the lieutenant governor's nomination. The other candidate is former Lt. Gov. Clarence A. Reid, of Detroit.

Waldron has charged that Stahlin's request for an inquiry by Michigan's Fair Campaign Practices Commission was "politically inspired" to embarrass Gust, who lives at 55 Muskoka road.

Stahlin, who has been identified with the "moderates" in the State Senate, has charged Durant as "the acknowledged leader" of right wing groups using racial and religious appeals to expand their control.

Although Stahlin reserved most of his charges for Durant he said Gust's "consistent refusal to disavow support" from extremist elements "cast serious doubt on the integrity of his candidacy."

Durant retorted that Stahlin "must be having a nervous breakdown."

"The senator is trying to smear his opponents when Gust has nothing to do with this situation," explains Waldron. Waldron, also a conservative, supports Gust, his former University of Michigan law school classmate, as his choice for the lieutenant governor candidate.

### Brownell School Concert Friday

Two choral groups consisting of students of advanced singing ability have been meeting regularly before school each morning to polish several numbers for this evening performance. The Girls' Ensemble, in its own inimitable style, will sing Hi Lili Hi Lo, and My Own America, accompanied by Alex Davlantes. The recently organized Boys' Ensemble has prepared the tuneful Oh Vreneli and A Capitol Ship, to Nancy McDougall's accompaniment.

### Petition Park To Buy Lots

A petition bearing the signatures of 162 persons, owning 135 pieces of residential property, was received by the Park council on Monday, May 14. The petition asks the city to purchase seven vacant lots in the proposed Civic Center Area opposite the Municipal Building, 15115 East Jefferson.

The purpose of the petition is to have the city buy the lots and retain them for the proposed Civic Center, thereby preventing them from being zoned for commercial use.

The interested residents also stated that they were in mutual agreement to contribute a fund to help the Park to fight a court action by one of the lot owners who is seeking to lease his land to a gasoline firm for the construction of a gas station.

They said they were willing to contribute a reasonable pro rata amount, not to exceed \$10, for the possible retention of counsel and costs of intervention as "amicus curiae" in the suit entitled "Edgar Brandau et al. vs. City of Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan, Wayne County Circuit Court, Chancery No. 619-553" now pending in court.

Brandau is the owner of the lot on which the gas station site is proposed.

The residents live in the 900 blocks of Pemberton, Lakepointe and Westchester.

Mayor Kenneth Cunningham informed the residents that the Park Planning Commission has been studying the matter for some time, and will make recommendations soon.

He also pointed out that legal action was started against the city when an ordinance was enacted to prevent construction of gas stations on any of the vacant lots.

## Park Residents Protest Church Expansion Plans

The Park council on Monday, May 14, approved the vacation of a public alley at Mack and Audubon, clearing the way for the construction of a gymnasium and the enlarging of a parking lot by St. Clare of Montefalco in Mack avenue, between Whittier and Audubon.

Part of the gymnasium building will extend in the vacated alley, which, according to city officials, is no longer in use. The alley, 100 feet south of Mack and west of Audubon, is only used by the Verbrugge Hardware for deliveries at the rear of the store.

The store building was recently purchased by the church and will be vacated by June 1, after which it will be torn down to make way from the proposed gym and lot expansion.

The residents were not swayed by representatives of the church who stated that a green buffer strip and a four-foot brick wall will be installed to separate the lot from the nearest residential property.

City Attorney Pierree Heftler interpreted a city ordinance which stipulated that a parking space must be provided in proportion to seating capacity for each 10 persons.

The residents voiced their protests for more than an hour, after which they were informed by the city attorney, that according to a city zoning ordinance, a church can construct or expand a parking lot as needed, without a permit from the city.

The people expressed surprise, and as one resident put it, "objections voiced were in vain."

The residents were informed that they can take legal action in an effort to prevent the church from carrying out its plans. For the moment, the people are undecided as to what course to follow, stating that they will have to meet and determine their next step.

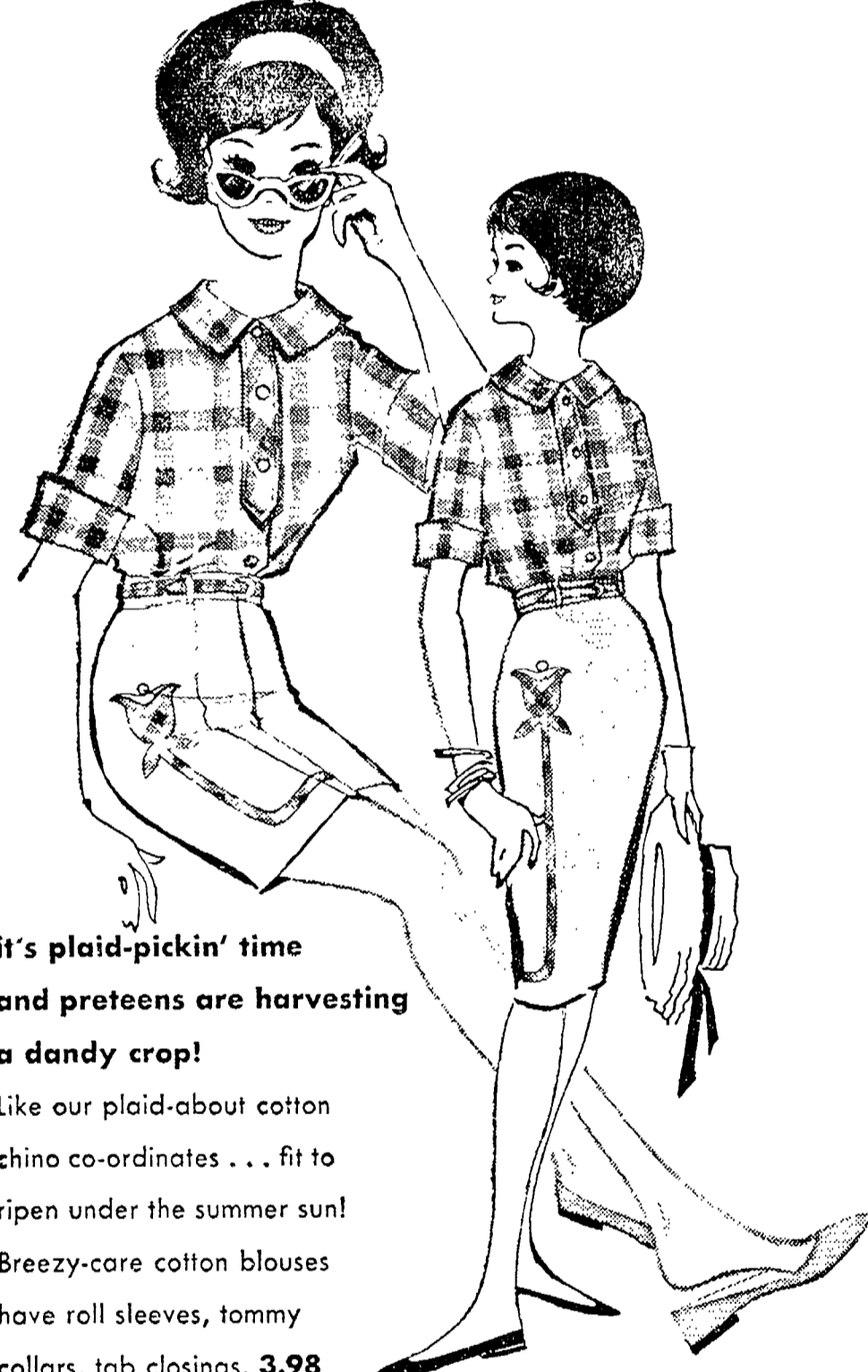

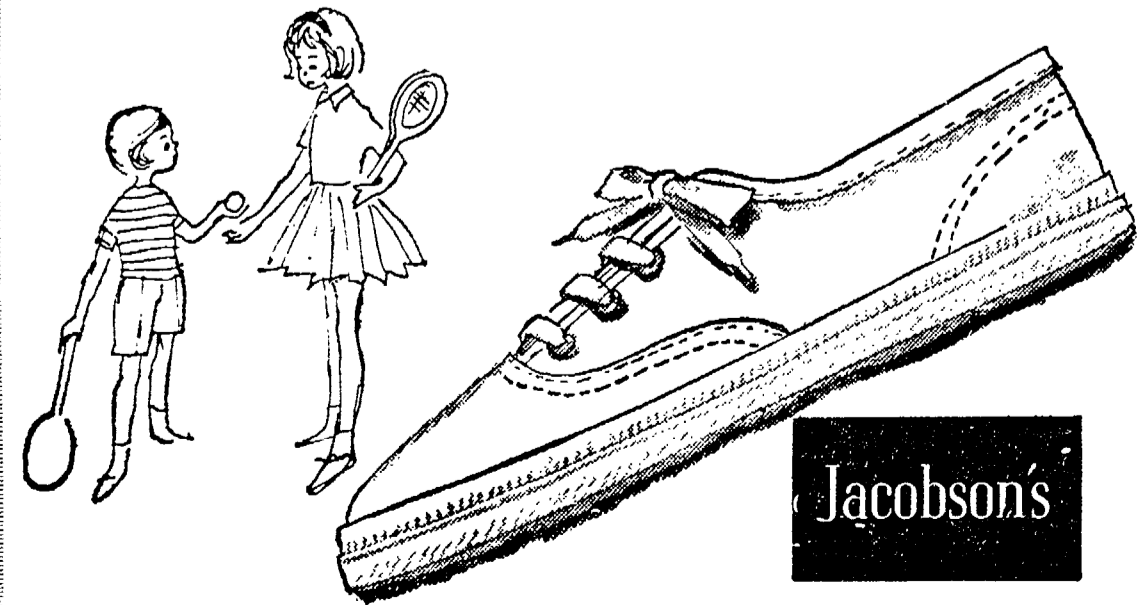

### Cases Heard In City Court

Theodore T. Licovoli, 1154 Balfour, and Bradford J. Hendricks, 1173 Nottingham, both charged with disorderly person, pled and were found guilty. They each paid a fine of \$15, were placed on two months probation, and directed to attend two sessions of Traffic Court.

### Wins Scholarship To Study in India

Miss Carolyn M. Elliott, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lester M. Elliott of 111 Touraine road, has been awarded a Fulbright Scholarship for study at Osmania University in India. The grant will cover expenses for the academic year 1962-63 for study in Government.

Miss Elliott received her B. A. degree from Wellesley College and at present she is working on her Ph.D. in Government at Radcliffe College.

Approximately 700 grants for graduate study abroad in the academic year 1962-63 are being awarded under the international educational exchange program of the Department of State.

As provided by the Fulbright Act, all students are selected by the Board of Foreign Scholarships, the members of which are appointed by the President of the United States. Students are recommended by the campus Fulbright committees and by the Institute of International Education.

### Nab Suspect In Robbery Of Market

#### Entrance Gained by Cutting Hole in Roof; Approximately \$300 Stolen

A male burglary suspect arrested by Farms police was released on a writ of habeas corpus signed by Wayne County Circuit Judge Nathan Kaufman on Wednesday, May 9.

The suspect, name withheld pending further investigation, is believed to be the person who broke into the Village Food Market, 18330 Mack avenue, Wednesday night, and took approximately \$300.

Alex Bell of 1470 Torrey road, owner of the market, told police that between \$250 and \$300 was missing from three cash registers, one of which was forcibly opened.

Police Remember Car  
The suspect, a Detroit, was arrested by Farms Police when the police officers who discovered the burglary remembered a car that was parked in the alley near the store shortly before the robbery. The car was checked and the license number noted by the policemen.

Patrolmen William Elworthy and Donald Pilon were cruising through the alleys at the rear of the Mack avenue business district, when they heard the store burglar alarm. They returned and found the market door open. They disconnected the wires to still the alarm.

The officers investigated and found that entrance into the store was gained by the thief by cutting a hole in the roof and dropping to the floor behind the meat counter.

Recall License Number  
Elworthy and Pilon called the station and gave a description of the automobile that is seen near the store and its license plate number. The car was found to be registered in the name of Jack Paisley, said Det. Sgt. Jack Paisley, said that evidence gathered at the scene of the burglary will be checked by State Police Laboratory scientists.

The suspect, who has been ordered to appear for further questioning, has a long police record, the sergeant said.

### School Board Receives Bids

A great variety of bids were received and opened by the Grosse Pointe Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday night. The bids involved proposed additions to several schools, remodeling at another, and a \$2,400,000 loan the school is negotiating.

The latter bid was competed for by three area banks. The low bidder was the Manufacturers National Bank with an offer to buy the school system's notes at par and charge an interest rate of 1.60% per annum. The loan is necessary to supply the school system with funds with which to operate until property taxes, the major source of school revenue, are collected next winter. The practice has been in effect for a number of years, school officials state, primarily because state funds due and payable are not paid on time.

Plans to erect permanent bleachers at Grosse Pointe High School's athletic field were approved by the Board at this meeting also. The Standard Steel Products Company of Three Rivers, Michigan was the successful bidder. A contract for \$20,294.00 was authorized and work should begin in June on the erection of stands which will seat several thousand spectators. 



**Burglar Robs Woods Store**

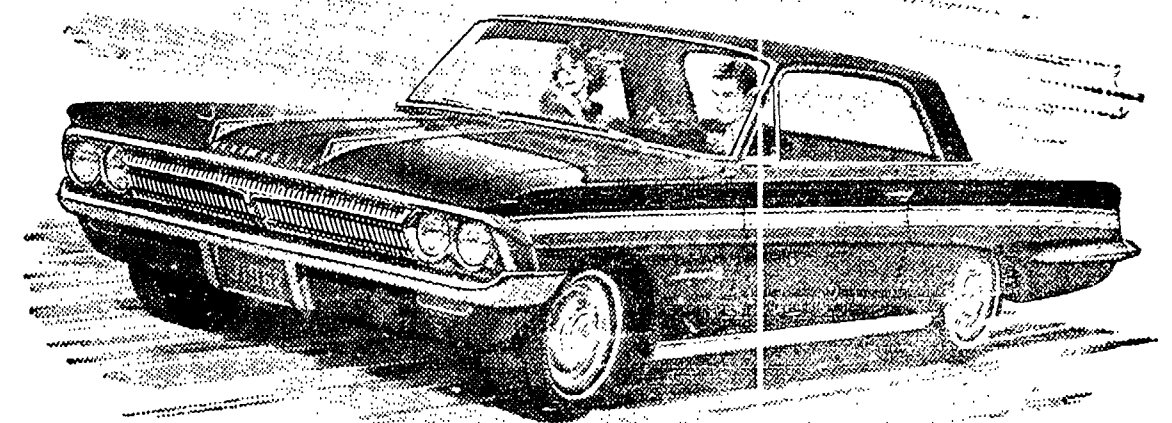

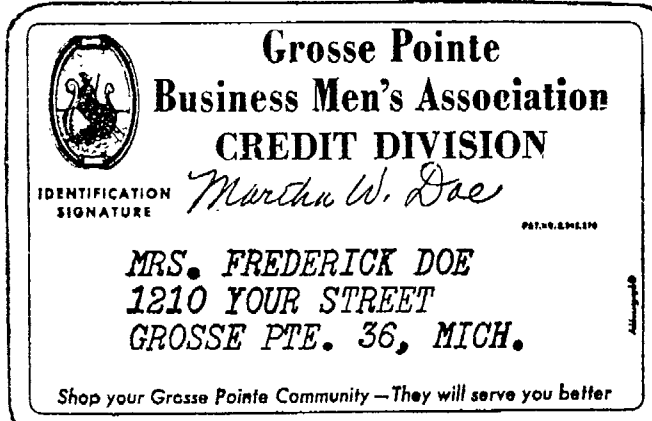

Police Capture Juveniles After They Rob Pay Phone

Two teenage boys were arrested by Farms police Monday night, May 7, and charged with breaking into a telephone and stealing money from the coin box. A policeman fired a warning shot into the air when one of the boys tried to escape. Police found \$42 in coins in the boys' pockets, taken from the phone that was ripped from the booth wall with a metal claw hammer. Det. Sgt. The boys' pockets were loaded with nickels, dimes and quarters. They were taken to the station where they were interrogated by Van Tiem. The detectives said that one boy had \$24.50 in change, and the other, \$17.45. The teenagers confessed to robbing the coin box after ripping the phone from the booth wall, the officer said. Both boys were released to the father of the 13-year-old, pending a hearing date in Juvenile Court.

Pointe Teachers Well Educated

Grosse Pointe, possessing one of the finest public school systems in the country, boasts a teaching and administrative school staff composed entirely of college graduates, 58.5 percent of whom hold advanced degrees. More than eight of every 10 teachers at the High School have progressed beyond the B.A. level, and many hold several advanced degrees. Average training for the High School staff as a whole is 5.3 years of college. In the High School Mathematics Department, for example, all 11 instructors hold advanced degrees. Only four out of 22 English teachers hold no more than a basic Bachelor of Arts, and eight of the 10 Foreign Language instructors have earned advanced degrees. What Goes On at Your Library

Can we get along without libraries?

Every worker likes to feel his product, if not essential, can make for a happier, more worthwhile life. Librarians are no exception. Just to keep us from becoming smug and complacent, at a recent meeting of Michigan librarians, a panel representing various professions, discussed this subject. Since all members of the panel obviously believed in libraries 100 per cent, to talk negatively as they had been requested to do, was hard going, but they made a brave attempt.

Is the library used enough to warrant its being? Who uses it? In general across the country around 15 per cent of the population are library users. (In Grosse Pointe we are happy to say, more than 40 per cent of the community are registered borrowers). However, the 85 per cent who may ignore libraries can be influenced indirectly by those who provide leadership—most of these are library users.

What do we mean by "get along"? It should be possible to "get along" without libraries just as it is possible to get along on a starvation diet, but it is neither desirable nor necessary in America. The greater the cultural background, the more awareness of the need, as has been proven in Grosse Pointe.

Jesus, Buddha and Socrates never read a book—but what books were there to read? The total fund of human knowledge has more than doubled in the last 50 years. According to the National Science Foundation,

scientific knowledge now doubles every eight years, with knowledge as a whole doubling every ten or twelve years. What we need to know is increasing daily, which means that access to knowledge is growing continually more important.

Acknowledged that we need books, do we need libraries? Those who can afford it, may build up sizable libraries of their own, or when the need arises borrow from their friends. This may be true of a segment of readers, but the analysts and the researchers who need a wide range of technical and scholarly books could not function adequately without libraries.

The library of the future may be so different from that of today as to be unrecognizable. The conventional book may well be replaced sooner than we think by a glass cube, which will hold the entire sum of knowledge, or perhaps it will be reduced to the head of a pin, in which case the egghead could conceivably become a pinhead.

Whatever the form the retention of knowledge may take, this material should be publicly available if we are to have a truly democratic society. Democracy implies not only equality of opportunity, but the equality of opportunity to learn.

Do librarians make good use of marketing concepts? Have we defined our target? Is the relatively small percentage of country-wide library use because we have a product with a limited market, or are we failing to keep up-to-date on the technology of selling which could apply to libraries?

We believe in our product. We're proud of the high percentage of use, proportionately, of the Grosse Pointe Public Library. But we still have a selling job to do. We won't be content until we have made this library important to at least a part of the remaining 60 per cent.

At the old Russell House in Woodward avenue on May 22, 1896, Henry M. Duffield led a delegation of prominent Detroiters to decide on suitable celebrations for the centennial of the evacuation of the city by the British.

A special edition of the history of the War for Independence in Detroit was printed to commemorate the proceedings which were held on July 11. General Russell A. Alger headed the general committee which included T. D. Buhl, D. J. Campau, M. W. O'Brien, John Bagley, James Vernor, Henry S. Sibley, Henry Lothrop, William Livingstone, Jr., Frank Hecker and Hervey C. Parke, names all familiar to civic groups this May 66 years later.

The book includes some wonderful pen and ink sketches of the guiding fathers as well as reprints from newspaper articles telling about old Detroit in the days when the Stars and Stripes was first raised after almost a century of French then British rule.

The defeat of the British in the west was largely decided by the capture of Gov. Henry Hamilton ("the hair buyer") of Detroit by Col. George Rogers Clark at Vincennes in March 1779. The pretext of unsettled claims and the protests of the Montreal fur traders delayed the surrender.

Meanwhile the Indians continued their attacks against the American settlers, but were finally defeated with their British allies, by Gen. Anthony Wayne at Fort Miami in 1794. The final peace came with the signing of the Jay treaty, which provided for the evacuation of Detroit by the British and on July 11, 1796 the British flag was hauled down from the fort and Capt. Moses Porter, with 65 men from Wayne's army, took possession. Col. John Hamtramck arrived two days later.

A traveler, Isaac Weld, arriving in the city soon after, published his impression of the fort town. "The belles of the town are quite in despair at the late departure of the British troops, though the American officers tell them they have no reason to be, as they will find them much more sensible and agreeable men than the British officers when they know them, a style of conversation, which strange as it may appear to us, is not at all uncommon amongst them. Three months, however, have not altered the first opinion of the ladies.

"About two-thirds of the inhabitants of Detroit are of French extraction, and the greater part of the inhabitants of the settlements on the river, above and below the town, are of the same description. The former are mostly engaged in trade and they all appear to be much on an equality. . . . The streets of Detroit are generally crowded with Indians of one tribe or another, and amongst them you see numberless old squaws leading about their daughters, ever ready to dispose of them to the highest bidder. At night all the Indians, except those such as get amittance into private houses, and remain there quietly, are turned out of town, and the gates shut upon them.

"The American officers have endeavored to their utmost to impress upon the minds of the Indians an idea of their own superiority over the British; but as they are very tardy in giving these people any presents, they do not pay much attention to their words. Gen. Wayne, from continually promising them presents, but at the same time always postponing the delivery when they come to ask for them, has significantly been nicknamed by them 'Gen. Wabang', which is Gen. Tomorrow. . . .

"The country around Detroit is uncommonly flat, and in none of its rivers is there a fall sufficient to turn even a grist mill. They grind their corn at present by windmills, which I do not remember to have seen in any other part of North America.

"Detroit contains about 300 houses and is the largest town in the western country. The town consists of several streets that run parallel to the river, which are intersected by others at right angles. . . . all surrounded by a strong stockade, through which there are four gates, two of them open to the wharfs, and the two others to the north and south side of the town respectively."

A conflict between the gardener and the flower arranger was solved in the latter's favor when Mrs. O. R. Aronson snipped dogwood blossoms for a dinner party centerpiece. . . . dogwood, traditionally difficult to grow, and rarely picked, with its wavy white blossoms and green centers makes an ideal bouquet.

Frank Kotcher has given us the latest word in the teen aged parlance. . . . at the high schools a situation which used to be "cool" is now "rough" but the meaning's the same.

Mr. Opera in Detroit is undoubtedly Frank W. Donovan, the man above all others who persuaded the New York Metropolitan Opera Company to present a series of performances here four years ago after an absence of half a century. This season again Mr. Donovan, as president of the Detroit Grand Opera Association, is masterminding the Met's appearance here May 21-26.

A real opera fan, Mr. Donovan has been attending Met performances since his Harvard Law School days. Mrs. Henry Ford II and he are the only Detroiters on the 40 member board of the Metropolitan. He has been to New York several times this season to hear opera. Although he is partial to Verdi's "Othello" he has no favorite, is particularly happy about this year's Met program for Detroit.

To Help Symphony Opening night, which this year is a benefit for the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the Met will perform "Lucia de Lamermoor." There will be three Verdi operas during the week including "Aida" always among the most popular, "Tosca" and "La Forza del Destino." The other operas to be sung include "Salome," "Così Fan Tutte" and "Madame Butterfly, starring the exciting diva, Leontyne Price.

During opera week Mr. Donovan will meet with Met officials to plan next year's season. The Association is offered a choice of seven operas from nine that the Met will tour and then makes a choice. Mr. Donovan reports that the Masonic Temple is one of the best auditoriums available to the Met on tour. In Boston the opera is played in a film theater. This season the Met will also tour Boston, Cleveland, Dallas, Atlanta, Bloomington, Ind., Minneapolis and Chicago.

Hold Many Meetings During opera week Mr. Donovan has few spare moments because he is constantly meeting with Met tour manager, Francis Robinson, and general manager.

- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 2 lbs. ground beef, chuck
- 3 Tb. butter
- 2 cans of tomato soup
- 1 3-oz. package of cream cheese
- 2 Tb. sugar
- 1 1/2 Tb. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 tsp. salt
- pepper
- 8-oz. medium noodles
- 8-oz. button mushrooms
- 1 cup cornflakes
- 3/4 cup chopped salted almonds
