#### Friday, June 22

PRESIDENT KENNEDY suffered a stunning personal defeat yesterday when the House of Representatives, in one of the biggest legislative upsets in years, failed to pass the Administration's farm program. Although it had been a hardfought battle all the way, Administration leaders, having successfully defeated over 50 amendments during two days of debate and having added several "sweeteners" to pick up extra votes, were convinced they had the victory in their pockets. 

> Mr. Denler, a decorator, sees no reason why the back of his shop should not be as attractive as the front, and the red flowers and greens certainly do add "something" to a rather bare parking lot area.

Unfortunately, some confirmed thief or thoughtless "practical joker" seems determined to sabotage this effort as business district "garden."

The geraniums and ivy were put in around the 20th of May. A few days later one of the plants was missing, pulled out by its roots. It was replaced. but then another disappeared,

and another. As the summer progressed, the mysterious thefts increased in volume and frequency. Mr. Denler would close his shop in the evenings, flowers and ivy intact; the next morning, sev-

eral geraniums would be gone. During the past week, the thieves have struck two or three nights in a row. Police have been informed, and are keeping a watch in the area, but the parking lot is, to all practical purposes, deserted after dark, and it is impossible to patrol it every minute of the night.

## Kerby Teachers Try Experiment

One form of teaching machine is being developed by two teachers at Kerby School, Miss Betty Frounfelter, sixth grade teacher, and Miss Nancy Dilloway, fifth grade teacher.

Their purpose is to provide a learning situation in which students work not only at their own speed but at their own level of achievement in spelling. They teach Grades 4-8 individually.

The teachers first tested their class with the Metropolitan Spelling Test to arrive at the spelling level. Then they used materials based on spelling rules, dictionary skills, and vocabularly. They taped 36 lessons (180 tapes) to provide immediate recall of words. They use two tapes at a time and the children wear

Walter Reuther's suggestion that the UAW and the Big Three of the automotive industry should get together and write an unemployment compensation law which the Michigan Legislature would be pressured \*9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., 1:30 p.m. tf 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. to into enacting, has received the response which it deserved. General Motors, Ford and Chrysler all promptly rejected the proposal.

Henry Ford II covered the situation most thoroughly when he sent this reply to Reuther.

"If there were ever any question in the minds of the people of Michigan as to who is running or attempting to run their State, your letter to me of June 21 should clearly answer that question.

"In essence, you propose that the three automobile manufacturers and the UAW join forces to effect a takeover of prerogatives that are solely those of the State Legislature and the State Executive Branch. You suggest that we and you get together to write a law under which all the people of Michigan must live that will not necessarily be the way they want it, but the way we and you want it.

"In my opinion, it is this kind of special-interest. pressure-group action that must bear the responsibility for much of the sickness in the world today.

"In my opinion, it is an outrageous proposal,

"I must inform you that Ford Motor Company does not propose to become a party to it."

Then replying to Mr. Ford's letter, Mr. Reuther further disclosed his egotistical conception of the democratic process by calling Ford's reaction to the propocal "intemperate, disappointing and shocking." He

"This is a free society . . . "We are most disappointed in your intemperate rejection of our offer to substitute cooperation for conflict."

This is pretty scarey thinking on the part of the head of one of the country's largest labor organizations. We commend Mr. Ford for his forthright answer.

Section 3. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

In these long ago days when the huge Victorian frame cottages drowsed under the summer sun, Grosse Pointe was a haven for resorters. To supply the summer colonists with the collations which followed their numerous lawn tennis matches, horse races, bowling on the green gatherings and evening choral meets a horse and buggy grocer's van drove out from Woodward avenue bi-weekly.

Even though such resorters as the T. P. Halls at Tonnancour, the Newberrys and McMillans at Lake Terrace, the Alfred Brushes at the Pines, the Berrys, Dyars, Muirs, Hunts and Newlands grew their own fruit and vegetables, killed their own cattle, chickens and pigs, there were still stables needed to keep the vast households going.

The firm which sent the horse and buggy to Grosse Pointe for orders was established by George and Robert McMillan, no relation to James McMillan, millionaire railroad owner.

The McMillan brothers, who were to become Detroit's most elite grocers, were born in Argyleshire, Scotland, in the early 19th century. George emigrated to New York and entered a mercantile firm in 1847 and then after two years came to Detroit. He and his brother opened a store at the corner of Woodward and Fort street which was for years known as the McMillan corner.

George married Isabella Moffat, a native Detroiter, whose father was one of Detroit's most prominent mayors. Hugh Moffat was elected in 1871 to rid the city of a paralyzing load of debt and to oversee the buying of lakeside parks and city improvements. In business he was a contractor and responsible for the Moffat building interest. 

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
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
