



### Four Pointes Wins Awards for Safety

 Grosse Pointe Farms, competing in the same population class as the Woods, won a Special Citation for "significant improvement" of its program aimed at safeguarding persons afoot during 1961.

The Special Citation is approximately equivalent to third place in the annual contest, Lewis explained. The Farms, which recorded one pedestrian fatality last year, had only three deaths in the last 14 years.

A total of 10 years without a pedestrian fatality won for Grosse Pointe Park and City a Pedestrian Safety Citation. The City of Grosse Pointe has gone six years without recording the traffic death of a person afoot, and the Park, four. In addition, pedestrian injuries in Grosse Pointe Park dropped from 13 in 1960 to nine last year, and in Grosse Pointe City, from four to two during the same period.

Grosse Pointe City competed against 697 other U.S. cities in the under-10,000 population class, while the Park competed with 572 cities in the 10,000-to-25,000 population class. The two communities were among 22 Michigan cities receiving the Pedestrian Safety award.

Lewis cited the work of police, school and other city officials in "carrying out an obviously effective and well-coordinated program," and had special praise for the "outstanding school safety program" and for the "hard-working Grosse Pointe Safety and Traffic committee."

Lewis added that the award was made possible chiefly through the careful driving and walking practices of all Grosse Pointe citizens.

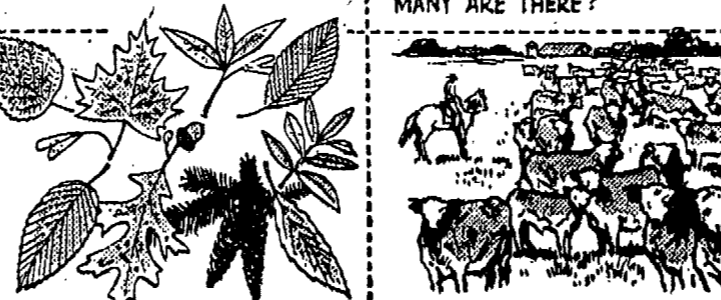

 Adrian Meerhaeghe, said that the assault victims, both of the Woods, told them that they were walking through Ghosquiere Park on Tuesday, July 17, when they were approached by the five boys, one of whom said, "Let's get them."

The three older boys then proceeded to hit their victims and pummeled them to the ground, after which one of the assailants began kicking the smaller boys, warning them not to move, or he would continue kicking.

The victims identified the 13- and 14-year-olds and told Setchell and Meerhaeghe where the two lived.

The officers went to the home of one of the identified boys, where the mother of the boys said that her son was supposed to be at a party.

 The son was picked up with two other boys and the fourth lad was picked up when he was seen walking on Mack avenue by one of the boys in custody, who identified him.

The fifth lad, the 13-year-old, was surrendered to police by his father, who learned that his son was being sought for his part in the incident.

O'Dell and Tobian said that all the boys were wearing black leather gloves, all of which were confiscated and held as evidence. Also confiscated and held as evidence was a toy snub-nosed pistol, blackened to appear like the real thing, that the 14-year-old had tucked into his belt.

The five accused boys were taken to the Wayne County Youth Home, held temporarily, and then released to their parents to await the hearing in Juvenile Court.

### New Head of Bon Secours

The Rev. Mother John Andrew has been appointed superior of the community at Bon Secours Hospital, Grosse Pointe.

Previously superior at Our Lady Help of Christians Convalescent Home in Philadelphia, she succeeds the Reverend Mother Theophane, who has been appointed superior at Bon Secours Hospital in Baltimore, Md., a 260-bed institution.

The Reverend Mother Mary Gertrude continues as administrator of the Grosse Pointe Bon Secours Hospital.

Mother John Andrew began her career in hospital work as a registered nurse. She was graduated from St. Francis Hospital in Wilmington, Del., and spent a year as a public health nurse before becoming a member of the Sisters of Bon Secours. For 13 years she was assigned to the Bon Secours Hospital in Baltimore and was night supervisor there before her transfer to Philadelphia a year ago.

Mother Theophane served in a number of capacities at Grosse Pointe Bon Secours for 14 years and was appointed superior in 1961. For some years she supervised the operating room and was instrumental in the establishment of

methods and procedures that enabled that department to meet the highest standards.

Grosse Pointe Bon Secours Hospital is operated by the Sisters of Bon Secours, a religious community organized in Paris in 1822 to provide nursing care for the sick. Nursing sisters of the community came to this country in 1880 and to Detroit in 1909. The site of the present Bon Secours Hospital was acquired by the sisters 40 years ago. Their activities in the Grosse Pointe area grew from simple home nursing care to the establishment of a convalescent home and then to the founding of the present full-fledged hospital which serves medical needs of residents of the entire area.

All members of the Sisters of Bon Secours are professionally qualified as registered nurses, dietitians or as other types of hospital specialists, technicians and administrators.

### \$550,313 Paid To Handicapped

A record breaking \$550,313 has been paid in wages to handicapped employees of Goodwill Industries of Greater Detroit in the six-month period ending June 30, 1962.

According to Hubert D. Bransford, Goodwill business manager, the high was made possible through additions in industrial contract work as well as an increase in discarded materials reconditioned and sold through Goodwill's nine retail stores.

"We have a weekly average of 450 workers on our payroll," said Bransford, "yet the waiting list of handicapped men and women seeking training and employment at Goodwill now exceeds 800 persons."

"With the continued support of the community through the contribution of household discards, we can eventually give these people a chance."

Pickup of materials by truck at the request of contributors and collection boxes located on the parking lots of 80 neighborhood supermarkets make it easy to provide Goodwill with needed materials. An additional 30 boxes will be placed in new locations within the next few weeks.

Goodwill employees are presently working at reconditioning fall and winter clothing to stock retail stores by Labor Day. Men's and children's clothing is especially needed at this time.

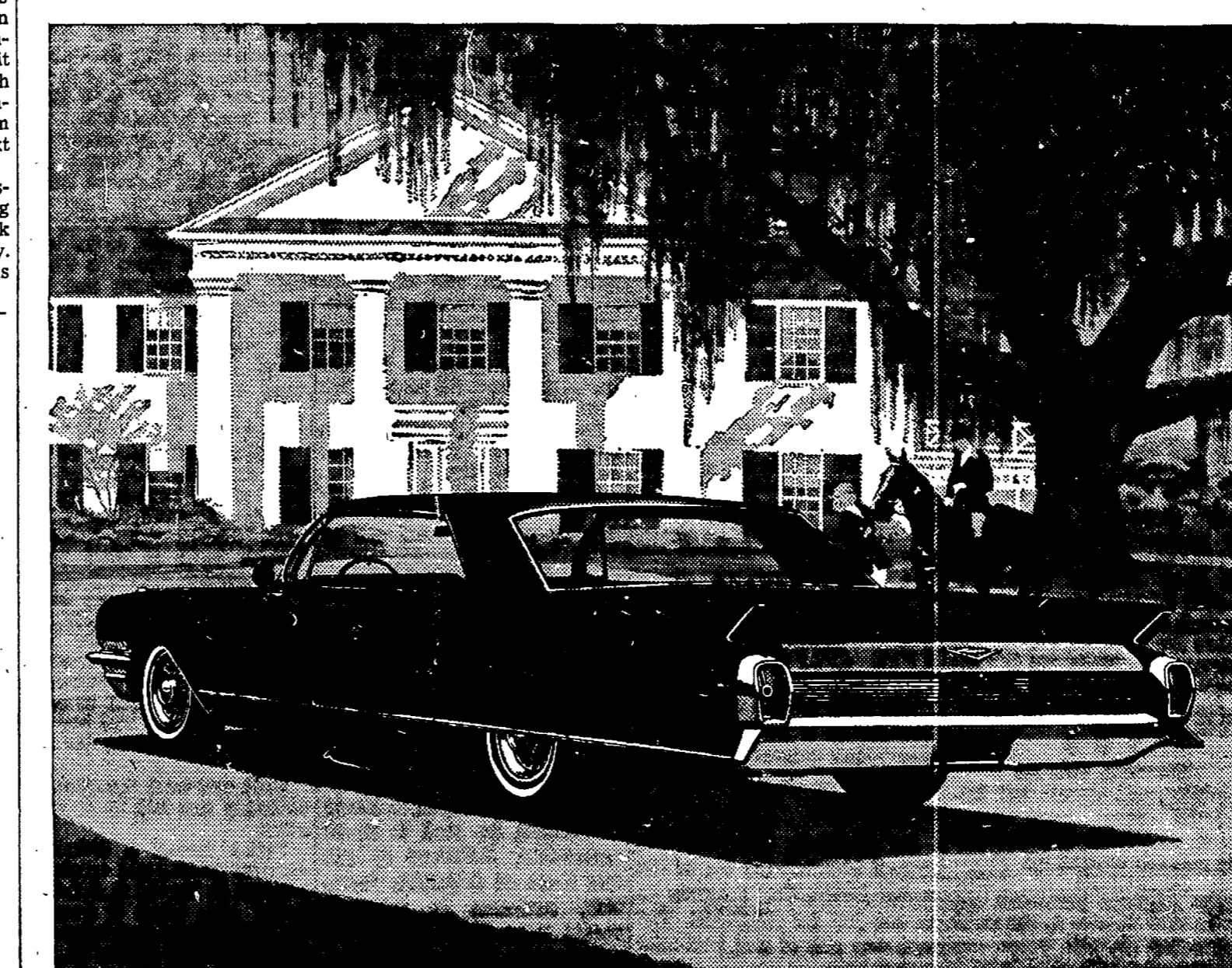

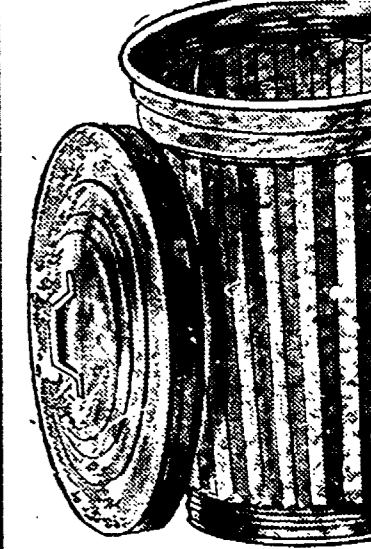

### Youths Injured As Car Hits Tree

Two young men driving home from the Harbor Bar at the foot of Fairview in Detroit early Saturday morning, July 21, were injured, one seriously, when the driver lost control near the intersection of Lincoln and Charlevoix. Jumping a curb, their car careened wildly before slamming against a tree.

The impact thrust Thomas R. Rice, 25, 17450 Maumee, sitting next to the driver in the front seat, against the windshield. Rice's face struck the glass, shattering it. The driver, James T. Courage, 23, 263 Kenwood, was also pushed forward, but the steering wheel protected him.

Courage stated that he and Rice had had a few drinks. When they left the Harbor Bar he (Courage) insisted upon driving because Rice was "feeling pretty good." Rice did not seem too happy with this arrangement as the car, a '59 Hillman station wagon, eventually acquired and Courage took the wheel.

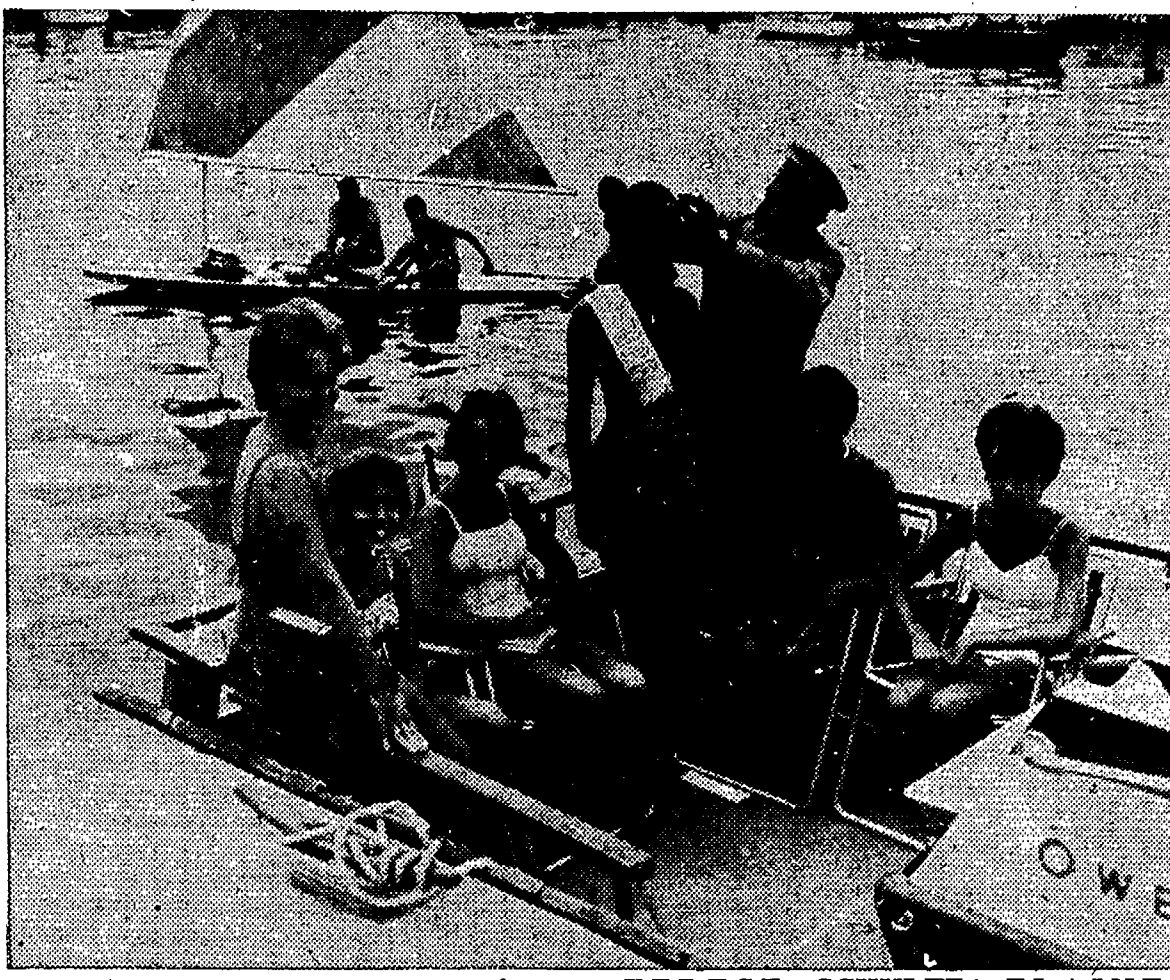
They were travelling east on Charlevoix near the Lincoln intersection when Rice suddenly grabbed Courage's arm, causing him to lose his grip on the steering wheel. Before Courage could straighten out the car had jumped the curb and was heading for the tree.

Mrs. E. C. Suor, 677 Lincoln, heard the crash and immediately telephoned City police. Arriving on the scene, Officers Benrhuys and Parmentier found the Hillman, twisted and bent, wrapped against the tree.

Courage, dazed, bruised and cut, was found to have only minor injuries, but Rice was considerably cut up. He was admitted to St. Secours Hospital, where approximately 70 stitches were required to close the wounds on his face. At last report, he is doing very well.

Courage received a ticket for reckless driving and causing an accident.

### Voters' League Offers Booklet

Copies of "You and Your National Government," the League of Women Voters' newest publication, on the federal government, have been placed at The Bookshelf, according to Mrs. Ervile - Maynard, Publications chairman of the League of Women Voters of Grosse Pointe. The booklet is on sale to the public for 25 cents.

As the title implies, the purpose of the booklet is to clarify the workings of the national government so that the ordinary citizen can see more clearly where and how he can fit in. To do this, there are sections explaining the formation and functions of each of the three branches of government: legislative, executive, and judicial.

In the section on the Congress, for instance, not only are its powers, membership, and organization spelled out, but there is a beautifully clear and simple graphical explanation of how a bill becomes a law.

The section on the executive branch explains what the President's responsibilities and duties are, and then presents the other side of the coin—the responsibilities of a citizen to his President.

A citizen even has a responsibility in the judicial branch. Although of course it is against the law to try to influence the decision of any judge, a citizen does have an indirect influence on the quality of the courts when through his vote he helps select the nation's leaders.

The last section in the book, "You as an Active Citizen," gives three pages of specific suggestions as to how the individual citizen can participate actively in the national government.

Summed up in the concluding sentence of the booklet "Knowledge of how to be an effective citizen can go a long way in providing you with the power to be one." This booklet can help a great deal to achieve such knowledge.

Also available at The Bookshelf now is "Know Your Wayne County Government," published by the League of Women Voters in Wayne County, for sale at 50 cents each.

### 640 Young Drivers Taught By Public School System

The driver education program carried on by the Grosse Pointe Public School System will train 640 young drivers this summer. Sixteen classes of 40 pupils each will have been taught by the end of the third 20-day session on August 27, school officials report.

This total represents a new high for students being taught safe driving habits. In earlier summer sessions only about 500 pupils could be accommodated. However, by running classes as late as 8:30 p.m. the capacity of the school has been increased to 640.

A very large percentage of those wanting driver education this summer have been cared for. About 50 pupils are on a waiting list, a substantial reduction from former years. Many of these are repeaters, students who failed the course in an earlier session.

School authorities state that all resident students are given equal opportunity to enroll for the summer course. Thus, parochial and private school pupils who are eligible by virtue of resident and age are registered and placed in a class on exactly the same bases as are public school pupils.

Each registrant is asked to list, in order, which of the 16

classes he'd like to attend. When all registrations are in, the pupils are assigned numbers, the oldest first and the youngest last. School administrators, working on the basic premise that those nearest their 16th birthday should have priority, then make up the 40-pupil groups, observing individual preferences insofar as possible.

Eight cars are available for training within the driver-court located on the parking lot of Grosse Pointe High School. Two other vehicles are used to administer road tests to pupils for that phase. All of the cars are provided for the school at a very nominal fee by local auto agencies. A variety of makes, models, and types of gear shift are in the fleet to insure a well-rounded acquaintance with a large number of automobiles on the part of the young drivers.

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### Safety Council Submits Report

A monthly report submitted by the Grosse Pointe Safety and Traffic Committee, disclosed that there were 86 property damage accidents in five of the communities during June.

The total does not include the Park, which did not submit a report for last month.

The committee, sponsored by the Safety and Traffic Division of the Automobile Club of Michigan, is comprised of the five Pointes and Harper Woods.

According to the report of the 86 traffic accidents, 21 were non-fatal, accidents resulting in injuries.

For the month of June, Harper Woods reported 22 accidents, of which five were non-fatal; the Farms recorded 27, with eight non-fatal; City, 15, with four non-fatal; Woods, 15, with three non-fatal; and Shores, five, with one non-fatal.

Since January 1, the number of property damage accidents totaled 470, of which 166 occurred in Harper Woods; 144 in the Farms; 72 in the Woods; 69 in the city; and 19 in the Shores.

The non-fatal accidents recorded since the beginning of the year totaled 83, of which 27 are reported to have happened in the Farms; 22 in Harper Woods; 14 each in the City and Woods; and six in the Shores.

Although the Park did not submit a report last month, there is one known 1962 fatal traffic accident. Harper Woods also had one fatal this year.

### Care Involved In Minor Crash

No tickets were issued and no injuries reported following a minor accident at the Kercheval-Notre Dame intersection on Tuesday, July 17.

The two-car collision, caused by a misunderstanding, involved Fred Lewis, 741 Lincoln, and Sandra Hookanson, 1027 Kensington. Lewis, driving a '61 Chevrolet station wagon, had stopped south of Notre Dame for the red light and discharged a passenger.

Sandra Hookanson meanwhile pulled her Ford 'up alongside Lewis' car and, thinking he was parked, started to make a right turn when the light changed. The two cars came together about six feet from the corner.

Damage to both vehicles was minor.

### Grads to Hear Dr. Bushong

Dr. James W. Bushong, superintendent of schools in Grosse Pointe, will deliver the commencement address to Northern Michigan College summer graduates July 27, at 2 p.m. in Marquette.

Degrees to be conferred upon the students include 64 bachelor's degrees and 44 master's degrees.

The vice president of the Michigan Association of School Administrators, Dr. Bushong received his bachelor's degree from Pacific University, Forest Grove, Oregon.

He received both his master's degree in education and his doctor's degree from the University of Oregon, and was an Education Fellow at Harvard University.

Married and the father of four children, Dr. Bushong came to Michigan in 1951 when he assumed his present position as superintendent of Grosse Pointe schools.

Since 1954, he has been a visiting professor in Educational Administration at various institutions of higher learning including the University of Michigan, University of Wisconsin and Syracuse University.

In the fall of 1961, Dr. Bushong traveled in central and eastern Europe and visited the Soviet Union school systems.

Dr. Bushong is a past president of the Wayne County Michigan Superintendents Association and is currently serving as chairman, Executive board, Metropolitan Detroit Bureau of School Studies.

### English Pastor Points Visitor

The Rev. Hubert William Janisch, M.A. (pronounced Yanish as in Danish) will preach at 8:30 and 10 a.m. this Sunday, July 29, at the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church (United Presbyterian). He will also speak at the Detroit Rotary Club, Wednesday noon, August 1.

Mr. Janisch is from England, where he is minister of the Baptist Church in Worthing on the south coast. He comes under the auspices of the British Council of Churches, who send 10 of their finest ministers each summer to America.

Mr. Janisch was born in Cape Town in 1905 and brought up in Johannesburg. He was first in business but, answering the call to the ministry, entered Cambridge University in 1928 and took his degree in 1931. His first pastorate was in College Street Chapel, Northampton. He has held a number of offices in Worthing: President of its Christian Council, of the Free Church Federal Council, Moderator of Kent and Sussex Baptist Association in 1961 and President of Worthing Rotary Club in 1959.

### Rattlesnake Bite Fatal To Pointe Girl in Canada

A 10-year-old Grosse Pointe girl died Tuesday night, July 17, after being bitten by a rattlesnake in Cognashene, Ont., where she was vacationing with her family.

Nora Armitage, one of five daughters of Mr. and Mrs. James Armitage, 1038 Yorkshire, ran screaming to her mother after the Massasauga rattler struck Mrs. Armitage, staying alone with her children at a cottage the family had taken for the summer, said the little girl told her she had been bitten by a snake.

A doctor, identified as an American M.D. on vacation nearby, was summoned within the hour, but, according to police reports, decided not to administer anti-venom serum, available in several nearby areas.

The little girl had rallied, and the doctor, working on the theory that anti-venom serum causes a severe reaction, decided it was unnecessary. Eight hours later the child became very ill.

Bundling her daughter into a motorboat, Mrs. Armitage began a 10-mile race against time. When the boat finally arrived at Penetanguishene, Ont., where medical facilities were available, the child was dead.

Ontario authorities have begun an investigation into the matter.

Mr. Armitage was in Detroit at the time of the accident. According to the autopsy report, Nora died from the bite of a small gray-brown rattler, commonly called the Massasauga. She was the second person

to die from a rattlesnake bite in Ontario in the past six years. Besides her parents, she is survived by four sisters, Diane, Patricia, Joan and Ellen. Services were Saturday, July 21, at the Verheyden Funeral Home and St. Clair of Montefalco Church. Burial was in Mt. Olivet cemetery.

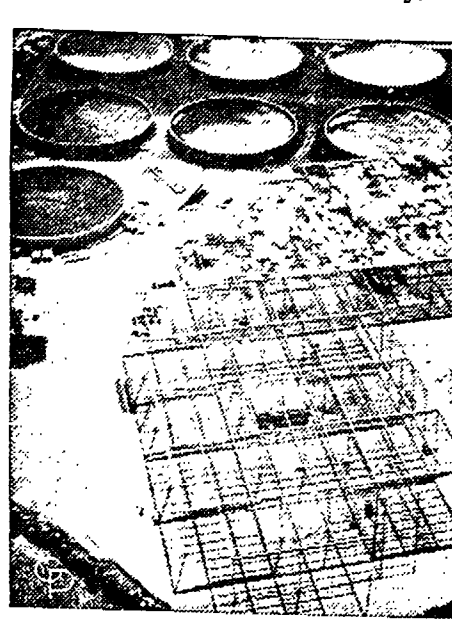

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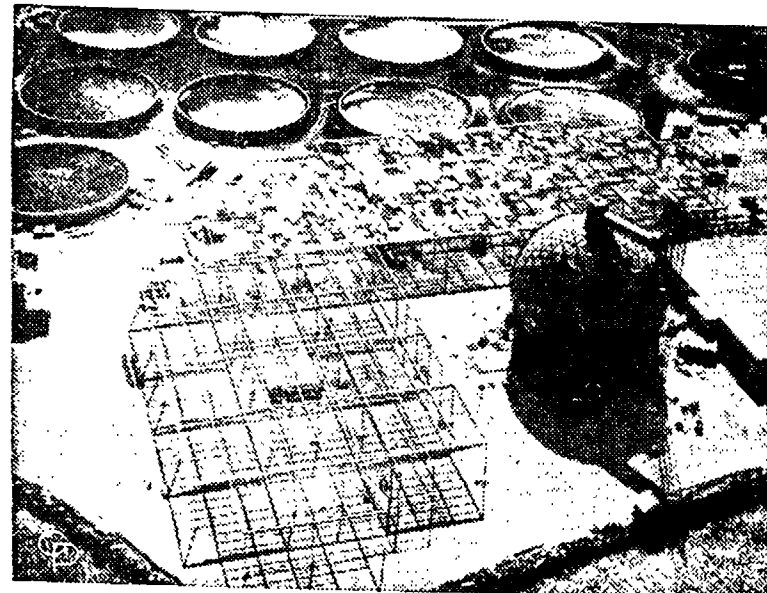
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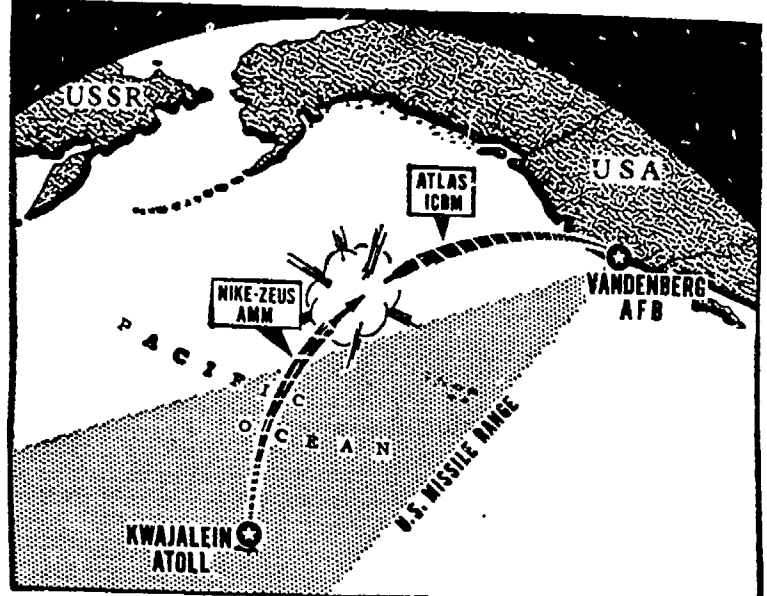

This is the sensitive tracking station on Kwajalein.



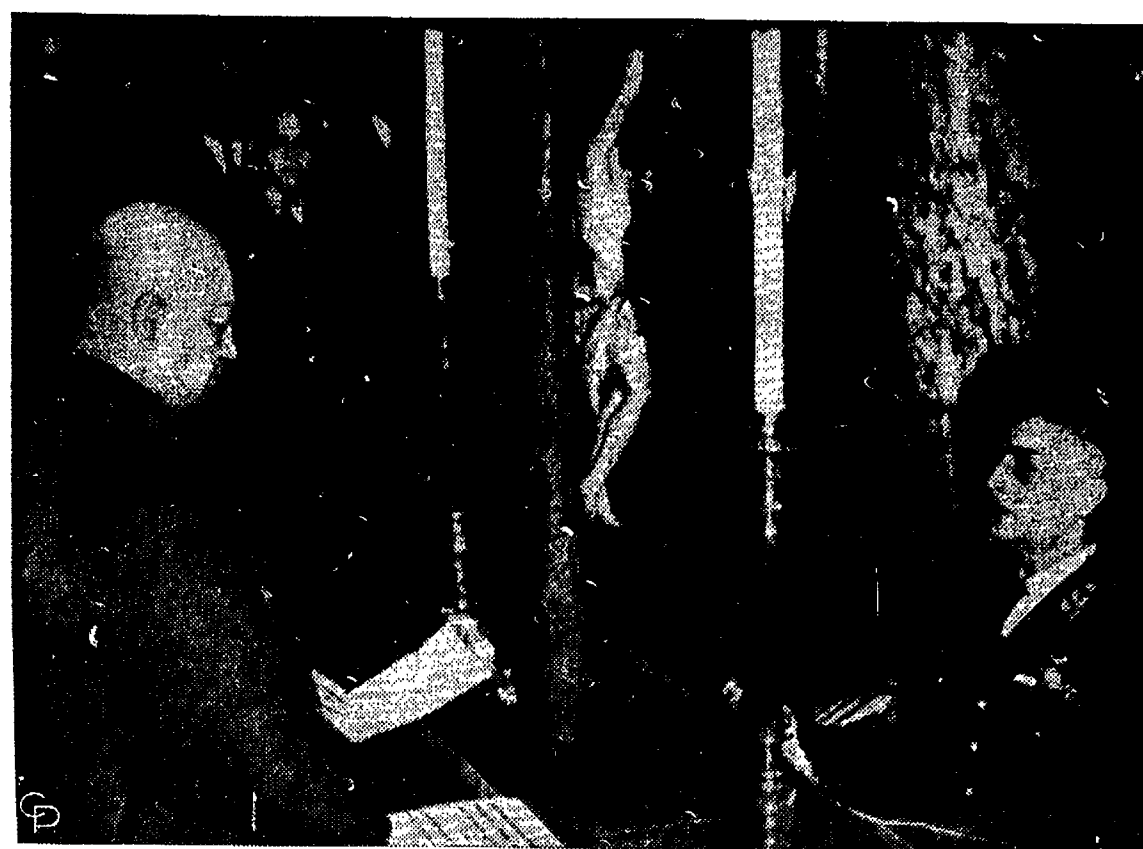

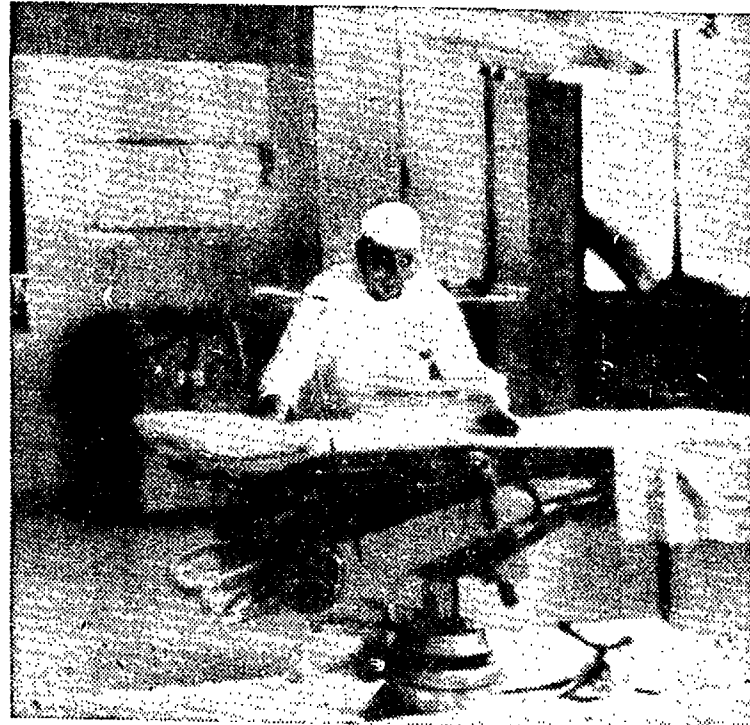

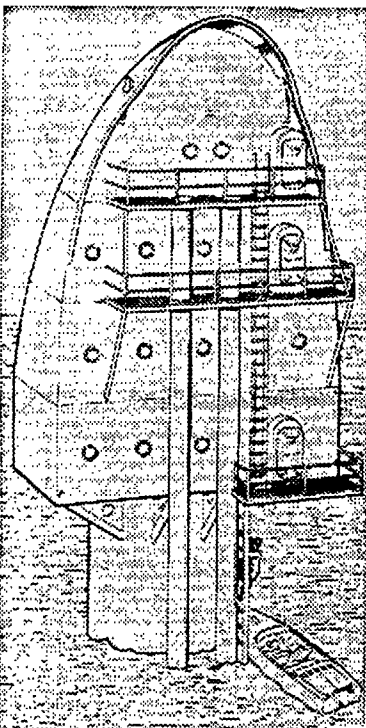

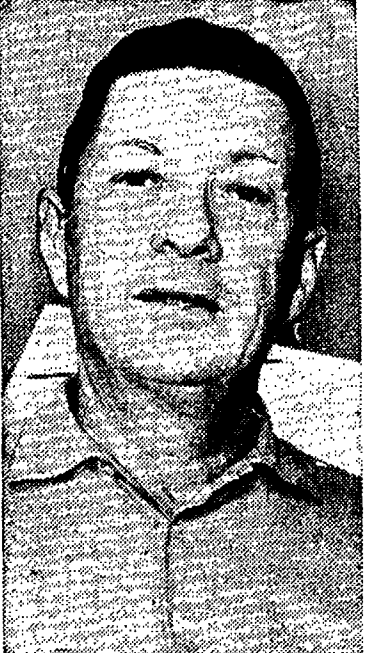

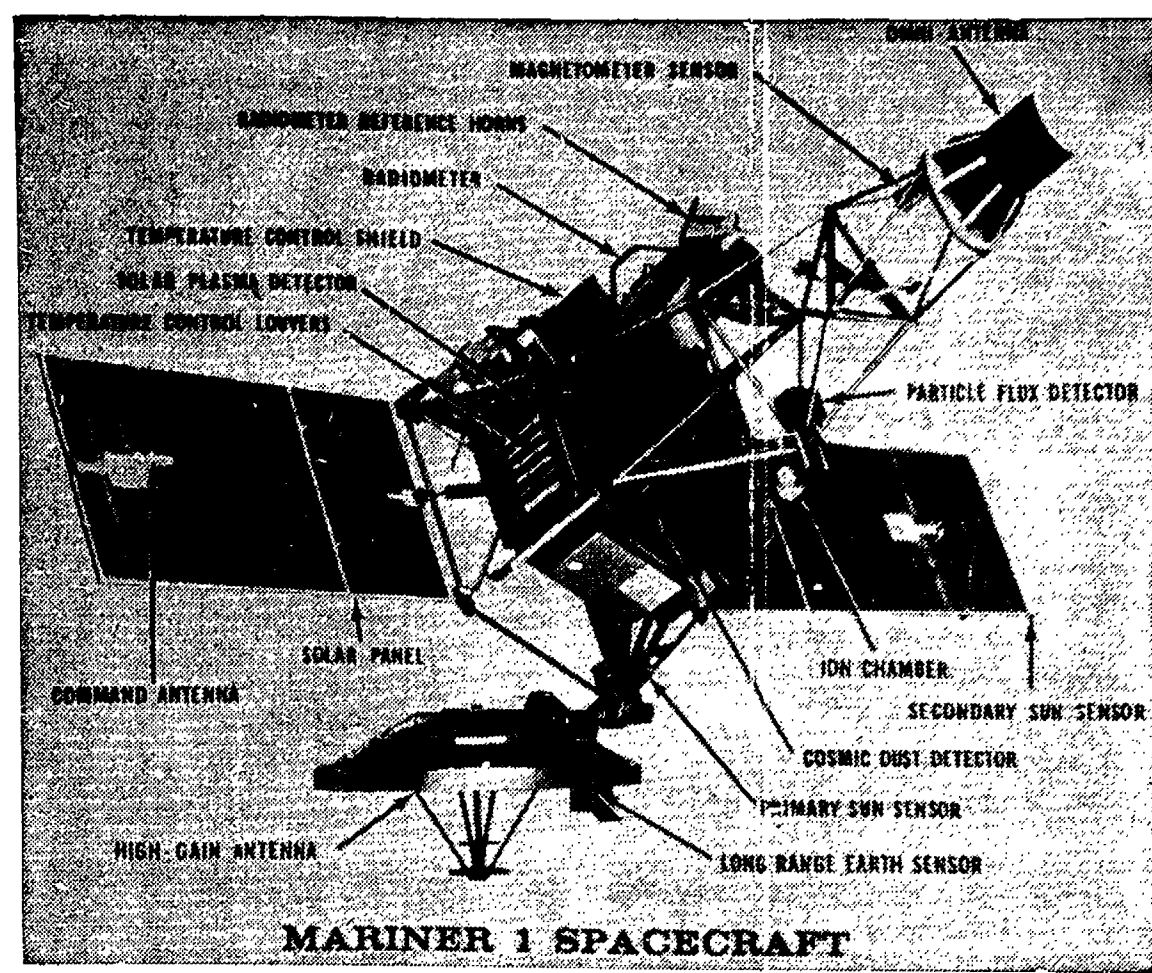
