 At 10:30 a. m. on Tuesday, an all-system meeting will be held in the Parcels Junior High School auditorium. President Weber will extend greetings from the Board of Education and a major keynote address will be delivered by Dr. Howard Jones, Dean of the School of Education at the State University of Iowa. Dr. Jones was a professor at the University of Michigan for a number of years prior to accepting the Iowa post. William Prosser, Brownell business teacher and president of the teacher association, will preside.
 Orientation programs for secondary school students will be held Wednesday, September 5. All junior high schools and the senior high will receive students new to these buildings at 1:30 p. m. and offer them information and advice concerning procedures and opportunities in which they might be interested. Classes will begin Thursday morning at the regular hour in all schools.
 Registrations Open
 Opportunities to register children new to the school district continue in all buildings.

School principals have designated the afternoon hours for this purpose this week. Students desiring to make changes in their class schedule may see secondary school deans at this time also.
 Testing of junior high school pupils newly enrolled in the school system has been carried on this week. Arithmetic, reading, and intelligence tests have been administered as needed to insure that complete data is available concerning each newcomer to the secondary schools so that proper grade placement and curriculum assignment can be made.
 Latecomers may still be tested next week, school officials state. During the morning hours test administrators will be at Pierce Junior High School on Wednesday, September 5, and Brownell Thursday, September 6. Parcels students will be tested Thursday afternoon.

 By Request Only
 The other "closed" section, from which books may be obtained only on specific request, lists such titles as "Lady Chatterley's Lover" and "Point Counterpoint" — which Mrs. Cassil admits are "filth." Emmett McLoughlin's books are presently in this section.
 Mrs. Cassil would be satisfied if McLoughlin's books were placed in the "Adults Only" section, as she considers them a type children would not want to read anyway.
 "If the books are so bad they have to be put on the closed shelf," Mrs. Cassil maintains, "the library should never have bought them in the first place."
 Mrs. Cassil has a carbon copy of a letter from an organization entitled "Protestants and Other Americans United" condemning the Grosse Pointe School Board for its "flagrant and blatant discrimination and favoritism."
 Copies of Letter Sent
 "Protestants and Other Americans United" is devoted to maintaining separation of Church and State in the United States.

Copies of the letter have been sent to Mr. Orr, Dr. Bushong, School Board President Robert Weber and Howard Snyder, president of the Friends of the Grosse Pointe Public Library.
 Since this whole furor started, says Mrs. Cassil, she has received several anonymous poison pen letters and a phone call purportedly from the NAACP, asking if she would be interested in selling her house to colored people.
 Mrs. Cassil told the caller she was not interested.
 She stated that she has also received several laudatory letters and that she intends to continue her fight against "censorship" in the Grosse Pointe Public Library.
 Mrs. Cassil believes that Rev. Downie, by addressing the Board in clerical garb and identifying himself as a clergyman, brought "religion" into what is, basically, a question of "censorship."

 Thursday night, August 23, one at Porky's Pizza, 19873 Mack, and the other at Deane Dairy Store, 21035 Mack.
 The break-in at Porky's Pizza was reported by Joseph Tringali, a partner in the pizza enterprise, at 8:45 a.m. Friday, August 24.
 Tringali stated that he had closed the shop at 11:55 p.m. Thursday. Some time during the night, the thief broke out the bottom half of the front door window with an unknown object, entered, and removed \$39.40 in currency from the cash register, exiting via the front door.
 The Deane Dairy burglary was discovered at 6:30 a.m. Friday by Don Bell, an employee of Wilson Dairy, as he was delivering products to the store. Bell noticed that the front door window had been broken out. A heavy mesh screen door obscured the break, making it unnoticeable several feet away.
 Loss Was Negligible
 Woods police notified the owner, Robert Deane, 17434 Sprenger, East Detroit, who came to the shop and verified that a negligible amount in change had been taken from the cash register.
 O'Dell and Tobian noted a marked similarity between

these two break-ins and two earlier ones. On May 28, the Ira Wilson and Sons Dairy Store, (Deane Dairy) 21035 Mack, and the Grosse Pointe Valet Cleaners, 21155 Mack, were visited by burglars.
 In both instances, the thief gained entry by smashing the front door glass. He then moved quickly through the stores, snatching money from the cash registers and exiting via the back doors.
 He appears to be interested only in cash.
 Deane Dairy seems to be his favorite spot for picking up loose change. Less than two weeks before the May 28 burglary, on May 19, he broke into the dairy store and took \$98 in currency from a cash register.
 Not Scared of Cuts
 According to Det. Sgt. O'Dell, the criminal is unique in that he smashes door glass and leaves jagged edges, apparently is unafraid of glass cuts.
 He enters through the jagged opening and goes directly to the cash register. If the register is locked, he does not bother with it, but continues through the store, out the front or back door.
 He seems to stop his criminal activities as soon as he has obtained a total of \$75. For this

The articles of clothing were not described.

Investigation of the theft is now being conducted by City police.

Daley said the "boys" had just left in a Ford convertible.

When the teenagers agreed to make \$3 restitution, charges against them were dropped.

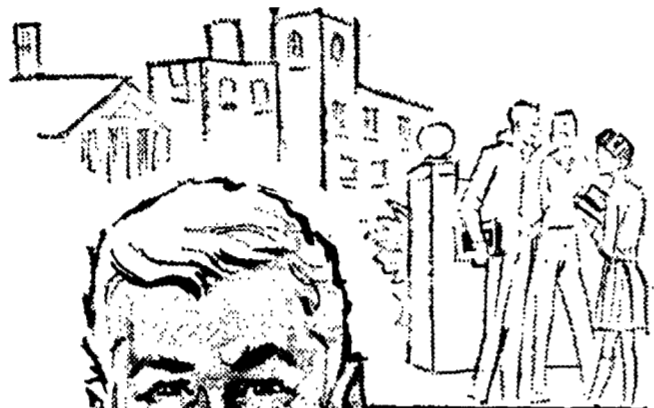
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Pointe Theater Selects Play

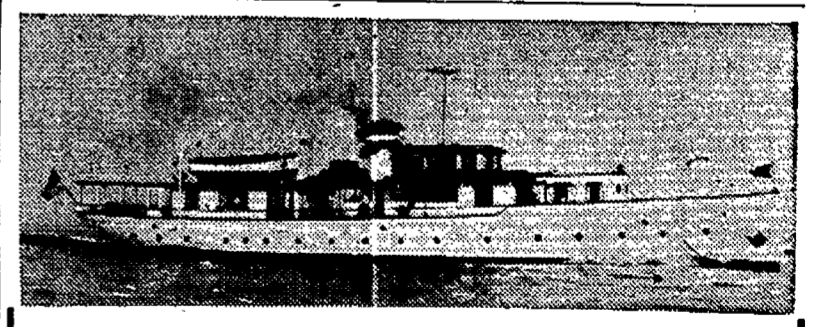
