#### Thursday, August 23

CHARLES DE GAULLE miraculously escaped injury yesterday, when 150 machine gun bullets riddled his limousine, speeding towards an airport outside Paris. One of the bullets missed the French President's head by a narrow two inches. Others shattered the car's rear window, showering de Gaulle with glass fragments, punctured two of the limousine's safety tires, hit a motorcycle policeman's plastic helmet, wounded a passerby, damaged escort cars and blasted into a near-by shop. De Gaulle, imperturbable as ever at 71, conceded to his military aide that the 10-man ambush was a "close shave."

### Friday, August 24

THE UNITED STATES Senate yesterday unanimously approved a bill aimed at tightening out-moded Federal drug laws. The measure now goes before the House, where somewhat similar drug legislation is pending in committee. The 78-0 vote by which the bill was approved is a major personal victory for Senator Estes Kefauver (D., Tenn.) who battled more than two years for stronger drug laws in the face of Senate apathy.

## Park Approves Sewer Survey

The Park is going to go ahead with plans for a sewer survey of its two most troublesome flooding areas this fall. This week it will get an estimate for a survey of five additional bothersome spots.

The survey will be made by the firm of Hubbell, Roth, and Clark for an estimated \$800. Earlier this month the Park Council rejected a proposal for a sewer survey of the entire city by the same firm for \$8000.

In its action Monday, August 27, the Council voted to spend a maximum of \$2800 for a detailed survey of the seven most troublesome areas.
