Thursday, November 15 DETROIT'S CITY PLAN COMMISSION yesterday approved a proposal to tear down the old Ernst Kern Co. and other buildings in the immediate area, making room for an urban renewal project in the middle of downtown Detroit. The Commission's unanimous decision could be a first tangible step toward rejuvenation of this onceprosperous retail center.

The property - management firm of Homer Warren & Co., representing a Detroit syndicate, has expressed interest in the full-block area already, may construct a six-story "Midtown Mall" shopping center. Estimated cost of the property, located in the heart of downtown Detroit and bounded by Woodward, Gratiot, Monroe and Farmer, is \$7,356,000, and Plan Commission officials believe it would cost another half-million dollars to pull down existing buildings, including a Sam's Store, Bond Clothing Co. and other retail shops as well as the Kern Co. Actual cost, after property resale, would come to about \$3,-074,000, with Detroit responsible for one-third of this outlay, the Federal Government pledged to make up the remaining two thirds. Robert D. Knox, City Housing Commission Director, is working to get his commissioners' approval. The City Housing Commission Director believes Detroit could recover most of its cash December 2 outlay, through improved taxes, in the first year of new business operation on the site, hopes begin within the next 18 months, and notes that two organizations have indicated an interest in major area developments.

After the procedings are completed under this act, the city would acquire title to the

Under the second Act, however, the court determines whether it is necessary to vacate a cemetery. If the court rules in favor of the city, it is the responsibility of the city to pay for, and to remove remains; and have them properly reinterred in a suitable cemetery not more than six miles from the corporate limits of the city.

Milton Henkel, 762 Sunningdale, was awarded the M.A.I. designation by the Governing Council of the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers at its annual meeting in Detroit, Michigan, November 12, 1962. This designation automatically admits Milton Henkel' to membership in the Institute. There are fewer than 65 active appraisers who have so qualified in Michigan.

To receive the M.A.I. designation Mr. Henkel had to be at least 30 years of age, had to have had a minimum of five years' experience in the practice of appraising, had to submit at least three acceptable. reports on fee appraisals to be graded by the Institute, had to pass a minimum of two examinations, and had to have the recommendation of appraisers familiar with his work.



Thanksgiving, 1942-1962

Going through some of the bound volumes of the Grosse Pointe News issues of years past, we came upon a Thanksgiving editorial which appeared on November 26, 1942. Written by the late Mark K. Edgar during that first year of our participation in World War II, its message seems particularly appropriate now, 20 years later. We couldn't hope to improve on it, so we take the liberty of reprinting it in this issue.

"This is the Thanksgiving that should stand out as the most meaningful in our whole history since that first one observed on the grim shores of New England more than three centuries ago.

"Thankfulness for our more material possessions should be subordinated to a Great Gratitude that these things furnish us the means to the attainment of a High Purpose.

"That first Thanksgiving, which was evoked when the products of the fields, the forests and the waters were sufficient to assure our physical survival, has progressed to the present Thanksgiving with its realization that they implement the doctrine of a world-wide Human Brotherhood.

"The greater significance of this day is that it treats of the Spirit of Man rather than his passing material needs.

"Today we face the whole world and count both its spiritual and material needs.

"The taking stock of our material resources should be only a reminder of the Responsibility and the Privilege that lodges with us to assume the leadership in the titanic struggle whose deeper meaning is the attainment of a happier state for mankind.

"We should give thanks this day to the Almighty that we have been selected by Him as a People to lead the world to this better state, and that we have the power under His guidance to reach the goal.

"Actually," Pendergast said, these books cannot tell the reader anything basic about the social security law that he would not find in the free booklets and leaflets available at the Detroit-East Social Security Dis-

In fact, if advice contained in some of the books were followed, it might result in extensive investigation by this office and thus delay social security payments rather than expedite their issuance. Further, following some of the advice might place the individual in a worse rather than a better financial position,

Monday, November 19 COMMUNIST CHINESE TROOPS poured into India yesterday, attacking on three points along the eastern and western borders. Both sides claim heavy casualties in what Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru now describes as "total war," and fierce fighting is reported in all three sectors. An Indian Defense Ministry spokesman revealed that the Chinese captured Walong, a strategic town in the Northeast Frontier Agency (NEFA), Saturday night, and have continued to advance some 10 to 12 miles beyond it, driving toward the Assam Valley and India's rich Digboi oil fields.

Sunday's thrust was the strongest Red offensive since the start of the Chinese-Indian "war" some four weeks ago, and the fall of Walong, with its important airstrip, is India's most serious setback to date. Communist troops were also reported to have pushed southward from the monastery town of Towang, some 250 miles west of Walong, and are forcing Indian forces back five or six miles to their main defensive positions at 14,000-foot-high Se La Pass. The Pass guards a mountain track leading down to Tezpur, Indian headquarters in Assam. Meanwhile, on the Western front, the Reds mounted an offensive against Chusul, vital Ladakh air supply center, Sunday morning.

Speaking to an anniversary gathering of the Auxiliary Air Force, Territorial Army and National Cadet Corps, Prime Minister Nehru said yesterday: "It is no longer a border war between India and China . . it is an invasion of India, I do not know how other countries will be affected by it." Nehru told his audience "We are preparing to meet this total war," adding that "possibly every able-bodied person will have to


