Highlight of this election was Durant's dramatic announcement that he had resigned from the John Birch Society. Less than a week later, however, at another GOP meeting, he admitted his resignation was "a political move," adding that he still retained his beliefs.

Romney, in turn, speaking to the GOP state convention, renewed his attack on Durant and the John Birch Society, demanding legislation permitting political parties to remove local leaders who proved "unworthy or unfit."

Despite Romney's public blast at the state convention, Durant sees no reason why Michigan Republicans should not work well together. He believes his relationship with Romney will be "harmonious" from now on, revealed that the governor-elect had sent him a telegram after the election, thanking him for his support.

Durant's "olive branch" does not extend as far as former State Senator John H. Stahlin, however. The arch-conservative is still pushing his million-dollar libel suit against Stahlin, who last summer accused him of attempting to take over Wayne County's Republican organization.

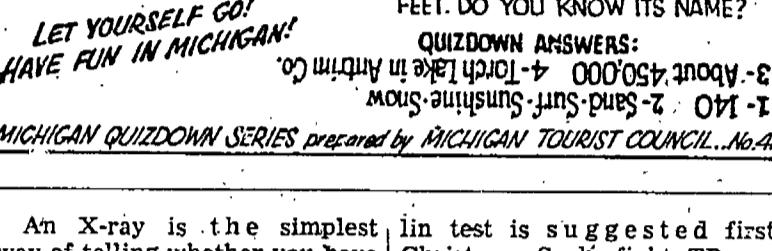

### Pointe Doctors Receive Grants

Gifts and grants of \$181,100 were accepted by the Wayne State University Board of Governors at its monthly meeting on Tuesday, November 20.

The largest single grant was \$68,930 from the U. S. Public Health Service to Dr. Walter H. Seegers, 832 Notre Dame, Grosse Pointe, professor and chairman of physiology at the College of Medicine. Dr. Seegers will continue his research on prothrombin, one of the clotting factors in blood.

The Upjohn Company also granted \$5,000 for Dr. Seegers' blood coagulation studies.

Some other U. S. Public Health Service grants, which totaled \$97,588, include: \$8,666 for chemical research titled "Anthracene-Type Carcinogenic Aryl Hydrocarbons" directed by Dr. George H. Schenk, Jr., 3124 Coolidge, Royal Oak, of the College of Liberal Arts; \$7,992 to Dr. Adrian C. Kuyper, 1776 Roslyn, Grosse Pointe Farms, College of Medicine; for his research on the chemistry of bone salt formation; \$5,300 for continuation of research on the "Chemical Composition of Isolated Cell Walls of Fungi" by Dr. Jerome M. Aronson, 8521 Yale, Oak Park, of the biology department.

Harper Hospital gave \$18,020 for the Department of Medicine Training Program Fund.

The National Science Foundation granted \$10,360 to support a "Research Participation for High School Teachers Program" directed by Dr. John P. Oliver, 24041 Norwood, Oak Park, of the chemistry department.

Dr. John J. Lee, 15143 Greenview, of the College of Education received \$3,000 from the Michigan Society for Crippled

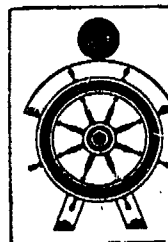

### Pumping Station Controls Rewiring to Cost \$2,440

The Park council on Monday, November 26, gave the go-ahead for the rewiring of controls in the city pumping station, Jefferson and Maryland.

The council gave the job to the Miller-Selden Electric company, which offered to do the work for \$2,440. The quoted figure was the lowest of four bids submitted. The highest was \$2,978.

George Roth of Hubbell, Roth and Clark, city engineers, told the council that the firm was a reputable one, and recommended the work be given to the company. All bids submitted were below the \$3,000 estimated cost of the rewiring job, Roth said.

### Chapin to Take Washington Post

WASHINGTON, D. C.: The appointment of a new top-level aide has been announced by the Very Rev. Francis B. Sayre, Jr., Dean of Washington Cathedral. He has named John C. Chapin, 42, as Communications Warden, effective December 15.

Commenting on his new staff member, Dean Sayre said, "The appointment of John Chapin makes a key step forward in our plans for an expanded ministry by the Cathedral. He will have the major responsibility for increasing the effectiveness of our communications, not only between our associated institutions — our three schools, two colleges and the Cathedral proper — but also, a full-scale, carefully-directed outreach to the world which we serve: Washington, the Nation and the Church at large."

"In addition, he will join with me and other staff members in our efforts to relate to and communicate with 'men at work' in this great city, the crossroads of the world and the political capital of our national life."

"For these responsibilities, John Chapin is uniquely qualified. He comes to us after twelve years as Communications Director of the Diocese of Michigan. Active in the larger life of the Episcopal Church, he has served as a parish vestryman, a deputy to General Convention, a member of the Presiding Bishop's Committee on Laymen's Work, and a member of the Board of Directors of the Church Society for College Work."

"Professionally, he is a member of the Public Relations Society of America, the National Religious Publicity Council, the Associated Church Press and is a past officer of the National Diocesan Press."

### Reading Course Lures Students

Twenty Grosse Pointe High School students have been enrolled in an "after hours" reading laboratory class, scheduled for Thursday afternoons, from 3:30 to 4:30 o'clock.

The boys and girls, unable to take advantage of regularly scheduled school-hour laboratory sessions because of conflicting schedules, elected to spend a portion of their free time learning to improve their reading skills. Teachers customarily gear reading assignments to the pace of the average reader, leaving poor or slow readers to struggle twice as long over the same amount of homework.

The reading "lab", with its tachistoscope, electric and manual pagers, time tests and supplementary magazines, aims at forcing the student to improve his reading speed and comprehension. Boys and girls are made to scan a page faster and faster, at the same time broadening their comprehension scope and learning better study techniques.

Francis Wessel, laboratory teacher, reports that students in his regularly scheduled class have doubled their reading speed since the beginning of the school year.



gear control circuit wiring system in the pumping station, according to City Manager Robert Stone, will boost the efficiency of the controls and permit the pumps to begin working within a few minutes. The controls can be operated manually, or by electric power.

The rewiring of the controls, to be completed December 27, is another improvement made in the pumping station. Recently, the Park completed modernization of pump machinery in the station, and the enlarging of a sewer from the station to a Detroit interceptor at Jefferson and Alter roads.

The modernization and improvements cost the city a total of \$186,000, excluding the cost of the rewiring.

The former program was undertaken when the Park was directed by the State Health Department, the Wayne County Health Department and the State Waterways Commission in Lansing to stop polluting Fox Creek.

For years the Park has been pumping its storm waters and sewage into the creek during heavy storms, which raised protests from residents living adjacent to the waterway, and who use the creek for their boats.

The residents took legal action, claiming the pollution was hazardous to health and recreation, and after several meetings with state and local health officials, the Park accepted full responsibility and agreed to take steps to eliminate the condition.

The last phase of the big project, the installation and connecting of the enlarged sewer, was completed during the early part of June.

### Drops Cigarette, Runs into Pole

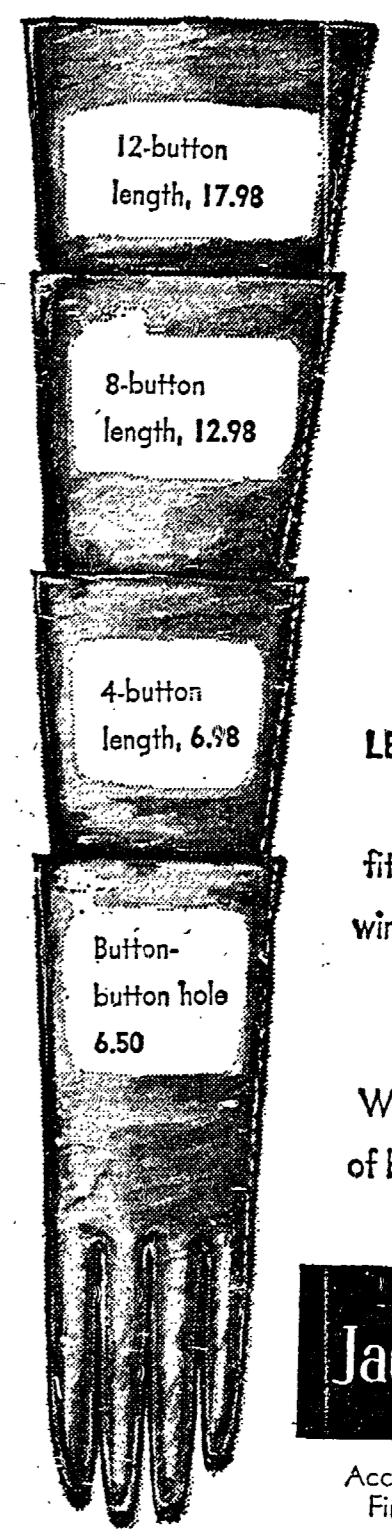

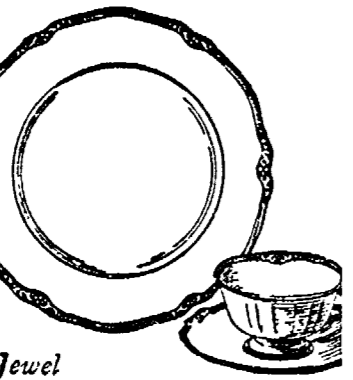

### Water Problem Parley Called

"Michigan can claim title to the largest fresh water supply in the world," said Harry R. Hall, executive vice president of the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce, "and still the archeologists of the future will dig up what remains of our fat and wasteful society and find ample evidence to conclude that we were a poorly civilized race of paganistic destructionists with little, if any, real appreciation of our magnificent natural heritage."

"Michigan's unparalleled water resources serve as an example of thoughtless waste," Hall continued. "While it is true that Michigan can rightfully be called 'The Water Wonderland,' this does not rule out the fact that we have water problems. We do have problems, but they have not yet reached the critical stage. Certain portentous trends need to be recognized now to meet future needs of industry, recreation, agriculture, and rapidly expanding municipalities."

The State Chamber of Commerce, realizing this tremendous importance of water as a basic resource to every person and every business in Michigan, is completing plans for the first Water Resources Conference ever to be held in the state. Co-sponsors of the conference, set for Tuesday, December 4, are the Michigan Farm Bureau, Michigan United Conservation Clubs and the Michigan Municipal League, all of whom are vitally concerned with water uses and abuses.  
The all day sessions will start at 9:30 in the morning and will continue most of the day in the Lansing Civic Center, with top-notch speakers and panelists on the program.  
Hall is urging that every businessman consider the conference as an important "first step" in meeting the situation. "Everyone is involved, either directly or indirectly about a sound, sensible, and workable solution," he said.

Newark, N. J., to Washington National Airport, crashed mysteriously on a farm near Elliott City, Md. The plane had already been cleared for final approach. Suddenly, it dropped from the airport radar scope, and, seconds later, plummeted to earth in a heavily wooded area immediately north of Washington, D.C. It exploded upon hitting the ground.

Ten Civil Aeronautics Board investigators were dispatched to the scene, but so far no one has ascertained the actual cause of the disaster. The British-made prop-jet apparently came down almost vertically, falling like an out-of-control elevator. As its wreckage was all in one heap with no path of destruction cutting the woods, as would have been inevitable if the plane had come in at a flatter angle. The 13 passengers and four crew members had no chance to escape.

James Clark, Jr., Maryland State Senator and one of the first to arrive at the crash scene, described it as "utter destruction." "The debris was scattered over a large area," Clark said. "There were pieces of metal and other things hanging from the trees." A nearby farmer, W. Clark Gaither, heard a "funny noise" just prior to the explosion. When he ran outside, "red flames were shooting 30 to 40 feet in the air above the trees." A Baltimore resident, W. S. Herb, also described the noise made by the Viscount's engines immediately before the crash as "funny." Herb, who estimated the plane's altitude at about 1,500 feet when it went into a nose dive, said it hit the ground "like 20 sticks of dynamite going off."

These preliminary accounts seem to indicate that the Viscount, its Rolls-Royce engines rated most reliable in aviation by the Federal Aviation Agency's own statistics, must have suffered some kind of freakish multiple-engine failure.

Sunday, November 25 THE UNITED STATES and Britain will give India "any assistance" she requests, regardless of the manner in which she (India) decides to deal with Peking's truce terms. High diplomatic sources in London revealed Saturday that both the British and American missions in New Delhi have been advised to make this "carte blanche" assistance offer clear to Prime Minister Nehru, at the same time assessing India's needs speedily and competently, from on-the-spot observation.

"1800 are teaching—a variety of subjects in elementary, secondary and apprenticeship schools and in colleges and universities. Of the 1,015 men and women currently in training throughout the United States in Peace Corps training programs for projects in the first 38 countries, as well as 3 additional countries, another 500 are destined for teaching assignments overseas.

"Thus half the Peace Corps Volunteers have not only learned foreign languages and about foreign cultures, but are getting invaluable practice in teaching foreign students under difficult conditions. Many Peace Corps Volunteers never taught in the

United States before they were selected, trained and sent overseas by the Peace Corps for teaching assignments, but the experience has led many to indicate their desire to launch teaching careers when they return to the United States after their two-year tour of Peace Corps duty."

THE GUATEMALAN government reports yesterday's Air Force revolt has been crushed, President Miguel Ydigoras Fuentes has the full support of the Army, and the situation in the Central American Republic is now completely under control.

Ydigoras, speaking on radio and television Sunday night, accused his implacable enemy, Fidel Castro, of masterminding yesterday's uprising. The President said he had learned, via his intelligence service, that former

Guatemalan University Students Association director, Arnulfo Parada Tovar, brought \$300,000 from Cuba to finance the revolt. Rebel Air Force units attacked the Presidential Palace and Army barracks Sunday, their strafing warplanes missing a direct hit on President Ydigoras, at work in the building, only by chance.

According to a Government communique, Loyalist anti-aircraft batteries shot down one of the attacking planes. Only two aircraft actually took part in the raids, the majority of the Air Force units remaining loyal and reinforcing Army units at the besieged barracks.

Red Cross officials report two civilians killed and some 30 wounded, most by stray bullets from planes attacking the barracks. The planes scored a di-

rect hit on president Ydigoras' office, but the 67-year-old Army general, who directed military operations against the rebels, was in another room at the time and escaped injury.

Leading the rebels were four Air Force colonels, Oscar Giron Perrone, once mentioned as a possible candidate in Guatemala's 1963 elections, Carlos Marroquin, Marco Asturias Sobral and Jose Gonzalez Batres. They are said either to have fled to El Salvador or to have taken refuge in Guatemala's Salvadoran Embassy.

Tuesday, November 27

FIDEL CASTRO'S reciprocal inspection offer — a proposal which would permit United Nations inspection teams to operate in Cuba providing similar

to tour United States bases—has been categorically rejected by the United States Government. Tearing the Caribbean strongman's latest "deal" an attempt to circumvent international safeguards against Cuba again becoming an offensive weapons base, U.S. authorities declared privately that they had no intention of agreeing to this latest proposal, adding that Russia and the United States have already come to an agreement on UN inspection in Cuba.

The authorities stated that the United States is the injured party in the Cuban missile base affair, and that the U.S. Government does not intend to be coerced into making further concessions on inspection. Castro's "reciprocal inspection deal" was proposed in a 2,000-word Havana-issued statement.

## Plan Exhibit At Institute

An exhibition of approximately 45 etchings, lithographs and woodcuts, entitled "The Graphic Arts of the Post-Impressionist Period," will be displayed in the Print Gallery of the Detroit Institute of Arts from December 4 through January 27. The object of this collection is to coordinate the graphic arts with the major exhibition of paintings by Vincent Van Gogh, opening December 12, and to show Van Gogh in relation to his contemporaries.

The selection of graphic arts will offer a few works by Impressionists such as Sisley, Pissarro and Manet, but the main emphasis is upon a much larger group showing the work of men often referred to as Post-Impressionists: Degas, Renoir, Cezanne, Gauguin and Toulouse-Lautrec.

Two rather rare prints by Van Gogh himself will be shown: his early study for the Potato Eaters, one of the paintings in the major exhibition, and a portrait of Dr. Paul Gachet, a physician who befriended many painters.

The majority of the works have been borrowed from the Toledo Museum of Art, the Lessing J. Rosenwald collection and the Art Department of Albion College. Another lender is Bernard Walker, Detroit collector, whose "Spirit of the Dead Watching" by Gauguin and several fine Renoirs are of special interest.

Miss Elizabeth Payne, curator who is responsible for arranging the exhibition, is supplementing the loans with some excellent impressions from the Museum's permanent collection.

"Mrs. Bird believes that any person or organization gaining profit from a community must return something to the community. For several years she has brought in Marguerite-Buck, Style Director of NHCA to consult with local women. Several times the shop has paid for stage productions and charity shows presenting Madame Buck."

Marie Bird was first in giving scholarships, even prior to the National organizations. She would pick a high school graduate and pay to sponsor her beauty school career. Then if the girl chose she came to work in the shop. Two of these recipients work in her salon now. These activities and 38 years in the beauty profession have made Marie Bird one of the Pointes best known hairstylists and her Beauty Salon a favorite.

## Active Oldsters Stay Healthier

Older people can be happier and healthier if they keep active, according to a doctor at The University of Michigan Medical Center.

Dr. C. J. Tupper, director of employees' periodic examinations, offers a concrete program of daily activities to help the aged help themselves. He advises them to:

—Cultivate appropriate extrovert activities. Moderate sports and club activities, he says, can "lead to a feeling of belonging and of being a contributing individual."

—Keep in touch with current affairs. An older person's conversation can be interesting and stimulating if he's up-to-date on sports, politics, and books, Dr. Tupper explains. "Forget your past when talking no matter how superior you think it may have been. Focus your mind on the present and future."

—Pay more attention to dress and posture. "Walk buoyantly and sit erect, and try to keep your face as free from distortion as possible," Dr. Tupper stresses that a better appearance contributes to success with others and increases self-respect.

—Create a definite masculine or feminine personality. "A woman at 80 can be a fascinating and charming individual, obviously feminine; and a man of 80 can be strikingly masculine," Dr. Tupper says.

Also he cautions older people not to lose their sense of humor. All too frequently, he says, a person's sense of humor departs with the onset of aging. He points out that other activities that help are writing letters, attending church services, and doing maintenance work.

A simple thing like developing an inquiring attitude about food can make mealtime an adventure rather than a dull routine, he adds.

Finally, Dr. Tupper says, these points can serve as a daily checklist to constantly remind senior citizens that they can do something about the way they feel.

His comments were made on a University broadcast, co-sponsored by the Michigan State Medical Society.

## Holiday Crafts Being Displayed

The crafts of an earlier Christmas will be featured in the annual holiday exhibition at Henry Ford Museum December 7 through December 30.

Christmas ornaments, gifts and greeting cards of late 19th century style will be fashioned by skilled craftsmen of the Museum and Greenfield Village. They will demonstrate their handcraft skills as part of a unique exhibition of antiques associated with holiday customs and traditions of the American past.

Antique cookie cutters will be used by a baker working over a 19th century cast iron stove. A glass blower will create Christmas tree ornaments reproduced from antique examples.

The Museum's early 19th century "Washington Press," operated entirely by hand, will print Christmas cards representative of those sent at the time this press was in commercial operation.

Candle making, an important 17th and 18th century domestic craft, will be featured as the candlemaker produces Christmas gifts which were once a necessity. Candles will be formed from beeswax and bayberry from antique candle molds.

A Victorian Christmas tree decorated with candles and handblown glass ornaments will highlight the exhibition.

A visit to "The Crafts at Christmas" exhibition, according to the Museum's curator of decorative arts, Gerald Gibson, should provide a welcome respite from the rush of 20th century Christmas preparations.

The holiday exhibition will be open during the regular Museum hours, 9-5 daily, 9-6 Saturdays and Sundays. The Museum and Village will be closed on Christmas and New Year's Day.

Those who attend the exhibition will be among the more than one million visitors who will tour the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village this year. The Museum and Village, founded in 1929 by the late Henry Ford, house the world's largest collection of Americana.

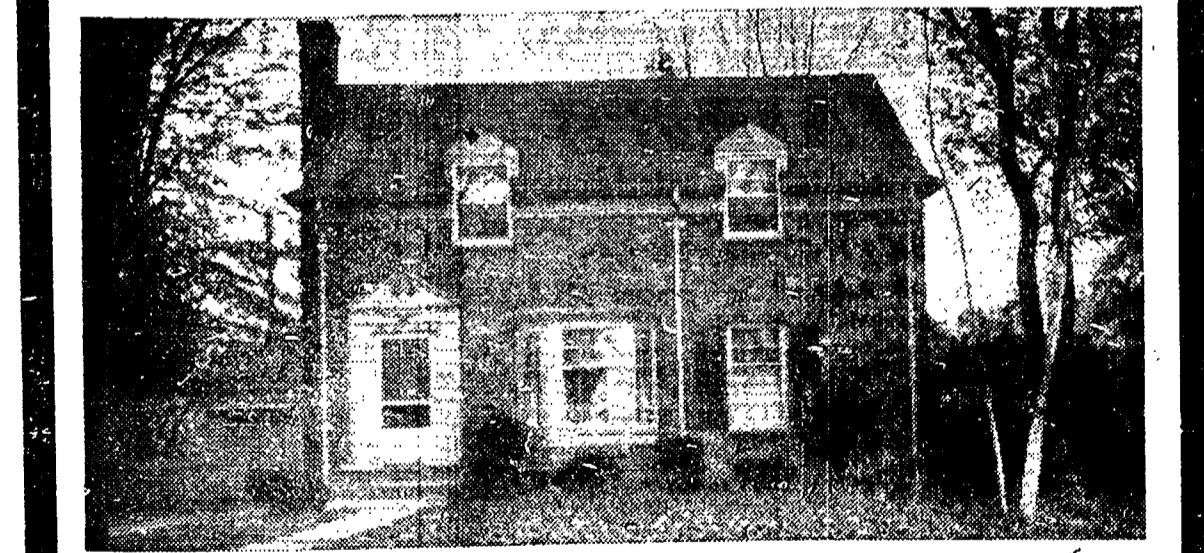

### Deadliest Month Starts Saturday

The deadliest month of the year in Detroit traffic begins Saturday, December 1.

Historically more persons are killed in Detroit each December than in any other month, according to records of the Detroit Police Department Accident Prevention Bureau. In the last decade, an average of 26 persons has met death each December, the records show.

Two facts stand out in an analysis of the records:

1. Most of those killed are pedestrians.
2. Most of the fatal victims are struck at night.

Aggravating the December situation is a rising trend of fatalities and serious injury accidents on Detroit streets in recent months that has resulted in a present 13 per cent increase in traffic deaths and an identical 13 per cent increase in injuries. The trend has caused both Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh and Police Commissioner George Edwards to appeal to Detroit drivers and pedestrians to exercise greater caution and courtesy in this period.

"I am greatly alarmed by the sharp increase in serious motor vehicle accidents in our city during the last few months," Mayor Cavanagh said. "Unless our citizens exercise greater care, and courtesy in traffic, as both drivers and pedestrians, the toll will be
