POINTES OPPOSE FLUORIDATION Legislators Pay Visit to Public Schools

Thursday, December 20 MICHIGAN pharmaceutical firms have contributed over a million dollars worth of drugs, earmarked for the ransom of some 1,000 Cuban prisoners-ofwar. Delta, Eastern and Northwest Airlines are flying the medicines, without charge, to Florida. "Well over a million dollars worth of antibiotics and pharmaceuticals" have been donated by Parke, Davis & Co., according to vice-president Carl Johnson, and Kalamazoo's Upjohn Co. revealed Wednesday that it has contributed \$250,000 worth of drugs. Upjohn is prepared, if necessary, to give \$1.5 million toward the Bay of Pigs POW ransom.

The United States Government, repudiating any official connection with a private citizens' committee currently negotiating the prisoners' release, has nonetheless acted as a more-than-welcome "silent partner" throughout ransom negotiations. Only last night, the Internal Revenue Service ruled that persons or firms donating medicines or food in the Cuban exchange may list the value of their donations as charity tax deductions.

Castro is reportedly willing to swap his 1,113 prisoners for \$62 million in drugs and food (\$25 million at the wholesale rate), and drug manufacturers will be permitted to write off the wholesale cost in taxes if the 1961 invasion captives

Woods Plans Referendum

Harper Woods Joins in Fight to Prevent Use of Chemicals in Water Supplied by Detroit

Officials of three Pointes and Harper Woods are opposed to Detroit's proposed water fluoridation program. Against fluoridated water, besides Harper Woods, are the Park, Shores and Woods, all customers of

Detroit's proposed fluoridation program is opposed in a recent Harper Woods resolution as "an additional exercise of power over our inhabitants, who are without voice or vote thereon."

The three Pointes have long standing resolutions against the use of the chemical in water, and have not amended them despite the Detroit Council's recent vote to fluoridate its water supply.

To Be Put to Vote The Woods plans to put the issue before its voters in a referendum vote in conjunction with a regular city election on April 1. The referendum received unanimous support at a Council meeting held on December 17.


Happy New Year and Thanks


The elite Brady Guards held their balls at the National, which in later years became the Russell Hotel. Firemen's balls were another festivity much anticipated by the local belles and beux.


Gentlemen in those days enjoyed dressing in cos-tume and at one memorable cotillion Theodore H. Hinchman appeared as Hamlet; T. D. Wilkins and A. J. Fraser, as Italian brigands; Henry P. Sanger as the Duke of Richmond; William Biddle as Mercutio from "Romeo and Juliet"; John Rumney as a Spanish courtier; Capt. S. Williams, as a French regimental officer; Samuel Lewis as a Korean, "who looked very odd", and Mrs. Alex J. Fraser as a Grecian maiden in a white silk short shift with a blue tunic and a white plume in her hair.

Mr. Chase, the proprietor of the National, had a daughter, Charlotte, who married Dr. Charles Casgrain, founder of the Detroit branch of this family. Dr. Casgrain practised in Detroit for some years then moved to Canada and it was there, at Sandwich, where his son, Charles William Casgrain, was born in 1859.




