 257, at an approximate cost of \$1,723.
Could Shelter 3,163
 At present, 3,163 persons could be sheltered in existing school building facilities. If an additional \$25,842 were spent to increase those facilities, shelter capacity would be more than doubled, reaching a 7,149 person total.

house present students and personnel in each of the buildings. "Although we all recognize our responsibility for safeguarding the children," he added, "it is questionable whether the Board could or should attempt to justify the expenditure of school funds to provide public fallout shelters."
Quotes Council's Report
 Dr. Wilson quoted a recent statement of the National Council on Schoolhouse Construction regarding use of school buildings as fallout shelters: "School plants intended to

serve as fallout shelters require extra expenditures not educational in nature. It is not conceivable that school shelters will serve school personnel only. "Consequently, extra expenditures beyond the normal local school construction cost level are non-educational and are not legitimate charges against school tax or capital outlay funds. The Council maintains that all extra and incidental costs attributable to shelter design or in excess of educational requirements should be provided by outside or general revenue sources. School boards should refuse to dedicate bond funds or school tax financing of shelter facilities, because school financing authority is designed solely for the education of children and youth."
City Officials Contacted
 The Superintendent noted that his office has been in contact with officials from Grosse Pointe Park, Farms and Woods, and that these local officials are responsible for presenting the survey information, securing licenses from the Board of Education, declaring school buildings available for use as public fallout shelters and stocking them with food, water, disposal facilities and radiation instruments.

Lawrence C. Savage, Grosse Pointe City Manager, commenting on the Corps of Engineers survey, revealed that only one building in the City, the Neff road pumping station, meets Federal shelter standards. The City, like the Shores, conducts most of its Civil Defense business through the Wayne County Civil Defense organization.

The Park, Farms and Woods, all with populations in excess of 10,000, process most municipal Civil Defense work in their own offices.
Have Consolidated Unit
 There is a consolidated Grosse Pointe Civil Defense Unit, with an organized medical team and radiation detection devices ready for use in an emergency. George Elworthy, former Neighborhood Club director, was appointed head of Grosse Pointe CD in 1940.

When Elworthy resigned as Director of the Neighborhood Club and Director of Civil Defense in 1962, the latter office was allowed to lapse. To date, no new Director of Grosse Pointe Civil Defense has been appointed.
 Obviously, the cost of providing every Grosse Pointe resident with community shelter space would be prohibitive, if undertaken by the municipalities alone. And although the Federal Government considers the fallout problem national in scope, no Federal funds for new community shelter construction are available at the present time.

Who Makes Decisions?
 Grosse Pointe's School Superintendent apparently does not believe school funds should be appropriated to expand existing school shelter facilities. Even if the City of Grosse Pointe agreed to set aside a portion of its revenues to increase shelter capacity at the Neff road pumping station, how many residents could be crammed into this one existing building?
 And who is to decide which residents shall be crammed in?

 It was pointed out that Park patrolmen are getting \$700 less, and sergeants, \$1,300 less, than their counterparts in the Detroit Police Department.
 Also that Park patrolmen are receiving \$1,900 less than most cities on the West Coast, and \$2,100 less than patrolmen in Washington, D. C.

It was also pointed out that the Park and Harper Woods, are the only two Pointe area communities that do not have city pension plans. Both come under the State Pension Plan System which requires service until 55 years of age, instead of retirement after 25 years of service.



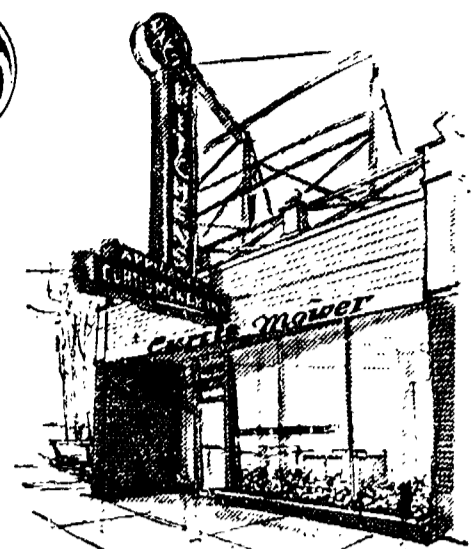

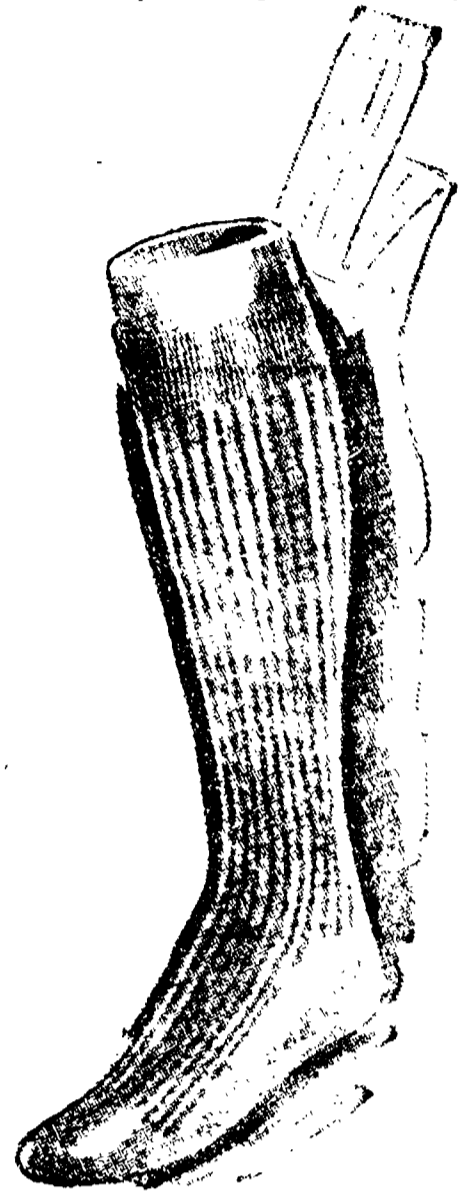

Great Decisions Meeting Tonight

The second meeting of Great Decisions 1963 will be held tonight, Thursday, February 14, at 7:30 p.m., in the Friends Room of the Main Library, Kercheval at Fisher road. Discussion will center on the topic "Red China and the USSR — How firm an alliance?"

With the Sino-Soviet rift already affecting the solidarity of the Communist bloc, a definite break between Moscow and Peking — with far-reaching consequences for world communism as well as the U.S.—is no longer a remote possibility.

How serious is this rift between Red China and the U.S.S.R.? Where is it heading? What are its underlying causes, its impact on the world Communist movement? How does it affect the United States?

These are among the questions to be discussed at tonight's meeting, and all interested Grosse Pointers are cordially invited to actively participate in this and other Great Decisions forums.

Great Decisions, now in its ninth year, is a program of local discussion groups patterned along the lines of early American town meetings. Sponsored by the Foreign Policy Association, a non-partisan educational organization founded in 1918, it has been endorsed by every U. S. President from Woodrow Wilson to John F. Kennedy.

Participants in the Great Decisions programs are provided with fact sheet kits, at \$1.50 each. There is no other charge.

Individual groups are encouraged to emphasize the expression of opinion, on a consensus rather than attempt to reach consensus. They are urged to take no political group action but to serve, primarily, as a sounding board for personal observations and opinions.

In April, when the current eight-week series comes to an end, all discussion groups will be invited to participate in a seminar at Wayne State University. U. S. Senator Phillip Hart, a Michigan member of Congress, and a member of the State Department will serve as resource leaders at this general meeting.

In Grosse Pointe, Great Decisions 1963 meets weekly at the Central Library, on Thursday evenings, 7:30 o'clock. Other groups have been formed at Grosse Pointe Memorial Church and Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church.

Future topics include "Algeria — What future?"; "Spain — End of the Franco era?"; "India — Is Democracy working?"; "Laos and Vietnam — Southeast Asia in danger?"; and "Alliance for Progress — New Deal for the Americas?" The series will close with an overall look at "Peace — What problems and prospects?"

Judge Belanger Submits Report on Park's Court

The total revenue collected by the Park Municipal Court and Violation Bureau during 1962 amounted to \$32,968.65, according to an annual report submitted by Park Judge C. Joseph Belanger.

The judge disclosed that \$11,977.20 was from fines, penalties and costs imposed by the municipal court; \$20,651.50 collected by the Violation Bureau; \$149.95 received from fees paid to the Park City Treasury on State cases handled in his court; and \$190 was from fines and costs on appeal cases received from the Wayne County Circuit Court.

The number of cases heard in municipal court last year was 951; traffic violations paid in the Violations Bureau, 5,730; and State cases tried (including civil suits), 21.

Under the Park City Charter, fees covering State cases are not retained by the municipal judge, but are and have been paid to the city treasurer.

In a summary of his report, Judge Belanger stated that the greatest majority of traffic cases justifying recommendation of restriction of driving privileges were referred to the Office of Secretary of State in Lansing, and because of the point driving rules, most of the cases were handled by cooperation with that office.

"The court received and issued all necessary criminal complaints during the past year," the judge stated, "including all warrants, and held all arraignments and examinations when demanded."

The state provides about only one-third of The University of Michigan's income for operations.

"The court also undertook and discharged such other proceedings as were necessary respecting defendants in felony and/or high misdemeanor matters, including the binding and remanding of certain defendants to the Wayne County Circuit Court for further proceedings and/or trial," Judge Belanger added.

He stated that the matters

turned over to the Circuit Court were those in which his court had no jurisdiction over final disposition.

In his opinion, Judge Belanger said, the Grosse Pointe Park Police Department continues to be the finest in the State, and once again, the court is indebted to Police Chief Arthur Louwers for his able and intelligent leadership of that department.

The judge expressed his gratitude for the active and intelligent services rendered by Mrs. Grace McCracken, court clerk; Mrs. Betty Ann Calvin, deputy court clerk; and Mrs. Veronica Fodell, Violation Bureau clerk-typist.

City Manager Robert Slone was lauded for his able and continued cooperation during 1962.

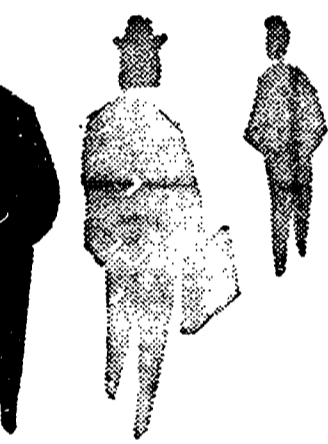

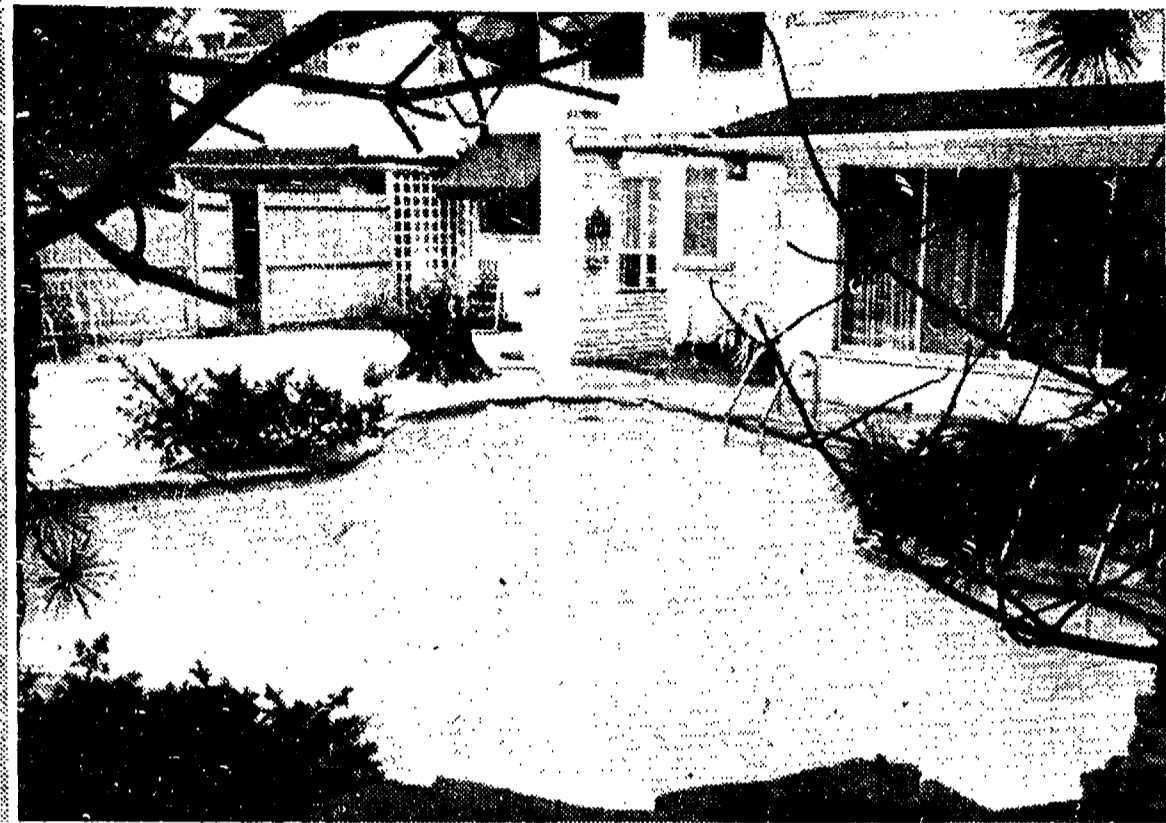

Supreme Court Declares Controversial Rule 9 Void

The Michigan Supreme Court, on Wednesday, February 6, voted unanimously to void controversial "Rule 9," intended to prevent discriminatory practices by real estate brokers and salesmen.

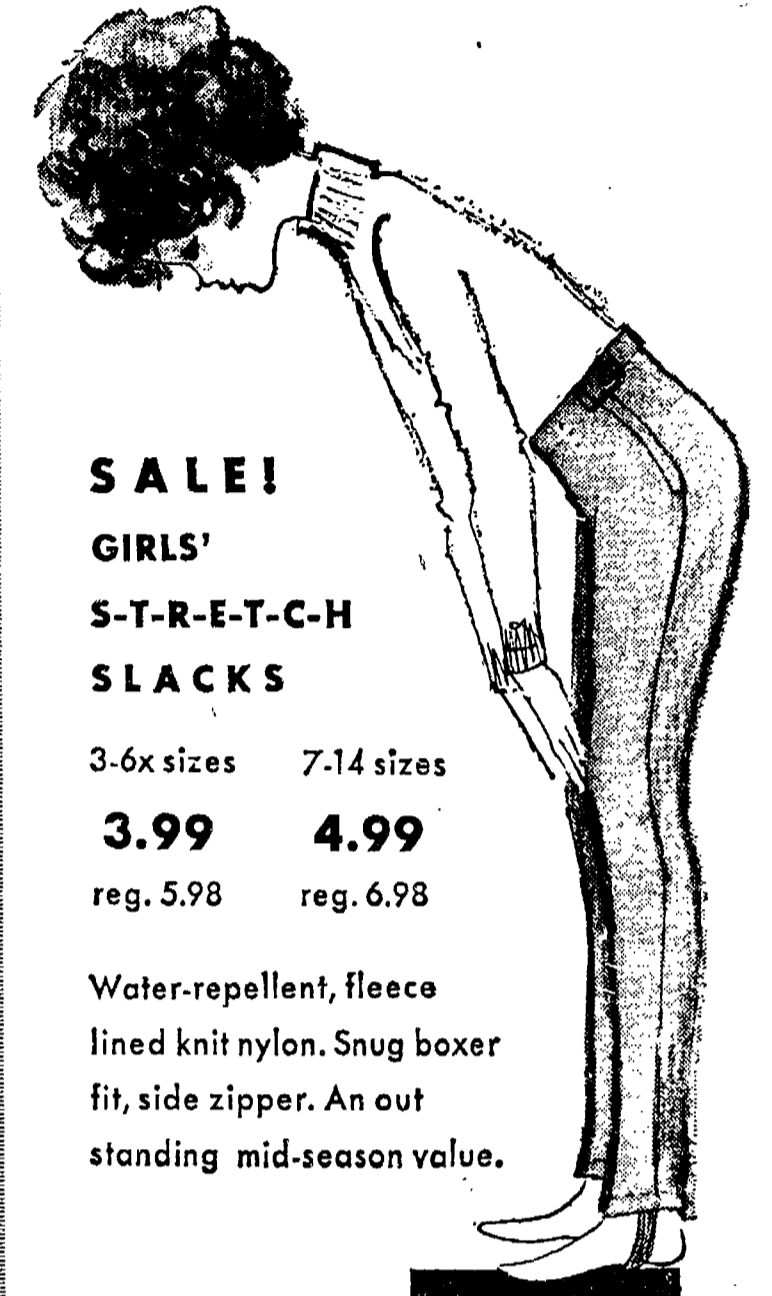
Rule 9 forbade real estate brokers or salesmen to refuse to offer for sale, or to buy or to offer to buy, or to receive an offer to sell or to buy, or to appraise, or to list, or to negotiate the purchase, sale, exchange or mortgage of any type of property "because of the race, color, religion, national origin or ancestry of any person or persons."

Supreme Court justices who ruled on the question found Rule 9, in its present form, too unwieldy, its terms too broad to be delegated for implementation by the Legislature to a State administrative agency without violating Michigan's Constitution.

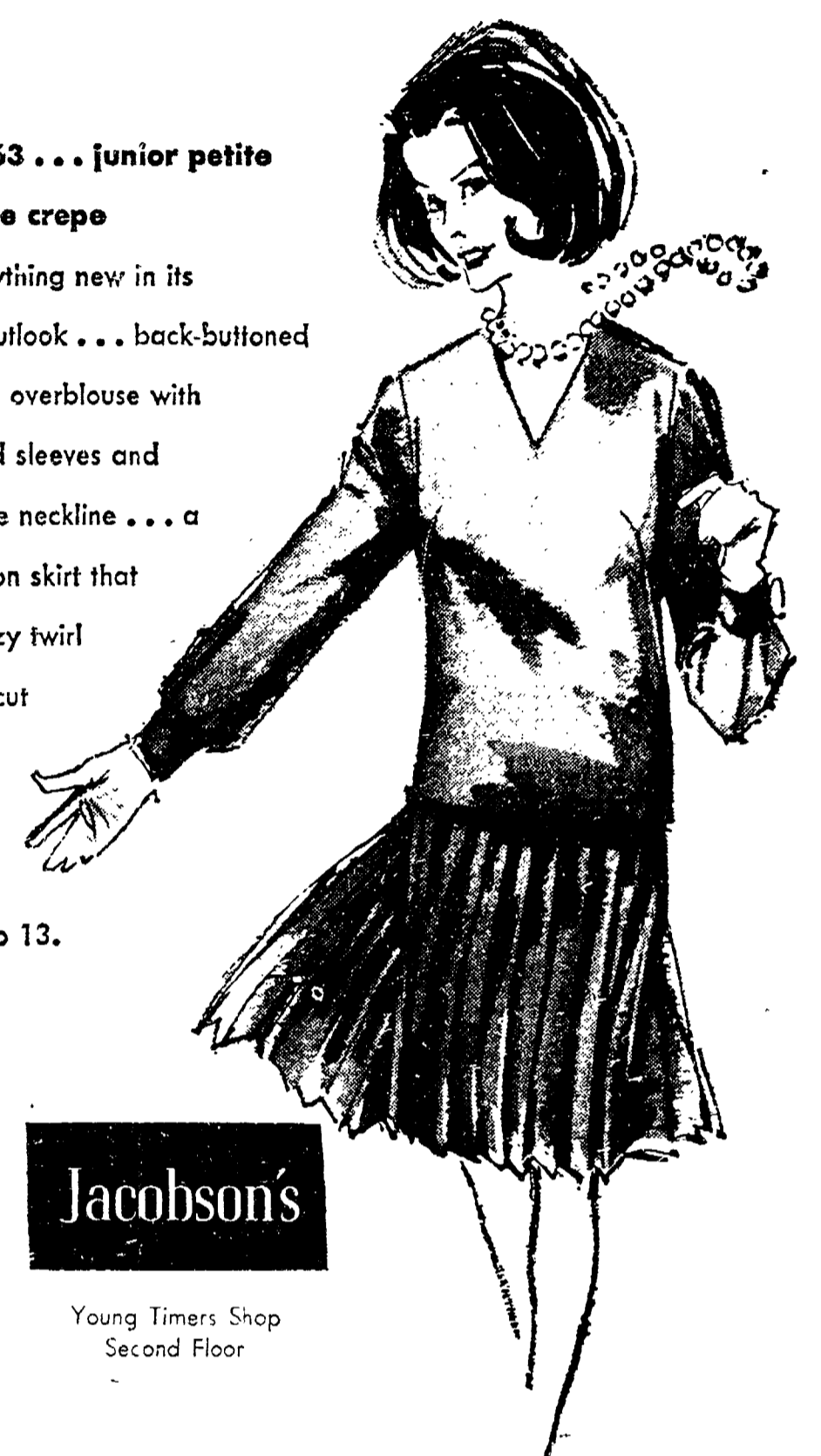

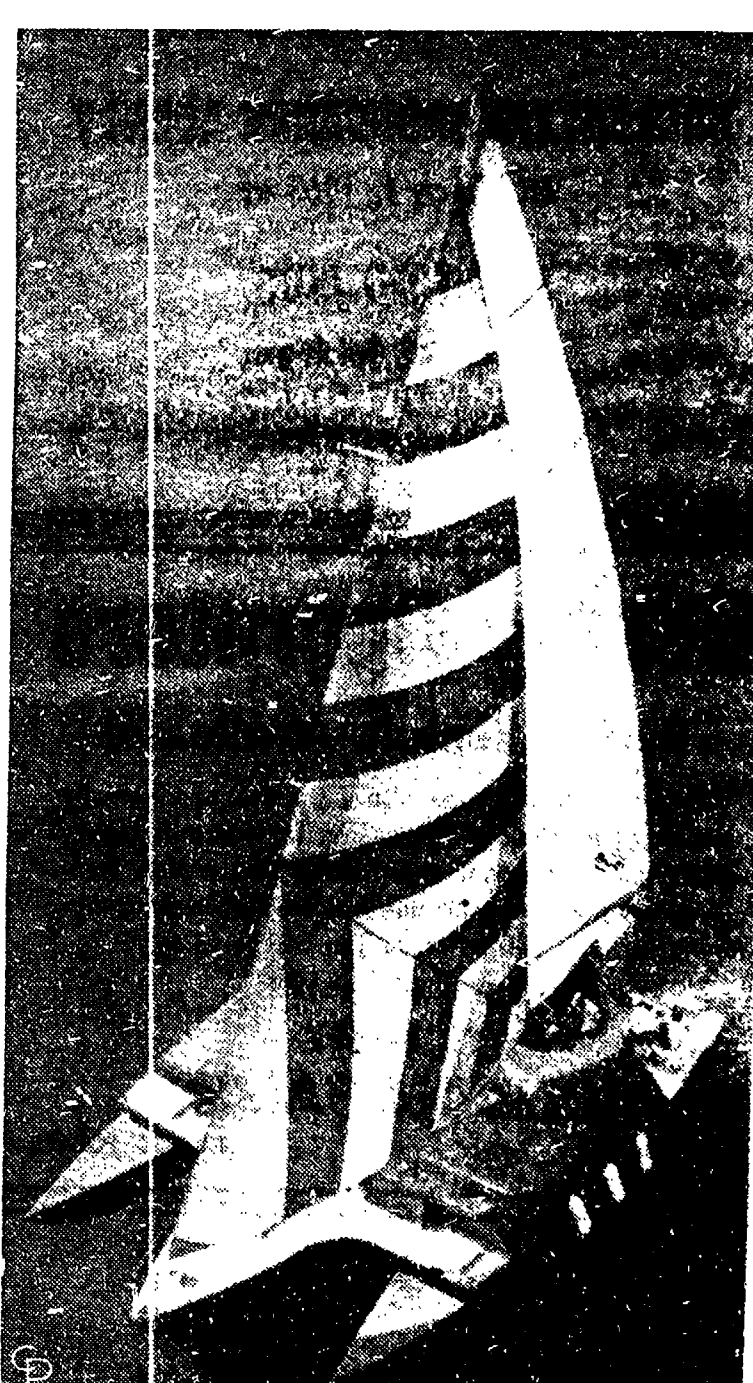

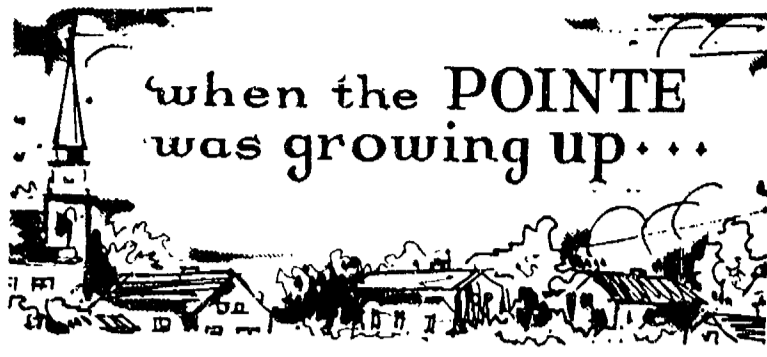

When the POINTE was growing up

By Pat Talbot

Commuting to downtown Detroit has been quite a trial to Pointers this winter but nothing to compare with the pioneer conditions which prevailed at the turn of the century.

The interurban railway was the most reliable method and the fastest if the horse and buggy was unavailable. The railway had been built about 1890 as a continuation of the Detroit line.

Lakeside is a forgotten community beyond the present Grosse Pointe Yacht Club which once included two large hotels and numerous summer cottages.

The single track often was blocked by snow drifts and falling tree limbs. The cars made a maximum speed of about 38 miles an hour and the fare from Detroit to Fisher road was ten cents.

Occasionally there would be special cars run from Detroit to the old Country Club at the foot of Fisher road for parties. Mrs. Cameron Waterman remembers trips abroad these interurban cars.

One of the DuPonts, who owned stock in the Detroit United Railway, and lived for a time where the present Horace Dodge estate is located had a private car which he rode to and from his Woodward office.

As the Model T Fords and the Chalmers and Olds made their appearance on the city's streets the interurban became obsolete. In May, 1928 the late Norbert Neff met the early 5 a.m. car leaving the Pointe with motorman Charles Lenman in charge and served a stop order procured after a protracted court battle.

When he was a five year old lad in knee pants in Leeds, England, Trant Jarman dreamed of race driving. This month his dream came true when he drove a British Falcon Sprint in the Monte Carlo Rally, the mecca of all top flight drivers.

In spite of miserable weather conditions, ice and snow making the mountain roads almost impossible to navigate, with his co-driver, British Peter Jopp, Jarman drove his car to win a first place trophy in his class and place 35th in the 2500 mile arduous four day race.

Thursday he left for Toronto where he will drive a Simca in the Canadian International Rally. He arrived home from Monte Carlo toward the end of January and hopes to compete in next year's international race which culminates in the fairytale kingdom of Princess Grace and Prince Rainier.

Although most drivers do not worry unduly about their physical condition, (Monte Carlo winner Erik Carlsson has a middle-aged paunch), Jarman keeps physically fit by playing squash and running.

He drove 10,000 practise miles across France before the January 19 starting gun. Rally drivers start from capitals all over Europe and end the race in Monte Carlo.
